add backstitch to your design

It's best to work backstitch when all your cross stitches are done. Check the key carefully for how many strands to use – usually it's one, but occasionally two for a more defined outline. Following the backstitch line on the chart, make your stitches as shown. Bring your needle up at 1, down at 2, then up at 3, stitching in a two-stepsforward, one-step-back motion.







Evenweave or aida?

On a design with a densely stitched background like this, we often choose to work it on aida as it makes it much faster and easier to complete. The regular, rigid grid of aida is a lot more forgiving – it'll allow you to be a little more relaxed when it comes to keeping an even tension, and makes counting much easier too.

However, it does mean that fractional stitches are a little more tricky, as you'll need to pierce the centre of the aida block for each one. If you need to, we suggest you change to a crewel embroidery needle for your fractionals, as it has a sharper point than a tapestry needle so it'll help you place the stitches more accurately. Turn to page 97 for our beginner's guide if you need more advice on fractional stitches.



wash your stitching



It's always a good idea to wash your finished piece. Immerse the stitching in a bowl of warm water with a little detergent and swill it around. Rinse in cold water – but don't wring it out. Iron your damp stitching face down on a fluffy towel, pushing the point of the iron into the back of the stitches to make them stand out.

'It's Nice Being A Bear' (XPB7) shows Paddington with a tray of sweet treats, making us wish we were a bear too! 'Please Look After This Bear' (XPB6) has Paddington dressed in his iconic blue coat and red hat with suitcase all ready for another adventure.

make a dressing table mat

- **1 Once you've finished** your stitching, gently wash and press it. Trim away excess aida, so it measures 21x8cm (81/2x31/4in).
- **2 For the top** of your dressing table mat, you can either fray the aida edges and patch your stitching onto a single piece of fabric. Or we prefer to inset the stitched border with fabric either side. Our finished mat is 19x60cm (7½x24in) but you can adjust the size to suit your dressing table. Cut one piece of quilting fabric, measuring 21x3.5cm (8½x1¼in) and another 21x55cm (8½x21½in).
- **3 Pin these panels** and your stitching, right sides facing ours are positioned so the magnolia border's at the left, but you could swap it to be on the right if you like. Machine- or hand-sew, with 1cm (½in) seam allowances, taking your time to get straight seams, especially with a striped fabric like ours, which easily shows up any wobbles!
- **4 Cut a panel** of fabric measuring 21x62cm (8½x25in) for the back. Pin this panel and the front piece, right sides together.
- **5 Leaving a gap** for turning, sew with 1cm (½in) seams. Turn right sides out, hand sew up the gap with slip stitch and press flat.

Celestial stitch

Anyone know of a pattern showing the sun setting and moon rising please? My son and I say a little rhyme at bedtime, "Night night, sleep tight, see you in the morning light" so I'd like to stitch something with a sun and moon perhaps. Thank you.

Lisa Jackson, via Facebook

Katriel says: This will be a sweet make

for your little boy's room, Lisa I found this complementary pair of designs by Spotted Skink*, which I think will be perfect stitched and mounted together, either in the same frame or in matching ones. I also like that the style and bright colours won't date too quickly as he grows up either! Find 'Moonlight and Sunlight' as a set of two black-andwhite charts, for each finished design to measure 7.5x7.5cm (3x3in) when stitched on 14-count aida. Order them for \$9.29 (approx £6.09).

Scatter free!

I use a lot of beads on my cross stitch designs. I constantly have a battle stopping them spilling all over the place when I am trying to use them though. I do have a bead nabber, but I'm sure I have read about a tray, with a mat inside for keeping the beads safe and making it easy to pick them up. Unfortunately, I can't remember where I read about it. Can you help me find one? Margaret Booth, via email

Ruth says: I've come across beading mats like the one you describe – it's a felt-like or velour-style fabric mat which you can use on a tabletop or rest it inside a regular tray. It's called a Bead Mat and you can order one measuring 22.5x30cm (9x12in) for just 70p at Beads Direct*. Another idea though is a spare hand towel, or terry tea towel, which works in the same way – I find the towel fibres keep my beads from "running" around my table. I just empty a few onto the towel and they don't scatter any more.

Scatter free! Keep beads from running away with a special mat, in a choice of colours When I'm done, I roll the towel up and keep it in my sewing basket.

In the spotlight

CLARE AGAR, SIESTA FRAMES

Roll my way

I use scroll frames and always roll the fabric inwardly so the "wrong" side is exposed to handling. I've seen that often in the magazine, fabric is rolled to expose the stitched side. Is there a right way?


Sallie Silver, USA

Clare says: Using a scroll frame is a great way to keep your project easier to handle and more manageable to work. It reduces distortion of your fabric, for a neater finish. At Siesta Frames* we make and sell a large number of roller frames, of different sizes and types, and we show in our product photography (as seen here) that

they're used with the fabric being rolled outwards, but we're aware that many stitchers roll theirs the other way. I personally recommend rolling it inwardly, as you have been doing. It'll protect the stitching you've already done and keep it clean.

There are many different scroll frames available with various ways of attaching your fabric. The traditional way of sewing your fabric on to the rollers is still popular and there are now clip on rollers and other no-sew options too.





I've been given a few charts that were once part of kits and I'm wondering if I can work out how much thread is needed for these projects. Can you help?

s: It isn't common for kit manufacturers (nor for us here) to list specific thread amounts needed, except to say that when The World of Cross Stitching projects use more than one full skein, then we always list this in the key. Thread quantities needed for our free kits, for example, are usually worked out by experience of how much was actually used by the test stitchers making that design.

It'd be tricky to work out requirements from a chart as every stitcher is different. Also, it depends on the type of the design. One with blocks of colour can be worked more "efficiently" than a confetti-style one with individual stitches scattered around. For non-confetti projects, you should get 35-40 stitches from a recommended 38cm (15in) length, using two strands.

Converted!

I have got a chart for a sampler project but the threads listed are not a brand I know. Usually I use DMC, but these are listed as Weeks Dye. Where can I get these?

Anne says: I think the threads used are in fact by a USbased company called Weeks Dye Works*, Marcia. They're hand-dyed, for soft, variegated effects. The sampler is probably created with this variegation in mind, so there is not an exact conversion to account for this, but if you'd like to substitute DMC threads, then I am sure it will be possible. Contact Weeks Dye Works for local stockist info so you can match up DMC alternatives, or maybe they can offer suggestions of the best matches.

Diving to the depths

My friend would like me to do a cross stitch of her husband's Royal Navy Submariners badge. Do you know where I could find a chart or get one made?

Fiona says: What a great way to honour his service. Avid Stitch* produces several military badge kits, however, the specific badge for submariners, known as the Dolphins and showing two dolphins facing with a crown above, is not among them. In the range is a submarine badge kit, specifically for the submarine

Diving to the depths This whole-stitch-only design is great for submariners

HMS Spartan, and it includes the Dolphins insignia. I'd recommend contacting Avid Stitch to see if they can help you with a design of the particular submarine which your friend's husband served on. The kit for 'HMS/M Spartan + Submariner badge' (X1684) for £21.95 contains everything you need, including 14-count black aida.





Getting the right fit

I'm new to cross stitch Q and would like to stitch the patterns from your Design Library, but I don't know how to figure out how much aida I will need for each motif. Help? Catherine Milne,

via Facebook

Anne says: To work out how much fabric you need for a project, just divide the stitch count by the count of your fabric, and this gives

you the size in inches of the motif. So for a motif of stitch count 25 high x 37 wide, it'll measure 4.5x6.5cm (13/4x21/2in) when finished on 14-count aida. Now to gauge the size of fabric you'll need, it's important of course not to forget the extra fabric to allow for mounting/finishing. In our example, cut a piece of 14-count measuring around 10x12cm (4x4¾in).

Friendly advice

We asked our Facebook fans what their tips were for stitching and decorating cards? – here's what they said...

X Carole Towner: By changing the count of the fabric (increasing its size from say 14- to 25-count) you can stitch more intricate designs which will still fit in the aperture you have.

X Kimberly Sloan Jarrett: I get creative with each card, sometimes adding embellishments. I love to use pinking shears to trim the designs.

X Lisa Towell: I mount stitching on pretty card and fray the edges.

X Lynn Alana Cawley: □ always back my design with wadding, cut to the size of

the aperture. It gives a lovely "cushioned" effect, and makes the design stand out.

X Aleksandra

Łanuszewska: I use doublesided tape for mounting, and stick a piece of white paper between the stitching and the back of the aperture if the card is dark.

X Rhiannon Richters:

I use stickers for the inside greeting as it makes the card look more professional.

X Em Day: I use doublesided tape and prefer patching my design onto a blank card with a pretty backing paper.

I like to use clear doublesided tape to attach my work to a blank card, then I use embellishments, such as ribbon, brads and buttons to enhance the overall project.

'm trying to find dance-related designs that might fit circular coasters - help please?

Fiona says: We hope this pretty ballerina bear might suit, Rita? 'Little ballerina' (JBDC1056) is easy to customise with different colour tutus for a coaster set, and if you stitch her on 14-count aida without the border and wording, she'll fit into a 81mm (3½in) diameter coaster from Framecraft*.

'm looking for a plain tablecloth to cross stitch my own design onto. Can you help?

Linda Keating, via email

Katriel says: Sadly pre-made tablecloths for cross stitch are few and far between. Your best option will be to buy evenweave fabric off the roll – it'll be better than aida as it is less stiff and drapes nicely. Try Zweigart* 22-count Fein-Ariosa, 25-count Lugana, 28-count Brittany Lugana or Trento, all machine washable. You'll also be able to design your project exactly as you'd like, rather than to fit pre-made aida inset panels.

TECHNIQUE FOCUS

Top table

I have a design that would look great as a placemat. I can find plenty of blank coasters, but am having no luck sourcing a blank placemat. Do you know of any?

Lucy Dunsmore, via email

Anne says: I'm sorry to say we think there is no such thing as an acrylic place mat for mounting cross stitch. Placemats are usually made up as fabric-backed items, so they can be washed if there are any spills.

For tips on making one, I'd choose a crafting-weight cotton to coordinate with your design - a typical size for a dinnersetting placemat would be 30x38cm (12x15in). Either make one from two pieces of the fabric with your stitching added as a patch. Pin the patch centrally onto the front of one fabric piece and stitch in place, either by hand or machine. Now pin the two fabric pieces with right sides together, machine sew and leave a gap for turning through, turn through, slipstitching the gap closed.

The second option is to incorporate your stitched piece into the front piece of the



placemat – like the one seen here, which we made as a tablemat centrepiece. First sew top and bottom strips to your trimmed stitching, then side strips onto this. Press all the seams flat. Now cut a back panel the same size and pin them together and sew to repeat the assembly process as before.

Durene says: I know several people who own Border collies, and they are lovely dogs. The breed is highly intelligent, infact they are considered to be the most intelligent dog breed, and all their energy ensures owners are never short of exercise.

I designed this pattern to have a green background to look like grass, but you could easily change the colour to suit your needs. I also gave the dog brown eyes, but as eye colour varies in this breed, from blue to brown and even sometimes differing eye colours, you can adapt the shades to match your beloved pooch!

Once stitched, patch the design onto a card blank, we chose white to make the design stand out, and decorate with ribbon in a coordinating colour like ours. If you want to ensure longevity of your design, you can easily frame it, just make sure you add extra fabric onto the measurements to allow for mounting.



How to ...

make a hanging

- 1 Back your finished stitching with ironon interfacing. Now trim to size, leaving a 3cm (11/4in) seam allowance at each side and at the bottom and 5cm (2in) at the top.
- 2 Cut a piece of lightweight backing fabric the same size as the stitched piece. Place them right sides together and pin.
- 3 Stitch either by hand or machine, and using a 2cm (¾in) seam allowance, taking your time to get straight seams. Start at one top corner and work down the long edge, finishing around 8cm (3in) away from where you started, so that a small gap is left at the top for turning through.
- **4 Turn through and** press the seams flat for a neat finish. (Try using a pin to 'tease' the seams out neatly.) Use slip stitch to close the gap invisibly.
- **5 Press then pin** a 2cm (¾in) hem towards the wrong side, to make your cord casing. Machine stitch with a row of top stitching 1cm (½in) down from the top edge.
- **6 Cut a length** of cord for hanging, or make one to match – like ours, using a Kreinik* Custom Corder. Thread it through the casing and tie a knot to form a loop.

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
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Decorative stitches

Learn how to work the decorative effects in Lisa's sampler. Follow our simple step-by-step guides to master each of these techniques





MODIFIED RHODES STITCH



The Rhodes stitch is a textural square-shaped stitch – it can be made over different numbers of threads for larger square areas, and worked either in a clockwise or anticlockwise direction. Usually

a Rhodes stitch is densely made, using every thread of the evenweave fabric, however, in this design Lisa has created a modified Rhodes which only uses a stitch every other thread of the fabric, for a more star-like finish, which is less dense. It is stitched over a total of 10 threads of the evenweave fabric, both in height and width, and works anticlockwise beginning towards the top left of the square.



component stitch of your modified Rhodes stitch is the one worked from bottom right to top left corners, then

1. Since the final

from bottom right to top left corners, then we'll start with the one anticlockwise from this. Bring the needle up two

threads down from the top left corner, along the left edge of the square. Go down two threads up from the bottom right (on the opposite side of the square). Count two more fabric threads down from the start of this first stitch, to begin your next stitch – come up, then take the needle down two threads up from the first one, so you're now working on a slight diagonal, rotating anticlockwise.



2. Continue working

the long stitches (backstitch, but over a longer distance) round the square, moving the start and end of each stitch along by two threads of the fabric. Do this in rotation for every

stitch you make to achieve the star-like finish in the sampler in anticlockwise movements.

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LAZY DAISY STITCH



his teardrop-shaped stitch is sometimes called detached chain stitch. Whereas chain stitch has each stitch linking on from the previous one, lazy daisies are usually made in isolation and often in a radiating

pattern, like petals of a flower. Lisa's cleverly used a similar effect here, emphasising it by layering lazy daisy stitches over other coloured whole cross stitches for contrast.

The lazy daisy is another stitch which can be worked over different number of fabric threads, to form stitches of different sizes. Here, the lazy daisies in Lisa's design are worked over six threads of the evenweave fabric (over three cross stitches).



1. For clarity, the method for working a single lazy daisy is shown without the cross stitch layer beneath. Bring your needle up at the base of the teardrop shape – the pointy end. In the case of Lisa's

sampler, this is the centre of the radiating 'flower' shape. Take the needle back down into the fabric very close to the start point, just one thread of the fabric across, but don't pull the thread too tight as you'll need to leave a loop.



2. Now bring the needle up again at the far point which corresponds to the height of the lazy daisy stitch – so in the case of this sampler, it's over the three cross stitches you will have already worked,

and in this step-by-step illustration we show it over six threads, so this corresponds to the same finished size. Don't pull the thread tight yet, so you'll still have the loop made in step 1, and you can bring your thread up inside the loop as you pull it. Take care not to pull so tightly that the loop disappears into a line, but just lies flat on the fabric in a rounded teardrop shape. Then secure the lazy daisy with a tiny straight stitch over the top of the loop.

3. Continue making all the lazy daisies, rotating around the central point until each 'flower' is done.

SEED BEADS



he huge range of colours and finishes of seed beads makes them an invaluable addition in many cross stitch designs - the Mill Hill* collection makes them ideal to add sparkle and texture to

projects. Also we find they're great for details like animals' eyes or flower centres, especially if you don't want to use French knots.

In this sampler design, Lisa's chosen a stunning rich gold-green shade for the beadwork accents, perfectly coordinating with the cross stitch palette. Attach seed beads with two strands of stranded cotton, and using a beading needle rather than a tapestry needle can be helpful, since it is much finer. If you struggle to thread a beading needle, then a smaller size of tapestry needle – a size 26 or even 28 will be better for threading through small beads.



1. Add beads last after all your other stitching is complete, even if the bead is to be added in an unworked area of your project, direct on to the fabric. This will avoid any

the beads as you continue to stitch the design. Securely attach each bead with a cross stitch in two strands of thread. Bring the needle up at the bead position on the chart, thread on your bead, then go back down to complete the first arm of the cross stitch. As you work the second arm of the stitch, separate the two strands either side of the bead.



2. When choosing a thread colour, take care to match to the surface you're attaching the beads to. So, if stitching beads direct to a white fabric, use white thread. Or if stitching beads to an area of cross stitching – as

in this sampler – use a colour to match those surface stitches. Compare the pair seen on the left – using matching threads, with those on the right, both of which use white, which is more obtrusive. Another tip is to use invisible thread (sold at sewing stores) to avoid changing thread colours so often.

How to ...

make a felt bookmark

1 Trim your stitched piece leaving a 1cm (1/2in) border all round. Take some tweezers and carefully fray your aida to create a fringe one block wide. Add iron-on interfacing to the back for a hardwearing finish.

2 Take some felt in a coordinating (and suitably funky) colour, and cut a piece to 23x7.5cm (9x3in).

3 Place your stitching towards the top of the felt backing, and pin in place when you are happy with the positioning.

4 Hand sew your stitching in place as a patch, using simple running stitch in either white or try a complimentary colour. Take care to stitch through the aida holes for a neat finish.

5 Finish by rounding the felt corners and tapering the point at the bottom, using sharp fabric scissors. Make a hole with a hand-held punch and add a tassel.

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


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


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How to...

Your beginner's guide to instant stitching success with Anne!



CHOOSE YOUR ESSENTIALS...

Start with these must-have items

1. FABRICS

Begin with either aida or evenweave. **Aida** is best for beginners, with regular woven blocks and obvious holes. It's stiffer than evenweave, but will soften slightly as you work. 14-count aida is the most common. It's harder to work fractional stitches on aida, as you'll need to make an extra hole in the fabric, in the centre of the aida block.

Evenweave is a lovely fabric to work on when you have a little more experience. The fibres aren't woven in blocks as with aida, so it's softer and the fine weave has more threads-per-inch – the most commonly used is 28-count. One stitch is usually worked over two threads of the fabric so it has an equivalent design size of 14-count aida. Cross stitching fractional stitches is easier on evenweave, as there's a central hole spare so you don't need to split a block as for aida.



2. THREADS

You'll need **stranded cotton** – this coloured thread comes in 8m skeins and is made up of six strands. The count of your fabric will determine the number of strands you use in your needle. Typically for 14-count aida you'll use two strands for cross stitch and just one strand for backstitch. This is indicated in the key or instructions for your project. There are three main brands – DMC, Anchor and Madeira – which are all smooth and easy





to stitch with, and are colourfast to 95°C. Cheaper brands are available, but they're less durable and may not be colourfast.

3. NEEDLES

To cross stitch, use a **tapestry needle**, which has a blunt tip and larger eye than a regular sewing needle. It easily passes through the fibres of aida and evenweave. Different needle sizes are available, with varying lengths and widths, so choose the best for your fabric – see our handy guide. Other needles are useful too... try a fine beading needle for adding bead accents. You may also prefer a sharp-tipped embroidery (or crewel) needle to split aida blocks when stitching fractional stitches.

START CROSS STITCHING...

Make sure you hit the mark first time, every time with our top tips!

- Choose your project... With our Factbox guide in every one of our projects, you can make sure you choose the right level for you. Absolute beginners should aim for a design without fractional stitches.
- Buy your materials... To make sure your design looks great, use our Shopping List for each project, which specifies everything needed, like size of fabric and finishing materials. Using another fabric with different HPI, will give a different finished size of design. Calculate your fabric requirements like this: Stitch count divided by HPI of 'new' fabric choice = new size in inches. Add at least 10cm (4in) on each dimension to allow for mounting, or less for cards.
- **Get ready...** We always recommend starting in the centre of a design and working outwards. Our charts are marked with two centre arrows so find a symbol close to the centre and begin there.
- **Get set...** Find the corresponding centre of your fabric by folding in half and half again. The point where the folds cross corresponds to the centre so this is where your central stitch should go.
- **38 Get stitching...** Begin your stitches in two strands of thread with a loop start for the neatest way to get going. It uses one double-length (80cm) strand with both ends threaded together. See our diagrams for how to stitch. Finish threads by weaving the left-over 'tail' under a few stitches at the back.


How to stitch


Tackle the basic stitches in our charts...



Loop start With both ends of a strand threaded, bring your needle up (1), leaving a loop at the back. Work the first arm of your stitch (2) & secure it by passing your needle through the loop.

Backstitch Add detail and definition. Bring your needle up at (1) & down at (2), come up again at (3), then back down at (1) & so on, to direct each stitch 'back' towards the line of the growing backstitch.





Cross stitch Bring your needle up at the bottom left corner (1) & down in the top right (2) for the first 'arm' of your stitch. Work the second arm, coming up in the bottom right (3) & going down in the top left (4).

French knots Easy with practice – come up in the fabric (1), keep the thread taut & wrap twice around the needle. Push the needle down, close by, but *not* in the same hole (2). Split the aida block for a neat knot.

FRACTIONAL STITCHES

Fractionals let you create rounded edges



QuarterThe chart shows which corner has

the fractional. Bring the needle up in that corner and down in the centre of the square, halfway across the diagonal (diagram 1).





Threequarters

Work a quarter stitch, then, a half stitch across the other diagonal arm of the square as in diagram 2. Like quarters, three-quarter stitches can face any direction.



Two symbols When two

symbols share a square, work a fractional in each colour. Decide on the quarter stitch for the background colour, then a three-quarters stitch for the main one (diagram 3).



a three-quarter stitch in each colour, stitching them back-to-back (diagram 4). Make sure that the two half stitch arms lie neatly parallel to each other.

How to read our keys

Clear symbols, colours, & all the info you need!



Symbols

Look for a symbol close to the chart centre — the arrows on our charts easily show the centre so you won't need to count! Find this symbol in the key. The codes in that row show which thread shades to use for cross stitching blocks with this symbol.

Thread brands

The thread shades are listed in separate columns for the different manufacturer brands of thread. For best results, you should stick to one manufacturer for the whole of a design.

Backstitch & French knot shades

The shades used for these are listed under the cross stitch symbols. The number of strands needed for these can vary, so make sure you check how many to use, as specified in the key.

Afghan – a woollen blanket with areas inset for cross stitching, often used for baby designs Aida band - a narrow strip of aida, available in varying widths, and finished with a decorative edge Aperture - a hole through which a design is seen in cards & frames Backstitch - used to add detail & definition. an evenweave fabric Variegated thread specific type of stranded cotton, in which the colour changes along the length of the thread for a shaded effect Waste canvas loosely woven fabric, held together with soluble glue. Used to add designs to clothing & other non-counted fabrics before being moistened & the fibres withdrawn with tweezers

Ruth's STITCHING WORLD

For a place to put your feet up and find some fun & stitchy chat, look no further...

olour! Who doesn't feel a bit of a thrill to see all the neat racks of threads in their stitching shop, or a workbox of tidy bobbins, ordered in a spectrum of shades?! But it's not too often that I think about fabric colour.

I usually stick to pale neutrals of white and ivory, sometimes pastels too (like pale blue, for sky-backgrounded projects), maybe a festive red. Even though, there are so many more ideas beyond these! Lately, I read a stitcher's blog... she'd been planning her next project with her compulsory "floss toss". Have you come across this phrase? I've



heard it many times, but I'm a snap-decision stitcher, so I don't tend to consider different fabric options before plumping for the one I want.

A "floss toss" is when you gather the thread skeins for a project and simply arrange them – toss them – on fabric samples, to get an idea of the colour combinations of how that pattern will look. Even online variants of the floss toss are offered by some fabric sellers, showing digitally how a project might look on different fabrics. So now, I'll be

"I've never been one to 'floss toss' before now, but I'll give it a go! " getting creative and just as soon as my current project is done, I'm going to try something beyond the usual. I'm sure the results won't disappoint!

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

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


