

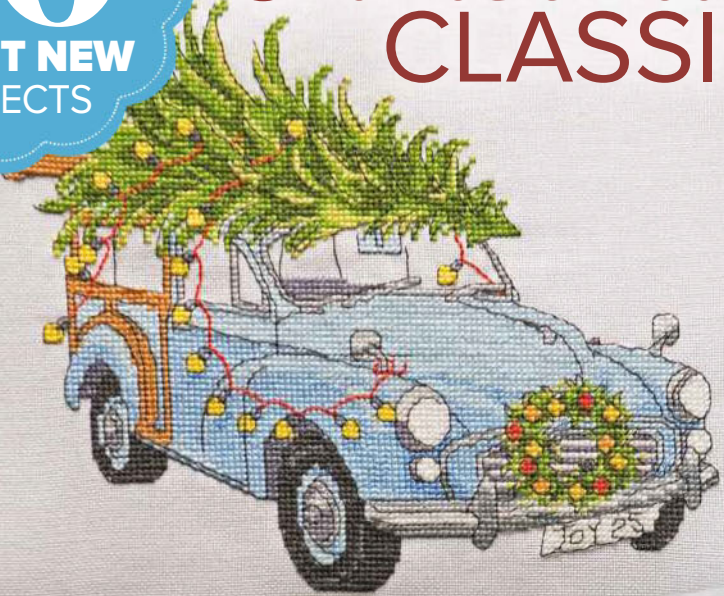

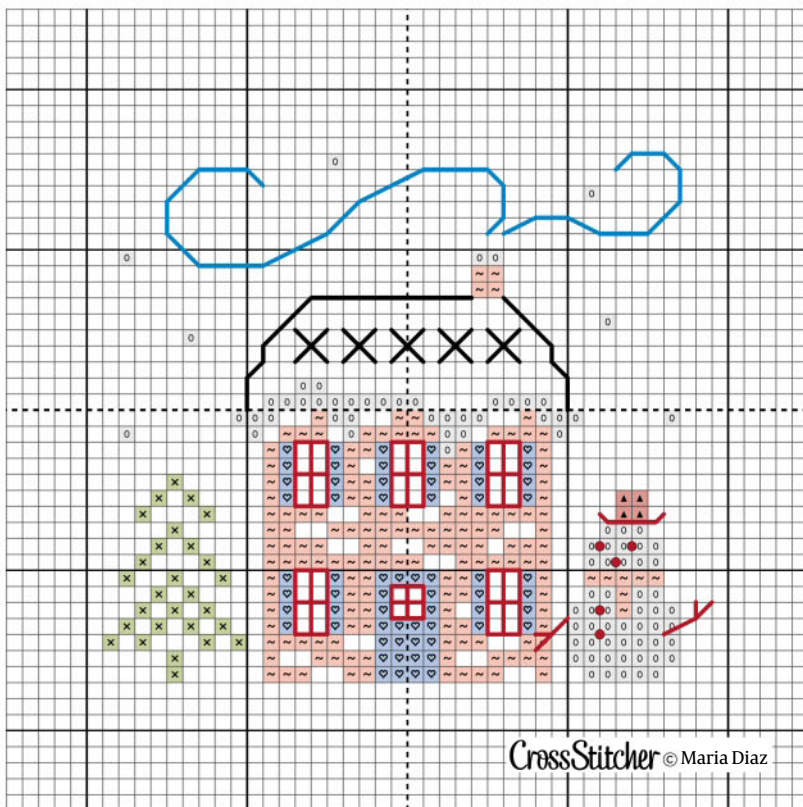

How to... make your little house decoration

Step 1

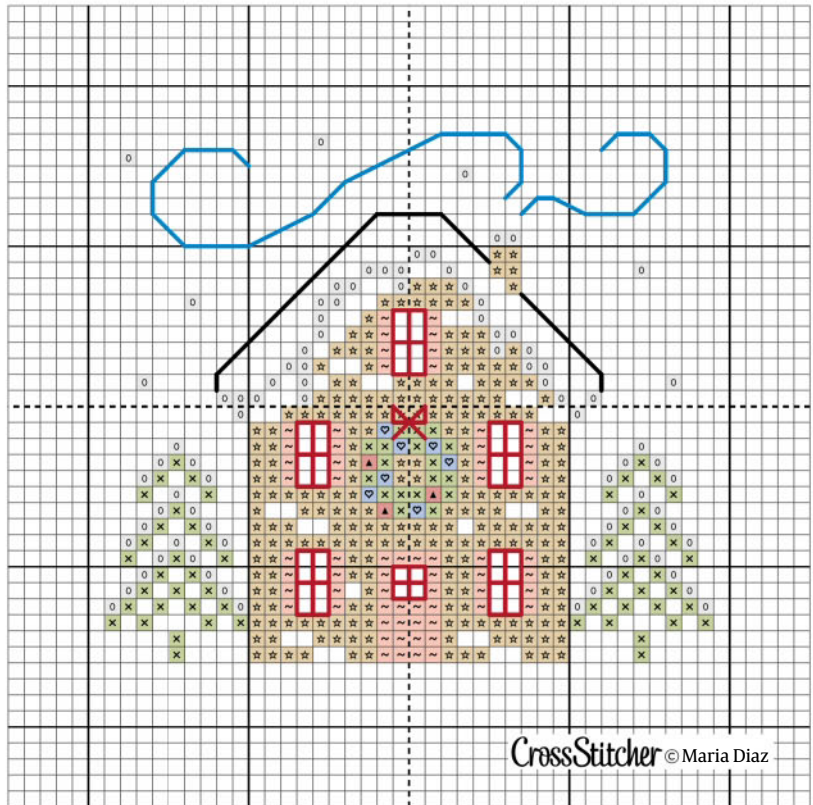
CUT a 10x10cm piece of 28 count evenweave fabric and stitch your chosen house using two strands of stranded cotton for the cross stitch, one and two for the backstitch and two for the French knots over two threads of evenweave.

Step 2

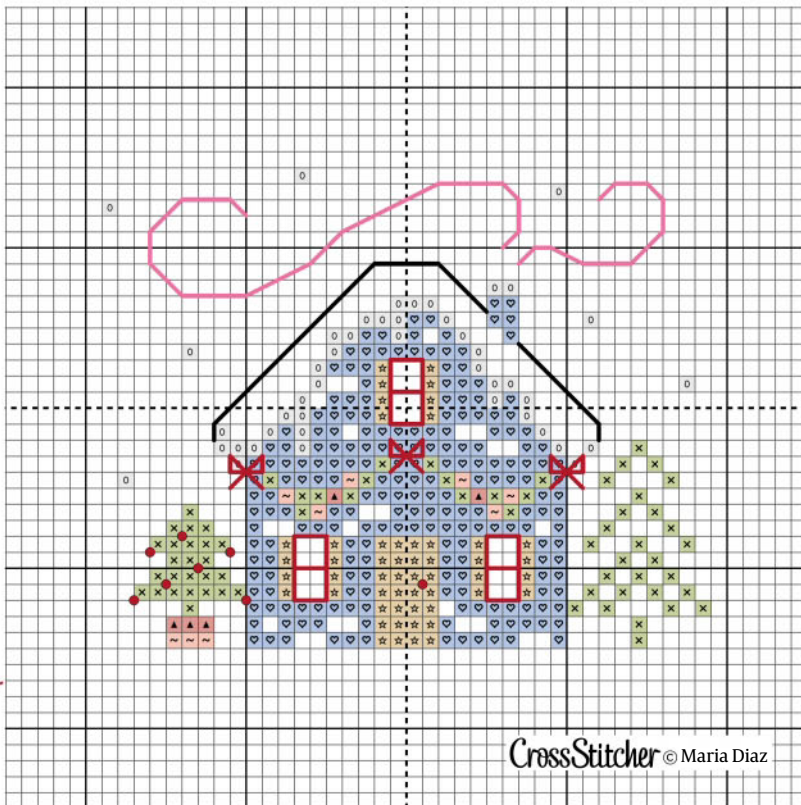
SNIP a 10cm length of white ric-rac trim and place on the front of the stitching just under the design. Sew it in place by machine or hand.

Step 3

PLACE the front and a 10x10cm piece of white felt right sides together. With a length of cord for hanging between the layers, and the ends pointing out, sew around the edge leaving a gap for turning. Turn, stuff and then sew up the gap.

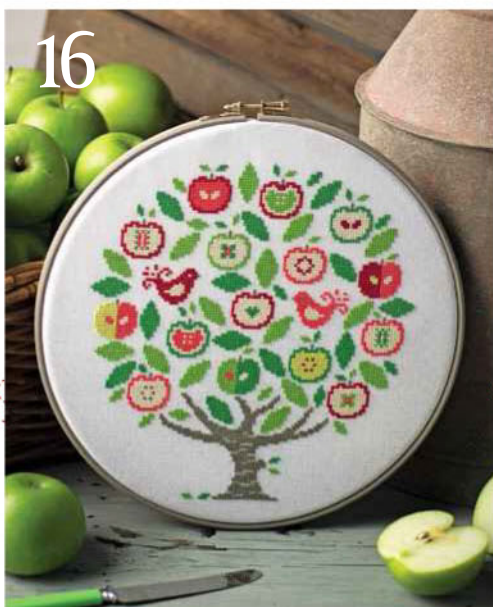

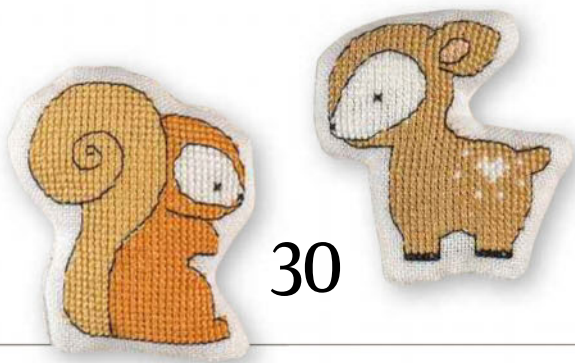

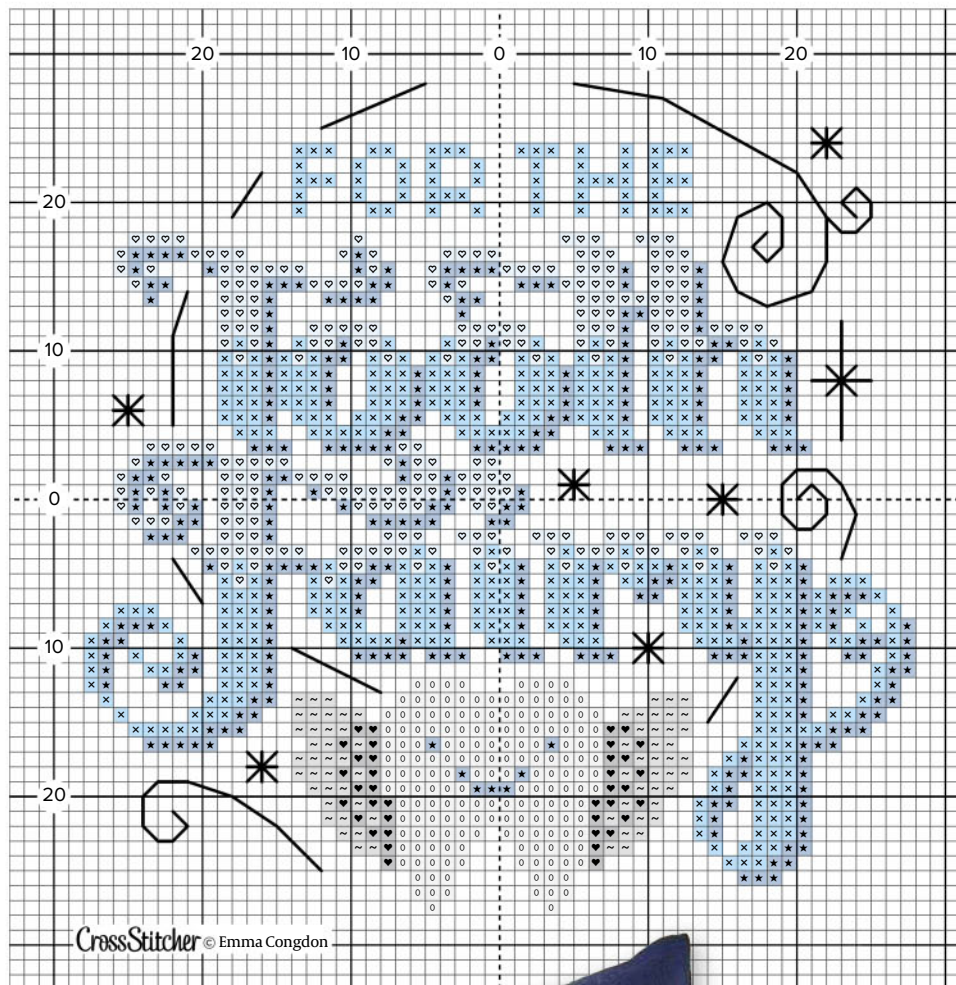

Make a... pocket pillow

Step 1

TURN over top edge of stitched fabric twice to wrong side. Press, then machine stitch or catch stitch the turning in place.

Step 2

FOLD under bottom and sides of stitched fabric so it measures 12x14cm (5½x4¾in), to make pocket front. Press.

Step 3

PLACE stitched pocket face out in centre of cushion front fabric. Machine stitch round three sides, leaving the top open. Place pillow front and back together, right sides facing, and machine stitch around edge, leaving a gap for turning. Turn and fill with toy stuffing. Sew up gap with neat stitches.

A couple of months ago I did a presentation and workshop at Sew Sociable, a great stitch-based monthly get-together in Leicester. (Find them on Facebook to get involved!) It was the usual combination of my 'View from the Cutting (& Stitching) Edge' presentation, which is a dazzling showcase of fantastic embroidery from around the world, and then a fast and furious cross stitch workshop.

At the end of the session, a young lady called Lucy Hayward presented me with a cross stitched card featuring one of her designs, a stag. It's a good design, but the thing that struck me about it was how cleverly Lucy had

design is going to crisp up and come to life when the single or double threaded little lines are added. When you're using characterful designs, like the ones that are often featured in this fine magazine, it really brings the images to life.

I try to get my backstitches to sit in a specific way, making sure that the stitches lie on each other in a slightly diagonal position (see diagram A, bottom left) rather than stitching them any old how (B), as it gives the illusion of a straighter line. I'm pretty sure that's the best way to do it, but I'm always open to correction.

I've played with backstitch a bit in my designs, particularly using it to

used backstitch to enhance the design. It got me thinking...

Backstitch is the common partner for cross stitch, being used to provide outline and detail to the otherwise pixelated format that we're familiar with. I find that designers often overlook the power of backstitch to finish off the design. It's easy for a designer to use backstitch to outline a piece, but it's that more thoughtful application of backstitch that really makes the difference.

I don't know about you, but I like the anticipation of backstitch. Getting all the Xs stitched, knowing that the

create 3D effects, and I think that there's a ton more space to play with these little stitches. I'm contemplating using them to create texture and contrast on top of existing cross stitches, not sticking to just outlines, but adding layers to the work, almost like the trash polka tattoo style.

What are your feelings on backstitch? Who are your favourite designers that make great use of the stitch that goes backwards? Are there any techniques you use that I should be paying attention to? Get in touch with the mag and let me know!

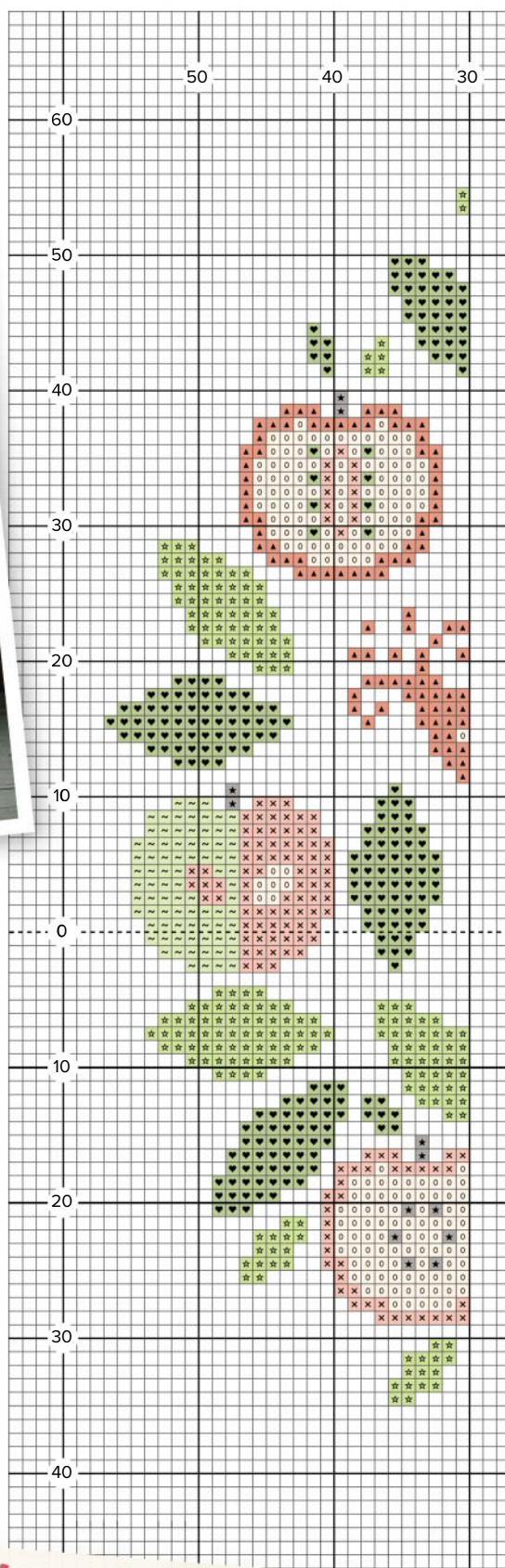

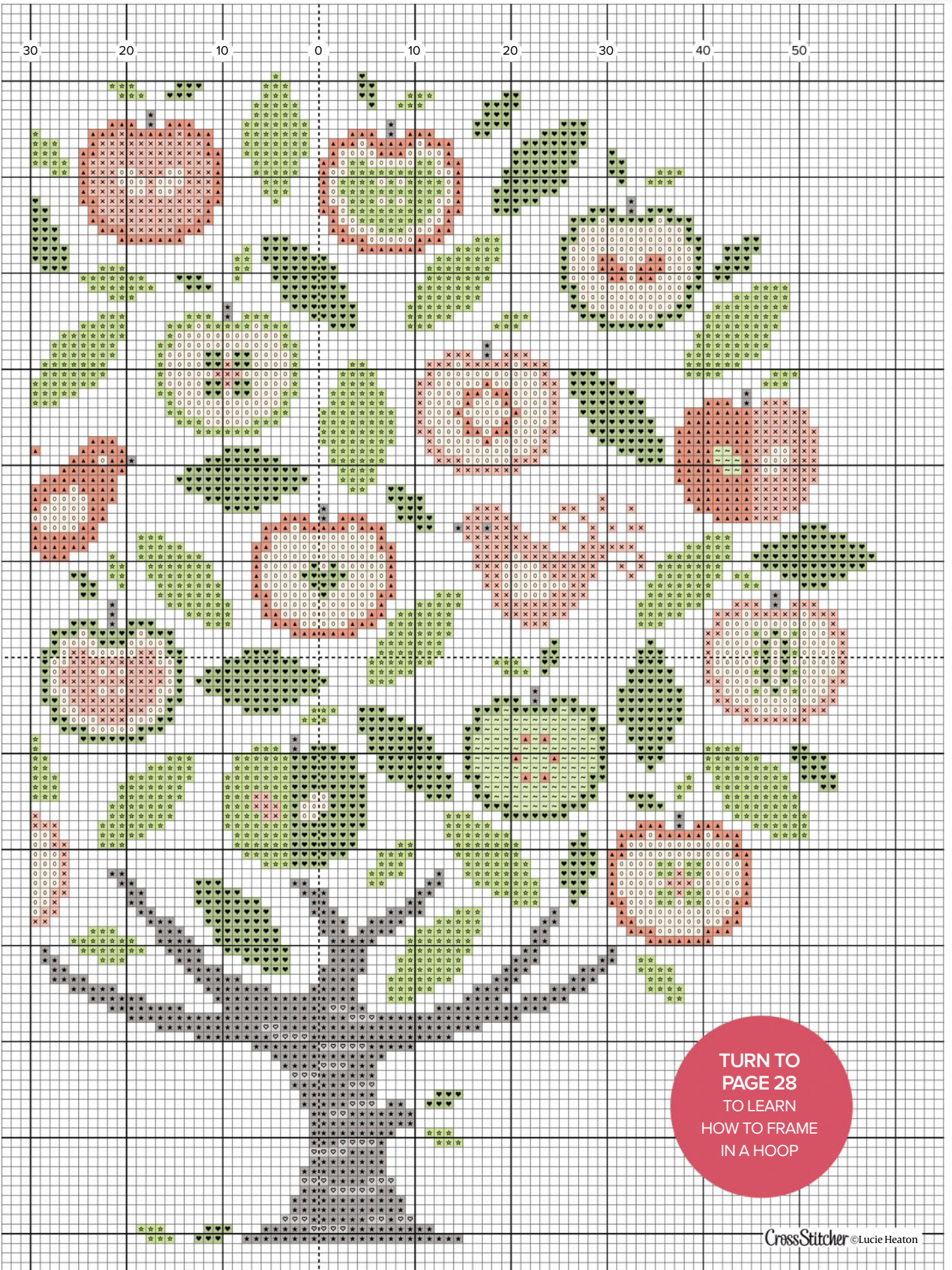

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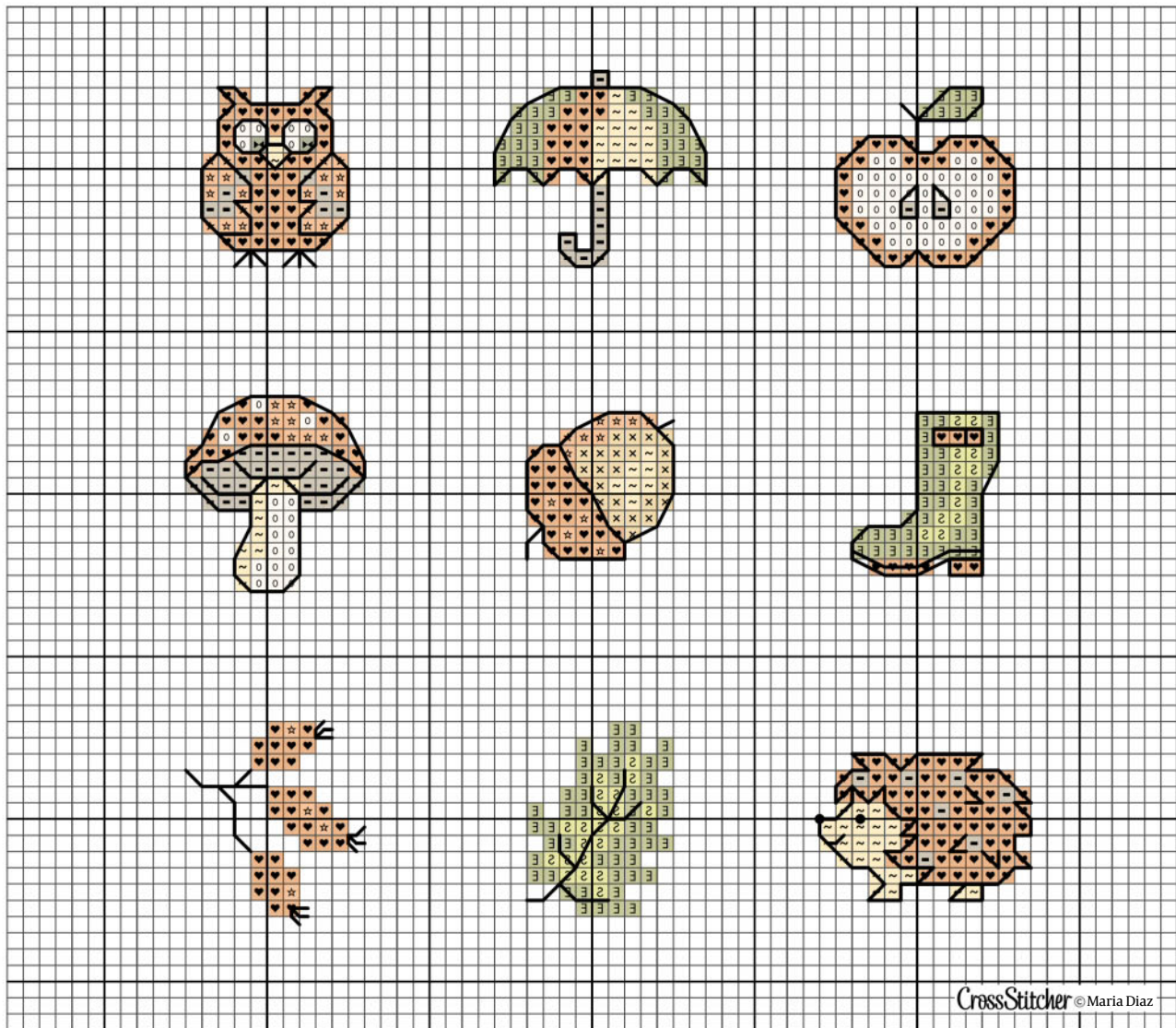

Make a... covered button

Step 1



USE the template provided with your self-covered button packaging to cut your fabric into a circle, with your stitching in the middle. Alternatively, you can simply cut your fabric into a 4cm circle.

Step 2



CHOOSE either metal or white plastic self-covered buttons, it's up to you. Pull your fabric around the button front as tight as you can. If you like, use a small piece of double-sided tape to help you hold your fabric in place.

Step 3



USE your fingernail to tighten and smooth any lumpy areas around the perimeter of your button. Once you're happy with it, pop the backing into place.

Pop a safety pin into the button shank to turn it into a badge!





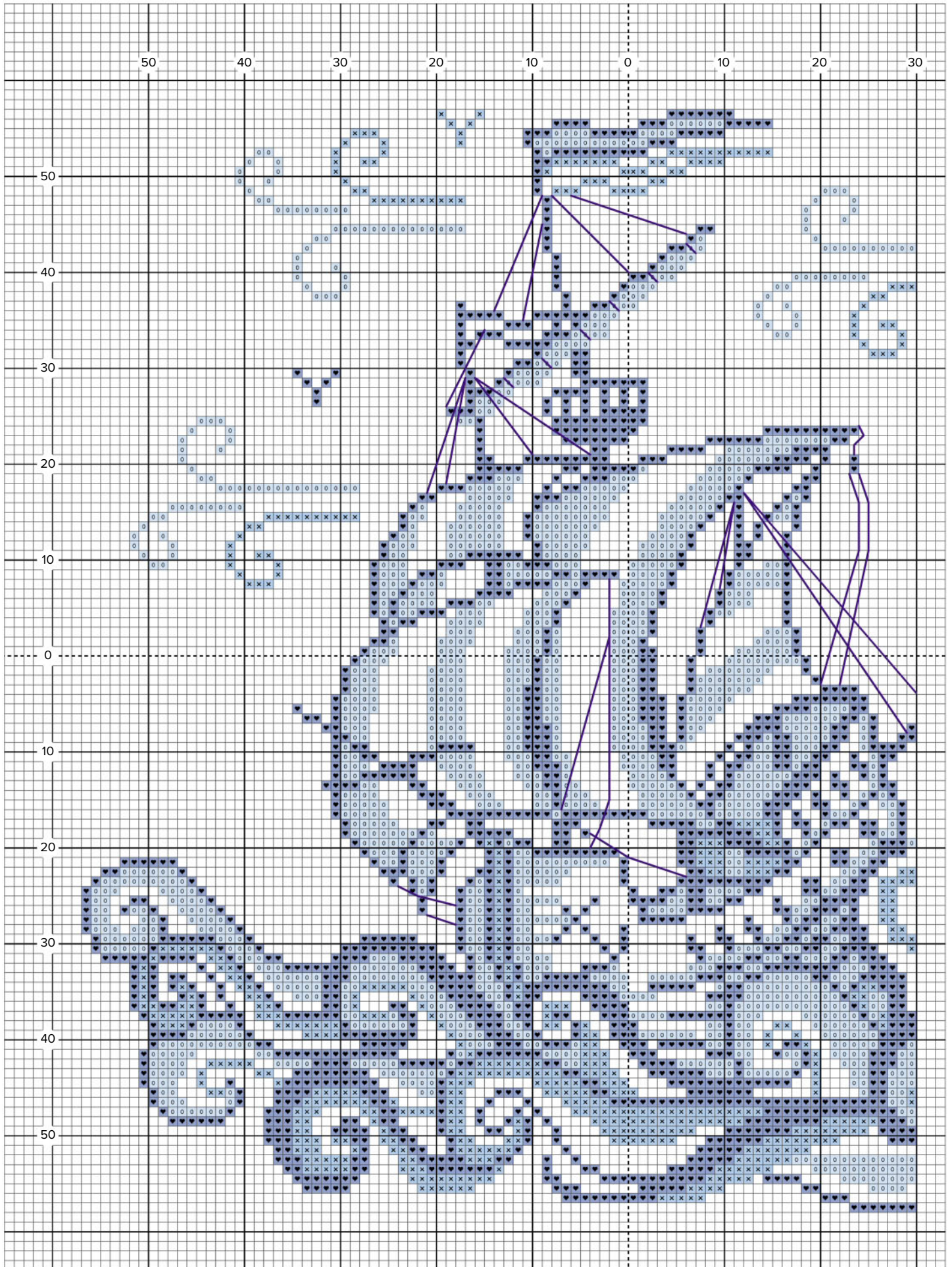

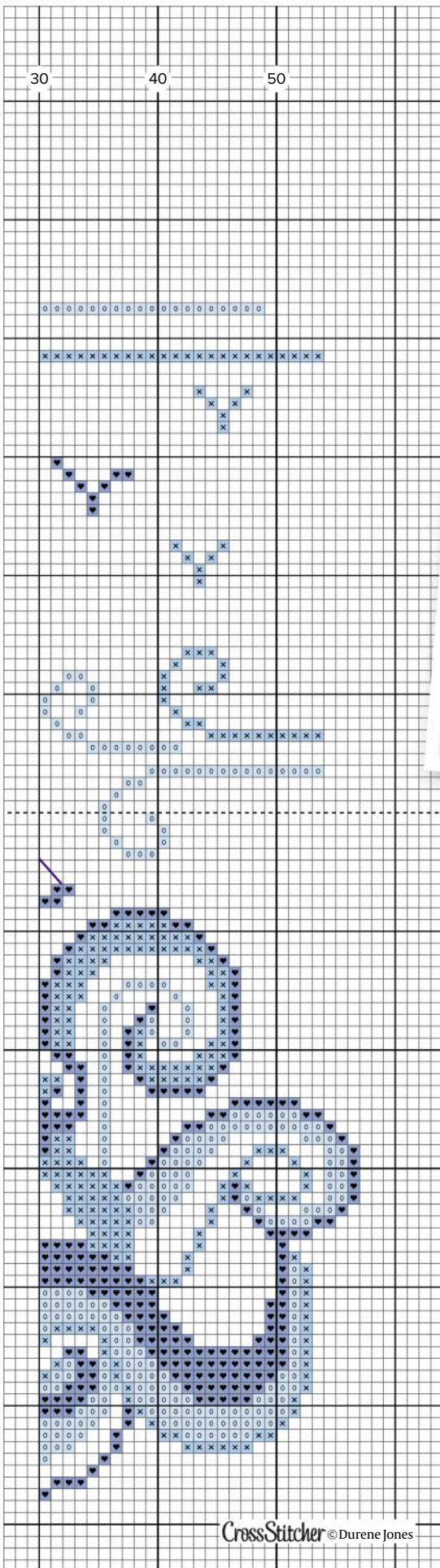

Materials

- Zweigart 28 count Brittney evenweave, white, ref: 3270/100, 33x33cm (13x13in)
 - White backing fabric, 33x33cm (13x13in)
 - Stranded cotton as listed in the key
 - Size 26 tapestry needle
 - 25cm (10in) wooden embroidery hoop

Paint your hoop using a match pot of emulsion paint. Apply two coats to the outer section of the hoop only, then allow to dry thoroughly

How to... frame your work in a hoop

Step 1



TRIM your stitching and a fabric piece into a circle slightly larger than your hoop. Place the inside hoop beneath the two pieces and the outer hoop on top. Centre and press over your work. Pull taut and tighten the screw.

Step 2



TURN your stitching to the reverse and cut a piece of felt to fit the inside the inner circle. Place the felt inside the hoop. You can use a bit of PVA glue to keep it in place. The felt will keep your work nice and fresh.

Step 3



USE a glue gun or double-sided tape to begin attaching the first layer of fabric, pulling taut as you go. Repeat for the second layer. Cut a second felt circle to fit over the back of your hoop and secure in place to finish.

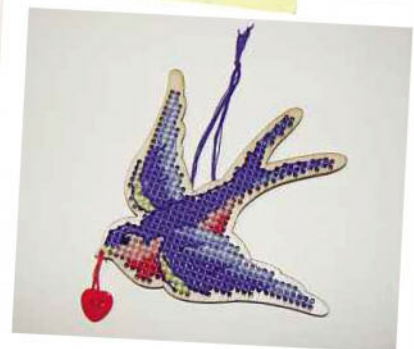

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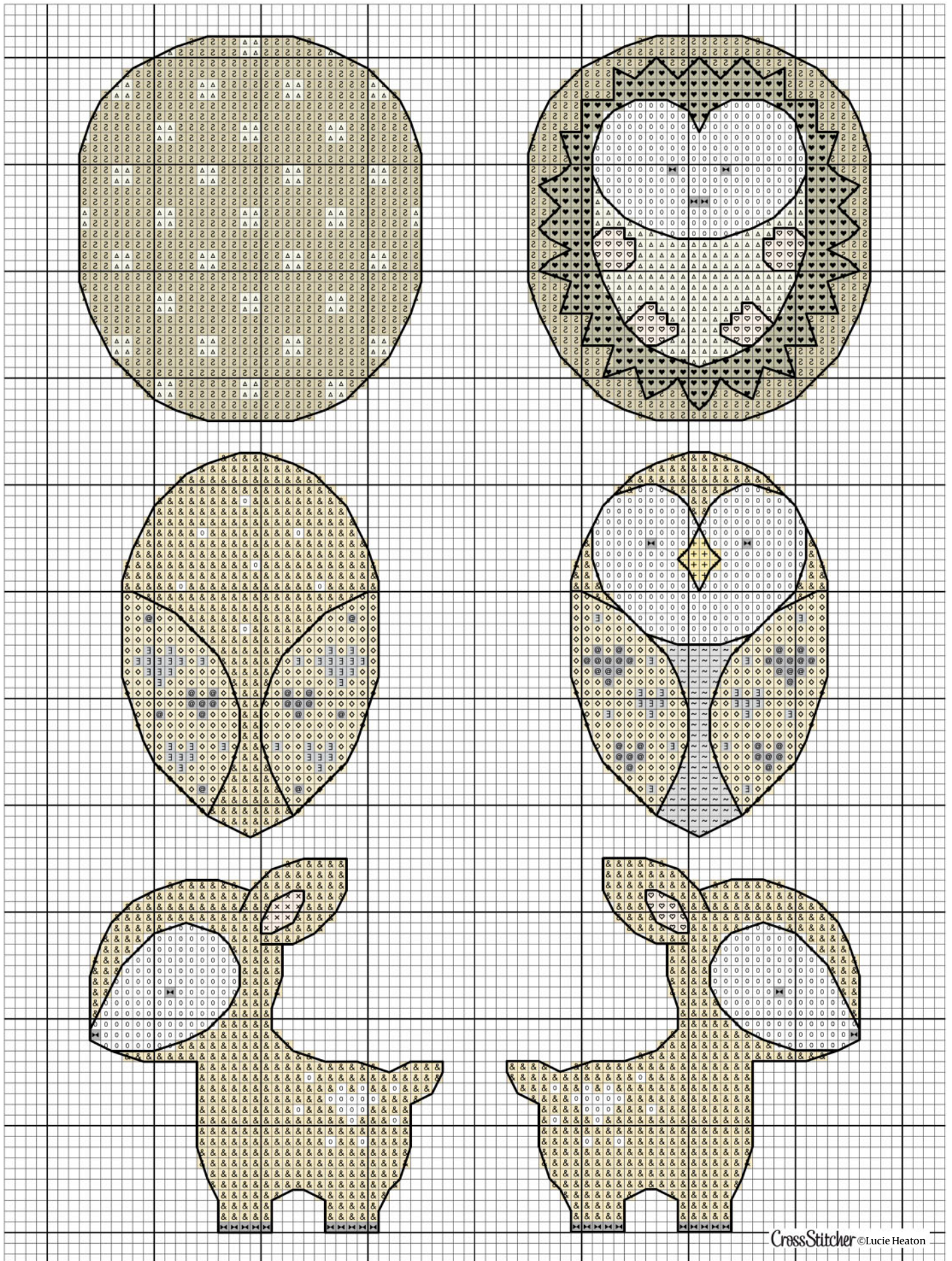

 - Stranded cotton as listed in the key
 - Size 26 tapestry needle
 - Toy stuffing
 - Ribbon or string for hanging

Make a... cute mobile

Step 1

STITCH a front and back for each animal. Place the two parts right sides together, matching the stitched outlines. It will help if you hold the stitching up to a window and then use pins to secure the front and back together.

Step 2

USE a sewing machine to stitch the rough shape of the animal, 1cm (3/8in) outside the outer edge of the design, and leaving the bottom open.

Step 3

TRIM off some of the seam allowance and then turn the animal through to the right side.

Step 4

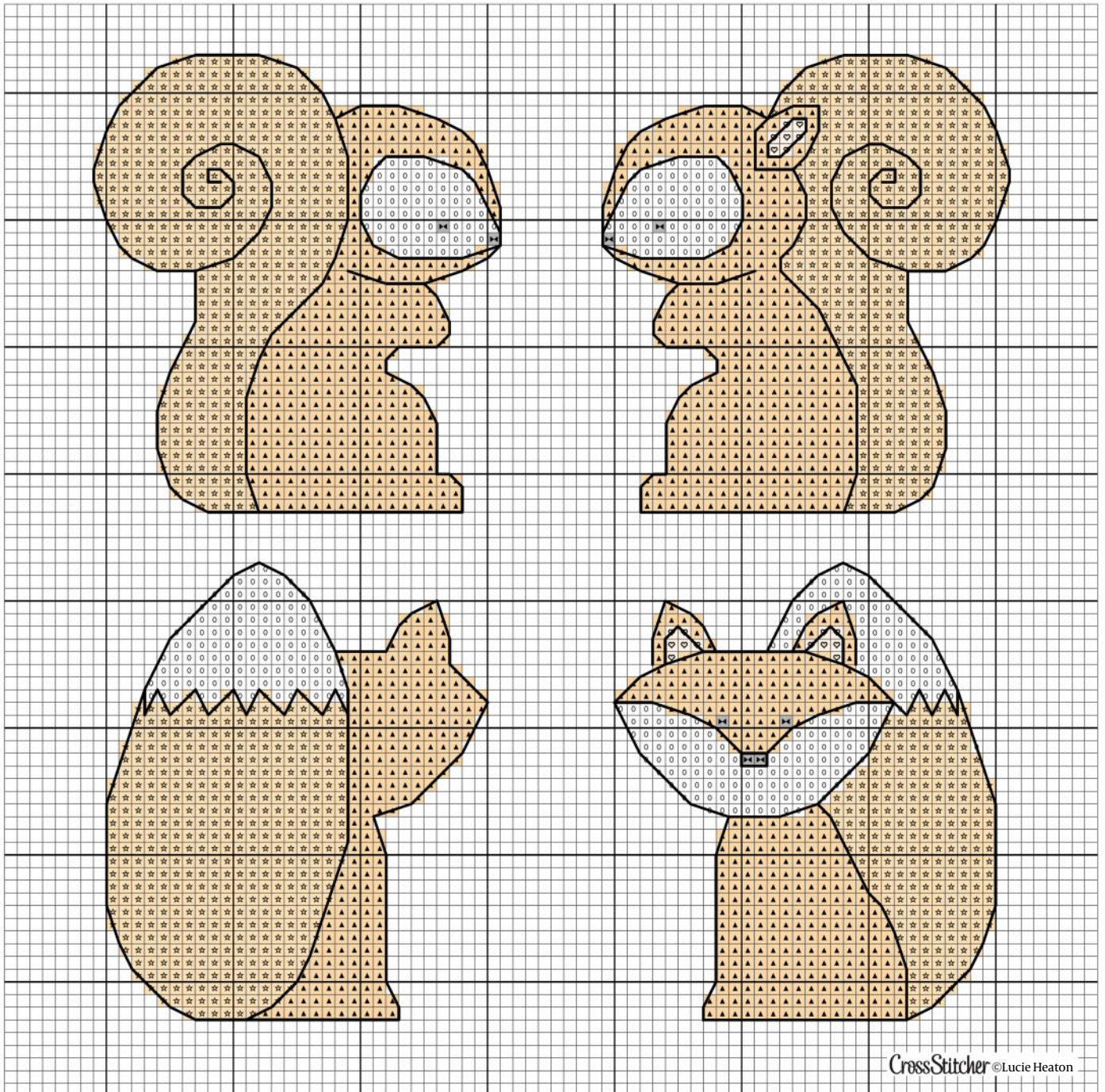
THREAD a needle with a length of ribbon and make a large stitch at the top of the animal for the hanger. Tie a knot in the ends.

Step 5

FILL each animal with toy stuffing through the gap left at the bottom, and then fold in the fabric and close the gap with small neat stitches.



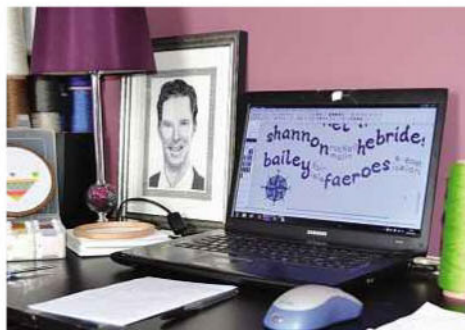
Make a lampshade mobile;

An interview with...

Colleen Carrington

We caught up with the author of *Benedict Cumberbatch* to find out how her mission to put Sherlock into cross stitch came about

Interview by **Katie Allen**

Whether or not you're a fully-paid-up Cumberperson, there's no denying that a certain actor has caught the imagination of the nation. In fact Colleen Carrington's love for Benedict Cumberbatch is so great that she has dedicated an entire book to cross stitching her favourite star. We caught up with Colleen to talk Sherlock, stitching and what it was like to meet the man himself...

How did this amazing stitching book come about?

It was completely out of the blue. One Monday morning I opened my emails and there was one from Kyle Books editor, Tara O'Sullivan, saying, "I've got an idea for a book." She'd seen a blog post I'd written about my love for Benedict Cumberbatch. We met up the same week, discussed



designs and I dropped everything and went for it.

You've always loved cross stitching?

I've always liked cross stitch, it's always been a hobby – it's only in the last few years that I've thought there was something in it. When I was about eight I became obsessed with the *Country Companions* patterns –

I think I did every single one. By the time I was a teenager I was making up my own patterns based on the house, the shed, my family, the cat... I nearly studied architecture – it lends itself to the precise 'pixely', charty nature of cross stitch.

And then you started your own business, *The World In Stitches*?

Cross stitch was a background hobby for me, fitted around my work in a supermarket. I was designing patterns for friends and then began selling my own cross stitch kits and patterns online. I opened the Etsy store in October 2012 and exactly a year later I went for it. Quitting my other job was the best decision of my life. In the last 18 months I've had about 1,000 sales. Now I do what I love, all day every day.

My style is very much about British culture – my new ranges are

inspired by weather and biscuits, which is all you need to know. Lots of modern colours and outlines.

Is that what you love most about cross stitch?

Yes, that's what's so exciting about cross stitch. All the pop culture and modern designs. Cross stitching is definitely cooler now. It seems obvious to me that you'd want to cross stitch something that you like!

Which brings us to Benedict. Why do you love him – and what was it like stitching him?

I love his charisma and personality. He's the most magnetic actor of our age – and it's his devastating good looks as well! I studied his face a lot – you have to get those cheekbones right. I never got sick of looking at his face. My other half did though – every time I opened my computer with my sewing in hand, there he was!

I spent about a week designing and then it took me another month to stitch up all fifteen patterns. I pulled a couple of overnight shifts to complete it all. I couldn't face stitching for two weeks after that and my arm ached!

And we've heard that you met him?

I met him at a Sherlock convention, just after the book was finished. I couldn't bring myself to say, "I've been staring at your face for the past month." But I think it's quite flattering... I think Una Stubbs, who also stars in Sherlock, cross stitches. So maybe she would do a project!

Is there anyone else you'd really like to stitch?

I could do a complete Sherlock book! Or Tom Hiddlestone. I'm quite into films so maybe I could do Simon Pegg and Nick Frost.

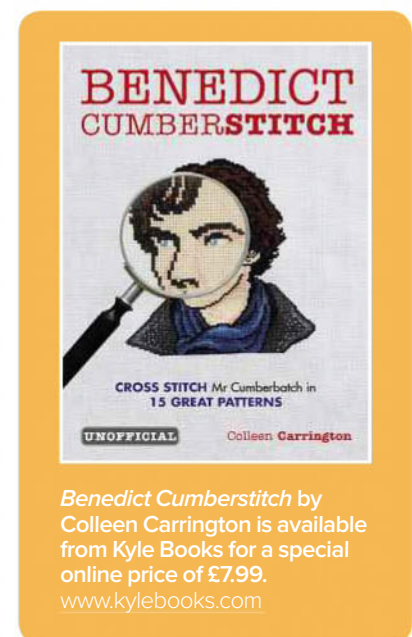
What's a normal day in the life of The World in Stitches like?

I get up and write a to-do list, with things like 'shop maintenance', 'cut fabric for kits' or 'take photos'. I do some designing. I have two hours of stitching at the end of the day. I'm a quick stitcher (I can stitch 1-2,000 stitches in a day). After dinner I do social media – I've started adding free patterns on Twitter and Tumblr. The book taught me that if I focus on one area at a time, I'm more productive. I still get a zen feeling when I'm designing and stitching.

What's next for you?

I've got new eight-colour beginner packs coming out to help people get into cross stitch, featuring simple designs like a windmill and heart. For Christmas, I've got some deluxe sets including the threads, scissors and so on. I'm opening a new Folkysy store. I get so excited when I sell a kit or pattern and the fact there's now a whole book of my designs is mind blowing! It's a mixture of extreme nervousness and anticipation.

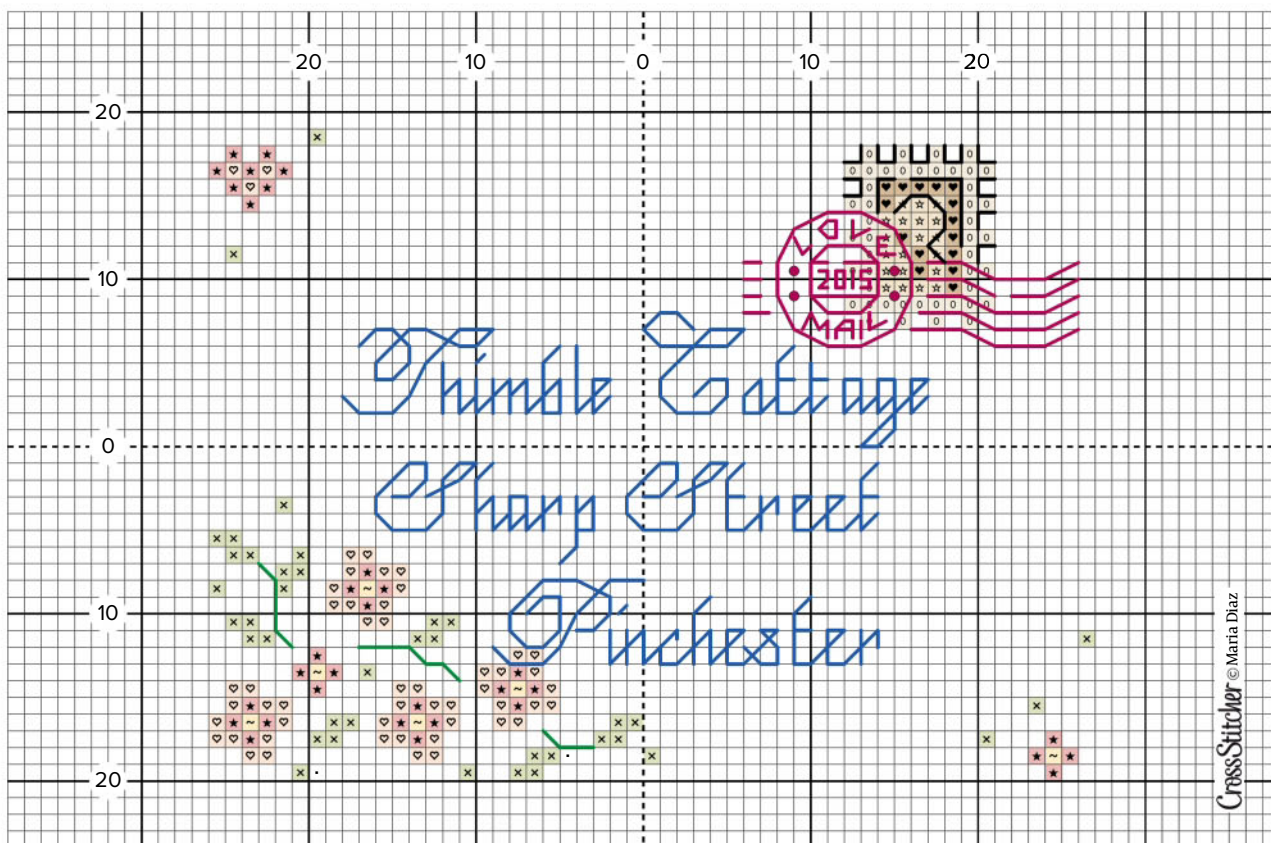

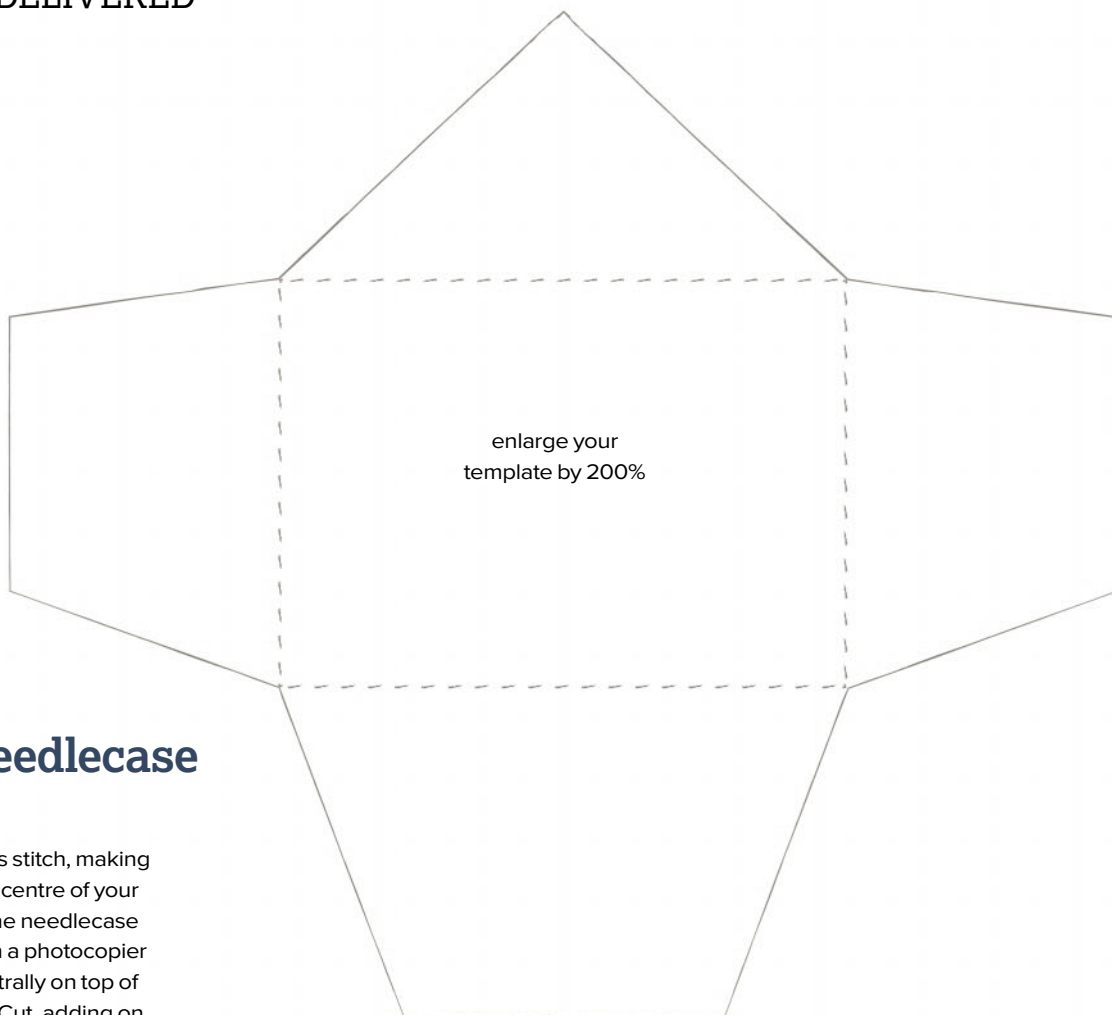

Make a... needlecase

Step 1

COMPLETE all the cross stitch, making sure the design is in the centre of your fabric. Make a copy of the needlecase template, enlarging it on a photocopier by 200%. Place this centrally on top of your stitching, then pin. Cut, adding on a 1cm (3/8in) seam allowance outside the outer template line.

Step 2

USING the template again, cut the same shape from the lining fabric, again adding on the seam allowance. Apply iron-on interfacing to the back of your lining.

Step 3

TURN over the outer edge on both the fabric and the lining fabric, and then iron on to the wrong side of the fabric. Clip the corners so that the fabric sits comfortably.

Step 4

WITH the right side of the lining fabric facing up, place the felt rectangle in the centre, then using a machine or by hand, make a row of stitches down the centre of the felt to attach it to the lining.

Step 5

PLACE your needlecase front and lining wrong sides together, and then machine stitch just in from the edge of the fabric, sewing through both layers, or catch stitch the lining to the needlecase front at the outer edge. Press carefully.

Make a... buttonhole loop



Step 1

THREAD your needle with all six strands of stranded cotton and then anchor your thread end between the layers of fabric at the top point of the needlecase. Bring the thread through at the point where you want the loop to begin.

Step 2

LOOP the thread so that it is big enough to slip your button through. Use trial and error to judge the correct loop size, but it is important to get it right at this stage of the stitching.

Step 3

TAKE the needle back into the fabric where you want the buttonhole to end, then between the fabric layers and out through at the starting point again. Repeat a couple more times to make a sturdy loop.

Step 4

WITH the needlecase held in your left hand, push the needle through the loop from back to the front, leaving a thread loop at the back.

Step 5

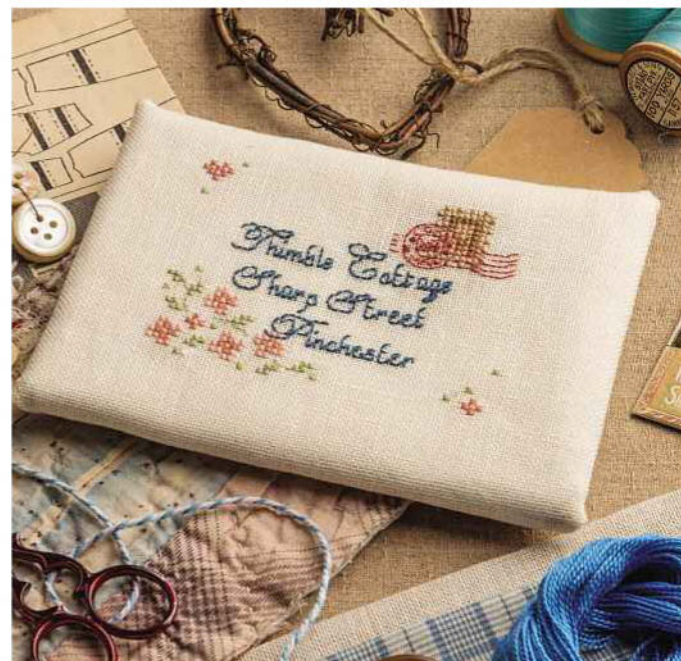
TAKE the needle over the buttonhole loop and through the loop at the back.

Step 6

PULL the thread tightly, sliding the stitch along until it is up against the fabric. This is your first buttonhole stitch. Repeat until the whole loop has been snugly covered. Fasten your thread between the fabric layers and then add a button to correspond with the loop on the opposite flap.

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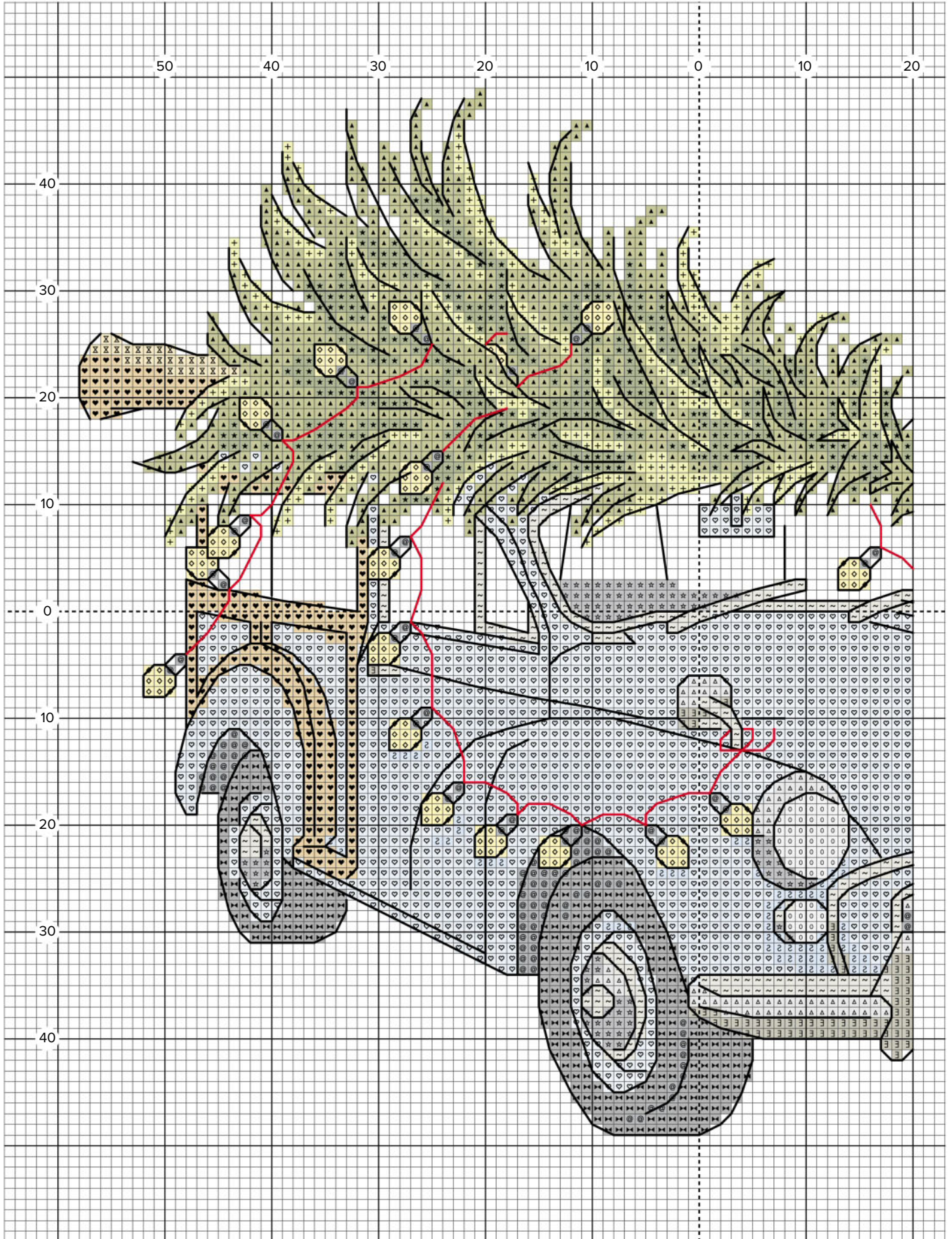
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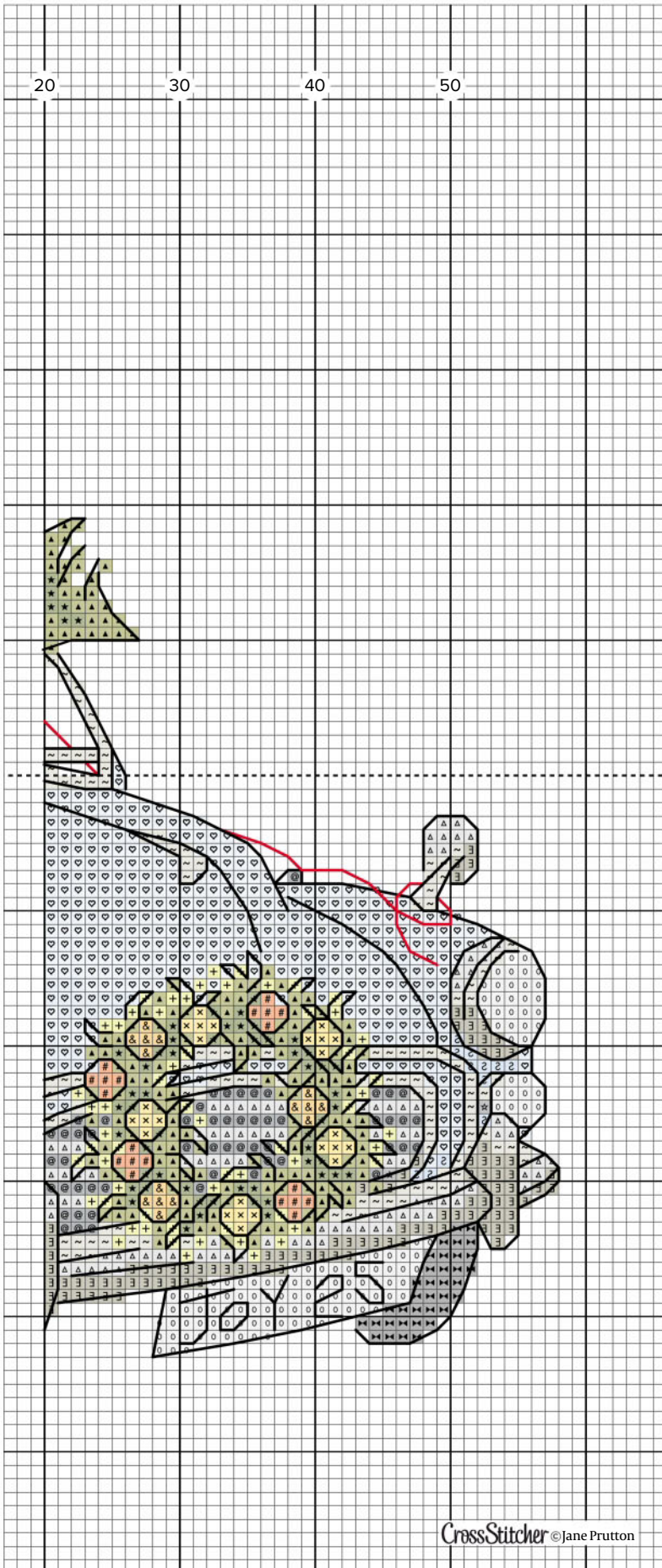

THE MORRIS MINOR, A REAL ENGLISH ICON

First revealed at the Earls Court Motor Show, London, on 20th September 1948, the Morris Minor was designed under the leadership of Alec Issigonis, later responsible for the more famous Mini. More than 1.3 million Minors were manufactured between 1948 and 1972, and it was the UK's first million seller.

Initially available as a two-door saloon and convertible, the range was expanded to include a four-door saloon in 1950, and the famous wood-framed estate (the Traveller), a van and pickup were added in 1953.

Our Traveller is a Minor 1000 from the 60s, when British cars were in their heyday. Production of this iconic Morris ended before the decline of the UK motor industry.



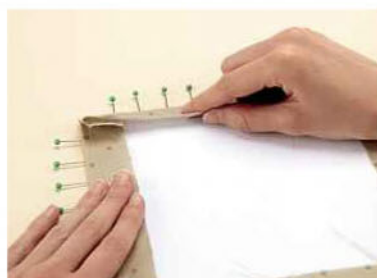
How to... frame a picture

Step 1



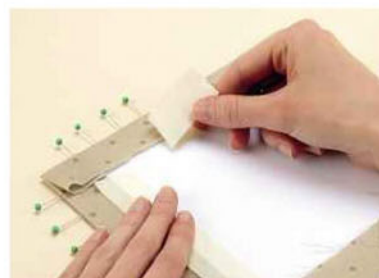
CUT a piece of white mount board to fit inside your frame. Place your design centrally over the mount board and pin the fabric around the board to secure, starting at the centre of each side and working outwards.

Step 2



PIN around the entire perimeter and check you are happy with the positioning of your design, then turn over to the reverse. Use double-sided tape to secure the fabric excess around all four sides.

Step 3



SECURE the fabric edges with masking tape and remove the pins. Position your stitching in the frame and back with a second piece of mount board. Seal the edges with more masking tape to finish off.

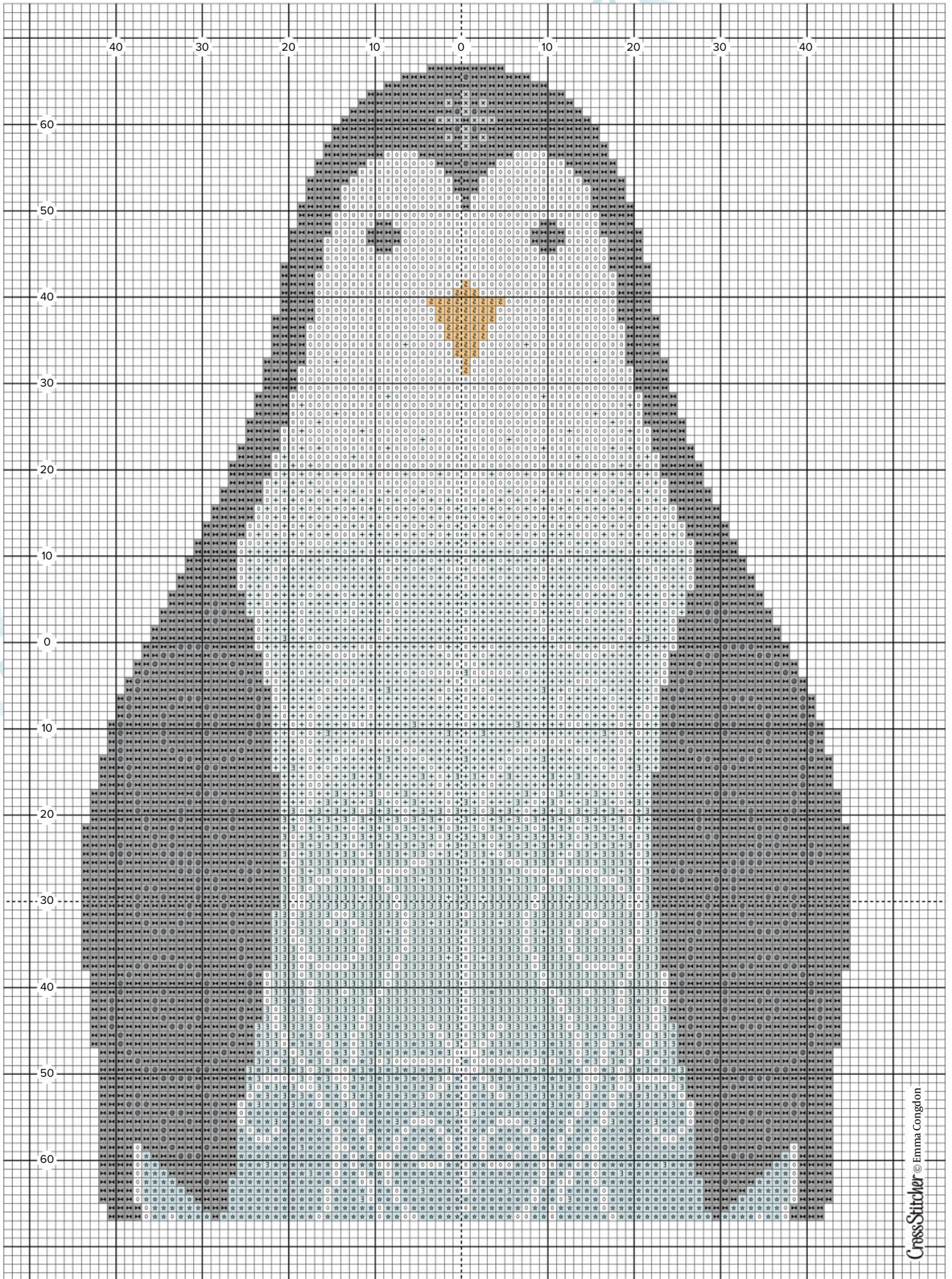

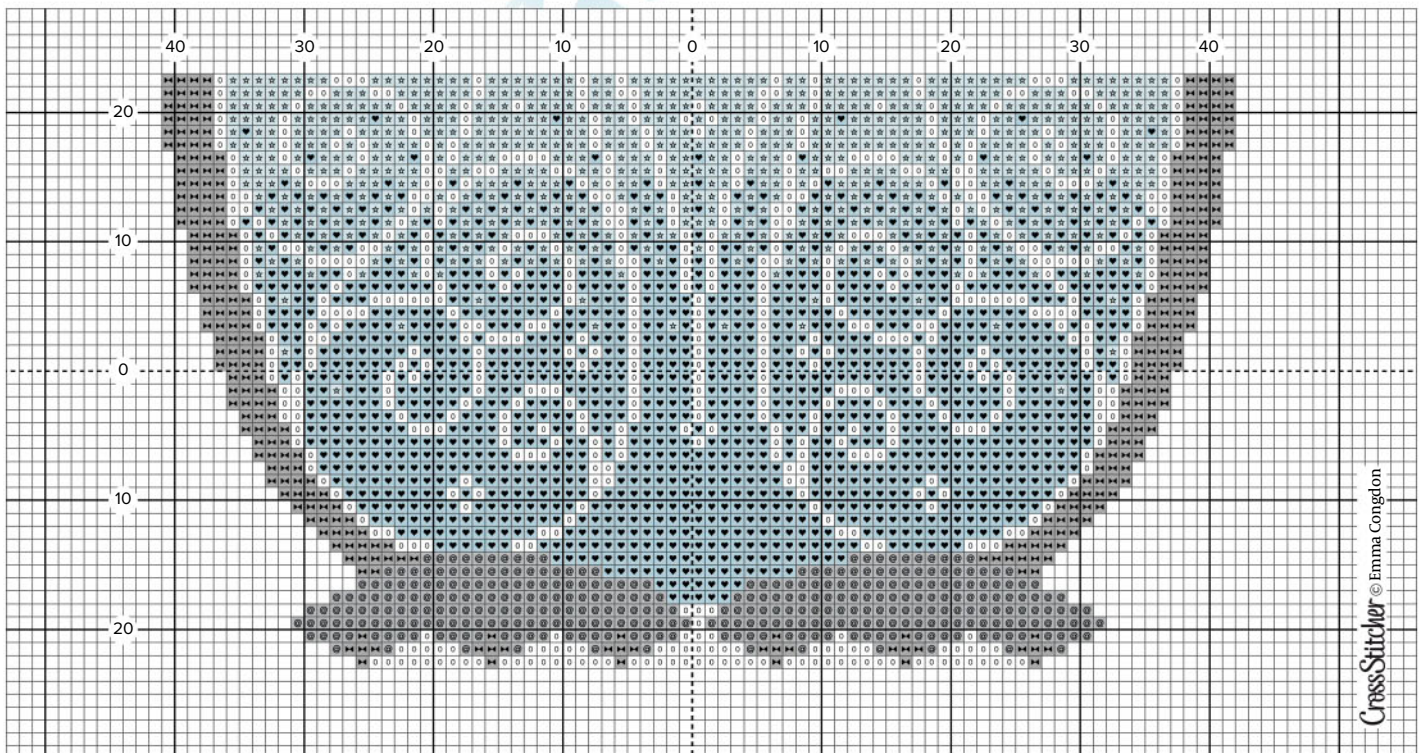

If you would prefer to make the mummy penguin without the pocket, just stitch the two parts of the chart as one



Make a... mummy penguin cushion

Step 1

FOLD the stitched mummy penguin pocket in half, so that the top of the design is right on the fold. Press.

Step 2

POSITION the folded mummy penguin pocket on top of the mummy penguin top, so that you have a complete penguin. Tack down both side seams to hold the pocket in place.

Step 3

PLACE the mummy penguin cushion front with the pocket attached on top of the cushion back, with right sides together.

Step 4

MACHINE stitch around the edge of the cushion, with a 2cm (¾in) seam allowance, leaving a small gap for turning. Now trim away some of the seam allowance.

Step 5

TURN the cushion to the right side, fill with toy stuffing and then sew up the gap with small neat stitches.

STITCHING LOCATION

It's important to start stitching at the correct location on the fabric to make sure the pocket is correctly positioned. The bottom row of the mummy penguin top should be 17cm (6¾in) up from the bottom of the fabric. The bottom row of the mummy penguin pocket design should be 9cm (3½in) up from the bottom of the fabric.

Materials

- Zweigart 28 count Brittny white evenweave, ref: 3270/100, 47x33cm (18½x13in) for mummy penguin top; 34x33cm (13¼x13in) for mummy penguin pocket;
- 21x16cm (8¼x6¼in) for baby penguin
- Stranded cotton as listed in the key
- Size 26 tapestry needle
- Backing fabric, 34x33cm (13¼x13in) for the cushion back; 21x16cm (8¼x6¼in) for baby penguin back
- Toy stuffing

Make a... baby penguin

Step 1

PLACE the stitched baby penguin and backing fabric right sides together. Using a sewing machine, stitch around the penguin about 5cm (1/4in) outside the design area, leaving a gap for turning. Press.

Step 2

TRIM the excess fabric from the edge of the baby penguin, leaving a seam allowance of 5cm (1/4in).

Step 3

TURN the baby penguin to the right side and fill with toy stuffing.

Step 4

SEW up the gap with small neat stitches to finish.

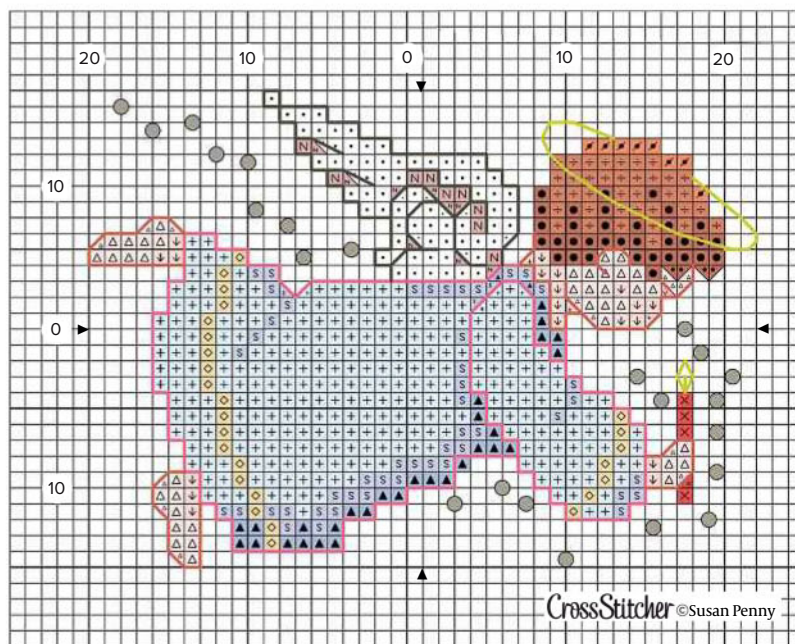

Step 3

ATTACH double-sided tape to the inside of the card around the edge of the aperture.

Step 4

PLACE the stitching on the table right-side up, and then place the card on top, pressing down firmly.

Step 5

CHECK which flap will fold over onto the back of the stitching, then add strips of double-sided tape and press firmly in place.

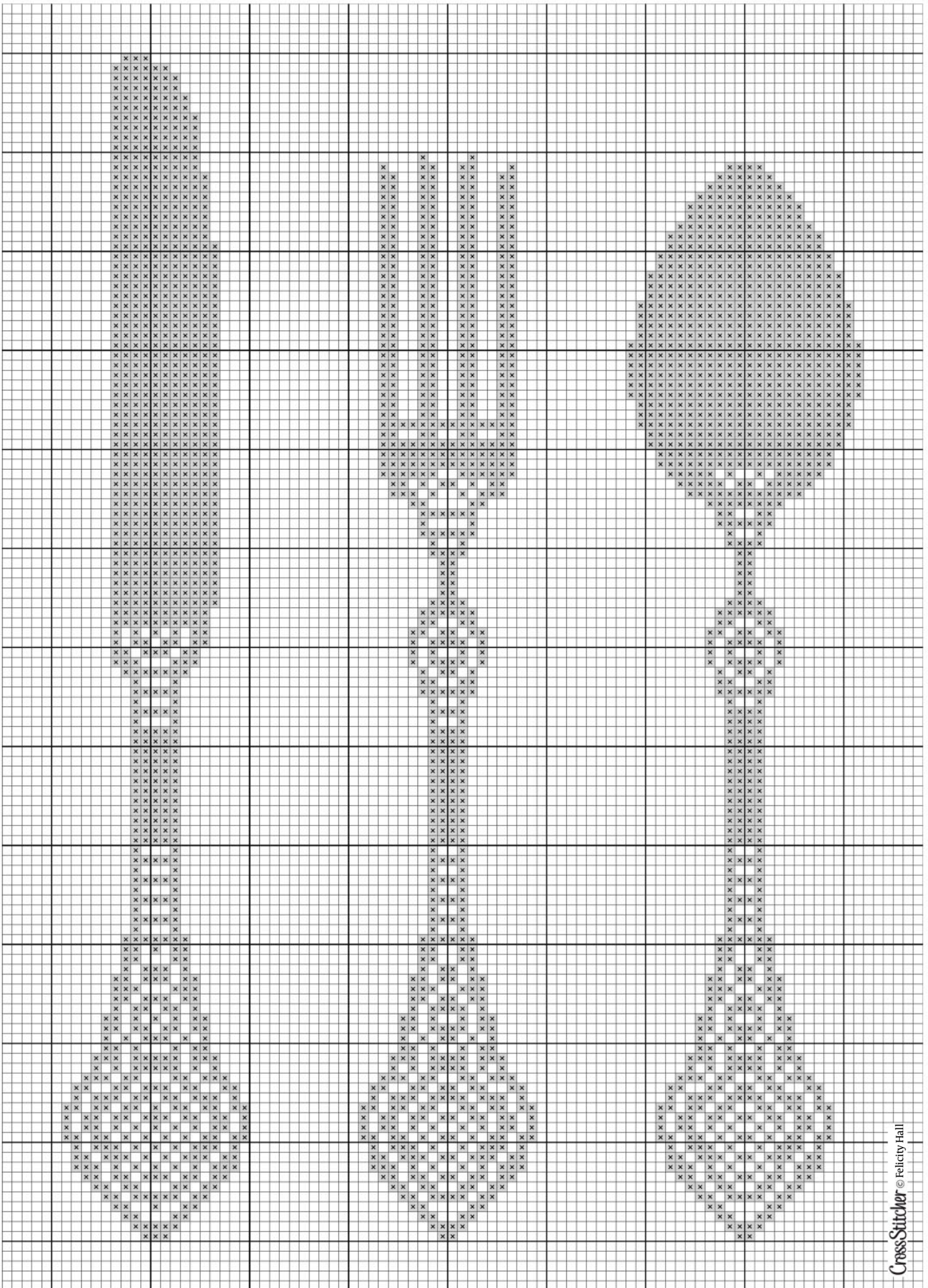

Make a... placemat

Step 1

TURN over the edges of the stitched fabric on to the wrong side, twice. Press.

Step 2

FOLD the fabric at each corner to form a mitre. Press, then machine stitch around the edges of the placemat.

Step 3

USE a needle and thread to catch stitch the mitres between the placemat points and the machine stitching. Press.

STITCHING LOCATION

The bottommost stitches of the spoon should be positioned 7.5cm (3in) up from the bottom edge and 9.5cm (3¾in) in from the right-hand edge.

If you wish to stitch a knife and fork instead or even all three pieces of cutlery, just take care to make sure that your stitches line up at the bottom.

Make a... patch card

Step 1

PRESS the iron-on interfacing centrally over the back of your stitching to stop it fraying.

Step 2

TRIM your fabric 2cm (3/4in) outside your stitching all the way round, following the outline of the jar.

Step 3

FOLD your card in half widthways and place your fabric centrally on the front section of your card. Machine stitch in place all the way round, close to the edge but following the jar's outline.



Make up into pretty tree decorations, with Christmas material for the back and a loop for hanging

Make a... pumpkin cake topper

Step 1

STITCH the pumpkin shape on to plastic canvas. Carefully cut around the design one square outside the stitching.

Step 2

SEW the wooden skewer on to the back of the plastic stitched pumpkin, then make a ribbon bow and attach to the skewer just under the pumpkin.





Make a... **trick or treat bag**

Step 1

STITCH your motif on a piece of aida. Fold the two bag handles in half lengthways. Machine stitch down their long edges, then turn through to the right side. Press the handles flat, with the seam at the centre back. Push the handle ends up inside the fabric tube. Press.

Step 2

TURN over the top twice on the front and back bag pieces. Press, then machine stitch both in place. Place the two ends of one bag handle on the top edge of the bag front. Use a pin to hold in place. Machine stitch the handle ends to the bag. Repeat for the bag back.

Step 3

PLACE the bag front and back right sides together. Machine stitch around the three sides of the bag, leaving the top open. Turn to the right side. Take with you trick or treating to be filled with sweets, or fill it yourself to make a cute party favour.

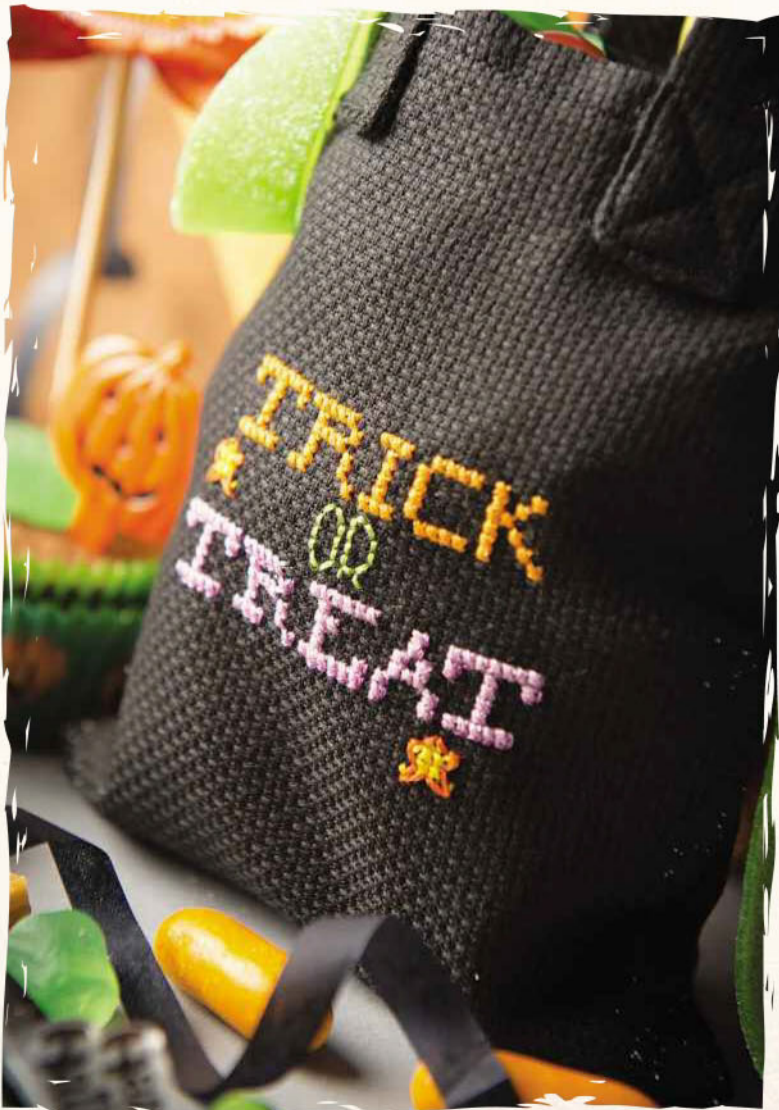

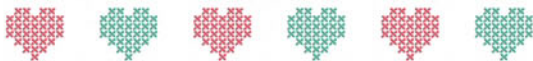

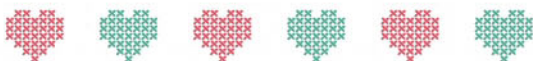

Lace has had a bit of a revival recently; there are plenty of pretty lace edgings in most fabric shops as well as vintage lace on specialist websites. But how can we use it to complement our stitching? Here we have three projects that show off the use of lace, plus you can learn a new stitch too! Choose from a pretty pincushion using vintage lace and lacy cross stitch. Try our fun mini bunting with a woven picot edging. Or have a go at our sweet makeup bag with its lace 'shelf' and little lace zip pull.



LACY MAKEUP BAG
Give your makeup bag an elegant finishing touch with clever lace embellishments

MAKE... LACE PANELS

Cross stitch a lace-effect panel and create another using a real lace scrap

Step 1



WORK all the cross stitch using the chart on page 78 and two strands of stranded cotton. Create the lace effect using backstitch; thread your needle with one strand of stranded cotton and work the outline first, then fill again with backstitch.

Step 2



CHOOSE the piece of lace that you would like to use. Cut a piece of backing fabric to a 7x7cm square. Position the lace on the backing fabric, making sure that any torn or stained lace is not prominent. Pin and trim to fit the backing fabric.

Step 3



THREAD a sharp needle with matching thread and use it to catch down any borders – these need to be secure, especially if they are not going to be caught in the stitching of the patchwork when you come to complete your pincushion.

Step 4



USE more thread to work blanket stitch where the lace has been cut and a raw edge is showing, to make sure that the lace doesn't unravel. Make sure you catch down any tears or broken parts of the lace. You're now ready to make the pincushion.

FINISHING YOUR... LACE PANEL PINCUSHION

Create a patchwork pincushion using your lace panels

Step 1

CUT all your fabric panels to the same size. Working on two patches at a time, place two panels right sides together and sew in place. Repeat with the other two panels.

Step 2

PLACE your pairs of panels right sides together, making sure that the centre seam matches and then sew together.

Step 3

PUT your stitched piece and backing fabric right sides together and sew, leaving a gap for turning. Turn out, stuff and slip stitch gap closed. Sew a button in the pincushion centre.

HOW TO... WEAVE LACY PICOT EDGING

Use picot edging to edge your lacy look bunting flags

Step 1



WORK the stitched bunting using the chart on page 78, then neaten the fabric edges. Thread your needle with Cotton a Broder and secure at the back. Holding the fabric edge away from you, bring the thread through the fabric and make a loop.

Step 2



ADJUST the loop to the size you would like. Insert a pin over it and into the fabric to help keep it firm while you work the picot. Pass the thread behind the top of the pin, then slip the needle through the loop. Tighten the stitch gently to form the top of the picot.

Step 3



CHECK to see that the thread is now on the left side of the loop. Pass the needle under the central thread to start the weaving of the picot. Pull tightly to help form the shape of the stitch. Leave it looser for a rounded stitch and tighter for a triangular stitch.

Step 4



TAKE the needle under the two outside loop threads for the second row of the picot; again pull the thread to form the stitch shape. Continue weaving until you reach fabric edge, secure thread end at back and remove pin. You can start the next picot.

MAKE... A LACE-TRIMMED MAKEUP BAG

Use a length of lace to add texture to a sweet stitched makeup bag

Step 1



WORK all the cross stitching using the chart on page 78. Cut your stitched fabric to the right size for the makeup bag you'd like to make and then position the lace trim where you would like it to go (in this case under the row of stitched vases). Pin in place.

Step 2



USE a sewing needle and length of thread that closely matches the colour of the lace trim. Carefully catch down the lace using small stitches so that the lace will be secure, but the stitches invisible. Finish neatly on the back.

Step 3



MAKE the zip pull for the bag. First, neaten both the raw edges of a short piece of lace trim with small over sewing stitches, this need to be very secure to stop the lace from fraying. Position over one end of a short length of ribbon and over sew in place.

Step 4



THREAD the lace topped length of ribbon carefully through the hole in the zip pull, then fold the ribbon in half and fold the neatened lace over the ribbon ends and over sew into place to finish neatly and securely. Your lacy zip pull is now complete.

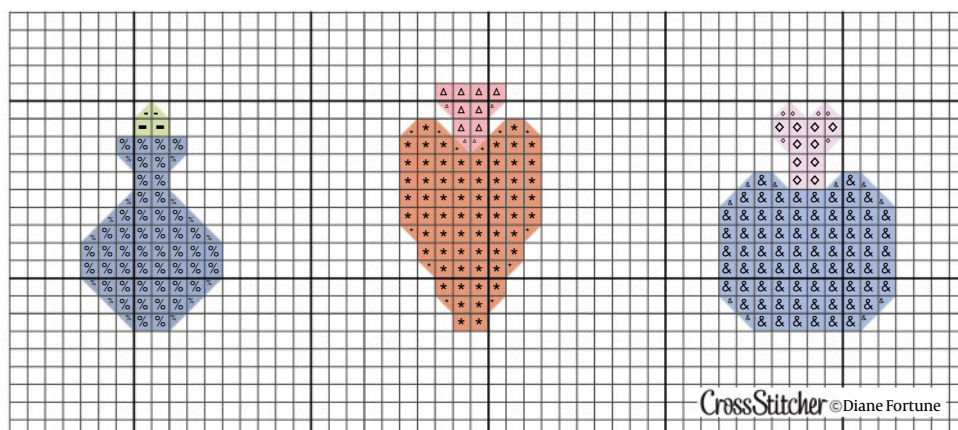
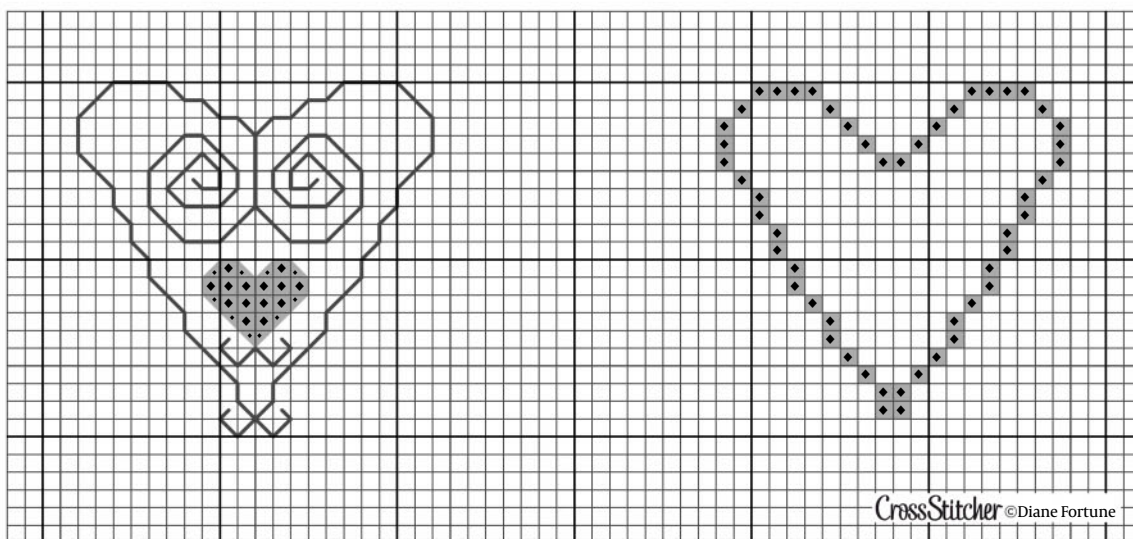
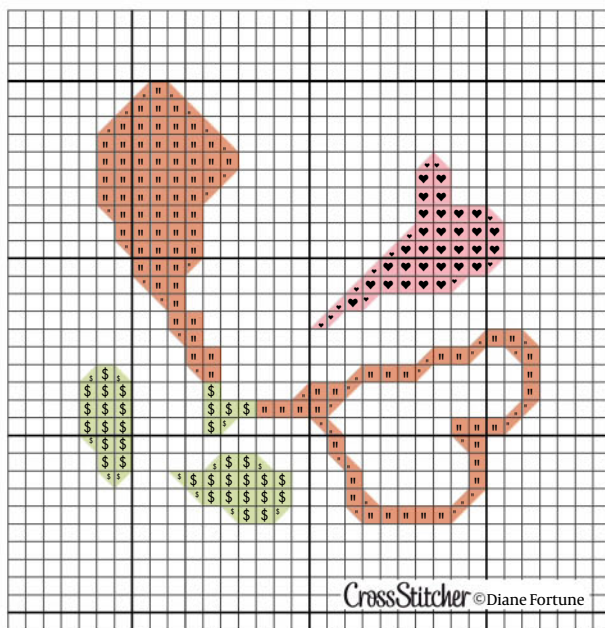

Stitching basics

TOOLS OF THE TRADE

NEEDLES

For basic stitching you'll need a tapestry needle that has a blunt tip and large eye. Use a size 24 needle for most aidas, and a size 26 for evenweaves and linens. Use a sharp embroidery needle for finer details such as backstitch and French knots.

EMBROIDERY SCISSORS

Embroidery scissors are an absolute must-have for stitchers and can be picked up for just a few pounds. Keep yours sharp by only using them to cut threads – that way a decent pair should last you a lifetime.

STRANDED COTTON

Embroidery thread is also commonly referred to as stranded cotton. Each thread length is made up of six strands of cotton twisted together. The chart key will indicate how many strands you'll need to stitch your design with.

HOOPS AND FRAMES

Though not absolutely essential, we do recommend using an embroidery hoop or frame to keep an even stitching tension. Just make sure it's big enough to fit your entire design.

AIDA

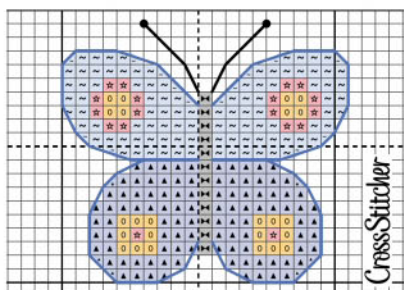
Aida is an ideal choice for cross stitch beginners. 14 count is the most common, although it's available in a huge variety of colours and counts. Each cross stitch is worked over a single aida block, making counting and keeping your place a cinch.

EVENWEAVE

Evenweave is much simpler to work with than you might think. Start with a 25 or 28 count evenweave, such as Zweigart Lugana. Once you're confident, try your hand at a linen version.

THE CHART

START stitching from the centre of the design and your fabric. The centre of our charts are indicated by dotted lines. To find the centre of your fabric, fold it in half and then into quarters.

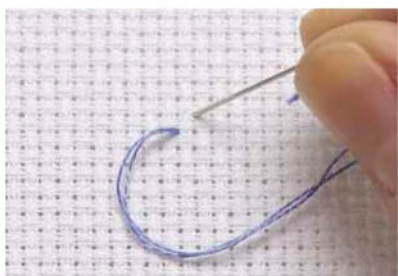


Reading the chart

EACH square on the chart represents a single cross stitch. Fractionals are half filled squares or squares filled with two different colours.

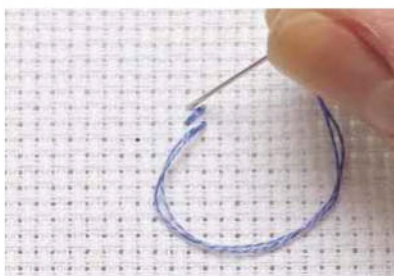
Start stitching... on aida

Step 1



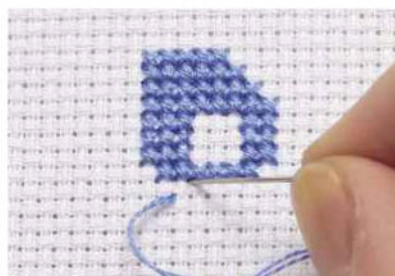
CUT a 40cm thread length, and thread your needle with two of the six strands. Knot one end and start with a waste knot (opposite). Make a diagonal half cross stitch across a single aida block.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross. Alternatively, you can work a row of half cross stitches first, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.

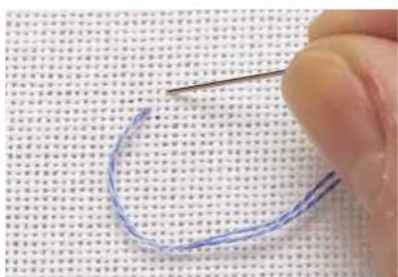
Step 3



THE direction of your diagonals is up to you, just be sure all your stitches cross in the same direction. Otherwise, your design will look uneven. Continue working from the centre outward.

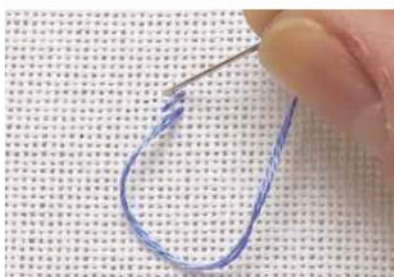
Start stitching... on evenweave

Step 1



INSTEAD of taking your needle diagonally across a single aida block, take your needle diagonally across two evenweave threads, creating a half cross stitch as before.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross stitch. Work each stitch individually or work a row of half cross stitches, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.

Step 3



CONTINUE working from the centre of your design outward. If you find the extra counting a bit daunting at first, don't give up. We promise it'll become second nature in no time.

THE KEY

ALL THE symbols that appear on the chart are listed in the key with their corresponding thread codes beside them. The key also tells you the different stitches used in the design.

Colour match

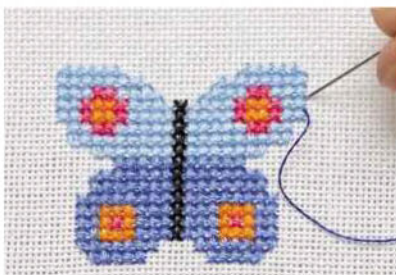
IN THE key, the closest column of thread codes listed next to the chart symbols is the thread brand that's used in the design. Similar colour matches are listed alongside it.



BACKSTITCH

Use this easy stitch to give a neat outline and add details

Step 1



WORK your backstitch using a sharp needle, once you've finished the cross stitch. To secure your thread, weave it through the back of your stitches, then bring your needle up to the surface.

Step 2



WORK your backstitch over about 1-3 chart squares at a time, making sure to closely follow the chart. Any longer and your stitches could end up becoming loose and pulling out.

Step 3

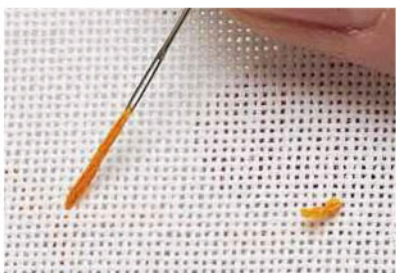


FOR each additional stitch, bring your needle up 1-3 chart squares away from your previous stitch. Then pass it back through the fabric at the same point as your previous stitch.

WASTE KNOT

A simple way to get started stitching

Step 1



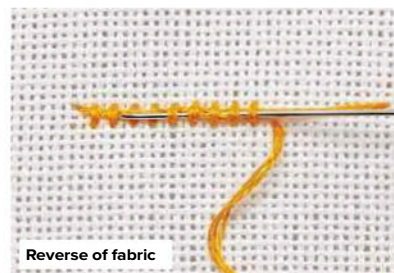
KNOT one end of your thread and take it down through the front of your fabric, about 2cm from your starting point. Then bring it back up to the front of your fabric to make your first stitch.

Step 2



BEGIN stitching your design, making sure you're stitching over your starting thread with each stitch. You can work whole stitches or work half stitches then come back on yourself.

Step 3

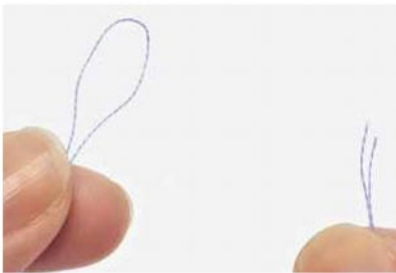


ONCE you're happy that your starting thread is secure, snip off the knot. To secure your thread when you've finished stitching, weave it through the back of your stitches as shown here.

LOOP KNOT

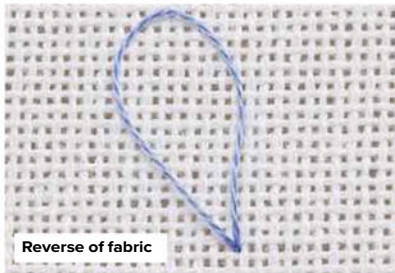
This easy start to your cross stitch is brilliantly neat

Step 1



IF YOU'RE working in two strands, a loop knot is the easiest and neatest method. Cut a single length of thread, twice as long as normal. Fold it in half to create a loop at one end.

Step 2



THREAD your needle with the two tail ends, just as you normally would. Bring your needle up to the front of your fabric, leaving a small loop of thread on the reverse.

Step 3

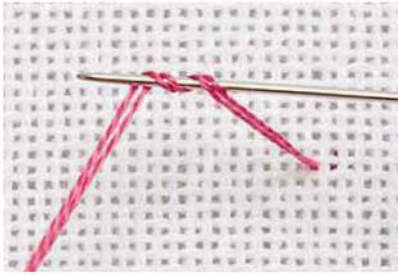


MAKE a half cross stitch, passing your needle through the loop on the reverse as shown here. Pull all the way to secure the thread. Now continue with your stitching as normal.

FRENCH KNOTS

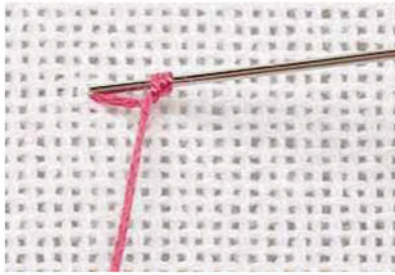
Go dotty with this simple way to add neat knots to your designs

Step 1



USE a sharp embroidery needle to help pierce the fabric. Bring your needle up at your starting point and wrap your thread once or twice around the needle. Use one strand for a small knot and two for a slightly chunkier knot.

Step 2



HOLD your thread end firmly and take your needle down, ever so slightly over from where you came up. Slide the twisted thread down the needle, so it rests on the fabric's surface, and gently feed the needle through the fabric.

Step 3

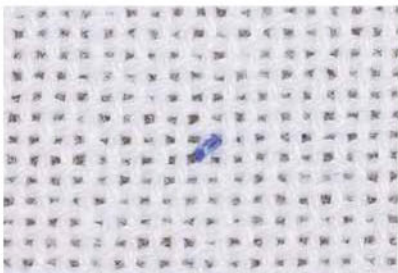


KEEP your thread as taut as possible to prevent the knot becoming loose. Gently pull your thread through to tighten the knot, so that it sits neatly on the surface. And remember, if you don't get it right away, keep practising!

FRACTIONALS

These little stitches are great for adding a bit more detail to your work

Step 1



START with a quarter stitch, working from one corner into the centre. For evenweave, there is already a hole in the centre to stitch into. With aida, you'll need to pierce the centre of the block.

Step 2



MAKE your next quarter stitch in your second colour, coming up from the opposite corner and back down through the centre. You've now created a half cross stitch.

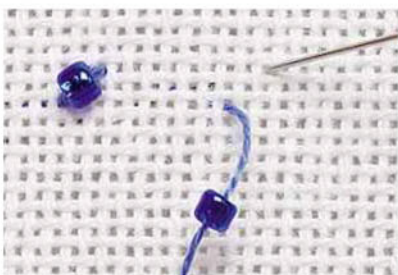
Step 3



FINISH your stitch by making a half cross stitch. Fractionals are shown in the chart either as two symbols opposite one another in a chart square, or by a symbol opposite an empty space.

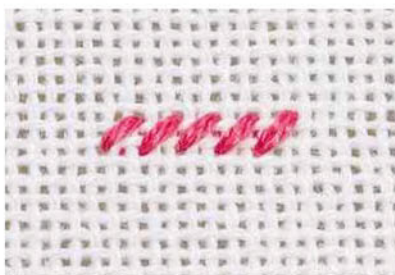
BEADING

TO ATTACH beads, you'll need a thin, flexible beading needle. Thread with one strand of cotton. Bring your needle to the front of your design, thread on a bead and make a diagonal stitch to secure the bead. If you like, stitch through again for added security.



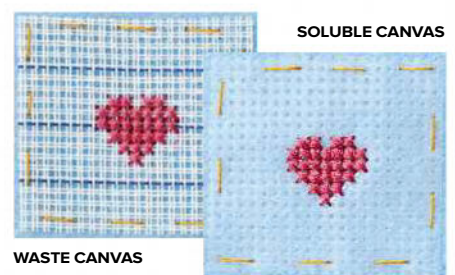
HALF CROSS STITCH

HALF cross stitches are exactly what they sound like – half of a cross stitch. Each diagonal stitch is worked across two evenweave threads or one aida block. They're most often used to create a subtle background in a design.



WASTE AND SOLUBLE CANVAS

WASTE and soluble canvases are used when stitching on plain fabrics and felts. Tack onto your fabric and stitch as normal. Soluble canvas dissolves in water. For waste canvas, soak in water then remove each thread individually.
