Make a... gift tag

Step 1

STITCH your chosen letter on to a 5x4cm piece of 14 count aida using two strands of stranded cotton for the cross stitch, with one for the backstitch and the French knots.

Step 2


CUT the aida fabric two squares outside the stitched letter. Gently pull away one block of fabric on each side of the letter to create a frayed edge.


Step 3


PLACE a piece of double-sided tape onto the back of the stitched letter, then press it centrally onto the front of the tag. Thread a length of baker's twine through the hole in the tag to complete.





Paint the outer section of the hoop with two coats of emulsion. We used a match pot of teal coloured paint. Allow to dry thoroughly before using

How to... frame your work in a hoop

Step 1



TRIM your stitching and a fabric piece into a circle slightly larger than your hoop. Place the inside hoop beneath the two pieces and the outer hoop on top. Centre and press over your work. Pull taut and tighten the screw.

Step 2



TURN your stitching to the reverse and cut a piece of felt to fit inside the inner circle. Place the felt inside the hoop. You can use a bit of fabric glue to keep it in place. The felt will pad your stitching, and stop anything showing through.

- Stranded cotton as listed in the key
- Size 26 tapestry needle
- Wooden embroidery hoop, 10cm (4in)
- Ribbon bow

Step 3



USE a glue gun or double-sided tape to begin attaching the first layer of fabric, pulling taut as you go. Repeat for the second layer. Cut a second felt layer to fit over the back of your hoop. Secure with glue or small neat stitches.

Inside the mind of

MR X SIIIUI

Cross stitch, the final frontiers. Jamie aims to boldly go where no manbroiderer has gone before...

ately, for reasons that I can't fully explain yet, I've been thinking about cross stitch frontiers.

Those areas around the edge of the form where there's space to play and try new things. Where are the bits that we can explore and do more with?

Let's have a look at the main materials we use – fabric and stitches. Fabric is an area where things can get interesting. We've all stitched on aida and evenweave, and many of us will have used interfaces to branch out onto other materials. But do you know where there's a frontier? Printed canvasses! With digital printing technologies exploding onto the scene, it's never been cheaper and

stitched areas turn dark when the lights are off, with the background shining through, and this gives a great opportunity for negative stitching or adding hidden designs that only come out at night. I tried stitching a QR code onto some GitD fabric – if you're in the dark but need an embroidery website in a hurry, bleep my QR code with your phone and you'll go straight to Mr X Stitch – the world's best contemporary embroidery website – and problem sorted. This idea could save lives!*

The brick patterns is a design I thought of when preparing for a workshop at a school. We created a design big enough so that individuals could stitch their names onto a single


easier to have fabric printed with a design of your choosing, so now's the time to think about this base material when planning a new project.

I've stitched on a fair few colours of fabric in my time, mostly coming back to black for something edgy, and using good old antique white for most things. But I've experimented with new fabric designs along the way. Two of my favourites are glow-in-the-dark fabric – yes that's right, glow-in-the-dark – and fabric with a brick design on it. Glow-in-the-dark fabric absorbs the light and shines for a fair while after the lights have gone out. The

'brick' and all of the pieces could be combined to create a wall quilt. I never got to see the finished product, but while experimenting with the design, I got some fabric with smaller bricks, and threw together an Arctic Monkeys inspired stitchery for my fiancée. Why graffiti on real walls when you can stitch on fabric ones? No destruction of property, just some good old urban cross stitch for the modern home!

There are heaps more frontiers out there and I'll explore more of them in this column. If you know of a frontier I should look at, get in touch! * Unlikely

JUMPER FOR JOY



Designed by: Lucie Heaton Max. stitch count: 41 high x 45 wide Max. design size: 8x7.5cm (31/4x3in) Stitch time: 5 hours each

These designs were stitched on 14 count aida fabric.

Make a... framed picture

Step 1

STITCH the jumpers that you would like to use in your framed picture. Cut each into a rectangle, a few squares outside the edge of the finished jumper design. Remove threads on each side of the fabric to give a frayed edge.

Step 2

FRAME a piece of complementary fabric - we used cloud blue evenweave. Stretch a length of baker's twine across the picture, taking the ends behind the frame and securing them on the back.

Step 3

USE small wooden pegs to attach your stitched jumpers to the washing line. You may wish to add a small amount of glue to the pegs to hold them securely to the aida.



Materials

- Zweigart 14 count white aida, ref: 3706/100, 12.5x12.5cm (5x5in) for each jumper
- Fabric Flair 28 count cloud blue evenweave, for the background
- Stranded cotton as listed in the key
- Red baker's twine or string
- Clothes pegs
- Wooden frame to fit

Stitch as many or as few jumpers as you like and simply extend your 'washing line' to fit!

Stitch one jumper and frame in an aperture card to make a fun Christmas card!

Materials

- Zweigart 14 count white aida, ref: 3706/100, 12.5x12.5cm (5x5in) for each jumper
- Stranded cotton as listed in the key
- White felt for decoration backs, 12.5x12.5cm (5x5in) for each jumper
- Red ribbon
- Toy stuffing

Make a... tree decoration

Step 1

STITCH the jumper front. Place the jumper and felt right sides together.

Step 2

CUT a length of ribbon and fold in half, bringing the cut ends together. Place the ribbon between the fabric and felt, with the cut ends against the edge of the fabric, and the folded end between the layers.

Step 3

USE a sewing machine to stitch the rough shape of the jumper, at least 5mm (1/4in) outside the outer edge of the design, and leaving a gap at the bottom for turning.

Step 4

TRIM and then turn the decoration through to the right side.

Step 5

FILL the decoration with toy stuffing through the gap left at the bottom, and then fold in the fabric and close the gap with small, neat stitches.

Make a... bag

Step 1

FOLD your fabric both ways to find the centre. Start stitching in the centre of the fabric with the long fabric edges at the top and bottom.

Step 2

TURN over the top edge of the fabric, twice on to the wrong side. Iron, then machine stitch in place.

Step 3

WITH right side facing, sew up the centre back seam, then neaten on the inside. Iron the bag so that the design is at the centre front and the seam centre back.

Step 4

STITCH across the bottom of the bag then neaten the seam. Turn to the right side.





With a limited colour palette and no backstitch, this design will stitch up relatively easily!

How to... frame a picture

Step 1



CUT a piece of white mount board to fit inside your frame. Place your design centrally over the mount board and pin the fabric around the board to secure, starting at the centre of each side and working outwards.

Step 2




PIN around the entire perimeter and check you are happy with the positioning of your design, then turn over to the reverse. Use double-sided tape to secure the fabric excess around all four sides.


Step 3




SECURE the fabric edges with masking tape and remove the pins. Position your stitching in the frame and back with a second piece of mount board. Seal the edges with more masking tape to finish off.

TAKE THE CAKE







Stitch count: 39 high x 161 wide Design size: 7x29cm (2¾x11½in) Stitch time: 29 hours

This design was stitched on 14 count aida fabric

Make a... cake band

Step 1

MEASURE your cake diameter and then add on a small amount for the overlap. Start stitching centrally on the band at one end of the fabric, leaving the overlap blank.

Step 2

WORK the cross stitch, holding the aida band in your hand to ensure an even tension.

Step 3

REPEAT the design, or part of the design, to fill the band.

Presenting someone with a homemade Christmas cake? You could change your thread colours to a Jestive red and green scheme, if you prefer!

- Zweigart white aida band, ref: 7008/001, 8cm (31/8in)
- Stranded cotton as listed in the key

All we want for Christmas...

We took four ladies who make a living from cross stitch and asked them about their crafty Christmases, including what they will be stitching to celebrate this year...

Interview by Katie Allen

ross stitch and

decorations. Which got us
thinking – what do the lucky folks
with crafty careers do to make
sure their Christmas is a stitching
success? We asked four ladies in
the business to share with us their
favourite festive traditions and
seasonal stitching dreams...

Tell us about your cross stitch journey!

I've always been crafty, since I was about 10 years old when my mother taught me to use the sewing machine. I first started cross stitch years ago when my neighbour took me to a local shop and I was hooked.

Several years later I entered a sampler design contest – and won second place! Then, I was hooked again – this time on designing my own projects.

My first design was a Christmas stocking. I printed out some patterns and took them and the stocking to the local shop. The lady in the shop took all I had and paid me for them on the spot. I was thrilled. About a week later she called to say she had run out! That was 21 years ago, so the new hobby turned into a business and has worked out pretty well.

How would you describe your style?

I would say sophisticated traditional with a twist. Antique samplers have always been an inspiration, but I like to play with that concept and give them a modern twist. I also love doing speciality stitches and think they add so much texture and interest to cross stitch.

Tell us a bit more about your Christmas designs!

I love doing Christmas designs. You always get to start with a pretty palette and there are so many lovely images associated with Christmas...Santa, pine trees, snowmen, ivy, holly, mistletoe, wreaths...

What do you hope to stitch for Christmas this year?

We are focusing on Christmas ornaments as they seem to be such an enduring tradition and are quick to stitch. We will be doing groups of ornaments in one pattern with a common theme: this year we are doing six little 'joys'.

Do you have any special crafty Christmas traditions?

Our family tradition is rather big and

garish Christmas stockings. I think my grandmother started it when she made each grandchild a Christmas stocking out of felt. My sister still makes the felt ones. I do cross stitch but have kept them in my own traditional style.

What are your favourite Christmas gifts you like to make?

I'm pretty much the 'crafty' giver in my family. Every year I knit small items for everyone... mittens, hats, scarves. Each year I also send preserves and pickles, chutneys and relishes. I'm a very practical Christmas gift giver!



INSPIRING PEOPLE



HEATHER GRAY Modern Needleworks www.modernneedleworks.com

Can you tell us a bit about yourself and Modern Needleworks?

I've always been inspired by my grandmother – she could make anything. I spent a lot of time with her and I learned so much. As an adult, most of the needlepoint and cross stitch designs available didn't fit with my personal style, which is a mix of vintage, modern, industrial and primitive – nothing formal or fussy.

So, armed with everything my grandmother had taught me, I designed and stitched a few pieces. I love bold, often simple, graphics and clean lines. My friends and family raved about them – so Modern Needleworks was born!

Tell us a bit more about your Christmas designs

I have always adored handmade Christmas ornaments, especially hand-stitched ones. However,



turning a piece of cross stitch or needlepoint into an ornament often requires expensive or complex finishing: I wanted to create something that did not require this and also conveyed my simple, modern aesthetic.

What will you be stitching for Christmas this year?

I'm actually working on something totally different: I'm stitching a vintage-inspired floral design which will be a gift for a friend. I doubt it will be a design I would sell but sometimes I have to shake things up a bit.

Have you based any Christmas traditions on your love of craft?

a number of bookmarks recently that have gone over well so I'd love to do more of those. I've also expanded the personalised section of my shop.


Have you got any Christmas traditions of your own?



How to... frame in a flexi-hoop

Step 1

TRIM your stitching into an oval slightly larger than your hoop.

Step 2

CENTRE over the inner hoop and press the outer hoop down over your fabric.

PULL your fabric taut, then on the back secure to the inner hoop with glue or double-sided tape.

Step 4

CUT an oval of felt the same size as your hoop. Place over the back of the stitching and secure it to the fabric with small neat stitches.



STITCHING THE DESIGN

FOLD your fabric both ways to find the centre. Start stitching in the fabric edge at the top and bottom. Work all the cross stitch in two strands of stranded cotton over two threads of evenweave, and then the areas of backstitch in one, two and three strands of stranded

Make a... tote bag

Step 1

TURN over the top edge of the fabric twice on to the wrong side. Iron, then machine stitch in place.

Step 2

WITH right sides facing, sew up the centre back seam, then neaten on the inside. Iron the bag so that the design is at the centre front and the seam is centre.

STITCH across the bottom of the bag then neaten the seam. Turn to the right side.


Step 4

CUT two bag handles from the webbing. Fold under the ends and then machine stitch the handles to the bag top on the front and back.

Count carefully when stitching the snowflakes to make sure you place every stitch correctly

Make a... Santa decoration

Step 1

CUT around the stitched Santa, leaving 1cm (1/2in) outside the edge of the design. Working on the wrong side, roll your Santa into a cone shape, then pin the back seam. Hold Santa up to the light and check that the parcel, Santa's hand, belt and fur trim all line up correctly across the seam.

Step 2

TURN Santa to the right side and fill with toy stuffing. Carefully fold the unstitched aida fabric inside the cone.

Step 3

SNIP a 6cm (2½in) circle from black felt. Place the felt on the bottom of the cone. Pin and then slip stitch around the edge using black sewing thread and small, neat stitches.

Step 4

SEW a black button to the front of Santa's belt, and a bell to the end of Santa's hat. Thread a length of sparkly thread or ribbon through the top of Santa's hat and tie in a knot to create a hanging loop.



Make an... aperture card

Step 1

WORK all the cross stitch in two strands of stranded cotton over two threads of the evenweave, and the backstitch and French knots in one strand.

Step 2

TRIM the stitched evenweave to fit your card, with the design placed centrally behind the aperture.

Step 3

ATTACH double-sided tape to the inside of the card around the edge of the aperture.

Step 4

PLACE the stitching on the table right-side up, and then place the card on top, pressing down firmly.

Step 5

CHECK which flap will fold over on to the back of the stitching, then add strips of double-sided tape and press firmly in place.

Make an... advent clock

Step 1

TRIM your stitching larger than your cardboard circle, so that when wrapped around it there is a 7cm ($2\frac{1}{2}$ in) overlap on the reverse side.

Step 2

MAKE a hole in the centre of both cardboard circles, large enough for the shaft of the mechanism to go through. Wrap your stitching over one cardboard circle and with sharp scissors make a small hole in the centre of your fabric - this is marked on the chart as grey squares.

Step 3

USE glue or double-sided tape to attach the stitching onto this cardboard circle - it's important that the hole in the fabric and the cardboard line up exactly.


Step 4

ATTACH the second cardboard circle to the back of the first with tape or glue - this will hide the excess fabric on the reverse side.

Step 5

PUSH the shaft of the clock mechanism through the clock. Add the washer, nut and the clock hand. Your clock is now ready for use.

No need to add batteries to your clock mechanism as you simply turn the hand to the correct day manually!







Make an... aperture card

Step 1

work all the cross stitch in two strands of stranded cotton over two threads of fabric, and the backstitch in one strand. Do not stitch the areas marked in grey on the chart. When all the other stitching is complete, sew a button in the centre of each marked area.

Step 2

TRIM the stitched fabric to fit your card, with the design centrally placed behind the card's aperture.

Step 3

ATTACH double-sided tape to the inside of the card around the edge of the aperture.

Step 4

PLACE the stitching on the table right-side up, and then place the card on top, pressing down firmly on the tape.

Step 5

CHECK which flap will fold onto the back of the stitching, then add strips of double-sided tape and press firmly down to secure.

Make a... decoration

Step 1

STITCH your chosen Kawaii character. Place the stitching and a piece of felt right sides together.

Step 2

CUT a length of ribbon and fold in half, bringing the cut ends together. Place the ribbon between the fabric and felt, with the cut ends against the edge of the fabric, and the folded end between the layers.

Step 3

USE a sewing machine to stitch a rough circle around the stitching at least 5mm (1/4in) outside the outer edge of the design, and leaving a gap at the bottom for turning. If you prefer, use a circular lid as a template to draw around. Machine stitch on this line.

Step 4

TRIM and then turn the decoration through to the right side.

Step 5

FILL the decoration with toy stuffing through the gap left at the bottom, and then fold in the fabric and close the gap with small neat stitches.














































































































































hat better time of the year for adding a bit of shimmer to your stitching, than at Christmas? This month we've created three festive decorations that will make your stitching shine! We've used three techniques that are quick to stitch and simple to do. Add a sprinkling of spangles or sequins to our snowflake design, or glittering gems to this simple Christmas tree decoration. Or for something a bit more challenging how about couching a festive gold bow to the top of our beautiful bauble design?















THE Savvy Stitcher

HOW TO... ADD SPANGLES AND SEQUINS


Spangles and sequins add a delicate shimmering touch to your work

Step 2

Step 1



STITCH your snowflake design using the chart on page 78. You can now add a bit of sparkle! Start by securing your thread on the reverse of your stitching and then bring your needle back up to the fabric's surface and thread on a single spangle.




SECURE the spangle with three straight stitches. Make your first stitch by taking the needle down over the spangle edge at A. Pull the thread through to the reverse. Move one third of the way along the spangle edge and bring the needle up at B.

Step 3



TAKE the needle down through the centre of the spangle to make second straight stitch, C. For the third stitch, come up a third of the way along the spangle edge, and down through the centre. Finish your thread by weaving it through the reverse of your stitches.

Step 4



work with sequins instead of spangles, if you prefer. Sequins, shown here, D, have a higher reflective surface and are more readily available from craft shops. Spangles are flat discs as shown, E, and are more often used in goldwork embroidery.

MAKE A... GEM DECORATED CHRISTMAS TREE

Create a cute tree and attach your gems neatly using our step-by-step guide

Step 1



MAKE your tree hanging first, as it's easier to attach the gems once it's finished. Tack the tree template on page 78 onto your fabric – centring the cross stitched tree trunk. Place the backing fabric on top and then pin together.

Step 2



fabric and backing together, following your tacking stitches. Leave an opening along one side for turning. Trim the excess fabric and then make 'v' shaped notches around the curved edges for a smoother finish.

Step 3



TURN the fabric tree right side out and then fill it with toy stuffing. Pin the opening together and slip stitch it closed. Remove any visible tacking stitches. Take an embroidery needle and secure to the fabric where the first gem will be placed.

Step 4



LOOK at the base of the gem, and you will see that it has a hole for stitching. Pass the threaded needle through the gem base and back through the fabric, as you would when stitching on a button. Repeat this until it is completely secure.

HOW TO... CREATE A COUCHED BOW


Couching is a great technique for showing off specialist threads

Step 1



PLACE your gold thread onto the design to create the couched bow. Leave a tail end of 3-4cm beyond your starting point and using a single strand of cotton and an embroidery needle, bring the needle up next to the gold thread, A.

Step 2



MAKE a couching stitch over the gold thread. Take the needle down through the fabric, angling the needle beneath the gold thread so it wraps around it, B. Bring the needle up, 2-3mm from the first stitch, C, and make a second couching stitch, etc.

Step 3



CREATE the curved shape of the bow, angling the stitches to follow the curve. Take care not to pull your couching stitches too tightly as this will distort the smooth line of the gold thread. Once you've completed the first loop you can move to step 4.

Step 4a Step 4b





TAKE the starting tail end through to the reverse with a tapestry needle, D (4a). On the fabric reverse place the gold thread back on itself and over sew the tail end using the back of your couching stitches to secure (4b). Trim off the excess gold thread.



TOOLS OF THE TRADE

NEEDLES

For basic stitching you'll need a tapestry needle that has a blunt tip and large eye. Use a size 24 needle for most aidas, and a size 26 for evenweaves and linens. Use a sharp embroidery needle for finer details such as backstitch and French knots.

EMBROIDERY SCISSORS

Embroidery scissors are an absolute must-have for stitchers and can be picked up for just a few pounds. Keep yours sharp by only using them to cut threads – that way a decent pair should last you a lifetime.

STRANDED COTTON

Embroidery thread is also commonly referred to as stranded cotton. Each thread length is made up of six strands of cotton twisted together. The chart key will indicate how many strands you'll need to stitch your design with.

HOOPS AND FRAMES

Though not absolutely essential, we do recommend using an embroidery hoop or frame to keep an even stitching tension. Just make sure it's big enough to fit your entire design.

AIDA

Aida is an ideal choice for cross stitch beginners.

14 count is the most common, although it's available in a huge variety of colours and counts.


Each cross stitch is worked over a single aida block, making counting and keeping your place a cinch.

EVENWEAVE

Evenweave is much simpler to work with than you might think. Start with a 25 or 28 count evenweave, such as Zweigart Lugana. Once you're confident, try your hand at a linen version.

THE CHART

START stitching from the centre of the design and your fabric. The centre of our charts are indicated by arrows at the designs' edges. To find your fabric's centre, fold it in half and into quarters.



Reading the chart

EACH square on the chart represents a single cross stitch. Fractionals are half filled squares or squares filled with two different colours.

THE KEY


ALL THE symbols that appear on the chart are listed in the key with their corresponding thread codes beside them. The key also tells you the different stitches used in the design.

IN THE key, the closest column of thread codes listed next to the chart symbols is the thread brand that's used in the design. Similar



Start stitching... on aida



CUT a 40cm thread length, and thread your needle with two of the six strands. Knot one end and start with a waste knot (opposite). Make a diagonal half cross stitch across a single aida block.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross. Alternatively, you can work a row of half cross stitches first, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.


Step 3



THE direction of your diagonals is up to you, just be sure all your stitches cross in the same direction. Otherwise, your design will look uneven. Continue working from the centre outward.

Start stitching... on evenweave

Step 1



INSTEAD of taking your needle diagonally across a single aida block, take your needle diagonally across two evenweave threads, creating a half cross stitch as before.

Step 2



MAKE a second diagonal stitch to complete your first cross stitch. Work each stitch individually or work a row of half cross stitches, then work back on yourself to complete the stitches.

Step 3




CONTINUE working from the centre of your design outward. If you find the extra counting a bit daunting at first, don't give up. We promise it'll become second nature in no time.

BACKSTITCH


Use this easy stitch to give a neat outline and add details

Step 1



WORK your backstitch using a sharp needle, once you've finished the cross stitch. To secure your thread, weave it through the back of your stitches, then bring your needle up to the surface.

Step 2



WORK your backstitch over about 1-3 chart squares at a time, making sure to closely follow the chart. Any longer and your stitches could end up becoming loose and pulling out.

Step 3



FOR each additional stitch, bring your needle up 1-3 chart squares away from your previous stitch. Then pass it back through the fabric at the same point as your previous stitch.

WASTE KNOT


A simple way to get started stitching

Step 1



KNOT one end of your thread and take it down through the front of your fabric, about 2cm from your starting point. Then bring it back up to the front of your fabric to make your first stitch.

Step 2



BEGIN stitching your design, making sure you're stitching over your starting thread with each stitch. You can work whole stitches or work half stitches then come back on yourself.

Step 3



ONCE you're happy that your starting thread is secure, snip off the knot. To secure your thread when you've finished stitching, weave it through the back of your stitches as shown here.

LOOP KNOT

This easy start to your cross stitch is brilliantly neat

Step 1




IF YOU'RE working in two strands, a loop knot is the easiest and neatest method. Cut a single length of thread, twice as long as normal. Fold it in half to create a loop at one end.

Step 2



THREAD your needle with the two tail ends, just as you normally would. Bring your needle up to the front of your fabric, leaving a small loop of thread on the reverse.

Step 3




MAKE a half cross stitch, passing your needle through the loop on the reverse as shown here. Pull all the way to secure the thread. Now continue with your stitching as normal.

FRENCH KNOTS

Go dotty with this simple way to add neat knots to your designs

Step 1



USE a sharp embroidery needle to help pierce the fabric. Bring your needle up at your starting point and wrap your thread once or twice around the needle. Use one strand for a small knot and two for a slightly chunkier knot.

Step 2



HOLD your thread end firmly and take your needle down, ever so slightly over from where you came up. Slide the twisted thread down the needle, so it rests on the fabric's surface, and gently feed the needle through the fabric.

Step 3




KEEP your thread as taut as possible to prevent the knot becoming loose. Gently pull your thread through to tighten the knot, so that it sits neatly on the surface. And remember, if you don't get it right away, keep practising!

FRACTIONALS

These little stitches are great for adding a bit more detail to your work

Step 1



START with a quarter stitch, working from one corner into the centre. For evenweave, there is already a hole in the centre to stitch into. With aida, you'll need to pierce the centre of the block.

Step 2



MAKE your next quarter stitch in your second colour, coming up from the opposite corner and back down through the centre. You've now created a half cross stitch.


Step 3



FINISH your stitch by making a half cross stitch. Fractionals are shown in the chart either as two symbols opposite one another in a chart square, or by a symbol opposite an empty space.

BEADING

TO ATTACH beads, you'll need a thin, flexible beading needle. Thread with one strand of cotton. Bring your needle to the front of your design, thread on a bead and make a diagonal stitch to secure the bead. If you like, stitch through again for added security.




HALF CROSS STITCH

HALF cross stitches are exactly what they sound like – half of a cross stitch. Each diagonal stitch is worked across two evenweave threads or one aida block. They're most often used to create a subtle background in a design.



WASTE AND SOLUBLE CANVAS

waste and soluble canvases are used when stitching on plain fabrics and felts. Tack onto your fabric and stitch as normal. Soluble canvas dissolves in water. For waste canvas, soak in water then remove each thread individually.


