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### From Our Editor

A FRIEND WHO'S ABOUT TO renovate her Iowa kitchen e-mailed me questions and mentioned, "I want it all white, I think. Debating some gray." I had to laugh. Though I had surface materials and floor-plan pointers to share, I didn't have much to say about white—neutrals are not my strong suit.

The idea of living with white walls, or white sheets, is alien to me. It's as much a departure, I imagine, as my aubergine living room (at left) would be to my friend. But there you have it: Our comfort levels with color are very personal.

I grew up in a Technicolor Dreamcoat of a house where anything that was white was simply in the queue to be painted. At 13, deep in the throes of teen angst, I chose café au lait for my bedroom walls, probably to peeve my mother. It would be my first and last neutral to date.

Saturated hues make me feel at home. I seldom wear white or black (even my mascara is brown), gravitating toward autumnal colors in my wardrobe and in life. But I recognize the shred of fear in my decisions. To cherry-pick ivory or dove from the vast range of whites is more challenging to me than choosing between moss and lichen. I'm sure there will be a chapter in my domestic life for the confidence of whites. You'll be the first to know when it happens!

And so this Color Issue is our way of coaxing readers out of their color security blankets. Designers are often quoted as saying they consider grass green, sky blue, and even bright red a neutral. It's nonsensical. Or is it? A neutral is a hue that plays nicely with others, one that's as pleasing tomorrow (and next year) as it is today. There's a whole fan deck out there. Why limit yourself to a few pages?

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
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
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


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


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# **A CAPTIVATING CITY SALON**

"I've been called 'the color whisperer,' and as crazy as that sounds, I've always had an innate understanding of how color affects an interior and its inhabitants. I consider color, be it a tonal palette or a Technicolor blast, both my most powerful tool and the foundation of every room I design. I don't believe in hard-and-fast rules; for me, it's an intuitive process, not a scientific one. Once I take in the basic factors and the essence of a space—the size, purpose, and light quality—the right color emerges." —as told to Julia Lewis



**A PRIMARY COLOR** "I'm not often drawn to primary colors, but this sunny living room with lush garden views called for a crisp, simple palette with bold swaths of color—yellow silk curtains and blue velvet sofas—to ground the room."



▲ COSSETING COLOR "Every home needs a cocoon—a cozy retreat from the world. These rooms lend themselves to deep, rich colors, like pea-soup green. The trim is the same glossy hue, so the corners seem to recede."

# UPDATING THE CLASSIC BLUE BEDROOM

"A blue bedroom

can be a bit formulaic, but there is something undeniably comforting about those pale water hues. If you go with blue, think about tonal layers for depth, interest, and a way around cliché. In one bedroom I designed, the periwinkle palette is an interesting assemblage of textures and hues. The walls have a subtle crosshatched pattern, the headboard is tufted linen, and the sconces have shirred-fabric shades. There are floral and geometric prints, plus a fuzzy mohair throw. The blues don't match—and that's the point. Color should be a sensory experience, one with complexity and nuance. It's not a matching game: It's the mix of different tones and textures that makes a room interesting."

# 1. A NOTICE-ME "HEARTH"

"With an open kitchen, the area above the stove is a great spot to splurge. Because it's relatively small, you won't need a ton of tile, so pick something you love, like a hand-painted one or one with an unusual finish. The remainder of the kitchen can be tiled in a less expensive complementary surface material."

# 2. ALL EYES ON THE LIGHTS

"Pendants over the counter or island are a beautiful place for your eye to linger when you're looking into the kitchen. They also act as a decoy, drawing your eye up and away from the clutter! Group three together, and don't be afraid to go big—a large pendant adds balance and drama. Think of it as jewelry for the room!"

# 3. MAKE SPACE FOR LIVING

"In a kitchen with a large open floor plan, valuable living space often goes unused. Turn it into a small sitting spot perfect for people to relax, have drinks, and talk while others are cooking."

# 4. KEEP IT COVERED

"If the thought of seeing a metal refrigerator or dishwasher from the living area feels jarring, choose panelready appliances in the same style and finish as your cabinets. This will make the room feel more appealing and less utilitarian. And put small appliances, like microwaves, below the counter facing away from the open area."

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
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# KITCHEN OF THE MONTH



Since you can look right into the kitchen from the front door of this 1909 Beaux Arts townhouse, it had to live up to its surroundings. "White never came into my head," says designer Christopher Peacock. "It was more about dark, masculine colors." He envisioned a handsome room with period-appropriate details and a few surprises—like the slab of raw wood that seems to grow out of the island. —Christine Pittel

**BRASS HARDWARE** "Satin brass is not shiny. It's soft and warm," Peacock says. He likes the way it looks against Farrow & Ball's Tanner's Brown paint on the traditional raised-panel cabinetry from his Lambourne collection. The dark color adds a sense of age to the room and sets up a striking contrast to light countertops in Silestone's Lyra, veined with black and brown.

# PLAID BACKSPLASH

When Peacock walked into the AKDO tile showroom and saw their new Balmoral Plaid pattern, he immediately thought of a classic Burberry raincoat. It fit right in with the tailored look he was after; he set it on a diagonal for more energy. "Initially I was going to use it everywhere, but then I decided it would have more impact as a focal point over the Dacor range."

# RAW WOOD

"An island can look like a monolithic block unless you do something to make it interesting," Peacock says. He found a gorgeous chunk of English wych elm at Grothouse Lumber and used it to anchor the seating area, keeping the live edge as a reminder of the garden outside. A bit of leftover wood was turned into six drawer-fronts, flanking the range.

# 4 OVERSCALE LIGHTS

Peacock chose the Marlowe lanterns from Remains Lighting because they were big and geometric, which suits the large room. "And you can see right through them, so they don't block the view." The brass framework echoes the brass hardware. "I want all the elements to be harmonious," Peacock says. "But nothing should dominate. I always try to balance a room.'

### **INGREDIENTS**

- 6 ripe medium to large Creole or other in-season tomatoes Salt
- ½ cup mayonnaise
- 1 sprig fresh basil, 6 small leaves reserved for garnish and the rest finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 2 cups jumbo lump crabmeat, picked over
  - Basic Creole Spices (for recipe, go to housebeautiful .com/creole)
- 3-6 chive or garlic chive blossoms for garnish, optional
- 1. To peel the tomatoes, bring a medium pot of water to a boil over high heat. Core the tomatoes, then score the bottoms by making a small X. Blanch 3 tomatoes at a time for exactly 5 seconds per batch, moving them around with a pair of tongs or a slotted spoon. Transfer the tomatoes cored-side down to paper towels to let drain and cool briefly, then peel off skin and discard.
- 2. Using a teaspoon and starting at the core, carefully scoop out the center of each tomato, creating a bowl. Cut the bottom thirds off and set aside (you'll use them as lids to top the tomatoes). Season tomatoes with a little salt.
- 3. Mix the mayonnaise, chopped basil, lemon juice, and mustard together in a medium bowl. Add the crab, stirring gently so as not to break up the meat. Season the crab salad with Basic Creole Spices and salt. Stuff the tomatoes with the crab salad and garnish each with a basil leaf and chive blossoms, if using. Set a tomato lid on top of each one.

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

# High Style


An attic is transformed into an airy retreat featuring a glamorous tub built for two.

"THE FIRST THING we shopped for was that tub," says Chicagobased designer Julia Buckingham. "It's the crown jewel." Made of solid copper with nickel plating, it tends to maintain heat, "so by the time you fill it up, it hasn't already cooled down." And the graceful slipper shape seemed perfect for this elegant Victorian house in northwest Iowa.

Originally the owners were going to add a master suite, but then they looked up and realized that the third-floor attic, with its peaked roof and exposed beams, presented an unused opportunity. Buckingham enlarged the windows and painted everything in Benjamin Moore's Chantilly Lace—"dead center between an off-white and a blue-white," she says. "It's the most beautiful backdrop because it feels like a color and not as though you just didn't want to deal with it."

A "rug" made out of tile balances the tub, "and you'll never need to dry-clean it." Instead of the usual crystal chandelier, Buckingham found a fixture draped with chains. "This is farm country, and it seemed more rustic and down to earth." Lavender towels were the finishing touch. "They bring a sophisticated femininity to the space and remind me of the wildflowers outside." —Christine Pittel

LISA CREGAN: It looks like your clients have set up house in the world's most luxuriant crayon box.

CATHERINE BROWN PATERSON: I literally had to prep my upholstery workroom! I handed everybody sunglasses and said, "Get ready, because this is going to be a crazy ride." The more concentrated the shade, the more comfortable my clients are with it; the wife even

wears dresses in the saturated fuchsia we used in the dining room. But I've never lived or worked with this much color in my entire life. I was mandated a lemon-yellow kitchen, a tangerine office, a turquoise bedroom—and all this in a 1930s house! It pushed me way out of my comfort zone. Did you ever worry it might end up looking like some disjointed decorator showhouse? I had a moment of inspiration. This couple—with four children under the age of 12—love chinoiserie. They've been to China a number of times and brought back antiques. I realized I could play on that and use a Chinese Chippendale fretwork design to hold the house together. It's on the edge of the living room curtains, the dining room rug, the master bedroom headboard, the office ottoman, the kitchen stools. You keep coming back to it, which creates continuity. Plus, there are pagodas, foo dogs, Chinese stools, and bamboo. Hollywood Regency

style was my inspiration—the way Billy Haines masterfully used gilt, reflection, and hints of the Far East in his rooms. Billy Haines was fearless, but even he might not have been brave enough for these electric dining room curtains.

After we picked the flowering-quince wallpaper and the fuchsia chairs, the wife insisted we get even *more* pink into the room! I was struggling. Then I ran into Chris Hyland, who has a wonderful collection of textiles, and told him about my dilemma. He said, "I have something that will make you happy." He pulled out this swatch of silk faille with an incredible feel, luscious and heavy, as weighty as a wedding

dress. We put it against the wallpaper sample and I nearly died. It's amazing. The curtains don't match any of the pinks in the paper, but the combination is so incredibly sexy and radiant.

This living room definitively takes the preppy out of pink-and-green.

It's an octagonal room, and it's what sold my clients on the house. They both went to

the University of Virginia, with all that Thomas Jefferson Palladian architecture, and they immediately fell for the place. We highlighted the room's contoured walls, which had been finished in an acid-green basket-weave glaze by a previous owner, by applying a glossy sealer for glamour. The zebra-print settees look handsome in

here—chocolate brown and green are great together—but it's the bright pink armchairs that make the wife happy. As for me, I love that those striped chairs aren't a matched pair. One was inherited and the other is from a vintage store—they help the room feel personal, less like a showroom. Was it hard to work in a style so different from your own?

Before interior design, I worked for a decade in fashion—for Ralph Lauren and then for Hermès. Both of those companies are about *l'art de vivre*, about creating a lifestyle. If my clients have color in their inner selves. I can help them let it out! I mean, look at the wife's office. She showed me a Pucci scarf and said. "These are the colors I want." I thought, Oh my Lord. I mean, I love her, we're good friends. But even the upholsterer couldn't believe we were covering the sofa in an orange zebra print. I'd originally chosen a cantaloupe color for the grass-cloth walls, but she dialed it up to tangerine—and then asked for a saturated blue for the master bedroom next door. Then I realized I could think of it like putting an Hermès box next to a Tiffany box, and that became my point of reference. Despite its intense color, the bedroom is somehow soothing. We kept it tonal—just blues and cream—because the

Chinese dragon fabric I used for the curtains is dramatic enough. The room has at least 12 shades of blue, from Wedgwood to pale aqua to teal, and we didn't match the wall color to any of them! We used the wife's favorite shade of aqua instead. The curtain pediments are an ode to Elsie de Wolfe, but in linen, not silk, so they're casual. And the ceiling, which is like a tent because this is another octagonal room, is a few shades lighter than the walls. So there's at least some softness—but only when you look up! How did you feel after you'd installed the last of these spirited colors?

I thought, What did I just do? I think I reinvented the color wheel!

## CHRISTINE PITTEL: Wow! That red paint in the library looks as if it could keep you warm all by itself on a cold winter's day.

RAMSAY GOURD: It's definitely a bright, gutsy color. Vermont's a great state, but we do have these long, cold winters, and red has a psychological warmth that's really important. This is a simple, mid-18th-century Greek Revival farmhouse that my clients use as their country home. Even its setting, down a bucolic dirt road and overlooking a pond and the mountains, is quintessential Vermont. The ceilings are low and the rooms are small because that made sense when the only source of heat was a fire in the fireplace.

### So red is like a virtual heater, making a small room feel even more cozy.

And more fun. But I can't take credit for the idea. The owners came to me and said, "We want to do a red toile library," so I went to the Boston Design Center and pulled every toile I could lay my hands on. Then I spread them out and said, "We can work with any of these. But at the end of the day, it's going to look like your grandmother's bedroom." That's when I suggested that I design a fabric for them.

### Now that's custom. What did you come up with? I see a tree....

A big maple tree, and then all the farm animals—horses, cows, pigs, ducks—that you would see on your way from the village to the house. I even managed to hide their monograms in the pattern. The fabric walks the line between a toile and an ikat, and then we played with the color. It's got a little bit of orange to it, just like the paint. I wanted to push them away from a more predictable red.

## And right into high-gloss, candy apple-red walls. Was that a hard sell?

No, they took a huge leap of faith and even went for the lacquer. It's such a gorgeous, tactile finish, like wet nail polish. You walk in and you're immersed in color, then right next to it is a quiet, peaceful guest room—all cool whites and uncurtained windows. I think a house should have different rooms for different moods. Sometimes you want to feel refreshed, and sometimes you want to be embraced. The library is the jewel box. It's design hyperbole.

#### And the excitement extends to the ceiling.

I thought about continuing the red lacquer up there and decided it might be too much. But a white ceiling is pretty banal, plus it wouldn't give you the warmth. So I suggested a lattice wallpaper, and one of the clients put it up as a surprise for the other at Christmas. Luckily, they both liked it a lot.

#### The living room has a neutral backdrop, but then that chartreuse on the sofa and chairs livens it up. Where did that come from?

Well, those knockoff Louis XV chairs had such an awful finish that I thought we might as well paint them and have some fun. Chartreuse is not completely foreign to the context. If you look out the windows in springtime, you'll see that color in the ferns popping up. The sofa is more of a grass green, in wide-wale corduroy—a great fabric that's very practical when you have a dirt road, a dog, and a cat. Then we added royal blue, pulled out of the Persian rug, and the suzani print brings the whole palette together.

#### It's like a balancing act. The royal blue and the chartreuse have equal weight, so they temper each other.

And that contrast of color and texture—glossy green chairs, deep blue upholstery, scratch-plaster walls, a plush tufted ottoman—makes the room feel alive. Then you want to integrate objects that are emotionally important into the design to give it depth and meaning. A grandmother's report cards from 1920 were framed and hung between the living room windows.

#### Was she a good student?

Moderate.

## How would you describe the mood in the living room?

Intimate and inviting. Then, in the dining room, the design becomes more spare. A plain pine table is paired with a casual assortment of chairs. A spectacular framed kimono is the only decoration. We didn't even hang a chandelier over the table because we didn't want anything to compete with the view.

## It gets very cozy again in that little room with the orange wing chair.


That's an extension we built off the kitchen to make it more of a gathering place. Now guests have a comfortable spot to sit, and whoever's cooking can enjoy the fire. It's got the same low ceiling as the rest of the house. We never tried to make the ceilings feel higher with vertically striped wallpaper or anything else. I think people have a tendency to homogenize spaces, but the clients fell in love with this particular house. We wanted to keep what made it special.

## WARM EMBRACE

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#### DOUGLAS BRENNER: It's nice to see a whiteglove Park Avenue duplex that's so warm and inviting.

BRUCE SHOSTAK: On our first visit here, we found just the sort of old-school showplace you would expect. The entry was glacial, with a polished marble floor, French furniture, and white walls hung with gilt mirrors and Old Masters-type paintings. The rooms beyond had strict formal arrangements of European antiques and Coromandel screens, chintz and toile, swags and jabots. Beautifully done, but inappropriate for a young couple in jeans, with two little girls and a rambunctious bulldog.

#### Is there a backstory to this stylistic mismatch?

They basically swapped apartments with the wife's parents, who, after living here for years, wanted a smaller pied-à-terre in Manhattan. Our directive was a total change from stuffy tradition to relaxed, comfortable, uncluttered modernitythough we still had to preserve architectural details that two generations of the family felt attached to. For a fresh start, nearly everything went to auction, and the clients encouraged us to have fun with color. They travel everywhere, and their images of Mexican tiles and tropical buildings inspired our palette.

#### The entry wallpaper practically smolders.

It's a persimmon-colored grass cloth that's happy and welcoming. The sheen of the natural-fiber weave adds depth and sparkle. We wanted every room to have textures that feel organic, that say, "Please touch!" The stone floor has a honed finish with a bluish undertone, so the entry is warm and cool at the same time. Whether it is hot or chilly outside, you walk into someplace cozy and inviting. This is more than a hall—it's the heart of the apartment. The girls ride their scooters here, and the dog flops down on the banquette. We covered it—and furniture in other rooms—with indoor-outdoor fabric.

#### "Organic" and "child-friendly" don't usually spring to mind amid plasterwork like this.

Classical architecture is based on columns made of tree trunks and leaves, garlands of flowers and bundles of reeds, and we simply went back to the source. My colleague Janie Myers and I decided to respond to these "statement" ceilings, rather than pretend to ignore them and paint everything white. We're big fans of the ceilings and carpets that Robert Adam designed

to reflect one another, making a cohesive environment. But we've done this in a contemporary way. Using an airy color on the walls lets the ceiling float into the architecture, as opposed to standing out. And informal seating arrangements make every generation feel at home.

#### Would you say that the dining room strikes a dramatically different tone?

The previous decorator had highlighted the layers of moldings with various shades of pale blue and green for a dazzling, somewhat dizzying effect. Janie, who loves the brilliantly colored historic dining rooms at Boscobel and Monticello, suggested painting everything in this high-gloss blue. With a single color, you get sculptural richness. In sunlight, the gloss finish is surprisingly cheerful, perfect for balloon-filled birthday parties. By night, it's a handsome backdrop for grown-up dinners.

#### Was the starburst pendant conceived as a conversation piece?

It has the physical presence of a classic chandelier, especially in this symmetrical layout, and it relates to the neoclassical ceiling medallion and mantelpiece without looking staid. We think of it as a solar system orbiting above the table. The rug reminds us of van Gogh's Starry Night. When we started out showing the clients designs that were more rectilinear, they were indecisive. They really responded as soon as we broke that code with dotted lines, circles, and meandering curves like those on the rug and the paisley curtains. They must be over the moon with the mega-

## paisley powder room.

This tiny room had been upholstered and tented in a document stripe à la Malmaison—not quite appropriate for playdate visitors. Now it's a magical trip to India. Though the big print might seem like a wild card, we've repeated similar flower and bird motifs throughout the apartment. What prompted you to do a knotty pine playroom?

#### It felt like a TV design challenge. This had been the wife's father's library, his pride and joy, and we were asked to work around the wood. No painting. So the walls became a supporting player to the hot pink, raspberry, and turquoise, and the bold patterns of textiles. On a busy day, you can't tell where the girly-colored toys end and the

Roman shades begin. But even the patri-

arch, we think, is pleased.







## **ALICE GORDON:** This house suggests that you start a project by asking yourself how much fun you can have.

PALMER WEISS: You know, after five seconds on the phone with this client, who's originally from Texas, I could tell she was superfunky and funny. Right off the bat she said, "I love color! I want to have fun!" It's exciting to learn that's how things will go. She left a lot of the choices to me. I should make a book of her e-mail responses to whatever I ran by her: She had so many ways to tell me that she liked things.

#### For example?

Well, once I proposed doing orange trim on a blue pillow, and she wrote back, "Pipe it like it's hot!" Or she would play like Inspector Gadget and write, "Go, Gadget, go!"—not just about a gadget but about almost anything. Durability and family were the overarching themes—she and her husband have two kids and two dogs. Most of the time I showed her one thing, and we went ahead and bought it.

## The colors look straight out of a gelato shop—banana, blueberry, lemon, lime, watermelon, mango, what else? How do you make them all work well together in one house?

It's intuitive and comfortable for me. That said, a common question I get from clients is, "How are you going to deal with this flow of color and pattern?" It's true, when you're working on large houses such as this one, you don't have to worry so much about it. The thread through rooms is often spun by complementary colors or hints from the previous room. If it all looks good when I lay out the swatches on the sea of sisal carpet in my office, I know it's going to work. How did you arrive at the astonishing green walls in the dining room?

It took 20 people practically living there, painting and sanding and wiping down dust, then doing it over and over again until the walls were like green mirrors. The color came from the curtain fabric. My mom [Charleston, South Carolina, designer Kathleen Rivers] likes to build a room around an antique rug, but for me, the launching pad is usually a fabric. This one walks the line between old-school bargello and modern. The client is young, and she didn't bat an eye when I suggested lacquered green walls and bright yellow chairs. We wanted to balance the formality of tradition with the fresher, more relaxed approach appropriate for California.

One thing that drove this house was the practicality of living with two small children. Trampoline parties on the sofa stretch the limits. This is the media room, too, so going dark allowed it to be both kid-proof and cozy. You see blue water and blue sky out the bay window. I love playing with different saturation levels of the same color. Blue has so much depth. With red you can quickly get too orange or pink, but with blue you can turn the dial 45 times and it will still be blue. For a shocking contrast, the orange pillow and trim could have been yellow or any warm color. I didn't want to go overboard, just play a little bit. There's more orange across the hall, in the Prozac room.

#### The Prozac room? Please explain!

That's what we call the sunroom. It opens onto the roof deck, which, by the way, is never used because the temperature rarely rises above 60 degrees. I warned my client that she didn't know what she was getting into by moving to San Francisco. I love this city, but the fog is a drag, and I've spent the last 13 years trying to dispel the gloom through design. This is the only room she

ever shot me down on. At first the palette was going to be black and yellow—shades of black and yellow, not bumblebee. But when I showed her my idea, she said, "No. You sold me on Prozac, and I want the Prozac."

# The husband's more muted study seems calming in a completely different way. Does he go there to disappear?

No, he'll shut the door to be on the phone, but when it's open the kids will come in and work at their teeny schoolhouse table while he sits at the computer or hangs out with them. The study sofa is a pullout, and a daybed in

the massive bay window is big enough to sleep two kids. There's not a ton of guest space in San Francisco.

You've said you picked up interior design from your mother "by osmosis," but studying art and your own life experiences must have sent you down your own path. Do you have a best lesson from her? Has your work informed hers?

My greatest achievement in life was when my mom started calling me to ask design questions. If you lined up our work side by side, you wouldn't know we were in the same family. She's a classicist at heart and works mostly with earth tones. I use more color. Our house was meant to be lived in, so I learned accessibility from her. She loves working with crafts- and tradespeople, and it's my favorite part of the job too. Even now, visiting studios is like walking into Narnia. One important, counterintuitive thing my mother taught me is that decoration is exhausting. It's wonderful, but the temptation is to poop out at the 25th mile. My mom won't let you go home until your hands are bleeding from hanging pictures. You can work on a project for two years, but you're only as good as the last picture you hang.

DAVID A. KEEPS: This living room has shades of dusty rose and lilac, along with sage and rust. Why such throwback colors? NATHAN TURNER: My clients are in their early 30s with a five-yearold daughter, so these old hues feel new to them, and as a child of the 1980s, I remember these colors fondly. I'm also a big lover of "old lady" style. My favorite thing is using granny chintz in an updated way, so the palette of the living room spun out of the colors in the Rosa Bernal floral fabric I chose for the curtains and chairs. Bright colors that pop tend to wear on you after a while; these are muted but not blah. like so many of the 1980s colors. They have depth, clarity, and light, like watercolors, which makes them more sophis-

The wife's study, however, is a lesson in the power of color. Do you call that shade shocking purple?

I call it French lavender, like French blue, because it has so much gray in it. The room has a beautiful bay-window seat, so I wanted it to be a happy place to sit and read. But at the same time, on a cloudy day you don't want a color that's so cheery, it's obnoxious. I wanted a lavender that you might find on vintage cosmetics if you were rummaging through a 1940s dresser. The walls have layers of gray strié, so it looks like they were painted bright lavender 100 years ago and someone has been chainsmoking in the room ever since. What's the real history of the house?

What's the real history of the house?
It's a Bel Air Hollywood Regency home from the late 1930s—before people went bonkers building big houses—and it has an old-fashioned layout: a step-down living room, a small kitchen, and a large dining room with French doors opening to the garden. It feels like a setting for a 1950s Slim Aarons

photograph, and although my client is a super-fashionable girl, she has that same ladylike spirit.

So would you call a green dining room traditional with a twist?

I used a de Gournay paper, which satisfies the classic vibe but is more frequently seen in blues and grays. This pattern features lily pads and lotus flowers in an almost acid green that complements the colors of the garden outside, so it all feels like one space. The wallpaper was traditional; hanging a Damien Hirst on it makes it modern.

Why does the color blue play such a large role in this house?

Blue lifts your mood. In the powder room, the walls are a bright robin's-egg hue with trelliswork in a bluish gray, and it has no function other than to look like an exotic Auntie Mame room. In the daughter's bedroom, the blue floral wallpaper and upholstered twin headboards conjure an old-fashioned storybook setting and are a great backdrop for a dresser painted canary yellow. It's a room that can grow up with her. Blue is such a happy, serene color.

Is that a California design mantra? I'm a fourth-generation native, and certain preppy California things are part of my aesthetic: wicker, rope, navy, and the color of sand. In the upstairs family room, everything—the walls. the trim, the carpet, the window seat, the sofa—is blue or beige, which feels so cozy and casual. And of course there are stripes. I've never met a stripe I didn't like; they're great sidekicks to solids and patterns. In the guest room, pattern dominates and turquoise lamps are the accent. What was the

This is the closest I will ever get to a beige room. I fell in love with these Muriel Brandolini fabrics that have slightly metallic prints—not silver and gold, but more bronze or pewter or the

lustrous colors you see in seashells. They go so well with the antique European furniture. And the blue keeps the space from being boring. When it comes to turquoise, I like the color of the gemstone and Turkish turquoise, as opposed to Palm Springs turquoise.

strategy?

How do you manage to pull off so many patterns in one space?

Because all the fabrics were in the same tones, I just kept adding, and nothing offended the others. The secret to mixing prints is getting the palette right. I don't think the scale of a print matters, but the density of the pattern does. An intricate pattern on a headboard is fine, but if you're upholstering walls, the pattern needs breathing room.

You're crazy for padded rooms, aren't you? I will remind everyone that I'm a child of the '8os, but that doesn't mean I want puffy walls with batting under the fabric. People ask me why I don't just put up paper. But I can feel the texture of an upholstered wall by looking at it. I find it oddly soothing. If you're going to do it, do it all—the walls, the headboard, the curtains, and the shades.
