About the yarn

DK; 535m per 150g ball; 90% acrylic, 10% alpaca

Tension

15 sts x 8 rows = 10 cm measured over tr with larger hook

Hooks used

4.5mm 5.mm

Other supplies

stitch markers

Sizing

48cm circumference

When instructed to turn at the end of a round, mark the last st worked with a marker so that when you turn, the first st of the round is easy to find.

When working the round following a 'bobble rnd', it's easier to find the closing st if you rotate the bobble towards you slightly.

Beg ch does not count as a st unless otherwise specified.

Start crocheting...

Hat is worked top down in rnds, do not turn at the end of the rnd unless specified.

Rnd 1: With larger hook and working into a magic ring, 3 ch (counts as first tr), 23 tr, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch, pm in 2nd tr for st placement in Rnd 3. 24 tr

Rnd 2: 1 ch, 1 dc, 3 ch, miss next st, *1 dc, 3 ch, miss next st; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc. 12 dc

Rnd 3: [1 sl st, 1 ch, 1 dc] into first 3ch-sp, 1 RpcF around marked st in Rnd 1, 1 dc into same first 3ch-sp, *1 dc into next



3ch-sp, miss next tr in Rnd 1, 1 RpcF around next tr in Rnd 1, 1 dc into same 3ch-sp as previous dc; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc. 24 dc, 12 RpcF

Rnd 4: 1 ch, 2 dc in first dc, *miss next RpcF, [2 dc in next dc] twice; rep from * around to last RpcF, miss last RpcF, 2 dc in last dc, join with sl st to beg dc. 48 dc

Rnd 5: 1 ch, 2 htr in first st, 1 htr, *2 htr in next st, 1 htr; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg htr. 72 htr

Rnd 6: 1 ch, 2 htr in BLO of first st, 2 htr in BLO, *2 htr in BLO of next st, 2 htr in BLO; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg htr. 96 htr

Rnd 7: 3 ch (counts as first RtrB), 22 RtrB, 2 RtrB around next st, *23 RtrB, 2 RtrB around next st; rep from * around, join with sl st in top of beg 3ch. Turn. 100 RtrB

Rnd 8 (WS): 1 ch, *1 bbl, 4 dc; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg bbl. Turn. 20 bbl, 80 dc

Rnd 9 (RS): 1 ch, htr around, join with sl st to beg htr. Turn.

Rnd 10 (WS): 1 ch, 3 dc, 1 bbl, *4 dc, 1 bbl; rep from * to last st, 1 dc, join with sl st to beg dc. Turn. 20 bbl, 80 dc

Rnd 11 (RS): 3 ch (counts as first tr), tr around, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch.

Rnd 12: 3 ch (counts as first tr), 1 RtrtrF/ RdtrFtog over bbl on Rnd 8 and next bbl on Rnd 10, *miss next st on Rnd 11, 4 tr, 1 RtrtrF/RdtrFtog over next 2 bbls on rnds 8 and 10; rep from * to last 4 sts, miss next st on Rnd 11, 3 tr, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 20 RtrtrF/RdtrFtog, 80 tr

Rnd 13: 3 ch (counts as first RtrB), *1 RtrB around next st; rep from * around, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 100 RtrB

Rnd 14: 1 ch, htr around, join with sl st to beg htr.

Rnd 15: As Rnd 13. Turn.

Rnds 16-19: Rep rnds 8-11.

Rnd 20: 3 ch (counts as first tr), 1 RtrtrF/ RdtrFtog over bbl on Rnd 16 and next bbl

Accessory

on Rnd 18, *miss next st on Rnd 19, 4 tr, 1 RtrtrF/RdtrFtog over next 2 bbls in rnds 16 and 18; rep from * to last 4 sts, miss next st on Rnd 19, 3 tr, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 20 RtrtrF/RdtrFtog, 80 tr

Rnds 21-22: Rep rnds 13-14.

Rnd 23: As Rnd 13.

Rnd 24 (WS): 1 ch, *1 bbl, 4 dc; rep from *around, join with sl st to beg bbl. Turn. 20 bbl, 80 dc

Rnd 25 (RS): As Rnd 14. Rnds 26-27: Rep rnds 13-14.

Rnd 28 (beg Band): 1 ch, *1 dc2tog, 8 dc; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc. 90 dc

Rnd 29: 1 ch, dc around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Change to smaller hook.

Rnd 30: 1 ch, *1 dc, 1 ch, miss next st; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Rnd 31: [1 sl st, 1 ch, 1 dc] into first 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss next st, *1 dc into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss next st; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Rnds 32-34: As Rnd 31.

Rnd 35: 1 ch, 1 dc in first st, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp, *1 dc, 1 dc into next 1ch-sp; rep from * around, join with sl st to beg dc. 90 dc

Rnds 36-40: 1 ch, dc around, join with sl st to beg dc.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.



Special stitches

RhtrB - Raised half treble Back:

Work the htr around post of indicated st, inserting hook from back to front around to back again

RpcF – Raised popcorn Front: Work 4 tr around the post of indicated st, inserting hook from front to back around to the front again, after completing 4th tr, drop loop from hook, insert hook from front to back in first of 4 tr, place loop back on hook, draw through first st Bobble (bbl): [Yrh, insert hook into st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops] 5 times into same st, yrh, draw through all 6 loops on hook

Raised triple treble Front/Raised double treble Front together (RtrtrF/RdtrFtog): Work trtr around post of lower specified bbl, inserting hook from front to back around to front again and leaving last 2 loops on hook, work dtr around post of next (higher) bbl in the same manner, leaving last 2 loops on hook (for 3 loops on hook total), yrh, draw through all 3 loops on hook

About the yarn

DK; 43m per 20g ball; 100% cotton

Tension

18 sts x 22 rows = 10cm

Hook used

4mm

Other supplies

tapestry needle 35cm zip (or choose one that can be cut to length when complete) sewing needle sewing thread to match zip

Sizing

23cm wide x 12cm tall x 5cm deep

Take your time with the sl st edges and joining to give the neatest finish.

Start crocheting...

Cloud Shape (make 2)

With MC, chain 11.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 10 dc. Turn. 10 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, 9 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. *11 sts*

Row 3: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 10 dc. Turn. 12 sts

Row 4: 1 ch, 11 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. 13 sts

Rows 5-7: 1 ch, 13 dc. Turn.

Row 8: 1 ch, 11 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 12 sts

Row 9: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 10 dc. Turn. *11 sts*

Row 10: 1 ch, 9 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *10 sts*

Row 11: 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook, 5 dc, cont across row, 10 dc. Turn. 15 sts

Row 12: 1 ch, 14 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn.

16 sts

Row 13: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 15 dc. Turn. 17 sts

Row 14: 1 ch, 16 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. 18 sts

Rows 15-17: 1 ch, 18 dc. Turn.

Row 18: 1 ch, 16 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *17 sts*

Row 19: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 15 dc. Turn. *16 sts* **Row 20:** 1 ch, 14 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *15 sts*

Row 21: 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from

hook, 5 dc, cont across row, 15 dc. Turn. 20 sts

Row 22: 1 ch, 19 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. 21 sts

Row 23: 1 ch, 2 dc in first st, 20 dc. Turn. 22 sts

Row 24: 1 ch, 21 dc, 2 dc in last st. Turn. 23 sts

Rows 25-27: 1 ch, 23 dc. Turn.

Row 28: 1 ch, 21 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 22 sts

Row 29: 1 ch, 1 dc2tog, 20 dc. Turn. *21 sts* : **Making up**

Row 30: 1 ch, 19 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 20 sts

Row 31: 1 ch, 5 sl st, 1 ch, 15 dc. Turn.

Rows 32-40: Rep rows 12-20. *15 sts*

Row 41: 1 ch, 5 sl st, 1 ch, 10 dc. Turn.

Rows 42-50: Rep rows 2-10. *10 sts*

Border Rnd: SI st evenly around edge of Cloud (1 sl st in each st and each row end), join with sl st in beg sl st, when making 2nd piece, do not turn at end of Row 50. Fasten off.

Rainbow Stripe Edge

With CC1, chain 11.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 10 dc. Turn. 10 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, 10 dc. Turn.

Rows 3-4: With CC2, as Row 2.

Rows 5-6: With CC3, as Row 2.

Rows 7-8: With CC4, as Row 2.

Rows 9-10: With CC5, as Row 2.

Rows 11-12: With CC6, as Row 2.

Rows 13-72: Rep the colour pattern as

set, 1 ch, 10 dc.

Row 73: With CC1, 1 ch, 5 dc, leave rem sts unworked. Turn.

Rows 74-144: Cont in colour pattern, over these 5 sts.

Fasten off, join CC1 in next unworked st on Row 73 and rep rows 74-144 on the unworked side.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

With CC1, sl st evenly around the edge of entire Rainbow Stripe.

Cheeks

Rnd 1: With CC1 and working into a magic ring, 6 dc, join with an invisible join. Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.




Using photograph as a guide for positioning, use tail to sew Cheeks onto one of the cloud pieces.

With CC7 and a tapestry needle, back stitch to embroider the eyes and mouth.

With a sewing needle and thread, sew the zip onto the Rainbow Stripe edge piece on each side of the long centre split.

With CC1, join the Rainbow Stripe edge piece to the front Cloud piece by slip stitching in BLO of the sl st edging on both the Cloud and the Rainbow Stripe. Rep for the back Cloud piece. With CC1, sew the ends of the Rainbow Stripe tog.

About the yarn

DK; 295m per 100g ball; 100% acrylic

Tension

7 blocks x 7 blocks = 10cm

Hook used

4mm

Sizing

Finished blanket measures 105x75cm including border

Start crocheting...

Where the colour changes to another and then changes back again within a short space, it is possible to carry the yarn across the back of the piece rather than cutting it and joining it again, reducing the number of ends to be sewn in at the end. If you do this, make sure to carefully crochet over the floats ensuring that they lay on the wrong side of the work. Don't do it over large expanses as the carried yarn may become visible on the front of the piece, spoiling the look of it.

Work stitches as below, following the chart on page 20 for colour changes.

Increase rows

With A, chain 6.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 4th ch from hook, 3 tr. Turn. 1 block (3 ch, 3 tr)

Row 2 (WS): 6 ch, starting in 4th ch from hook, 3 tr, [1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into 3 ch-sp of next block. Turn. 2 blocks

Row 3: 6 ch, starting in 4th ch from hook, 3 tr, *[1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into 3ch-sp of next block; rep from * to end. Turn.

Rows 4-50: Cont increasing as for Row 3, following Chart for Colour changes (colour changes beg on Row 15). *50 blocks*



Maintain rows

Row 51: 6 ch, starting in 4th ch from hook, 3 tr, *[1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into 3ch-sp of next block; rep from * to last 3ch-sp, sl st into last 3ch-sp. Turn. *50 blocks*

Row 52: Sl st across to first 3ch-sp, [1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into first 3ch-sp, *[1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into next 3ch-sp; rep from * across. Turn. 50 blocks

Rows 53-70: Rep rows 51-52.

Decrease rows

Rows 71-118: SI st across to first 3ch-sp, [1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into first 3 ch-sp, *[1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into next 3ch-sp; rep from * to last 3ch-sp, sI st into last 3ch-sp. Turn. 1 block dec'd

Row 119: Sl st across to 3ch-sp, [1 sl st, 3 ch, 3 tr] into 3ch-sp, sl st into next 3ch-sp. Do not turn. 1 block

Border


Rnd 1: With RS facing, cont with A, 1 ch, 1 dc in sp between last block made and block with last sl st, 2 ch, {*1 dc in next sp between blocks, 2 ch; rep from * to next corner st, [1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] in corner st, 2 ch} 4 times, changing to D, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off A. Rnd 2: With D, 3 ch, 2 tr into first 2ch-sp,
*3 tr into each 2ch-sp across to corner
2ch-sp, 5 tr into corner 2ch-sp; rep from
* around to last 2ch-sp, 3 tr into each
rem 2ch-sp, join with sl st in top of beg
3 ch.

Rnd 3: SI st in next 2 tr, 1 ch, {*1 dc in next sp between 3tr-groups, 2 ch; rep from * to next corner 3tr-group, [1 dc, 2 ch, 1 dc] in centre tr of corner 3tr-group, 2 ch} 4 times, [1 dc in next sp between 3tr-groups, 2 ch] twice, join with sI st to beg dc.

About the yarn

Chunky; 288m per 300g ball; 100% polyester

Tension

10 sts x 11 rows = 10 cm measured over dc

Hook used

6.5mm

Other supplies

stitch markers


Sizing

6/8 (10/12) years to fit chest measurement: 63.5-67.5 (71-76) cm finished chest measurement: 122 (147.5) cm

Body and Sleeves are crocheted in rnds until armhole.

At end of each rnd, turn work, to alternate rnds on RS and WS. This will ensure the sections worked in rnds will match sections worked in rows.

Schematic



Beg 2 ch does not count as st, join all rnds with sl st to beg htr.

Start crocheting...

Body

With CC, ch 120 (144), join with sl st in first ch to beg working in the rnd, being careful not to twist chain. Pm for beg of rnd.

Rnd 1 (RS): 2 ch, htr around, join. Turn. Rnd 2 (WS): 2 ch, RtrF around, join with MC. Fasten off CC. Turn.

Rnd 3 (RS): With MC, 2 ch, htr around, join. Turn.

Rnd 4 (WS): 2 ch, htr around, join. Turn. Rep last 2 rnds until work from beg measures 43 (51) cm, ending on a WS rnd. Turn.

Divide for Back and Front

Back

Row 1 (RS): 2 ch, 60 (72) htr, leave rem sts unworked. Turn.

Row 2: 2 ch, htr across. Turn. Rep last row until armhole measures 23 (25.5) cm, ending on a WS row. Turn.

Shape shoulders

Row 1: SI st in first 10 (12) sts, 1 ch, htr across to last 9 (11) sts, 1 dc, leave rem 8 (10) sts unworked. Turn. 42 (50) htr

Row 2: SI st in first 10 (13) sts, 1 ch, htr across to last 9 (12) sts, 1 dc, leave rem sts unworked. Fasten off. 24 (26) htr

Front

Row 1: With RS facing join MC with sl st in first unworked st, starting in same st as join, 60 (72) htr. Turn.



Row 2: 1 ch, htr across. Turn.

Rep last row until armhole measures 6 rows shorter than Back before beg of shoulder shaping, ending on a WS row.

Shape left neck

Row 1 (RS): 2 ch, 20 (25) htr, 1 htr2tog, 1 htr, leave rem sts unworked. Turn. 22 (27) sts **Row 2:** 2 ch, 1 htr, 1 htr2tog, htr to end of row. Turn. 21 (26) sts

Row 3: 2 ch, htr across to last 3 sts, 1 htr2tog, 1 htr. Turn. 20 (25) sts
Rows 4-6: 2 ch, htr across. Turn.

Shape shoulder

Row 7 (RS): SI st in first 10 (12) sts, 1 ch, htr to end of row. Fasten off.

Shape right neck

With RS facing, miss next 14 (16) htr (centre front neck), join MC with sl st in next htr.
Cont on rem 23 (28) sts as follows:

Row 1 (RS): 2 ch, 1 htr, 1 htr2tog, htr to end of row. Turn. 22 (27) sts

Row 2: 2 ch, htr across to last 3 sts, 1 htr2tog, 1 htr. Turn. *21 (26) sts*

Row 3: As Row 1. *20 (25) sts* **Rows 4-5:** 1 ch, htr across. Turn.

Shape shoulder

Row 7 (WS): SI st in first 10 (12) sts, 1 ch, htr to end of row. Fasten off.

Sleeves

Sew shoulder seams.

With RS facing, join MC at side edge between Left Front and Back.

Rnd 1 (RS): 2 ch, work 45 (53) htr evenly around armhole, join. Pm for beg of rnd. Turn.

Rnds 2-6: 2 ch, htr around, join. Turn.Rnd 7 (RS): 2 ch, 1 htr2tog, htr across to last 2 sts, 1 htr2tog, join. Turn. 43 (51) stsRnds 8-10: As Rnd 2.

Rep last 4 rnds twice more. 39 (47) sts Cont as Rnd 2 until work from beg of Sleeve measures 23cm, ending on a RS rnd.

Next Rnd (WS): 2 ch, 1 htr, 19 (23) htr2tog, join with CC. Fasten off MC. Turn. 20 (24) sts

Next Rnd (RS): With CC, 2 ch, htr around. Turn.

Next Rnd: 2 ch, RtrF around, join. Fasten off.

Hood

With CC, chain 59 (65) loosely.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 3rd ch from hook,

htr across. Turn. 57 (63) sts

Row 2: 2 ch, RtrF to end of row, join MC.

Fasten off CC. Turn.

Row 3: With MC, 2 ch, htr to end of row. Turn.

Rep last row until work from beg measures 11.5 (12.5) cm, ending on a WS row.

Shape Neck of Hood

Row 1 (RS): 2 ch, 1 htr, 1 htr2tog, htr across to last 3 sts, 1 htr2tog, 1 htr. Turn. 55 (61) sts

Row 2: 2 ch, htr to end of row. Turn. Rep last 2 rows twice more and pm at end of last row. *51 (57) sts*

Rep Row 2 until work from marked row measures 5cm, ending on a WS row.

Shape back of Hood

Row 1 (RS): 2 ch, 23 (26) htr, 1 htr2tog, 1 htr, pm in last htr, 1 htr2tog, htr to end of row. Turn. *49 (55) sts*



Row 2: 2 ch, htr across to 2 sts before marked st, 1 htr2tog, 1 htr, pm, 1 htr2tog, htr to end of row. Turn. *47 (53) sts*Rep last row 2 (3) times more. *43 (47) sts*Fasten off.

Fold last row in half and sew back seam.

Overlap fronts of Hood at foundation row by 4cm (overlap will be centre front). Sew Hood around neck opening, matching Hood seam with centre back neck edge.

Pocket

With MC, chain 37 (42).

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 3rd ch from hook, htr across. Turn. 35 (40) htr

Row 2: 2 ch, htr to end of row. Turn. Rep last row until work from beg measures 7.5cm, ending on a WS row.

Shape sides

Row 1 (RS): 2 ch, 1 htr, 1 htr2tog, htr across to last 3 sts, 1 htr2tog, 1 htr. Turn. 33 (38) sts Row 2: 2 ch, htr to end of row. Turn.

Rep last 2 rows 3 (4) times more, then rep Row 1 once more. 25 (28) sts Fasten off.

Try on Hoodie. Pin Pocket at comfortable height on centre front. Sew Pocket edges in position, leaving shaped sides open.

Outer Ears (make 2)

With MC, chain 10.

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 3rd ch from hook, htr across. Turn. 8 htr

Rows 2-6: 2 ch, htr to end of row. Turn.

Shape top of Ears

Row 7 (RS): 2 ch, 1 htr2tog, 4 htr, 1 htr2tog. Turn. 6 sts

Row 8: 2 ch, 1 htr2tog, 2 htr, 1 htr2tog. Turn. *4 sts*

Row 9: 2 ch, 2 htr2tog. Turn. 2 sts Row 10: 2 ch, 1 htr2tog. Fasten off.

Inner Ears (make 2)

With A, work as given for Outer Ears.
With WS of Outer and Inner Ears tog, join MC with sl st at foundation ch. Working through both thicknesses, work in dc around Ears to opposite side of foundation ch, having 2 dc at top point. Fasten off, leaving a long tail.
Fold foundation row in half. Sew to Hood using photograph as a guide.

Mane

Cut strands of MC and CC 15cm long.

Holding 2 strands each MC and CC tog, fold in half and knot into fringe across centre of Hood. Trim fringe evenly.


Small... check.

Start crocheting...

BUNNY BODY

Rnd 1: With coloured yarn, starting with a magic circle, work 6 dc in circle, pull circle tail tight, sl st into first dc. 6 dc

Rnd 2: 1 ch, work 2 dc in each st around, sl st into 1 ch. 12 dc

Rnd 3: 1 ch, 1 dc into first st, 2 dc into next st, (1 dc in next st, 2 dc in next st) around, sl st into first dc. 18 dc

Rnd 4: 1 ch, 1 dc in each of first 2 sts, 2 dc in next st, (dc in next 2 sts, 2 dc in next st) around, sl st into first dc. 24 dc

BUNNY HEAD

1 ch, work 1 htr into first st, tr in next st, dtr in next 4 sts, tr in next st, htr in next st, 1 ch, sl st into next st, sl st in each st around.

EARS

SI st in htr, sI st in tr, sI st in first dtr, *5 ch, in second ch from hook work htr, tr in next 3 chs,* sl st into top of third dtr from previous round, repeat from * to * sl st into htr after fourth dtr in previous round, 1 ch, sl st in next st, yrh and cut yarn with long tail.

SEWING EARS

Attach tail to needle. From back side of bunny, sew through the bottom - most tr

Hop to it and hook up one of these adorable appliqué bunnies!

of each ear to the head round to close the gap between the ears and the body. Secure tail on back side. Weave in beginning tail.

With cream or white yarn, leaving a long tail begin with a slipknot on hook, 2 ch, *yrh, insert hook into first ch, yrh, pull through, yrh, draw through 2 loops on hook; repeat from * three times so that there are 5 loops from hook, yrh, pull through all loops on hook, 1 ch to tighten stitch. Leaving a long tail, cut yarn and pull through loop on hook.


ATTACHING TAIL

Insert hook in spaces of first round (not centre of bunny), take one tail and pull through. Position tail as you like it, insert



hook and pull opposite tail through body. Tie a knot or two in tails on back side of bunny.

When making amigurumi dolls, always aim for tight stitches. A good way to do so without exhausting your hands is to make an "x" double crochet, by doing yarn under and then yarn over when working the stitch.

Sewing pins can be very handy; make sure to use them to place the pieces in the correct position before you start sewing.

To sew a hole closed of a stuffed piece, run the yarn tail through the needle and with it

pick up all the front loops of the last round worked. Pull tightly to close the hole and hide the yarn tail inside the piece.

The main parts of this pattern are worked in the amigurumi style, in a spiral without slip stitching or turning chains. Use a stitch marker or waste yarn to keep track of the first stitch of each round.

The scarf is worked in rows, turn your work at the end of the row, turning chains do not count as a stitch.

Start crocheting...

Head

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st to end. 12 sts

Rnd 3: *1 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 18 sts

Rnd 4: *2 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 24 sts

Rnd 5: *3 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 30 sts

Rnds 6-8: Dc around.

Rnd 9: 12 dc, [2 dc in FLO of next st] 6 times, dc to end. 36 sts

Rnd 10: 12 dc, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, dc to end. 42 sts

Rnds 11-15: Dc around.

Rnd 16: 12 dc, [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, dc to end. 36 sts

Rnd 17: 12 dc, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, dc to end. 42 sts

Rnd 18: 12 dc, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times, dc to end. 48 sts

Rnds 19-24: Dc around.

Rnd 25: 12 dc, [2 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, dc to end. 42 sts

Rnd 26: 12 dc, [1 dc, 1 dc2tog] 6 times, dc to end. 36 sts

Rnd 27: 12 dc, 6 dc2tog, 12 dc. *30 sts* Beg to stuff firmly and cont as you go.

Rnd 28: 12 dc, 6 dc in FLO, 12 dc.

Rnds 29-30: Dc around.

Rnd 31: *3 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. 24 sts

Rnd 32: *2 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. 18 sts

Rnd 33: *1 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. 12 sts

Rnd 34: 6 dc2tog. 6 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Sew hole closed with tail.

With CC3 and using photo as a guide, embroider the eyes 2 sts tall with the right eye between rnds 12 and 16, and the left eye between rnds 21 and 25. Try to embroider them at the same level and near the middle of the Head's height. Embroider a few lashes for each eye. With CC5, embroider a mouth between the eyes, 3 rnds wide.

Cheeks (make 2)

Rnd 1: With CC1 and working into a magic ring, 5 dc. *5 sts*

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st to end. 10 sts



Toy

SI st in next st to close spiral.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Sew Cheeks slightly below the eyes and 1 st away from them on either side.

Body

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st to end. 12 sts

Rnd 3: *1 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 18 sts

Rnd 4: *2 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 24 sts

Rnd 6: *4 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 36 sts

Rnd 7: *5 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 42 sts

Rnd 8: *6 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 48 sts

Rnd 9: *7 dc, 2 dc in next st, rep from * to end. 54 sts

Rnds 10-13: Dc around.

Rnd 14: *7 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. *48 sts*

Rnds 15-16: Dc around.

Rnd 17: *6 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. *42 sts*

Rnds 18-19: Dc around.

Rnd 20: *5 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. 36 sts

Rnd 21-22: Dc around.

Rnd 23: *4 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. 30 sts

Rnds 24-25: Dc around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Stuff Body firmly and flatten the bottom to sit on a surface. Pinch the opening to match the width of Head. Sew Body to Head between rnds 14 and 24.

Legs (make 2)

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st to end. 12 sts

Rnd 3: *1 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 18 sts

Rnd 4: *2 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. 24 sts

Rnds 5-10: Dc around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Stuff firmly. Sew Legs to each side of Body between rnds 7 and 14, with 8 sts between them at the front.

Arms (make 2)

Rnd 1: With MC and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st to end. 12 sts

Rnd 3: *3 dc, 2 dc in next st; rep from * to end. *15 sts*

Rnds 4-13: Dc around.

Rnd 14: *3 dc, 1 dc2tog; rep from * to end. 12 sts

Stuff lightly.

Flatten the opening and work 6 dc through both layers to close.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Sew Arms on each side of Body between rnds 19 and 24 and secure them with a stitch where they touch the Legs.

Scarf

Change colours on last yrh of last st before

colour change.

With CC1, chain 101.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook and working in back bumps, dc across. Turn. 100 sts

Change to CC2

Row 2: 1 ch, dc across. Turn.

Change to CC3

Row 3: 1 ch, dc across. Turn.

Change to CC4

Row 4: 1 ch, dc across. Turn.

Change to CC5

Row 5: 1 ch, dc across. Turn.

Change to CC6

Row 6: 1 ch, dc across.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Fasten off. 124 sts

Rnd 12: Join D with sl st in top of marked beg ch, 3 ch, 8 tr, 1 RtrF, 1 RhtrF, 2 htr into next 1ch-sp, 1 RhtrF, 1 RtrF, 1 RhtrF, 2 htr into next 1ch-sp, 1 RhtrF, 1 RtrF, 10 tr, 2 RdtrF, [3 dtr, 2 ch, 3 dtr] into next 2ch-sp, 2 RdtrF, 1 tr, *9 tr, 1 RtrF, 1 RhtrF, 2 htr into next 1ch-sp, 1 RhtrF, 1 RtrF, 1 RhtrF, 2 htr into next 1ch-sp, 1 RhtrF, 1 RtrF, 10 tr, 2 RdtrF, [3 dtr, 2 ch, 3 dtr] into next 2ch-sp, 2 RdtrF, 1 tr; rep from * to end, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 164 sts

Rnd 13: 1 ch, 1 dc in first st, 34 dc, *[2 dc, 1 picot, 2 dc] into next 2-ch sp, 3 dc, 1 picot, [5 dc, 1 picot] 7 times, 3 dc, [2 dc, 1 picot, 2 dc] into next 2-ch sp*, 41 dc; rep between * and * once more, 6 dc, join. Fasten off. 180 sts

Finishing

Weave in ends and block. Make 10 (2 for each of colours B-F) 7.5cm tassels. Attach one tassel in each picot on bottom of square. Weave in rem ends and slide dowel

Leaving end tail for sewing, weave in ends. With tail, sew 24 flowers onto each panel. Place the flowers randomly over the fabric. Allow the flowers to fall over each other and over the edges of the panel. Weave in any rem tails.



Row 2: 3 ch, 2 tr, *1 ch, miss 1 st, 5 tr; rep from * to last 4 sts, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 3 tr. Turn.

Row 3: 3 ch, 1 tr, *1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 3 tr; rep from * to end omitting last tr on last rep. Turn.

Row 4: 4 ch (counts as 1 tr, 1 ch), miss next st, 1 tr into 1ch-sp, 1 tr, 1 tr into 1chsp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr, *1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr into 1ch-sp, 1 tr, 1 tr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 tr; rep from * to end. Turn.

Row 5: 3 ch, tr in each tr and 1ch-sp across to beg 4 ch, 1 tr in 4th ch, 1 tr in 3rd ch. Turn.

Rows 6-19 (20, 20, 21, 21) (22, 22, 23,

23): 3 ch, tr across. Turn.

We will now work short rows to create shoulder panels.



Row 6: As Row 2. 16 (19, 25, 28, 31) (34, 37, 43, 46) sts

Row 7: As Row 3. 15 (18, 24, 27, 30) (33, 36, 42, 45) sts

Row 8: As Row 2. 14 (17, 23, 26, 29) (32, 35, 41, 44) sts

Fasten off, leave a long tail for seaming.

Left Shoulder

Row 1: With WS facing, join yarns with sl st in marked st, rm, 3 ch, tr across. Turn. *21* (24, 30, 33, 36) (39, 42, 48, 51) sts

Row 2: 3 ch, tr across to last 3 sts, 1 tr2tog, 1 tr. Turn. 20 (23, 29, 32, 35) (38, 41, 47, 50) sts

Row 3: 3 ch, 1 tr2tog, tr across. Turn. 19 (22, 28, 31, 34) (37, 40, 46, 49) sts

Row 4: As Row 2. 18 (21, 27, 30, 33) (36, 39, 45, 48) sts

Row 5: As Row 3. 17 (20, 26, 29, 32) (35, 38, 44, 47) sts

Row 6: As Row 2. 16 (19, 25, 28, 31) (34, 37, 43, 46) sts

Row 7: As Row 3. 15 (18, 24, 27, 30) (33, 36, 42, 45) sts

Row 8: As Row 2. 14 (17, 23, 26, 29) (32, 35, 41, 44) sts

Fasten off, leave a long tail for seaming.

Sleeve (make 2)

Holding one strand of each yarn tog, chain 39 (39, 45, 51, 51) (57, 57, 63, 69).

Row 1 (RS): Starting in 4th ch from hook, tr in back bump across. Turn. *37 (37, 43, 49, 49) (55, 55, 61, 67) sts*

Rows 2-5: As rows 2-5 of Body.

Rows 6-9: Rep rows 2-5.

Row 10: 3 ch, 1 tr in first st, tr across to last st, 2 tr in last st. Turn. 39 (39, 45, 51, 51) (57, 57, 63, 69) sts

Row 11: As Row 10. *41 (41, 47, 53, 53) (59, 59, 65, 71) sts*

Row 12: 3 ch, tr across. Turn.

Rows 13-18: Rep rows 10-12 twice. 49 (49, 55, 61, 61) (67, 67, 73, 79) sts

Next 1 (1, 1, 2, 2) (3, 3, 4, 4) row(s): 3 ch, tr across. Turn.

Fasten off, leave a long tail for seaming.

Finishing

Block each panel according to given measurements.

Using st markers, pin RS of Body panels tog. Using whip stitch, seam from bottom corner upwards, leaving 12 (13, 14, 15, 15) (16, 17, 18, 19) rows from top edge unseamed for armhole. Rep on other side.

Fold sleeve panel with RS tog. Using whip stitch, seam Sleeve into a tube.

Pin sleeve to armhole. Using whip stitch, seam Sleeve to Body panels. Rep for other Sleeve. Turn jumper the right way around so the RS is facing out. Using mattress stitch, seam shoulder sts. Rep for other shoulder.

Neckline

With RS facing, join both yarns held tog with sl st in first unworked st of Row 19 (20, 20, 21, 21) (22, 22, 23, 23) on the back panel, chain 6.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, sl st in the back bump across ch, [sl st in next st on Body] twice. Turn. *7 sts*

Row 2: Miss 2 sl sts, sl st in BLO across. 5 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, sl st in BLO across, [sl st in next st on Body] twice. *7 sts*Rep rows 2 and 3 around neckline. Fasten off.

Using mattress stitch, seam first and last

Waistband

rows of ribbing tog.

Join both yarns held tog with sl st in st after either seam at bottom edge of jumper, chain 11.

Row 1: As Row 1 of Neckline Ribbing. 12 sts

Row 2: Miss 2 sl sts, sl st in BLO across. 10 sts

Row 3: 1 ch, sl st in BLO across, [sl st in next st on Body] twice. *12 sts*Rep rows 2 and 3 around waist. Fasten off.

Using mattress stitch, seam first and last rows of ribbing tog.

Sleeve Cuff

Joining in st after seam and working joining sl sts into Sleeve, rep Waistband ribbing around end of each Sleeve.

Weave in ends.





Row 5: 1 ch, 2 dc, [1 RdtrF around tr 2 rows below, 1 dc] twice, *miss 3 sts, 2 RdtrF, 1 dc in 3rd of 3 missed sts, 2 RdtrF starting in first of 3 missed sts, 1 dc, [1 RdtrF around tr 2 rows below, 1 dc] twice; rep from * 14 times more, 1 dc. Turn.

Row 6: As Row 4.

Row 7: 1 ch, 2 dc, miss 2 sts, 1 RdtrF around next st, 1 dc in 2nd missed st, 1 RdtrF around first of 2 missed sts, 1 dc, *[2 RdtrF, 1 dc] twice, miss 2 sts, 1 RdtrF around next st, 1 dc in 2nd missed st, 1 RdtrF around first of 2 missed sts, 1 dc; rep from * 14 times more, 1 dc. Turn.







Row 1 (RS): Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 1 dc, miss 2 chs, 1 shellRS, miss 2 chs, 1 dc, miss 2 chs, [1 dtr, 2 tr] in last ch. Turn. 9 sts

Row 2: 1 ch (does not count as a st here and throughout), 2 dc, 1 shellWS in next dc, change to MC, 1 dc in 3rd st of next shell, 1 shellWS in last dc. Turn. 11 sts

Row 3: 4 ch (counts as a st), [2 tr, 1 htr] in 3rd ch from hook, miss first st, 1 dc, change to CC, 1 shellRS, miss 1 st, 1 dc, miss 2 sts, [1 dtr, 2 tr] in next dc, 1 tr. Turn. 14 sts

Note: Work the final dc2tog of Row 4 and all following WS rows over the last 2 sts of the Row.

Row 4: 1 ch, 3 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, change to MC, 1 dc2tog over last 2 sts. Turn. 13 sts

Row 5: 3 ch (counts as a st here and throughout), [2 tr, 1 htr] in first st, miss 1 st, 1 dc, change to CC, [1 shellRS, miss 1 st, 1 dc] twice. Turn. 15 sts

Row 12: 1 ch, 2 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, change to MC, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 17 sts

Row 13: 3 ch, [2 tr, 1 htr] in first st, miss 1 st, 1 dc, 1 shellRS, 1 dc, change to CC, 1 shellRS, 1 dc, miss 2 sts, [1 dtr, 2 tr] in next st, 1 tr. Turn. 19 sts

Row 14: 1 ch, 3 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, change to MC, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 18 sts

Row 15: 3 ch, [2 tr, 1 htr] in first st, miss 1 st, 1 dc, 1 shellRS, 1 dc, change to CC [1 shellRS, 1 dc] twice, working last dc in last st. Turn. 20 sts

Row 16: 3 ch, [1 tr, 1 dtr] in first st, miss 2 sts, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, change to MC, [1 dc, 1 shellWS] twice, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 19 sts

Row 17: 3 ch, [2 tr, 1 htr] in first st, miss 1 st, [1 dc, 1 shellRS] twice, change to CC, 1 dc, 1 shellRS, miss 1 st, 2 dc. Turn. 21 sts

Row 18: 3 ch, [2 tr, 1 dtr] in next st, miss 2 sts, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, change to MC, [1 dc, 1 shellWS] twice, 1 dc2tog. 20 sts

Row 19: 3 ch, [2 tr, 1 htr] in first st, miss 1 st, 1 dc, 1 shellRS, 1 dc, change to CC, [1 shellRS, 1 dc] twice, 2 dc. 22 sts

Row 20: 1 ch, 1 dc in first st, miss 1 st, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, change to MC, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc2tog. 21 sts

Row 21: 3 ch, [2 tr, 1 htr] in first st, miss 1 st, [1 dc, 1 shellRS] twice, change to CC, 1 dc, 1 shellRS, 1 dc, miss 2 sts, [1 dtr, 2 tr] in last st. Turn. 23 sts

Row 22: 1 ch, 2 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, change to MC, 1 shellWS, [1 dc, 1 shellWS] twice, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 22 sts



Row 23: 3 ch, [2 tr, 1 htr] in first st, miss 1 st, [1 dc, 1 shellRS] twice, 1 dc, change to CC, 1 shellRS, 1 dc, miss 2 sts, [1 dtr, 2 tr] in next st, 1 tr. Turn. 24 sts

Row 24: 1 ch, 3 dc, 1 shellWS, 1 dc, 1 shellWS, change to MC, [1 dc, 1 shellWS] twice, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 23 sts

Rows 25-74: Rep rows 15-24 five times more, working one more shell and dc in MC with each rep, as MC edge increase allows; keep number of CC sts as written to end.

On WS rows: Work an additional shellWS rep in patt until working last dc2tog.

On RS rows: Work MC shell reps in patt up to colour change as directed.

Fasten off. Do not fasten off on 2nd panel.

Making up

Place panels RS tog with Row 74 of both panels tog and sts aligned. Cont with MC and working through both layers, 36 dc to colour change, change to CC, dc to end. 48 sts Alternatively, sew up for an invisible seam. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Block to dimensions.

Special stitches

Asymmetrical shell on Right Side (shellRS): [1 dtr, 2 tr, 1 htr] in next dc **Asymmetrical shell on Wrong Side** (shellWS): [1 htr, 2 tr, 1 dtr] in next dc Take care over colour changes for a neat finish. For best results, leave the unused strand loose as you change colours – as you approach it on the following row, work over the loose strand on the final st in the alternate colour. Draw strand up to complete last loop of st, and cont in patt



We are so excited for Janine Myska's new book, Modern Crochet Sweaters, and were lucky enough to get an exclusive interview with Janine herself!



Hi Janine, thanks for speaking with us! Please tell us a little about you and your everyday life

I live in Winnipeg, Canada, with my partner Matt and our two dogs, Pancake and Joe. We bought our first house in 2020 and have been slowly renovating it together on the weekends! It is my absolute dream to be able to work from home every day, writing patterns and creating all kinds of knitting and crochet content for a living. I create and release patterns independently and work with yarn companies to develop patterns for new yarn lines.

Congratulations on your new book, Modern Crochet Sweaters! Tell us about how you came to write this book

Thank you! After the concept of a potential book was introduced to me, I knew right away that it should be a crochet sweater book. They are my favourite things to make and design and have always been the most popular category with my audience. I think that much of the growth of my business over the last few years can be attributed to writing patterns with inclusive sizing from XS-5X, which was not very common among pattern designers at the time. I knew the book had to be size-inclusive as well. For many of these patterns, I asked my audience on Instagram to design the sweaters with me through polls and questionnaires asking for their input. It was a fun way to come up with new sweater patterns together!

What was your aim when bringing this fabulous collection together?


My goal in writing this book was to bring forward a size-inclusive collection of wearable crochet patterns with a store-bought look that can be incorporated into an everyday wardrobe. Beautifully fitting sweaters are for everybody, and each pattern was thoughtfully graded to suit a range of bodies, from a 28-62" bust. You'll find customisation tips within each pattern to help you achieve the best possible fit for your unique body measurements. No size is an afterthought; I want you to feel as though this book was written just for you. There is an accompanying blog post for each design in the book which lists yarn substitutions, customisation ideas, and showcases all the tester photos so you can see how the sweater looks on a range of bodies. I had over 500 pattern testers for this book to make sure that each size fits its intended wearer in a way that makes them feel beautiful!

Which project is your favourite in the collection, and why?

My favourite project in the book changes depending on the day, but right now I'm really loving the clean and sophisticated look of the Lakeside Mist cardigan. This piece features a unique sideways construction, a pretty texture, and statement ribbing around the collar, sleeve cuffs, and bottom hem that really brings this simple design to the next level. This is one of the most versatile pieces in the book, with a lot of customisation options within the pattern. This pattern (along with each pattern in the book) is also available independently on my website (www. knitsnknots.ca) and most pattern-selling platforms.

What makes crochet and designing crochet garments special for you?

With crochet specifically, I love the freedom of stitch placement. Since there is only one live stitch at any given moment, you are free

to place new stitches wherever you like. You can make decisions on the fly, whereas knitting requires a little more planning since you are working with so many live stitches. When I'm writing a garment pattern, I recognise that everybody has certain styles or certain elements of clothing that they feel more comfortable in (sweater length, sleeve length, neckline depth, etc), so I like to incorporate tips and tricks throughout the pattern on how to adjust most of these elements to ensure the crocheter can make modifications if they so choose. That is the empowering thing about crocheting your own clothes – you can make something that fits your body perfectly.

Are you working on anything else exciting at the moment you want to tell our readers about?

2022 will be filled with so many brand-new patterns, but I've also got a hand-dyed yarn collection that releases in the spring with a few accompanying patterns! I converted part of my basement into a dye studio early last year and have been slowly preparing for this yarn launch, so stay tuned for that!

Sizing

XS (S/M/L, XL/2X/3X, 4X/5X) Designed to be worn with 20-64cm positive ease, if between sizes, size down A: 124 (142, 160, 178) cm B: 74cm C (unfolded): 15.5cm

Note that when working PS, you will find it helpful to pull your loops up a little bit to make it easier to pull through all the loops on your hook.

Make sure you check your tension for the Turtleneck as well. Use whatever hook allows you to achieve the turtleneck tension, or your desired fit for the turtleneck. You might match tension with the same hook, or you might need to use a different hook to achieve the proper tension for this ribbed turtleneck.

For a shorter (or taller) turtleneck than the sample shown, work fewer (or additional) chains as you see fit.

This poncho has a circular yoke construction, worked from the top down. To make the Infinite Prairies poncho, you begin with the turtleneck, and then work the puff stitch pattern in joined rounds, increasing every few rounds until reaching the depth at which you will place the armholes. Next, two separate sections are worked to create space for the arms, and then re-joined to work in rounds until your desired length.

Beg 2 ch does not count as a st.

Start crocheting...

Turtleneck

Chain 21, leaving a 30cm tail for seaming the turtleneck.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, dc across. Turn. 20 sts

Row 2: 1 ch, dc in BLO across. Turn. Rep Row 2 until you have a total of 56 rows completed.

Rotate your work to begin working across the row ends.

Joining Rnd: 1 ch, work 1 dc into the ends of each row of ribbing, then bring your first and last st tog to form a tube, join with sl st to beg dc. Turn. 56 dc

With tapestry needle and beg tail, seam turtleneck closed using the whip stitch or seaming method of your choice.

Body

Rnd 1: 2 ch, 1 (2, 3, 3) tr, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] in next st, {6 tr, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] in next st} 7 times, 5 (4, 3, 3) tr, join with sl st to beg tr. Turn. 48 tr, 16 PS

Rnd 2 (Increase Rnd): 2 ch, {tr across to next PS, 1 tr in next PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, 1 tr in next PS} 8 times, tr to end of rnd, join with sl st to beg tr. Turn. 64 tr. 16 PS

Rnd 3: 2 ch, {tr across to next PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS) 8 times, tr to end of rnd, join with sl st to beg tr. Turn.

Rep rnds 2-3 two (three, four, five) times more. 96 (112, 128, 144) tr, 16 PS There is now a total of 7 (9, 11, 13) rnds and 12 (14, 16, 18) tr in between each PS. Rep Rnd 3 seven (five, four, two) times more. There is now a total of 14 (14, 15, 15) rnds completed.

Split for Sleeve Opening

Section 1

To create sleeve openings without interrupting the st patt, you will work two sections in back and forth rows, creating two armhole openings, and then connect them again to close up the armholes.

ALL SIZES:

Row 15 (15, 16, 16): 2 ch, tr across to first PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS, {tr across to next PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS} 5 times, 4 (6, 8, 9) tr, leave rem sts unworked, pm in next st (you will return to this in Section 2). Turn. 68 (82, 96, 108) tr, 12 PS

Rows 16 (16, 17, 17)–27: 2 ch, tr across to first PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS, {tr across to next PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS} 5 times, tr to end of row. Turn.

Pull up this live loop and put a st marker in it to hold it in place. You will come back to it after completing Section 2. When you return to this live loop, you will continue working in the same direction as Row 27, working over Section 2.

Section 2

To create Section 2, lay your work out flat with the unworked section of Row 15 facing you. You are going to join yarn in marked st (the 2nd available st from the RH side), leaving 1 st unworked after the first completed section.

Row 15 (15, 16, 16): With new ball, join with sl st in 2nd st from the first section, leaving 1 st unworked between Sections 1 and 2, 2 ch, *tr across to next PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS; rep from * once more, tr across to last st, miss last st to have 1 st unworked between Section 1 and Section 2. Turn. 26 (28, 30, 34) tr, 4 PS

Rows 16 (16, 17, 17)–26: 2 ch, *tr across to first PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS; rep from * once more, tr to end of row. Turn.

Fasten off.

Insert hook into st on hold from Section 1. At this point, you have worked Row 27

over Section 1, but have not yet worked Row 27 over Section 2. Now you are going to cont Row 27, working over Section 2.

Row 27: 1 ch, 1 tr in first tr in Section 2, *tr across to next PS, miss PS, [1 PS, 2 ch, 1 PS] into 2ch-sp, miss next PS; rep from * once more, tr to end of row, 1 ch, join with sl st to beg tr from Row 27-Section 1. Turn.

Rnd 28: Rep Rnd 3, working 1 tr into each 1ch-sp. 96 (112, 128, 144) tr, 16 PS

Rnds 29-44: Rep Rnd 3.

For a shorter (or longer) poncho, work fewer (or additional) reps of Row 3 until reaching your desired length.

Fasten off.


Finishing Armhole Openings

Rnd 1: Join with sl st to bottom of armhole opening, 1 ch, dc evenly around armhole opening, working approximately 2 dc in each row end, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off.

Rep for 2nd armhole. Weave in ends.





Working the raindrops after the main piece is complete simplifies the work involved and allows for the raindrops to be spaced slightly differently according to the size made, based on maker's judgement.

Start crocheting...

Jumper

Jumper is worked in rnds from the top of the yoke downwards. Join each rnd with a sl st in first st.

Rnd 1: With B, 80 (88, 96, 104) ftr, join with sl st in first ftr to work in the rnd. 80 (88, 96, 104) sts

Fasten off B.

Rnd 2: Join A with sl st in first st, 3 ch (does not counts as a st here and throughout), *24 (26, 28, 30) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] in next st, 14 (16, 18, 20) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] in next st; rep from * once more, join. 84 (92, 100, 108) sts

Rnd 3: 3 ch, 25 (27, 29, 31) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 16 (18, 20, 22) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 26 (28, 30, 32) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 16 (18, 20, 22) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 1 tr, join. 92 (100, 108, 116) sts

Rnd 4: 3 ch, 26 (28, 30, 32) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 18 (20, 22, 24) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 28 (30, 32, 34) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 18 (20, 22, 24) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 2 tr, join. 100 (108, 116, 124) sts

Rnd 5: 3 ch, 27 (29, 31, 33) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 20 (22, 24, 26) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 30 (32, 34, 36) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 20 (22, 24, 26) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 3 tr, join. 108 (116, 124, 132) sts

Rnd 6: 3 ch, 28 (30, 32, 34) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1

Special stitches

Foundation treble crochet (ftr): 3 ch, yrh, insert hook in 3rd ch from hook, *yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 1 loop on hook (ch made), [yrh, draw through 2 loops] twice (tr made)**, yrh, insert hook in last ch made; rep from * for number of sts required, ending last rep at ** 5 treble cluster (5trcl): [Yrh, insert hook in indicated st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops] 5 times in same st, yrh, draw through all 6 loops on hook **Surface sl st:** Holding working yarn behind piece and hook in front of piece, insert hook through piece, place slipknot on hook, draw through piece, *insert hook through piece (in next st), yrh, draw yarn through piece and loop on hook (as a sl st); rep from * as needed



Rnd 8: 3 ch, 30 (32, 34, 36) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch,

1 tr] into ch-sp, 26 (28, 30, 32) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 36 (38, 40, 42) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 26 (28, 30, 32) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 6 tr, join. 132 (140, 148, 156) sts

Rnd 9: 3 ch, 31 (33, 35, 37) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 28 (30, 32, 34) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 38 (40, 42, 44) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 28 (30, 32, 34) tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, 1 tr] into ch-sp, 7 tr, join. 140 (148, 156, 164) sts



Baby

Divide for sleeves

Rnd 10: 3 ch, 32 (34, 36, 38) tr, 1 tr through ch-sp and next ch-sp at the same time, missing 30 (32, 34, 36) sts for sleeve, 40 (42, 44, 46) tr, 1 tr through ch-sp and next ch-sp at the same time, missing 30 (32, 34, 36) sts for sleeve, 8 tr, join. 82 (86, 90, 94) sts

Rnds 11-30 (32, 34, 36): 3 ch, tr around, join.

Rnd 31 (33, 35, 37): With B, 3 ch, tr around, join.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Sleeves (Work both alike)

Rejoin A in centre st of underarm.

Rnds 1-18 (20, 22, 24): 3 ch, 30 (32, 34, 36) tr, join.

Rnd 19 (21, 23, 25): With B, 3 ch, tr around, join.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Sun

Rnd 1: With C and working into a magic ring, 6 dc.

Rnd 2: 2 dc in each st around. 12 sts Rnd 3: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 18 sts

Rnd 4: [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 24 sts

Rnd 5: [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 30 sts

Rnd 6: [4 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 36 sts Rnd 7: SI st in each st around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Cloud

With B, chain 28.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 27 dc. Turn.

Row 2: 2 dc in first st, dc in each st to last st, 2 dc in last st. Turn. *29 sts*

Row 3: As Row 2. 31 sts

Row 4-6: 1 ch, dc across. Turn.

Row 7: 1 dc2tog, 7 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn, leaving rem sts unworked. 9 sts

Row 8: 1 dc2tog, 5 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 7 sts

Row 9: 1 dc2tog, 3 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 5 sts

Row 10: 1 dc2tog, 1 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 3 sts Fasten off.

Miss first 9 unworked sts on Row 6, join with sl st in next st, rep rows 7-10.
Fasten off. Rejoin B in first unworked st of Row 6.

Rows 7-10: 1 ch, 9 dc.

Row 11: 1 dc2tog, 5 dc, 1 dc2tog. **Row 12:** 1 dc2tog, 3 dc, 1 dc2tog.

Row 13: 1 dc2tog, 1 dc, 1 dc2tog.

SI st around edge of shape.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing. Using photo as a guide, with tapestry



needle and tail ends, sew Sun onto Jumper, then sew Cloud overlapping it. With C, surface sl st 5 lines radiating outwards from the Sun to represent sun rays.


Raindrops

With C, D and E, and using photo as a guide

for placement and colours, create raindrops by joining yarn around the post of a st, 3 ch, work a 5trcl around the same post, sl st to same post. Fasten off and, with a tapestry needle, take both ends to the back of the work, knot together to secure, and weave in. Rep this for each of the 10 raindrops.

Row 2: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 1 ch, miss 1 st,

[7 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st] 3 times, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 35 sts

Row 3: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 1 htr into 1chsp, [1 ch, miss 1 st, 5 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr] 3 times, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 33 sts

Row 4: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 1 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, [3 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st] twice, 3 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 htr, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 33 sts

Row 5: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 2 htr, [1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 3 htr] twice, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 2 htr, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 33 sts

Row 6: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 3 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, [1 htr into 1chsp, 5 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st] twice, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 3 htr, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 36 sts

Row 7: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 3 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st, [1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 5 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st] twice, 1 htr into

1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 3 htr, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 33 sts

Row 8: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 2 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st, [1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 3 htr, 1 ch, miss 1 st] twice, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 2 htr, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 33 sts

Row 9: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 1 htr, [1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 3 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st, 1 htr] 3 times, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 33 sts


Row 10: 2 ch, 6 htr in BLO, 1 ch, miss 1 st, [1 htr into 1ch-sp, 5 htr, 1 htr into 1ch-sp, 1 ch, miss 1 st] 3 times, 7 htr in BLO. Turn. 35 sts

Rep rows 3-10 nineteen times more, then rep rows 3-9 once more. Fasten off, leaving a long tail.

Making up

Fold in half and lay short ends tog with sts aligned. Sew seam, fasten off and : weave in ends. 🏶

About the yarn

DK; 112m per 50g ball; 100% Falkland Islands Wool

Tension

Completed square measures 10cm

Hook used

4mm

Sizing

Finished blanket measures 115x90cm, not including fringe

The blanket is made up of a 9x9 block of granny and rainbow motif squares, then granny stripes are added to two ends to create a rectangle shape. The piece is then embellished with fringe using all four yarn colours.

Beg 2 ch counts as first dc, join at end of rnd in top of beg 2 ch.

Beg 3 ch counts as first tr, join at end of rnd in top of beg 3 ch.

Beg 5 ch counts as first tr and 2ch-sp, join at end of rnd in 3rd of beg 5 ch.

Weave in ends as you go or work them into the seams.

Start crocheting...

Granny Square (make 65: 21 in C and 22 each in B & D)

Chain 4, join with sl st to form a ring. Rnd 1: Working into ring, 3 ch, 2 tr, 2 ch, [3 tr, 2 ch] 3 times, join. 12 sts

Rnd 2: SI st across to first 2ch-sp, [sl st, 5 ch, 3 tr] into first 2ch-sp, 1 ch, *[3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into next corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * twice more, 2 tr into first 2ch-sp to complete corner, join. 24 sts

Rnd 3: [Sl st, 5 ch, 3 tr] into first 2-ch sp, 1 ch, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch, *[3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into next corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * twice more, 2 tr into first 2ch-sp, join. 36 sts

Rnd 4: [Sl st, 5 ch, 3 tr] into first 2ch-sp, [1 ch, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp] twice, 1 ch, *[3 tr, 2 ch, 3 tr] into next corner 2ch-sp, [1 ch, 3 tr into next 1ch-sp] twice, 1 ch; rep from * twice more, 2 tr into first 2ch-sp, join. 48 sts

Rnd 5: [Sl st, 1 ch (counts as dc), 2 dc, 2 ch, 3 dc] into first 2ch-sp, [1 ch, 3 dc into next 1ch-sp] 3 times, *1 ch, [3 dc, 2 ch, 3 dc] into corner 2ch-sp, [1 ch, 3 dc into next 1ch-sp] 3 times; rep from * twice more, join with sl st in beg 1 ch. Fasten off. 15 sts, 4 1ch-sps per side

Rainbow Square (make 16)

With A, chain 4, sl st to first ch to form a ring. **Rnd 1:** Working into ring, 3 ch, 11 tr, join. 12 sts

Rnd 2: 2 ch, [2 dc in next st] 5 times, change to B (work over A), [2 dc in next st] 6 times, change to A, join. Fasten off B. 24 sts

Rnd 3: [2 ch, 1 dc] in first st, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 5 times, 1 dc, change to C (work over A), [2 dc in BLO of next st, 1 dc in BLO] 6 times, change to A, join. Fasten off C. 36 sts

Rnd 4: [2 ch, 1 dc] in first st, [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 5 times, 2 dc, change to D (work over A), [2 dc in BLO of next st, 2 dc in BLO] 6 times, change to A, join. Fasten off D. 48 sts

Rnd 5: 2 ch, 2 dc, 2 htr, 1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr, 2 htr, 6 dc, 2 htr, 1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr, 2 htr, 3 dc, work rem sts in BLO, 3 dc, 2 htr, 1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr, 2 htr, 6 dc, 2 htr, 1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr, 2 htr, 3 dc, join.

Rnd 6: 3 ch, 5 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into corner 2ch-sp, *12 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into corner 2ch-sp; rep from * twice more, 6 tr, join. 56 sts

Rnd 7: 3 ch, 6 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into corner 2ch-sp, *14 tr, [1 tr, 2 ch, 1 tr] into corner 2ch-sp; rep from * twice more, 7 tr, join. 64 sts, 16 sts per side

Block all squares to measure 10cm.

Joining

Arrange squares into one large 9x9 square, referring to photograph as a guide. Join squares in rows, first horizontally then vertically, using a dc seam as follows: Hold 2 adjoining squares with WS tog (seam will

show on RS), with A and starting in 2chsp, dc across edge, working through both pieces at the same time and ending in next 2ch-sp; when joining a Granny Square with a Rainbow Square, miss the first, third and fourth 1ch-sps on the Granny Square to match the st count of the rainbow square, this will give an even finish.

Edging

Row 1: Join A with sl st in 2ch-sp of top RH square, 3 ch, 1 tr into same 2ch-sp, 1 ch, *[3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch] 4 times, 1 tr into next 2ch-sp, 1 tr in dc seam, 1 tr into next corner 2ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * 7 times more, [3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch] 4 times, 2 tr into last corner 2ch-sp. Turn.

Row 2: 3 ch, 1 tr, 1 tr into first 1ch-sp, 1 ch, *3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * to last 1ch-sp, 1 tr into last 1ch-sp, 2 tr. Turn. Fasten off.

Row 3: Join B with sl st in first st, [3 ch, 1 tr] in first st, 1 ch, *3 tr into next 1ch-sp, 1 ch; rep from * to last 3 sts, miss 2 sts, 2 tr in last st. Turn.

Row 4: As Row 2.

Rows 5-6: With C, as rows 3-4. **Rows 7-8:** With D, as rows 3-4.

Fasten off.

Rep rows 1-8 on the opposite side of blanket. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Border

Join A with sl st in first st of either Granny Edge, 1 ch, evenly dc around all sides, join with sl st to beg dc. Fasten off.

Fringe (optional)

For Rainbow Squares, cut 32 lengths each of B, C and D, each 8cm long. Make a Lark's Head Knot on each corresponding rainbow end.

For top and bottom of blanket, cut 16cm lengths: 116 in A, 24 in B and 22 each in C and D. Pair each length with an additional length of A (for 2 lengths each), make a Lark's Head Knot in every 4th st on short sides.

Special stitches

Lark's Head Knot: Fold 2 lengths of yarn in half, insert hook into indicated st and into loop created by fold, pull loop partially through st, bring ends of yarn through loop and pull tightly to secure



About the yarn

4-ply; 125m per 50g ball; 100% cotton

Tension

13 sts x 16 rows = 5 cm measured over dc

Hook used

2.5mm

Other supplies

toy stuffing 1 pair of safety eyes, 7mm tapestry needle stitch markers black stranded cotton

Sizing

25cm tall x 12cm wide

Tension is not critical for this project, but sts should be tight enough to avoid stuffing showing through.

When you sew pieces together, pin them in place first so that you can see if you like the position before you sew.

When you sew the laces on, don't fasten off until you have done both boots, so you can make sure that they match.

Start crocheting...

This pattern is worked in the amigurumi style, in a spiral without slip stitching or turning chains. Use a stitch marker or waste yarn to keep track of the first stitch of each round.

Head

Rnd 1: With A and working into a magic ring, 6 dc. 6 sts

Rnd 2: [2 dc in next st] 6 times. 12 sts

Rnd 3: [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 18 sts

Rnd 4: [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 24 sts

Rnd 5: [3 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. *30 sts*

Rnd 6: [4 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 36 sts

Rnd 7: [5 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 42 sts

Rnd 8: [6 dc, 2 dc in next st] 6 times. 48 sts

Rnds 9-16: Dc around.

Rnd 17: 18 dc, 2 dc in next st, 9 dc, 2 dc in next st, 19 dc. 50 sts

Rnd 18: 24 dc, 1 bbl, 25 dc. Push bbl to RS to make the nose.

Rnds 19-20: Dc around.

Rnd 21: 18 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 9 dc, 1

inv-dc2tog, 19 dc. 48 sts

Rnd 22: [6 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 42 sts

Rnd 23: [5 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 36 sts

Rnd 24: [4 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times.

30 sts

Rnd 25: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times.

24 sts

Secure the safety eyes in the gap between rnds 16 and 17, above the increases of Rnd 17 with 9 sts between the eyes, then stuff Head.

Rnd 26: [2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 18 sts

Rnd 27: [1 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 12 sts

Rnd 28: 6 inv-dc2tog. 6 sts Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Arms (make 2)

Rnds 1-2: With A, rep rnds 1-2 of Head.

Rnds 3-4: Dc around. 12 sts

Rnd 5: 11 dc, 1 PC (thumb made).

Rnd 6: 11 dc, 1 dc in PC.

Rnd 7: [1 inv-dc2tog, 4 dc] twice. *10 sts*

Change to D, fasten off A.

Rnd 8: [2 dc in next st, 4 dc] twice. *12 sts*

Rnds 9-10: Dc around.

Rnd 11: [2 dc in next st, 5 dc] twice. 14 sts

Rnds 12-19: Dc around.

Rnd 20: [6 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice. *16 sts*

Fasten off.



Toy

Skates (make 2)

With B, chain 6.

Rnd 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 4 dc, 3 dc in next ch, rotating as you go, work in the other side of the chain, 3 dc, 2 dc in next ch. *12 sts*

Rnd 2: {2 dc in next st, 3 dc, [2 dc in next st] twice} 2 times. 18 sts

Rnd 3: {1 dc, 2 dc in next st, 3 dc, [1 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice} 2 times. *24 sts*

Rnd 4: Dc in BLO around. Rnds 5-7: Dc around.

Rnd 8: 7 dc, 4 inv-dc2tog, 9 dc. 20 sts Rnd 9: 7 dc, 2 inv-dc2tog, 9 dc. 18 sts Rnd 10: [8 dc in FLO. 2 dc in FLO of nex

Rnd 10: [8 dc in FLO, 2 dc in FLO of next

st] 2 times. 20 sts

Rnds 11-12: Dc around.

Fasten off. Weave in ends.

Legs (make 2)

Rnd 1: Join C with sl st to first back loop on Rnd 9, starting in same st as join, dc in BLO around. 18 sts

Rnds 2-14: Dc around. *18 sts*

Rnd 15: 5 dc, 2 dc in next st, 8 dc, 2 dc in

next st, 3 dc. *20 sts* **Rnds 16-17:** Dc around.

Fasten off. Stuff Skates and lower Legs.

Blades (make 2)

With C, chain 11.

Rnd 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 9 dc, 2 dc in next ch, rotating as you go, work in the other side of the chain, 9 dc. 20 sts

Rnd 2: Dc around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Sew Blade to bottom of Skate. With C, embroider laces onto the front of each Skate, using photograph as a guide.

Body

With C, join Legs tog by placing both feet facing in the same direction, join with sl st in the inside st of the right Leg (doll's perspective) and the corresponding st of the left Leg at the same time. Each rnd will beg at the centre back of the doll.

Rnd 1: Begin working around the left Leg, 19 dc, move to the next unworked st of the right Leg, 19 dc, miss the joining st. 38 sts

Rnd 2: [2 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, 26 dc, [2 dc in next st, 2 dc] twice. *42 sts*

Rnds 3-8: Dc around.

Rnd 9: [2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] twice, 3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 18 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog. 36 sts
Change to D, fasten off C.

Rnds 10-11: Dc around.



Rnd 12: Working in BLO, 10 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 16 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 6 dc. 34 sts

Rnds 13-14: Dc around.

Rnd 15: 9 dc, join Arm to Body by working through from the WS of Arm (make sure the thumb is facing forwards) and the RS of Body (working through 2 layers), 3 dc in both Arm and Body, 14 dc in Body, 3 dc in both 2nd Arm and Body, 5 dc in Body.

Rnd 16: 9 dc, miss 3 joining sts, 13 dc in unworked sts of Arm, 14 dc in Body, miss 3 joining sts, 13 dc in unworked sts of Arm, 5 dc in body. *54 sts*

Rnds 17-19: Dc around.

Rnd 20: [7 dc, 2 inv-dc2tog, 9 dc, 2 inv-dc2tog, 3 dc] twice. 46 sts

Rnd 21: [7 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 9 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog, 3 dc] twice. *42 sts*

Rnd 22: [5 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 36 sts Rnd 23: [4 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 30 sts Change to A, fasten off D.

Rnd 24: [3 dc in BLO, 1 inv-dc2tog in BLO] 6 times. *24 sts*

Finish stuffing Body.

Rnd 25: [2 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 18 sts

Rnd 26: [4 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 3 times. 15 sts

Rnd 27: Dc around.

Rnd 28: 4 dc, 1 sl st, leave rem sts unworked. 5 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Sew the neck to the base of Head, making sure to stuff the neck well before closing. Weave in ends. Using black stranded cotton, embroider eyebrows, eyelashes and mouth.

Hair

Rnds 1-8: With E, rep rnds 1-8 of Head.

Rnd 9: [15 dc, 2 dc in next st] 3 times. 51 sts

Rnds 10-14; Dc around.

Rnd 15: 8 dc, 2 dc in next st, [16 dc, 2 dc in next st] twice, 8 dc. *54 sts*

Rnds 16-17: Dc around.

Rnd 18: 5 dc, 6 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook (here and throughout), 5 dc across ch, 16 dc, [7 ch, 6 dc across ch, 2 dc] 6 times, 16 dc, 6 ch, 5 dc across ch, 5 dc. 100 sts

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Use tail to sew Hair onto Head so that the long hairs are at the front to create the fringe. Tack down the fringe at the end of each hair. Weave in ends.

Bun

Rnds 1-5: With E, rep rnds 1-5 of Head.

Rnd 6: Dc around. 30 sts

Rnd 7: [3 dc, 1 inv-dc2tog] 6 times. 24 sts

Rnd 8: [8 ch, starting in 2nd ch from hook,

7 dc across ch, 4 dc] 6 times. 66 sts Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Sew Bun to the crown of Head, stuffing lightly as you go. Weave in ends.

Skirt

Holding Body upside down, join D with sl st to the first front loop on Rnd 11 of Body.

Rnd 1: [3 dc, 3 dc in next st] 9 times. *54 sts* **Rnd 2:** 4 dc, [2 dc in next st, 5 dc] 8 times, 2

Rnds 3-13: Dc around.

dc in next st, 1 dc. 63 sts

Fasten off and weave in the ends.

Headband

With B, chain 9.

Row 1: Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 8 dc. Turn. 8 sts

Rows 2-52: 1 ch (does not count as st), do in each st across. Turn.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail. Sew the short sides of Headband tog and weave in the ends. In the middle of the Headband (Row 26) sew a running st through the sts and pull tight to gather the sts tog, secure the gathering stitches with a knot and securely weave in ends. With D, embroider stars onto Headband.



About the yarn

Aran; 85m per 50g ball; 100% cotton

Hook used

5mm

Other supplies

tapestry needle 2 x 25cm lengths of 5mm wooden dowel

Sizing

30cm high x 22cm wide

The cotton yarn for this weave provides strength and stability.

Start crocheting...

Crochet base (Fig. 1)

With A, chain 42, leaving a 30cm beg tail. Row 1: Starting in 4th ch from hook, tr

across. Turn. 40 sts

Row 2: 3 ch, tr across. Turn.

Row 3: 3 ch, working in FLO, 1 tr, [1 tr, 1 ch,

miss 1 st] 17 times, 4 tr. Turn.

Row 4: 3 ch, 1 tr, [1 tr, 1 ch, miss 1 st] 17 times, 4 tr. Turn.

Rows 5-19: Rep Row 4.

Row 20: 3 ch, working in BLO of sts and chs, tr across. Turn.

Row 21: 3 ch, tr across.

Cut yarn leaving a long 30cm tail, and fasten off with a sl st.

Rya Knots

Fold a length of yarn in half and place the midpoint on top of one ch-sp, wrap the ends of the yarn around the two tr and into the ch-sps either side, to the back of the work. (Fig. 2) Finally, pull the two ends to the front through the middle ch-sp, pull gently to tighten. (Fig. 3)

Loops

Holding a length of yarn firmly behind the work, insert a crochet hook into the first ch-sp, yrh, then pull up a loop to the front of the work, without pulling the yarn tail all the way through to the front. Remove your crochet hook, leaving your loop in place. If your loop does not stay put, double or triple up your yarn to create a thicker loop. Rep in the next ch-sp along, or in every 2nd/3rd ch-sp etc, depending on the thickness of your yarn. (Fig. 4)























Row 8: With E, tabby weave.

Row 9: With E, cut 11 x 15cm lengths. Place 6 rya knots evenly across the row. Trim knots ends to 3cm.

Rows 10-11: With E, tabby weave.

Rows 12-13: With B, cut 3 x 2m lengths and hold triple, tabby weave.

Rows 14-16: With D, cut 2 x 1m lengths, create a soumak over these 3 rows.

Row 17: With C, cut 2 x 1m lengths and hold double, create a loop in every ch-sp.

Rows 18-19: With B held triple, tabby weave.

Tabby Weave

(Fig. 5) Cut a length of yarn 2-3 times as wide as your crochet weave, then thread your yarn onto a large yarn needle. Starting from the back of the work, weave the yarn in and out of the ch-sps. If when you reach the end of the row you are on top of the work, come down on the other side of the nearest tr.

Soumak

(Fig. 6) A soumak is made by weaving diagonally from the first row into the second row below, then diagonally in the opposite direction from the second to third row. Choose 3 rows to work across and start top left. Bring your yarn to the front of the work in Row 1, then down to the back of the work in Row 2, choosing a ch-sp that

is not directly below, but on a diagonal. Rep until the end of the rows 1 and 2.

(Fig. 7) To make the second line, start on the far right of Row 2, and bring your yarn to the front of the work, then down to the back of the work through a ch-sp in Row 3. Work diagonally along rows 2-3 in the opposite direction to rows 1-2.

Weave pattern

Using your crochet as a base with the unworked loops of rows 3 and 20 on the WS of the work, weave as follows:

Row 3: With C, cut 17 x 35cm lengths and make a rya knot in every ch-sp. Trim knot ends to 12cm.

Row 4: With E, create a loop in each ch-sp. **Rows 5-7:** With B, cut 3 x 2m lengths and hold triple, tabby weave.

Making up


Step 1: Once your weave is complete, secure any ends on the back of your work by tucking them in or tying off and cutting. Leave the two long crochet tail ends.

Step 2: (Figs. 11 & 12) Place your weave wrong-side up and lay the two wooden dowels on top of crochet rows 1-2 and 20-21. Using the long yarn tail, whip stitch through each st on Row 1 to the unworked loops from Row 3, encasing the dowel inside these two rows.

Step 3: Rep Step 2 for Row 21 and the unworked loops from Row 20. Secure ends by weaving in and trimming any excess.

Step 4: Finally, tie a 30cm piece of yarn to either end of the top dowel to hang your weave from.











Special stitches

Bobble (bbl): [Yrh, insert hook into st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops] 4 times into same stitch, yrh, draw through all 5 loops on hook

Rows 12-16: 1 ch, dc across. Turn.

Row 17: 1 ch, 9 dc, [1 bbl in CC3, 7 dc in MC] 5 times, 1 dc. Turn.

Rows 18-19: 1 ch, dc across. Turn.

Row 20: 1 ch, 48 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 49 sts

Row 21: 1 ch, 47 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. 48 sts

Row 22: 1 ch, 46 dc, 1 dc2tog. Turn. *47 sts*

Row 23: 1 ch, 11 dc, [1 bbl in CC4, 7 dc in





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

Sometimes our tension becomes looser as

we relax into a pattern we have become used to – this may cause some puckering the larger the blanket becomes, preventing a neat flat shape when finished. If you find this happening, you can either go down a hook size or try increasing every other rnd on the last few colours.

For a smaller blanket, you can try working fewer rnds per colour or try making the blanket in just 1 or 2 colours.

Start crocheting...

With B, chain 5. Join with sl st in 5th ch from hook to form a ring.

Rnd 1 (RS): 1 ch (does not count as a st), 14 dc into ring, join with sl st to beg dc. 14 sts

Rnd 2: Beg cl in first st, [3 ch, miss 1 st, 1 cl] 6 times, 3 ch, miss 1 st, join with sl st to beg cl. Fasten off. 7 cl

Rnd 3: Join A with sl st in any 3ch-sp, 6 ch (counts as 1 tr, 3 ch), [1 tr into next 3chsp, 3 ch] 6 times, join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg 6 ch. 7 sts, 7 ch-sps

Rnd 4: 3 ch (counts as first tr here and throughout), 2 tr in same st as join, [2 ch, 3 tr in next st] 6 times, 2 ch, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 21 sts, 7 ch-sps

Rnd 5: 3 ch, 3 tr in next (centre) st, 1 tr, 2

ch, miss 2ch-sp, [1 tr, 3 tr in next (centre) st, 1 tr, 2 ch, miss 2ch-sp] 6 times, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 35 sts, 7 ch-sps

Rnd 6: 3 ch, [tr across to centre st, 3 tr in centre st, tr across to next 2ch-sp, 2 ch, miss 2ch-sp] 7 times, join with sl st in top of beg 3 ch. 14 sts inc'd

Rep Rnd 6 until there are a total of 8 rnds in A. Fasten off.

Join B with sl st in first st after any 2ch-sp, rep Rnd 6 eight times. Fasten off. Join C with sl st in first st after any 2ch-sp, rep Rnd 6 eight times. Fasten off. Join D with sl st in first st after any 2ch-sp, rep Rnd 6 eight times. Fasten off. Join E with sl st in first st after any 2ch-sp, rep Rnd 6 eight times. Fasten off.

Finishing

Weave in ends. Pin out to shape.



Special stitches

Beginning cluster (beg cl): 2 ch, [yrh, insert hook in first st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops] twice, yrh, draw through all 3 loops on hook

Cluster (cl): [Yrh, insert hook in indicated st, yrh, pul, yrh, draw through 2 loops] 3 times in same st, yrh, draw through all 4 loops on hook

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
