What's your favourite design from a recent issue?
I love the peacock stitching accessories set from issue 267.

Most of my family and friends are really impressed with my stitching. They all think it's very beautiful. My mum even started to cross stitch herself after I took up the hobby!

Celebrating the magnificent stargazer lily, this striking design is simply bursting with colour


$\delta$o-called because their exquisite flowers look up towards the sky, stargazer lilies have long been a favourite of floral enthusiasts due to their stunning pink hues and rich scent. In this charming design, Amanda has beautifully paired them with pale pink gerberas, creating a stitched bouquet that is sure to delight any flower fan.

The spotted pattern on the petals is cleverly created with French knots, but as the rest of the design uses just cross stitch and backstitch, advanced beginners as well as more experienced stitchers will enjoy making this delightful pattern flourish!

Framing the finished design in a simple white frame with a deeper

cream mount will ensure the bright colours of these exotic blooms really take centre stage. Hang in your living room or conservatory, and enjoy the vivid hues of these pretty lilies all year round - especially in winter when you need a boost of summer colour! >

## How to... <br> add backstitch to your design



Always add any backstitches to your design after you've finished all the whole stitches and fractionals. Thread your needle with whichever coloured thread is indicated in the
key. Following the backstitch line on the chart, make your stitches as shown in the diagram on the left. Bring your needle up at 1, down at 2 then back up at 3, stitching in a two steps forward, one step back motion. Keep your backstitches neat and taut by not stitching over more than one block at a time.

When autumn arrives, the trees put on a magnificent display for us, their leaves turning to jewelled reds, oranges and yellows. Amanda's seasonal design allows you to capture this amazing transformation on fabric, creating a wonderful scene in stitches that's alive with all the colour and movement of the woods.

The depth and texture of the trees and water in this design are achieved with a mix of whole cross stitch and half cross stitch, while backstitch is used sparingly to create a sense of perspective. It also uses blending, a technique where you stitch with two different colours of thread at the same time, which

## How to... <br> stitch with blended threads

Amanda has used the two-tone effect of blended stitches to add texture and movement to the river and trees in her design. Begin by checking on the key for how many strands of each different coloured thread you will need for your special blended stitches. Then thread your needle with the different colours as indicated and stitch the cross stitches as normal. The blended stitch will have its own symbol on the chart, different to the one indicating the individual colours that make it up if you need to stitch them on their own.

## A pressing problem

QI've just finished a piece of work but cannot iron out the crease made by the frame I had the aida stretched over. Do you have any ideas I can try, please?

## Lorraine Baker, via email

Heather says: When trying to get rid of stubborn creases, first make sure your stitching is washed and free of dirt or grime, or you could permanently iron the markings into your fabric. The trick to ironing is to get the crease really wet, so if
you've already washed your piece, spray well with some clean water before you begin. Set the iron slightly hotter than you would usually use it, and lay a sheet of white cotton over the top so as not to scorch the fabric at this higher setting. As you iron, pull the fabric taut, then continue to do this as much as possible as it cools, to help ensure that the fabric remains flat. Repeat again if necessary, until the crease has completely gone.

## Let's make a date

QI would like to cross stitch an eternal calendar, but I can't find a chart for one. Do you have any patterns or ideas for how I can do this?

## Eleanora Murphy, London

AKatriel says: Why not try making one yourself, Eleanora? Simply pick your alphabet and numbers style - have a look though some of our back issues as we always include an ABC every month, with some also featuring numbers too! Plot out the days of the week and months of the year on graph paper, before stitching them onto perforated paper, not forgetting to leave space at the top for the hanging holes. Add in a set of numbers (remember you'll need to stitch two number 1 s and 2 s , for days 11 and 22), punch holes along the top edges and hang over hooks fixed onto a decorated wooden board. You can buy perforated paper in a range of colours from The Nutmeg Company*, starting at $£ 4.25$ for two A4 sheets.

## Add some pizzazz

QHow can I make my greeting cards look less basic? Your magazine always has nice finishing touches to your greeting cards. Where would be a good place to pick up some simple techniques to build on?

AHannah says: There are so many flourishes you can add to your cards to set off your stitched elements. From simple stickers and trimmed paper ornaments and flowers and die-cutting your own apertures, you can do as much or as little as you like. I'm the Editor of Papercraft Inspirations magazine, which is a great place to start!

QHow do you stop your fabric from fraying if you can't sew around it? I've seen people use a grime guard, but where does the excess material go, especially on a hoop?
Natasha Fryer, via Facebook

AKatriel says: Grime guards are great for tucking all your fabric up inside to keep it out the way, but are really only designed for straight-sided Q-Snap-type frames. Lakeside Needlecrafts* offers a selection of grime guards in a range of sizes, from $15 \frac{1}{4} \times 151 / 4 \mathrm{~cm}(6 \times 6 \mathrm{in})$ to $43 \times 43 \mathrm{~cm}(17 \times 17 \mathrm{in})$, that cost from just $£ 6.49$ each. If you prefer to stick with using a hoop, however, why not cover the edges of your fabric in acid-free masking tape? This low-cost solution means you can use a hoop or a frame. Use a piece of fabric slightly larger than you would normally, to allow for the edges to be cut off afterwards, rather than trying to peel off the tape.

## Changing shades

This will be my second time stitching Bucilla's 'Nighty Night' design - the first time was for my granddaughter 24 years ago. Now my friend is going to be a great gran, I have decided to do it again, but some of the thread numbers are not on the current brand lists. Any idea what the alternative shades are?

Fiona says: Cyberstitches* has a brilliantly handy list of conversion tables, one of which converts Bucilla threads to DMC. QHow easy is it to stitch on evenweave when you mostly stitch on aida?

 Heather says: It's essentially just the same - although evenweave is woven in a finer count, so each cross is worked over two threads to achieve the same size stitch. Just bring your needle up at the bottom corner of the square and take it down two holes across and two holes up, then repeat for the other arm. Start small, and you'll be flying along in no time.

I always have a smaller project on the go at the same time. If I get a bit jaded with the large project, I just move to a small one then return once that's completed.

I often have a completely different project on the go to alternate with - a finish always spurs me on to complete other projects. I also sometimes just have a day of stitching, as even if I'm
not feeling the project at the start of the day, I won't want to put it down by bedtime!

I try not to see it as a large project and pick smaller areas out to stitch, increasing my confidence and motivation to complete it as a whole!

I take photos to track the progress. Sharing these with friends helps keep me motivated. If I haven't posted a photo in a few days, they start asking for them, which helps to keep me going

Once covered, overlap the end and fix in place with a few stitches between the layers You could bind the outer hoop in the same way if you wanted to add extra cushioning, but you'll probably need a longer tightening screw so it will still connect afterwards.

## Binding your embroidery hoop

I'd like to try binding my embroidery hoop. I've read that you can bind with ribbon, but have also seen suggestions to use bias tape. Is there a benefit to using one over the other?

AHeather says: Binding your embroidery hoop is a great way to ensure it holds your stitching with an even tension, but it can also help to create a bit of cushioning to minimise damage to completed stitches too; if you need to move the hoop around a larger project, for example. You can buy pre-bound hoops but it's just as easy to make your own, and it's also a big money saver! We'd recommend using bias tape or even spare fabric strips instead of ribbon, as a more textured material holds the fabric in the hoop a lot better than a smooth ribbon surface might.

To bind, begin wrapping the inner hoop with your chosen material by placing the end at an angle - you could clip or glue in place to make it easier. Continue in place to make it easier. Continue

The patchwork effect is cleverly created with backstitches across the patterned blocks, giving the impression of fabric that's stitched together. The details of the cat's face are then created in backstitch using three strands, adding strong definition to the whiskers, eyes and mouth.

## How to...

## make a cat doorstop



Wash and press your stitching, then trim it to size, leaving a 2 cm (3/4in) border. Choose a complementary backing fabric, and cut one panel to match the dimensions of your stitched piece.
Then cut two side panels measuring $11 \times 25 \mathrm{~cm}$ ( $41 / 2 \times 93 / 4 \mathrm{in}$ ) and two panels measuring $19.5 \times 11 \mathrm{~cm}$ ( $71 / 2 \times 41 / 2$ in) for the top and the bottom.


With right sides together, pin one side panel to your stitched piece along the long edge and sew with a $1 \mathrm{~cm}(1 / 2 i n)$ seam. Sew your back panel to your side panel, then sew the other side panel to the back panel along the long edge to create one long panel. Line up the side panel and front panel, making sure the right sides are together.
Sew a seam along the edge to make an inside-out tube of fabric.


On the tube's bottom edge, pin your bottom panel to each of the four sides, with right sides together. Sew with a $1 \mathrm{~cm}(1 / 2 \mathrm{in})$ seam. To make the handle, cut a $8 \times 26 \mathrm{~cm}(31 / 4 \times 101 / 4 i n)$ piece of fabric, fold in half lengthways and sew a 1 cm (1⁄2in) seam along one long edge.


Turn your doorstop inside out and press. Take your handle and pin it to the top edge, with ends overlapping, then pin your top panel to the top edge. Sew a $1 \mathrm{~cm}(1 / 2 \mathrm{in})$ seam, leaving a $6 \mathrm{~cm}(21 / 2 i n)$ gap for turning. Turn the doorstop the right way out and fill half way with rice, then pack the remaining space with stuffing. Sew closed using ladder stitch.

 aperture and then cut out your stitching slightly larger than the aperture window, with a minimum $1 \mathrm{~cm}(1 / 2 i n)$ border.2. Attach strips of double-

sided tape around the aperture on the reverse side of the card, as close to the edges as possible.
3. Lay your stitching face-up and position the card above, with the aperture framing the design. Move the card around until you are happy with the way it frames the design, then fix into position.
4. Attach more strips of double-sided tape
to the left-hand flap of the card, insert a piece of white paper behind the aida, and then fold over the flap to conceal the back of the stitching

# And so to bed... 

This talented stitcher came up with a clever way to display her finished projects - a bedspread!

When Irene Cain started stitching, she enjoyed mounting her work and hanging it up. After a few years, however, her love of cross stitch meant that her walls were rapidly filling up and she needed a new way to make up her designs. "There's only so much wall space that anyone can have!" laughs Irene. Inspiration struck, and she had the clever idea of using her designs to make a bedspread.

Irene, who is 88 years old and lives near Halifax, Yorkshire, began stitching after her children had grown up and left home. "I was out of work, so with time on my hands I thought I would give it a go," she explains. "Sewing, knitting and crocheting had always come easily to me, so it seemed a natural progression to try a more detailed form of sewing." She joined her local stitching group, "to gain confidence and share the ups and downs of learning such a delicate art." Irene's love of stitching flourished, and she started working on projects, of

which her stunning bedspread is by far the most complex!

The bedspread has over 70 motifs, all stitched on aida, ranging from simple flowers and Celtic patterns to detailed landscape scenes. The 12 signs of the zodiac decorate one long side panel, while a pretty alphabet frames the other long side. Horses are a dominant theme, from a winged Pegasus to working shires and prancing carriage horses.

All the designs came from charts in magazines that Irene bought, with the exception of the church that's at the top of the design, which this
talented stitcher charted herself from a photo. "I saw a picture of it in a magazine, and then when I was on a bus ride to Bury, I passed it!" says Irene. "What are the odds of that! So I decided that I had to stitch it." Irene also added her name, ensuring that future generations know who was responsible for this fabric work of art!

It took Irene five years to complete her bedspread, including the time it took to delicately piece and sew together all the cross stitched panels, ensuring they all worked together as a whole. The finished item has pride of place on her bed.

Irene is still busy stitching away. "I stitch daily for around five hours - after that my eyes and hands are ready for a well-earned rest!" Her current WIP is a Little Dove design, which will be a Christmas present

Corgis are known to be very intelligent and playful dogs, and l've tried to capture that in my chart. I've used a pink background for this little cutie, to pick up on the colour I've used for the ears and the mouth. The design is very adaptable, however, so you could always choose two complementary shades of another colour from your stash.

This hue has then been continued in the making up, too, using a pink square aperture card. As you're sending it as a sympathy card, we've also added a foiled sentiment. The size and shape means that the design would also fit a coaster, so you could stitch it again so your friend can have another reminder of her beloved pet.

Designer Becky shares her stitching inspiration and the joys of a creative job

How did you first start cross stitching?
I began stitching when I was around nine years old. My sister and I had a babysitter called Gwen who was like a grandma to me. She taught me how to knit and sew. She died a long time ago but I still have an old green Singer sewing machine she gave to me. I use it for all my machine sewing.

How did you get into the business of designing? I've been designing for seven years. I studied art at university and one of my first jobs was working as the Charting Editor for Cross Stitch Crazy. Part of my role was checking other designers' charts and also creating charts from artwork. After a while, I decided to start designing my own charts. I was a bit nervous at the time about approaching the Editor of Crazy, but I was really lucky that she was very encouraging and gave me a chance to be published in the magazine. I'll always be grateful to her for that.



How would you describe your design style?
Colourful, uplifting and a little bit sentimental. I'd like to say my designs are really contemporary but I'm not sure I'm quite cool enough for that! I think I'm somewhere between modern and traditional. I get a lot of inspiration from modern illustration and pattern design. I also like looking at what other cross stitch designers are doing - Emma Congdon and Jody Rice are favourites of mine.

What do you enjoy most about being a cross stitch designer? I love having a creative job where I can put my ideas down on paper - well, in stitches! It's humbling to know that people are out there putting their time and effort into stitching my designs. I also love how flexible it is. I've always wanted to be a freelancer, so I'm lucky to have found a job which allows that.

Other than cross stitch, what are you most passionate about in life? How do you relax? My family are my main passion. My husband and I have two children, Evelyn and Leo, who are three and one respectively. Looking after them is my main focus and the reason I get up in the morning (and during the night!). At the moment, relaxing is something I think about wistfully and look forward to doing again one day!

What are your ambitions for the future?
I'm looking to build up my work as a cross stitch designer and start selling online, under the name Apple Tree Stitch. I've set up a Facebook page and my Etsy shop will follow soon. 8

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# How to... 



## CHOOSE YOUR ESSENTIALS...

Start with these must-have items

## 1. FA BRICS

Begin with either aida or evenweave.
Aida is best for beginners, with regular woven blocks and obvious holes. It's stiffer than evenweave, but will soften slightly as you work. 14-count aida is the most common. It's harder to work fractional stitches on aida, as you'll need to make an extra hole in the fabric, in the centre of the aida block.
Evenweave is a lovely fabric to work on when you have a little more experience. The fibres aren't woven in blocks as with aida, so it's softer and the fine weave has more threads-per-inch - the most commonly used is 28 -count. One stitch is usually worked over two threads of the fabric so it has an equivalent design size of 14 -count aida. Cross stitching fractional stitches is easier on evenweave, as there's a central hole spare so you don't need to split a block as for aida.


## 2. IHREADS

You'll need stranded cotton - this coloured thread comes in 8 m skeins and is made up of six strands. The count of your fabric will determine the number of strands you use in your needle. Typically for 14 -count aida you'll use two strands for cross stitch and just one strand for backstitch. This is indicated in the key or instructions for your project. There are three main brands - DMC, Anchor and Madeira - which are all smooth and easy


to stitch with, and are colourfast to $95^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. Cheaper brands are available, but they're less durable and may not be colourfast.

## 3. NEPDIES

To cross stitch, use a tapestry needle, which has a blunt tip and larger eye than a regular sewing needle. It easily passes through the fibres of aida and evenweave. Different needle sizes are available, with varying lengths and widths, so choose the best for your fabric - see our handy guide. Other needles are useful too... try a fine beading needle for adding bead accents. You may also prefer a sharp-tipped embroidery (or crewel) needle to split aida blocks when stitching fractional stitches.


## START CROSS STITCHING...

Make sure you hit the mark first time, every time with our top tips!
*Choose your project... With our Factbox guide in every one of our projects, you can make sure you choose the right level for you. Absolute beginners should aim for a design without fractional stitches.
*Buy your materials... To make sure your design looks great, use our Shopping List for each project, which specifies everything needed, like size of fabric and finishing materials. Using another fabric with different HPI, will give a different finished size of design. Calculate your fabric requirements like this: Stitch count divided by HPI of 'new' fabric choice = new size in inches. Add at least 10 cm (4in) on each dimension to allow for mounting, or less for cards.

* Get ready... We always recommend starting in the centre of a design and working outwards. Our charts are marked with two centre arrows so find a symbol close to the centre and begin there.
* Get set... Find the corresponding centre of your fabric by folding in half and half again. The point where the folds cross corresponds to the centre so this is where your central stitch should go.
*Get stitching... Begin your stitches in two strands of thread with a loop start for the neatest way to get going. It uses one double-length $(80 \mathrm{~cm})$ strand with both ends threaded together. See our diagrams for how to stitch. Finish threads by weaving the leftover 'tail' under a few stitches at the back.


# How to stitch <br> Tackle the basic stitches in our charts... 



Loop start With both ends of a strand threaded, bring your needle up (1), leaving a loop at the back. Work the first arm of your stitch (2) \& secure it by passing your needle through the loop

Backstitch Add detail and definition. Bring your needle up at (1) \& down at (2), come up again at (3), then back down at (1) \& so on, to direct each stitch 'back' towards the line of the growing backstitch.


Cross stitch Bring your needle up at the bottom left corner (1) \& down in the top right (2) for the first 'arm' of your stitch. Work the second arm, coming up in the bottom right (3) \& going down in the top left (4).


French knots Easy with practice - come up in the fabric (1), keep the thread taut \& wrap twice around the needle. Push the needle down, close by, but not in the same hole (2). Split the aida block for a neat knot.

## How to read our keys <br> Fox key <br> $\approx$ Cross stitch in two strands

Clear symbols, colours, \& all the info you need!


Symbols
Look for a symbol close to the chart centre

- the arrows on our charts easily show the centre so you won't need to count! Find this symbol in the key. The codes in that row show which thread shades to use for cross stitching blocks with this symbol.


## Thread brands

The thread shades are listed in separate columns for the different manufacturer brands of thread. For best results, you should stick to one manufacturer for the whole of a design.

Backstitch \& French knot shades The shades used for these are listed under the cross stitch symbols. The number of strands needed for these can vary, so make sure you check how many to use, as specified in the key.

## Fractionals let you

 create rounded edges

Quarter The chart shows which corner has the fractional. Bring the needle up in that corner and down in the centre of the square, halfway across the diagonal (diagram 1).
 stitch, then, a half stitch across the other diagonal arm of the square as in diagram 2. Like quarters, three-quarter stitches can face any direction.

Two symbols When two symbols share a square, work a fractional in each colour. Decide on the quarter stitch for the background colour, then a three-quarters stitch for the main one (diagram 3).


Back-to-back For a stronger outline, work
a three-quarter stitch in each colour, stitching them back-to-back (diagram 4). Make sure that the two half stitch arms lie neatly parallel to each other.

## Jargon buster! Use our A-Z of cross stitch to know what's what...

Afghan - a woollen blanket with areas inset for cross stitching, often used for baby designs Aida band - a narrow strip of aida, available in varying widths, and finished with a decorative edge Aperture - a hole through which a design is seen in cards \& frames Backstitch - used to add detail \& definition. See how to stitch it in our diagram above!

Beading needle - a longer, finer needle than a tapestry needle, used for adding seed beads to a design Counted stitches - embroidery stitches worked on counted, or evenly woven, fabrics like aida \& evenweave. Cross stitch is the most basic counted stitch Floss - USA term for stranded cotton Fractional stitches - made from either a
quarter or three-quarters of a cross stitch, these allow you to create 'rounded' edges. See how to make these in our diagrams above! Half stitch - made up of only one half (one 'arm') of a cross stitch, it gives less dense coverage so an overall lighter effect in the design Hoop - a wooden or spring-mounted plastic circular frame that holds your fabric taut while
working a design Longstitch - long backstitches, crossing larger fabric distances Metallic threads - similar to stranded cottons, these have a metallic finish for shine and sparkle
Perforated paper toughened paper with a tiny grid of holes, which can be used for stitching instead of fabric Plastic canvas plastic alternative to
fabric which won't fray when cut
Skein - an 8m length of stranded cotton, divisible into six separate strands Soluble aida temporary fabric which, like waste canvas, is used to add cross stitching to non-counted fabrics, \& then dissolved away in water afterwards Stitching over two - term used to describe stitching over two threads of the weave of
an evenweave fabric Variegated thread specific type of stranded cotton, in which the colour changes along the length of the thread for a shaded effect Waste canvas loosely woven fabric, held together with soluble glue.
