## EMMA VINING

This month we have a chat with designer Emma Vining about cables, tension and more.

## Favourite knitting technique?

Cables and twisted stitches are my favourite stitches. I love the way you can 'draw' lines with cables on a knitted surface to create interesting and flattering designs.

## Tips for knitting jumpers?

 My number one tip would be to knit a tension square. There's a huge temptation to get straight into the main knitting, but if your tension doesn't match the pattern tension then your finished garment will not look its best.Why do you particularly enjoy designing knitting patterns? I constantly look for inspiration everywhere I go and I love combining ideas to create interesting stitch patterns. Putting these ideas into designs that can be made by other people is very satisfying.

## Favourite new yarn?

I'm always on the lookout for new yarns and shades and love swatching the same stitch pattern in different weights and fibres. Seeing how a stitch pattern can emerge or disappear with a yarn is fascinating.

## Worst knitting habit?

My worst knitting habit is at the end of the day when I tell myself just one more row and then find myself still knitting an hour later!

Row 2 K1 (2: 1: 2: 1), P3, *K2, P3; rep from * to last 1 (2: 1: 2: 1) sts, K1 (2: 1: 2: 1).

Row 3 P1 (2: 1: 2: 1), s11, k2tog, psso,
*P2, sl1, k2tog, psso; rep from * to last 1 (2: 1: 2: 1) sts, P1 (2: 1: 2: 1).
Row 4 K1 (2: 1: 2: 1), (P1, K1, P1) all into next st, *K2, (P1, K1, P1) all into next st; rep from * to last 1 (2: 1: 2: 1) sts, K1 (2: 1: 2: 1).
These 4 rows form patt (see Pattern Note, left).
Cont in patt until Back meas 15 (15: 15: 14: 14) cm , ending with RS facing for next row.

## SHAPE ARMHOLES

Cast off 3 (4:5: 6: 7) sts at beg of next 2 rows, keeping patt correct.
[109 (119: 135: 145: 161) sts]
Dec 1 st at each end of next 3 (5: 7: 7: 9) rows, then on foll 1 (2: 4:5:7) alt rows. [101 (105: 113: 121: 129) sts]

Cont straight until armhole meas 20 (21: 22: 23: 24)cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

## SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off 5 (5: 6: 7: 7) sts at beg of next 2 rows, keeping patt correct.
[91 (95: 101: 107: 115) sts]

## SHAPE BACK NECK

Next row (RS) Cast off 5 (5: 6: 7: 7) sts, patt until there are 20 (22: 23: 25: 28) sts on right needle and turn, leaving rem sts on a holder. Work each side of neck separately.

Dec 1 st at neck edge of next 4 rows and AT THE SAME TIME cast off 5 (6: 6: 7: 8) sts at beg of 2 nd and foll alt row. Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off rem 6 (6:7:7: 8) sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 41 (41: 43: 43: 45) sts onto a holder, rejoin yarns and patt to end. Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

## LEFT FRONT

Cast on 56 (62: 71: 77: 86) sts using 4 mm needles and one strand each of Yarns $A$ and $B$ held together.
Row 1 (RS) P1 (2: 1: 2: 1), *K3, P2; rep from * to end.
Row 2 *K2, P3; rep from * to last 1 (2: 1: 2: 1) sts, K1 (2: 1: 2: 1).
Row 3 P1 (2: 1: 2: 1), *sl1, k2tog, psso, P2; rep from * to end.
Row 4 *K2, (P1, K1, P1) all into next st; rep from * to last 1 (2: 1: 2: 1) sts, K1 (2: 1: 2: 1).
These 4 rows form patt (see note, left).
Cont in patt until Left Front matches Back to beg of armhole shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

Dec 1 st at armhole edge of next 3 (5: 7: 7: 9) rows, then on foll 1 (2: 4: 5: 7) alt rows. [49 (51: 55: 59: 63) sts]

Cont straight until 14 (14: 16: 16: 18) rows less have been worked than on Back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

## SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (RS) Patt 36 (38: 42: 46: 50) sts and turn, leaving rem 13 sts on a holder (for neckband).

Keeping patt correct, dec 1 st at neck edge of next 6 rows, then on foll 3 (3: 4: 4: 5) alt rows. [27 (29: 32: 36: 39) sts]

Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.

## SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off 5 (5: 6: 7: 7) sts at beg of next and foll 3 (1:3: 3: 1) alt rows, then - (6: -: $-: 8)$ sts at beg of foll $-(2:-:-: 2)$ alt rows, keeping patt correct, and AT THE SAME TIME dec 1 st at neck edge of 3rd row. Work 1 row, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off rem 6 (6: 7: 7: 8) sts.

## RIGHT FRONT

Cast on 56 (62: 71: 77: 86) sts using 4 mm needles and one strand each of Yarns A and B held together.
Row 1 (RS) *P2, K3; rep from * to last 1 (2: 1: 2: 1) sts, P1 (2: 1: 2: 1).
Row 2 K1 (2: 1: 2: 1), *P3, K2; rep from * to end.
Row 3 *P2, sl1, k2tog, psso; rep from * to last 1 (2: 1: 2: 1) sts, P1 (2: 1: 2: 1).
Row 4 K1 (2: 1: 2: 1), *(P1, K1, P1) all into next st, K2; rep from * to end.
These 4 rows form patt (see pattern note).

Complete to match Left Front, reversing shapings and working first row of neck shaping as folls:

## SHAPE FRONT NECK

Next row (RS) Patt 13 sts and slip these sts onto a holder (for neckband), patt to end. [36 (38: 42: 46: 50) sts]

SLEEVES
Cast on 49 (51: 53: 53: 55) sts using
$33 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and one strand each of Yarns A and B held together.
Row 1 (RS) K1, *P1, K1; rep from * to end.
Row 2 P1, *K1, P1; rep from * to end.
Rows 3 \& 4 As rows $1 \& 2$.

Change to 4 mm needles.

Beg with a P row, work in rev st st, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of 7th (5th: 5th: 5th: 3rd) and every foll 8th (6th: 6th: 6th: 4th) row to 69 (57: 63: 79:
59) sts, then on every foll - (8th: 8th:

8th: 6th) row until there are - (73: 77: 81: 85) sts.

Cont straight until Sleeve meas 38 (39:
40: 40: 40)cm, ending with RS facing for next row.

## SHAPE TOP

Cast off 3 (4: 5: 6: 7) sts at beg of next 2 rows. [63 (65: 67: 69: 71) sts]
Dec 1 st at each end of next 5 rows, then on every foll alt row until 43 sts rem, then on foll 11 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off rem 21 sts.

## TO MAKE UP

Block carefully, following any instructions on the ball band. Join both shoulder seams using back stitch, or mattress stitch if preferred.

## NECKBAND

With RS facing, using $33 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and one strand each of Yarns $A$ and $B$ held together, slip 13 sts on right front holder onto right needle, rejoin yarns and pick up and knit 21 (21: 23: 23: 25) sts up right side of front neck, and 5 sts down right side of back neck, K across 41 (41: 43: 43: 45) sts on back holder, pick up and knit 5 sts up left side of back neck, and 21 (21: 23: 23: 25) sts down left side of front neck, then patt across 13 sts on left front holder.
[119 (119: 125: 125: 131) sts]
Row 1 (WS) K1, *P1, K1; rep from * to end.
Row 2 K2, *P1, K1; rep from * to last st, K1.
These 2 rows form rib.
Work in rib for a further 5 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off in rib.

## BUTTON BAND

With RS facing, using $33 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and one strand each of Yarns $A$ and $B$ held together, pick up and knit 71 (73: 73: 73: 75) sts evenly down Left Front


You'll work the shell rib pattern on the body and reverse st st on the sleeves.
opening edge, from top of neckband to cast-on edge.
Beg with row 1, work in rib as given for neckband for 7 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off in rib.

## BUTTONHOLE BAND

With RS facing, using $33 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and one strand each of Yarns A and B held together, pick up and knit 71 (73: 73: 73: 75) sts evenly up Right Front opening edge, from cast-on edge to top of neckband.

Beg with row 1, work in rib as given for neckband for 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.
Row 4 (RS) Rib 3 (4: 4: 4: 3), *yrn, work 2 tog (to make a buttonhole), rib 14 (14: 14: 14: 15); rep from * 3 times more, yrn, work 2 tog (to make 5th buttonhole), rib 2 (3: 3: 3: 2).
Work in rib for a further 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off in rib.

## TO MAKE UP

Sew in sleeves using the set-in method. Sew up side and sleeve seams.

Need a gift for a new arrival or a quick-knit donation for charity? You can't go wrong with this adorable little jacket-and it's super simple to make too. If you've mastered garter stitch, stocking stitch and basic shaping, you can manage this! In fact it'll knit up so easily you might be tempted to make a whole pile of them...

## NOTE

As garter st is reversible, place a marker to mark the right side of the work using a strand of yarn of a different colour.
The coat is made in one piece, starting with right front.

## RIGHT FRONT

Cast on 26 (28: 30: 33 ) sts using $51 / 2 m m$ needles.
Work in garter st (knit every row) until work measures 3 cm .
Continue in st st for 13 (15: 17: 20) cm.

## BEGIN RIGHT SLEEVE

Cast on 26 (29:33: 37) sts in front of sts already on needle, knit to end of row. Work in garter st on the 52 (57: 63: 70) sts obtained for 2 more rows.
Next row K1, k2tog, yo, K5 (6: 6: 7), k2tog, yo, K to end of row.
Work in garter st for 11 (13: 17: 19) rows across all the sts.
Next row K1, k2tog, yo, K5 (6: 6: 7), k2tog, yo, $K$ to end of row.
Work in garter st for 3 rows across all sts.

NECK
Cast off 12 (13: 13: 15) sts, work to end of row. [40 (44: 50: 55) sts]

Continue in garter st until work measures 5 cm .

## BACK NECK

Cast on 13 (14: 14: 16) sts in front of sts already on needle, and slip the 53 (58: 64: 71) sts obtained onto a stitch holder and cut the yarn, leaving a 10 cm length of yarn.

## LEFT FRONT

Cast on 26 (28: 30: 33 ) sts using $5 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Work in garter st for 3 cm .
Then continue in st st for 13 (15: 17: 20) cm.

BEGIN LEFT SLEEVE
Cast on 26 (29: 33: 37) sts in front of sts already on needle.
Work in garter st on the 52 (57: 63: 70) sts obtained for 7 (8: 9: 10)cm.

## NECK EDGE

Cast off 12 (13: 13: 15) sts, work to end of row. [40 (44: 50: 55) sts]
Continue in garter st until work measures 4.5 cm .

## BACK

Work 1 row.
Slip the sts on the stitch holder onto the empty needle and work in garter st.
Continue in garter st on these 93 (102:
114: 126) sts for 10 (11: 12: 13 ) cm.

TO FINISH SLEEVES
Cast off 26 (29: 33: 37) sts, $K$ to end of row. [67 (73: 81: 89) sts]
Cast off 26 (29: 33: 37) sts, $P$ to end of row. [41 (44: 48: 52) sts]

Join the side seams of the coat, then
below the sleeves, allowing for a 3 cm turn-up on each sleeve.

Using the tapestry needle, weave in the cut ends along the edge stitches, across several rows and trim excess yarn.
Sew buttons on front opposite buttonholes.

When wearing, fold up 3 cm towards right side of work to form cuffs.

1 Insert the point of the right-hand needle through the loops of the next 2 stitches as if to knit.


2 Wind the yarn round the tip of the right-hand needle and pull the yarn through the 2 stitches, knitting them both together.


3 Drop the 2 stitches from the left-hand needle and keep the new stitch on the right-hand needle.


4 Knitting three stitches together decreases your stitch count by two, and the decrease stitch leans to the right. This is how a series looks.

Cast on 92 sts using $51 / 2 m m$ circular needles and Yarn A. Join into the round, being careful not to twist sts.

Rounds 1-3 Knit.
Round 4 *P2tog, yrn; rep from * to end.

Repeat rounds 1-8 in Yarn B.

HANDLES
Using Yarn A, make 2 more i-cords measuring 52 cm each for the handles.


Make the bag handles with a pair of i -cords in the darkest yarn colour.


The lace pattern is very simple to work, so you'll have it memorised in no time!

## TO MAKE UP

Weave in any loose ends and block to measurements given. Sew i-cord along top edge with a slip stitch. Sew on each handle 3 cm in from the edge. Join the bottom of the bag using mattress stitch.

STEP-BY-STEP P2TOG PURL TWO TOGETHER


1 Push the point of your right-hand needle through the first two stitches on your left-hand needle, going from right to left as you would for a purl stitch.


2 Bring the yarn anticlockwise around the needle, between the two needles.


3 Pull the yarn through both stitches, as you would if working a purl stitch, and drop both from the left-hand needle.


4 Purling two stitches together decreases your stitch count by one, and the decrease stitch leans to the right. This is how a series looks on the right side of stocking stitch.

Next row (RS) Knit to end of row, working all wraps with wrapped sts.

Cont in st st and beg with a WS row,

Row 2 (RS) (K2, P2) 4 times, knit to end. Cont in st st and rib as set for 9 rows more, ending after a WS row.

Change to 6 mm needles and work even in patt for 42 (42: 44: 44: 48: 48: 50: 50: 52: 52) rows, ending after a WS row.

Next row (RS) (K2, P2) 4 times, K3, MT over next 13 sts, knit to end.
Next row Purl to last 16 sts, (K2, P2) 4 times.
Rep last 2 rows twice more.
Cont in st st and rib as set until piece measures 46.5 (46.5: 44: 44: 44: 44: 44: 45.5: 45.5: 45.5$) \mathrm{cm}$ from cast on, ending after a WS row.

## SHAPE NECK

Next row (RS) (K2, P2) 4 times, ssk, knit to end. [1 st dec'd]
Work even in patt for 3 rows.
Rep last 4 rows 6 (6: 8: 8: 8:8:9:8:9:9) times more.
[34 (36: 36: 38: 40: 42: 43: 44: 45: 47) sts]

Cont even in patt until piece measures same as Back to shoulder short rows, ending after a WS row.

SHAPE SHOULDER
Beg with a RS row, rep rows 2-9 of Left
Front shoulder shaping.
Place rem 17 sts on holder.

## LEFT SLEEVE

Cast on 32 (32: 34: 34: 34: 36: 36: 36: 38: 38) sts using $51 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 (WS) Purl.
Row 2 (RS) K20 (20: 20: 20: 20: 22: 22: 22: 24: 24), MT over next 6 sts, knit to end.
Rep last 2 rows twice more.
Cont in st st only for 13 rows.
Change to 6 mm needles.

## BEGIN INCREASES

NOTE: Read ahead; increases are worked at the same time as MT. Cont in st st, inc 1 st at each end of next row, then every foll 6 (6: $6: 6: 4: 4$ : 4: 4: 4: 4)th row 8 (9: 9: 10: 11: 11: 12 : 13: 13: 14) times more.
[50 (52: 54: 56: 58: 60: 62: 64: 66: 68) sts]

AT THE SAME TIME, when a total of 43


Shape the shoulders using short row shaping to get that flattering drape.
rows have been worked from cast on, place tear as folls:
Next row (RS) Patt 7 (7: 7: 7: 7: 8: 8: 8: 8: 8) (including any increase), MT over next 8 sts, knit to end.
Next row (WS) Purl.
Rep last 2 rows twice more, keeping placement of MT correct if any further increases are worked.

After increases are completed, work even until sleeve measures 50 cm from cast on.

## Cast off.

## RIGHT SLEEVE

Cast on 32 (32: 34: 34: 34: 36: 36: 36: 38: 38) sts using $51 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 (WS) Purl.
Row 2 (RS) K6, MT over next 6 sts, knit to end.
Rep last 2 rows twice more.
Cont even in st st for 13 rows.
Change to 6 mm needles.

## BEGIN INCREASES

NOTE: Read ahead; increases are worked at the same time as MT.
Cont in st st, inc 1 st at each end of next row, then every foll 6 (6:6:6:4:4: 4: 4: 4: 4)th row 8 (9: 9: 10: 11: 11: 12: 13: 13: 14) times more.
[50 (52: 54: 56: 58: 60: 62: 64: 66: 68) sts]

AT THE SAME TIME, when a total of 23 rows have been worked from cast-on, place MT as folls:
Next row (RS) Patt 7 (including any increase), MT over next 9 sts, knit to end.
Next row (WS) Purl.
Rep last 2 rows twice more, keeping placement of MT correct if any further
increases are worked.
After increases are completed, work even until sleeve measures 50 cm from cast on.

## Cast off.

TO MAKE UP
Block pieces to measurements.
Join shoulders.

Mark centre point of sleeve cast-off. Match centre of cast-off to shoulder seam and pin each sleeve in place. Sew sleevehead to front and back. Sew side seams from bottom of sleeve to hem. Sew sleeve seams.

## NECKBAND

Place 17 sts held for Left Front on smaller needle with RS facing. Join yarn.
Cont in rib as set (working 1 st from body in st st) until band measures long enough to fit neatly to centre back neck.
Cast off in patt.
Repeat for Right Front band.

## TO MAKE UP

Join cast-off edges and seam sides of bands to back neck.

Weave in ends.


The front ribbed panels are worked as part of the left and right front pieces.


The tears are at the wear points, including on the long sleeves to form thumb holes.

## STEP-BY-STEP YF, SL1, YB



1 Bring the yarn to the front of your knitting by bringing it between the needles.


2 Then insert the left-hand needle into the next stitch as if to knit and slip the stitch on to the right-hand needle.


3 After working the slipped stitch, take the yarn to the back of the knitting between the needles. This is also known as a wrapped stitch.

Ever wanted your very own parrot? Ta-dah! Here he is, resplendent in his glorious bright red, blue and yellow plumage and standing proudly in his jaunty black hat (definitely stolen from a pirate). Another genius creation from Alan Dart, we can't wait to get started on our new feathered friend. Where will you perch yours?


NOTE
Use 3 mm needles throughout and cast on by using the cable (two needle) method. This is most important when knitting the smaller pieces. Also begin all pieces with a K row, and always work 'inc 1' by knitting into the front and back of the stitch, otherwise your stitch count will not be correct.

BODY \& HEAD (MAKE 1 PIECE)
Cast on 18 sts with Signal Red for tail edge and work in st st for 4 rows.
Inc row 1 (Inc 1, K1) to end. [27 sts] Work in st st for 3 rows.

Work in st st for 3 rows.
Inc row 4 K1, inc 1, K10, (inc 1) twice,
K10, inc 1, K2. [31 sts]
Work in st st for 3 rows.
Inc row 5 K1, inc 1, K12, (inc 1) twice,
K12, inc 1, K2. [35 sts]
P 1 row.
Work feather pattern:
Use a ball of yarn for each colour and strand yarn not in use loosely across purl side of work.
Row 1 K2 Sunflower, (K3 Signal Red, K1 Sunflower) to last st, K1 Sunflower.
Row 2 P2 Sunflower, (P3 Signal Red, P1 Sunflower) to last st, P1 Sunflower.

Signal Red, K3 Azure, K6 Signal Red. Row 6 P6 Signal Red, P3 Azure, P3 Signal Red, P3 Azure, P5 Signal Red. Row 7 K5 Signal Red, K4 Azure, K1 Signal Red, K4 Azure, K6 Signal Red.
Row 8 P6 Signal Red, P4 Azure, P1 Signal Red, P4 Azure, P5 Signal Red.
All odd rows to row 17 K5 Signal Red, K9 Azure, K6 Signal Red.
All even rows to row 18 P6 Signal Red, P9 Azure, P5 Signal Red.
All odd rows to row 23 K6 Signal Red, K7 Azure, K7 Signal Red.
All even rows to row 24 P7 Signal Red, P7 Azure, P6 Signal Red.
Rows 25 \& 27 K7 Signal Red, K5 Azure, K8 Signal Red.
Rows 26 \& 28 P8 Signal Red, P5 Azure, P7 Signal Red.
Row 29 K8 Signal Red, K3 Azure, K9 Signal Red.
Row 30 P9 Signal Red, P3 Azure, P8
Signal Red.
Row 31 K9 Signal Red, K1 Azure, K10
Signal Red.
Row 32 P10 Signal Red, P1 Azure, P9 Signal Red.
Continue in Signal Red and work in st st for 8 rows.
Next row (K3, skpo, k2tog, K2) twice, K2. [16 sts]
Work in st st for 5 rows.
Next row K2, (skpo, k2tog, K3) twice. [12 sts]
Work in st st for 5 rows.
Next row (K1, skpo, k2tog) twice, K2.
[8 sts]
Work in st st for 3 rows.
Break yarn, leaving a long end. Thread through sts on needle, draw up tightly and fasten off.

FEET (MAKE 4 PIECES)
Cast on 14 sts with Dark Grey Mix for


Make a tail former using a bendy drinking straw so your parrot doesn't wobble over!


Place the top edge of each wing in line with dec row 4 at the top of the chest.

STEP-BY-STEP KFB INCREASE 1 BY KNITTING INTO FRONT AND BACK


1 Insert the tip of the right-hand needle into the front of the stitch and knit as normal, but don't drop it from the left-hand needle.


2 Then take the right-hand needle behind the left and insert the tip of the needle down through the back of the stitch on the left-hand needle.


3 Wrap the yarn round the tip of the right-hand needle to knit the stitch. Bring the needle through to make the stitch, keeping it on the right-hand needle.


4 Take the stitch off the left-hand needle. You'll have increased one stitch by knitting twice into the original stitch, first at the front, then at the back.

This lovely parrot would make a fantastic gift for anyone with children, or for a local nursery or primary school. He'd look so sweet perched on a shelfor desk, or you could find a bird cage and pop him inside! Make sure you place him out of reach of little ones.

Inc 1 st at beg of next 6 rows
[12 sts]
Cast on 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows for base edge of opening. [18 sts]
Work in st st for 6 rows.
Dec row 1 K2, (k2tog, K2) to end
[14 sts]
Work in st st for 5 rows.
Dec row 2 K2, (k2tog, K1) to end.
[10 sts]
P 1 row.
Change to Dark Grey Mix and work in st st for 4 rows.
Cast off for base edge.
EYE BACKING (MAKE 2 PIECES)
Cast on 32 sts with Cream for outside edge and work in st st for 2 rows.
Dec row 1 K2, (k2tog, K1) to end.
[22 sts]
Work in st st for 2 rows.
Dec row 2 P1, (p2tog) ten times, P1.
[12 sts]
Break yarn, leaving a long end. Thread through sts on needle, draw up tightly and fasten off.

UPPER BEAK (MAKE 1 PIECE)
Cast on 16 sts with Oatmeal for face edge and work in st st for 2 rows.

Dec row 1 K6, skpo, k2tog, K6.
[14 sts]
P 1 row.
Dec row 2 K5, skpo, k2tog, K5.
[12 sts]
P 1 row.
Next row K4, skpo, k2tog, K4. [10 sts]
Inc 1 st at beg and end of next row.
[12 sts]
Repeat the last 2 rows two more times. [12 sts]
Cast off for front edge.
LOWER BEAK (MAKE 1 PIECE)
Cast on 16 sts with Black for face edge and work in st st for 2 rows.
Dec row 1 K6, skpo, k2tog, K6.
[14 sts]
P 1 row.
Dec row 2 K5, skpo, k2tog, K5.
[12 sts]
P 1 row.
Dec row 3 K4, skpo, k2tog, K4.
[10 sts]
P 1 row.
Cast off for front edge.
PIRATE HAT (MAKE 1 PIECE)
Cast on 100 sts with Cream for brim edge.
Change to Black and work in st st for 2 rows.

## IT'S ALL IN THE DETAIL



Once you've knitted each piece, neatly join them together, mainly using mattress stitch. You'll make the head and body first, then add the wings, tail and legs. When you pin the wings in position, make sure the tips meet at the top of the tail. Use drinking straws for tail and leg formers, binding sections of the straw with yarn to make it nice and sturdy.


Bend the two side claws forward to form the bird's foot and ensure he stays put!


Oversew the side edges of each eye backing piece together to form the circle.

## SHAPE BRIM

Dec row 1 (K4, k2tog, K4) to end.
[90 sts]
P 1 row.
Dec row 2 (K2tog, K7) to end. [80 sts] P 1 row.
Dec row 3 (K3, k2tog, $K 3$ ) to end. [70 sts]
P 1 row.
Dec row 4 (K2tog, K5) to end. [60 sts] P 1 row.
Dec row 5 (K2, k2tog, $K 2$ ) to end.
[50 sts]
P 1 row.
Dec row $6(K 2 t o g, K 3)$ to end. [40 sts]

## WORK CROWN

Work in st st for 6 rows, beg with a K row.

## SHAPE TOP

Dec row 1 (K1, k2tog, K1) to end. [30 sts]
Work in st st for 3 rows.
Dec row 2 (K1, k2tog) to end. [20 sts] P 1 row.
Dec row 3 (K2tog) to end. [10 sts] Break yarn, leaving a long end. Thread through sts on needle, draw up tightly and fasten off.

## HAT BOW (MAKE 1 PIECE)

Cast on 36 sts with Royal.
Cast off.

## TO MAKE UP

Unless otherwise stated, sew seams and join pieces using mattress stitch, working with right side of knitting uppermost. A one-stitch knitted seam turning has been allowed on most pieces to accommodate this method. Starting at gathered edge, join head and body seam, stopping 4cm away from tail edge. Stuff head and body firmly, then join remainder of seam. With body seam running down centre back, fold tail edge flat and sew across, leaving a 6 mm space open in centre of seam.
Take tail piece and darn in ends of yarn on two-colour feather section, then, starting at gathered edge, join tail seam. To make tail former, start below bendy section and cover long straight length of one drinking straw by binding closely with Signal Red yarn, securing ends of yarn with spots of glue. Insert bound end of former into tail, then use tweezers to insert a little stuffing round straw to pad lightly. Push a large knitting needle into opening in seam at tail end of body and turn round to create a hole in stuffing. Spread a little
glue over unbound straight length of straw at top of tail former, carefully remove needle and insert former into hole, then, with seam running along underside, sew cast-on edge of tail to body. The bendy section of straw will enable you to adjust the tail to help the parrot stand.
Join side edges of each foot piece for the first two knitted rows, starting at cast-on edge and stopping at base of claws. Now work a gathering thread through every stitch along cast-on edge of two foot pieces, draw up tightly and fasten off. These will be the under foot pieces and the remaining two will be the upper foot pieces. Join each upper foot piece to an under foot piece and leave unstuffed.
Starting at base edge, join each leg seam, stopping at base edge of opening. Cut two 10 cm lengths of drinking straw for leg formers, and bind 7.5 cm of each, in same manner as given for tail, leaving a 2.5 cm section of straw uncovered at one end of each former. Insert bound section of former into each leg, so that 6 mm of bound straw shows at base of leg. Insert this short bound end of straw into opening in top of foot, then sew base edge of leg to foot, matching leg seam to one of the claws. Use tweezers to add stuffing round formers and stuff legs firmly. Mark leg positions on body with pins, placing 17 knitted rows down from dec row 1 at top of chest, and spacing 20 knitted stitches apart. In same manner as given for tail, use a large knitting needle to make a hole at each leg position, remove pin, and insert unbound section of leg former into hole. Pin top of each leg in position and sew in place, adding more stuffing if necessary. Bend the two side claws forward to form a bird's foot shape and hold in position with a few stitches. Starting at gathered edge, join each wing seam, then fold cast-on top edge in half and sew across. With top edge of each wing in line with dec row 4 at top of chest, pin wings in position on body, so that wing tips cross over at top of tail, then sew in place round shaped top section of each wing. Starting at gathered edge, oversew side edges of each eye backing piece together to form a circle. Pin pieces on head, with base of each in line with increase row at base of head, and spacing 6 knitted stitches apart at centre front. Sew in place by working backstitch over every stitch along


Don't forget the blue bow! Sew the loops to the knot to keep it nice and tidy.


Pinch the edges of the brim on opposite sides and hold in place with a few stitches.


The stunning feather pattern is worked in Fair Isle, using two balls of yarn.


The iris and pupil of the beady eyes are embroidered on, giving lots of character.
cast-on edge, then remove pins.
Fold cast-off edge of upper beak piece in half and sew across, then repeat with lower beak piece. Pin beak pieces in place so the ends of both cast-on edges meet and overlap cast-on edge of eye backing circles. Also position so that top point of upper beak is in line with top of eye backing circles, and base point of lower beak is in line with base of eye backing circles. Sew beak pieces in place with backstitch, worked over every stitch along cast-on edges, and remove pins. Coat beak with hair spray, pinch into shape and leave to dry.
When embroidering eyes, fasten off ends of yarn at top of head, where they will be hidden by hat. Following photograph for placement, mark eye positions with pins, then take a length of Cream yarn and work a few stitches between each marked point, drawing up yarn slightly to indent eye sockets, and remove pins. Draw out a single strand from a length of Black yarn and use this and a sharp needle to embroider a circle of 5 tiny chain stitches for each eye, then surround with a circle of 8 tiny chain stitches, worked with a single strand drawn from a length of Azure yarn.
Starting at gathered edge, join hat crown seam, then oversew side edges of brim section together. Coat brim with hair spray, pat into knitting, and leave on a flat surface to dry. Mark
centre point of brim cast-on edge by counting 50 stitches from seam and marking this point with a pin. Stuff hat crown lightly and fit hat on head, placing so that brim seam and marked point are at opposite sides, then pin in position. Sew in place by working backstitch over every knitted stitch along last row of brim and remove pins. Pinch edge of brim to fold at marked point and catch 12 mm of cast-on edge together with a few stitches, then pinch brim seam on opposite side and hold fold in same manner.
Pull bow piece to stretch knitting, then tie a tight knot in centre. Count 5 knitted stitches in from one end, fold at this point, then sew fold to knot to form a loop and a tail. Repeat at opposite end, then position and sew bow to upturned hat brim, placing above right eye.

## "As knitters, we're a privileged lot"

Do you know what? I think knitters have a different relationship with time from the rest of the population.

Some examples. Have you ever waited for a train that's been severely delayed? As the Tannoy drawls, 'We're-sorry-to-annouce-that-the-08:42-service-is-running-three-lunar-cycles-late,' how do you feel? Or when you're sitting in the waiting room at the hospital, as a nurse updates the information board with the news that Dr Tardy's clinic is now a whopping two hours behind schedule, what do you notice? In both of these situations, I guarantee there'll be a palpable groan from the people around you. But not from you, because you're a knitter. Admit it, aren't you just a tiny bit pleased at the news? Are you not revelling in the absolutely guilt-free knitting time that you've been awarded? And aren't you feeling about $300 \%$ happier than the chap next to you who's having to make do with a freebie newspaper and a can of cola to pass the time?

Time is such a subjective thing, anyway: how you experience it never
has very much to do with those minutes and hours we use for its measurement. Sitting purling on the platform, you'll scarcely notice the passing minutes that newspaper-andcola man is counting off, one-by-painful-one on the station clock (unless you hate purling). "Oh, is the train here already?" you might think, as the delayed 08:42 rumbles in at last. Newspaper-and-cola man, meanwhile, has gnawed off his own left arm simply to pass the time.

## A STITCH IN TIME

As knitters, we're a privileged lot, because for us there's rarely any 'dead' time that must just be idly passed. Is it not rather splendidly fabulous that there's always something we can do that's productive, enjoyable, creative, and a source of constantly expanding skills, all whilst waiting for the $13: 30$ flight to Dublin or an 09:00 dental appointment? Lucky us!

Of course, if this is the one occasion when you've - horrors! - forgotten your knitting, then you're about to enter a special sort of purgatory that's far worse than anything newspaper-
and-cola man is enduring even with his gnawed-off arm, but let's not spoil our day by even imagining that scenario, because you don't forget your knitting, do you? Your shoes and your children, sometimes yes, but never your knitting.

Traffic jams are another example of a guilt-free knitting opportunity. 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# A holiday prompts a passion for <br> AFRICAN YARN 

## A sunshine break led to Michelle Gladwish launching a company supporting the work of a talented South African yarn dyer.

How do you go about putting the finishing touches to your holiday plans? In the case of
Michelle Gladwish (and we're sure she can't be alone!) that means finding out where to buy local yarns.
"I mentioned on Ravelry that I was coming to South Africa to visit family in Cape Town and asked if anyone could recommend any good yarn shops," Michelle says.
Carle Dehning from Nurturing Fibres replied to Michelle's post, inviting her to visit the dyeing studio in the Western Cape hamlet of Philadelphia and see her yarns.
"So off we went on a very hot day and Carle, her husband and all her lovely staff made my family and I very welcome!" Michelle says. "She explained that she's an indie dyer, and it was clear that she's proud of the high-quality fibres produced by South African farmers. She said she took her inspiration from the Western Cape's natural beauty as well as the cultures of South Africa."
Carle explained to Michelle that she uses yarn dyeing methods she's developed over many years, and
that she "enjoys hand-dyed skeins with subtle variations and keeps her dye lots small to ensure unique colours and a high quality".

Michelle was captivated by Carle's talent. "I've always admired the beauty of the African landscape and when I saw the locally produced yarns, I thought how wonderful it would be if my friends could see and feel how special these yarns are," she comments.

## NATURE AND NURTURE

Carle's yarn dyeing journey began with her producing just enough to fuel her own sock-knitting needs. However, as she sourced and dyed more yarns, she soon realised she didn't have the capacity to knit it all up. "She started to sell it to family and friends, and Nurturing Fibres was launched!" Michelle exclaims. "The yarn was so lovely and soft I told her how wonderful it would be if it was available in the UK."
That planted the seed of a grand idea, and after re-visiting the studio several times, Michelle put the plan for African Yarns, the UK stockist of Nurturing Fibres, into motion.
"We built a website, had flyers printed, opened up a Facebook page, and then the orders started coming in!" Michelle says. "The feedback is wonderful - people are saying that the colours are so much better in real life and they can't believe how soft the yarn is."

The shades stocked by the fledgling company are inspired by the landscapes of Africa, "from sunset to sunrise and everything in between". The range currently includes Eco-Bamboo, which is a 4ply yarn, and Eco-Cotton, a 100\% organic double knit cotton yarn, which Michelle describes as a treat to use. "It's beautifully soft and knits up into wonderful garments for the entire family," she says.

In the meantime Michelle is making the most of her new venture by dipping into the yarns herself! "I'm knitting an African-coloured rug for my conservatory," she enthuses. "Carle helped me choose the colours that best represent this amazing continent."

Row 4 Knit.
Row 5 Skpo, K to last 2 sts, k2tog.
[64 sts]
Row 6 Skpo, K to last 2 sts, k2tog.
[62 sts]
Row 7 Knit.
Row 8 Purl.
Row 9 (K2, P4) to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 10 (P2, K4) to last 2 sts, P2.
Row 11 (K2, P4) to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 12 (P2, K4) to last 2 sts, P2.
Row 13 Knit.
Row 14 Purl.
Row 15 P3, (K2, P4) to last 5 sts, K2, P3.
Row 16 K3, (P2, K4) to last 5 sts, P2, K3.
Row 17 P3, (K2, P4) to last 5 sts, K2, P3.
Row 18 K3, (P2, K4) to last 5 sts, P2, K3.
Rows 7-18 form basketweave pattern.
Rep rows 7-18 until work measures 23 cm , ending with row 8 or row 14 of patt.

Next row K1, M1, K to last st, M1, K1.
[64 sts]
Next row K1, M1, K to last st, M1, K1. [66 sts]
Next row Knit.
Next row K1, M1, K to last st, M1, K1. [68 sts]
Next row K1, M1, K to last st, M1, K1.
[70 sts]
Next row Knit.
Cast off.

## EDGINGS (MAKE 2)

With RS facing, pick up and knit 49 sts along side edge (approximately 2 sts for every 3 rows).
Row 1 K1, M1, K to last st, M1, K1.
[51 sts]
Row 2 K1, M1, K to last st, M1, K1.


The garter stitch side borders are sewn to the central panels on the lace placemat.


If you're not keen on sewing up, try the woven set - the edges are picked up.

Row 3 Knit.
Row 4 K1, M1, K to last st, M1, K1.
[55 sts]
Row $5 \mathrm{~K} 1, \mathrm{M} 1, \mathrm{~K}$ to last st, M1, K1.
[57 sts]
Cast off.
TO MAKE UP
Join mitred edges. Sew in any loose ends.

## LACE RECTANGULAR PLACEMAT

Cast on 64 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 Knit.
Rep row 1 fifteen times more.
Next row (RS) K8, sl these sts onto st holder, K1, *K1, yfwd, k2tog; rep from * to last 10 sts, K2, sl rem 8 sts onto st holder.

Continue working on central 48 sts.
Next row P1, (P2, K1) to last 2 sts, P2.
Row 1 K1, (K1, k2tog, yfwd) to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 2 P2, (K1, P2) to last st, P1.
Row 3 K1, (K1, yfwd, k2tog) to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 4 P1, (P2, K1) to last 2 sts, P2.
Rows 1-4 form central panel patt.
Rep rows $1-4$ until work measures 17 cm from cast-on edge, ending with a WS row. Break yarn and sl these sts onto a st holder.

Cast on 1 st using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles (this st will be used to sew the border to the central panel). With RS facing, $K$ across sts from st holder on right-hand side of central panel. [9 sts]
Next row Knit.
Rep last row until border measures 17 cm from cast-on edge, ending with a WS row. Break yarn and sl these sts onto a st holder.

Cast on 1 st using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles (this st will be used to sew the border to the central panel). With WS facing, K across sts from st holder on left-hand side of central panel. [9 sts]
Next row Knit.
Rep last row until border measures 17 cm from cast-on edge, ending with a WS row.

Transfer sts from st holders, in correct order for working and now continue working across all sts.

Next row K8, k2tog (with 1st st from central panel), K to last 10 sts, k2tog (with 1st st from right-hand border), K to end. [64 sts]
Next row Knit.
Rep last row 14 times more.
Cast off.

## TO MAKE UP

Sew borders to central panel and sew in any loose ends.

WOVEN NAPKIN RING
Cast on 14 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 Knit.
Row 2 Purl.
Row 3 (K2, P4) to last 2 sts, K2.

Row 4 (P2, K4) to last 2 sts, P2.
Row 5 (K2, P4) to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 6 (P2, K4) to last 2 sts, P2.
Row 7 Knit.
Row 8 Purl.
Row 9 P3, (K2, P4) to last 5 sts, K2, P3.
Row 10 K3, (P2, K4) to last 5 sts, P2, K3.
Row 11 P3, (K2, P4) to last 5 sts, K2, P3.
Row 12 K3, (P2, K4) to last 5 sts, P2, K3. Repeat rows 1-12 until work measures 18 cm , ending with row 2 or row 8 .

## Cast off.

EDGINGS (MAKE 2)
With RS facing, pick up and knit 44 sts along side edge (approximately 2 sts for every 3 rows).

## Cast off.

## TO MAKE UP

Join short edges together and sew in any loose ends.

LACE RECTANGULAR NAPKIN RING Cast on 15 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles. Row 1 K1, (K1, yfwd, k2tog) to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 2 K1, (P2, K1) to last 2 sts, P1, K1.
Row 3 K1, (K1, k2tog, yfwd) to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 4 K1, P1, (K1, P2) to last st, K1.
Repeat rows 1-4 until work measures approximately 18 cm (or desired length), ending with row 4.

## Cast off.

TO MAKE UP
Join cast-on and cast-off edges and sew in any loose ends.


Napkin rings are super quick to make if you don't have time to knit the full set.


Knitting textured patterns like this one is similar to knitting simple rib patterns.

STEP-BY-STEP YFWD YARN FORWARD


1 Bring the yarn to the front before you work the next stitch.


2 Insert the needle into the next stitch and take the yarn from front to back over the right needle, then wrap it around the needle as usual.


3 Pick up the yarn and pull it through the stitch on the needle.


4 Slip the stitch off the needle. You will notice that the yarn forward forms an extra loop to the right of the stitch just worked. When you purl back across the row, it will create a hole.

Spending time making sure your guests have delicious bread to go with their dinner? Whether you're up to the Berry and Hollywood standard of homemade bread baking or not, keep your bread basket stylish with this pretty lace edging. It's a 12-row pattern, but it's only lace on one side and it's easy to see how the pattern develops as you're going. Knitters, get ready, knit!

(K) DIAMOND BREAD BASKET EDGING Cast on 9 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 Knit.
Row 2 K3, k2tog, yfwd, k2tog, (yfwd, K1) twice.
Row 3 Knit.
Row 4 K2, (k2tog, yfwd) twice, K3,
yfwd, K1.
Row 5 Knit.
Row 6 K1, (k2tog, yfwd) twice, K5,
yfwd, K1.
Row 7 Knit.
Row 8 K3, (yfwd, k2tog) twice, K1, k2tog, yfwd, k2tog.
Row 9 Knit.
Row 10 K4, yfwd, k2tog, yfwd, k3tog, yfwd, k2tog.
Row 11 Knit.
Row 12 K5, yfwd, k3tog, yfwd, k2tog.
Rows 1-12 form border pattern.
Rep rows 1-12 until work fits around basket
Cast off knitwise.

TO MAKE UP
Sew short edges of border to each other, weave in any loose ends.

The pointed picot edging pattern is just one row long, so it's really easy to knit!


## Try elegant edgings with these beautiful designs for napkins. By Sarah Dennis.

You can often see picot edging used on children's garments to add a pretty finishing touch, but it's a really clever idea to use it on napkins as Sarah has done here.
Make sure you cast on fairly loosely, as it'll be tricky to knit four stitches together (and especially to knit four stitches together through the back of the loop) if your stitches are too tight to start with. It's a quick project, so you can afford to experiment to get it right.

## seso

(K) SCALLOPED LACE EDGING (MAKE 4) Cast on 98 stitches using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 *Knit 4 together, (yarn forward, knit 1) 5 times, yarn forward, knit 4 together through the back of the loop, knit 1 ; rep from * to end of row.
Row 2 Purl.

Row 3 *Knit 4 together, (yarn forward, knit 1) 5 times, yarn forward, knit 4 together through the back of the loop, knit 1; rep from * to end of row.
Cast off purlwise.

## TO MAKE UP

Sew cast-off edge to edge of napkin, join mitred corners, sew in any loose ends.

POINTED PICOT EDGING (MAKE 4)
Cast on 48 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 Cast off 2 sts, sl st from RH needle back onto LH needle, *cast on 3 sts, cast off 5 sts, sl st from RH needle back onto LH needle; rep from * until all sts have been cast off.

## TO MAKE UP

Sew cast-on edge to edge of napkin, stretching it slightly to fit, sew in any loose ends.

## NINTHEGROOVE

Give your table a finishing touch with this stunning shaped mat. By Sarah Dennis. When working the cables make sure your tension stays consistent so the crossed stitches don't get distorted. If you're new to cables this can take a bit of practice, so have a go on a swatch first until you feel happy with how your finished knitting looks.

This is a great project if you're new to wrap stitches and short row shaping. It's easy to see how the stitches work, and you'll be well into the groove of making them by the time you've finished! Stylecraft's Special DK yarn comes in lots of pretty colours, too, so you're bound to be able to find a scheme to match your décor. We've gone for neutral tones here, which will complement most tableware.

## Gere

## NOTES

Working short rows with wrapped stitches will shape your knitting, which causes it to wind into a circle. When instructed to turn, simply turn the work around so you are working on the other side, leaving the remaining sts unworked. The 36th st is wrapped during each repeat, but never knitted.

This placemat could be worked with a provisional cast on, which could then be grafted with the stitches on the final row (instead of casting these stitches off) to create a seamless mat.

## (K) CABLED CIRCULAR PLACEMAT

Cast on 36 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 (P1, K4) twice, P1, K24, wrap 1 turn.
Row 2 P24, K1, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 3 (P1, C4B) twice, P1, K21, wrap 1, turn.
Row 4 P21, K1, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 5 (P1, K4) twice, P1, K19, wrap 1, turn.
Row 6 K20, (P4, K1) twice
Row 7 (P1, C4B) twice, P1, K16, wrap 1, turn.
Row 8 P16, K1, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 9 (P1, K4) twice, P1, K14, wrap 1, turn.
Row 10 P14, K1, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 11 (P1, C4B) twice, P1, K11, wrap 1,
turn.
Row 12 K12, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 13 (P1, K4) twice, P1, K9, wrap 1,
turn.
Row 14 P9, K1, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 15 (P1, C4B) twice, P1, K6, wrap 1,
turn.
Row 16 P6, K1, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 17 (P1, K4) twice, P1, K4, wrap 1,
turn.
Row 18 K5, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 19 (P1, C4B) twice, P1, K1, wrap 1,
turn.
Row 20 P1, K1, (P4, K1) twice.
Row 21 (P1, K4) twice, wrap 1, turn.
Row 22 (P4, K1) twice


Keeping your tension nice and even will help the mat lie flat once it's finished.


The cable edging makes this placemat fun to knit and looks really effective.

Row 23 P1, C4B, P1, wrap C4B, turn.
Row 24 P2, K1, P4, K1.
Row 25 P1, K4, wrap 1, turn.
Row 26 P4, K1.
Row 27 P1, wrap C4B, turn.
Row 28 P2, K1.
Rows 1-28 form pattern.
Repeat rows $1-28$ a further 12 times ( 13 pattern repeats in total).

## Cast off.

TO MAKE UP
Join cast-on and cast-off edges and sew in any loose ends.

With RS facing rejoin yarn to remaining 22 sts.

Row 2 Purl.
Repeat rows $1 \& 2$ three more times.
Row 9 K1, ssk, knit to last 3 sts, k2tog,
K1. [20 sts]
Row 10 Purl.
Row 11 K1, ssk, knit to last 3 sts, k2tog,
K1. [18 sts]
Row 12 Purl.

Cast on 15 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and Yarn A.
Row 1 SI1, knit to end.
Row 2 Sl1, purl to end.
Row 3 S11, ssk, K9, k2tog, K1. [13 sts]
Row 4 SI1, purl to end.
Row 5 SI1, ssk, K7, k2tog, K1. [11 sts]
Row 6 Sl1, purl to end.
Row 7 SI1, ssk, K5, k2tog, K1. [9 sts]
Row 8 SI1, purl to end.
Row 9 Sl1, ssk, K3, k2tog, K1. [7 sts]
Row 10 SI1, purl to end.
Row 11 SI1, ssk, K1, k2tog, K1. [5 sts]
Row 12 Purl.
Row 13 Sl1, s2kpo, K1. [3 sts]
Row 14 P3tog.
Fasten off.
INNER EARS (MAKE 2 PIECES)
Cast on 11 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and Yarn B.
Work as Outer Ears from Row 7 to end.

## SNOUT (MAKE 1 PIECE)

Cast on 18 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and Yarn B.
Row 1 Knit.
Row 2 Purl.
Repeat rows $1 \& 2$ three more times. Cast off.

## TO MAKE UP

Sew front and back body panels together. With WS facing sew an inner ear into centre of outer ear and sew to head using image as a guide. Using black yarn, embroider on eyes. Bring the sides of snout together and sew together (this seam is the centre back of the snout), oversew top closed and stuff, oversew top. Using black yarn, bullion stitch the nostrils, sew snout to head.

## FROG

Using Yarn C, work as for Pig to **.

## EYES (MAKE 2)

Cast on 8 sts evenly over three $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ DPNs using white yarn. Join into the round taking care not to twist sts.

Round 1 Knit.
Round 2 *K1, M1; rep from * to end.
[16 sts]
Round 3 Knit.
Round 4 Knit.
Round 5 *K2, M1; rep from * to end.
[24 sts]
Round 6 Knit.
Change to Yarn C.
Round 7 Knit.
Round 8 Purl.
Round 9 Knit.
Round 10 *K1, k2tog; rep from * to end. [16 sts]
Round 11 Knit.
Round 12 Knit.
Stuff VERY lightly as the eyes need to be fairly flat.
Round 13 *K2tog; rep from * to end. [8 sts]

Cut yarn, pull yarn through rem sts, pull tight to close and secure with sts. Use a running thread through cast on sts and pull tight to close.

## PUPILS (MAKE 2)

Cast on 7 sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and black yarn.
Row 1 (WS) Purl.
Row 2 Skpo, K3, k2tog. [5 sts]
Row 3 Purl.
Row 4 Skpo, K1, k2tog. [3 sts]
Row 5 P3tog.
Cut yarn, pull through rem sts, pull tight to finish. Using image as a guide, sew onto eye.

## TO MAKE UP

Sew front and back body panels together. Sew eyes to head using image as a guide. Using 3 mm hook and black yarn, make a crochet chain approx 6 cm long. This chain should be nice and tight. Sew onto face to form a mouth using the tails of the chain.


Both mitts are easy to make using two stocking stitch pieces sewn together.


They have different faces, but the basic shape is the same for the pig and frog.

# Knit and Natter in Aachen, Germany 

OPEN AND WELCOMING are the buzzwords at Aachen Strickt und Häkelt (Aachen Knits and Crochets) club in Germany. Founded on Ravelry in 2010, the group initially existed online with just a few members. Then in 2012 the new administrator, Birgitta, took the lead and started to arrange real-life meetings.
"We tried several local cafés," remembers member Kata Götz, "then we found a very welcoming local bar called Café-Bar Zuhause where we
meet for our regular monthly meetings on a Saturday afternoon - we announce the dates well in advance in our Ravelry group."

The club doesn't stop there, providing other chances for its members to get together. "We've been holding monthly meetings in other locations for the last six months, plus members can initiate meetings in between and announce it in the Ravelry thread," says Kata.

The power of social networking has certainly

The knitting club has become a great place for members to meet other people, gain inspiration for new projects and
learn new techniques. "For me, the group means a lot," says Kata. "I moved to Germany at the beginning of last year and joined the group to get to know some people. Today I'm one of the moderators, help organise knitalongs and - most important of all - I've gathered some new, valuable friends!"
The club started to organise the knitalongs this year. "It's a challenge but a lot of fun!" says Kata. "When a member has a special day, we also work on a project together-for example,


creating a baby blanket or flowers for a wedding."

It's not all about sitting and cups of tea! The lively club also goes on fun outings. "The online forum is a great place to organise small excursions to festivals and local markets and shops, which we tend to do regularly," says Kata. "This year in March, 12 of us went to a knitting weekend in the local Eifel National Park. It was a great thing to do and will be organised next year too!"

Later this year, the club is hosting a Knit in Public Day in Café Kaiserwetter in Aachen. "We hope to get people

excited about handicrafts and knitting!" says Kata.

The club knits all kinds of things - from socks to shawls to complicated colourwork cardigans. "We get a lot of inspiration from each other as more and more people try out new techniques in the group. "All in all, our knitting club is a great place to be. We're open and welcoming for new members and are always open for a good conversation!"

ORGANISER
BASE
Cast on 56 sts using 5 mm needles and Yarn A.
Next row Knit into the back of every stitch to form a neat edge.

Row 1 *K6, P1; rep from * to end.
Row 2 *K2, P5; rep from * to end.
Rows 3 \& 4 *K4, P3; rep from * to end.
Row 5 *K2, P5; rep from * to end.
Row 6 *K6, P1; rep from * to end.
Row 7 *P1, K6; rep from * to end.
Row 8 *P5, K2; rep from * to end.
Rows 9 \& 10 *P3, K4; rep from * to end.
Row 11 *P5, K2; rep from * to end.
Row 12 *P1, K6; rep from * to end.
Repeat these 12 rows another 7 times. Knit 1 row.

## TOP LOOPS

Next row Knit 8, turn leaving remaining sts on needle.
Knit 20 rows on these 8 sts only.

## Cast off.

Rejoin yarn to remaining sts and cast off 15 sts leaving last st on needle.
Knit 11, turn and knit 20 rows on these 12 sts.

## Cast off.

Rejoin yarn to remaining sts and cast off 15 sts leaving last st on needle. Knit across remaining sts, then knit 20 rows on the 8 sts.

## Cast off.

POCKETS (MAKE 4)
Work 2 pockets with black dogs, following the Chart, then 2 pockets with white dogs, reversing Yarns B and C on the Chart.

Cast on 24 sts using 5 mm needles and Yarn A.
Next row Knit into the back of every stitch to form a neat edge.
NOTE: On all purl rows the first and last 2 stitches are knitted to form the border.


The black and white pooch motifs are worked in intarsia - just follow the chart.

Rows 1-6 Beg with a K row, work in st st. Row 7 K2, work row 1 of Chart to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 8 P2, work row 2 of Chart to last 2 sts, P2.
Last 2 rows set Chart placement.
Cont to follow Chart until all 16 rows
have been worked.
Rows 23-28 Beg with a K row, work in st st.
Row 29 Purl.
Cast off.

## TO MAKE UP

Place one pocket at the bottom right-hand corner, aligning in with the bottom and side edge and sew into place. Using the alternate colourway do the same with a second pocket on the left-hand edge.
Place third pocket (with the opposite colourway to the one below it) one pattern repeat down from the top right-hand edge and sew into place. Using the alternate colourway do the same with the fourth pocket on the left-hand edge.
Sew flaps into place at the back of the main piece so they form loops to place your pole through.

Sew in all loose ends.

ISSUE 133 SOLUTION


Ever noticed that babies seem to arrive in relays and you want to knit for them all? At times like these we find ourselves searching for a polite response to the praise that what we're making looks as good as something shop-bought. Fashion graduate Cheryl Walton faced both these scenarios and did something extraordinary. She took them at their word, and set up shop.
"I was travelling in Australia and suddenly found myself needing to provide gifts for my ever-growing family, but I was rather strapped for cash," she recalls.
Rescue came in the form of a skill she'd been taught by her mum and nanna long before. "Fortunately, I was carrying my knitting needles on my travels, so l began creating my own patterns and knitting up cute booties and mittens," she says. "As the children sported their lovingly made presents, their parents' friends started asking for their own handmade goods."

Within a couple of years word of mouth had spread so far that Cheryl devised her own brand, Sebastian Loves. But who is Sebastian?
"Sebastian is my car!" Cheryl exclaims. "Now, I know this sounds a little strange but I drive a quirky Citroën 2CV complete with his own personality. Family and friends ask after him, and I love the idea of a possession bringing such joy. I want the items sold by my company to evoke similar feelings, so Sebastian Loves makes perfect sense."

## QUALITY CONTROL

As well as knitting gifts and commissions for family, Cheryl has benefited from the experience and knowledge of one particular relative. "My mum, Sue, checks that my patterns are readable and that they actually work as they're supposed to," Cheryl says. "It's easy to forget that while I know exactly what I mean, a fellow knitter may get confused. Mum is also full of handy tips and suggestions."

Before long, Sebastian Loves was selling items online through Etsy and Folksy and patterns soon followed. "I've bought things from both sites and went to a weekend of business workshops Folksy held a couple of years ago," she says. "I love the feel of these sites they're easy to explore and you get a lot of traffic. Plus, they're designed for independent designers and creators, so what better places to sell?"

Sebastian Loves is about to start selling on www.belessrobot.com and via its own Facebook page too. "Adding knitting patterns as downloadable PDFs is a recent development and we'll be adding new patterns each month. You're pretty much instantly sent the file and can print out the pattern and begin knitting within minutes!"

Rather than incur the overheads of a bricks-and-mortar shop, Cheryl has opted to have some knitted stock sold at Fringe in Muswell Hill, North London. Her products

include a range of life-sized knitted guinea pigs, which we've grown rather besotted with!
"When I was a child we had a lot of guinea pigs," she says. "The first one I made was for a friend's birthday - she was desperate to have some pets but living in a London flat made this impossible. I gave her a knitted guinea pig and she fell in love with him!"

## RATTLES AND ROBOTS

Currently, Cheryl's most popular creations include her knitted animal rattles for babies, and robot hats, which have proved such a hit that she designed an adult version.
"I love the more obscure orders," Cheryl enthuses. "I might have a vague idea and then it turns into something far better than I could ever have imagined. It's amazingly satisfying, especially when you receive a photo from the customer enjoying their new purchase."
Remarkably, Cheryl fits all this around her job as a service manager
of a specialist garage, which gives her the luxury of some stability. "We fix modern French vehicles and restore older ones," she says with a smile. "My brother-in-law is my boss - I've learned so much about business by working with him."

This leaves Cheryl with between 12 and 16 hours to work on the knitting business. "Knitting a new piece takes time," she says. "I've been lucky enough to have support from my family and friends."

Fortunately, Cheryl enjoys working wherever and whenever she has a few moments free. "I knit in my lunch break and most evenings and over weekends at home or at my boyfriend's house. As long as I have my needles, yarn and tea at hand, I'm happy!"

Cheryl's busy life means she needs to stay incredibly organised. "I have a corkboard in my home and every time I have an idea, I pin it up," she says. "I'm constantly moving ideas around or disregarding them all together."

Cheryl often fine-tunes her designs as she's knitting them too. "I start by figuring out the initial idea with an old metric pattern-cutting book that gives me the exact sizings for a child's head or foot, for example. I figure out the number of stitches I need to start with and then I knit and write as I go along."

She adds: "Of course this means it's trial-and-error but once you get it right, it's done - pattern written and off to mum's for her checks!"
The latest development for Cheryl has been the launch of the Sebastian Loves blog. "I wanted an online space to share techniques, handy tips, step-by-step guides and anything else which may help people develop the knitting skills needed for my patterns, or just knitting in general," she says. "I want knitters to feel welcome to join in and use our patterns and create with us." © Written by Judy Darley

 he alternating bands of patterning on this long-line $T$-shirt give it a unique style, and they'll be a joy to knit too. The toughest part will be choosing your yarn - Rico Design's Creative Cotton Aran comes in dozens of different shades, so will you go for soft neutrals or bold brights? Whatever you pick, it's bound to look fabulous!
## NOTE

You will find it helpful to use a 3rd 5 mm needle just for working row 19 of pattern where the wrapping technique involves a large number of stitches just on that row. Alternatively you could use a circular 5 mm needle just for that row.

## FRONT

Cast on 90 (98: 106: 114: 122: 130) sts using 5 mm needles.

Change to $5 ½ \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 (RS) Purl.
Row 2 K1, (m3, p3tog) to last st, K1.
Row 3 Purl.
Row 4 K1, (p3tog, m3) to last st, K1.
Rows 5-16 Rep rows 1-4 three times.
Change to 4 mm needles.
Row 17 Knit, dec 1 st at centre of row.
[89 (97: 105: 113: 121: 129) sts]
Row 18 Purl.
Row 19 Using a 5 mm needle, $K$ to end wrapping yarn round needle 3 times for every st.
NOTE: Make sure you are wrapping 3 times during each knit stitch, not working 3 yarn overs after the knit st is
complete
Change to 4 mm needles.
Row 20 *P1 dropping off extra loops, slip next 3 sts purlwise dropping off the extra loops, now slip these 3 long sts back onto left needle and then work (P1, K1, P1) into the next 3 sts all together (as if working one stitch); rep from * to last st, P1 dropping off extra loops.
Rows 21 \& 22 Purl.
Rows 23-30 Rep rows 19-22 twice more, but inc 1 st at centre of row 30 .
[90 (98: 106: 114: 122: 130) sts]
Rep these 30 rows twice more but omitting the increase on final row. [89 (97: 105: 113: 121: 129) sts]

Next row (RS) Knit, dec 8 (7: 6: 5: 4: 3) sts evenly across row.
[81 (90: 99: 108: 117: 126) sts]
Change to 5 mm needles.
Purl 1 WS row.

## SHAPE CAP SLEEVES

Cont in st st, inc 1 st at each end of next 4 rows.
[89 (97: 105: 113: 121: 129) sts]

Cast on 3 sts at beg of next 2 rows.
[95 (104: 113: 122: 131: 140) sts]
**
Work 26 (26: 30: 30: 34: 34) rows
straight.

## SHAPENECK

Next row (RS) K36 (39: 43: 47: 50: 54), turn.
Cont on this group of sts for left half of neck.

## SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off loosely 3 (4: 4: 5: 5: 6) sts at beg of next row and the 2 foll alt rows. Cast off 4 (4:5:6:6:7) sts at beg of next 2 alt rows.
Cast off 7 (7: 8:7:9:8) sts at beg of next alt row. Work 1 row.
Cast off rem 7 (7: 8: 8: 9: 9) sts.
With RS facing slip next 23 (26: 27: 28: 31: 32) sts on a stitch holder.
Neatly rejoin yarn to rem 36 (39: 43: 47: 50: 54) sts and $K$ to end of row.
Complete as left half but working 1 more row before shaping shoulder.

## BACK

Work as Front to **.
Work 40 (42: 46: 48: 52: 54) rows straight.

## SHAPE SHOULDERS

Cast off loosely 3 (4: 4: 5: 5: 6) sts at beg of next 6 rows, then $4(4: 5: 6: 6: 7$ ) sts at beg of the foll 4 rows.
[61 (64: 69: 68: 77: 76) sts]
Cast off 7 (7: 8: 7:9:8) sts at beg of next 2 rows, then $7(7: 8: 8: 9: 9)$ sts at beg of next row.
[40 (43: 45: 46: 50: 51) sts]
Cast off 7 (7: 8: 8: 9:9) sts, $P$ to end,
dec 4 (3: 4: 1: 4: 1) sts evenly across. [29 (33: 33: 37: 37: 41) sts]

## WORK BACK NECK EDGING

Change to 4 mm needles.
Knit 5 rows.
Purl 1 row.

Working both rows on 4 mm needles, work rows 19 \& 20 as given on Front. Knit 3 rows.

## Cast off knitwise.

## FRONT NECK EDGING

With RS facing and 4 mm needles, pick up and knit 19 (22: 22: 23: 22: 25) sts down left front neck, knit across centre 23 (26: 27: 28: 31: 32) sts dec 1 (1: 2: 1: 3: 1) sts evenly across, finally pick up and knit 20 (22: 22: 23: 23: 25) sts evenly up right front neck.
[61 (69: 69: 73: 73: 81) sts]
Knit 4 rows.
Purl 1 row.
Working both rows on 4 mm needles, work rows 19 \& 20 as given on Front. Knit 3 rows.
Cast off knitwise.

## SLEEVE EDGINGS

First join shoulders including neck edging.
With RS facing and 4 mm needles, pick up and knit 65 (69: 73: 77: 81: 85) sts evenly along sleeve edge.
Knit 4 rows.
Purl 1 row.
Working both rows on 4 mm needles, work rows 19 \& 20 as given on Front. Knit 3 rows.

## Cast off knitwise.

## TO MAKE UP

Press st st sections and edgings only on WS. Join side and sleeve seams. Press seams and weave in ends, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.

## STEP-BY-STEP HOW TO PICK UP STITCHES



1 Holding the piece of knitting you're going to pick the sts up from in your left hand, and starting at the top-right corner, insert the RH needle between the first two stitches of the row.


2 Wind your wool around the needle and 'knit' the first stitch...


3 ...And pull the new stitch through between the two stitches.


4 Continue to work like this along the row or until you've picked up the necessary amount of stitches. Try to space your stitches evenly.

Carol Harrison was drawn to the wonder of knitting at an early age. "I remember sitting next to my mum watching a knitted jumper magically appear," she says. By the time she was nine, Carol was making clothes and blankets for her dolls. "I soon realised that knitting can be even more satisfying when you create your own patterns," she says. In adulthood, having made enough blankets and jumpers for a lifetime, Carol needed a new challenge. "One evening back in 2006, I created my first teddy. He sits at about an inch tall and is still with me."

After her mum lost her pet budgie, Jimmy, in late 2013, Carol resolved to knit her a woolly budgie to remember him by. "The challenge was set: to knit a budgie without a written pattern, using only my imagination and a photo of Jimmy for inspiration," Carol remembers. "It was a case of trial and error, but the first version was quite lifelike."

To add more detail and a realistic shape, Carol began to needlefelt the budgies as well as knitting. "Since then I've been asked to make a variety of birds: kingfishers, cockatiels and conures amongst others. I just love seeing the birds come to life," she says.
In August 2014, Carol launched her Facebook page 'Knitted Budgies by Carol Harrison', and is delighted to have more than 9,000 people following her work. While she's considered selling budgie knitting patterns, Carol isn't sure she wants to take that path: "I like making them too much!" she says. Her daughters have joined her business part time. "I never thought our knitting lessons would lead to us working together," says Carol.

Each knitted pet is bestowed with its own name.
"Customers have joked that they're cleaner and quieter than their feathered friends," she smiles. "Despite using the same techniques, each bird has its own character."

At the start of 2015 Carol developed her business by using photos to create lookalikes of birds the owners have lost. "It's particularly rewarding when customers send me photos of the knitted birds in their new homes!"

Carol's now turning her attention to creating knitted versions of our garden birds. From knitted caged birds to free, what could be better?

# Knit a tortoise to help raise money for 

# Designing a knitting pattern for a colourful tortoise has enabled reader Hazel Pattison to raise more than $£ 2,000$ for people in need. 

When reader Hazel Pattison got in touch about her knitted Rainbow Tortoises, we just had to make her our star letter writer in our March 2015 issue. Then we wanted to find out more about her brilliant venture, and how it all began. Fortunately, Hazel was only too happy to share her story.
"When I decided to create Rainbow the Tortoise I was working at The Chiltern Centre for Disabled Children, a local respite centre that supports families with a disabled child," she says. "My husband and myself are trustees for Pathway Workshop, an Oxford-based charity that employs disadvantaged adults, and I'm a committee member for our local Toy Library in Wallingford."
Each of these charities is in constant need of funds, so Hazel decided to put her knitting and design skills to the challenge.
"I've always enjoyed knitting, as did my mum, who was always knitting for charity," she says. "That was my inspiration for the concept of Rainbow the Tortoise." She chose a tortoise in particular, she explains,
"because it's slower than others, especially hares, but gets there eventually, or even wins."
Hazel devised a pattern through "a few attempts, and lots of stitch and row counting". The original plan had been to sell the pattern to knitters to raise money, but Hazel soon discovered that non-knitters, and knitters short on time, wanted their own cuddly tortoises too, so she began a mini production line with help from knitting friends and even a few ladies of the WI.
Hazel then began playing with her pattern and adapted it to make a large range of Rainbow the Tortoise goodies, including smaller tortoises, key rings, cushions and bags.
Hazel has even written a book about Rainbow the Tortoise! "I've always wanted to write a book but never before had the right inspiration," she says. "I'm a retired teacher, having worked with small children for many years, so a children's book that's fun and a little educational seemed just right."
Today Hazel, her husband and friends take their vibrant creations to craft fairs to sell the products and
raise funds. The venture also has a website, where you can buy the goodies Hazel's created, as well as her patterns and children's book.
Appearing on Simply Knitting's letters page has already helped. "Ever since, there has been a gentle flow of enquires for patterns and tortoises," Hazel says. She's also made a few new connections, including "a letter and subsequent phone chat with a Simply Knitting reader, who was once a Girl Guide leader with my mum!".
Through Rainbow the Tortoise, Hazel has been able to give more than $£ 2,000$ to the Chiltern Centre, make donations to Wallingford Toy Library and buy equipment for the Pathway Workshop. "There have also been chances to make life a little easier for individual families when we see them struggling," says Hazel. "Our hope is that we can carry on helping those less fortunate than we are, and continue to be rewarded by the smiles we get along the way." Written by Fudy Darley

## Knit your way through hot summer days with these dainty stitch patterns.



## GENTLE RIPPLES

Cast on a multiple of 6 sts.
Row 1 (RS) *SI1, K2, pass sl st over the 2 knit sts, K3; rep from * to end.
Row 2 P4, *yo, P5; rep from * to last st, yo, P1.
Row 3 *K3, sl1, K2, pass sl st over the 2 knit sts; rep from * to end.
Row 4 P1, *yo, P5; rep from * to last 4 sts, yo, P4.
Rep rows $1-4$ to form pattern.


## SOFT LATTICE

Cast on a multiple of 6 sts plus 2 .
Row 1 (RS) K1, *K3, P3; rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 2 and all alt rows $K$ the $K$ sts, $P$ the $P$ sts, $K$ the yo loops.
Row 3 K1, *K3, P3; rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 5 K1, *yo, k3tog, yo, K3; rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 7 K1, *P3, K3; rep from * to last st, K1.
Row 9 K1, *K3, yo, k3tog, yo; rep from * to last st, K1.
Row $10 K$ the $K$ sts, $P$ the $P$ sts, $K$ the yo loops.
Rep rows 3-10 to form pattern.


## TINY TRIANGLES

Cast on a multiple of 6 sts.
Row 1 (RS) *P4, yo, p2tog; rep from * to end.
Row 2 K1, *P1, K5; rep from * to last 5 sts, P1, K4.
Row 3 P4, *K1, P5; rep from * to last 2 sts, K1, P1.
Row 4 K1, *P1, K5; rep from * to last 5 sts, P1, K4.
Row 5 P4, *K1, P5; rep from * to last 2 sts, K1, P1.
Row 6 K1, *P1, K5; rep from * to last 5 sts, P1, K4.
Row 7 P1, *yo, p2tog, P4; rep from * to last 5 sts, yo, p2tog, P3.
Row 8 K4, *P1, K5; rep from * to last 2 sts, P1, K1.
Row 9 P1, *K1, P5; rep from * to last 5 sts, K1, P4.
Row 10 K 4, *P1, K5; rep from * to last 2 sts, P1, K1.
Row 11 P1, *K1, P5; rep from * to last 5 sts, K1, P4.
Row 12 K4, *P1, K5; rep from * to last 2 sts, P1, K1.
Rep rows $1-12$ to form pattern.

STEP-BY-STEP Knitting Fair Isle


These images show what happens to the yarn that you carry over on the wrong side of the work. Work a stitch in the first colour as usual. To change colour, twist the two yarns together before working the next stitch.


Work the next stitch in the new colour as normal. When working alternating stitches of two colours, try and keep an even tension and do not pull the yarn too tight.

## TRAiling v4, p93

SSK Slip, slip, knit

Change back to the original colour, not forgetting to twist the two yarns together before you work the stitch.



A completed row shows the yarn 'floats' carried across the back of the work. If the floats of one colour always stay above the other colour, your work will look more even.


Insert the point of the left-hand needle into the slipped stitch on the right-hand needle and take this stitch back over the k2tog.


$1 \begin{aligned} & \text { With the yarn at the back of your } \\ & \text { knitting, slip the first stitch on the }\end{aligned}$ left-hand needle knitwise.

Now slip the next stitch on the

3 Push the left-hand needle through 3 the front of both the slipped stitches.



Bring the yarn round just as you would for a knit stitch and knit the two stitches together. You will now have a single stitch on the right-hand needle, and your two slipped ones will create a left-leaning decrease.

## How to Knit

CAST ON: CABLE METHOD Use it for a firm edge, and when adding stitches in your work.



Repeat steps 2-3 until you have the number of stitches you require.


Push the point of the right needle further through the stitch you created, then gently pull the right needle up and to your left, taking the original loop with it. You've now created one knit stitch. Repeat points 1-4 across the row.

PURL To make purl stitches, just reverse the action of plain knit stitches.


1Holding the needle with all the stitches on in your left hand, and ensuring that the yarn is at the front of your work, insert the right-hand needle down through the front loop of your first stitch as shown.


2 Wind the yarn around the tip of the right-hand needle from right to left, in an anti-clockwise motion, constantly keeping a slight tension on the yarn.

CAST OFF Finish off your knitting with this straightforward cast-off technique.


1Start by knitting the first two stitches of the row as normal, but don't go any further along as you usually would.

KNIT Follow our simple steps to make the most important stitch you'll learn.


1
Hold the needle with the stitches on it in your left hand. Keeping the yarn in your right hand and at the back of your work, insert the point of the right-hand needle up into the front loop of the first stitch, as shown.


Wind the yarn anti-clockwise around the point of the right-hand needle using your index finger. It's important to keep the yarn in your right hand relatively taut to maintain an even tension as you go.


Bring the right-hand needle down through the loop, making sure that you catch the yarn you wound around the needle. This creates the stitch. Don't pull the free yarn too tightly, let out some slack.



4 Pushing the point of the right-hand needle a little further through the stitch you've just created, pull the original loop up and off the left-hand needle. That's your first purl stitch! Repeat points 1-4 across the row.

Insert the left-hand needle through the first stitch, as shown. Lift this stitch over the other stitch on the right-hand needle and over the needle point.



3 Knit another stitch so you have two on the right needle. Lift the first stitch over the second, then repeat steps 1-3.

4
When you get to the last stitch, cut he yarn about 6in ( 15 cm ) away, feed it through the loop and pull through firmly to fasten off.

## How to Crochet

CHAIN STITCH This is the foundation of all crochet stitches.


About 6 in $(15 \mathrm{~cm})$ from the end of the yarn, make a loop with the ball end on top. Insert the hook through this loop and catch the yarn, pulling it through the loop. Slide the slipknot up to the hook.


2 With the hook in your right hand, hold the slipknot between thumb and finger of the left hand. Move the hook under and over the yarn.



SLIP STITCH This stitch won't add height.


Insert the hook from front to back under the top of the second chain from the hook. Wrap the yarn round the hook (this is known as yrh).


Pull the yarn through both loops on 2 the hook to make a slip stitch (sl st). To carry on working a row of slip stitches, insert the hook into the next chain down and so on, repeating step 2 each time.

FOUNDATION RING Carry on for a spiral.


Make a short length of foundation chain as stated in your pattern instructions, for example, ch 5. Insert hook into the first chain.


Close the ring with a slip stitch (yarn 2 round hook and pull through). You can continue the spiral. If working in the round, add a stitch marker here.

## MATTRESS STITCH

Thread your yarn on to a needle, then weave along an edge to where you want to start. Bring it to the front between the first and second stitches of this edge, then insert the needle between the first two stitches of the other edge. Bring it back up through the opposite piece, between the two stitches and below the horizontal strand you just made. Keep stitching in this way, pulling the yarn tight every few stitches.


## BACKSTITCH

First, pin your two pieces together and secure the yarn by making a couple of stitches over each other at the base of the seam. Now working from right to left, bring the needle up a couple of stitches away at 11. Take the needle down at ${ }^{〔}$ and up again at 3 . Repeat, keeping the stitches regular and ensuring you put the needle through the middle of each knitted stitch to avoid splitting the fabric.

Super chunky Knit on $7-12 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles. A great weight for beginners, as it produces quick results. Good for furnishings.

Big Knit on 9-20mm needles. Perfect for eye-catching scarves and coats, as well as cosy cushions and throws.

Next round Work instep in pattern as set to marker, sm, k2tog, K2, *P3, K3; rep from * to end of round.

## SIZES S \& L ONLY

RIGHT LEG
Work instep in pattern as set to marker, sm, p2tog, P1 (K3, P3), 3 (-: 4) times, K3, P1.

## LEFT LEG

Work instep in pattern as set to marker, sm, p2tog, (K3, P3), 3 (-: 4) times, K3, P2.

## ALL SIZES

BOTH LEGS
Continue to work in established $3 \times 3$ rib pattern, following Chart as set until leg measures 11 cm or desired length.

## CUFF

Next round *P1, K1; rep from * to end of round.

Work this round until the Cuff measures 4 cm or desired length.
Cast off all stitches loosely in rib.
Weave in ends. Block.

HOW TO USE OUR CHARTS
Start at the bottom right-hand corner. Read all rows from right to left. A row of squares represents a row of knitting.


The cuff is worked in P1, K1 ribbing for a comfortable fit around the ankle.


## STEP-BY-STEP C6B CABLE 6 BACK



1 Purl up to where your cable is going to begin.


2 Slip the next 3 stitches onto the cable needle.


3 Take the cable needle and stitches to the back of the knitting. Knit the next 3 stitches, pulling the first stitch tight to avoid ladders.

BEST ALTERNATIVE SKILL Organisation. I'm a
list-making, spreadsheet-using bossy boots. And sometimes I'm lucky enough to be paid to do that!

BEST WAY TO RELAX I enjoy most aspects of gardening - I was a gardener in a former life - but | love to grow things to eat. Actually, I love to eat things that I've grown!

BEST BOOK The last book I read is usually my favourite. I really enjoyed A Place for Us by Harriet Evans - I couldn't put it down and I abandoned cooking in order to finish it. I also love the Cypress Hollow stories by Rachael Herron. They have a knitting theme running through them, and are just the right sort of easy, enjoyable read.

Work each side of neck separately. Keeping stripes correct, dec 1 st at neck edge of next 4 rows and AT THE SAME TIME cast off 3 (3: 4: 5: 5: 6: 6:7) sts at beg of 2 nd row, then 3 (4: 4: 5: 5: 6: 6:7) sts at beg of foll alt row. [3 (4: 4: 5: 6: 6: 7: 7) sts] Work 1 row.
Cast off rem sts.

With RS facing, slip centre 36 (36: 38: 38: 40: 40: 42: 42) sts onto a holder, rejoin appropriate yarn and K to end. Complete to match first side, reversing shapings.

## FRONT

Work as given for Back until 14 (14: 14: 14: 16: 16: 16: 16) rows less have been worked than on Back to beg of shoulder shaping, ending with RS facing for next row.

Cast off rem sts.

## SLEEVES

Cast on 42 (46: 46: 50: 50: 50: 50: 54) sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and Yarn A.
Work in rib as given for Back for 9 cm , inc 1 (0: 1: 0: 0: 1: 1: 0) st at each end of last row and ending with RS facing for next row.
[44 (46: 48: 50: 50: 52: 52: 54) sts]

Change to 4 mm needles.
Beg with a K row, work in st st for 4 (6: 2: 4: 6: 0: 4: 8) rows, inc 0 (1: 0: 0: 1: 0: 0: 1) st at each end of 0 (5th: 0:0:5th: 0:0: 5 th) of these rows and ending with RS facing for next row. [44 (48: 48: 50: 52: 52: 52: 56) sts]

Join in Yarn B.
Beg with 4 rows using Yarn B, now work in Striped St St as given for Back, shaping sides by inc 1 st at each end of next (5th: 3rd: next: 5th: 5th: next: $3 r d)$ and every foll 6th row to 72 (66: 66: 60: 70: 76: 84: 84) sts, then on every foll 8th row until there are 76 (78: 82: 84: 88: 92: 94: 96) sts.

Cont straight until Sleeve meas approx 50.5 (53.5: 57: 59.5:
61.5: 63: 63: 64)cm, ending after same stripe row as on Back to beg of armhole shaping and with RS facing for next row.

## SHAPE TOP

Cast off 5 sts at beg of next 2 rows.
[66 (68: 72: 74: 78: 82: 84: 86) sts]

Dec 1 st at each end of next 3 rows, 4 foll alt rows, then 4 foll 4th rows.
[44 (46: 50: 52: 56: 60: 62: 64) sts]

Work 1 row.
Dec 1 st at each end of next and every foll alt row until 36 sts rem, then on foll 5 rows, ending with RS facing for next row. [26 sts]
Cast off 4 sts at beg of next 2 rows. [18 sts]
Cast off rem sts.

## NECKBAND

Join right shoulder seam. With RS facing, using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and Yarn A, pick up and knit 9 (9: 9: 9: 12: 12: 12: 12) sts down left side of front neck, K across 26 (26: 28: 28: 28: 28: 30: 30) sts on front holder, pick up and knit 15 (15: 15: 15: 18: 18: 18: 18) sts up right side of front neck, and 5 sts down right side of back neck, K across 36 (36: 38: 38: 40: 40: 42: 42) sts on back

holder, then pick up and knit 5 sts up left side of back neck.
[96 (96: 100: 100: 108: 108: 112: 112) sts ]

Row 1 (WS) K1, *P2, K2; rep from * to last 3 sts, P2, K1.
Row 2 K3, *P2, K2; rep from * to last st, K1.
These 2 rows form rib.
Work in rib for a further 11
rows, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off in rib.

## BACK SHOULDER

BUTTON BAND
With RS facing, using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and Yarn A, pick up and knit 20 (24: 24: 28: 32: 32:
36: 36) sts evenly across left back shoulder edge, from top of neckband to armhole edge. Beg with row 1, work in rib as given for neckband for 7 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.

## FRONT SHOULDER BUTTONHOLE BAND

With RS facing, using $311 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles and Yarn A, pick up and knit 20 (24: 24: 28: 32: 32: 36: 36) sts evenly across left front shoulder edge, from armhole edge to top of neckband.
Beg with row 1, work in rib as given for neckband for 3 rows, ending with RS facing
for next row.
Row 4 (RS) Rib 4 (6: 6: 6: 8: 8: 10: 10), *yrn, work 2 tog (to make a buttonhole), rib 4 (5: 5: 7: 8: 8: 9: 9); rep from * once more, yrn, work 2 tog (to make 3rd buttonhole), rib 2.
Work in rib for a further 3 rows, ending with RS facing for next row.
Cast off in rib.

## TO MAKE UP

Machine wash all pieces before completing sewing together. Lay buttonhole band over button band so that pick-up rows match cast-off edges and sew together at armhole edge. Sew side and sleeve seams.

Place centre of cast-off edge of sleeve to shoulder seam. Set in sleeve, easing sleevehead into armhole.
Join side and sleeve seams.
Sew on buttons to correspond with buttonholes.
Gently block to measurements, following any special yarn care instructions on ball band.

Row 9 K4, *yo, ssk, yo, K2, ssk, K2, k2tog, K4, yo, K3; rep from * to last 7 sts, (yo, ssk) twice, K3.

Row 11 K4, *K1, yo, ssk, yo, K2, ssk, k2tog, K2, yo, K4; rep from * to last 7 sts, K1, (yo, ssk) twice, K2.
Row 12 Purl.

Repeat rows 1-12 until work measures 34 (38: 41: 45)cm.

Next row Knit.
Next row K1, purl to last st, K1.
Next row K1, *k2tog, yo; rep from * to last st, K1.
Next row K1, purl to last st, K1.
Next 5 rows Knit.
Cast off loosely.

Sew mid back seam, inserting the tapestry needle into the outer loops of edge sts to avoid a chunky seam. Fasten off and weave in ends, following any yarn care instructions on the ball band.

## LEFT SHOULDER

Insert st holders into first and last sts to mark shoulder.
Cont as set until work measures

19 (20: 22: 23)cm from beg of sleeve, ending with a RS row.

Next row (WS) Work in patt as set to end, K across 34 (36: 38: 40) cast-on sts on holder for back neck, K3, work 37 (40: 43: 46) sts in Patt St, K4 [122 (130: 138: 146) sts]

Next row K4, work in Patt St to last 4 sts, K4.

Cont as set until work measures 34 (36: 40: 42)cm from start of sleeves.

## END OF SLEEVES

Cast off 20 sts at beg of next 2 rows. [82 (90: 98: 106) sts]

Cont in Patt St until work measures 35 (36: 36: 37)cm from end of sleeves, ending with a WS row.

Join right shoulder seam. With RS facing, using $31 / 4 m m$ needles and Yarn B, pick up and knit 5 (5: 5: 7: 7:7) sts evenly along left side of neck, knit across 23 (25: 27: 23: 27: 27) sts left on a stitch holder at front of neck, pick up and knit 5 (5:

5: 7:7:7) sts evenly along right side of neck and work across 29 (31:33: 33: $37: 37$ ) sts left on a stitch holder at back of neck as follows: K10 (10: 11: 11: 12: 12), pick up loop between next and last st and work into back of this loop, (this will now be referred to as M1), K9 (11: 11: 11: 13: 13), M1, K10 (10: 11: 11: 12: 12).
[64 (68: 72: 72: 80: 80) sts]
Work 1 row in g st.
Using Yarn A, work 2 rows in g st. Using Yarn B, work 1 row in g st.
Cast off loosely knitwise.

## TO MAKE UP

Join left shoulder and neckband seams. Fold sleeves in half lengthways, then placing folds to shoulder seams, sew sleeves in position. Join sleeve seams. Join side seams leaving garter st welts open. Pin out garment to the measurement given. Cover with damp cloths and leave until dry. See ball band for washing and further care instructions.

With RS facing, using 4mm needles starting at centre back of neck pick up and knit 11 (13: 14) sts from back of neck, 34 (40: 44) sts evenly across sleeve top, 14 (16: 18) sts evenly along shaped edge, 53 (71: 76) sts evenly along straight edge and 6 sts evenly along rib. [118 (146: 158) sts]
Row 1 P2, (K2, P2) to end.
Row 2 (K2, P2) to last 2 sts, K2.
Rows $1 \& 2$ set rib.
Work 6 rows more in rib.
Cast off in rib.

his casual jumper is a great little knit for boys and girls, ideal for keeping out the chill on cool summer evenings and breezy days at the beach. The textured stitch pattern shows off the colourful self-patterning yarn beautifully, and it's easy to knit too!
(K) BACK

Cast on 59 (65: 71: 77: 83) sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Row 1 K1, *P1, K1; rep from * to end.
Row 2 P1, *K1, P1; rep from * to end.
Rep the last 2 rows for 5 cm finishing on a row 1.

Next row (Dec row) Rib 2 (5: 4: 3: 2), dec 1 st, *rib 2, dec 1
st; rep from * to last 3 (6: 5: 4: 3) sts, rib to end. [45 (51: 55: 59: 63) sts] Change to $41 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles. Knit 2 rows.
Row 1 (RS) K1, *K1 below (see abbreviations), K1; rep from * to end.
Row 2 Knit.
Row 3 K1, *K1, K1 below; rep from * to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 4 Knit.

These 4 rows form the patt. Continue in patt until work measures 16.5 (17.5: 21.5: 25.5: 30.5) cm from commencement finishing on a WS row. (Mark each end of last row with a coloured thread to indicate start of armholes.)

Continue in patt until armholes measure 10 (11.5: 12.5: 14:

Cast off 7 (8: 8: 9: 10) sts at beg of next 2 rows, then 8 ( 9 : 9: 9:10) sts at beg of following 2 rows, keeping pattern correct.
Cast off remaining 15 (17: 21: 23: 23) sts.

## FRONT

Work as for Back until armholes measure 3 (4: 4.5: 4.5: 5.5)cm, ending on a RS row.

## COMMENCE FRONT OPENING

Next row K20 (23: 25: 27: 29), cast off next 5 sts, K to end. Continue on the last set of sts as follows:
**Keeping patt correct, continue in patt until Front opening measures 4 (4: 5: 5: 5) cm finishing at front edge.

## SHAPE NECK

Cast off 2 (2: 3: 3: 3) sts at beg of next row, keeping patt correct.

Dec 1 st at neck edge on every row until 15 (17: 17: 18: 20) sts remain.
Continue without further dec until armhole measures same as Back to shoulders finishing at armhole edge.

## SHAPE SHOULDER

Cast off 7 (8: 8: 9: 10) sts at
beg of next row.
Work 1 row.
Cast off remaining 8 (9: 9: 9: 10) sts.**

With RS facing, rejoin yarn to remaining sts at front opening. Work as instructions given for other side from ** to **.

## SLEEVES (BOTH ALIKE)

Cast on 31 (33: 37: 39: 41) sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles. Work 4 cm in rib as given for Back finishing on a row 1.
Next row (Inc row) Rib 2 (2: 4: 5: 7), inc in next st, *rib 4 (3: 3: 2: 1), inc in next st, rep from * to last 3 (2: 4: 6: 7) sts, rib to end.
[37 (41: 45: 49: 55) sts]

Change to $41 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Knit 2 rows.

## COMMENCE PATT

Continue in patt as given for
Back until Sleeve measures 15
(17.5: 23: 26.5: 30.5)cm ending on a WS row.
Cast off loosely.

TO MAKE UP
BUTTON BAND
With RS facing, using $311 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles, pick up and K13 (13: 17: 17: 17) sts evenly down left front opening for a girl or up right front opening for a boy.

Commencing on a row 2, work 5 rows in rib as given for Back. Cast off in rib.

## BUTTONHOLE BAND

With RS facing, using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles, pick up and K13 (13:
17: 17: 17) sts evenly up right front opening for a girl or down left front opening for a boy.

Commencing on a row 2, work 2 rows in rib as given for Back.

25.5 (28.5: 31: 33.25: 35.5)cm 10 (111⁄4: 1214: 13: 14)in

## GIRL'S DESIGN

Next row (Buttonhole row) Rib 2, yrn to make a st, rib 2 tog, rib 4 (4: 6: 6: 6), yrn to make a st, rib 2 tog, rib to end.

## BOY'S DESIGN

## Next row (Buttonhole row)

*Rib 4 (4: 6: 6: 6), yrn to make a st, rib 2 tog, rep from * once more, rib 1.

## BOTH DESIGNS

Work 2 rows in rib.

## Cast off in rib.

## COLLAR

Cast on 73 (77: 81: 87: 91) sts using $31 / 4 \mathrm{~mm}$ needles.
Work 4 rows in rib as given for Back.
Change to 4 mm needles.

Continue in rib until collar measures 5 (5: 6.5: 6.5: 6.5) cm, ending on a row 2.

## Cast off in rib.

Join shoulder seams by top sewing. Join side seams to markers and sleeve seams. Pin sleeves into position, sew into place. Pin button band under buttonhole band, slip stitch to cast off sts at front opening. Pin cast-on edge of collar into position round neck, placing edges of collar to centre of front bands, sew into place.
