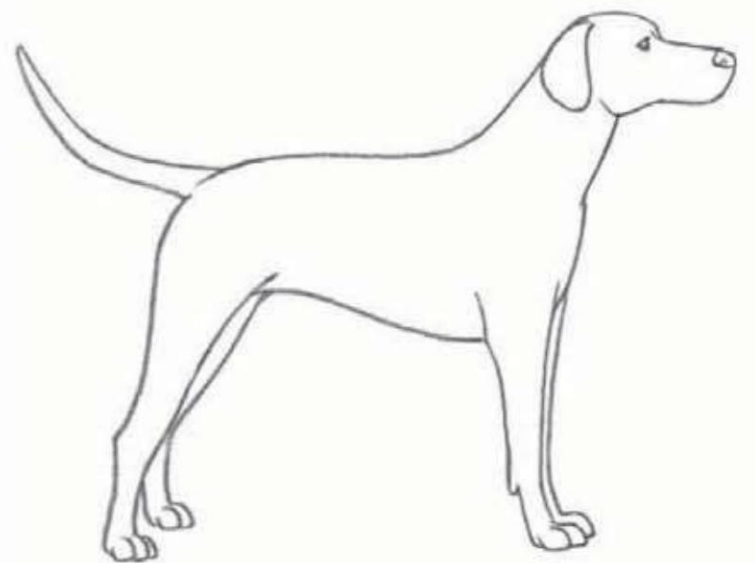
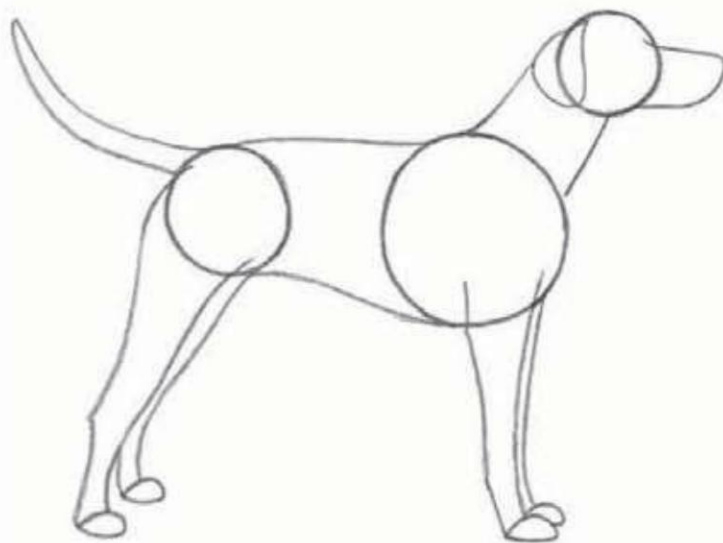


Getting Started

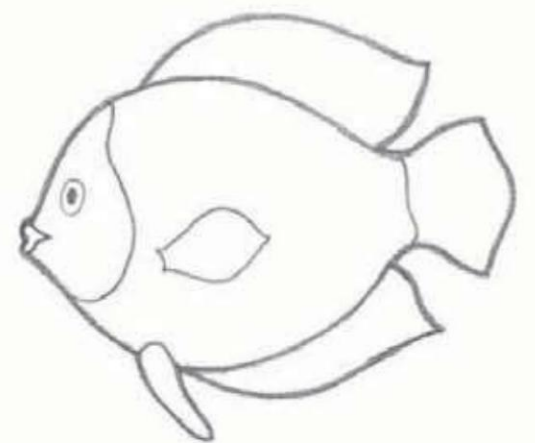
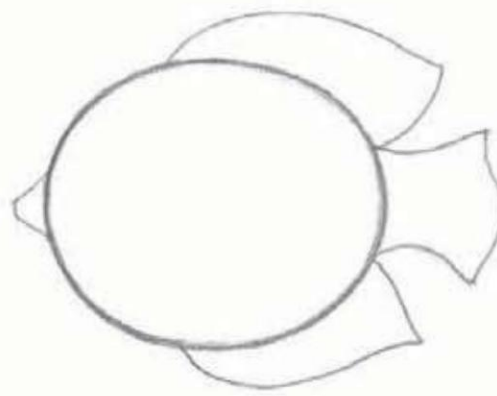
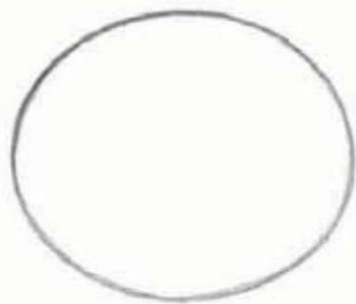
Circles

are used to draw a standing dog's chest and hips.



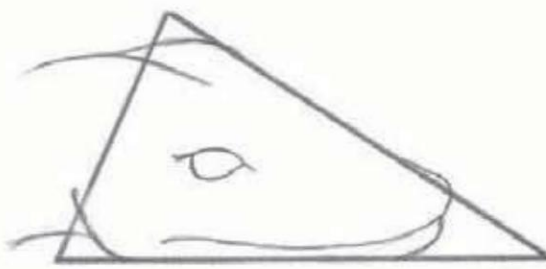
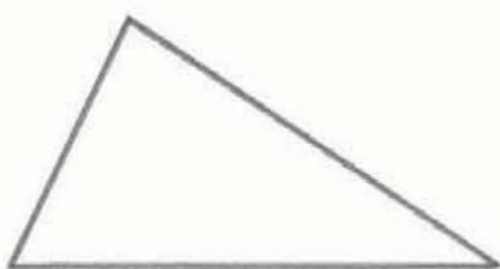
Ovals

Triangles

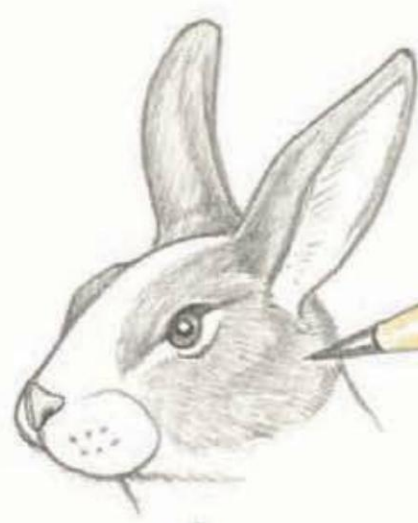
are best for angled parts, like a snake's head.



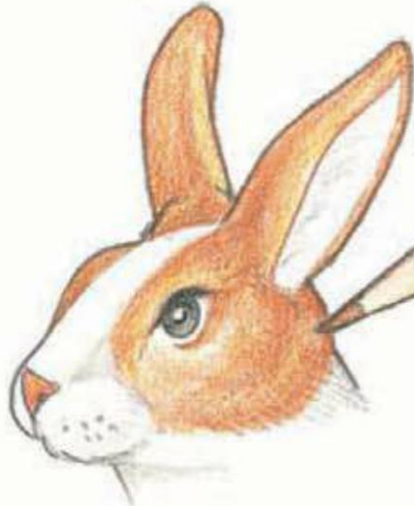
Coloring Tips

This lovable Lab is still a youngster, so it has a chubby body. Begin with an oval for the tummy and a circle for the head.

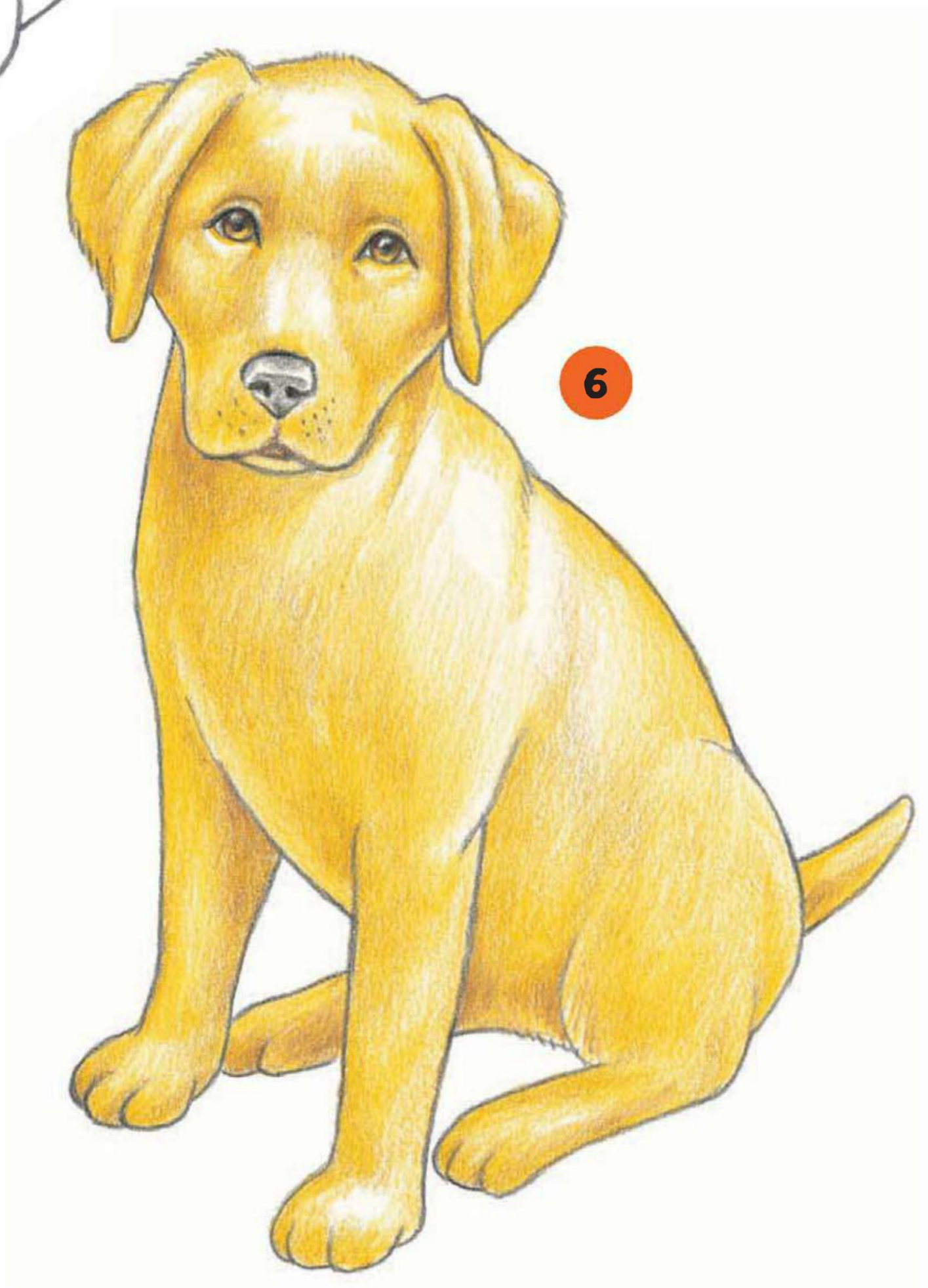

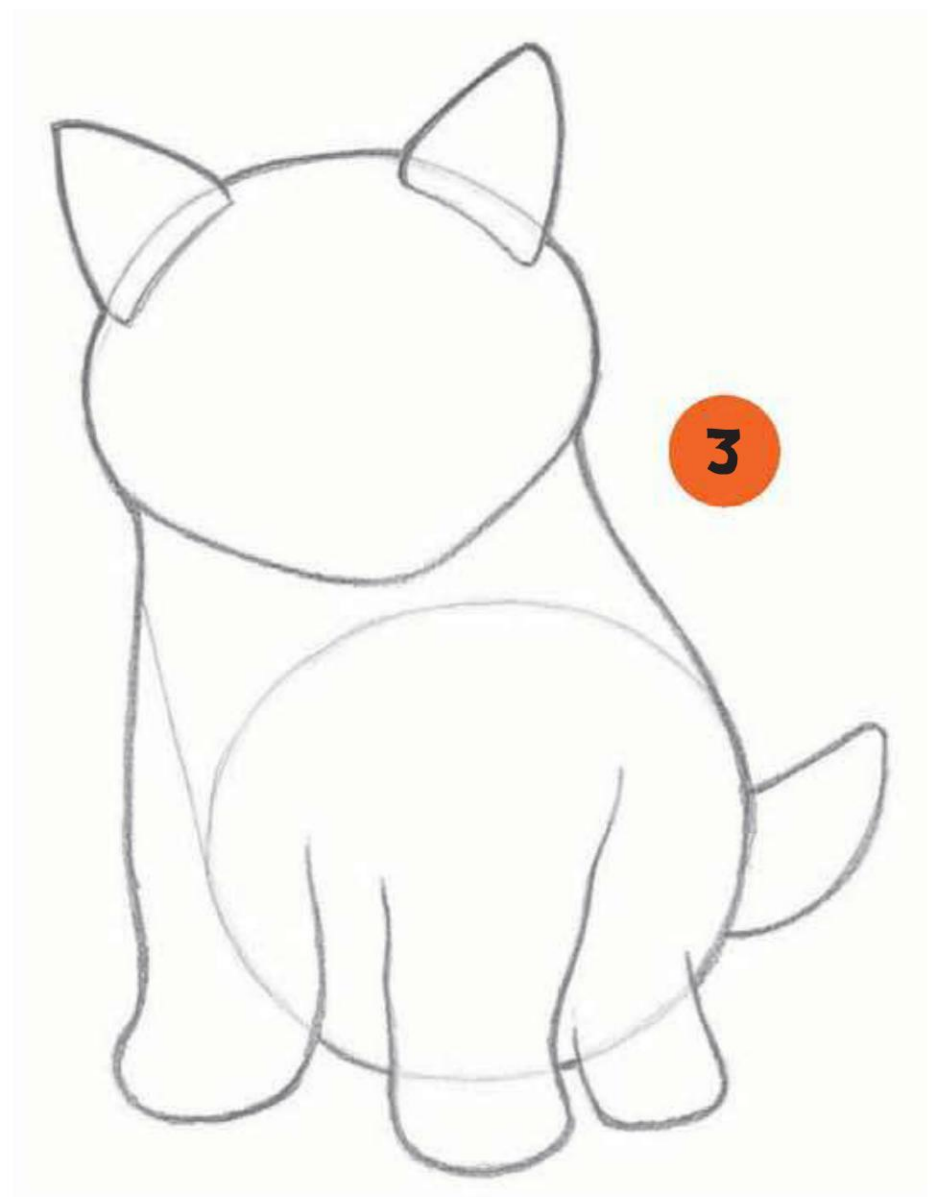
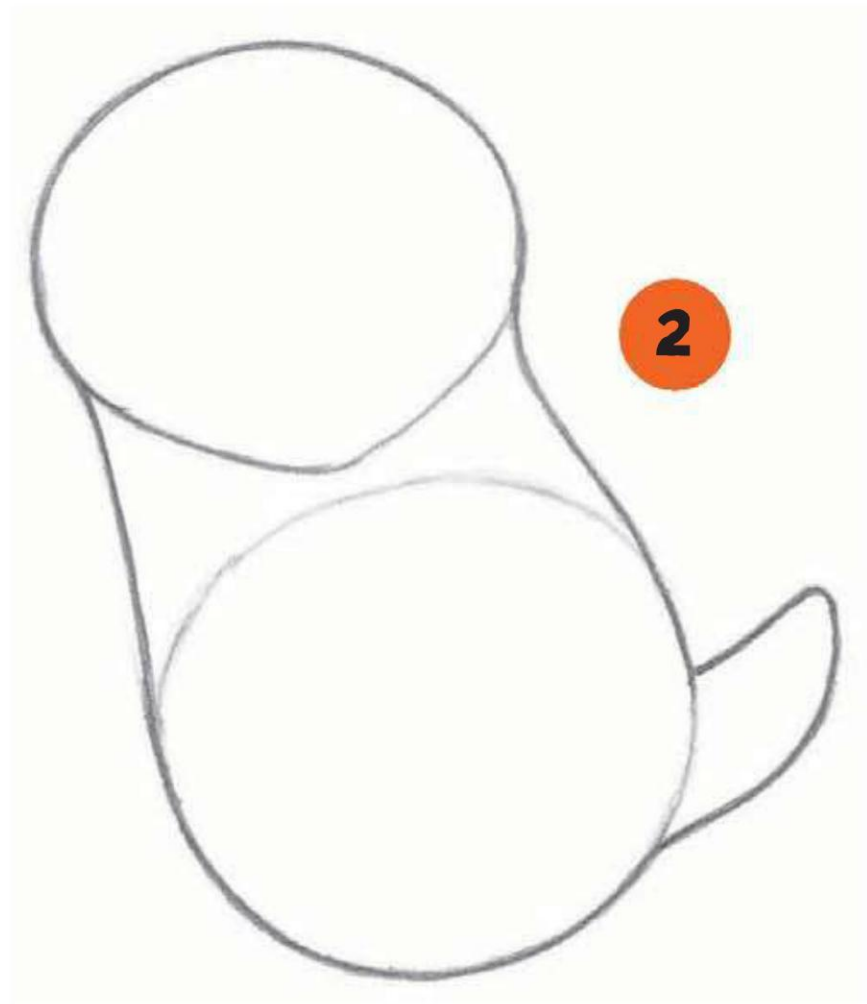
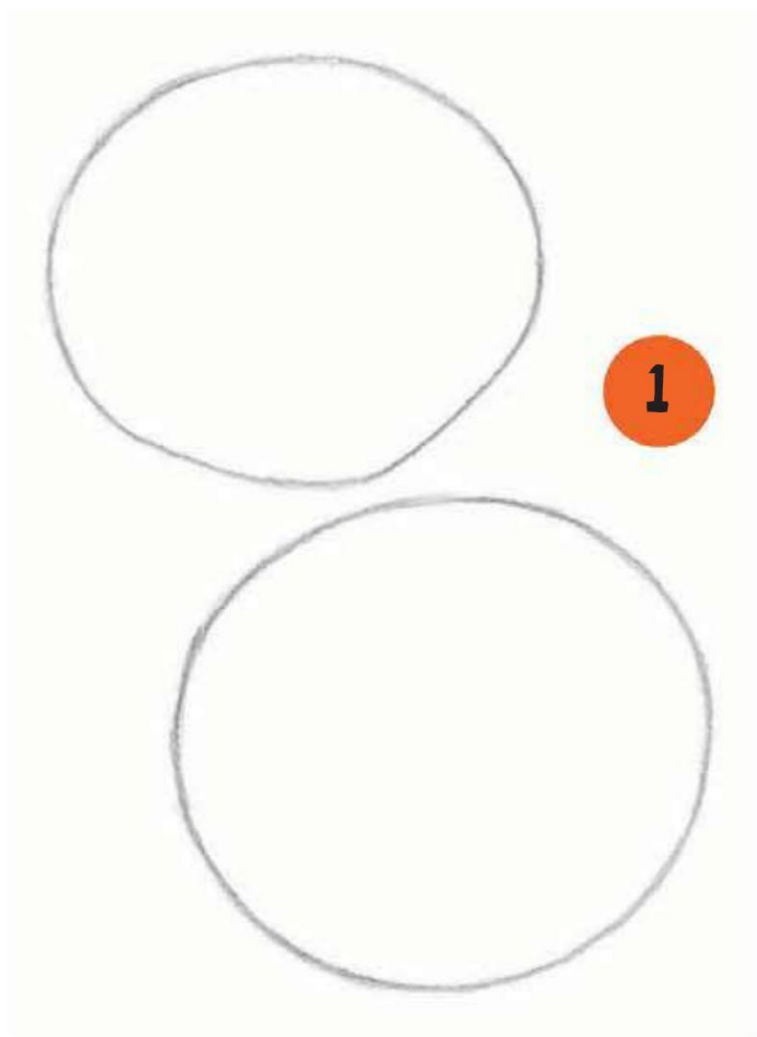
Even puppies who are “free to a good home” need care and upkeep—and that takes cash. So how much can you expect to spend on that doggie in the window?

Get out your piggy bank! On average, it costs \$6,400 to raise one medium-sized dog from a puppy to the age of 11.



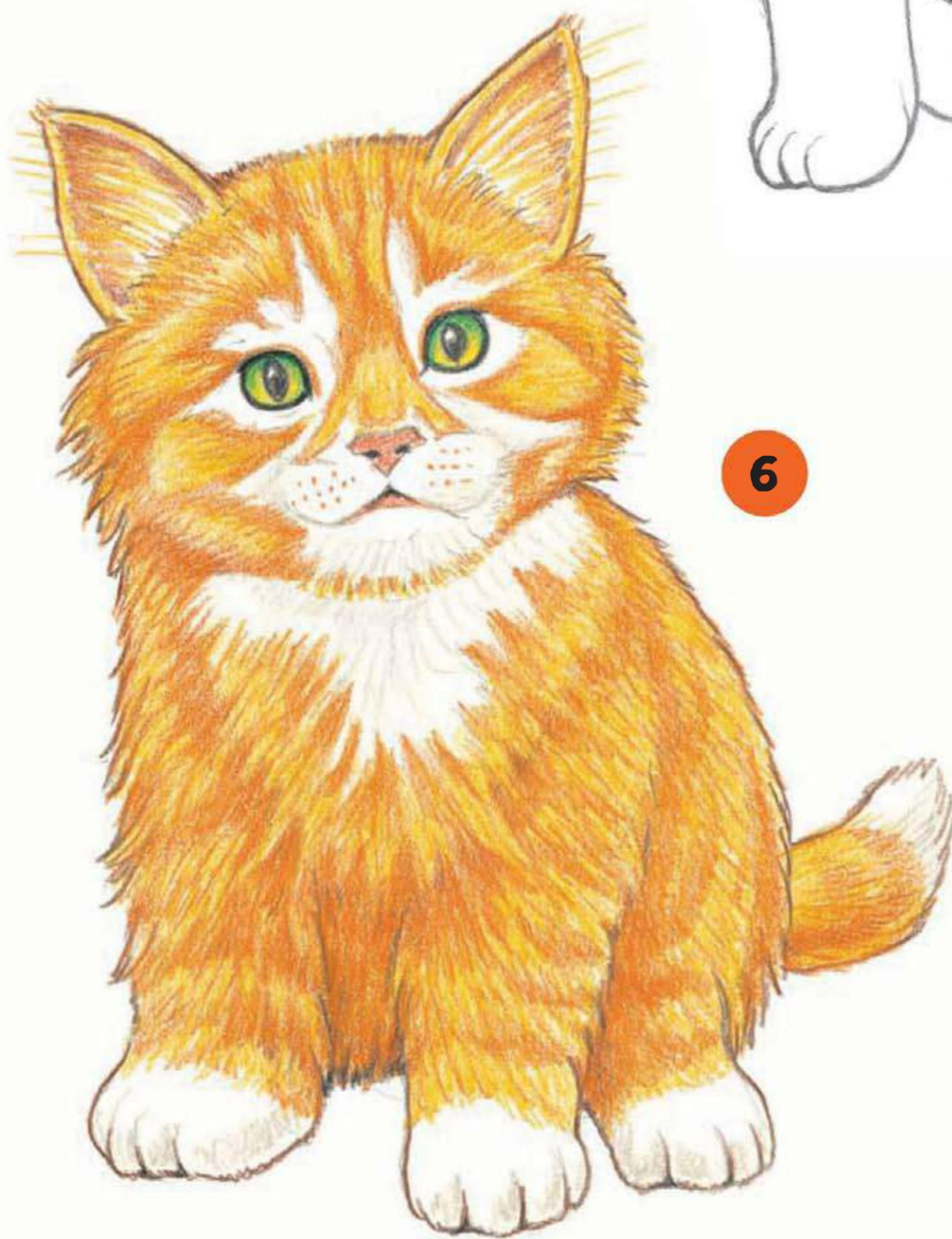
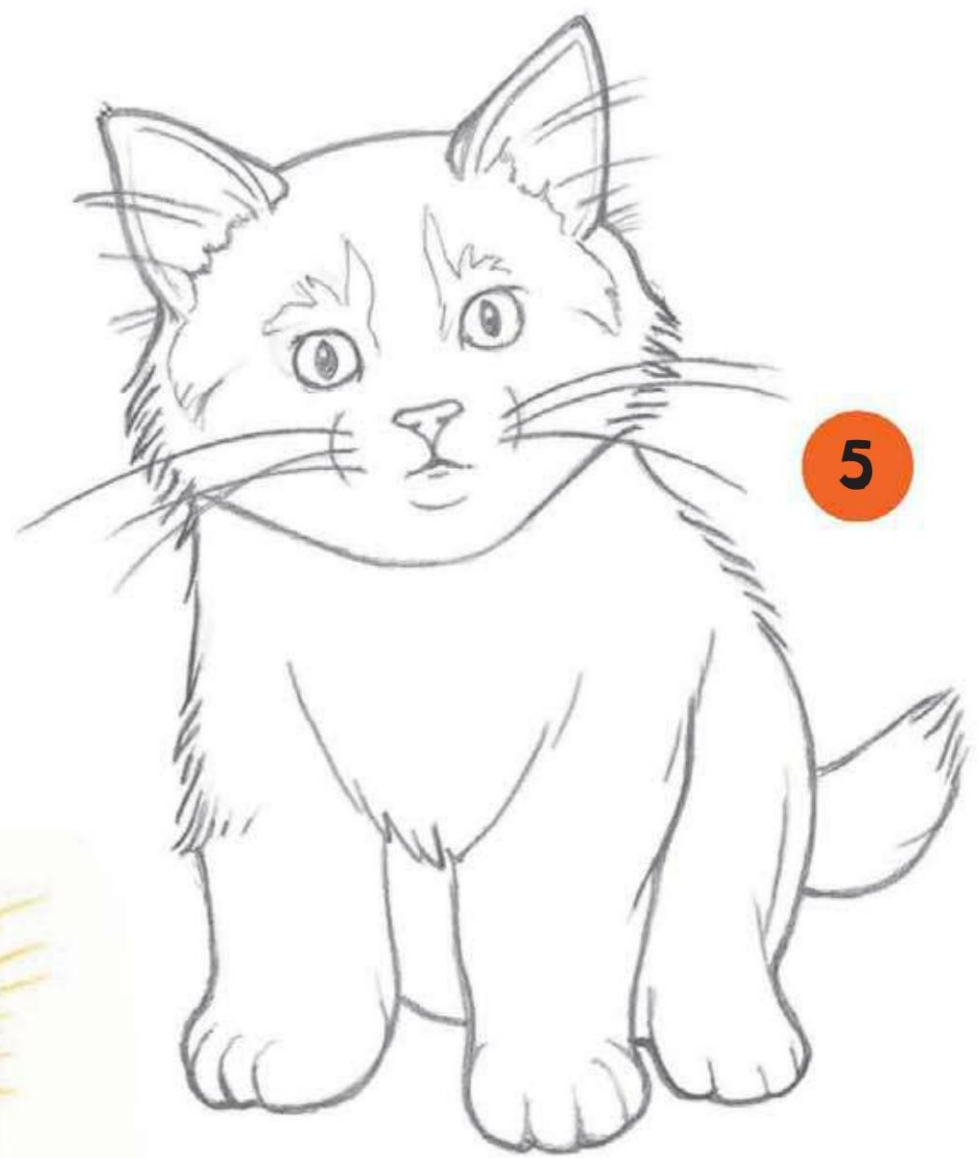
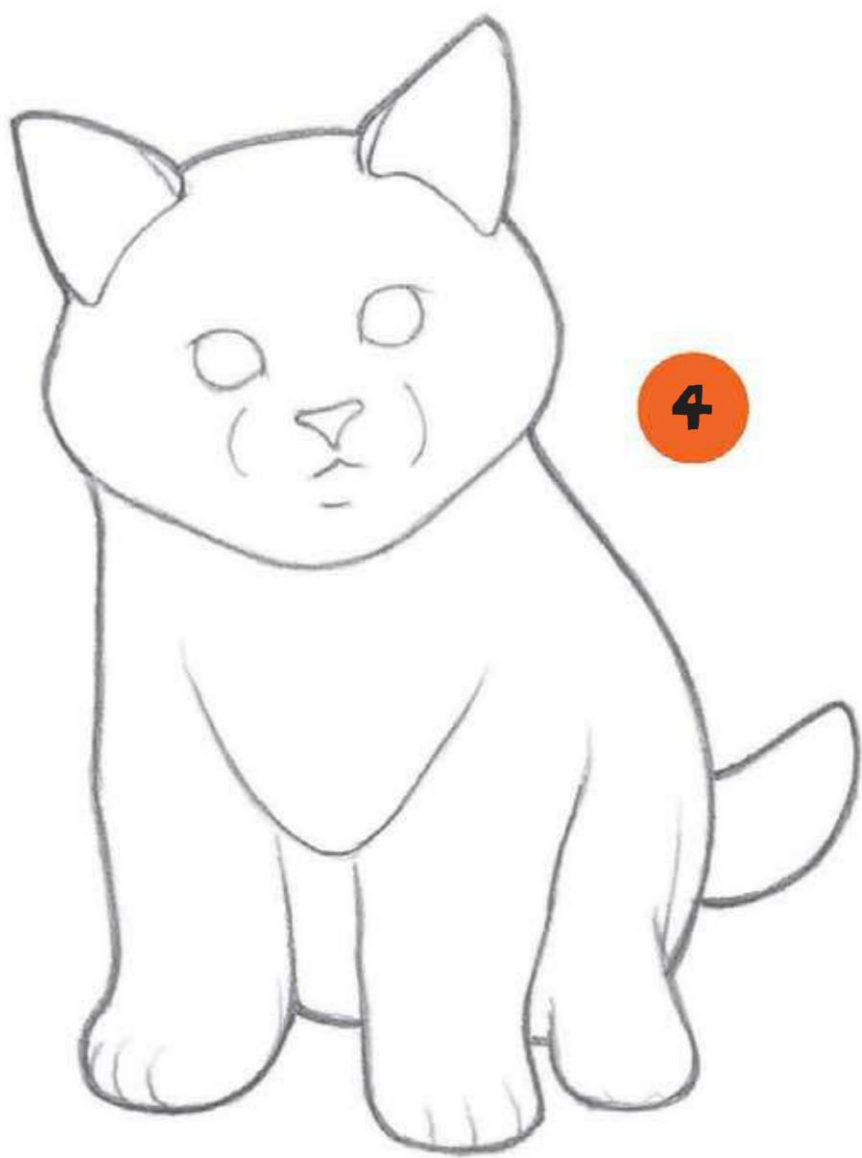
Kitten

This tiny tabby has a fluffy body and short, thick legs. Its round eyes and triangular ears look huge on its little furry frame!



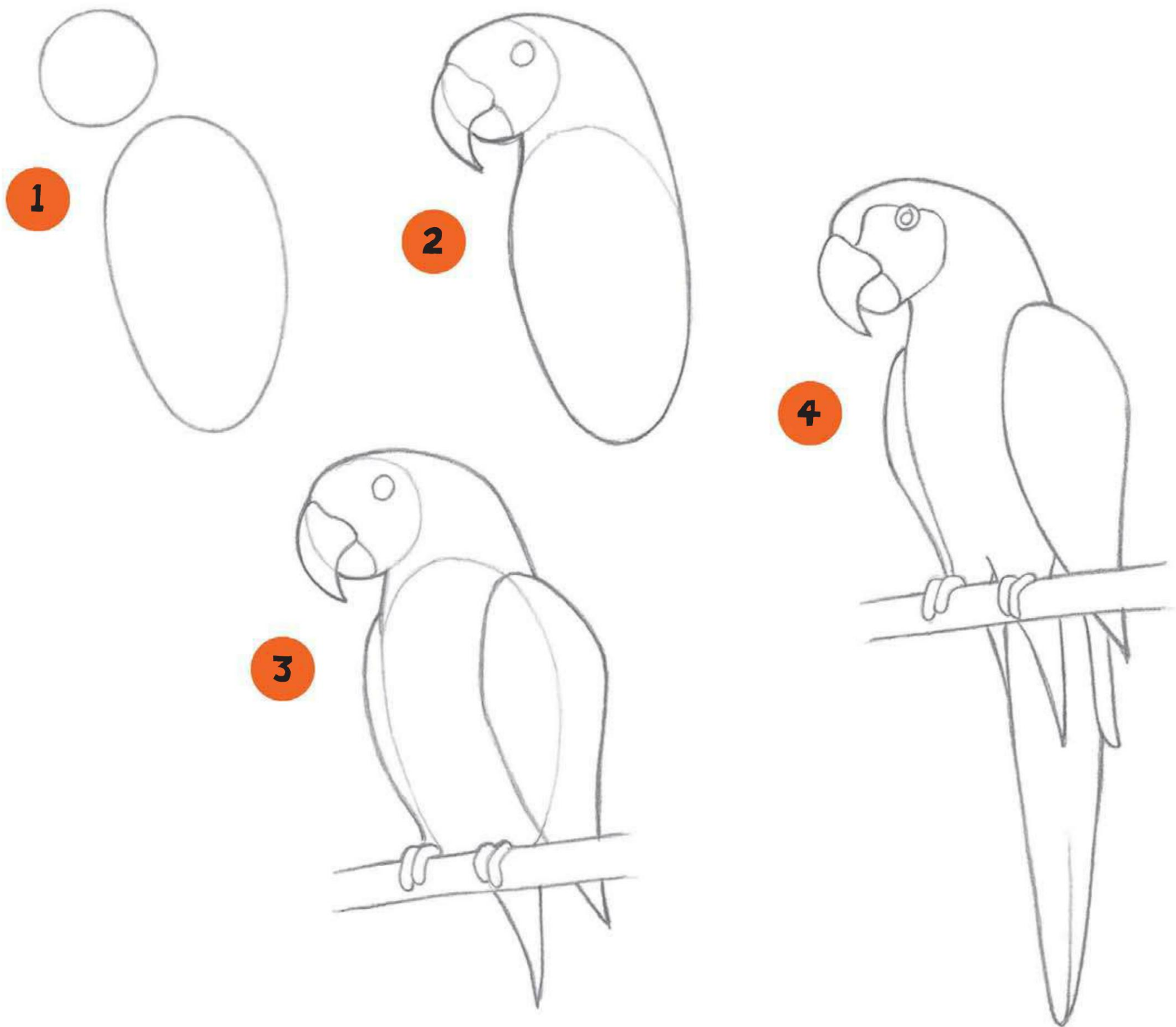

Cats have excellent hearing and very flexible ears! They have 30 outer-ear muscles that rotate each ear a full 180 degrees. This means felines can hear in all directions without moving their heads, which helps them pinpoint where sounds are coming from.



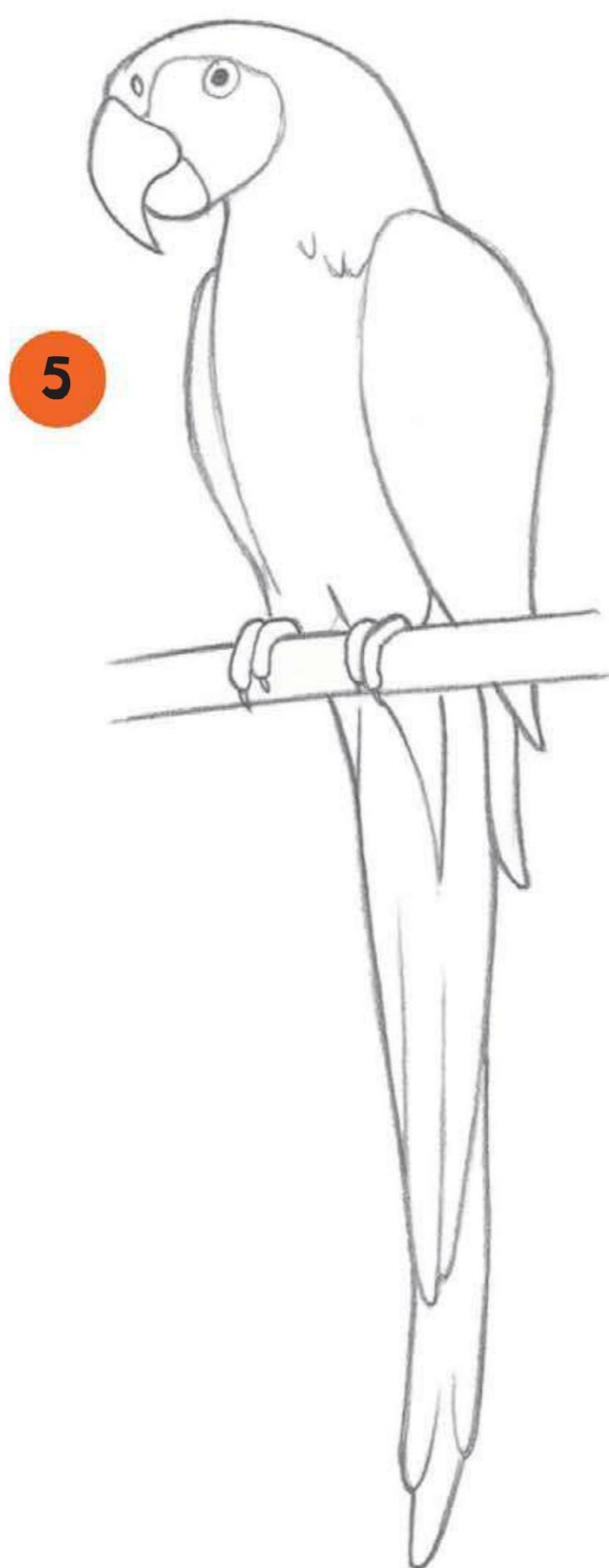
Macaw

Use an oval to draw this colorful, exotic parrot's body. The bird's long feathers come to a point—so does its sharp, curved beak!

Most people know that a macaw's beak is powerful—it's so strong that it can easily crush a Brazil nut! But what's less well known is that a macaw also uses its dry, scaly tongue as a tool. A bone inside the tongue helps the bird break open and eat food.

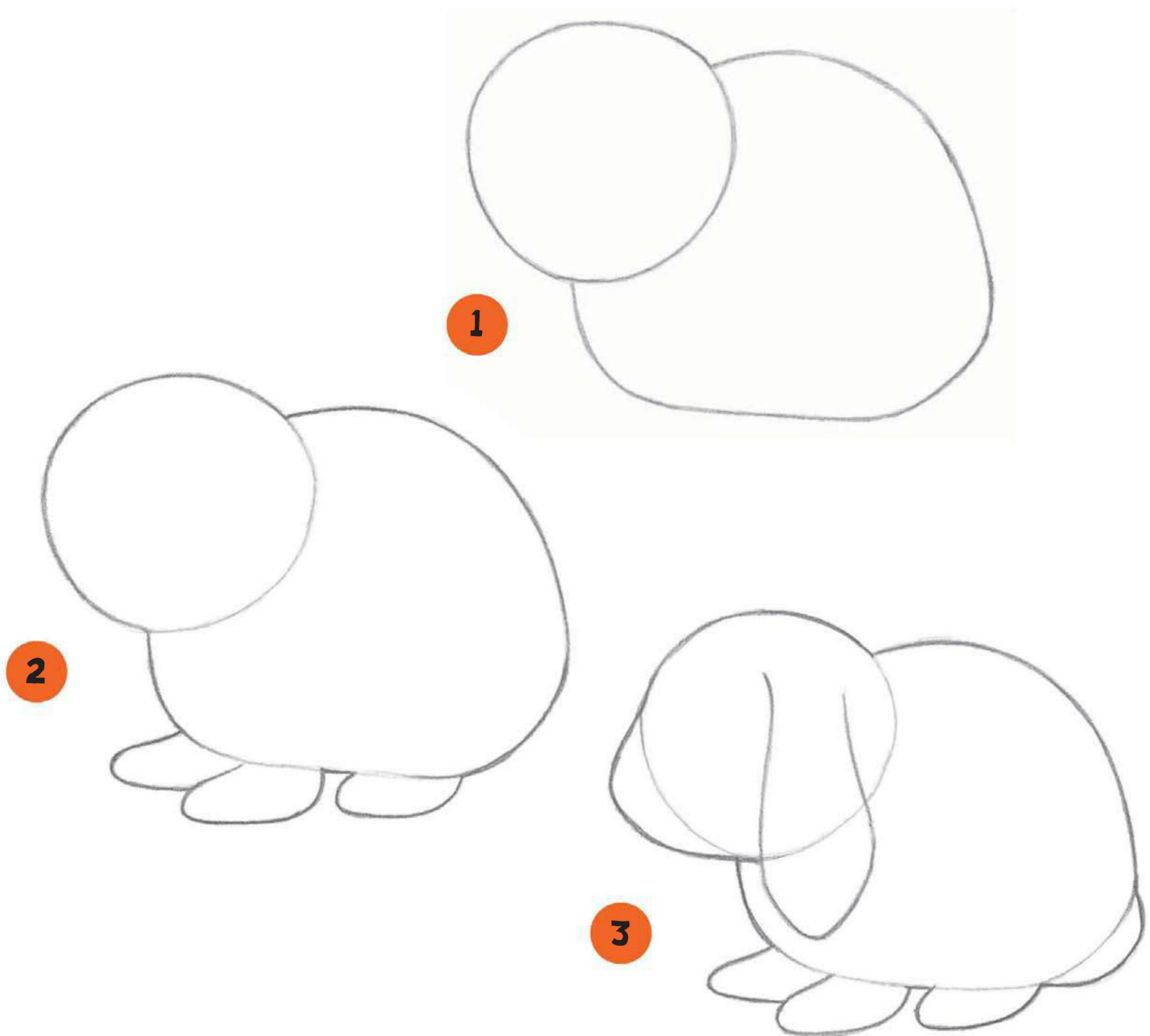


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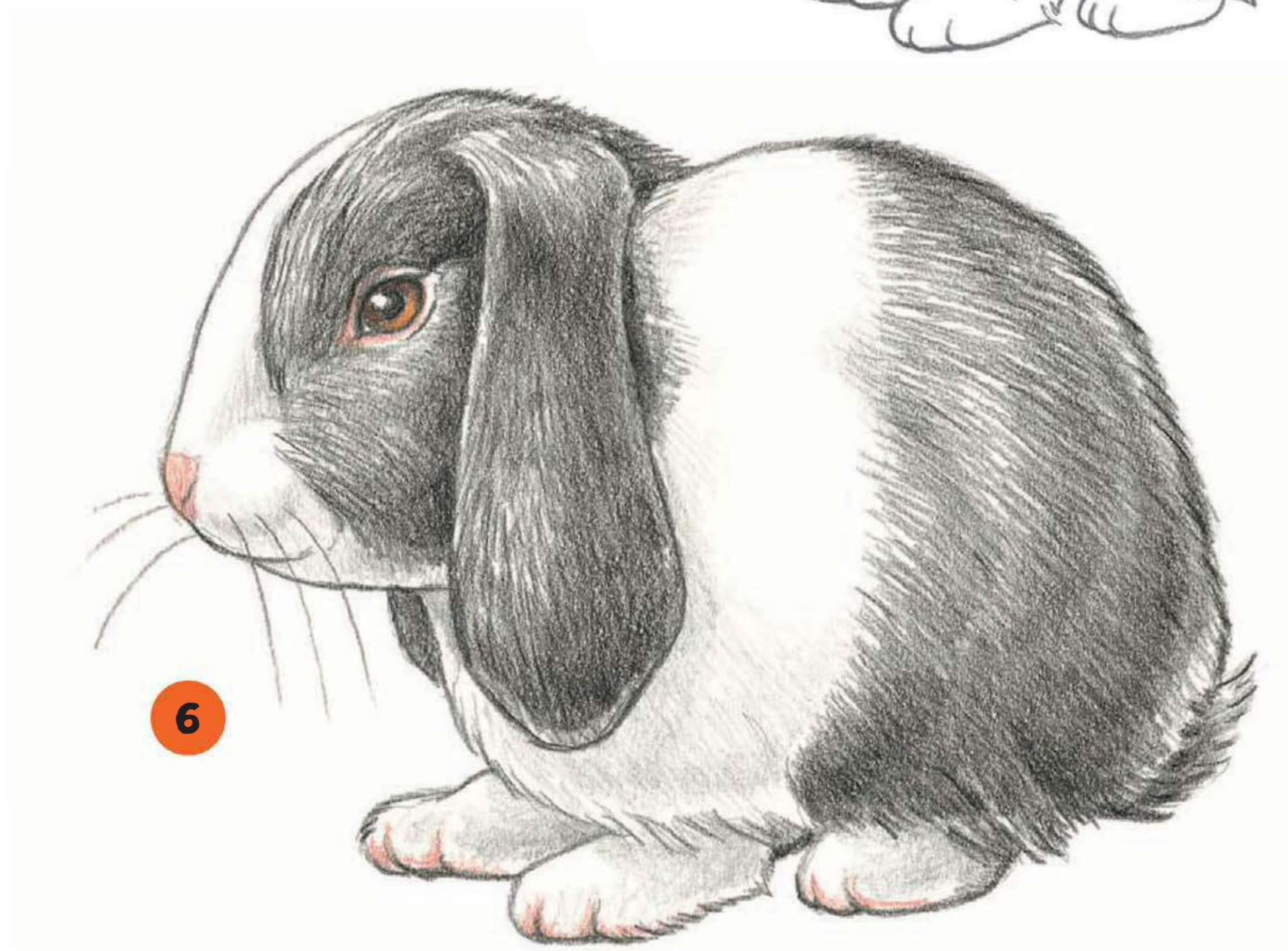
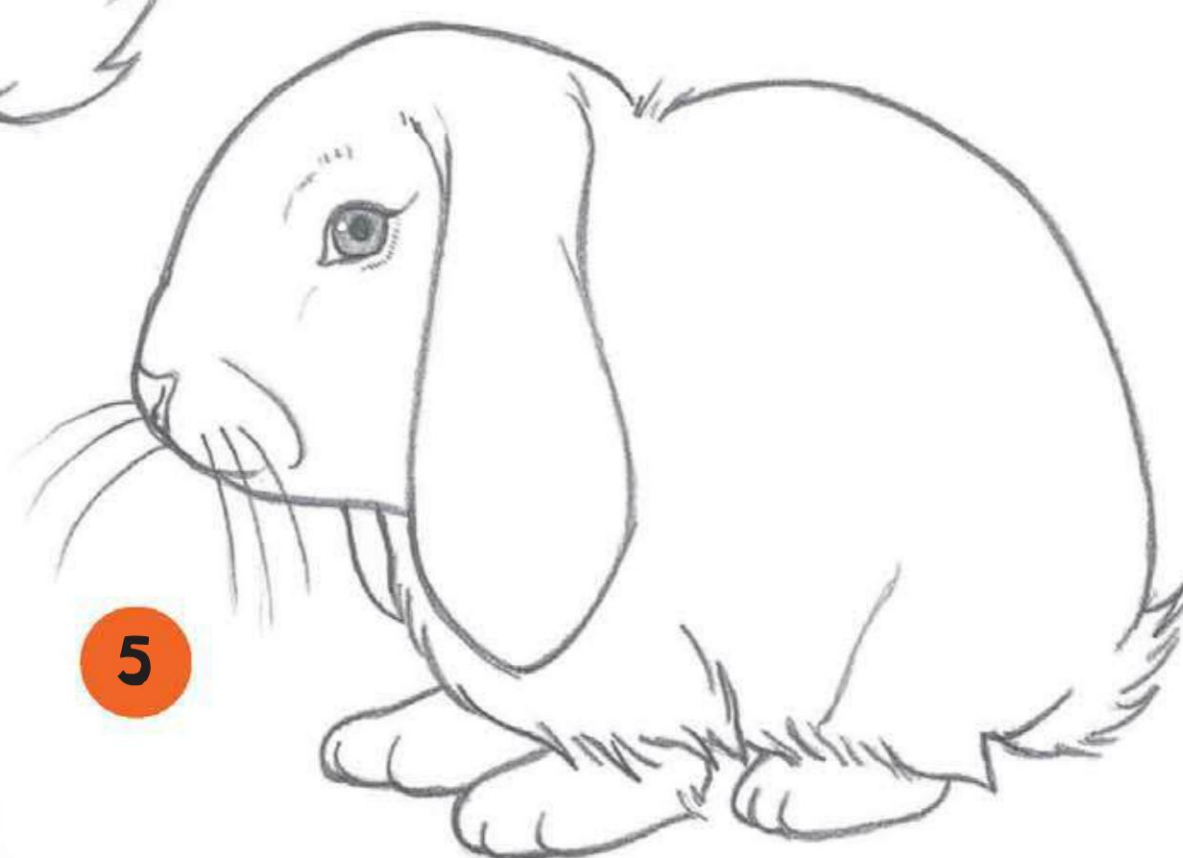
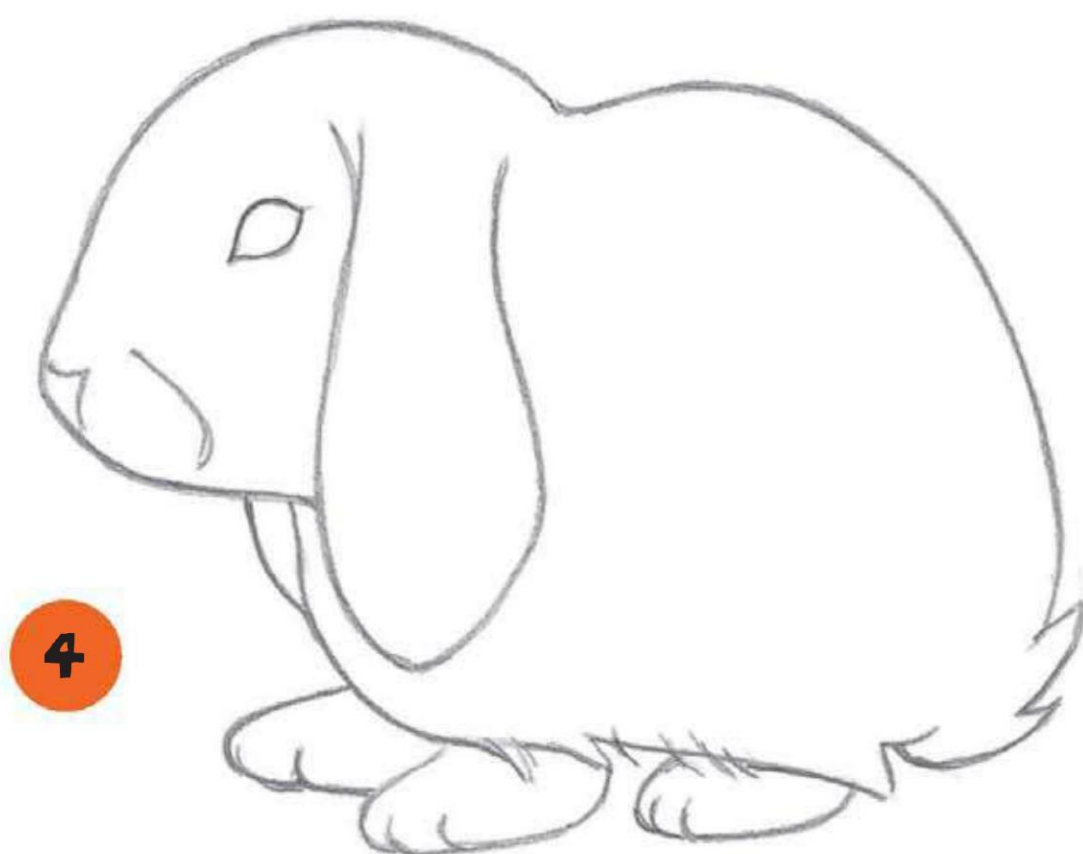
Bunny

This Lop-eared rabbit's body is round, but it isn't a perfect circle. Its long ears droop down, but its short tail swoops up!



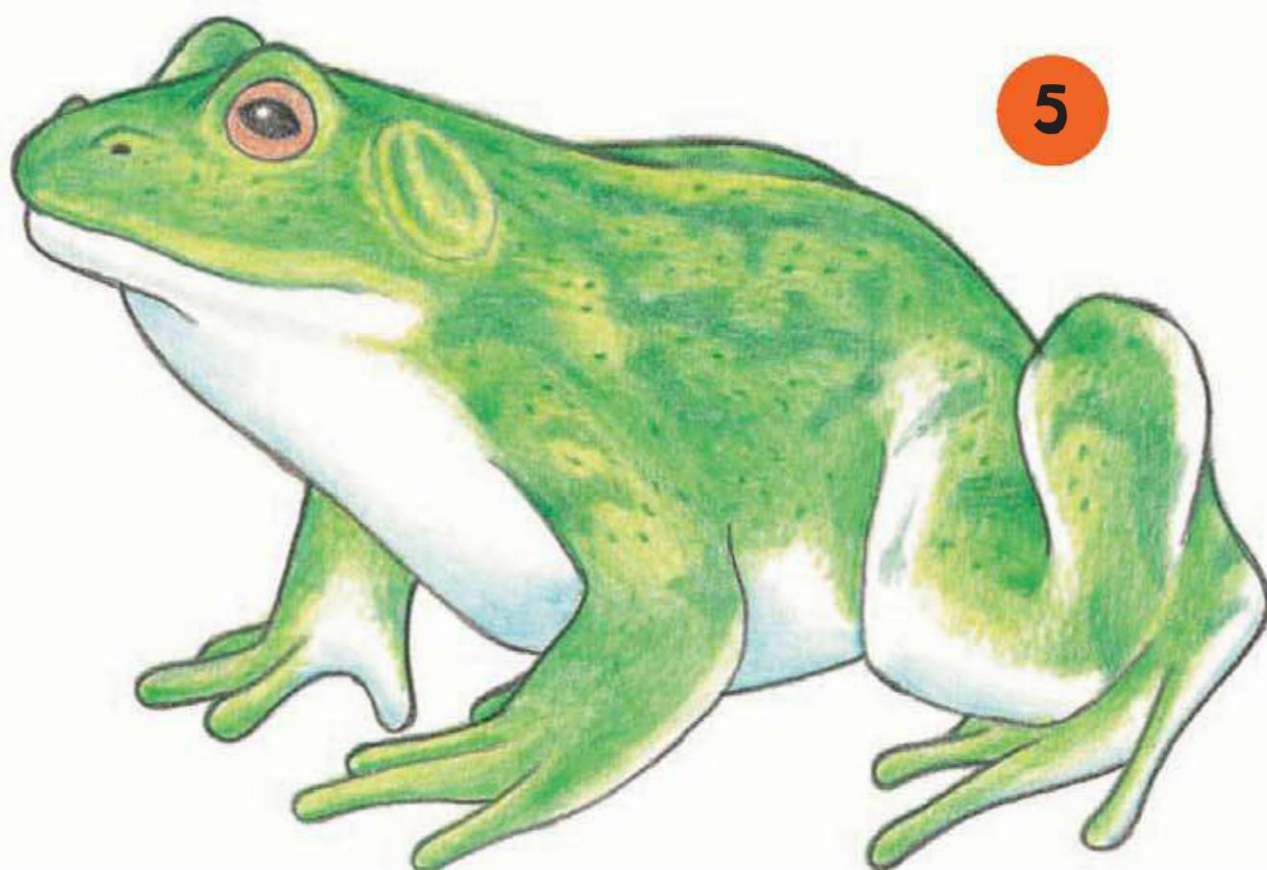
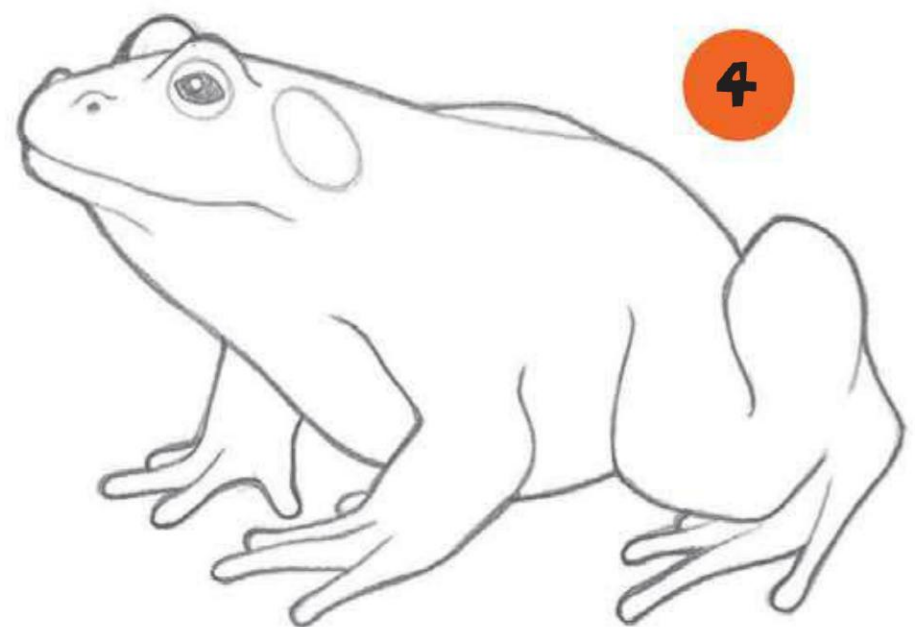
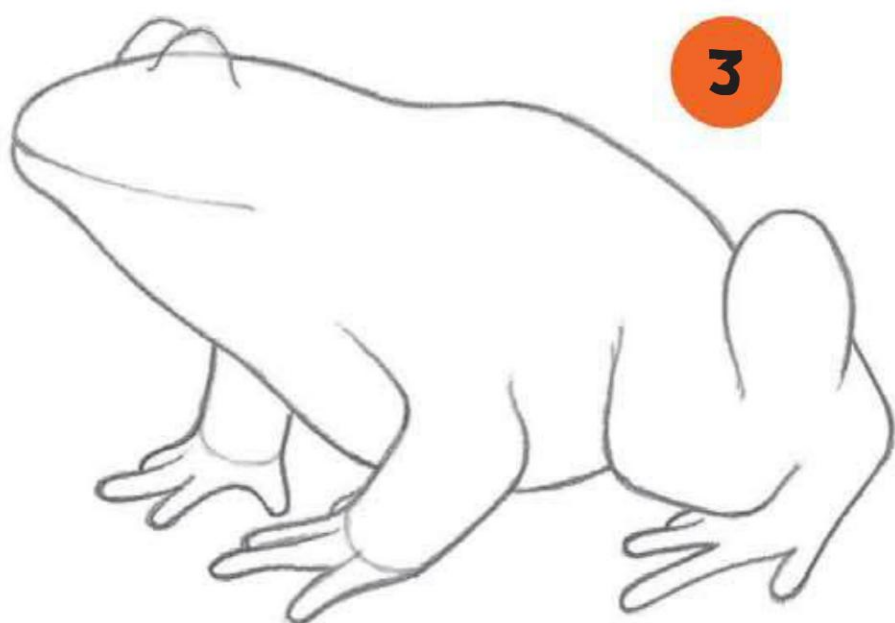
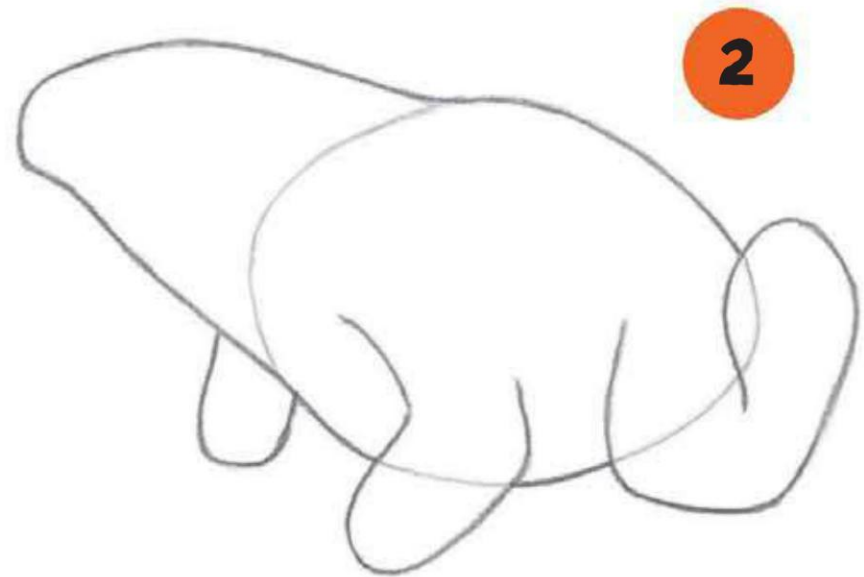
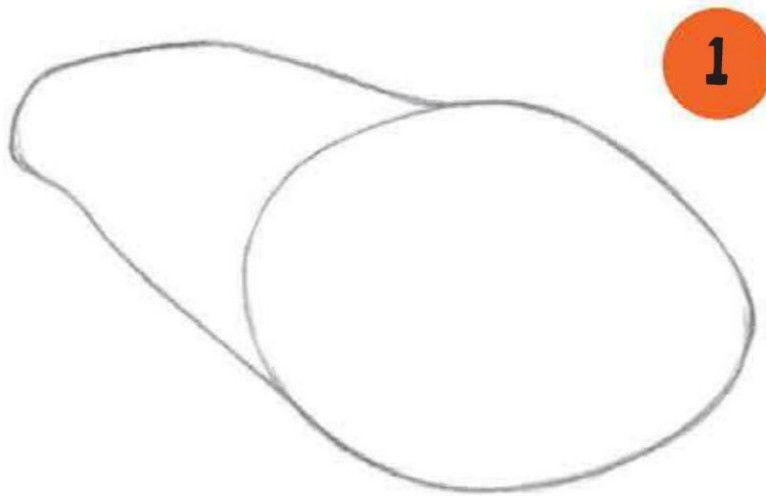
fun fact

It's not unusual for caretakers to discover their pet bunnies fast asleep. After all, rabbits are nocturnal, which means they're active at night, so they sleep during the day. And, on average, rabbits take 16 naps per day to get in a full 8 hours of sleep!

It isn't easy being green! This amphibian has a few unusual features, like legs that fold and eyes that sit on top of its head!

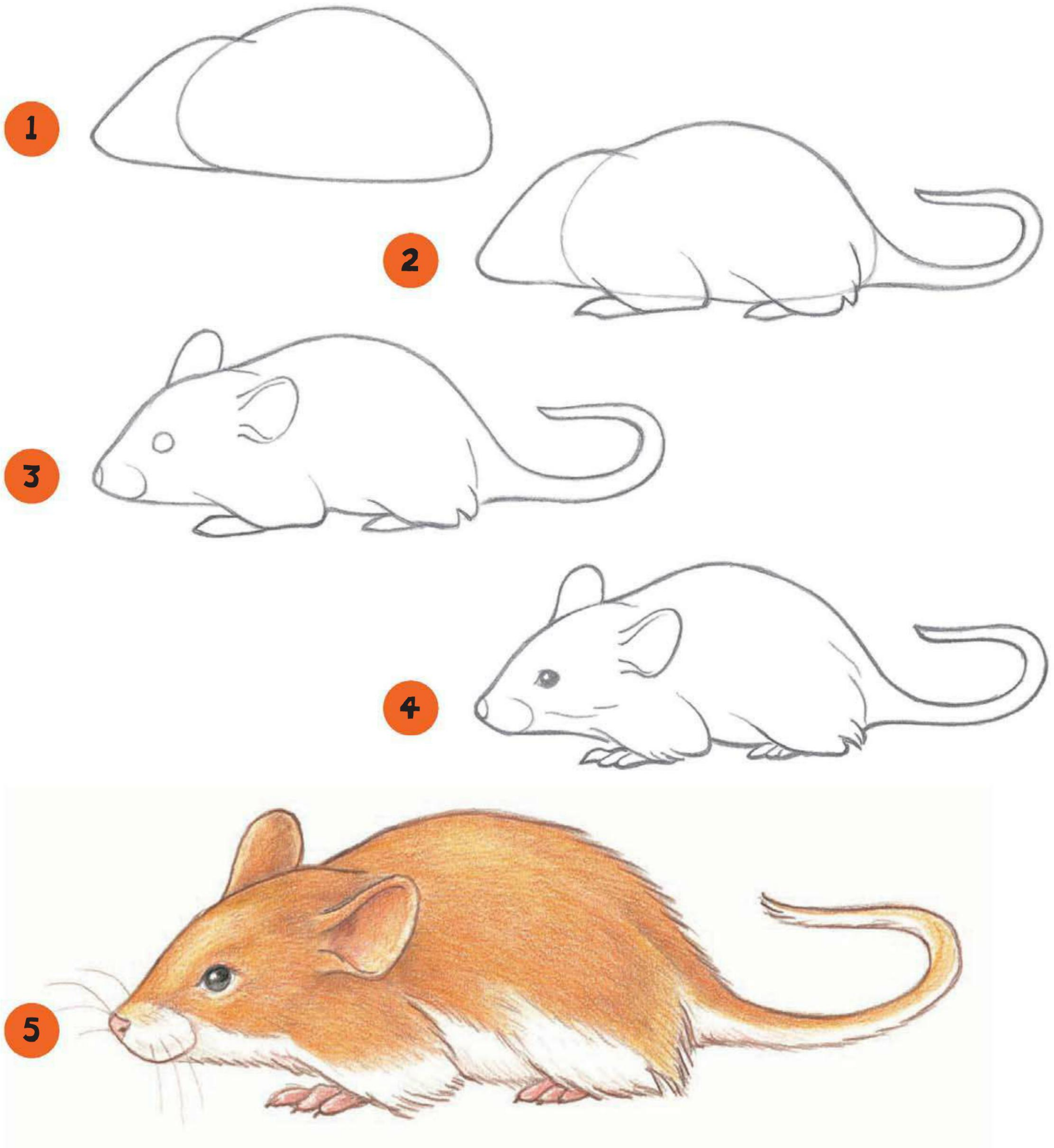

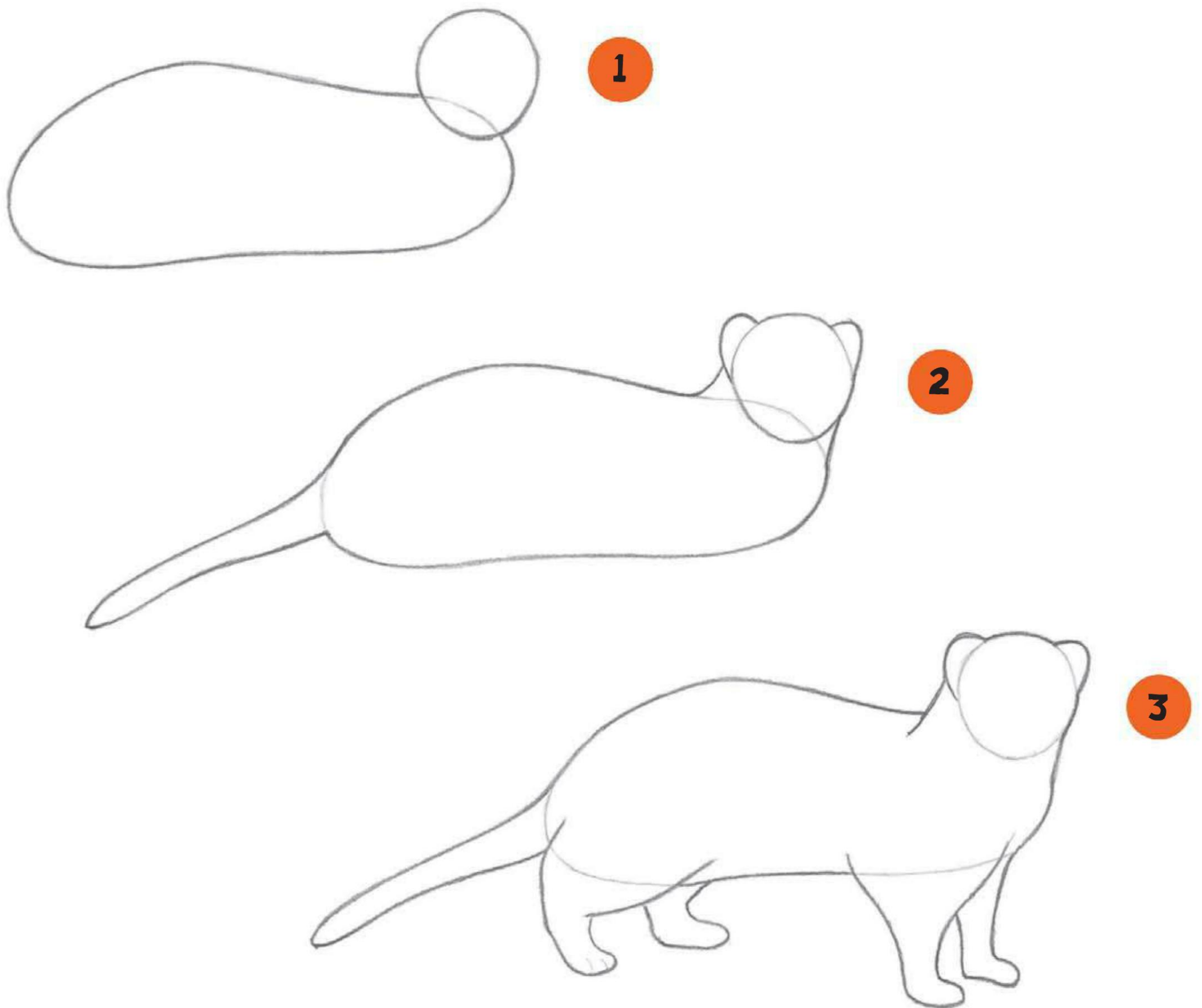
Mouse

This little mammal has tiny rodent features: small, round eyes; a tiny pink nose; a long, thin tail; and itty, bitty toenails!



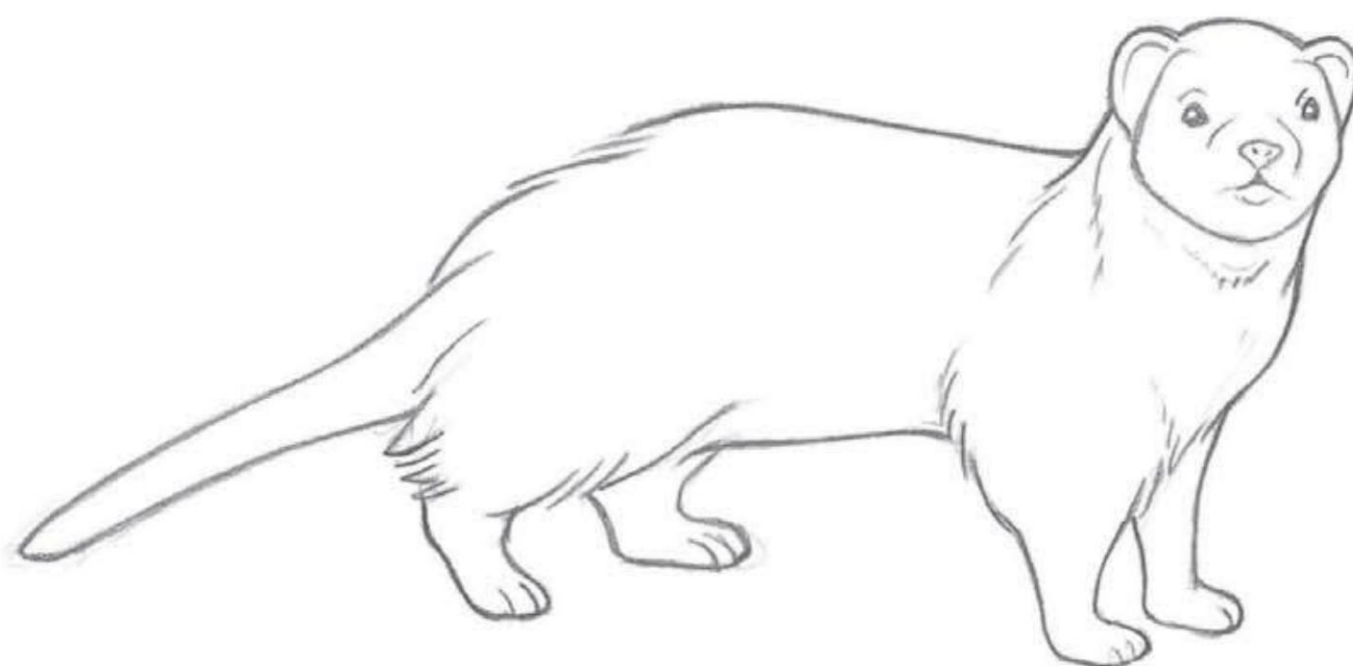
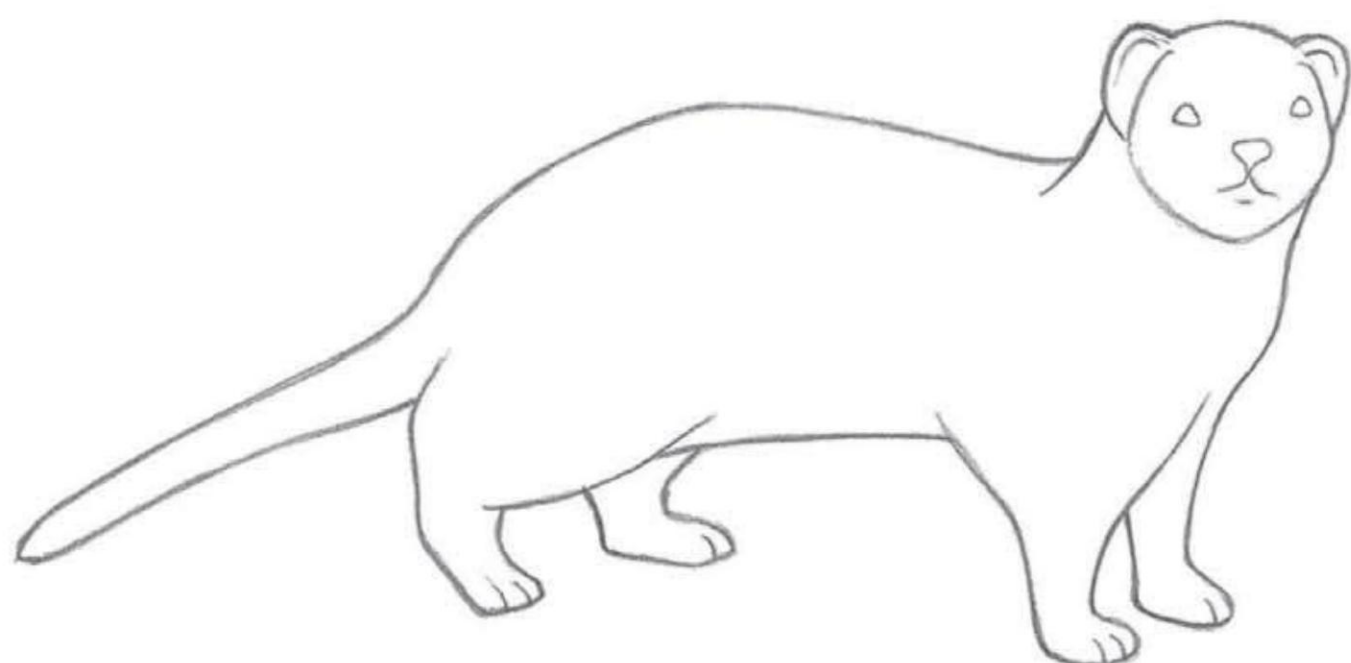
Ferret

With its slim body and small head, the ferret looks similar to a cat! But its rounded ears and masked markings distinguish it from most pets.



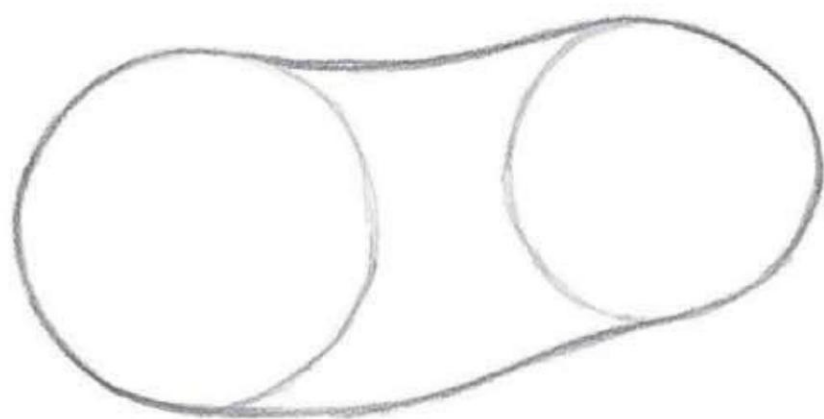
fun fact

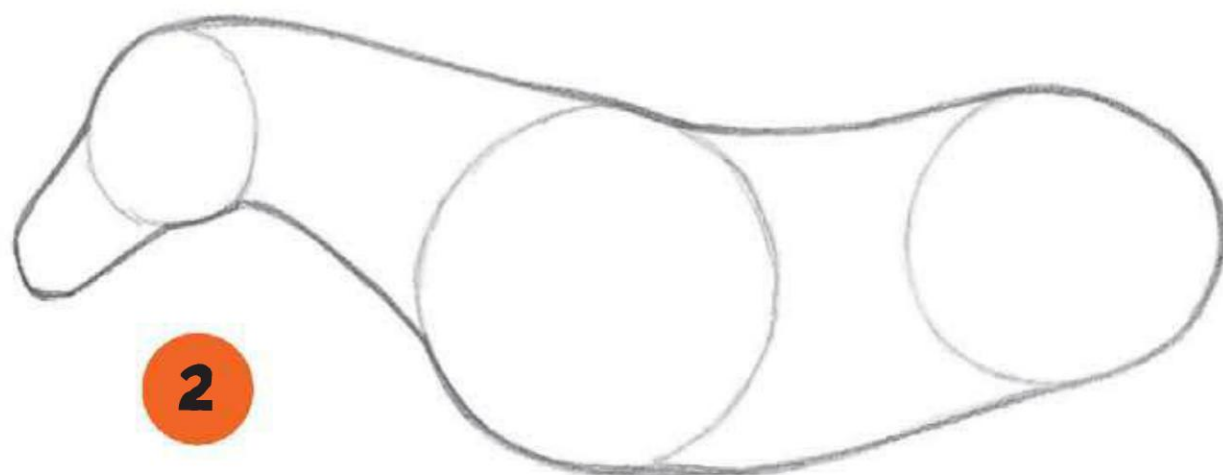


Horse

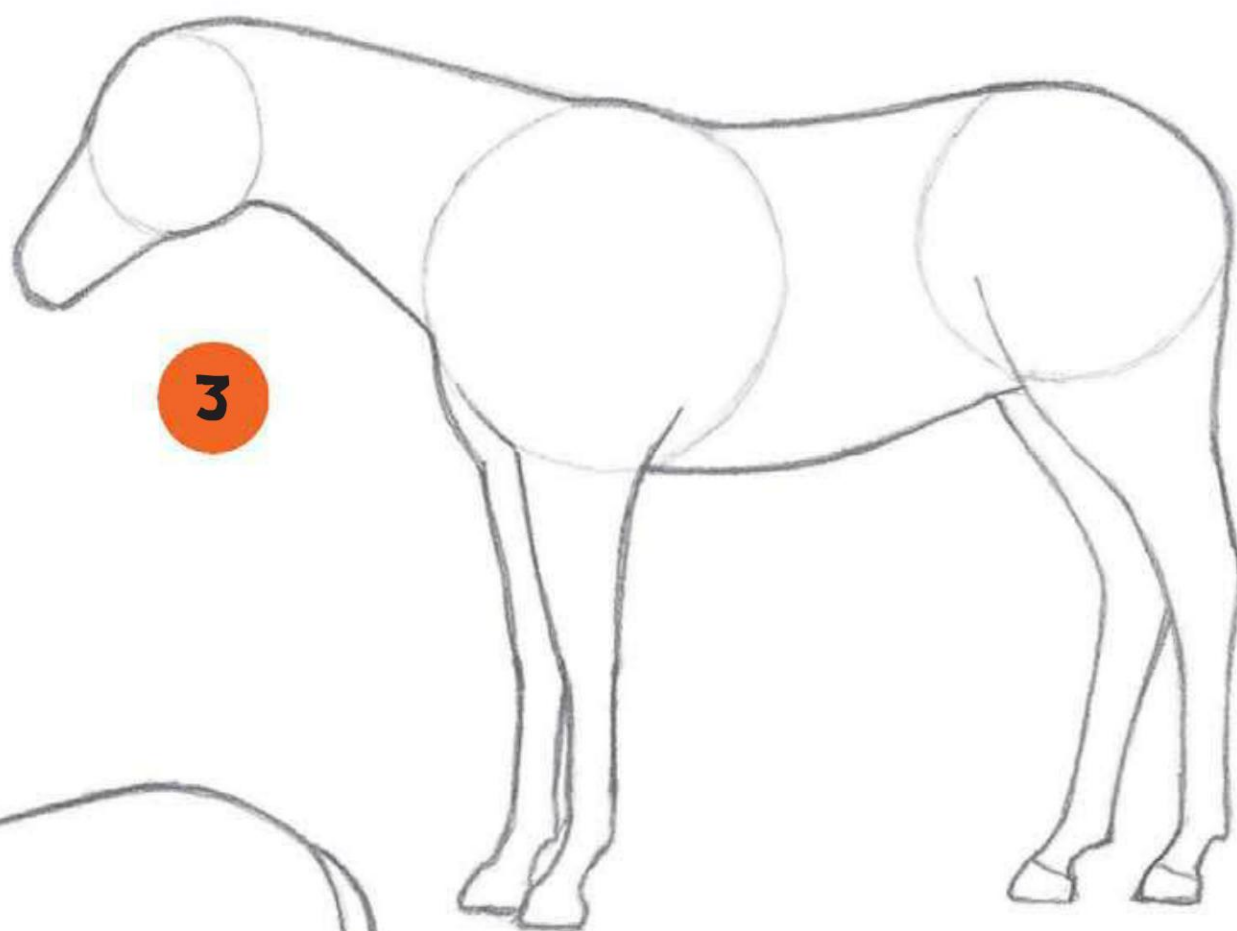
start this horse on the right track by drawing the main shapes: two circles for the hips and chest. Then trot along to the other parts!



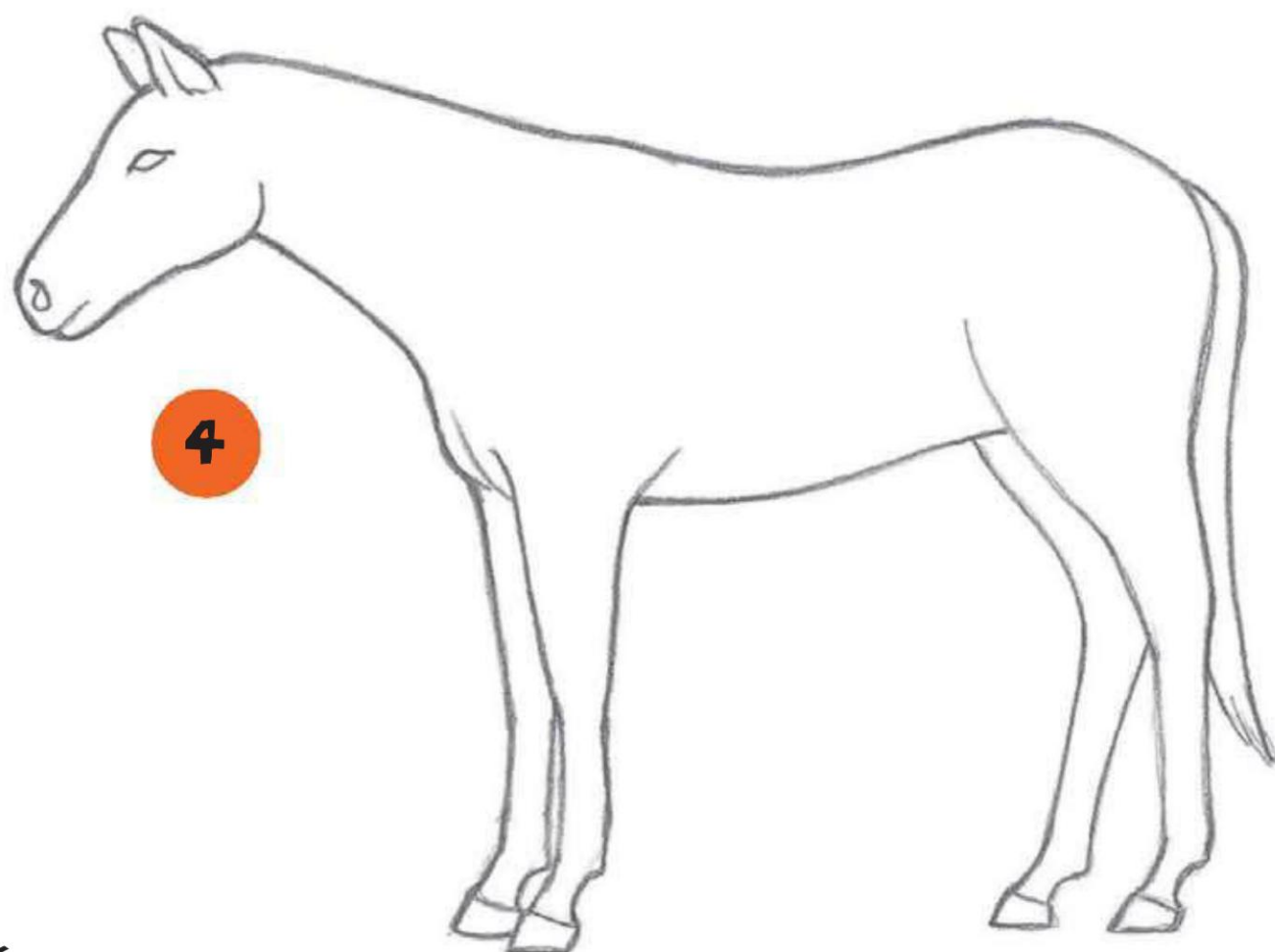
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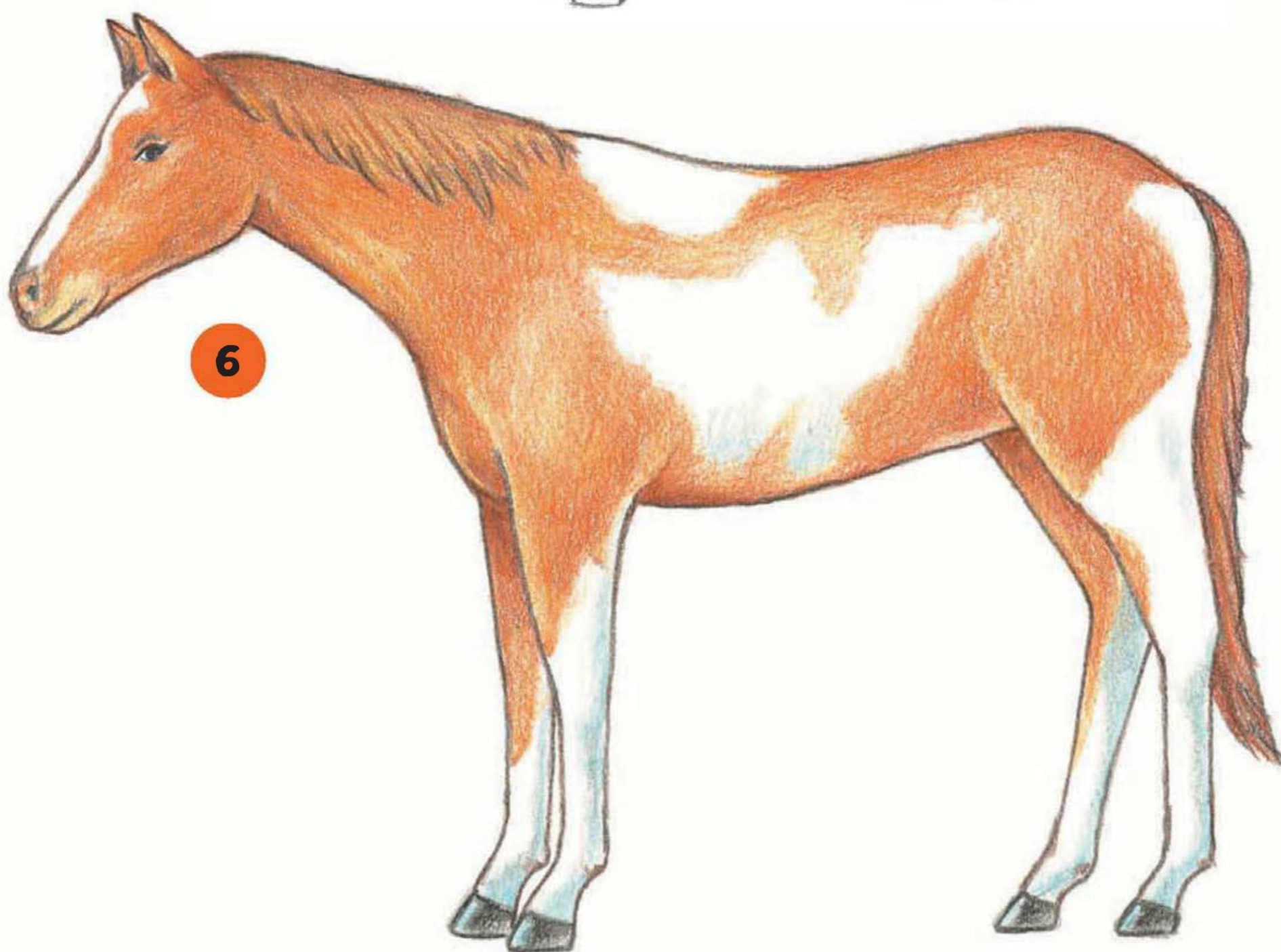
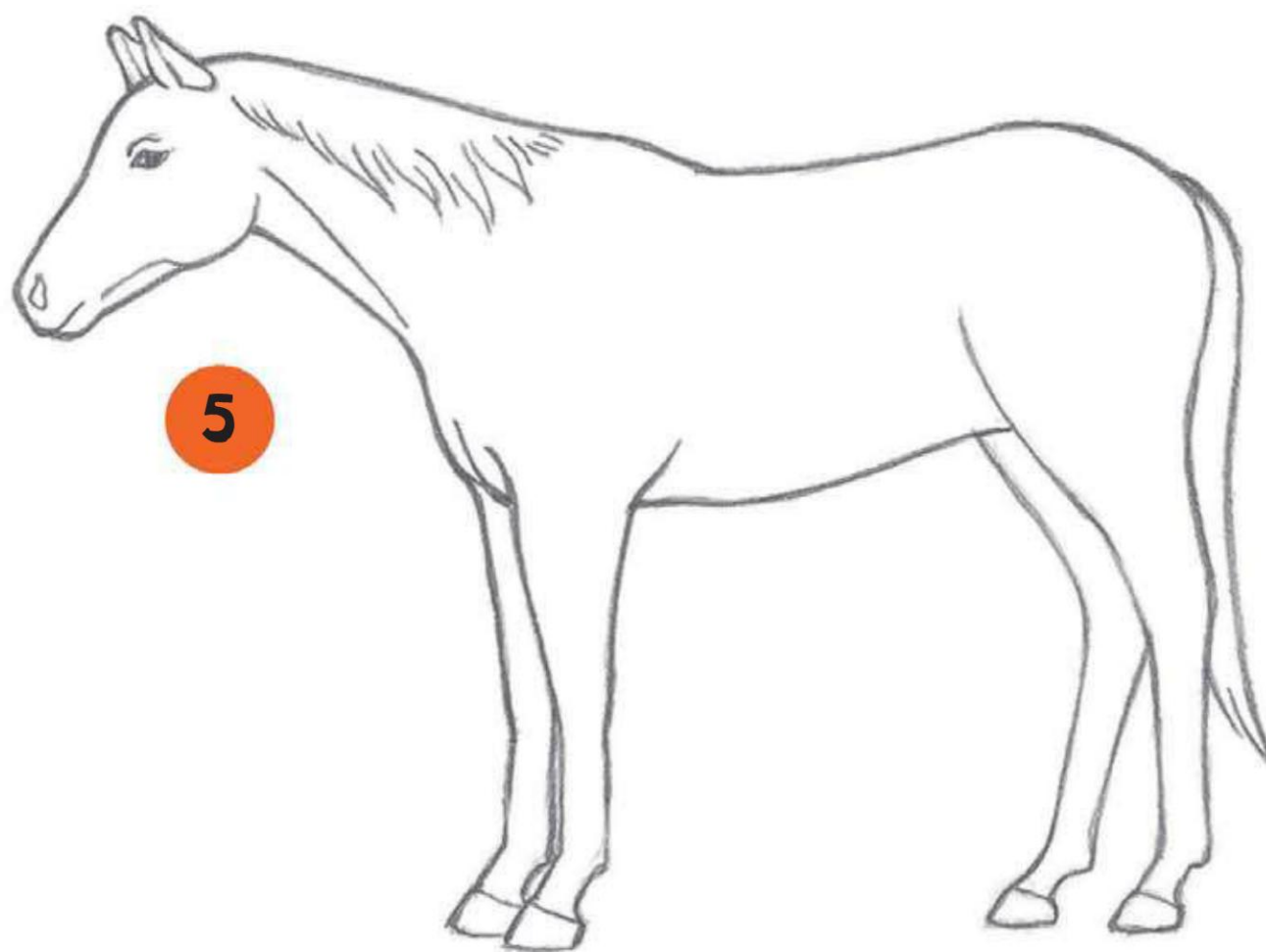
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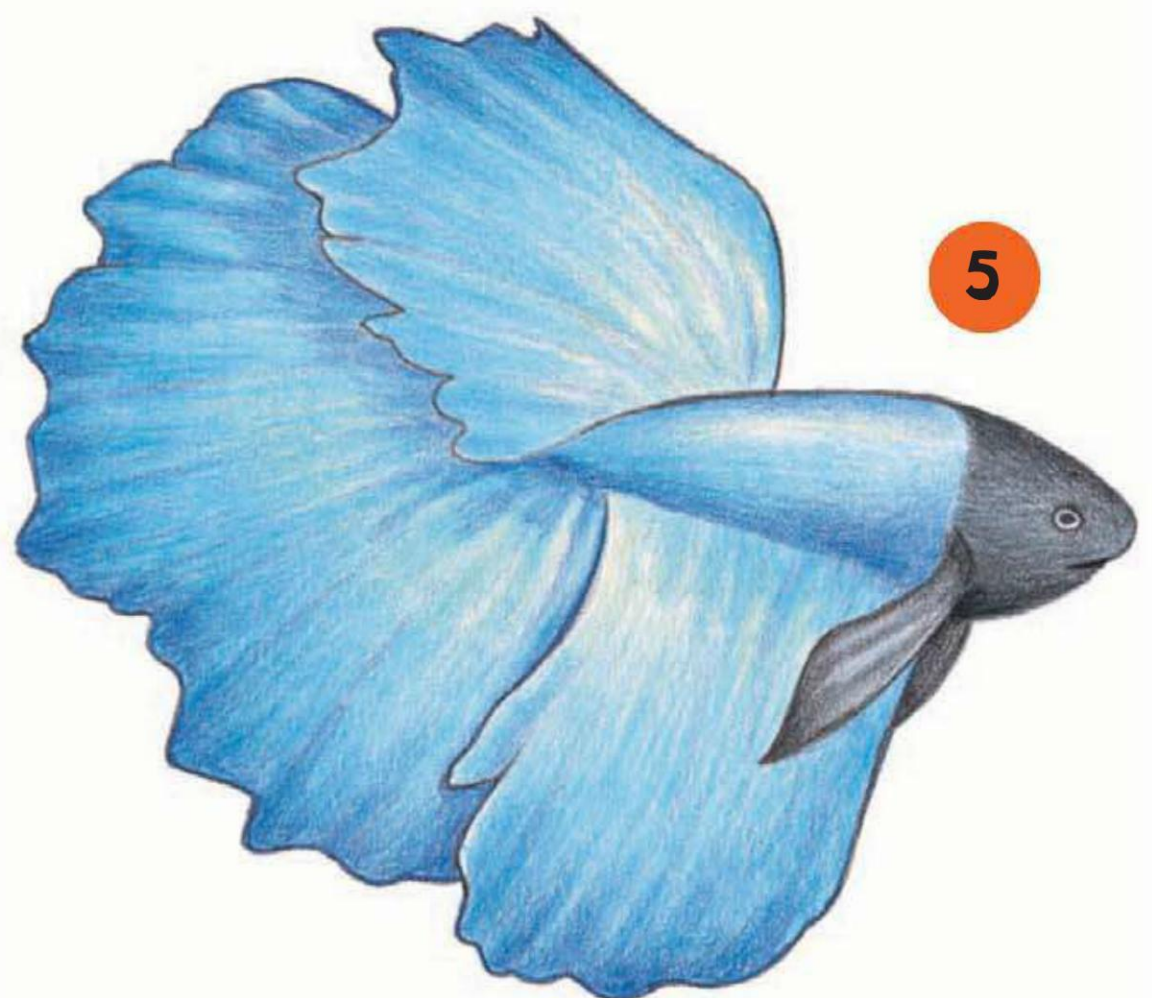
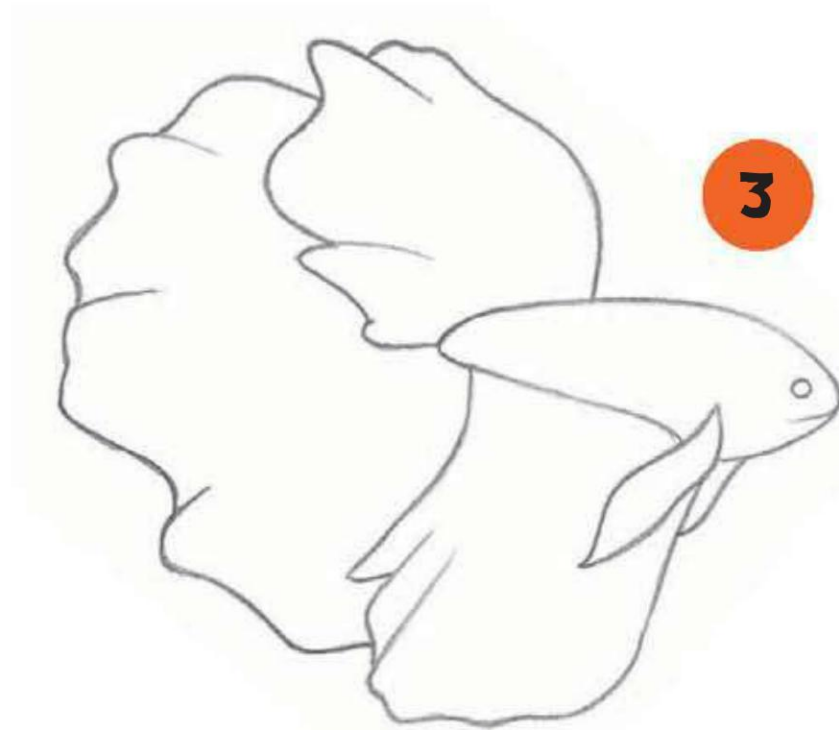
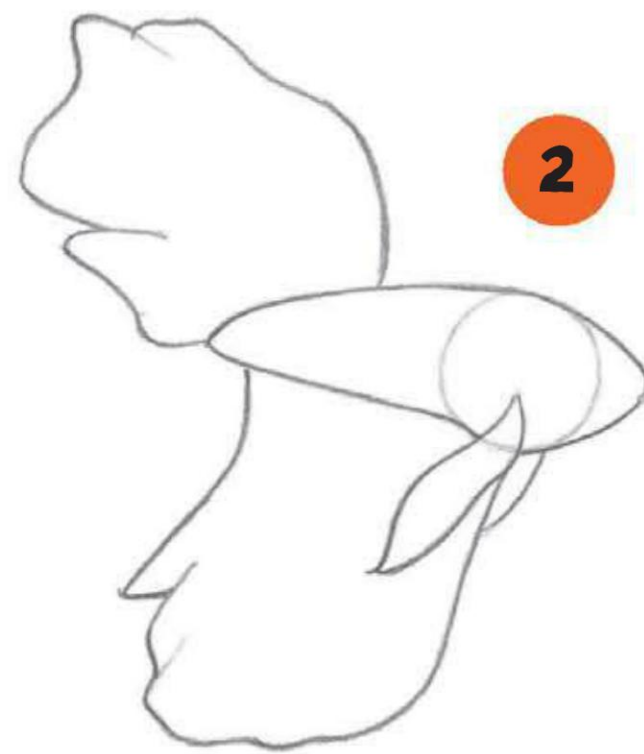
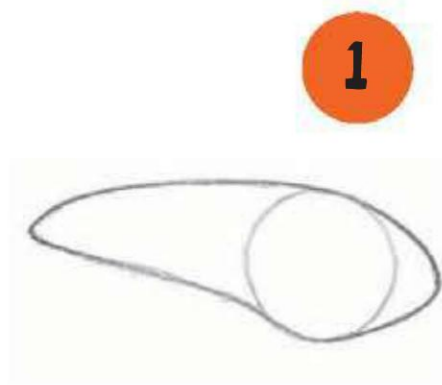


fun fact

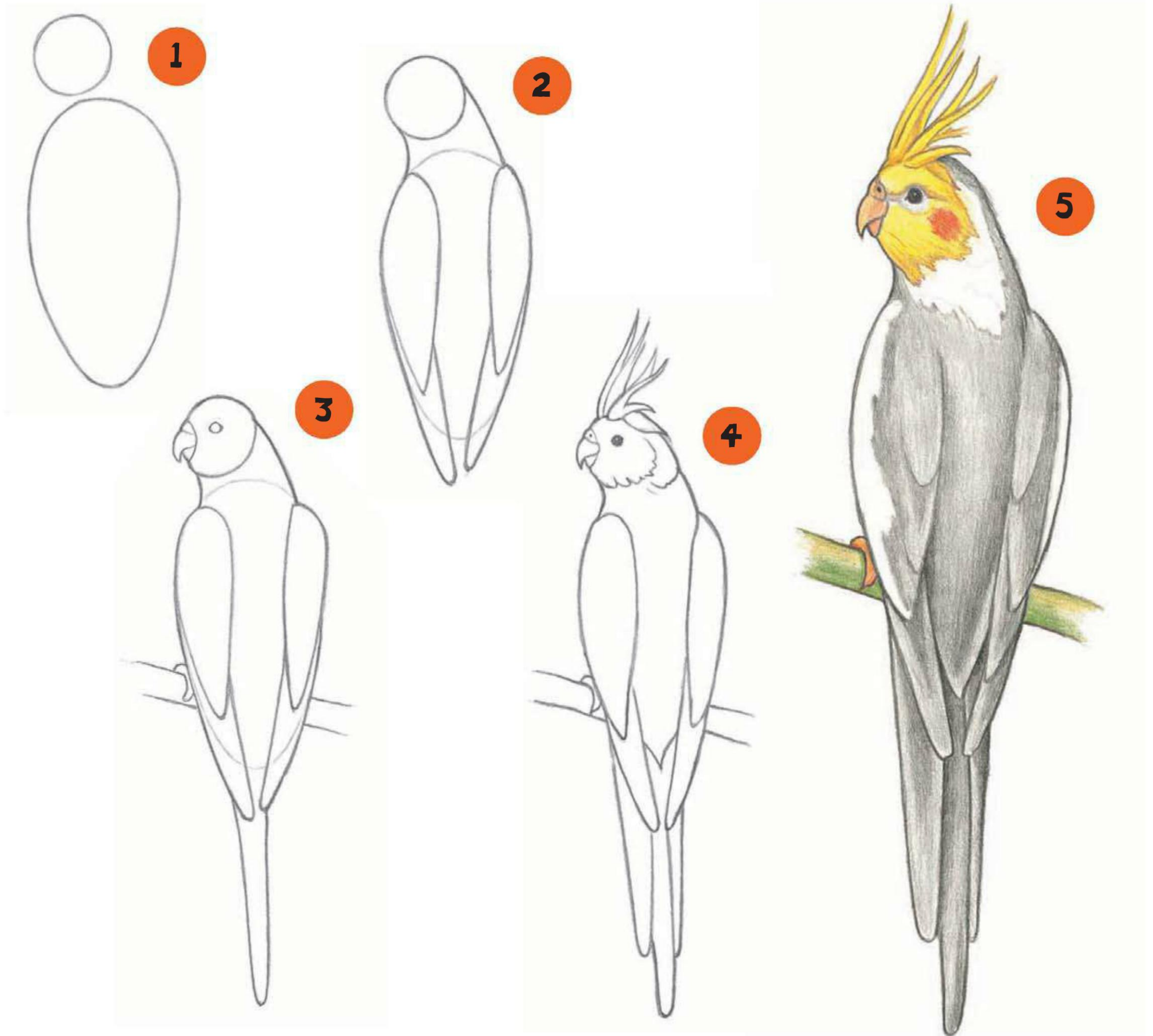
Betta

The cockatiel's crown of feathers stands up when the bird is excited, but it lies flat and curls at the end when the bird is calm.



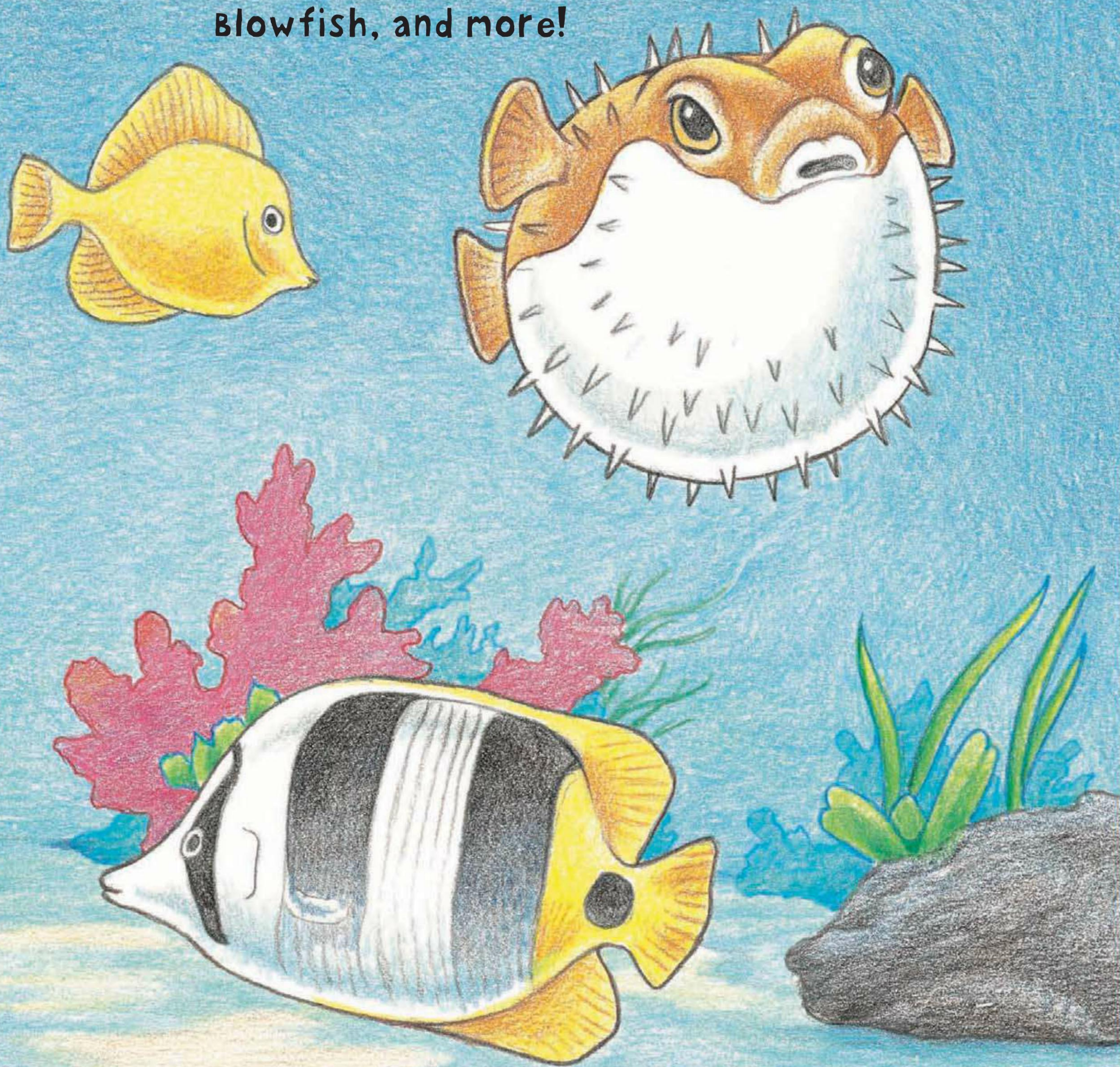

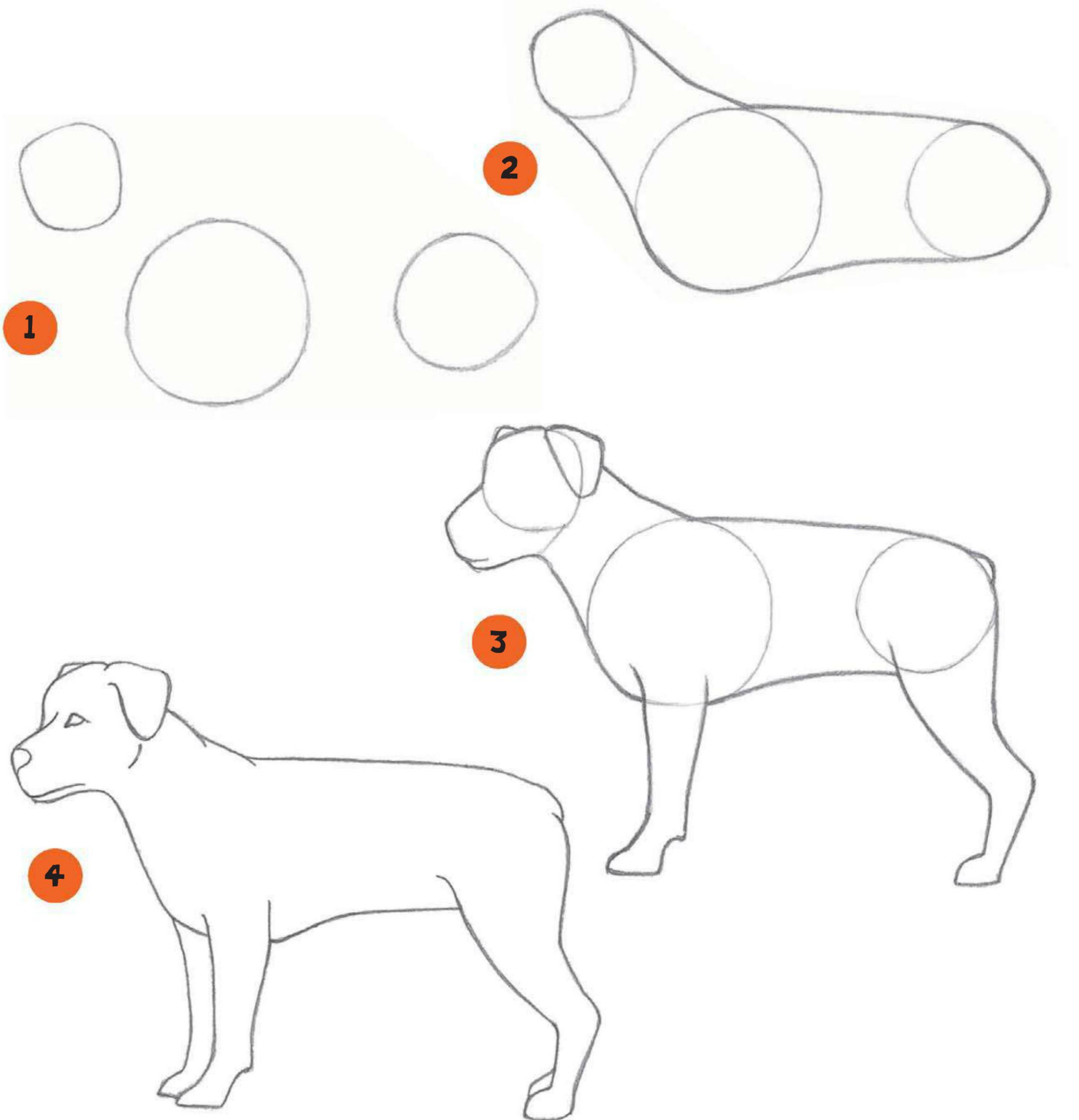


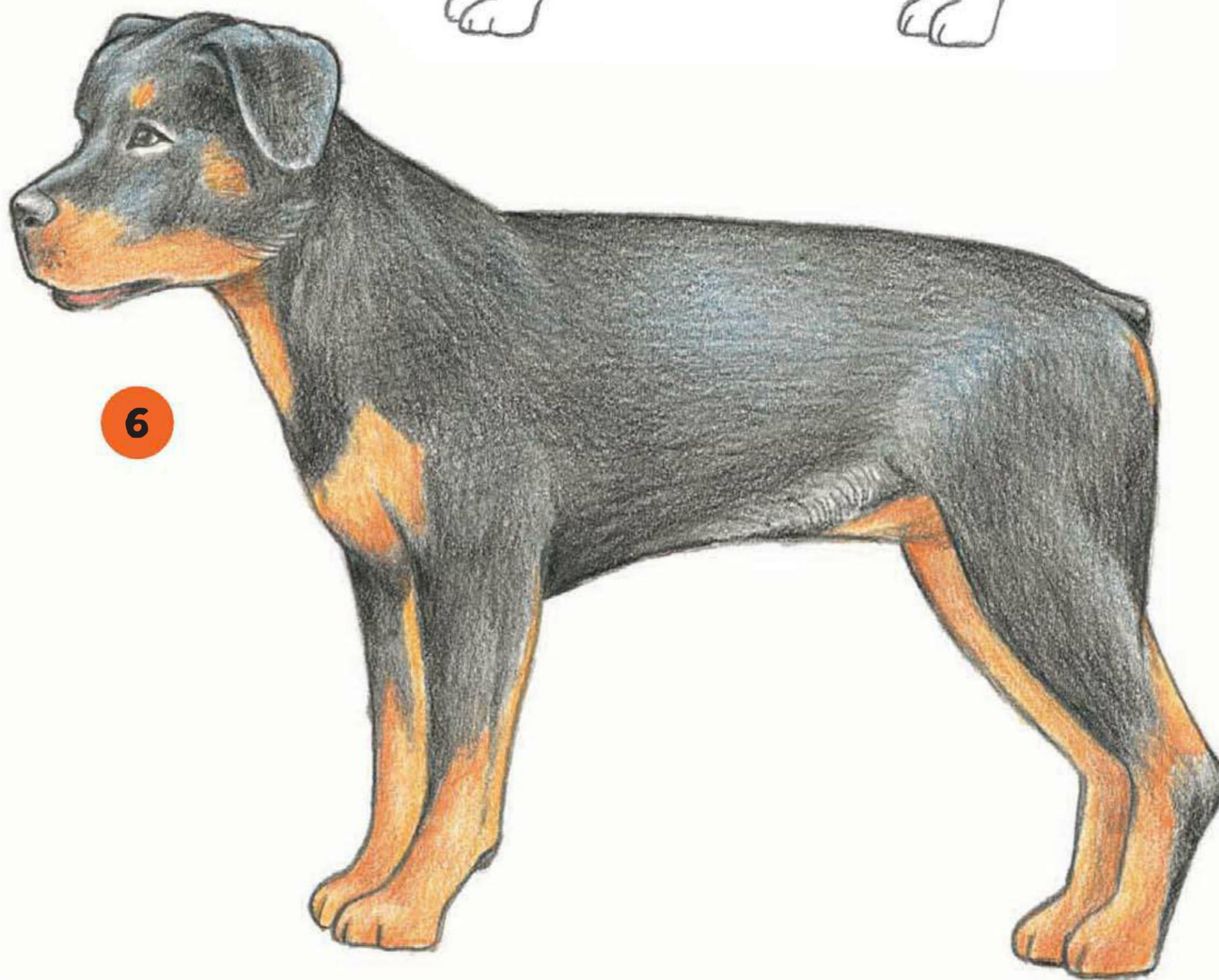
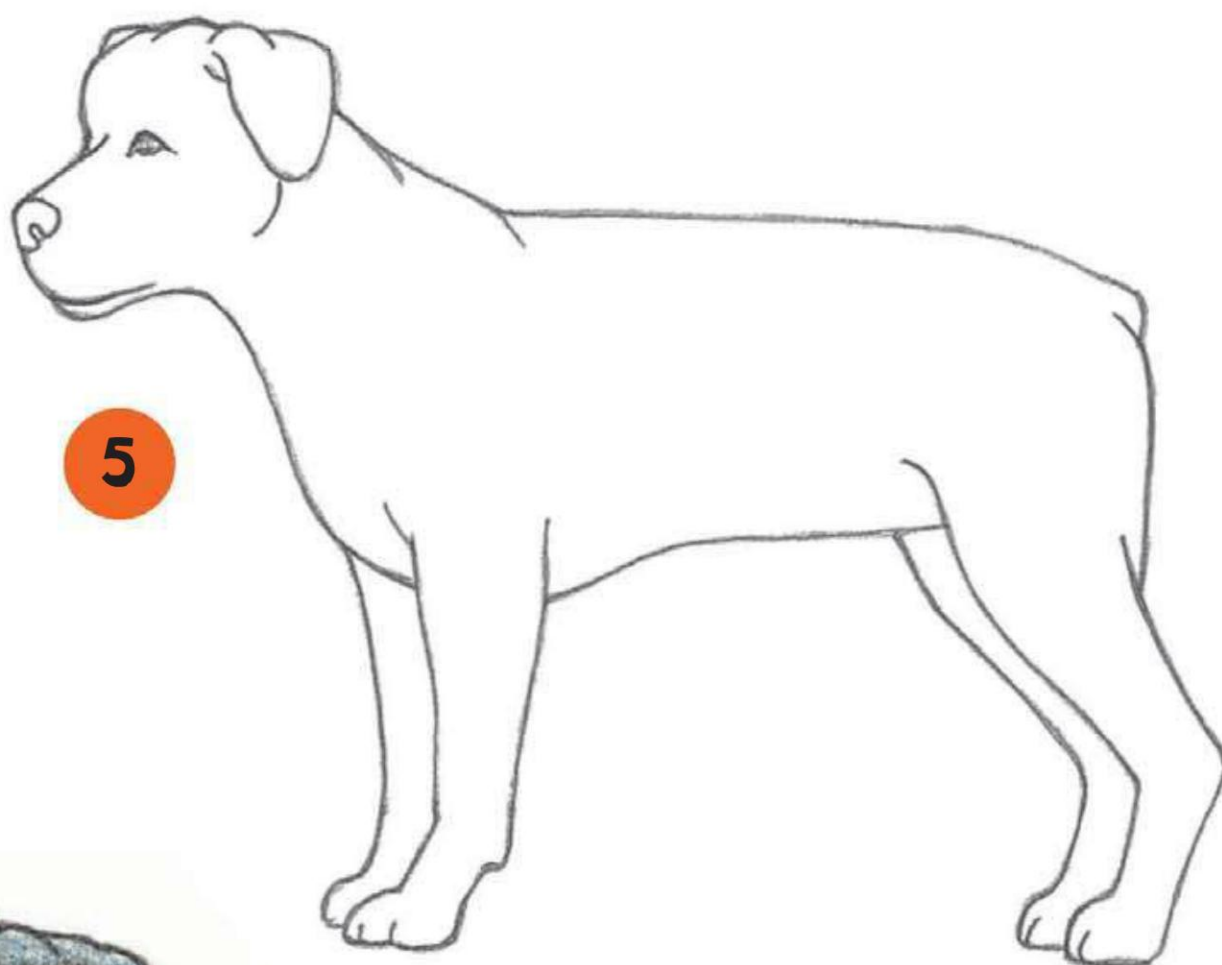
Why stop at one fish when you can

A Rottweiler has a thick, stocky body and a big head. Draw this powerful dog with strong legs, a square jaw, and a straight back.



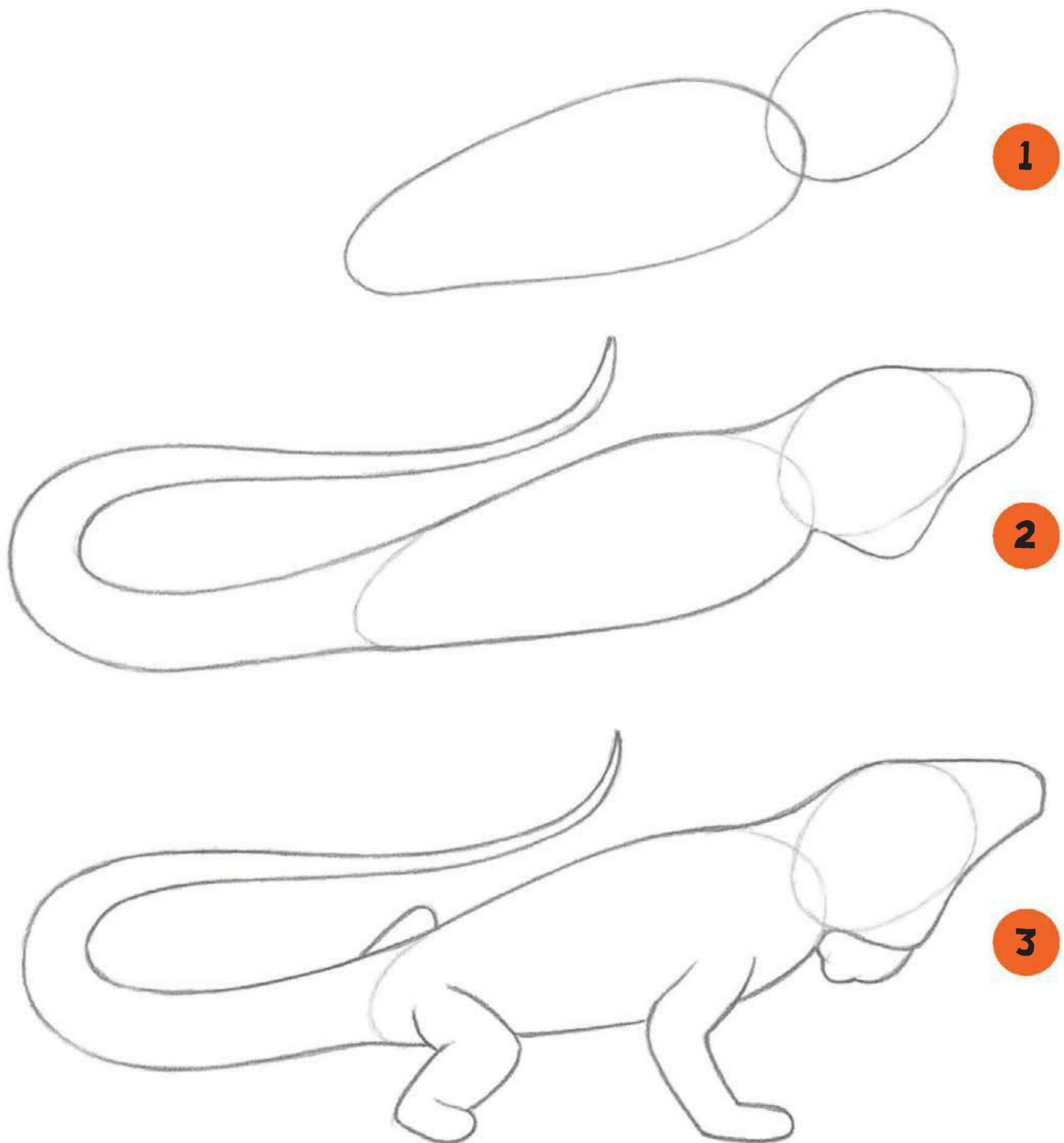

Many people incorrectly believe that the Canary Islands, located in Spain, were named after the bird. Actually, the islands were named after the Latin *Canariae insulae*, where "Canariae" refers to a large breed of dogs from Roman times. So the islands' name really means "Isle of Dogs"!

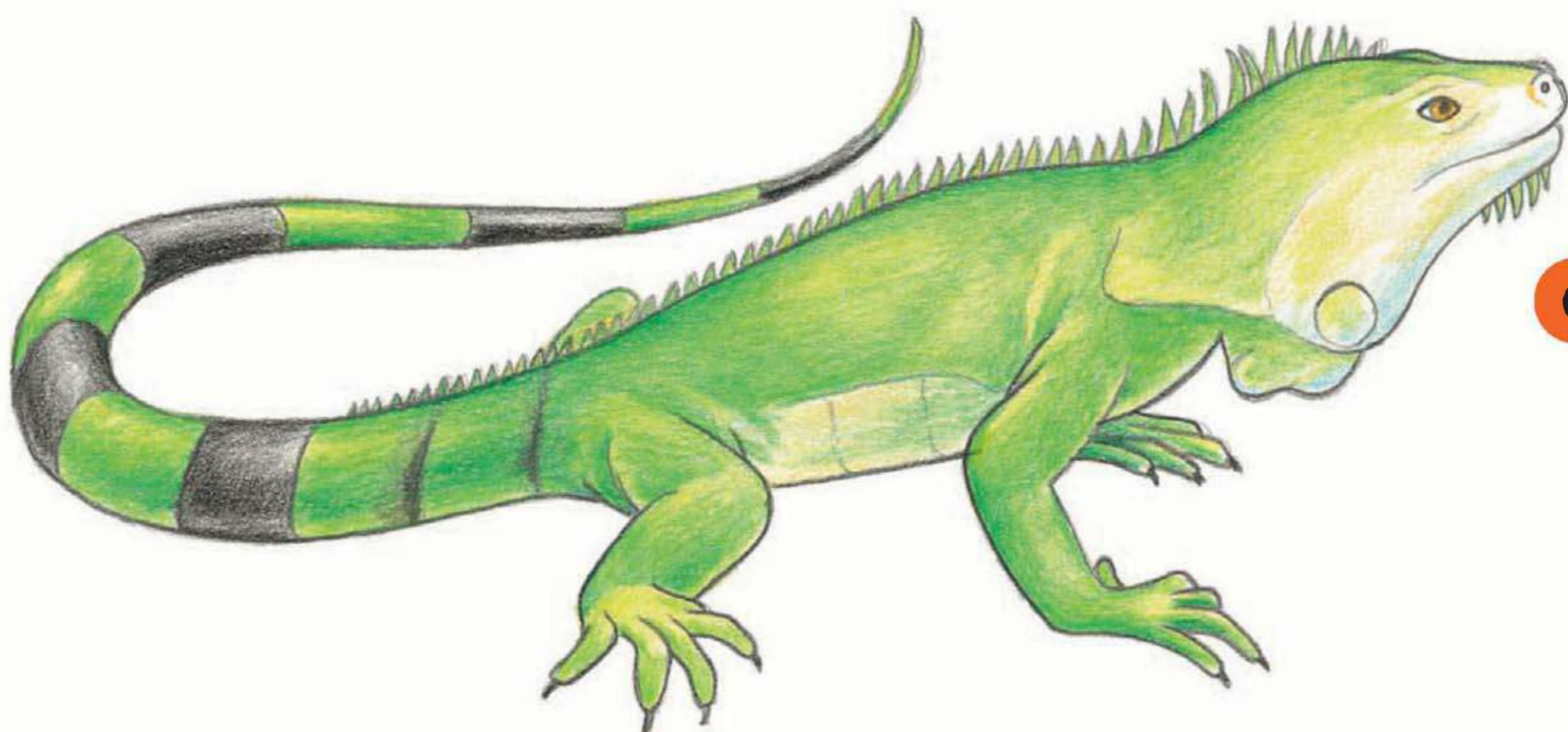
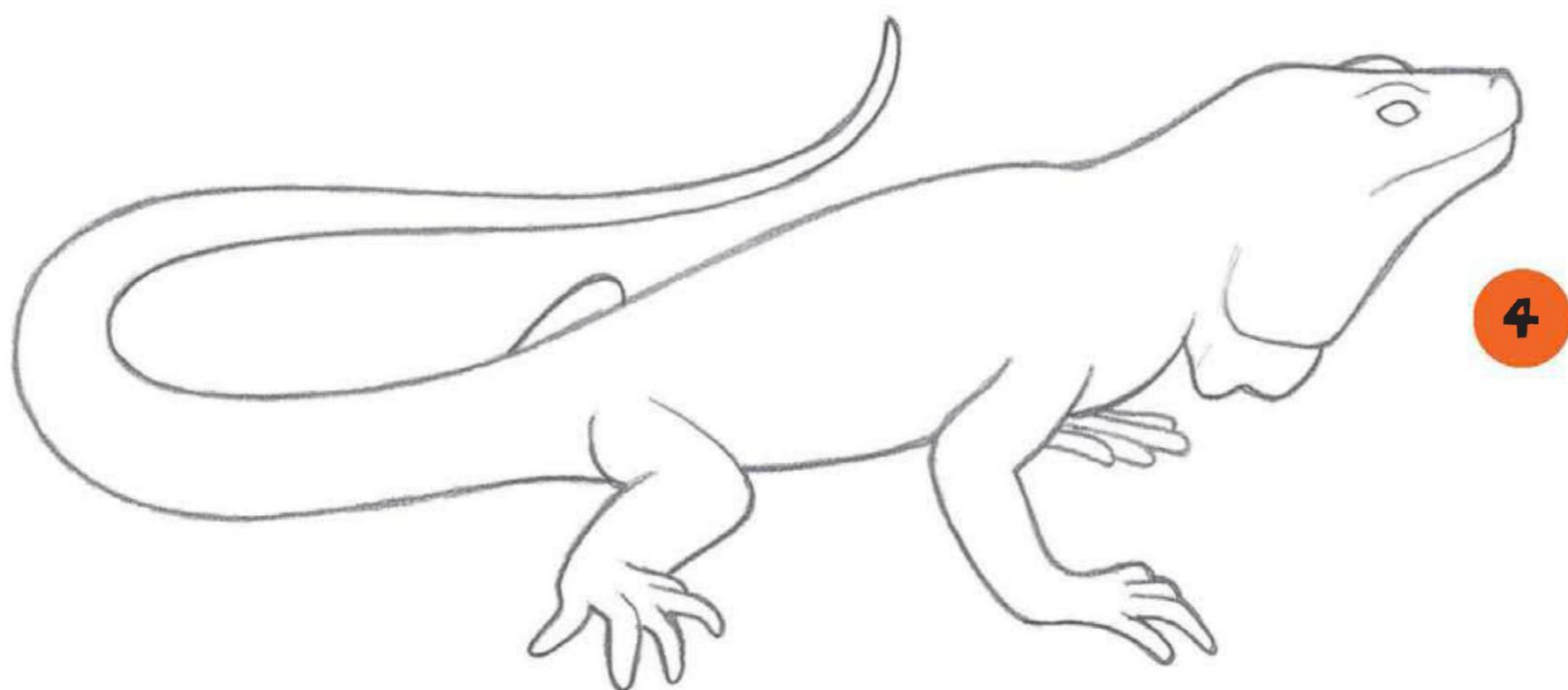
Iguana

When you draw this scaly, sun-loving reptile, be sure to make its tail longer than its head and body combined!



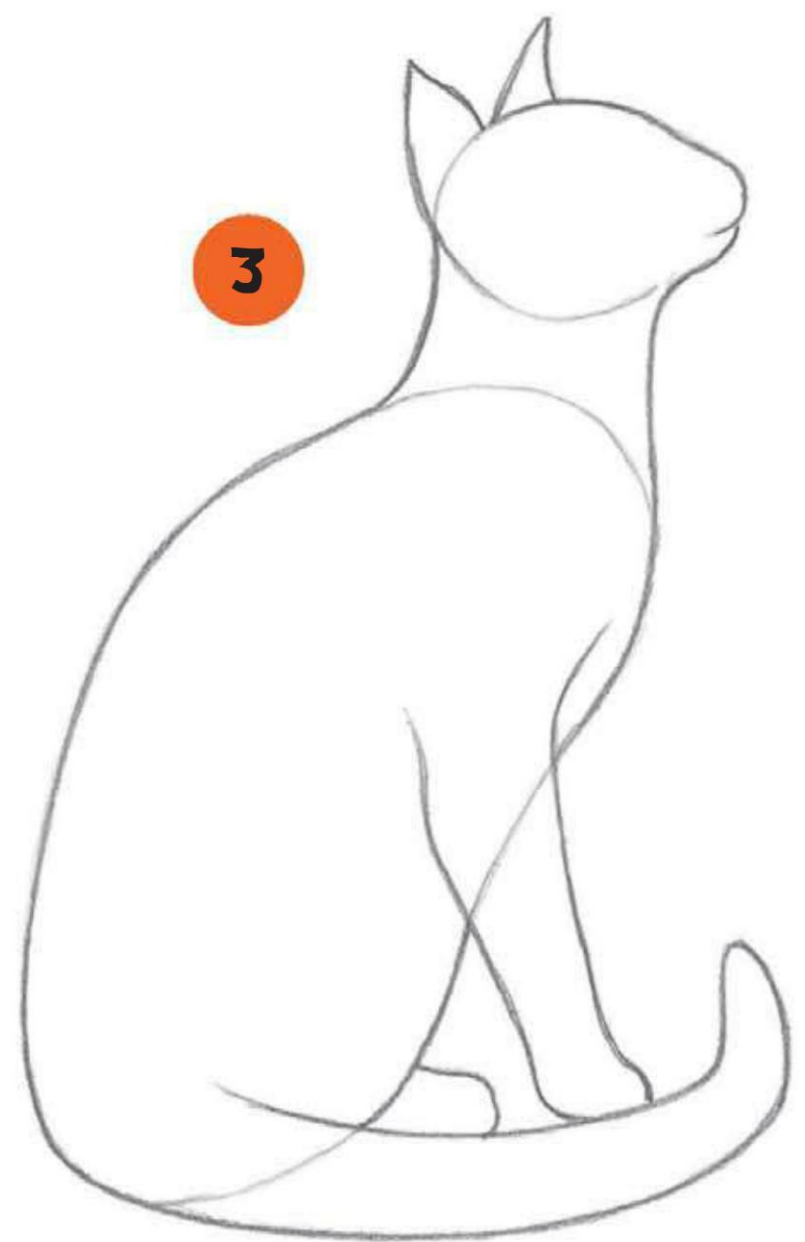
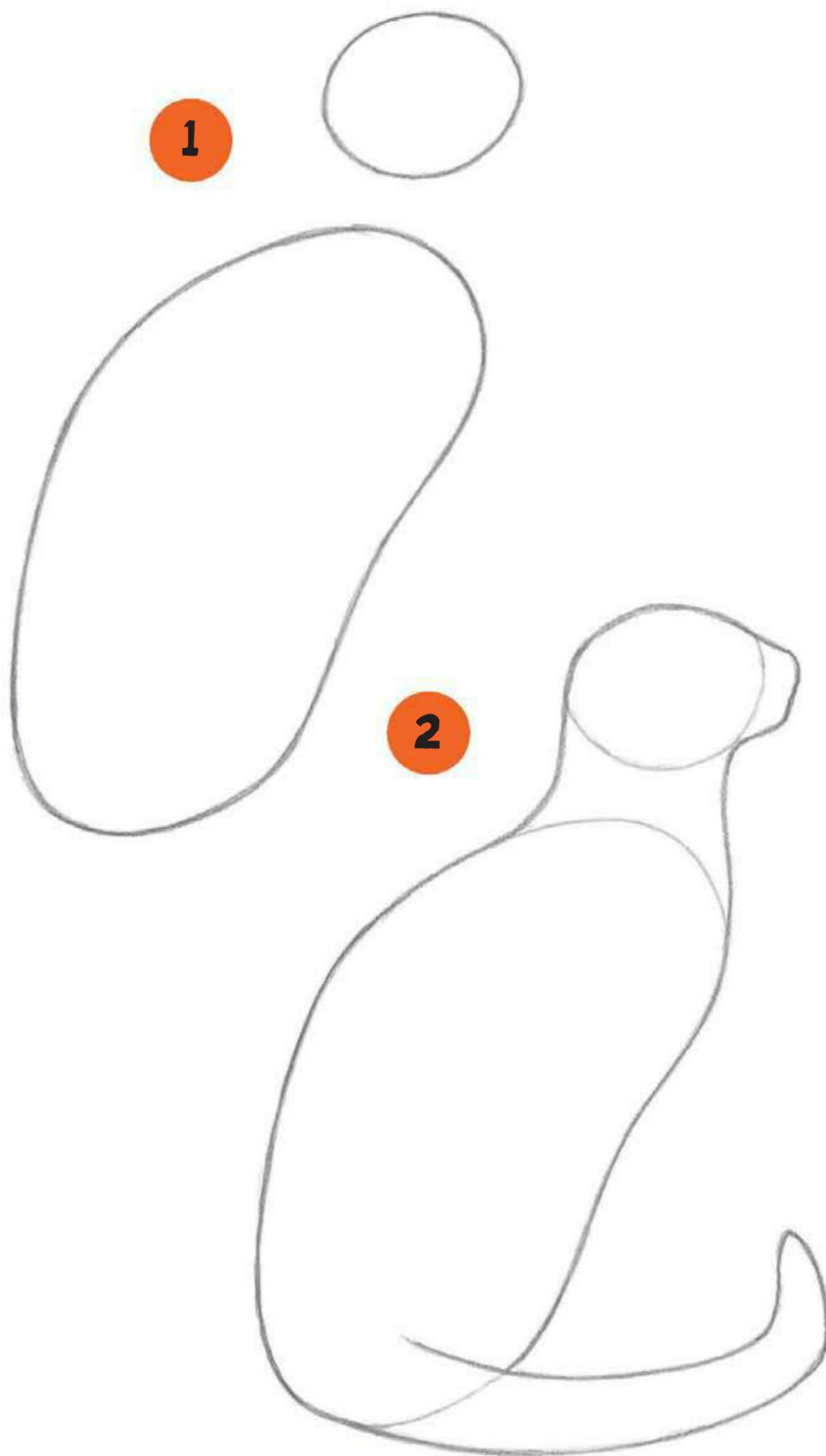

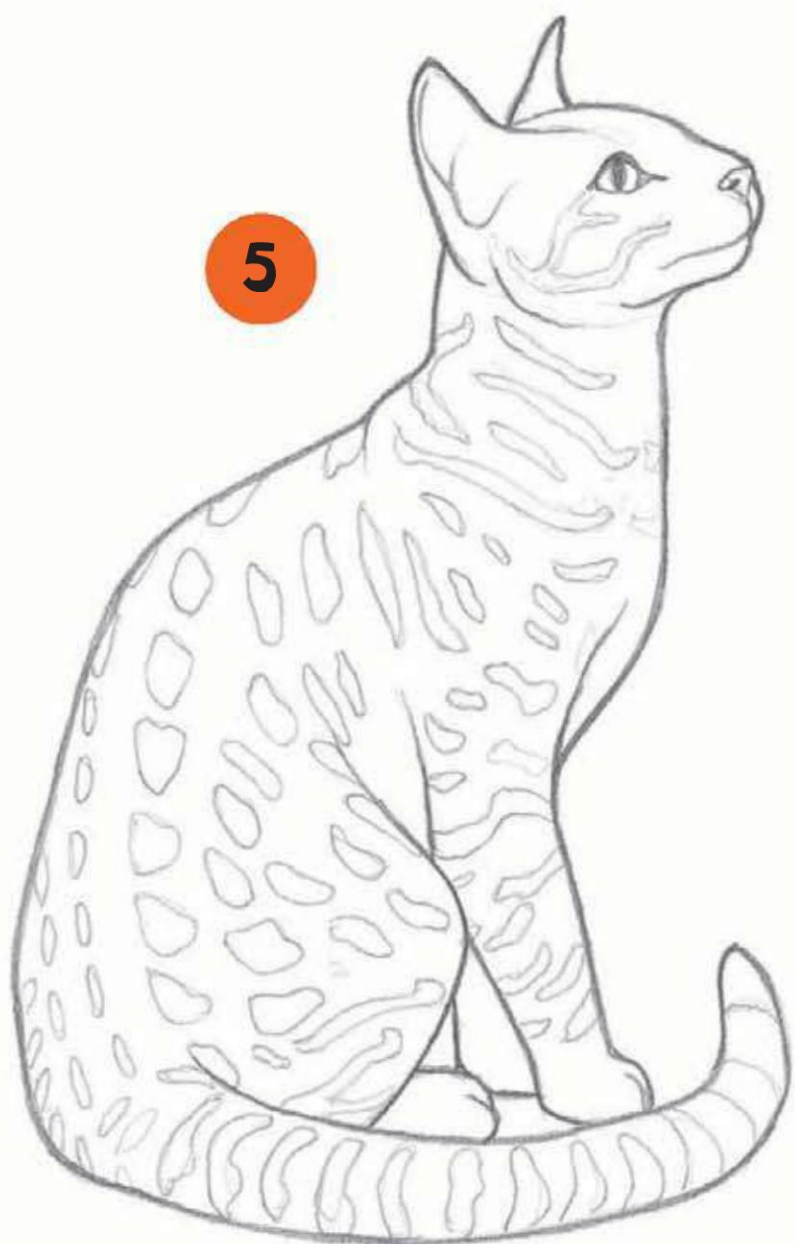
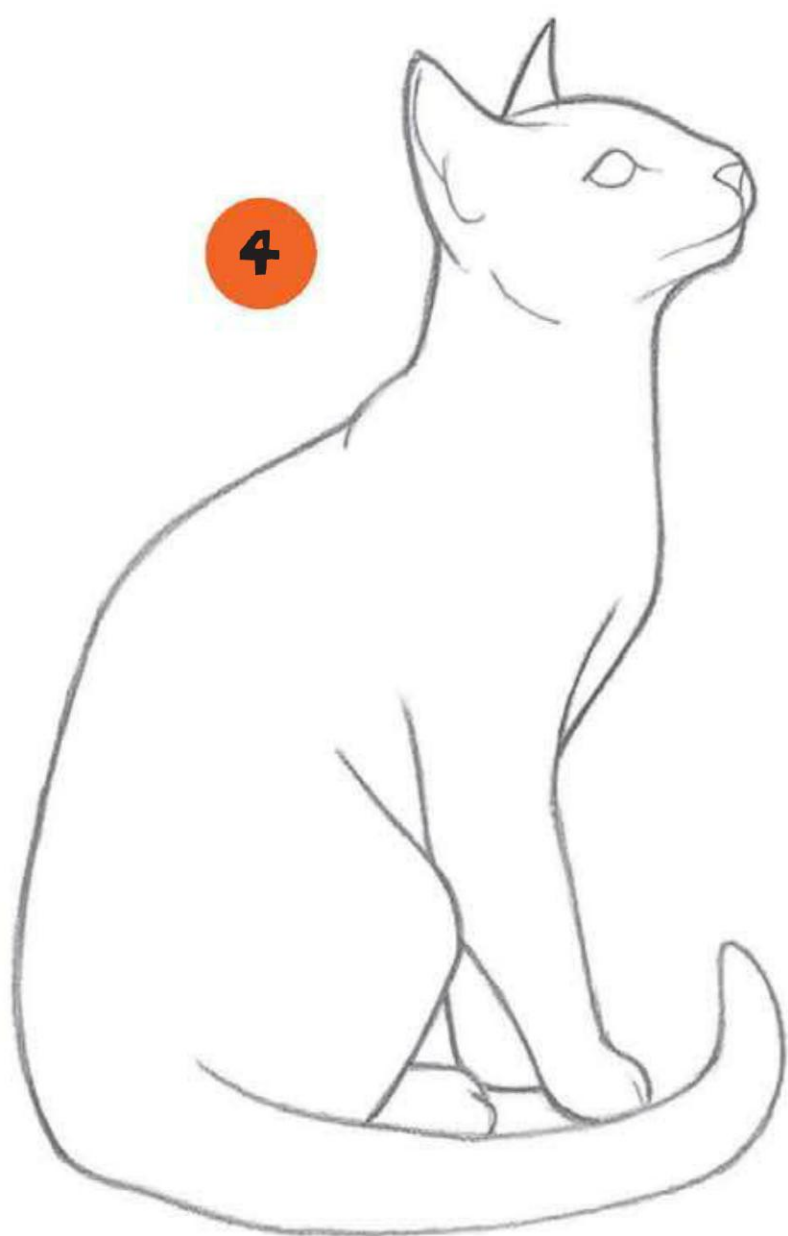
Short-Haired Cat

It's easy to spot this feline's shape because of its short coat! Start drawing this regal Bengal's body with a tall bean shape.



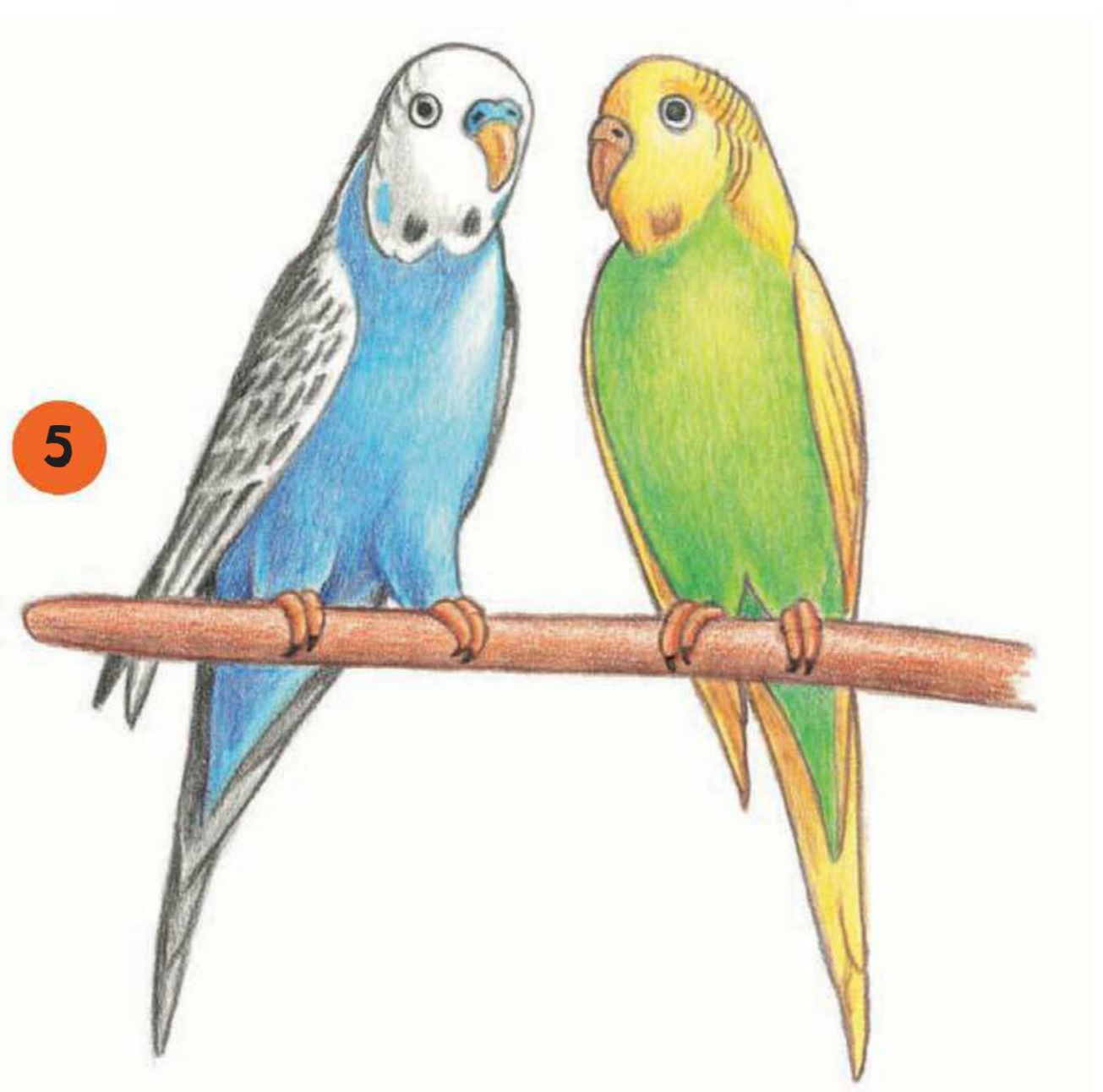
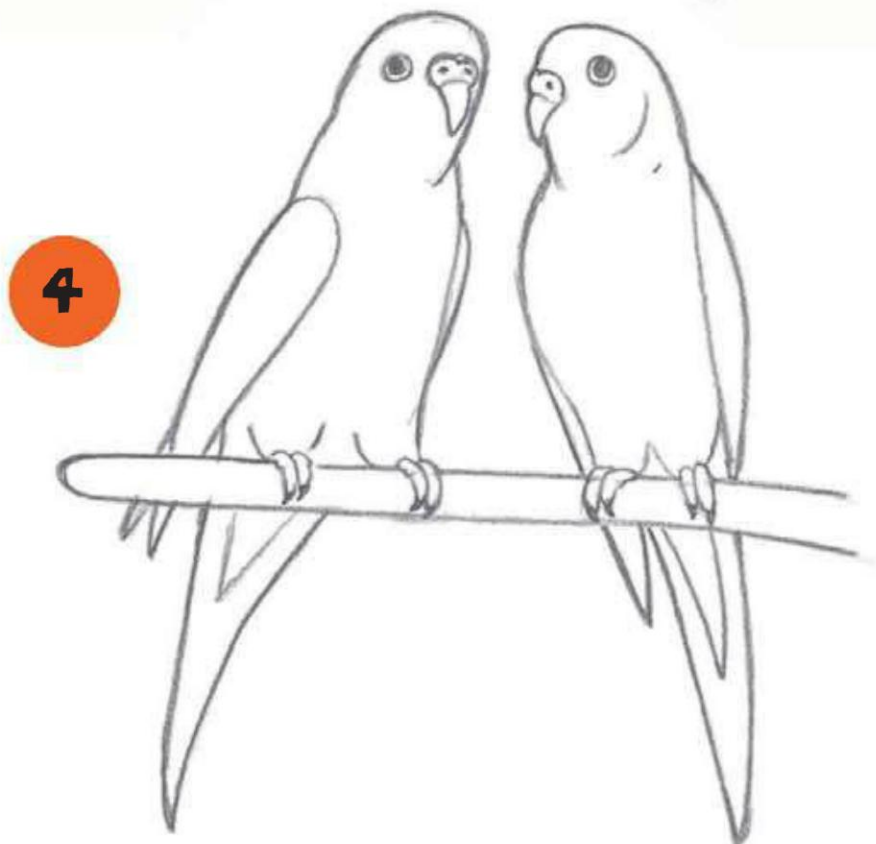
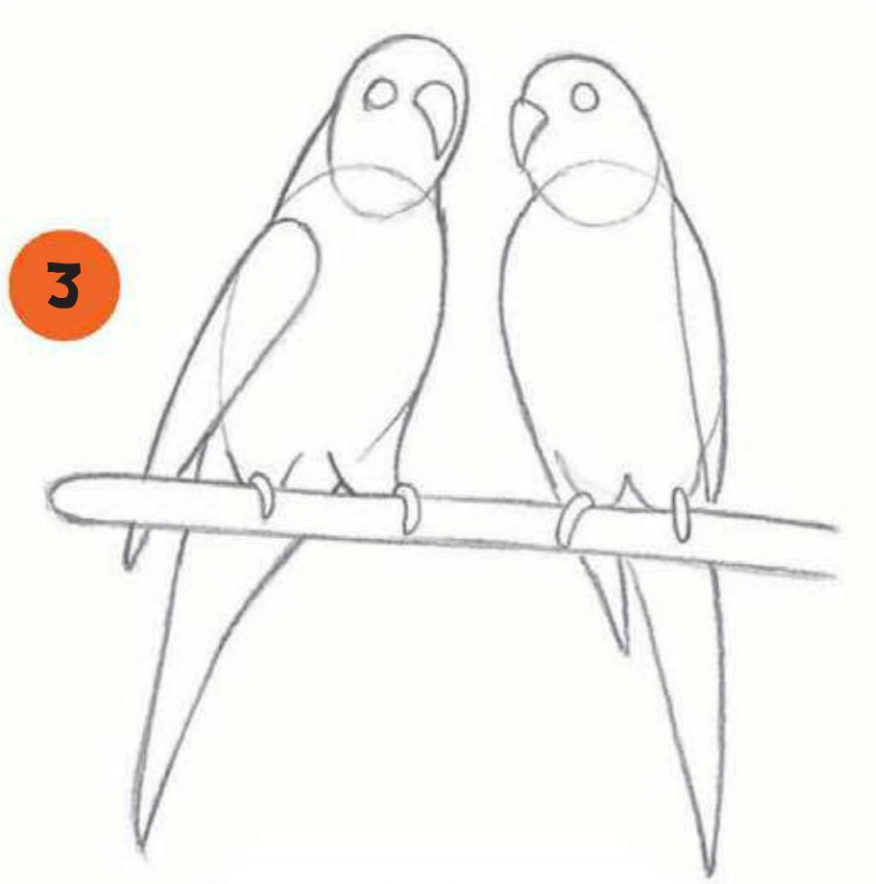
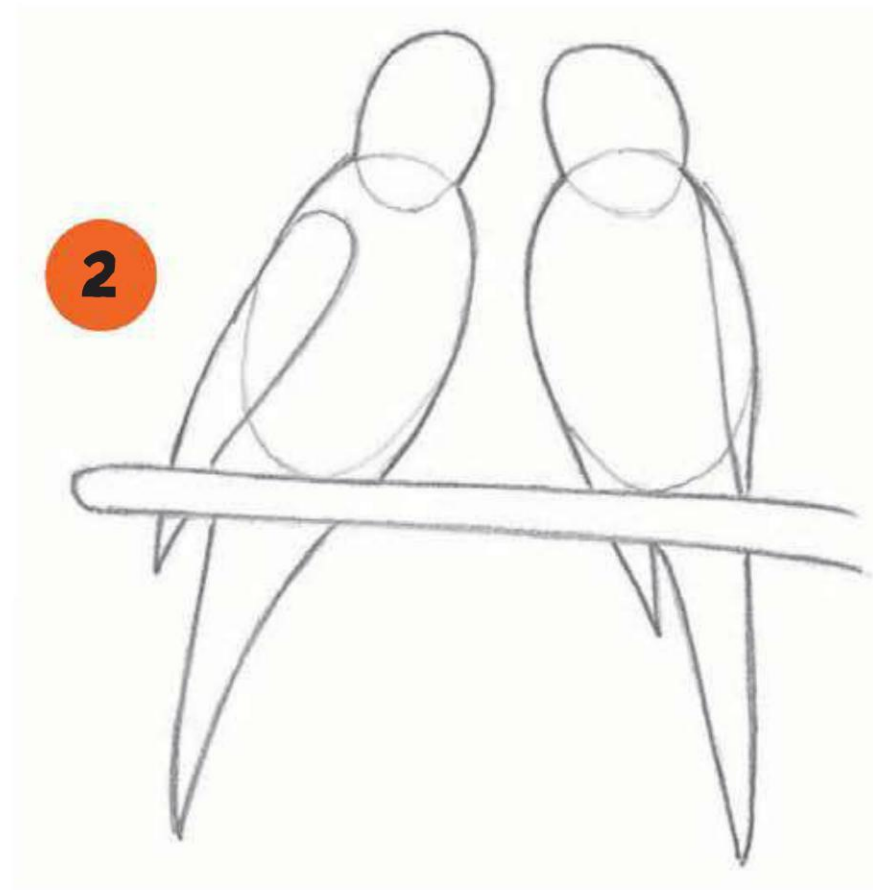
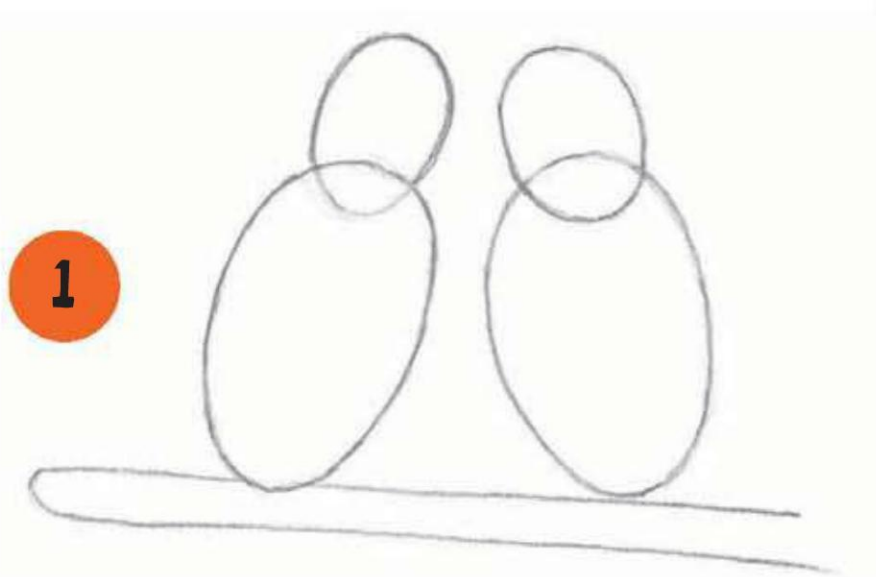

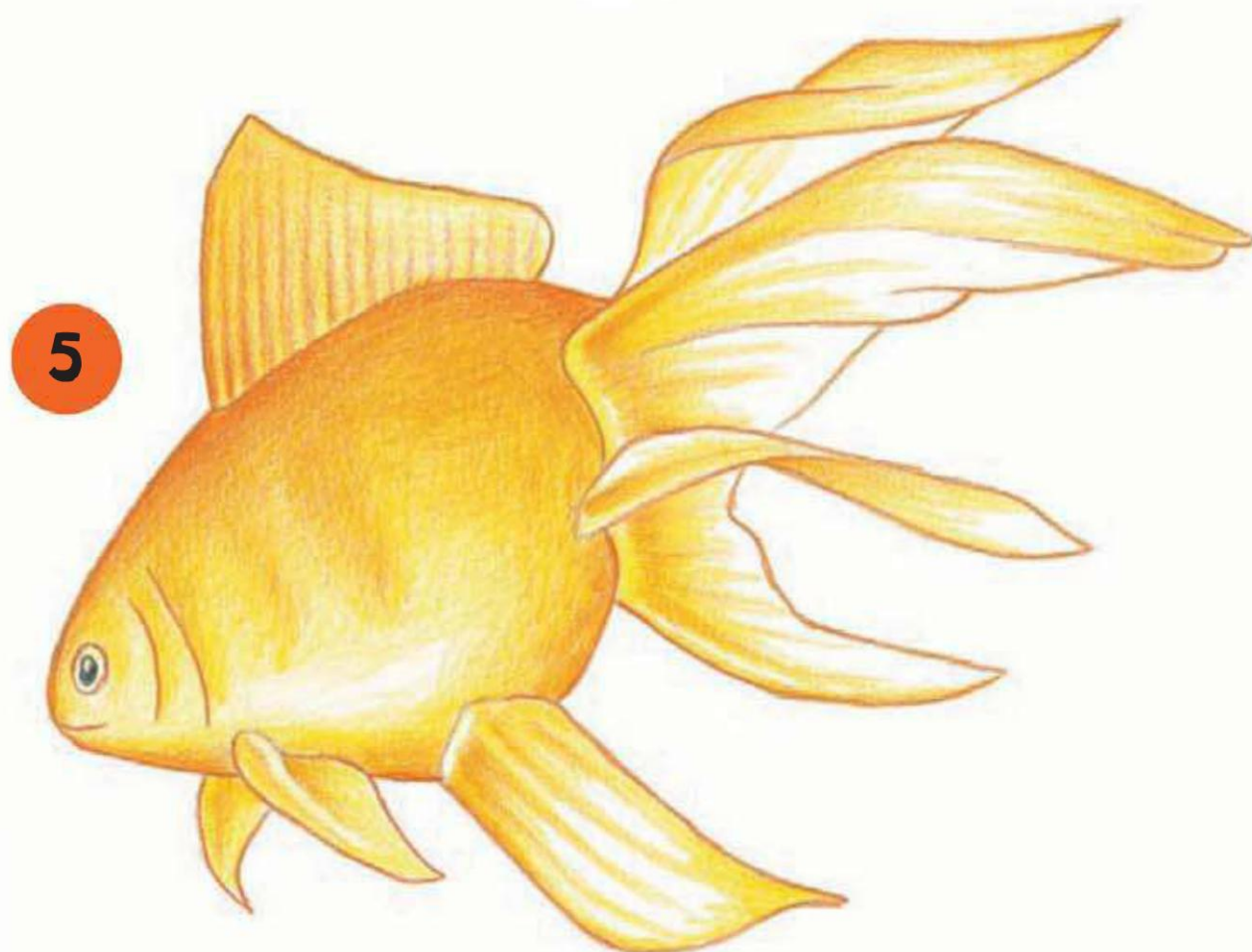
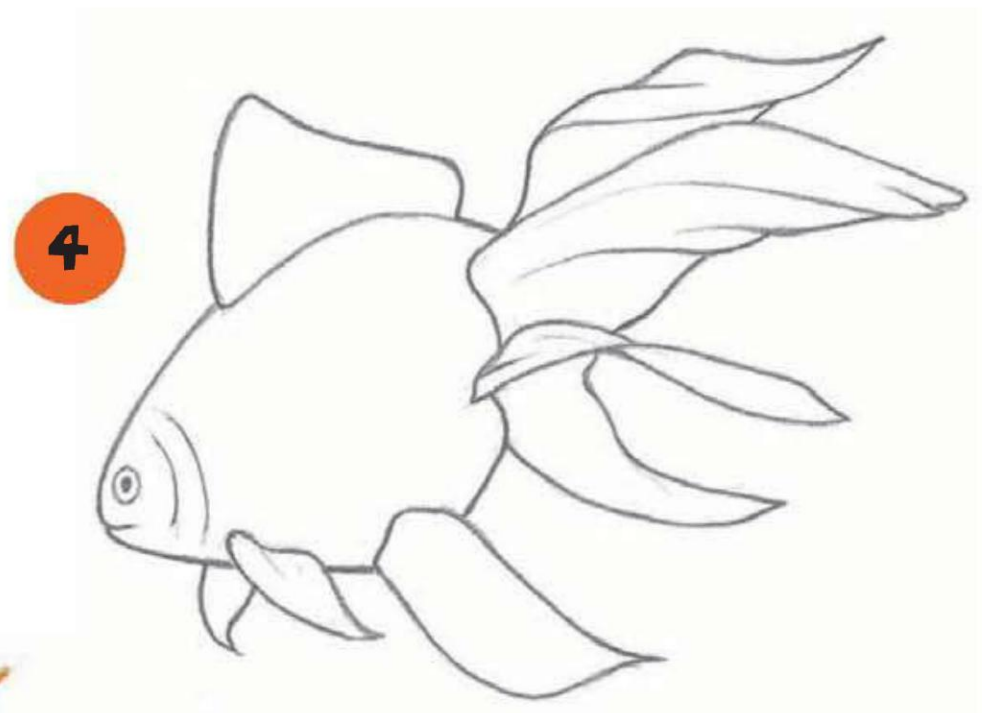
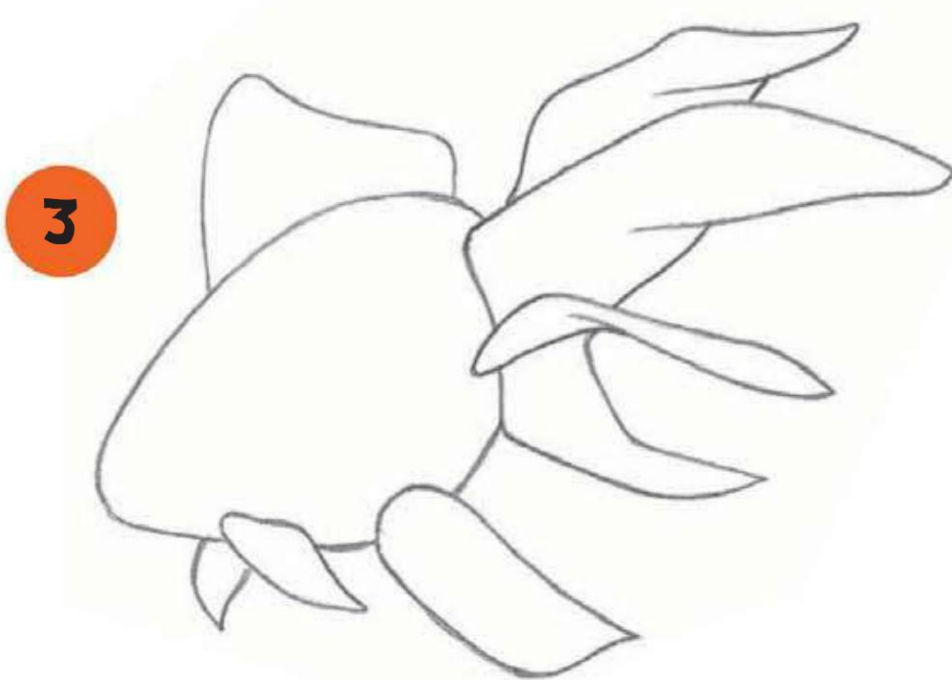
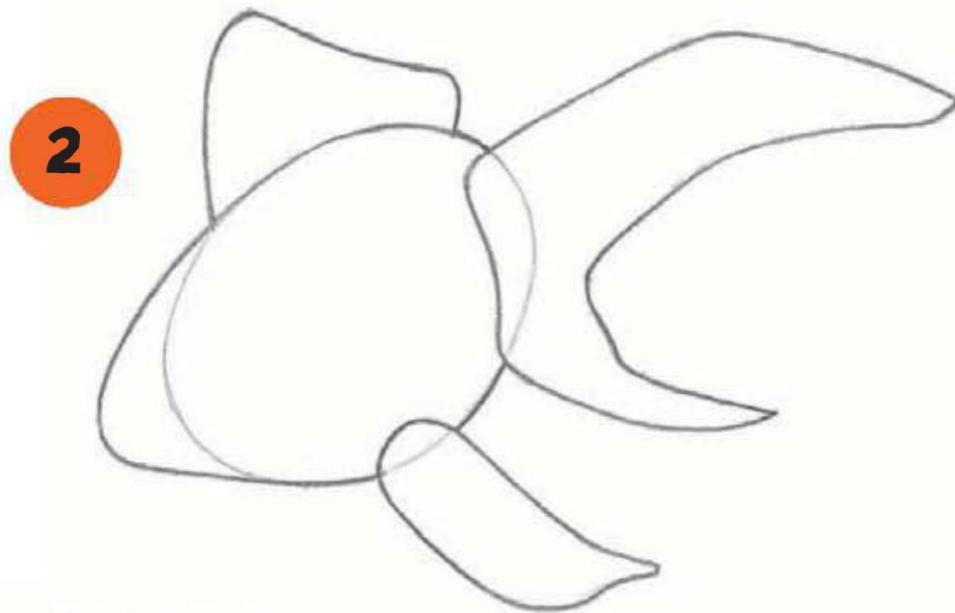
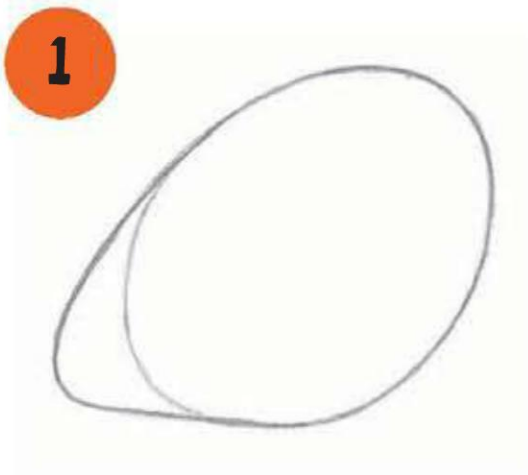
Parakeets

Like a game of Go Fish, drawing this goldfish is as simple as can be! Begin with an egg shape for the body, and then add the flowing fins!

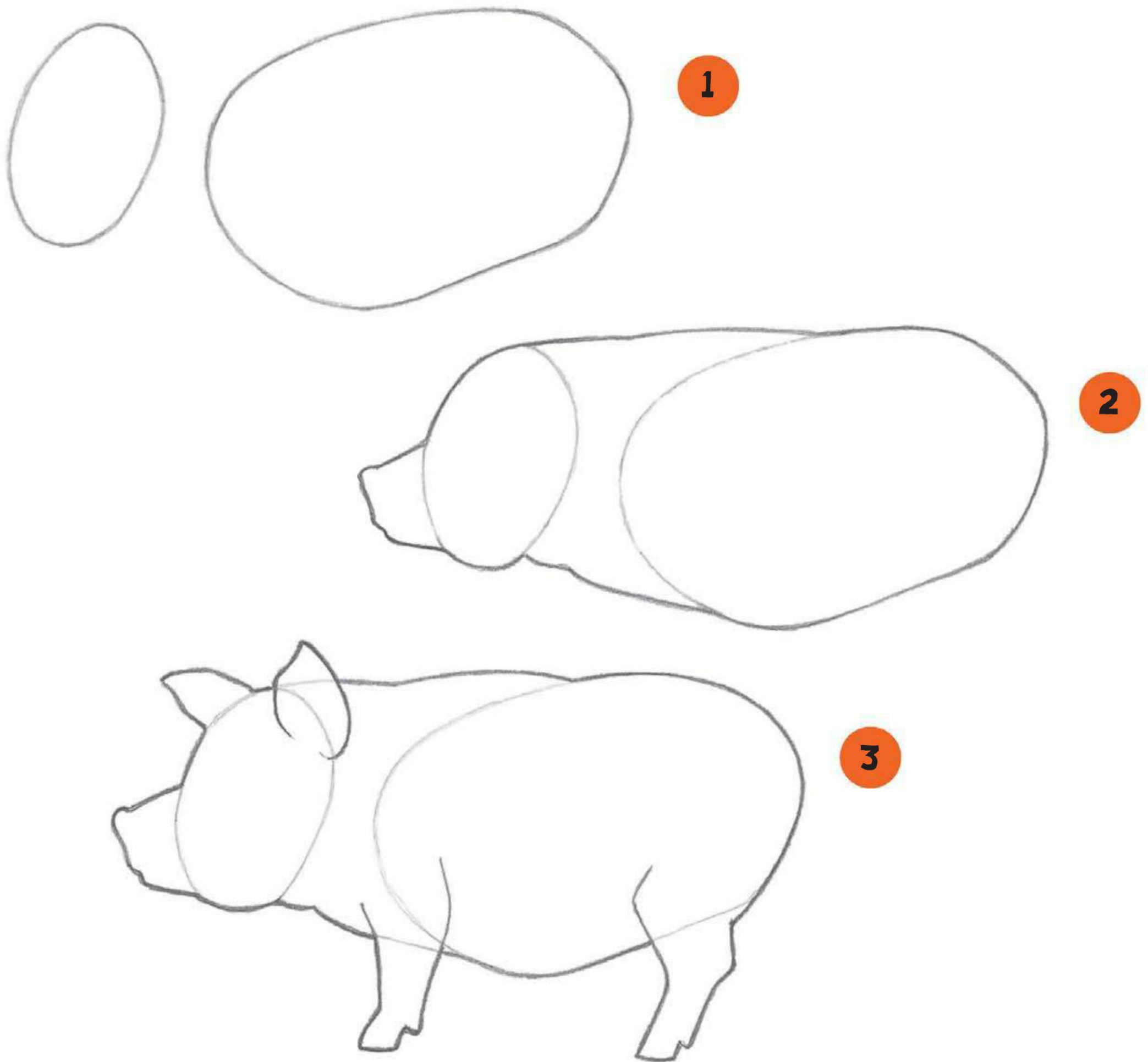

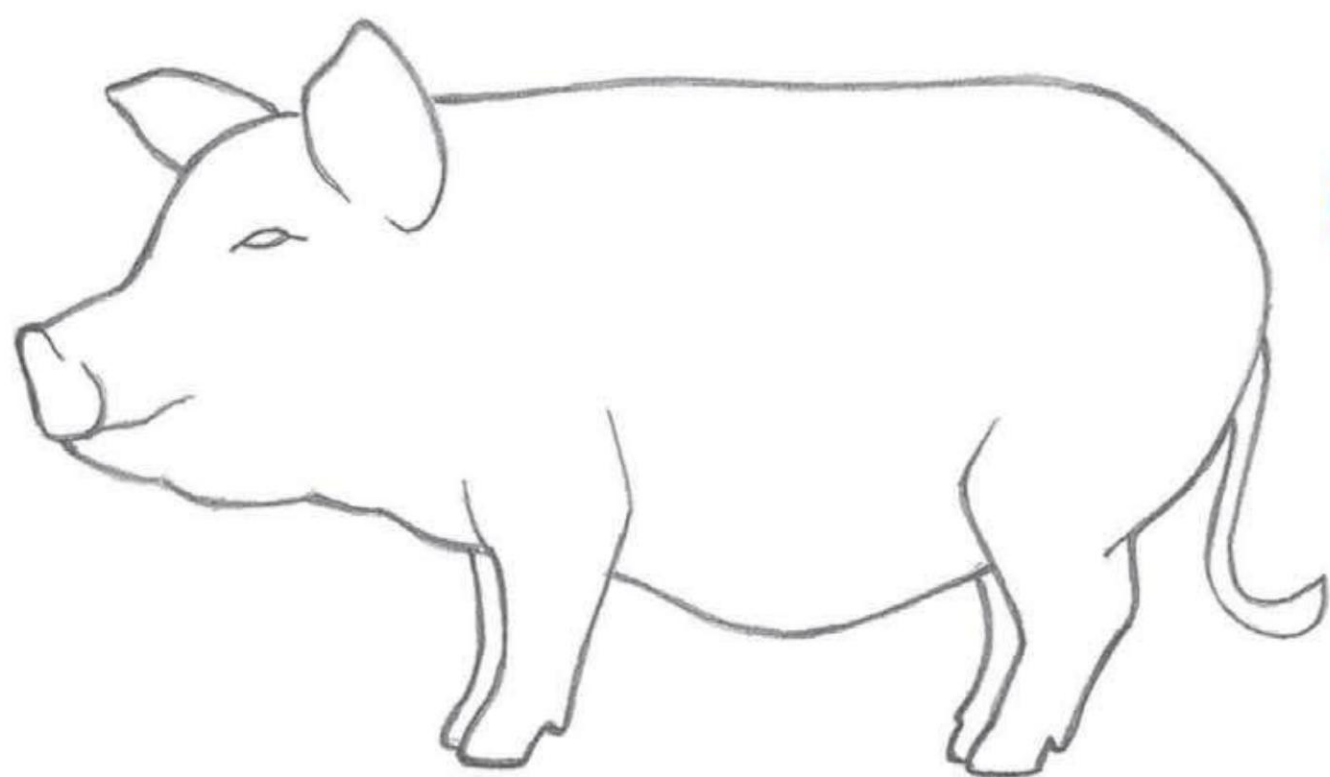
Pot-Bellied Pig

“Porkers” like this one love to pig out, so it’s no surprise that this swine’s most recognizable feature is its big round belly.

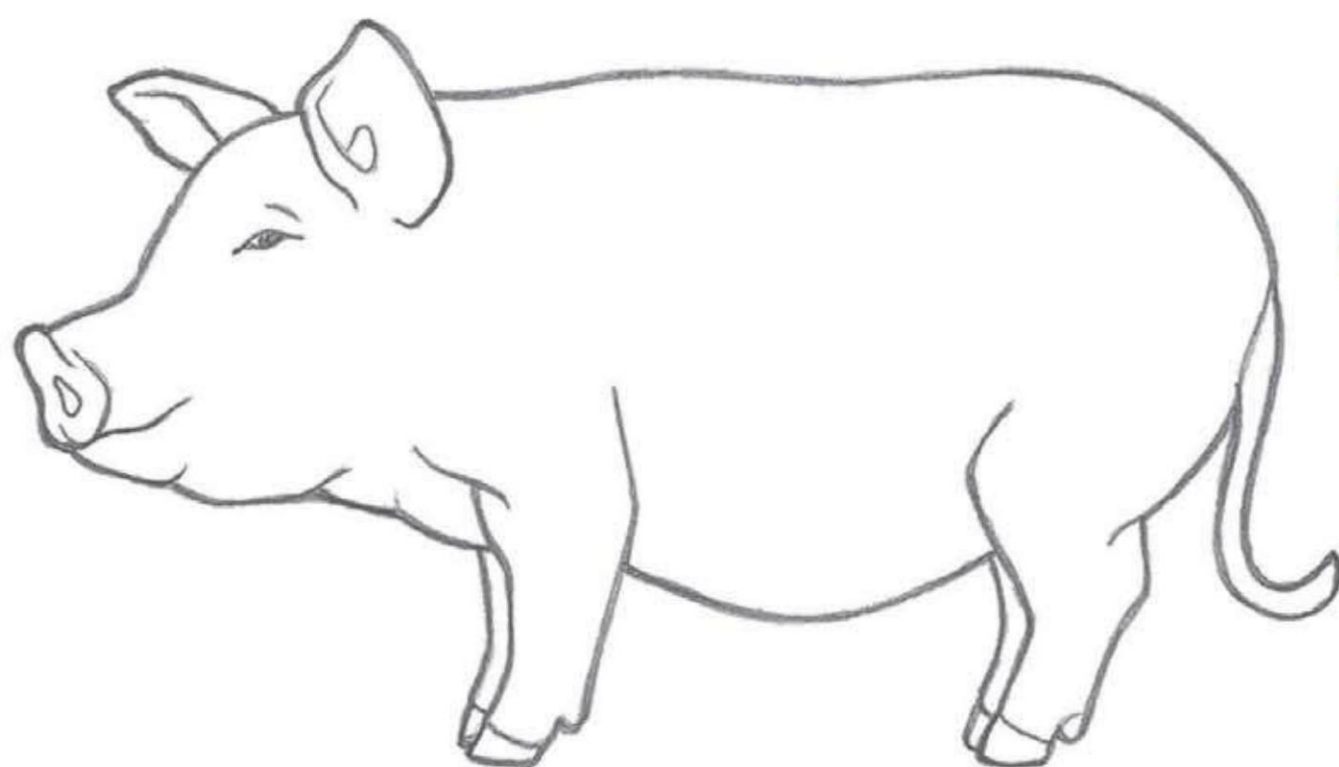

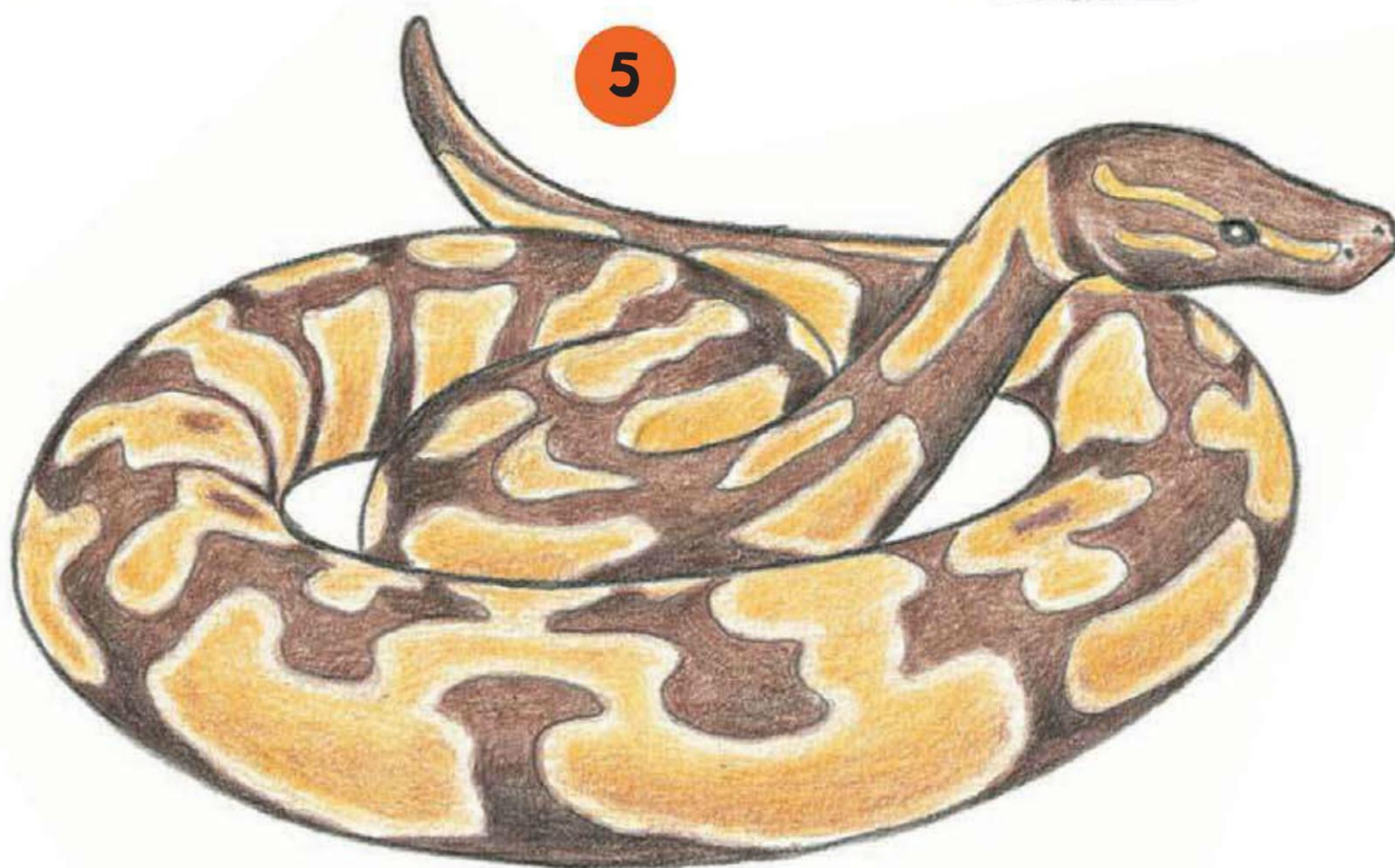
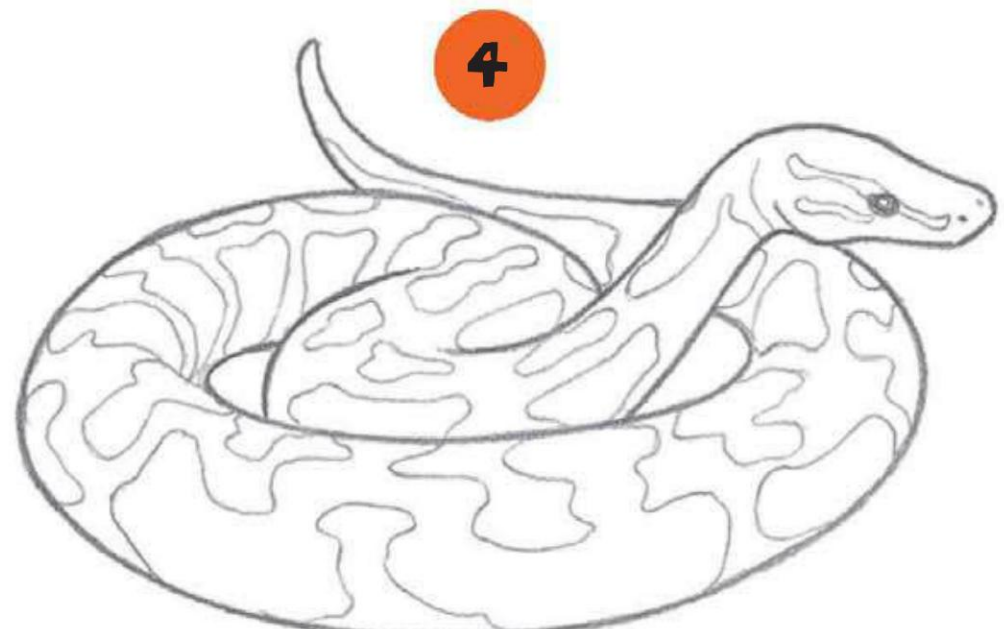
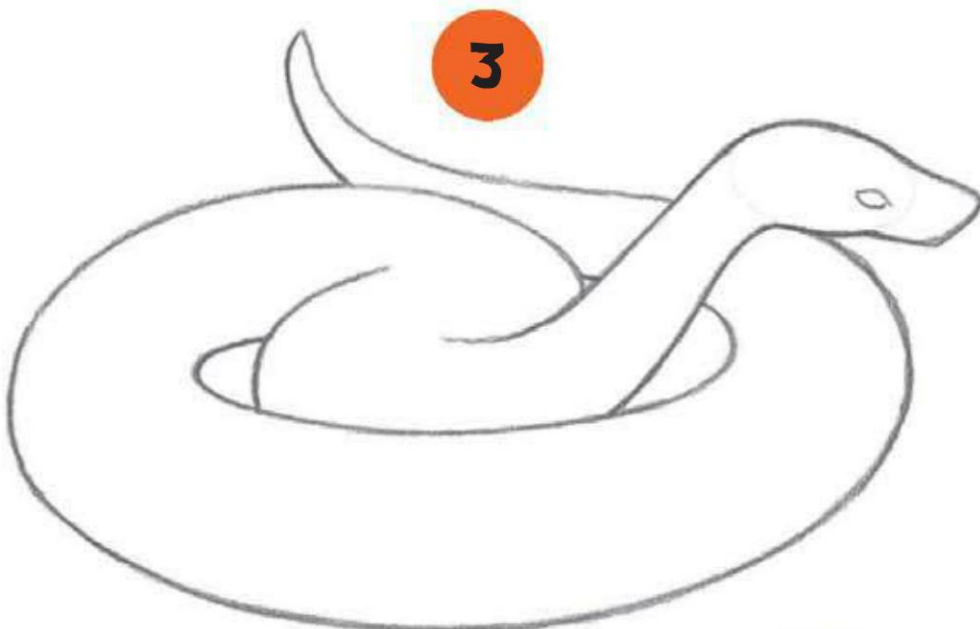
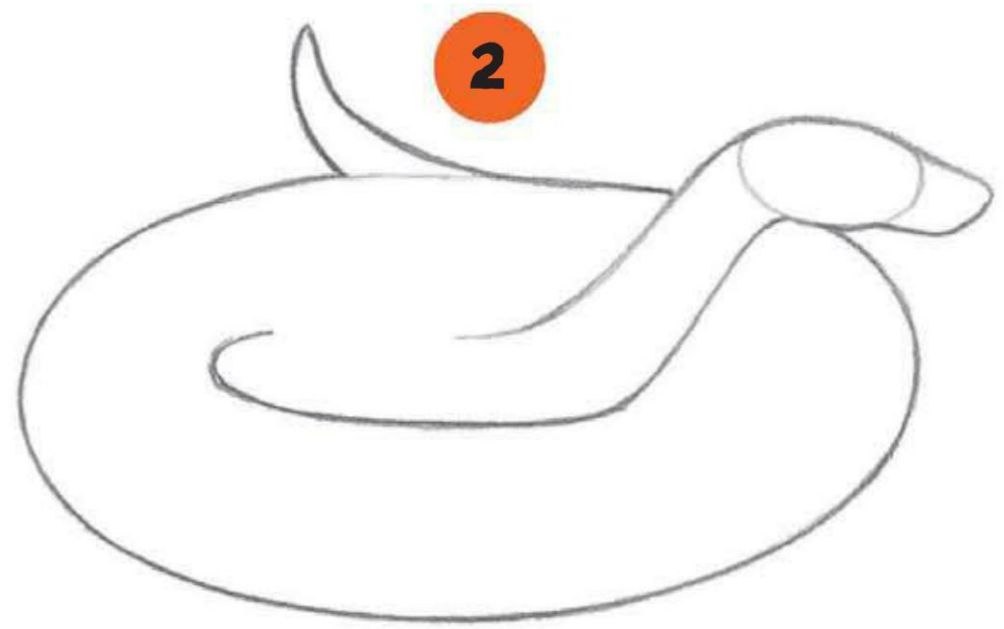
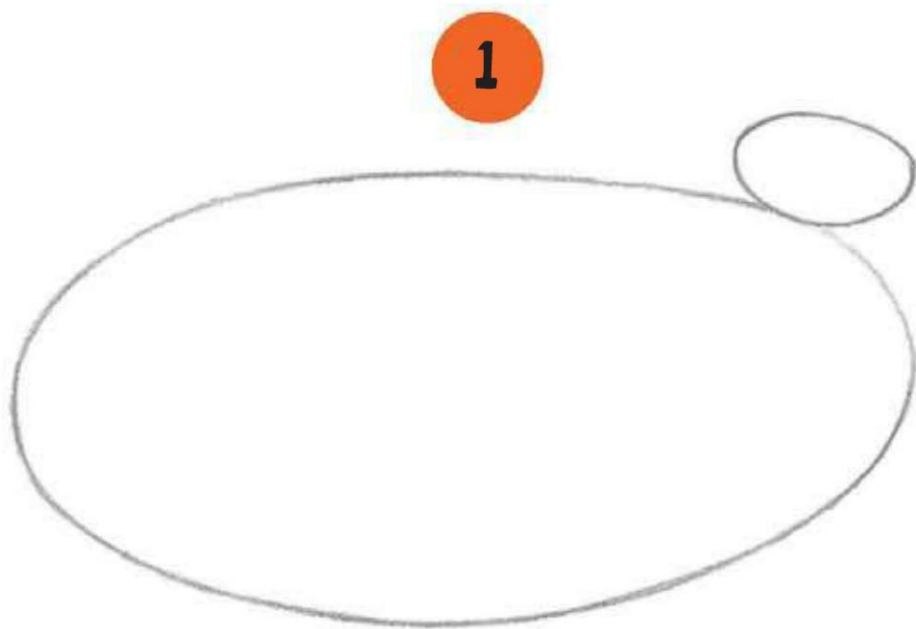
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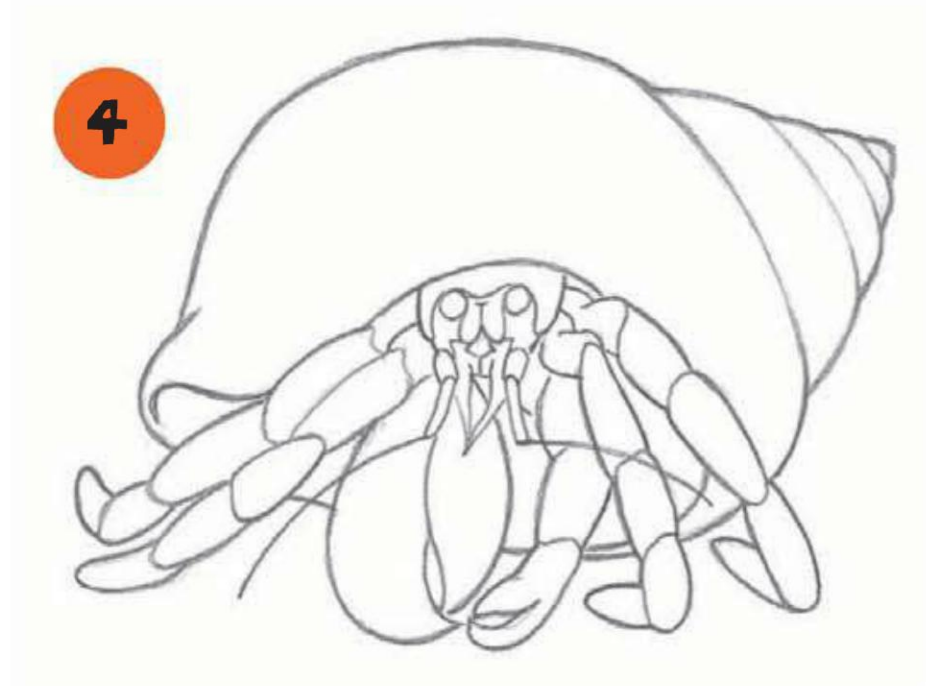
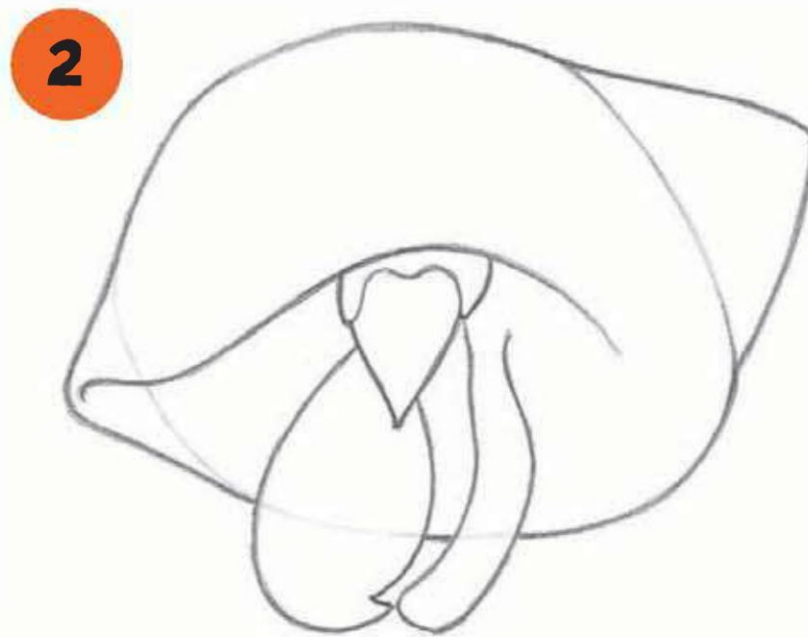
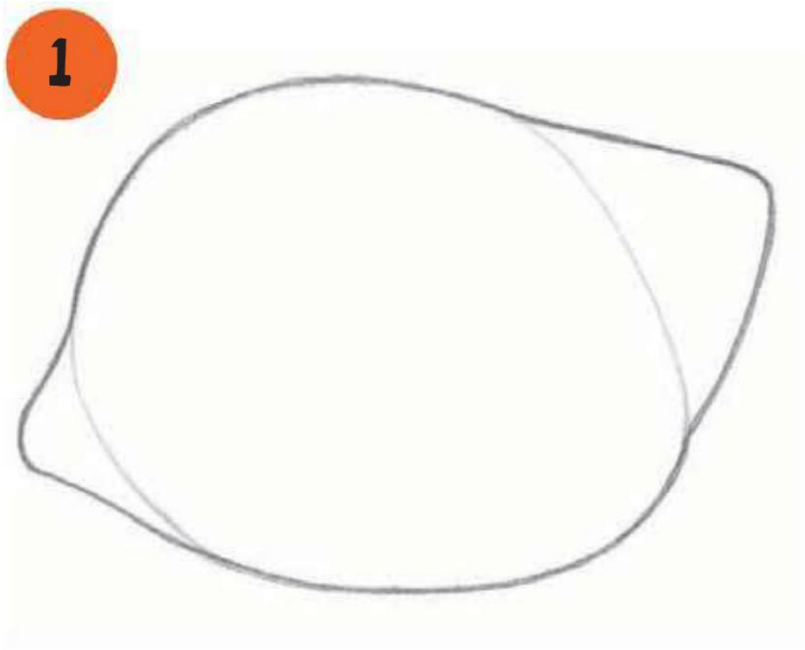
Snake

The hermit crab's shell once belonged to a sea snail or other ocean creature. Hermit crabs find empty shells and move into them for protection.



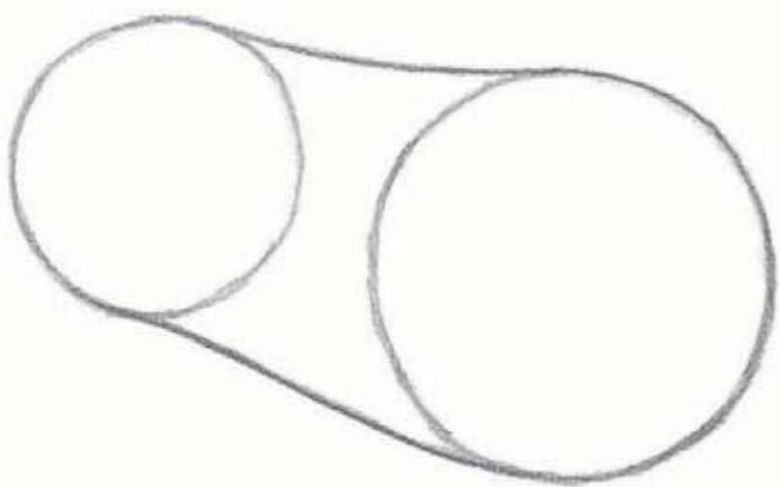

A hermit crab can live for 20 years or longer in captivity, but it only reproduces in the wild.

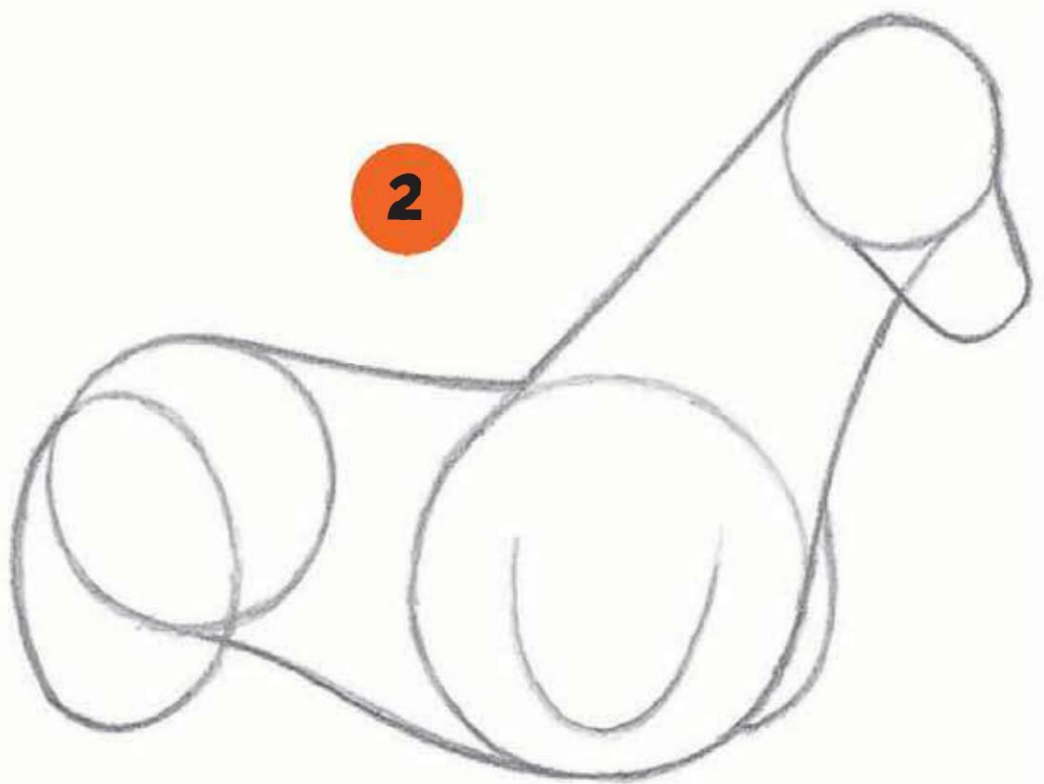
Pony

Ponies are shorter than horses, but they're usually stronger as well! Draw this pet with a thick body and muscular legs.

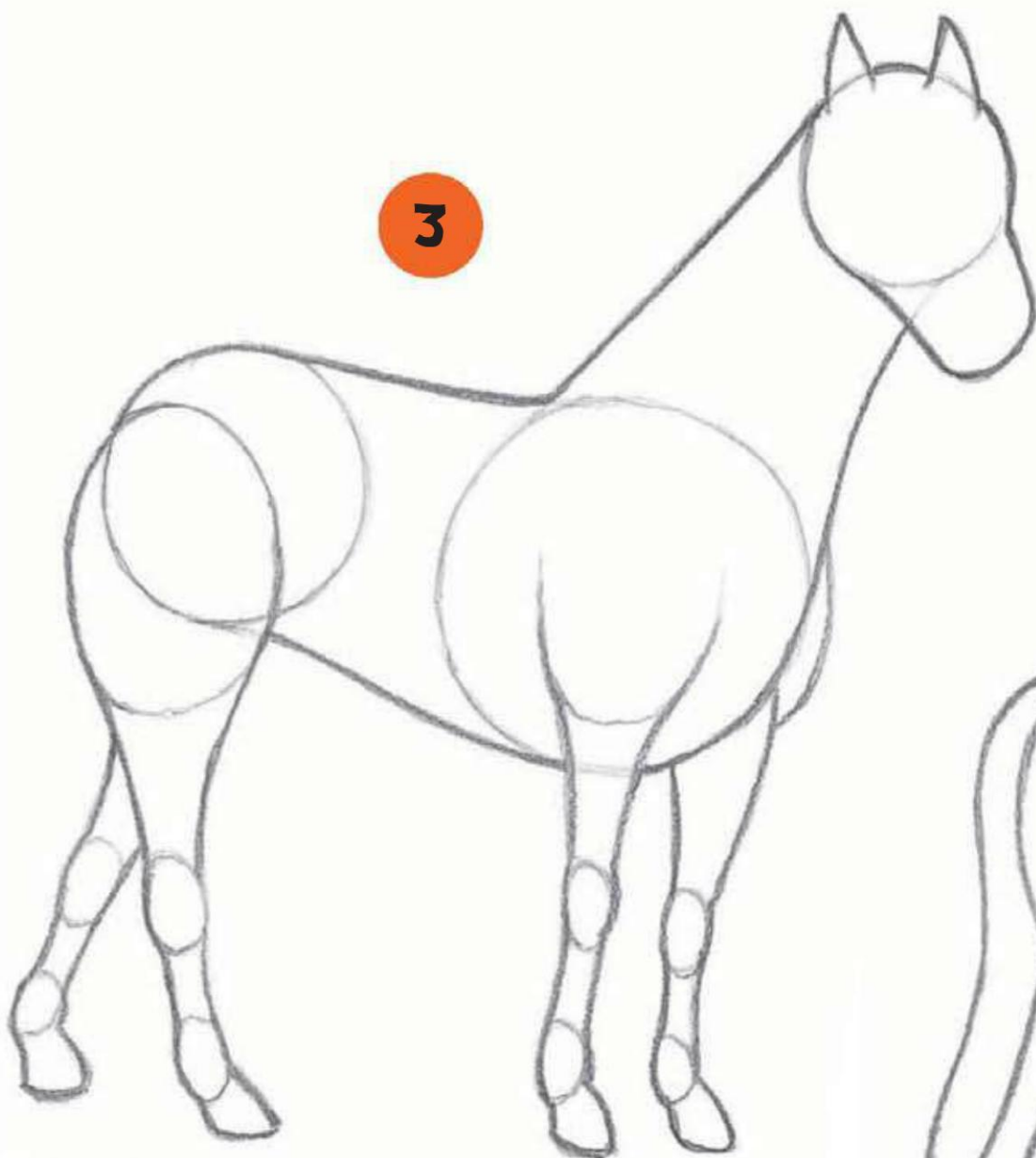
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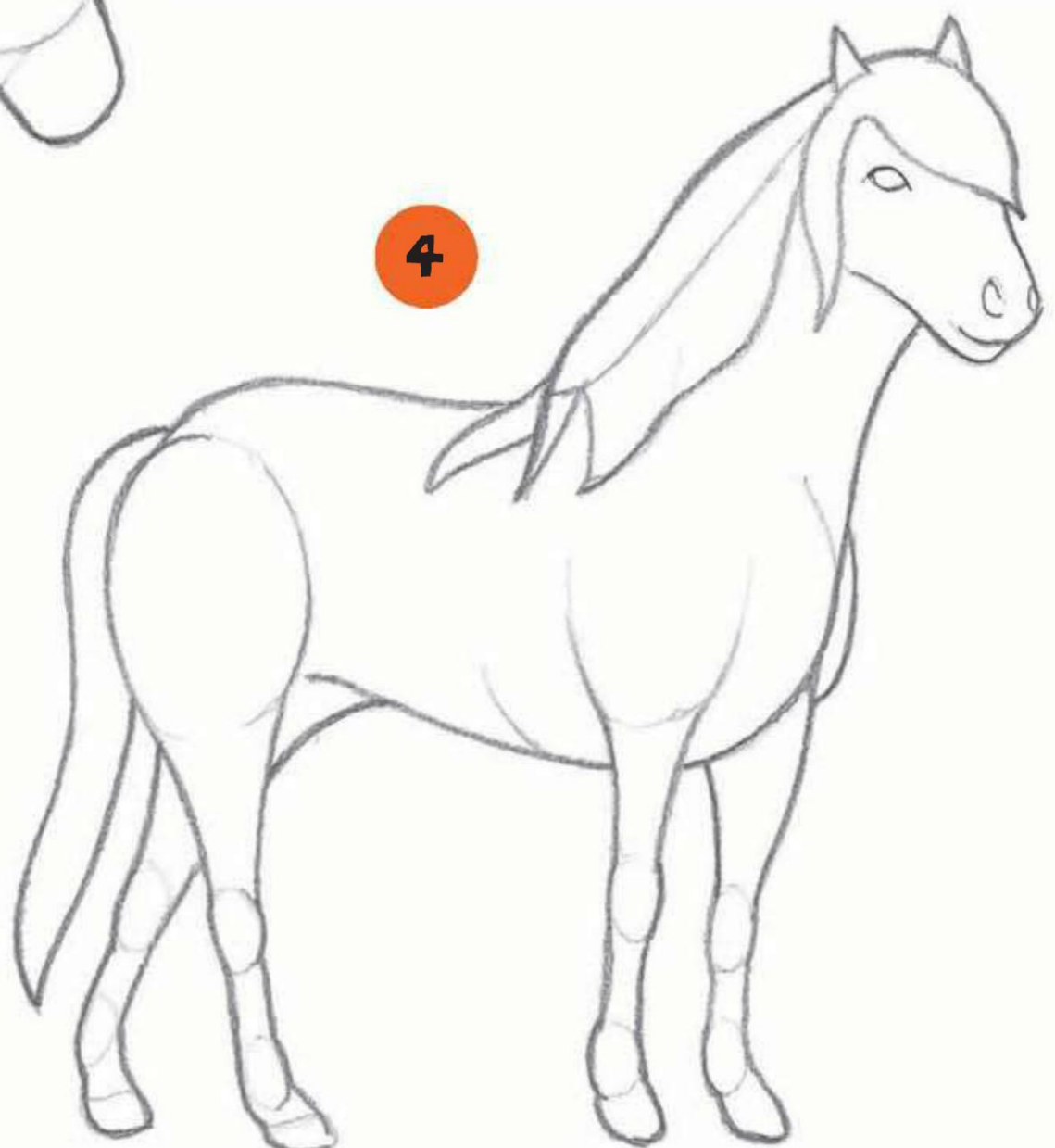
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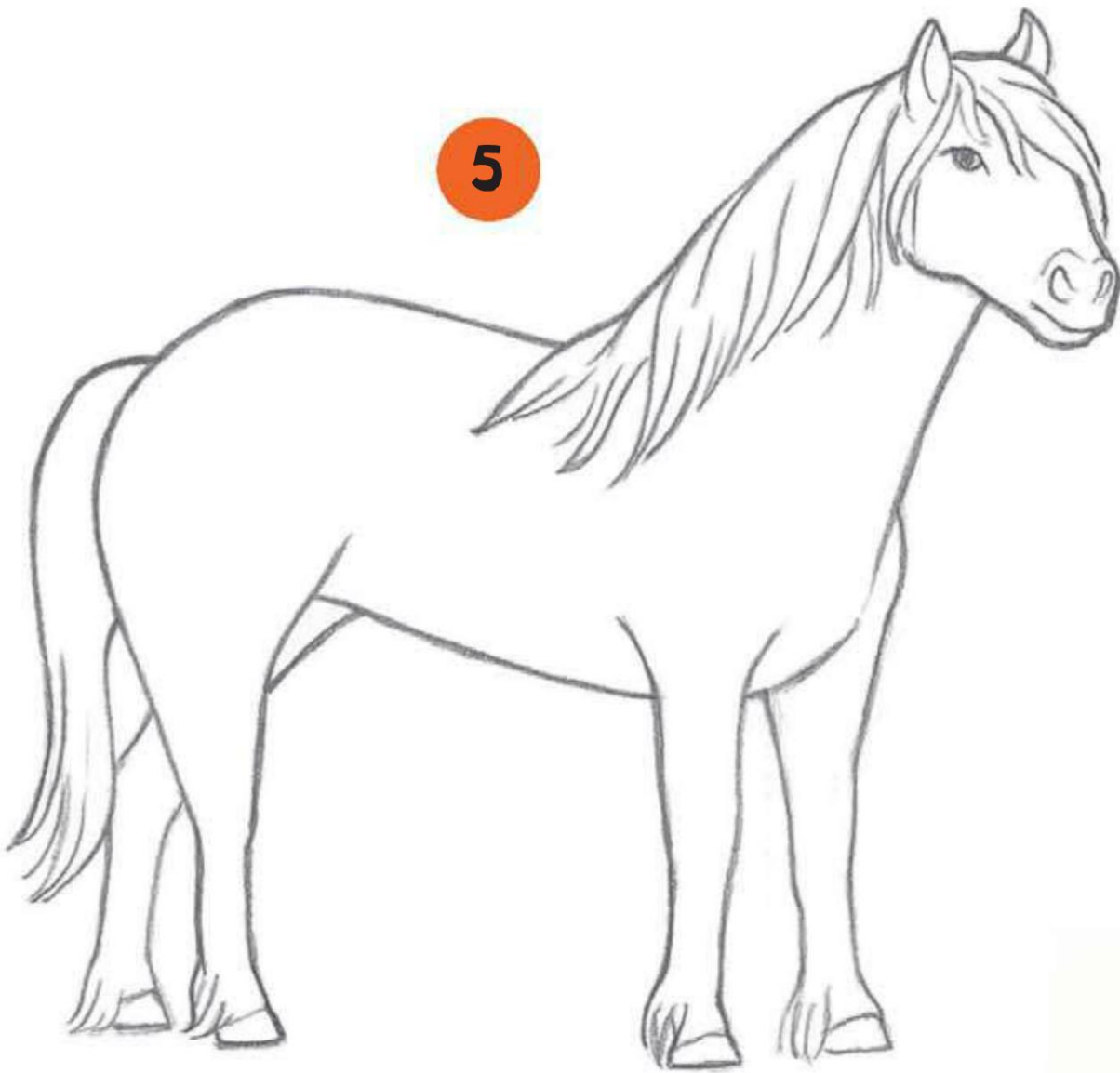
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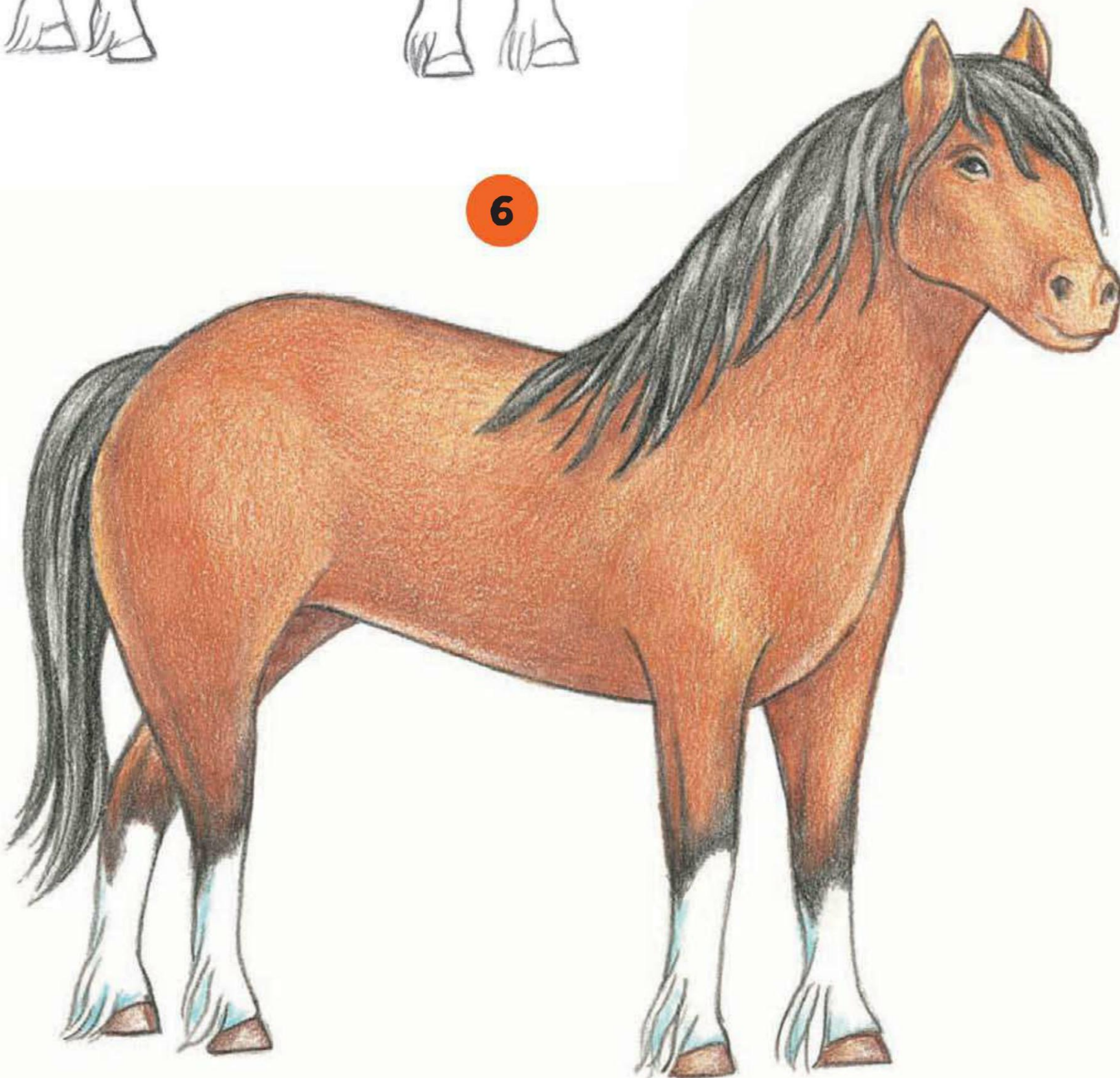
fun fact

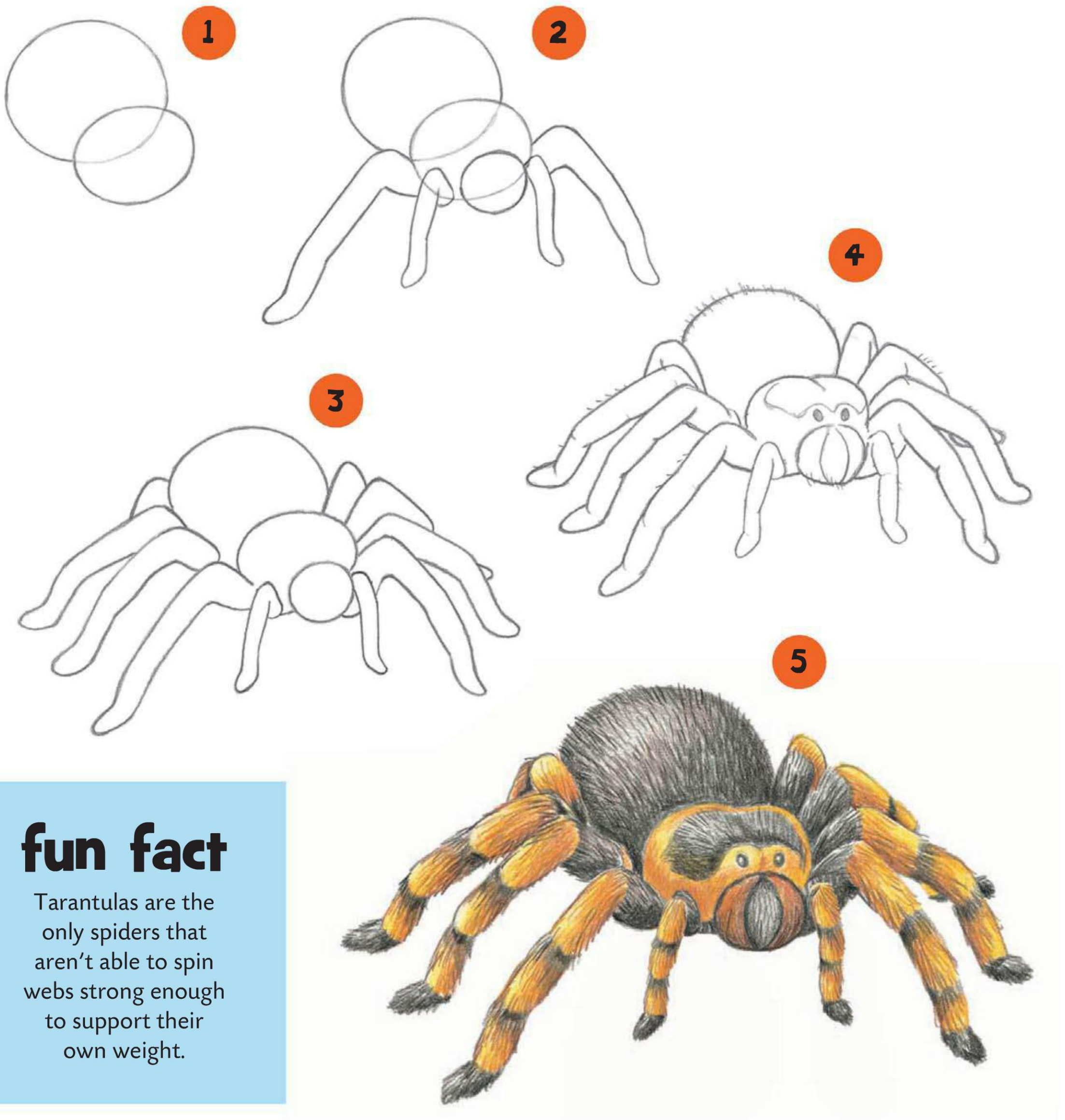

An Arachnid is a different kind of “furry” friend! This spider has eight shaggy legs and two shorter “arms” in front of its body.

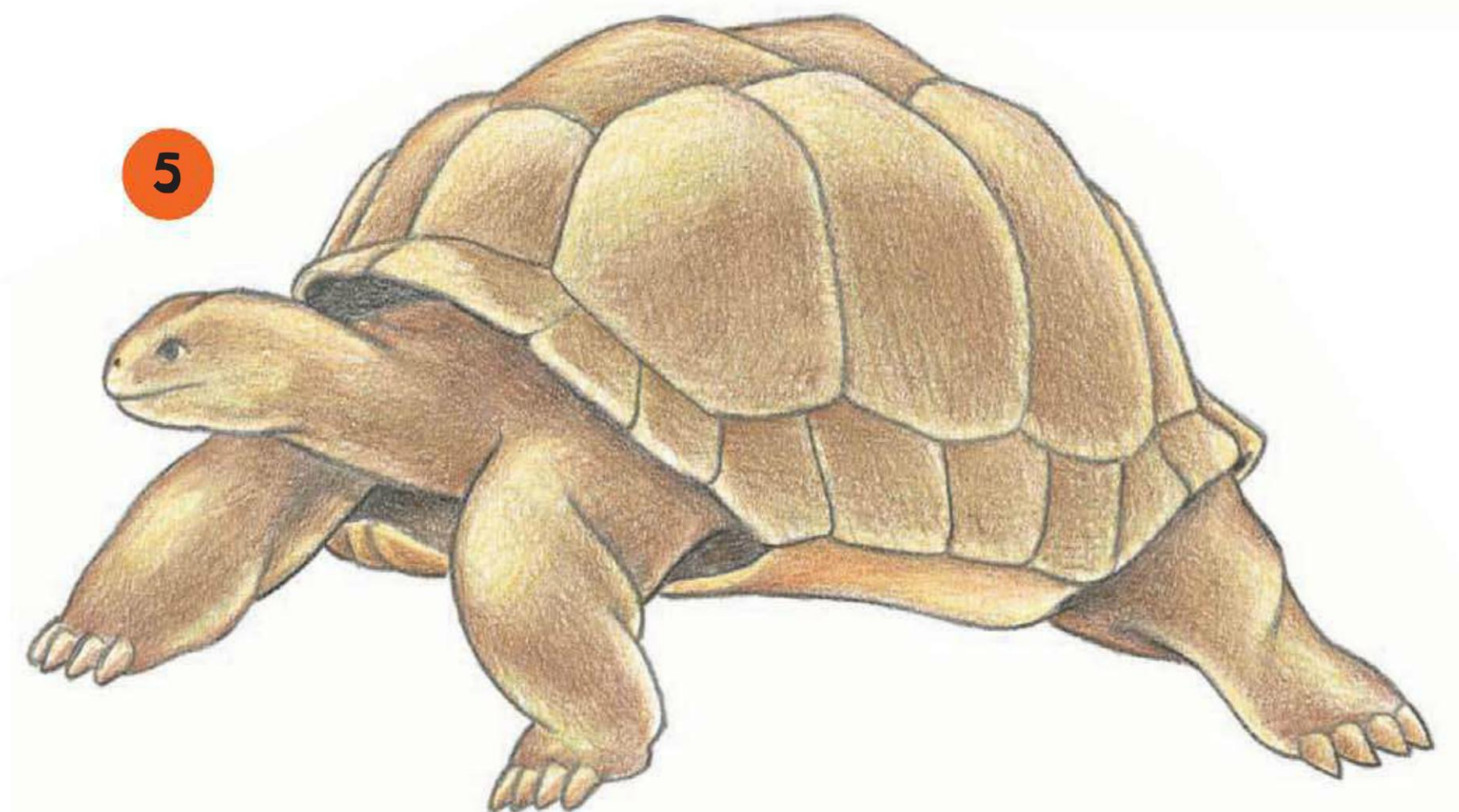
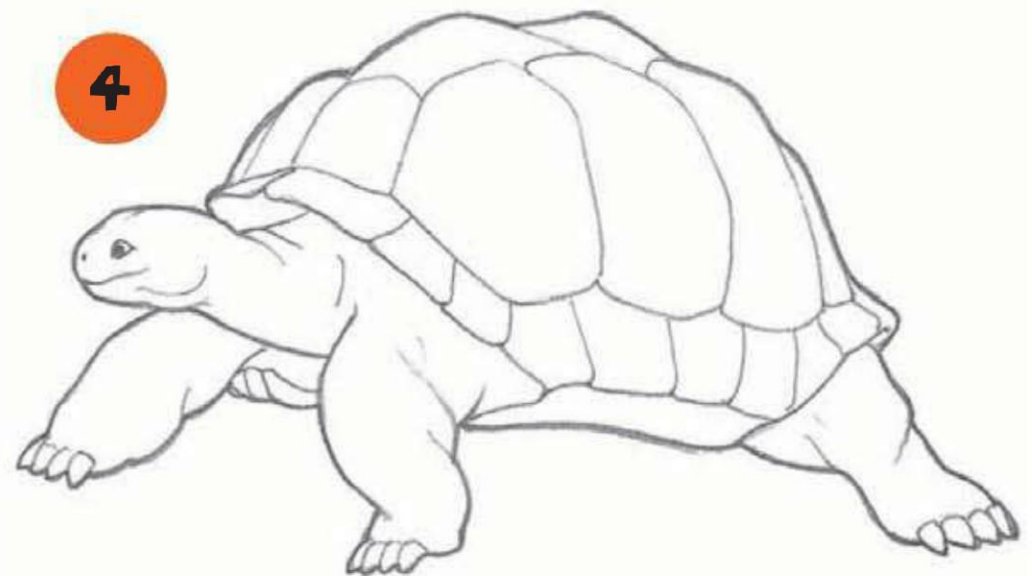
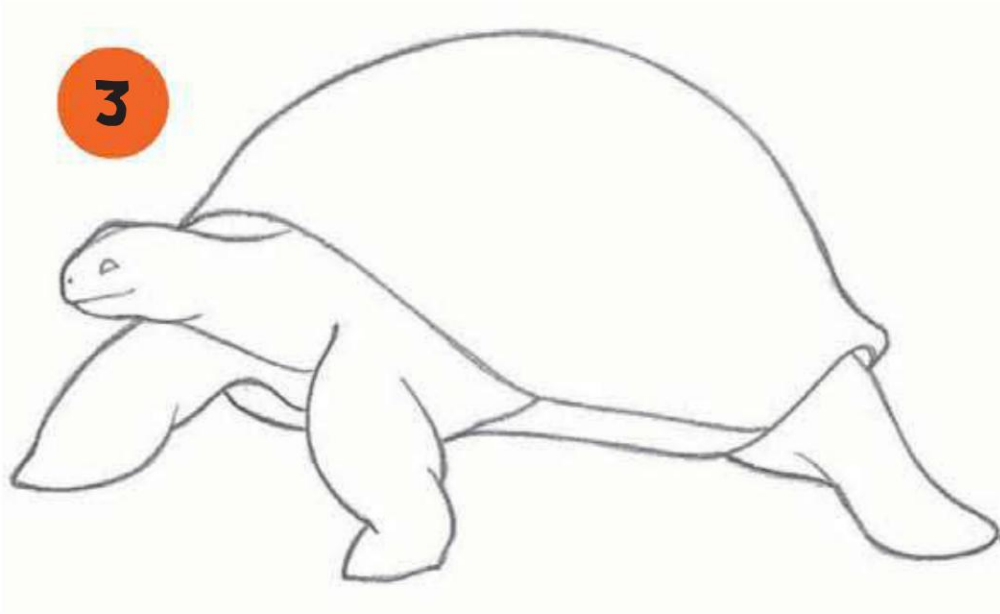
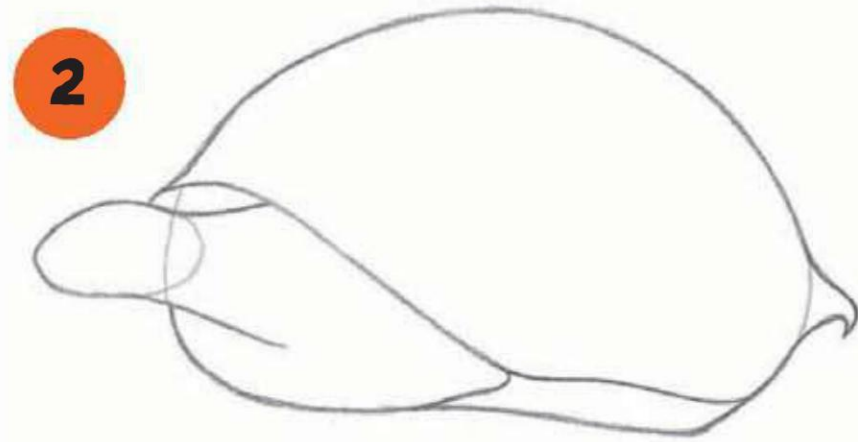
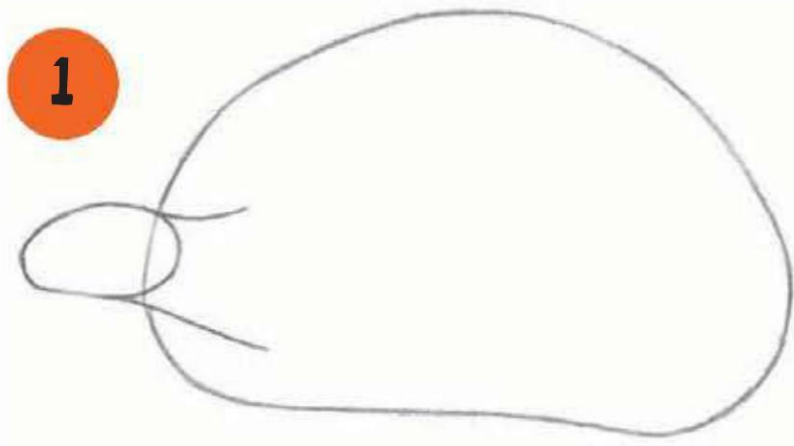

Tarantulas are the only spiders that aren't able to spin webs strong enough to support their own weight.

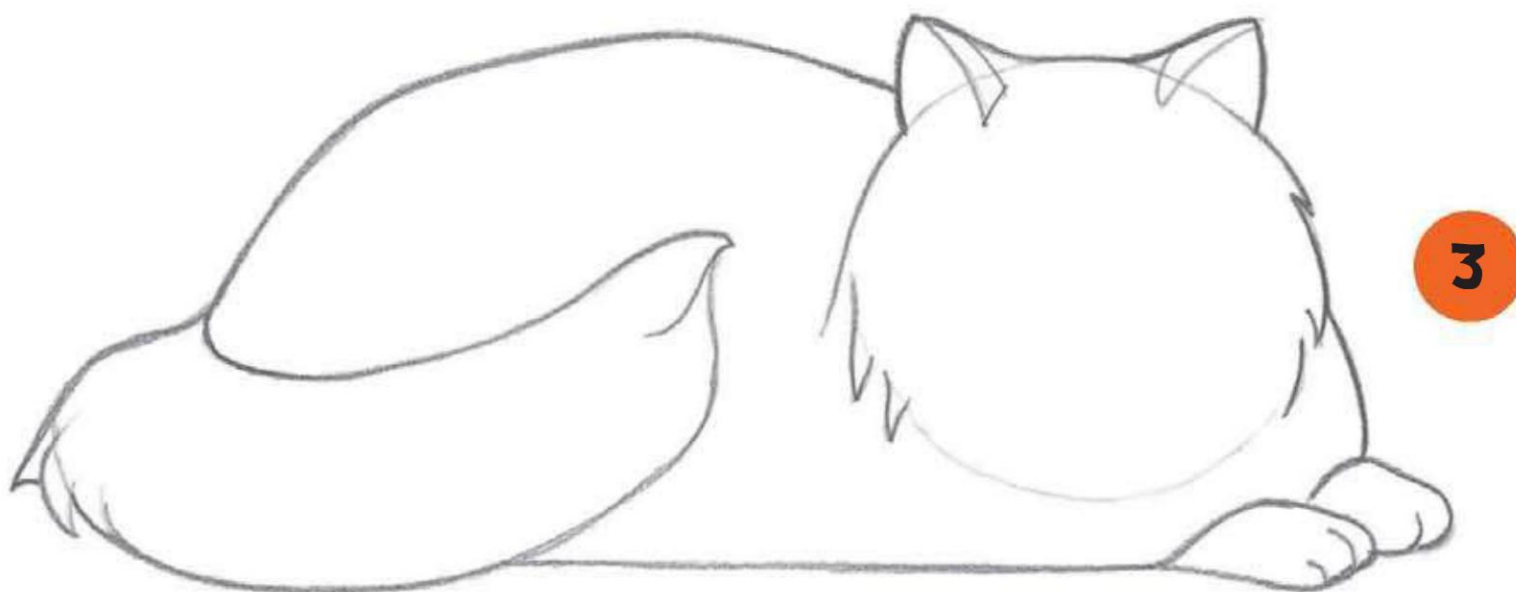
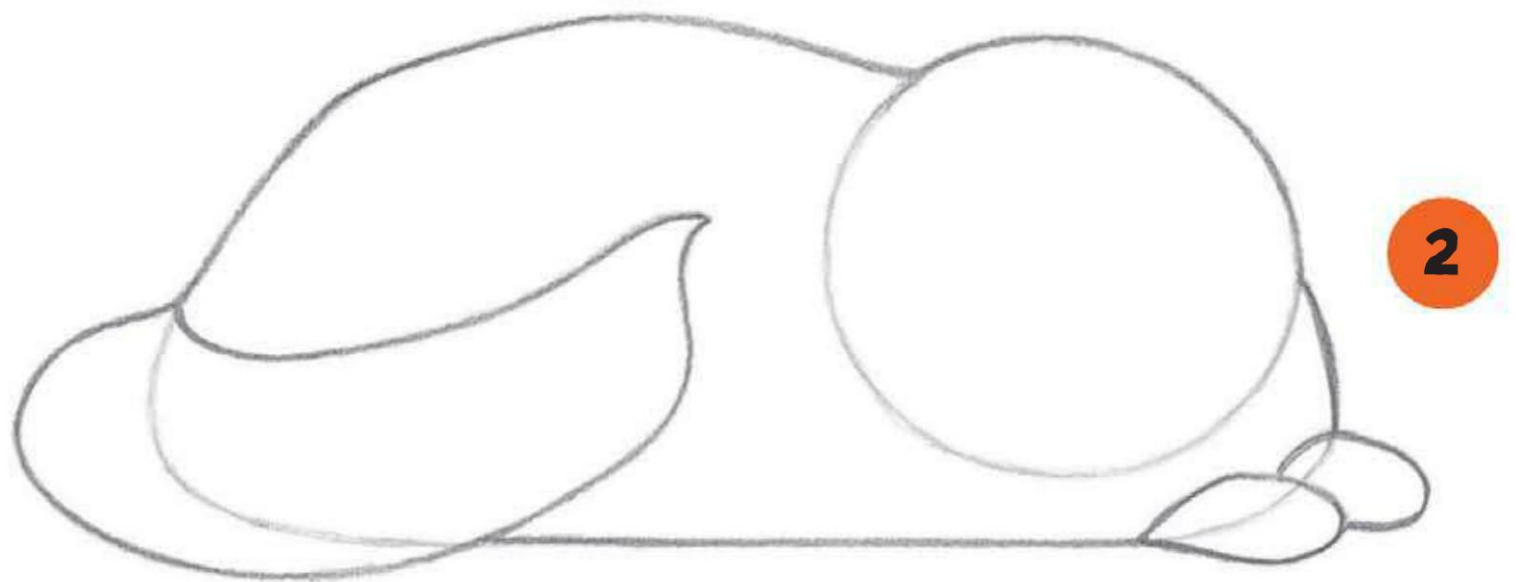
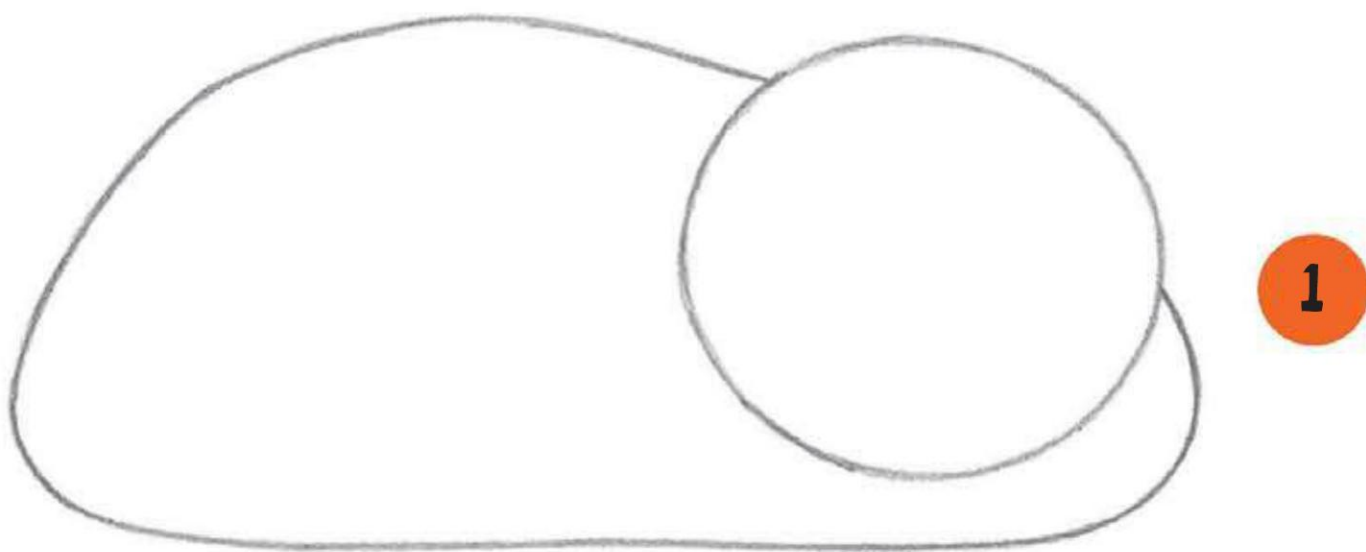
Tortoise

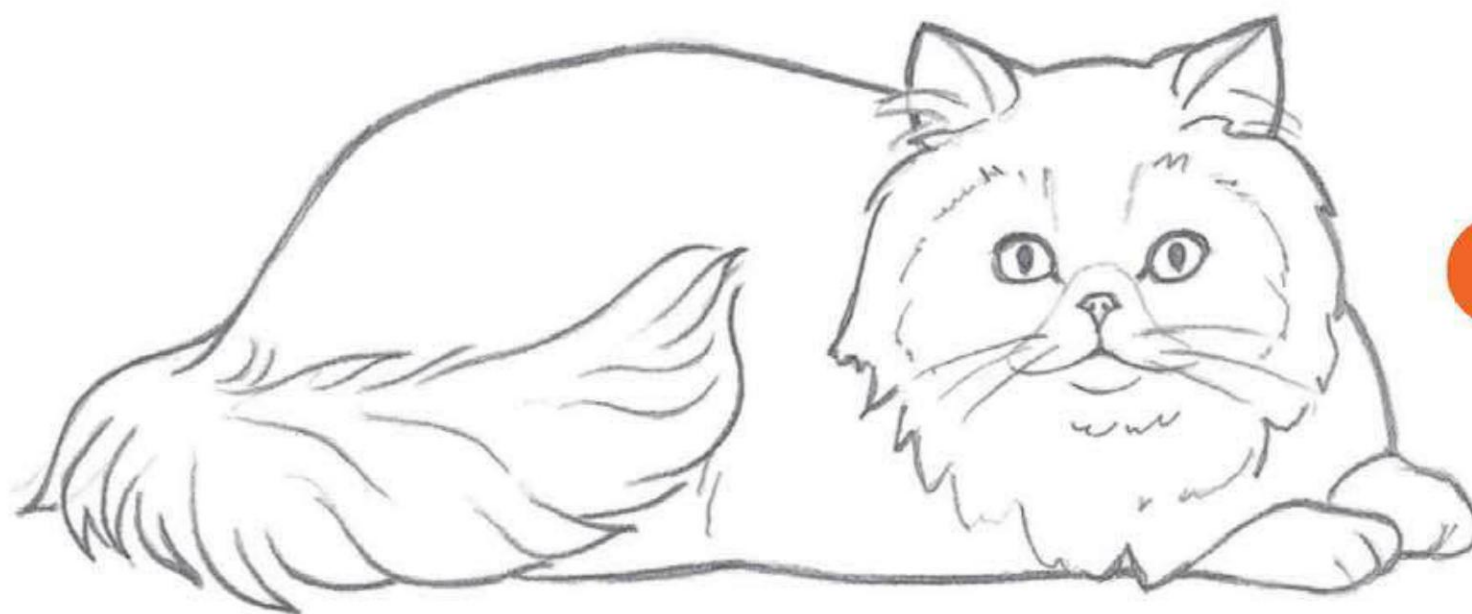
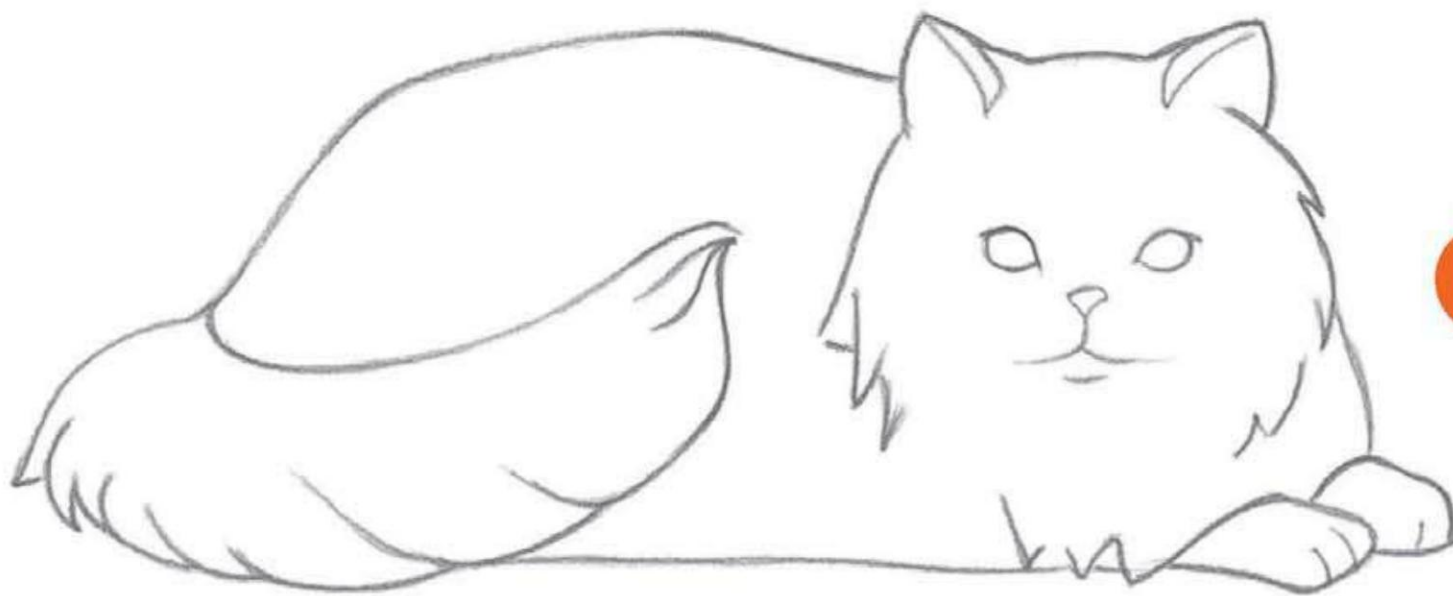
This shell-back moves slowly because it takes its home wherever it goes! Its four thick, strong legs have to work hard.

The “color point” pattern of cats like the one above is determined by heat! Color-point kittens are born light-colored because they are warm inside their mothers. After birth, the cool temperature areas (or points) of the cat darken.

Guinea Pig

This little cowlicked furball is more closely related to a mouse than to a pig. It may be the only pet with permanent “bedhead”!
