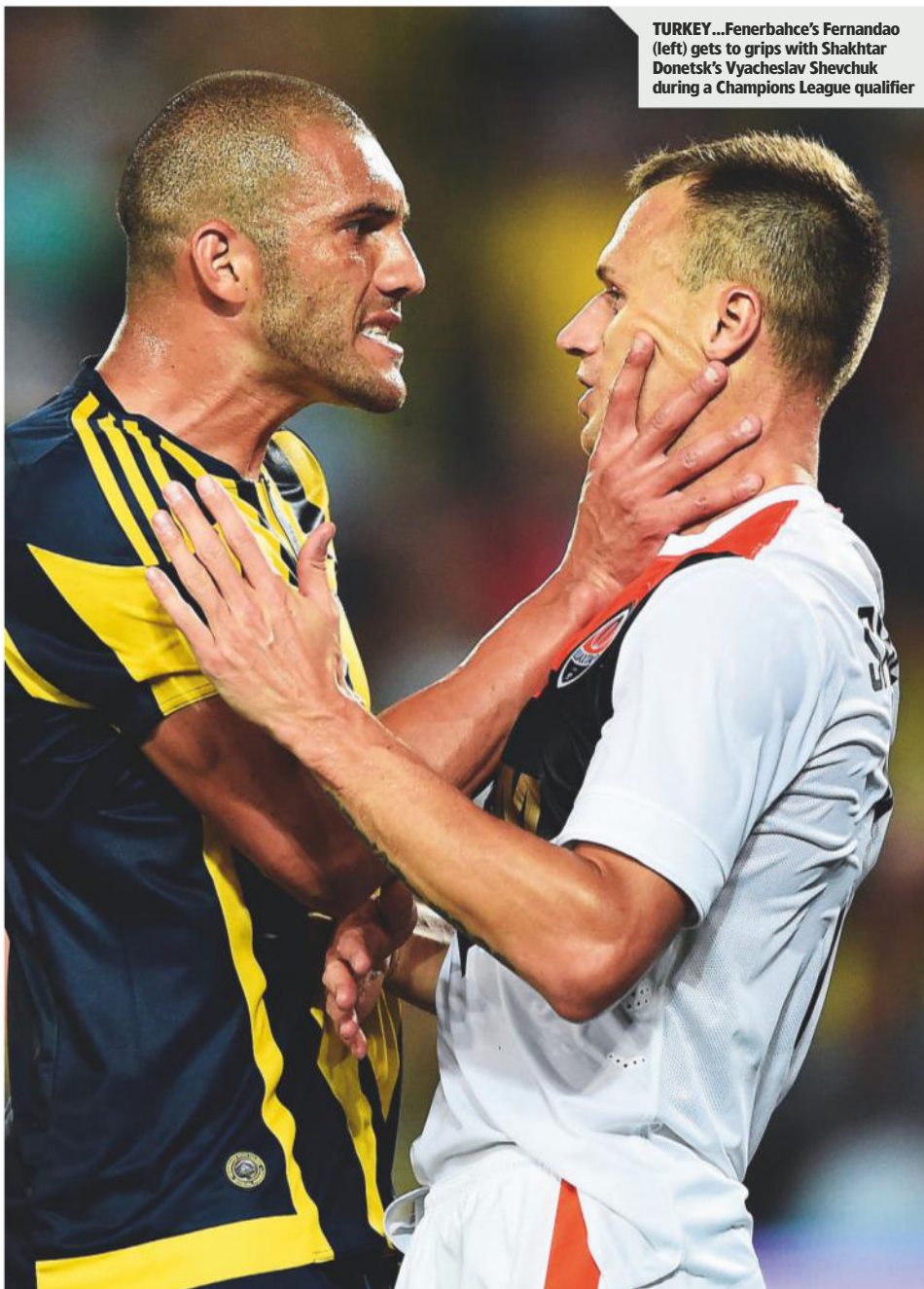

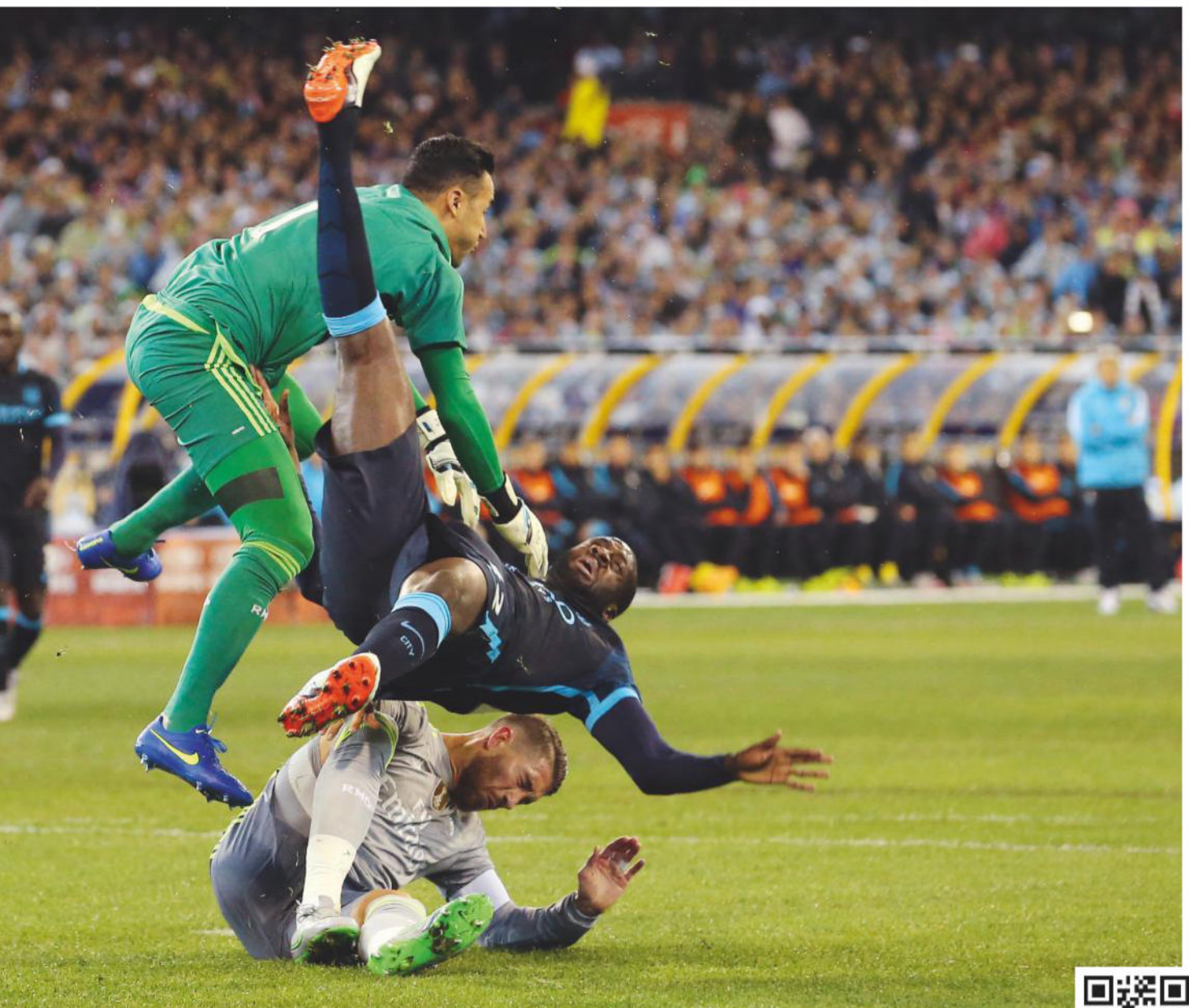

Platini announcement kick-starts FIFA election

UEFA president Michel Platini has confirmed he wants to succeed Sepp Blatter as FIFA president and will stand in the election on February 26.

Platini made his announcement following a series of meetings with key FIFA powerbrokers before the 2016 World Cup draw in St Petersburg, Russia.

"This was a very personal, carefully considered decision, one in which I weighed up the future of football alongside my own future. I was also guided by the esteem, support and encouragement that many of you have shown me," Platini said.

"There are times in life when you have to take your destiny into your own hands.

"I am at one of those decisive moments, at a juncture in my life and in events that are shaping the future of FIFA."

Platini's announcement was followed by a similar declaration of intent by former FIFA vice-president Chung Mong-joon of South Korea.

Prince Ali of Jordan, who stood unsuccessfully against Blatter in May, is considering standing again. Others who have said they plan to stand include former Brazil international Zico and Liberia FA boss Musa Bility.

Candidates must be nominated by five member countries.

Fred failed Copa America dope test

Brazilian midfielder Fred is facing a lengthy ban after he failed a drugs test at the Copa America in Chile in July.

The 22-year-old provided samples which showed traces of the diuretic hydrochlorothiazide, a prohibited substance that can be used as a masking agent for other drugs.

Fred, who plays for Shakhtar Donetsk in Ukraine, appeared in Brazil’s first two group games before being dropped for

the last match against Venezuela.

Shakhtar coach Mircea Lucescu attracted criticism when he selected Fred in the Shakhtar team to play Fenerbahce in a Champions League qualifier.

Lucescu believes the banned substance could have been administered to the midfielder when he was on international duty with Brazil.

“I do not think a guy who can run 13km per game needs pills, but I will avoid commenting on the issue further until the results of the second test are known,” commented Lucescu.

“However, it would be very sad if such a young player is suspended for some time.”

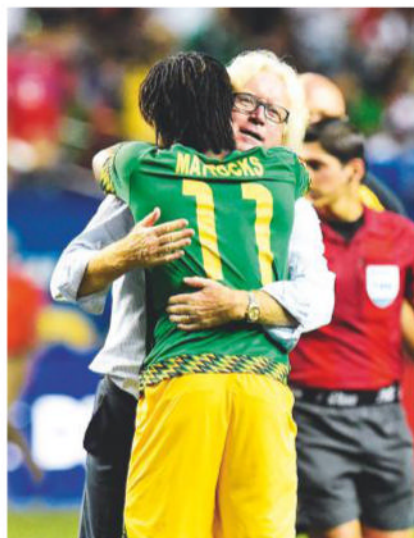

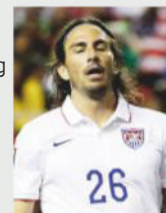

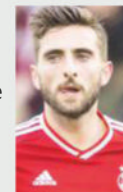

**Oversees a Gold Cup triumph...and is

On July 28, Miguel Herrera was sacked from his position as coach of Mexico's national team. The decision came as a surprise to the world of football – though, in reality, it was the chronicle of a death foretold. Behind the jovial and enthusiastic man who made the planet fall in love with his joyous celebrations in Brazil 2014, there was a dark side that eventually became his undoing.

The day after Mexico won the Gold Cup, Herrera punched Christian Martinoli, a journalist with the television network TV Azteca, at the airport in Philadelphia. The event shocked the Mexican public and, one day later, the new president of the Mexican FA, Decio De Maria, announced the dismissal of a coach who only a year ago was probably the most popular man in the country.

But the incident in the US was the straw that broke the camel's back. In just a few months, he had completely tarnished the excellent image he had made at last year's World Cup and embarked on a dramatic road that took him from hero to pariah.

After Brazil, his face was everywhere and he recorded more than 20 television commercials in almost a year. But when a study by the website *juanfutbol.com* revealed his revenue since joining “*El Tri*” totalled \$8million, fans began to wonder if he was more concerned about his pocket than the welfare of the side.

The first serious problem came on June

which it would never recover.

Mexico then failed in the Copa America and made a bad start of the Gold Cup, finishing second in their group behind Trinidad & Tobago. The situation got even worse in the knockout stage and they only beat Costa Rica and Panama thanks to highly debatable penalty calls in the final minutes of both games.

Herrera was under siege and one of his fiercest critics was Martinoli, perhaps the most influential pundit in the country, who repeatedly suggested the coach should be fired. Herrera, whose volatile temper is well known, called him “*un pendejo*” (an arsehole) and threatened to “settle their differences when they met”.

However, nobody thought the coach would carry out his threat; even less so

after Mexico deservedly beat Jamaica 3-1 in the Final to significantly decrease the pressure on Herrera's shoulders.

Yet a day later, when he bumped into Martinoli in check-in area of the airport, the coach could not contain his temper and hit the reporter in the neck. To add insult to injury, a few seconds later, Herrera's daughter slapped Martinoli's commentating partner, former Mexican international Luis Garcia.

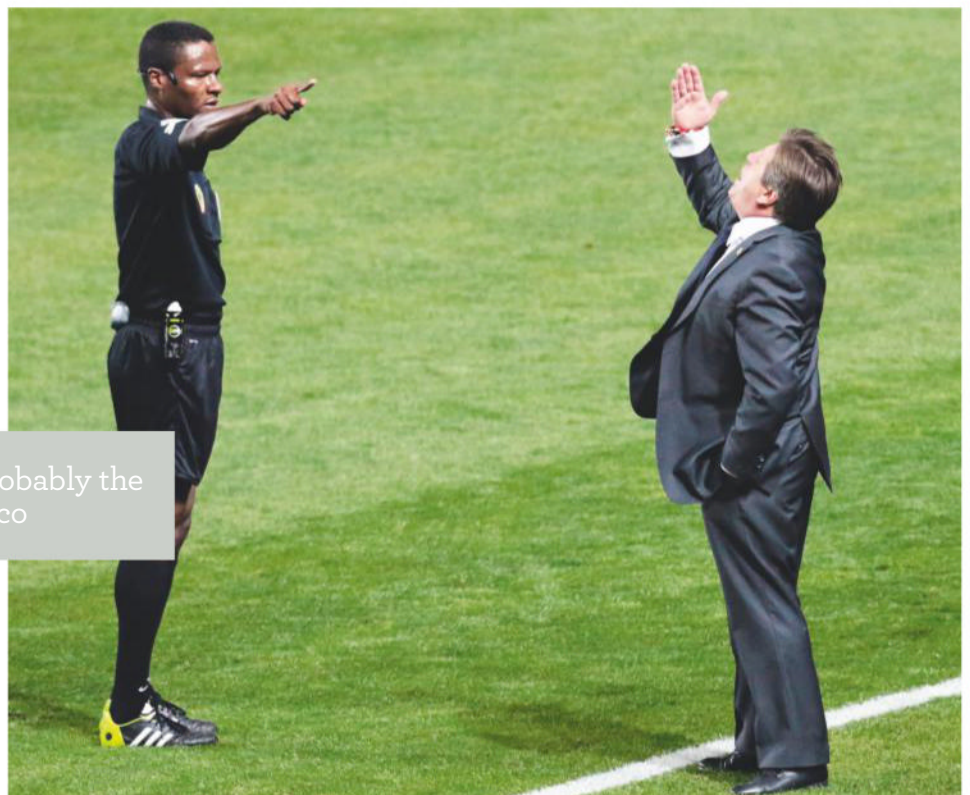
It was no surprise to anyone that Herrera was fired the next day, but his dismissal leaves the Mexican FA with a huge problem.

The national team face the USA on October 10 in a play-off for a place at the 2017 Confederations Cup in Russia, while qualifiers for the following year's finals begin this November – all of which means that there is little time to find a quality replacement for Herrera.

Argentinian coach Marcelo Bielsa, who quit Marseille only the opening day of the French season, was an early favourite for the post, but whoever gets the job will be hard pressed to have the team ready for those important matches.

Chung is a serious contender

Chung Mong-joon, the man who snatched a share of World Cup hosting for South Korea in 2002, intends to stand for the FIFA presidency in the election in Zurich on February 26, 2016. On the face of it, he is a rank outsider, having been absent from the FIFA arena for four years. But the lesson of FIFA history is that no one should underrate the 63-year-old scion of the vast Hyundai empire.

Already Chung is not pulling any punches. With Michel Platini the only other declared runner so far, he insists the world federation needs a fresh approach after the scandal-twisted downward spiral under Sepp Blatter.

“It won’t be easy,” says the South Korean billionaire. “But I think it would be worth it and there could be good results if I try hard enough. If I get elected, my job is not to enjoy the luxury of the office. My job is to change it.

“It will be very difficult for Mr Platini to have any meaningful reforms. Mr Platini enjoys institutional support from the current structure of FIFA; he is very much a product of the current system. It is time that FIFA had a non-European leadership. FIFA became a closed organisation for president Blatter, his associates and his cronies. I want to change that.”

Money is not the issue – whatever may be revealed eventually as the remuneration of the FIFA president – as Forbes estimates Chung’s net worth at \$1.2 billion. And his qualifications go far beyond football, as a graduate of Seoul National University, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Johns Hopkins University.

Platini wasted comparatively little time in issuing his own declaration of candidacy, but Chung will not have been concerned.

He knows all about hunting down early front runners – whether they be the French president of UEFA, old South American stars Zico and Diego Maradona, or Liberian federation president Musa Bility.

The initial barrier all must surmount is the need to garner nomination support from at least five national associations by the October 26 deadline and to have served in a football role for two of the last five years.

Since Chung is an honorary vice-president of FIFA the latter issue should not be a problem, and the influence of both World Cup sponsor Hyundai and the South Korean

federation should ensure at least four other signatory supporters. After that, events back in the early 1990s should caution Platini and his supporters about Chung.

Back then, Japan was out on its own in seeking to bring the World Cup to Asia for the first time, having been touted by Stanley Rous in the 1960s and early 1970s, and endorsed

– because of its raft of World Cup sponsors – by FIFA presidential successor Joao Havelange.

But the historic antipathy between Japan and their Korean neighbours sparked a rivalry which overflowed into world football. Match that with the political ambitions of the newly arrived Chung as South Korean FA president and the political and bidding landscape changed overnight.

Chung and his Koreans bid late but aggressively for 2002 and he built powerful allies within Havelange-hating UEFA. Havelange, who had expected a walkover vote within the FIFA ExCo for Japan, was confronted with the prospect of a dangerous

schism; hence he came up with the proposal of a co-hosted World Cup.

For the Japanese this was a humiliating defeat; for Chung and South Korea it was a devastating victory. For FIFA, it was an administrative nightmare. As Blatter, then general secretary, complained months down the road: “We can’t even get the Japanese and Koreans to agree on a meeting date.”

In the end national pride on both sides produced an exemplary staging of a co-hosted World Cup, even if each virtually ignored the other’s role. Chung’s own self-promotion within the battle saw him installed as the Asian confederation’s FIFA vice-president, defeating a Japanese opponent. That was his foundation to fight political wars of his own against Mohamed bin Hammam, Qatari president of the AFC and, later, against Blatter within FIFA.

Even while Havelange was still president of FIFA, Chung had asked, during an executive committee meeting, for more transparency about the federation’s finances. How much, for example, was the president paid? Havelange was furious, reportedly thumping the table with his fist in anger at being challenged. Later, after Havelange was succeeded by Blatter, Chung

raised the issue again only to be shot down by several fellow ExCo members.

That did not deter Chung. He just had to wait for his moment. Another arose in early 2007 after the infamous court case which left FIFA paying out in a settlement for cancelling MasterCard's World Cup sponsorship to sign up, instead, with Visa. As Chung wrote years later: "In a ruling full of contempt for FIFA, the judge mentioned the word 'lie' 13 times. Blatter ascribed all the responsibility to Jerome Valcke [then head of FIFA Marketing]."

Furious, Chung sought critical support among his ExCo colleagues before their next meeting but in vain. So he determined to go it alone, stating: "At our meeting, Blatter mentioned it only briefly, saying it was handled well and done with. I said in the meeting that it was not only a matter of money but was serious that FIFA suffered even worse damage to its credibility and reputation."

In 2009 Chung stepped down from his presidency of the South Korean federation to invest more time in politics and business. Then, in December 2010, South Korea's bid for a lone hosting of the World Cup came up badly short. South Korea was eliminated in the third round of voting with only five of the 22 votes.

Blatter took this result as a clear sign of a weakening of Chung's influence and, within weeks, seized his chance to rid himself of this troublesome Korean.

In early 2011 Chung was standing for re-election as the AFC's FIFA vice-president. This time Blatter threw his weight behind his Jordanian rival, Prince Ali bin Al Hussein. Even

bin Hammam supported Chung but their unholy alliance lacked credibility. Chung was ousted from FIFA, after 17 years, by 25 votes to 20. His consolation – and to assure the continuing sponsorship revenues of Hyundai – was a lifetime honorary vice-presidency.

Bin Hammam was probably secretly delighted. With Chung out of the way he had a clear run to try to oust Blatter as FIFA president. But that collapsed after the notorious Port of Spain campaign conference with Jack Warner's Caribbean Football Union. Blatter, Chung's old and new enemy, was left in unchallenged command.

Of course, Chung had always entertained greater ambitions than mere football. He had

always wanted to play a central role on the Korea political stage. In the run-up to the 2002 World Cup he had hoped to use the lure of hosting finals matches to open doors toward reunification with North Korea. Then he could go on to pursue the country's presidency. In the event he was snubbed, not only the North Koreans in football but later by South Koreans at the ballot box.

With nothing to lose, Chung vented his frustration in an autobiography, entitled *My Challenge, My Passion*. Much of the book was taken up with exacting revenge on political opponents. But he also devoted a chapter entitled "FIFA, more politics than football" to lay into Blatter and co, describing the FIFA president as "an articulate and intelligent man but more of an impetuous child than a gentleman".

Chung wrote: "The executive committee is meant to provide checks and balances when its president goes beyond his authority and mandate. But Blatter tries to minimise the power of the

executive committee and thereby neutralise any efforts to check his power... A lot of dictators on this planet have used similar methods."

Now, with Blatter stepping down, Chung must work hard to make up for four lost years on the FIFA fringe. But he has the money for the campaign and a sharp political nose.

He will have understood that AFC president Sheikh Salman bin Ibrahim Al Khalifa noted Platini's candidacy but stopped short of endorsing it; he will have understood that most of Africa bitterly resents what it considers UEFA's coup against Blatter; he will know that other federations are open to persuasion.

Chung's prospects – in any fight – should never, ever be discounted. **WS**

Goalkeepers are still free to foul, maim and injure

Back in my teenage years (so we're in the 1940s), me and my young friends knew everything about football. Everything. We argued a lot, of course, and one thing we never agreed on was the offence of obstruction. Odd, really, given that the calls were not that frequent, and usually inconsequential.

But obstruction seemed capable of almost any interpretation. Jumping forward 50 years, we come to 1995, when the word "obstruction" was banished from the rules and replaced by "impeding the progress of an opponent" – or just plain impeding.

This could hardly be interpreted as an attempt to clarify things, for nothing else changed – the same mystifying offence, but with a new name. Or maybe not, for the "Additional Instructions" section of the 1996 rule book had not got the message and still used the word "obstruction" – particularly when explaining the singular offence of obstructing a goalkeeper at corner kicks.

That section of the rule book may not have caught up with the name-change, but it did reflect a huge change in the game itself. Why was it considered necessary to single out this offence and give it special emphasis?

The apotheosis of the goalkeeper into Mr Untouchable was under way. Here was an unequivocal declaration that he was to get special protection at corners. He was not to be

obstructed – and it was specifically stated that the protection applied "before the kick is taken and before the ball is in play".

No mention was made of the possibility that the goalkeeper might himself be guilty of obstructing opposing players as they sought to play the ball.

The wording was eventually adjusted, in 2002, to "impeding" the goalkeeper. By 2007 the rule-makers seem to have become aware that they needed to acknowledge that

non-goalkeepers also had some rights in situations where impeding might be called. An explanatory note appeared in the "Guidelines" section of the rule book, stating: "All players have a right to their position on the field of play, being in the way of an opponent is not the same as moving into the way of an opponent."

A statement that severely weakened the earlier statement that impeding at corner kicks could occur before the ball was in play. If five opponents chose to position themselves around the goalkeeper, boxing him in – but without moving – how was that now impeding? Well, it just was. The impeding rule

continued to be applied as one-sidedly as ever, with goalkeepers getting virtually all the calls. They got additional help from the rule-makers when, in 2009, a small change in wording – the addition of just two letters, "e.g." – made it clear that the ban on impeding the keeper involved more than corner kicks. Under the new wording – "impeding the goalkeeper, e.g. at the taking of a corner kick" – corner-kick play was merely an example, one of various other, unspecified, situations where the goalkeeper was to receive what already looked like privileged treatment.

This was really inexplicable. In 1982, German keeper Harald Schumacher's frightening assault on Frenchman Patrick Battiston gave a brutal warning of the dangers posed by reckless goalkeepers.

Goalkeeper assaults on opponents became a common occurrence and were usually dealt with by awarding a free-kick against the victim – for impeding. A prime example was Manuel Neuer's crude foul on Gonzalo Higuain in last year's World Cup Final. Referee Nicola Rizzoli managed to turn what should have been a red card for Neuer and a penalty to Argentina, into a foul by Higuain – though he did later admit that was wrong, saying that there had been no foul by either player.

That's where we are now. Goalkeepers are allowed to charge, knee up, fists raised, into a crowd of players, to commit mayhem, to injure opponents – and sometimes their own team-

mates – with impunity.

"brave" – goalkeeping. It is also utterly reckless, and it usually involves excessive force – the two most serious of soccer's sins. No outfield player would be allowed to get away with that sort of play.

It is surely way past time for goalkeepers to be reined in, for the rule-makers to work out a way of banning this recklessness while still ensuring that goalkeepers get the protection that their unique position warrants. **WS**

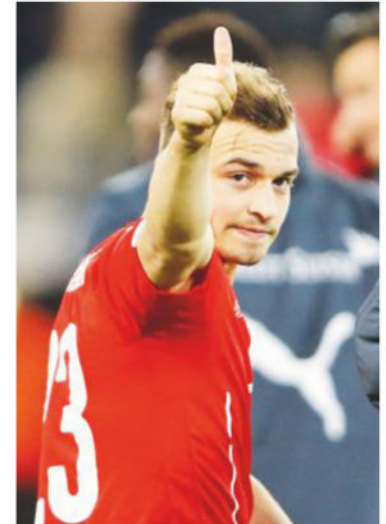

Ronaldinho is battling time

Fluminense are the 35-year-old former World Player of the Year’s latest club

The past nine years of Ronaldinho’s professional life were summed up in his first 90 minutes for his latest club.

The former World Player of the Year had been presented to fans of Fluminense at a previous game in Rio a fortnight earlier. A big crowd had turned out for the occasion, and an inspired Ronaldinho declared himself raring to go. However, he neglected to add that it would be some eight days before he actually made it to training, as part of the deal he agreed with the club was that he would be granted two weeks’ holiday straight away.

Since he had not played since the end of May, with Queretaro in Mexico, this was yet more evidence that getting the most out of the Brazilian’s extraordinary talent is not at the top of his own list of priorities – something that would seem to have been the case for some time.

In hindsight, it is almost tragically comic that going into the 2006 World Cup the Brazilian media was full of speculation that

this would be the tournament where Ronaldinho would prove himself better than Pele. It is now evident that the world had already seen the best of a player who had only just turned 26.

In the subsequent years he has been a pale and immobile shadow of the joyful youngster who thrilled the planet in the pre-Pep Guardiola Barcelona days. Indeed, Guardiola’s decision to get rid of him in 2008 stands revealed as a masterstroke. As Barca went from strength to strength, Ronaldinho – drifting from Italy to Brazil, Mexico and now back to Brazil – has never come remotely close to the standards he set previously.

The physical decline was immediately apparent in his first game for Fluminense, which, as fate would have it, was against Gremio of Porto Alegre, where his career began in the late 1990s. With World Cup centre-forward Fred

injured, Ronaldinho started the game in a false-nine role, which mainly seemed to be a way of setting up the team without giving him marking responsibilities. He did pick up a second-half yellow card for a sliding tackle, but there was an air of playing to the gallery about the incident, since it would clearly be foolish to expect an intense participation in the game from a player who has not lived as an athlete.

But this is no ordinary player. Even lamentably short of fitness, Ronaldinho is capable of producing the odd moment when he stamps his quality on the match – providing he can find enough space to work his magic. Over the last few years he has tended to drift over to the left, where he seeks the room to launch long, diagonal passes. Surround him with pace and a centre-forward adept at playing with his back to goal – at least in Brazil, where the defences lie deep and space is easier to come by – and he can still be useful.

There were snatches of quality in the Maracana, especially after Gremio had midfielder Wallace sent off early in the second half. It opened up more space – which was surely part of the explanation

for keeping Ronaldinho on the field for the full 90 minutes. It worked, too. Inside the last 15 minutes he helped set up the only goal of the game. His raking long ball was

noddled on by substitute centre-forward Wellington Paulista, who had a bizarre spell with West Ham United a couple of seasons ago, and Marcos Junior rounded the goalkeeper to score.

So, the crowd went home happy, Fluminense moved to third in the table, behind Atletico Mineiro and Corinthians, and some supporters may have gone home dreaming that the acquisition of Ronaldinho will take them higher still.

But this is where it becomes problematic because he is unlikely to be able to produce on a regular and consistent basis.

At the age of 35, there is only so much gas in the tank, even if his main priorities lay elsewhere. There will doubtless be flashes of genius and moments of frustration, but there is only ever one winner in the race between time and footballing talent, especially when the player concerned has done so much to push the clock forward.

The man who bamboozled Brazil

Alcides GHIGGIA (1926–2015)

The Uruguayan football legend died on the 65th anniversary of the shock 2-1 World Cup victory over Brazil in which he struck the winning goal.

Until Brazil's 7-1 humiliation by Germany at last year's World Cup, the "Maracanazo" of 1950 had been the greatest symbol of shame in their sporting history. Yet, in later years, Ghiggia always received a generous welcome on his visits.

His place in football history was secured on July 16, 1950. The giant new Maracana in Rio de Janeiro had been built with the specific expectation that Brazil would be crowned world champions in front of 200,000 of their own fans.

With Brazil needing only a draw because the concluding stage was a mini-league, and Uruguay having to win, no one doubted the outcome. One newspaper printed a poster, three days before the game, with a picture of the Brazilian team proclaimed as "Champions of the World". Some Uruguayan directors were so convinced of the outcome that they left for home the day before the game.

Brazil went close to scoring three times in the first five minutes, but by half-time it was still goalless. Then, two minutes after the restart, left-winger Friaca put the hosts ahead.

With a packed Maracana happily cheering Brazil to victory, Uruguay equalised in the 66th minute through

their great inside-forward Juan Schiaffino. No worries; a draw was still sufficient.

But then disaster struck as Uruguay broke away. Julio Perez released right-winger Ghiggia, who outpaced defender Bigode, cut into the penalty box and shaped to cross. Goalkeeper Moacir Barbosa threw his weight onto his right foot and stepped forward in anticipation ...so the alert Ghiggia drove the ball between the keeper and his near post.

Brazil, who were now shattered, could barely pass the ball between each other, let alone amount a serious attack in the time remaining.

The final whistle from English referee George Reader signalled victory for Uruguay and a string of reported heart-attack deaths both inside the stadium and across the country.

Ghiggia played for a further three years in Uruguay and then spent a decade in Italy, with Roma and Milan. In the days of travel travails, foreign-based players were largely written off by their own national teams so he ended his career with a mere four goals in 12 international matches, all scored in that 1950 World Cup.

Back in Brazil to attend the World Cup last year, he said: "People here love their football above all else. They don't hold grudges. I feel very proud of being Uruguayan but I also respect Brazil a great deal. It's a country full of joy, they welcome you with open arms so for me it's beautiful to be here.

"After all, this is football – people win and people lose, and that event at Maracana was what it was. The Brazilians were sad at the time but they have won five World Cups since then so I'm happy for them."

In 1950 Uruguay had opened their campaign by winning 8-0 against Bolivia, with Ghiggia scoring the eighth goal at the Estadio Independencia in Belo Horizonte – which later proved England's football graveyard against the United States. He also scored in the 2-2 draw with Spain and again in a 3-2 win against Sweden.

The subsequent winning goal in Maracana made him the first man to score in every possible match in a finals – 20 years before Brazil's Jairzinho did the same in Mexico.

Dick NANNINGA (1949–2015)

Along with Johan Neeskens, who scored a penalty against West Germany in 1974, he is one of only two players to score in a World Cup Final for Holland, coming on as a substitute and equalising in 1978 before Argentina eventually won 3-1 in extra-time. He won 15 caps, scoring six goals, and spent most of his career with Roda and Maastricht, plus a spell in Hong Kong.

Cecil JONES ATTUQUAYEFIO (1944–2015)

A member of Ghana's African Nations Cup winning team in 1965 and the African Champions League as coach of Hearts of Oak in 1998, he also served as a vice-president of the Ghana Football Association and deputy general secretary.

Hassan AL SHAZLY (1943–2015)

Egypt's all-time leading league scorer with 171 goals, he spent his entire career at Tersana and was top scorer at the 1963 African Nations Cup tournament.

John MOSHOEU (1965–2015)

Known as "Shoes", the midfielder was an African Nations Cup winner with South Africa in 1996 and capped 73 times, scoring eight goals. He spent 10 years in Turkey with Fenerbahce before returning to his homeland, where he played until the age of 42.

Glenn, the FA’s mystery man

The Football Association blunders on, ill served as ever by its clumsy hierarchy. The recently appointed chief executive is someone called Martin Glenn. Search in vain for his background in football...

One of his major claims to fame is his successful promotion of Walker’s Crisps, thanks in no small part to Gary Lineker – who, to do him credit, has matured into a formidable television pundit.

Tact seems hardly Mr Glenn’s greatest virtue. When Roy Hodgson recently

The best you can say about Michel Platini is that he is probably the least worst. And by comparison with his predecessors Joao Havelange and Sepp Blatter, a veritable angel of light. But to hear the plaudits visited upon him by the euphemistic head of the Football Association, Greg Dyke, you might think that a knight in shining armour had arrived.

According to Dyke: “Mr Platini had always made it very clear that he voted for Qatar. If all the other people who voted for Qatar had been quite as transparent it would have been more helpful!”

Eh? Read that again and try to make sense of it. To vote for Qatar at all, initially as a summer tournament, in heat of 50 degrees centigrade, seemed outrageous, but Platini did. Then to go along, as he did, with the shift to a winter tournament, to

the chaotic disadvantage of the clubs he is meant to represent in Europe seemed a betrayal of his responsibilities. No, there never has been any hint of malfeasance.

The preferred explanation had been that Platini was heavily leaned upon by the then president of France, Nicolas Sarkozy, who had the mineral interests of his country in mind. But in that case, surely the decent thing to do was either to ignore the pressure or in the last analysis to resign. Platini did neither.

Yet if you look around for an alternative presidential candidate, you will surely look in vain.

Meanwhile, Jerome Valcke, chief executive to Blatter, has graciously informed us that he too will be going when Blatter does.

Not a moment too soon, one might say.

Russia, a disaster in waiting

Is it truly too late to take the World Cup away from Russia? The full infamy of awarding the tournament to them was all too recently emphasised by the grim case of Emmanuel Frimpong.

Once as Arsenal midfielder, now playing for a lesser Russian team, Ufa, the Ghanaian was subjected to monkey chants when he played against Moscow Spartak. At a certain moment, foolishly he admits, he retorted with a one-finger gesture. He was sent off and subsequently banned for two matches, while the Spartak louts were neither punished nor even admonished. Frimpong went on to criticise the staging of a World Cup in Russia, where African teams will be involved.

Another sufferer has been the more prominent Hulk, the black Brazilian international centre-forward, who has complained that as a Zenit player he has been subject to sustained racist taunts. Chosen to take part in the World Cup draw, he was surprisingly withdrawn at short notice by Zenit manager Andre Villas-Boas on flimsy grounds. Why, it was wondered, Villas-Boas' decision to take him to a distant club match come so late?

One is reminded of the remarks of the Dutch veteran coach Dick Advocaat, who said that when he was managing Zenit he did not dare sign a black player.



A tale of two keepers

The Community Shield at Wembley between Arsenal and Chelsea provided a fascinating contrast and an intriguing sub-plot with goalkeepers Petr Cech and Thibaut Courtois.

On this occasion, the veteran Cech had the better of it, helping his new club, Arsenal, to beat Jose Mourinho's Chelsea.

At the other end, the much younger Courtois had on the whole rather more saves to make than Cech, though Arsenal in the second half decided to counter-attack. Fair's fair. They have been doing that since, under Herbert Chapman, they introduced the third-back game with its breakaway style as long ago as 1925.

Not that it stopped them freely scoring. I remember Cliff Bastin, their prolific outside-left who once got 33 goals in a single league season, once telling me that when Arsenal had a lot of the play, they'd get worried.

As for Chelsea under Mourinho, surely for all their luminous stars they have often been seen as a counter-attacking team themselves.

I can well understand Mourinho being reluctant to let Cech go to Arsenal; John Terry has claimed that he could earn the Gunners an extra 15 points.

But surely the Chelsea billionaire owner, Roman Abramovich, did the decent thing in allowing Cech to cross London – for £10million, which may yet prove a true bargain. Cech and his family didn't want to go abroad, and last season he made a mere half dozen appearances for Chelsea in the Premier League.

United's De Gea dilemma

Speaking of goalkeepers, just as Chelsea and Arsenal seem so well served by their towering keepers, Manchester United have a previously unexpected crisis. Last season, David De Gea, another towering figure, and at 24 just a year older than Courtois, saved United a good many points with his courage and agility.

But then along came Real Madrid – for whose historic rival club Atletico Madrid he had cut his teeth – and declared an interest. It soon grew plain that De Gea was all too keen to go. All too very keen you might say as his form on United's American tour so precipitately dropped.

He had a really poor game when they were well beaten by Paris Saint-Germain – and it was all too obvious that his heart was not in it.

River's resurrection men

River Plate cap a remarkable revival by winning their third Libertadores Cup

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After the lap of honour and the official photos with the trophy, River Plate players donned T-shirts especially made for the occasion. The inscription, loosely translated, read: "You Don't Abandon a Style of Play." The quote is loaded with meaning for River as it taps into the club's past and present. It is also a taunt at their great rivals, Boca Juniors.

Tigres of Mexico were dispatched 3-0 on aggregate in the Final, but the springboard for River Plate's third Libertadores Cup success was victory over Boca in the round of 16. Boca were expelled from the competition after a small group of supporters sprayed River Plate players with a homemade pepper spray. Since then, River fans have taunted their neighbours with a chant about "giving up" or "abandoning". River's players have also been filmed singing the song.

But this Libertadores triumph is about a far bigger picture than settling scores in

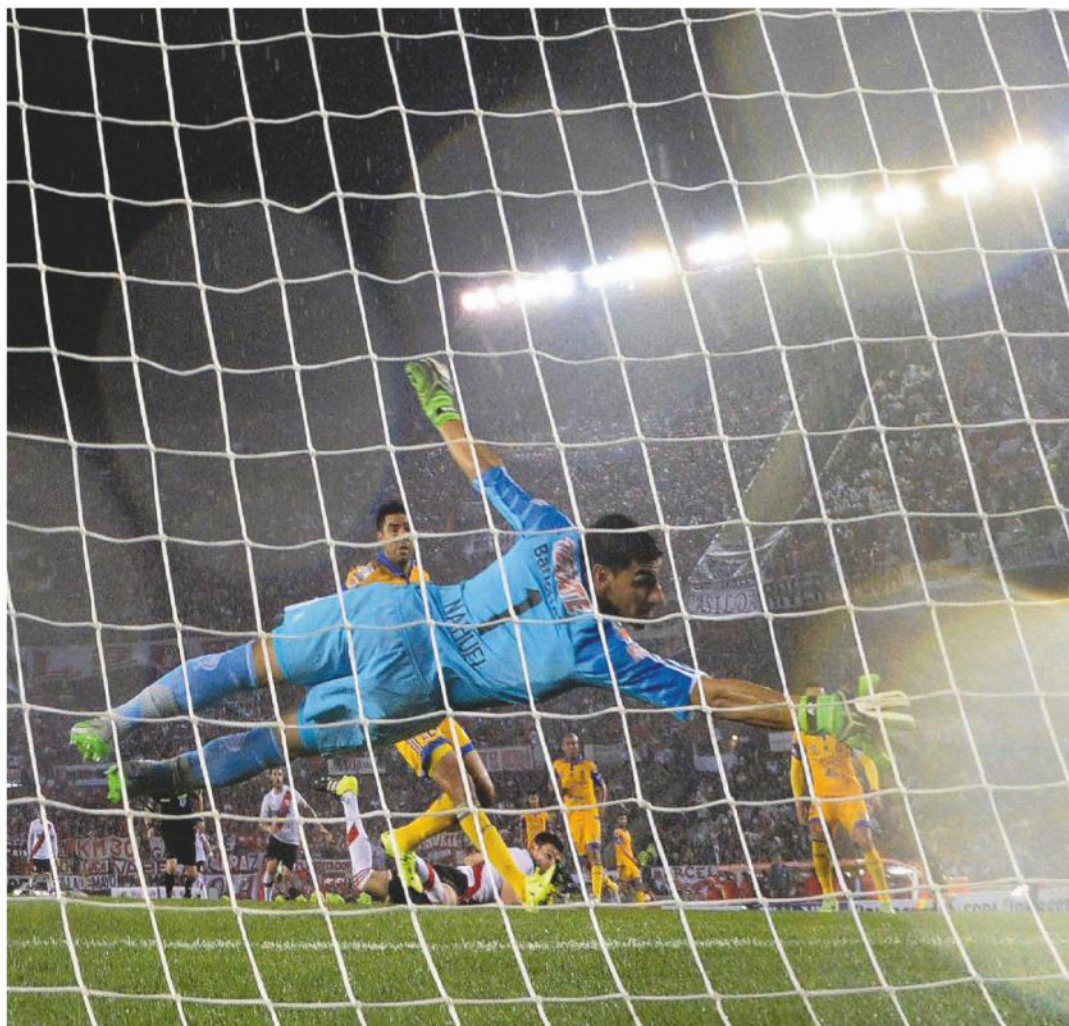

a local rivalry. For River, this is a moment of unadulterated glory that crowns a stunning 18 months. It completes the club's resurrection after its lowest point four years ago and brings to an end two decades without winning the continent's most important title. The torrential rain in Buenos Aires on the night only added an extra element of the epic to the title win.

In May 2014, River Plate were Argentinian league champions and they went on to win the domestic Super Cup under Ramon Diaz. Although the coach then quit, River Plate president Rodolfo D'Onofrio assured supporters "this has only just started". Sports director Enzo Francescoli pushed for Marcelo Gallardo, the young coach and former River Plate player, to replace Diaz and the board heeded the Uruguayan's choice, despite preferring more experienced alternatives.

Under Gallardo, River immediately produced a stylish brand of play. They won the Sudamericana Cup, also defeating Boca Juniors along the way, and then won the South American Super Cup – making



them the first club to hold of all three continental trophies at the same time.

With silverware in the trophy cabinet, a strong squad, a clear identity of play and a healthy bank balance, this was all in stark contrast to the club's recent history.

Four years ago, River Plate were in the

veterans of the campaign in the second division: Leo Ponzio, Jonathan Maidana, and one of the goalscorers on the night, Carlos Sanchez. In these players, but in Cavenaghi in particular, was the story of River's transformation.

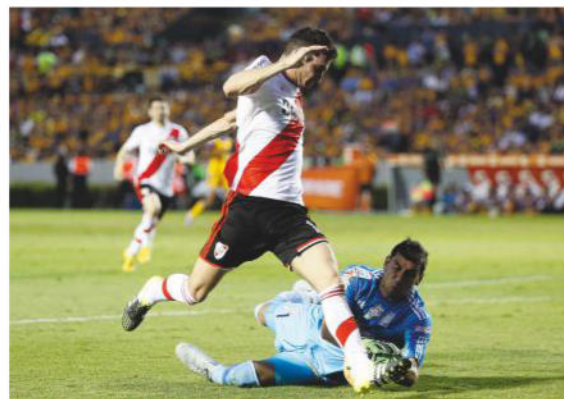
Along with Sanchez, the other two goalscorers from the 3-0 win over Tigres also explain part of the story.

Lucas Alario was a virtually unknown striker at Colon when signed by Gallardo. His first start for the club was in the semi-final against Guarani, and in the second leg he scored the goal that secured the spot

second tier. Disastrous administrations had lead the club to relegation and the institution was in complete disarray. For that season, former youth-team product Fernando Cavenaghi returned, offering to play for whatever the club could afford. The striker was captain and top scorer in River's worst-ever season, and his gesture of returning to the club when it most needed him made him a club icon.

Cavenaghi had been struggling with form and fitness this year, and was behind other strikers at the club. Yet injury to Rodrigo Mora allowed him to start the second leg of the Libertadores Final against Tigres, along with three fellow

And so Tigres became the third Mexican club to reach the Final of the Libertadores Cup, only to be sent back to the northern hemisphere to think again. Perhaps the difference this time was that Tigres went into the decider as favourites – which looked well founded on the basis of the evidence presented in the semi-finals.

During the pause in the action for the Copa America, the Mexicans made a huge investment, bringing in wingers Jurgen Damm (Pachuca) and Javier Aquino (Villarreal), and former France centre-forward Andre Gignac (Marseille). But they initially looked to be at a disadvantage going into the game with Internacional for a place in the Final. Their opponents had been in constant action in the Brazilian championship, while Tigres had been on holiday, without a game since the end of May. Would they be in a good enough physical condition and could they bed in their new players in a hurry?

Ten minutes into the first leg in Porto Alegre, the answer seemed to be a resounding “no” as Internacional went two goals up. From that point on, though, Tigres took control, playing their way into the game and pulling a goal back through centre-back Hugo Ayala. But he was then sent off early in the second half, after which the visitors retreated and held on comfortably.

A week later, in Nuevo Leon, it was one-way traffic. Aquino and Damm were a 90-minute nightmare for the Internacional full-backs, Gignac was too hot to handle and Uruguayan midfielder Egidio Arevalo Rios kept popping up in the opposing penalty area as an element of surprise. A scoreline of 3-1 hardly did justice to Tigres’ superiority. There was some late drama after Inter had pulled one back in the 88th minute – and another would have taken them through on away goals. But that did not happen and it would have been a colossal injustice.

River Plate, meanwhile, had to fight all the way against little Guarani in their semi-final.

Well led by Spanish coach Fernando Jubero, the Paraguayans were the surprise of the 2015 Libertadores. In the second leg in Asuncion they had halved River’s 2-0 first-leg lead and an equaliser seemed likely. But then came the moment for River’s re-enforcements to come good. Uruguayan attacking midfielder Tabare Viudez came off the bench to bring clarity to the counter attack and he produced a defence-splitting pass for centre-forward Lucas Alario to

lob home the decisive goal. Rodrigo Mora had scored with a similarly delightful chip in the first leg in Buenos Aires, where Guarani were left ruing the absence through injury of defensive organiser Julio Cesar Caceres.

It was a tribute to the excellence of the pass from Viudez in the return game that it managed to cut out Caceres. That goal from Alario was the only time that Guarani conceded in the knock-out stage while Caceres was on the field. The veteran marshalled his side’s back three with quality and intelligence, reading the danger and snuffing it out quickly and efficiently. He had been superb as Guarani kept four consecutive clean sheets against the giants Corinthians of Brazil and Racing of Argentina, and had he been fit for the first leg of the semi-final his team might have pushed River even closer.

Carlos Sanchez, River Plate’s dynamic

Uruguayan midfielder, was seen by some as the outstanding player of the competition, but Caceres has as good a claim as anyone – which speaks volumes about contemporary South American club football.

Last year’s star man was Juan Mercier of champions San Lorenzo – a solid,

dependable central midfielder in his mid-30s who, from a position slightly higher up the pitch, brought to bear some of the virtues shown by Caceres in this campaign.

Approaching 36, Caceres is even older. He has had a fine career, appearing in three World Cups and playing for both Boca Juniors and River Plate. But his European experience is limited to a few games in France for Nantes and in Spain for Gimnastic. And if a world XI were being picked, he would hardly have merited a mention at his peak, let alone at his current age.

And yet, like the journeyman Mercier in the previous year, that fact that Caceres can shine brightly in the Libertadores is perhaps proof of the dearth of genuine quality in the competition.

A comparison between the Final of the Champions League and the Libertadores is tough viewing for fans of the latter.

The gap between top level European and South American football has never been wider – and with MLS on the rise in the US, and China and the Middle East also creaming off talent, these are worrying times for the club game in the continent that in the past has produced some of the world’s greatest teams. **WS**

in the Final. His clinical finish on the stroke of half-time opened up the game against Tigres in River’s favour.

Defender Ramiro Funes Mori scored the third goal in the Final – and it was his brother, Rogelio Gabriel, who had been berated for missing goals when River were relegated. Ramiro not only scored vital goals for the club, he was also central to River’s impressive defensive line.

The Libertadores Cup win underlined the transformation at River Plate over the past four years, but also brought to an end a two-decade wait for the trophy. Despite boasting more Argentinian league championships than any other club, Independiente (seven), Boca Juniors (six) and Estudiantes (four) all have more Libertadores titles than River, whose only other victories were in 1986 and 1996.

The 1996 Libertadores Cup-winning generation were, in part, the architects of this year’s Libertadores success and River now look forward to the Club World Cup in Japan, where they fully expect to face Barcelona.

For that, the club, Gallardo and his players, will look to take inspiration from the generation of 1986, which not only won the Libertadores but were also world club champions. **WS**

In the shadow of civil war

One promising youngster gave up his Under-17 World Cup dream to flee death and destruction

It was a game they had to win, against an opponent they had to beat for more reasons than one. Syria's under-16 side stand to attention as their national anthem is played, prior to final group game in the AFC Championship in Bangkok, Thailand last year.

They had already overcome huge obstacles to be there. Since 2011 the country had sunk into a multi-layered and inexorably vicious civil war that has killed hundreds of thousands of people. More than seven million people have been internally displaced. A further four million have fled the country, with refugees living in camps in Turkey, Iraq and Jordan, or risking everything with human traffickers on the journey to Europe.

The Syrian football league, meanwhile, has somehow continued, moving to the relatively safer surroundings of the capital

Damascus which is still under government control. But the war has taken its toll. The mass bombing of cities like Homs and Aleppo has killed dozens of players, with several others joining the rebels in their fight against the forces of Syrian president Bashar Al Assad.

Several more have been jailed for allegedly supporting the rebels, while a number of former international players now play abroad, disgusted by the idea of playing for a team that represents the regime. One member of Syria's under-16 squad was even killed by a bomb in the southern city of Homs in the run-up to the tournament in Thailand. No one knows whether the government or the rebels were responsible.

Yet somehow, Syria's young footballers have thrived in recent years. They have qualified for several regional tournaments,

reaching the quarter-finals of all but one in the under-16, -19 and -23 age groups since the war began. The under-23s even came within one match of qualifying for the 2012 Olympics.

And now they were in Thailand, about to play Iran in a match of huge significance.

A win would set the team on their way to the quarter-finals, and reaching the semi-final would secure a place at this autumn's Under-17 World Cup in Chile.

And their opponents in this game? None other than Iran – the country blamed by many within Syria of providing arms, money and material support to keep Assad in power.

Captaining Syria's under-16s is their playmaker, Mohammed Jaddou. "The Syrian national team is my country's team,



and it was an honour to play for such a team,” recalls Jaddou of the tournament.

Within a few minutes of the anthems finishing and the game kicking off, Jaddou broke free on the right after a perfectly weighted ball over the top split the defence. He had time to choose his spot and he drilled the ball low into the bottom right hand corner to give Syria the lead. They would go on to win 2-1, before dispatching Uzbekistan 5-2, with Jaddou scoring one and setting up another.

The midfielder was suspended for the semi-final. In his absence Syria lost 7-1 to Korea, but it was enough for them to reach the finals in Chile. Jaddou smiles sadly when he thinks of Chile...because it's an achievement he will never get to savour.

“When we qualified for the world

championship, I tried to resist and forget all the bad things that happened back in my country that affected me,” he says.

“But I reached a point that I couldn't stand it any more.”

Jaddou is sitting in the kitchen of his new home; a clean, bright but bare wooden-built house in a small village in southern Germany. He lives with five other Syrians, including his father and uncle, who also fled their homeland.

Despite his importance to the under-16 team, and the attraction of taking part in a tournament that in the past has earmarked the likes of Cesc Fabregas and Landon Donovan as stars for the future, Jaddou and his family embarked on a terrifying, two-month journey to escape Syria. First they went overland to Turkey,

and then they travelled by boat to Italy, across the Mediterranean Sea – a journey that, according to the International Organization for Migration, has cost almost 2,000 lives this year. “I won't be able to forget it no matter how hard I try,” Jaddou says of the voyage that nearly cost him his life. “We saw death with our own eyes.”

Jaddou grew up in the coastal city of Latakia and by the age of eight his talent had been spotted by local club Hutteen, who play in the Syrian Premier League.

“I stopped giving my school much importance and only cared about playing football,” he says of the brief few years he remembers playing football before the civil war began. “I loved football more than I loved my parents!”

But as the war began to engulf the

country, it became harder and harder for him to travel from the coast to Damascus, through a patchwork of constantly shifting territory controlled by the government, the rebels and various groups aligned with the so-called Islamic State. His bus to training was attacked on several occasions.

"Shootings and battles between the government and the opposition were taking place and we got caught up in the crossfire," he says. "Missiles fell around our bus and they opened fire on us.

"The bus driver started driving as fast

the Syrian league. They dominated the professional game domestically and even reached the Final of the Asian Champions League in 2006. Yet by 2011 Homs was seen as the capital of the revolution against President Assad, and Saroot had left the team and taken to the streets, using his phenomenal singing voice to recite religious and patriotic songs in front of small crowds that grew from a few hundred to tens of thousands.

Saroot soon became a target for the regime and he survived several

as possible so that he can leave the area and we also had to take cover under the chairs in the bus because otherwise snipers could take us out"

A team-mate, and Jaddou's best friend, 15-year-old Tarek Ghair was killed during a mortar attack in Homs prior to the tournament in Thailand. Jaddou keeps a picture of his mangled body on his phone. "I cried for two days," he says. "He wasn't a friend. He was a brother."

In the fog of war, Jaddou had been viewed with suspicion by both sides. He claims to have been threatened by the rebels, who accuse anyone representing Syria of being complicit with the regime, and the government itself, but also says: "The government used to threaten to end my career and punish me if I didn't show up for a training camp. They also threatened to call me a deserter if I ever left the team."

The regime had form in this area, most noticeably in the case of Abdelbasset Saroot, the so-called "Singing Goalkeeper of Homs"

Saroot was the Syrian under-20 goalkeeper and played for Al Karama of Homs, then the most successful team in

assassination attempts – a story that has been told in the award winning documentary *Return to Homs*. He is believed to still be alive, a figurehead for the faltering uprising.

Another goalkeeper for played for both the national team and Al Karama is Mosab Balhous, who was jailed for "sheltering armed gangs and possessing suspicious amounts of money", according to news channel Al Arabiya.

Balhous was later released and, amazingly, allowed to rejoin the team. He even shook President Assad's hand when the team was invited to the presidential palace after Syria won the 2012 West Asian Championship, their first ever piece of silverware. Balhous is now team captain and played in Syria's 6-0 demolition of Afghanistan in their opening qualifier for the 2018 World Cup.

However, the pressure and the fear of playing football in Syria got too much for the teenage Jaddou.

Earlier this year he tried to fly to Germany, a country he had dreamed of playing in since he was a child, but he was barred from getting on the flight and told that the entire team that was due to play

in the Under-17 World Cup Chile had been placed on a no-fly list. It was then that Jaddou's father sold his house, raising the \$13,000 needed to pay people-smugglers to first cross overland into Turkey and then by boat across the Mediterranean to Italy.

The boat was overloaded. More than 130 men and women – young and old, healthy and the infirm alike – were crammed onto the 70-foot long vessel. Six hours after the boat had left the Turkish coast it began to sink.

"We had to throw everything away – food, clothes and belongings – to keep the boat afloat," says Jaddou, who recalls that the men and boys had to stay awake and bail water out of the boat with their bare hands.

"Not even for a second were we able to sleep. If we did we would eventually drown." By the time the Italian military



spotted the boat – now with no electricity and no rudder – off the coast of Sicily, Jaddou had been at sea for five days and five sleepless nights.

“That was the third time in which I was so close to death but I survived.”

On arriving in Italy, Jaddou travelled north through the country, with his father and uncle, avoiding the police until they reached Milan. They slept rough at the city’s train station before spending the last of their money paying a trafficker to drive them to a refugee center in Munich. From there they were eventually housed in the hills outside the small town of Oberstaufen, near both the Austrian and Swiss border.

Today, Jaddou is training with Ravensburg, a team who play in Germany’s fifth division. The club’s under-19 side has excelled in recent years, and many players have made the step up to play for nearby

Bundesliga members Freiburg.

“We decided to invite him without knowing what to expect,” says Markus Wolfangel, coach of the club’s under-19 team, as he watches Jaddou train. “We were very surprised from the performance of Mohammad.”

Jaddou, for the moment at least, is safe. However, he fears being deported from

Germany and has a hearing in a few months to find out whether he can stay. His biggest fear, though, is for his mother and two brothers who remain in Syria.

“I want to start as fast as possible so that I can take them away from that place filled with destruction, kidnapping, and insults and bring them here to Germany where it is safe,” he says.

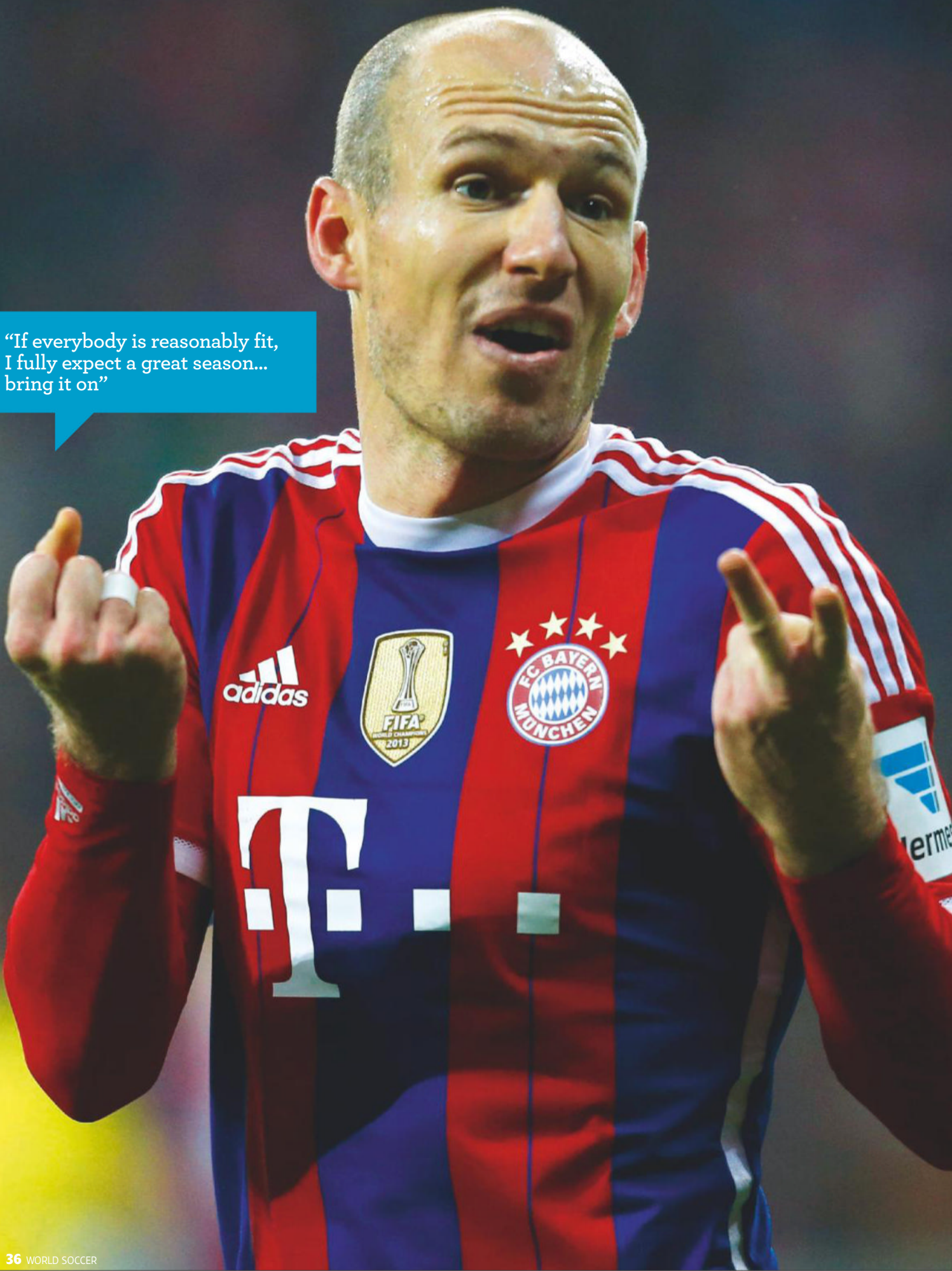
“It’s probable that I hear of their death any minute now. My brothers are young, they could be kidnapped easily.”

Jaddou’s ambition, he says, is to play for a “top European club” in the Bundesliga or elsewhere. He dreams of one day playing against his hero Cristiano Ronaldo. Yet as far-fetched as that might seem at the moment, he still believes that scenario is more likely than him ever returning home.

“Syria is being completely razed to the ground,” he says.

At 31, Bayern Munich's Dutch international may seem more laid back, but he's lost none of his desire to win

“ **Despite winning the title last season, Bayern were criticised in the final weeks after several defeats in the Bundesliga and semi-final eliminations in the Champions League and the German Cup. Do you think Bayern's achievements are not always appreciated enough?**

When I hear the criticism I want to laugh, and that's the only reaction to have. People have to look at this realistically. It was a post-World Cup season and, at the beginning, everybody was predicting it was going to be particularly difficult. So what happened? We ended up as champions with a 10-point cushion – an outstanding performance.

But some of those defeats must have dampened the mood...

Towards the end we neglected the Bundesliga because we had a lot of injuries and wanted to concentrate on the Champions League and German Cup. In semi-finals, the small details tend to be decisive. That's the way it goes. What went right for us, for example, in the 2013 Champions League Final, went against us this time around. There's no reason for us to be ashamed of our season. For me, there's no happy medium when assessments are made. If you win, everything is wonderful; if you lose, it's all bad. It shouldn't be like this. After such a season, the coach and the players ought not to be called into question. We're not uncritical of ourselves. We always know when we haven't played well.

At times you were very critical in the wake of a poor display...

You have to talk about matters which aren't going to plan. There's no use lying.

So, do you think Bayern will be back on track for this campaign?

Absolutely. I've every confidence in the squad

we have. All that matters is that we have a complete group for pre-season training. If everybody is reasonably fit, I fully expect a great season. Just look at our team. We'll have Javi Martinez raring to go again, Thiago should have a full summer of preparation, Franck Ribery and I will be back, and David Alaba will be healthy once more. Bring them all on. We'll take some stopping.

Do you see any need to make extensive changes to the team, after all it is an ageing squad?

We've enough at the club, and a super coach who knows what he's doing. We heard the same thing at the end of the 2011-12 season [when Bayern didn't win a trophy]. Everyone was saying a clean break and a new generation of players was required. And then we go and complete the triple. It's only worth bringing in new faces if they have great quality and can move us forward. There is no point in making signings just to please certain people. As for the age question, I can only speak for myself. I'm still fit and think I can play at this level for another couple of years.

Prior to missing the latter part of last term through injury, you'd been in unbelievable form, scoring 17 goals in 21 Bundesliga games and making a further eight. Was last season the best of your career?

I think that in the last two or three years I've continued to improve. Last season too, I made strides and again upped the ante. Following on from a fantastic World Cup, everything was going brilliantly. Physically, I was in great shape and I was playing well. Then came the injuries and the frustration. It all changed from one moment to the next. Naturally, I've wondered what might have been if I'd stayed fit.

After recovering from a stomach injury, you were back the following month for the

German Cup semi-final against Borussia Dortmund, but only lasted for a few minutes after coming on as a substitute...

Some did speculate that I'd returned to action too soon. That's complete nonsense. Those two injuries had nothing to do with one another. Before the Dortmund tie, I'd been training extremely well. In the past, I've had a good instinct for potential injury problems, but on this occasion I didn't suspect a thing.

How are you now?

At the end of the season I stayed on for an extra week on the training ground. It felt good. I got in some good work with the fitness coaches and, importantly, began to run again.

With you in the side, would Bayern have enjoyed more success in last season's cup competitions?

Such second-guessing makes no sense. I would have loved to have been fully involved in those matches with Porto, Dortmund and Barcelona. But talking ifs and maybes doesn't help anyone.

Were you disappointed to miss out on the Bundesliga's top goalscorer award by just two goals?

Of course it would have been nice to pick up this trophy, but no more than that. At best, it's just a nice bonus. Much more important is for the team to win games and cups.

You looked particularly happy when Bayern paraded the Bundesliga shield at the end of the season...

And why not? A championship is something special. Winning titles is not a foregone conclusion. You work all year and at the end, you're on top. You enjoy it for all it's worth. Nobody can take it away from you.

What is your working relationship like with Bayern boss Pep Guardiola?

He's a coach who encourages us to push on, to continually improve.

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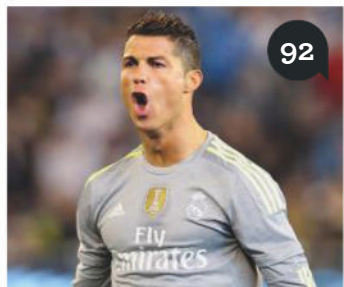
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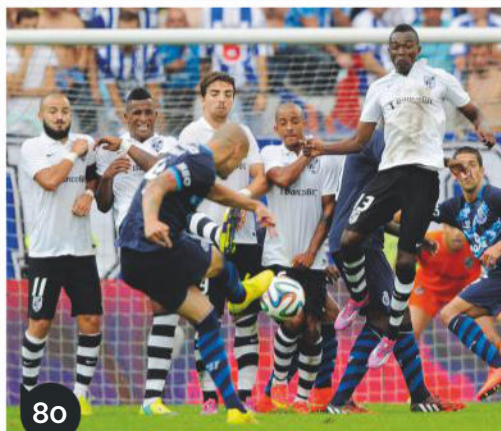
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Salzburg to place their trust in youth

Having regularly failed to qualify for the group stage of the Champions League despite their sponsor's annual hefty investment, Red Bull Salzburg appear to have abandoned their dream of buying success. From now on, they look set to concentrate on developing their own young talent before selling players on and making a profit.

And it was this shift in emphasis that prompted Adi Hutter to walk out on the club shortly after he had led them to last season's domestic league-and-cup double, claiming that he does not see himself as a "youth academy" coach.

Hutter left after only one season in charge and was clearly unhappy with the change of priority, explaining: "Salzburg are going in the direction of becoming a training club. More and more good players are leaving and young talent is coming in.

"For me, it's always difficult to start the season in the middle of upheaval.

"Too many good players have left the club in a short space of time."

Over the course of the last 12 months, Hutter saw almost his entire first team walk out the door at the Red Bull Arena. Sadio Mane went to Southampton, Kevin Kampl was sold to Borussia Dortmund and Andre Ramalho joined Bayer Leverkusen, while Stefan Ilsanker, Peter Gulacsi and Nils Quaschner all moved on to Salzburg's sister club RB Leipzig, who play in the

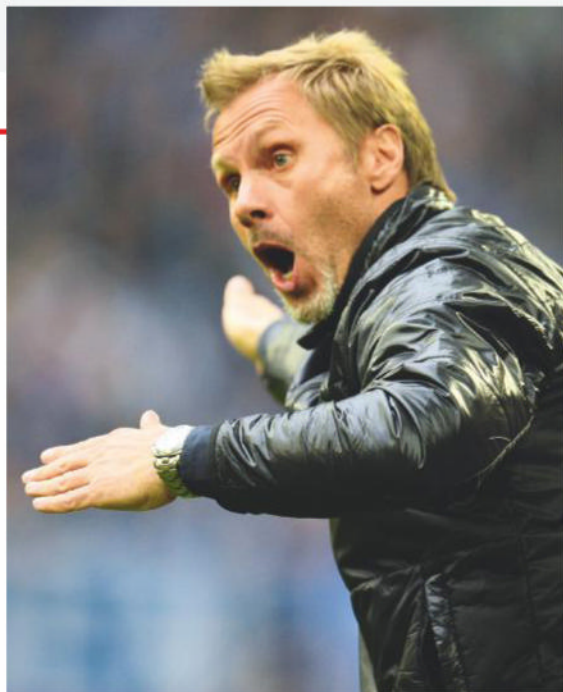

Ralf Rangnick, who was Red Bulls' sporting director for both Salzburg and Leipzig, has also severed his ties with the Austrian outfit. After three seasons working with Salzburg, and turning them into exponents of a high-tempo pressing game, he will now work solely as coach of ambitious Leipzig as they attempt to reach the German top flight.

Following the loss of Hutter and Rangnick, Salzburg have turned to Peter Zeidler – who was previously coach of second-tier Liefering, who are a de facto subsidiary of Salzburg – to implement their new policy.

"Peter Zeidler knows our philosophy inside and out after several successful years with FC Liefering," says Christoph Freund, the club's new sporting director. "He is a coach whose work we know well and whose quality we are confident in."

When Red Bull took over Austria Salzburg in 2005 their publicly stated plan was for the team to become Champions League group stage regulars, rather like Basle have managed to do in neighbouring Switzerland. But while Salzburg have certainly achieved domestic dominance, winning the league six times in 10 seasons during that period, European success has constantly evaded them, failing for seven seasons in a row before this campaign to



the best place for Fink to try to revive his career. Last season he spent four months in Cyprus with APOEL, prior to which he had a topsy-turvy two years at Hamburg – which included a club record-equalling 9-2 defeat to Bayern Munich.

Known as the "Trainerfriedhof" – the coach's graveyard – Austria Vienna have employed 38 of them in the last 30 years. Of those, only Karl Daxbacher and Herbert Prohaska managed to complete two full seasons in charge.

Even Germany's World Cup-winning boss Joachim Low was among those whose reign came to a premature end. *Brian Homewood*

get past the qualifying rounds. And all that in spite of a budget which is far superior to their rivals.

With the situation at Salzburg starting to look uncertain, it remains to be seen whether Rapid Vienna and their city neighbours Austria Vienna can take advantage and challenge for the title.

Rapid have made few changes to the squad which finished second last year, while Austria – having been turned down by Felix Magath during the summer – hired former Basle and Hamburg coach Thorsten Fink in an attempt to improve on last season's dismal seventh place. Austria Vienna may not, however, be

Title up for grabs in wide-open contest

Take one feeder league, add a mixture of relatively low wages and club budgets, throw in a pinch of an ill-designed play-off system and you have a recipe for one of the most open leagues in Europe. It could only be Belgium.

It's on the cards that none of the Belgium squad at the 2016 Euros will be playing in the Pro League as each season some of the best-known players leave. This summer has been no different, with Aleksandar Mitrovic and Maty Ryan having gone to Newcastle United and Valencia respectively, and the league not having the ability to attract big-name replacements.

In the coming campaign, any one of five teams – Anderlecht, Club Brugge, Gent, Genk or Standard Liege – could get their

hands on the trophy come May.

While Anderlecht usually start as favourites, their failure to qualify for the Champions League has made it hard for them to bring in the required talent. A lot will be expected from 18-year-old Youri Tielemans, 21-year-old Dennis Praet and Steven Defour in midfield. But while there is plenty of "star quality" they lack someone able to do the hard graft.

Club Brugge played more games than any other club in Europe last time out. General manager Vincent Mannaert does not want a repeat this term and he has been forceful in saying that the title is the priority for Michel Preud'homme's side.

After losing Australian keeper Ryan, they have brought in two replacements – Sinan Bolat (Porto, on loan) and Sebastien

Bruzzese (Zulte Waregem) but they face a struggle to win the title for the first time in 11 years.

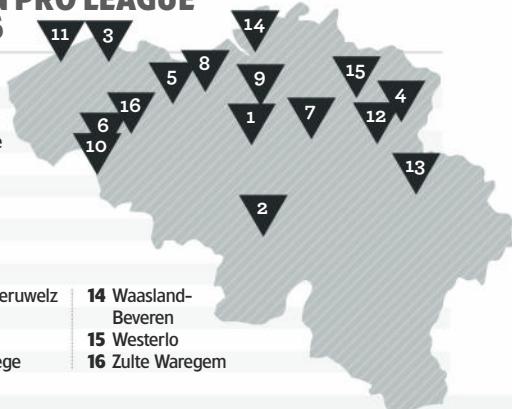
Like Anderlecht, Club Brugge look weak in certain areas and if they don't spend they could miss out again.

Gent were last year's big surprise, with coach Hein Vanhaezebrouck's tactically astute game plan taking a team without any stars to an improbable league title. But despite their Champions League windfall, Gent have not invested to refresh their squad and it's likely they will suffer from "second-season syndrome".

With Roland Duchatelet having walked

away from Standard roughly €12million richer, the Liege club are new under the ownership of businessman/fan Bruno Venanzi.

Hugely ambitious, and with the club's supporters right behind him, Venanzi has high hopes for his club this season. There is also a new coach in Slavoljub Muslin, who has a reputation for being a strict disciplinarian, while only Morocco midfielder Mehdi Carcela-Gonzalez (Benfica) has left so far, with winger

Anthony Knockaert arriving on a free transfer from Leicester City.

Since winning the title in 2011, Genk have been on a downward spiral. Alex McLeish couldn't stop the rot and they have now turned to the highly regarded Peter Maes, who worked wonders for several years at Lokeren. The troublemakers in the squad have been removed and the team looks to have a good blend of youth and experience.

It's likely that the teams featuring in the play-offs will be these five, together with one from a trio consisting of a rejuvenated Mechelen, a resurgent Charleroi and an ambitious Oostende.

The closeness of the title race will be heightened by the continuing policy to halve the points gained by the top six clubs in the classic season ahead of the play-offs. With no clear favourite, it could be the closest title race for years.

Former great CSKA in amateur ranks

Champions of Bulgaria for a record 31 times and European Cup semi-finalists twice, CSKA Sofia will play in the third-tier V Group this season, where they will be joined by Lokomotiv Sofia, who themselves have been league winners four times.

To understand CSKA's fall from grace you have to go back to 2006, when Alexander Tomov became president of the club. The former politician had big plans for the future and attracted sponsorship from Indian millionaire Pramod Mittal, who owned Kremikovtzi, Bulgaria's largest metalworking company.

In 2008, CSKA won the domestic league title for what was to be the last time, but they were barred from the Champions League due to their financial situation. Amid protests from supporters, Tomov was forced to step down and the club passed into the hands of Dimitar Borisov and Ivo Ivanov, who were known as "The Titans" because they owned the waste firm Titan AS.

Despite somehow managing to get their licence to play in European competition, CSKA's finances went from bad to worse, and in 2013 Borisov and Ivanov left as the debt soared ever higher.

With the club facing bankruptcy, a group of businessmen and former club playing legends stepped in to save the day – remarkably, under the leadership of former president Tomov, who was still widely blamed for the origins of the crisis in 2008.

With demotion to the second tier a real possibility, finding a coach willing to take charge of CSKA proved extremely difficult, but somehow Stoycho Mladenov managed to inspire the team and they rose to the challenge, finishing the first half of last

season in first place. Then, after three straight defeats in the spring, Mladenov walked away.

Critics would later point to his salary of €20,000 a month plus bonuses – huge by Bulgarian standards – only adding to the club's problems. And with his youngest son as his co-coach, an older son working as a football agent, and his wife also on the payroll, many felt Mladenov treated the club more like a family business.

Whatever the truth, CSKA went into freefall following Mladenov's departure, setting an unwanted record of 12 consecutive games without a win and 960 minutes without a goal. Three coaches came and went as they ended the season in fifth place.

But the humiliation didn't end there. With debts said to total €15m, UEFA finally stepped in and withdrew the club's European and Bulgarian professional football licence.

Barred from the top two divisions, the now amateur CSKA had two options

available: play in the fourth division debt-free, or play in the third tier with all those debts still outstanding.

Grisha Ganchev, owner of Litex Lovech, agreed to take over the club with another businessman, Yulian Indzhov, and CSKA will compete in this season's South-West V Group. The new sport director is former national coach Plamen Markov, while former player Hristo Yanev is the coach. Although the team is comprised mostly of youngsters, experience is provided by Boris Galchev and Alexander Branekov. However, what will happen about the money still owed remains to be seen.

Lokomotiv Sofia, who finished third last term were also demoted due to financial

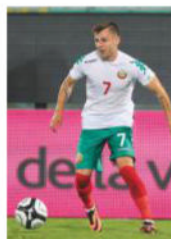

problems, although their debt only amounted to around €600,000.

Nikolay Gigov, club president for 21 years, ran a successful weapons business, so it was strange that he chose not to pay what was a relatively small sum. It has been suggested that maybe he had grown tired of football.

Unlike CSKA, Lokomotiv have been left to the mercy of fate. All their players have gone, sporting director Georgi Markov has moved to Botev Plovdiv and there is no coach. New owners Kiril Loskov and Petar Kasev paid just €100 for this once great club and nobody knows just what the future holds in store.

Champions turn to Thorup after coach walks out

The celebrations of last season's champions, first-time winners Midtjylland, had barely died down before coach Glen Riddersholm announced his resignation, citing "difficult considerations".

"I've been honest to myself and have admitted there are everyday compromises that I can no longer accept if I want to remain the best version of myself and the leader I want to be for the players and staff," said the 43-year-old by way of cryptic explanation.

Riddersholm was full of praise for the club that had won success with the appliance of science, with its "Moneyball" approach under British owner Matthew Benham – so why did he go?

The most cogent argument is that he

fell out with his immediate boss, sporting director Claus Steinlein, perhaps over transfer policy. Both were at Midtjylland before the new era began and maybe there was an element of an old-fashioned power struggle.

Just three weeks before the 2015-16 season kicked off, the defending champions turned to the hottest property around at the moment: Jess Thorup, who guided Denmark to a surprise semi-final spot in this summer's Euro Under-21 Championship, thereby qualifying for a place in next year's Olympic football tournament in Rio de Janeiro.

Thorup's stock could not have been higher at the Danish Football Association and he would have been a very strong candidate to become coach of the senior



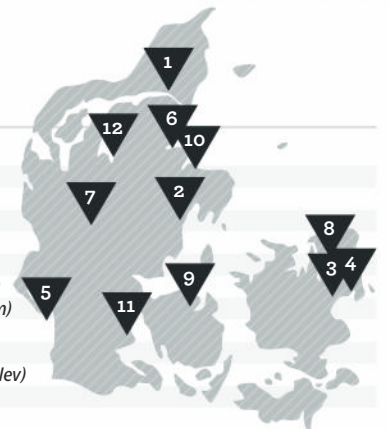
side when Morten Olsen retires next summer. Instead, he has been tempted by the lure of leading a club side against the best in Europe.

Before the under-21 post, Thorup had been in charge of Superliga side Esbjerg, where he had integrated a new generation of youngsters into the team with impressive results. A similar approach will be required at Midtjylland who do not have the financial resources of last season's runners-up, Copenhagen.

"I was immediately interested when they contacted me," said Thorup. "I like their new way of thinking about football. It will

be a challenge, but I feel it is a good step in my career.”

Midtjylland have been relatively inactive in the transfer market, selling goalkeeper Jakob Haugaard to Stoke City of the Premier League, while acquiring Austrian winger Daniel Royer from Austria Vienna and defender Kian Hansen from Nantes.

The biggest moves in the market were made by Copenhagen, who are smarting

from two successive seasons without the title and are desperate to avoid a third.

In his second spell at the club, coach Stale Solbakken is hugely experienced in the Danish game and all his signings look sound investments, particularly the two Denmark internationals: defender Peter Ankensen, on loan from Austria’s Red Bull Salzburg, and midfielder Kasper Kusk from Twente in Holland.

Serbian midfielder Benjamin Verbic from Slovenian club Celje looks like he could be a shrewd buy and there is added firepower in attack with the addition of Paraguayan international Federico Santander from Guarani.

Copenhagen finished last season strongly, winning the Danish Cup, and they are the bookmaker’s favourites following the midsummer turmoil at Midtjylland. It is a must-win season for Solbakken, who knows he will not survive if his side fail to reclaim the Superliga title.

Chelsea lead from the front

For the first time in more than a decade, none of England's top six sides changed their manager in the close season. Will that familiarity breed contempt? Or will the stability provide the platform for an exciting, open league campaign?

Certainly, it is hard to see anybody challenging the dominance of the big four of Chelsea, Arsenal and the two Manchester clubs, City and United.

Liverpool and Tottenham Hotspur, the teams that have come closest to breaking into the Champions League places in recent seasons, still look

short of a serious challenge.

Chelsea, as defending champions, started as favourites even though they kicked off the campaign with few new additions. Colombian forward Radamel Falcao and goalkeeper Asmir Begovic were the only new arrivals, with Petr Cech controversially sold to Arsenal and Brazilian defender Filipe Luis returning to Atletico Madrid.

Manager Jose Mourinho is in a minority in believing he can get the best from Falcao, who struggled to recover his best form at Manchester United last term. The Colombian was rushed back from a serious knee injury last year in order to play for his country at the World Cup.

Opinion was more divided over the

departure of 33-year-old Cech. Chelsea got good money (£10million) for a player who was unhappy at being a reserve to Thibaut Courtois but, at £8m from Stoke City, Begovic would appear to be a more-than-adequate replacement and one who is happy to play a limited role.

Chelsea were still in the market for other players, notably Augsburg's highly rated Ghanaian left-back Baba Rahman and Everton defender John Stones. But few of Chelsea's army of young loanees – almost 30, according to the club website – will get an opportunity this season. The club have been

stockpiling talent from across the globe – Brazilian forward Kenedy (Fluminense) and Romanian defender Cristian Manea (Viitorul) were the latest to be signed and sent out on loan this summer – but very few have made the first-team squad.

Instead, Mourinho will stick with the tried and tested group of players who won the title at a canter last season. The major caveat is that he needs striker Diego Costa to retain his fitness.

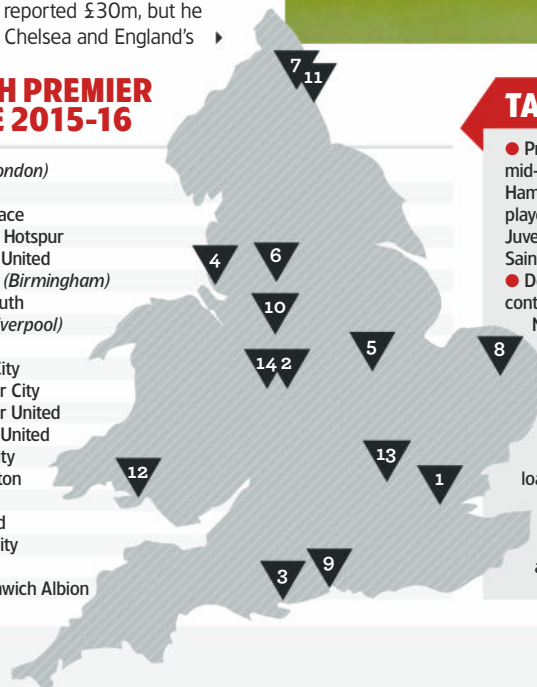

- Watford have 20 different nationalities in their squad as their controversial owner Gino Pozzo moves players around his network of clubs. Quique Sanchez Flores, the club's fifth manager in 12 months, has the unenviable task of moulding a team together.
- Liverpool have traditionally stayed loyal to struggling managers. But how much slack will the club cut Brendan Rodgers if expensive signings Roberto Firmino and Christian Benteke fail to fire Liverpool in to the top four?
- Clubs again spent heavily in the summer transfer market, with more than £500million laid out by the start of August as they act to

- avoid missing out on next year's bumper TV deal, worth £5.1 billion over three years.
- Stoke's re-invention under Mark Hughes continues. Ibrahim Afellay is the latest recruit from Barcelona as the Tony Pulis years become a fading memory.
- After defying expectations last season, Southampton have again lost players to bigger clubs: Morgan Schneiderlin to Man United and Nathaniel Clyne, another sale to Liverpool. Jordie Clasie is an astute signing but how will the Saints cope with life in the Europa League and the Thursday/Sunday match congestion?
- West Ham parted company with Sam Allardyce and hired Slaven Bilic. But every team Allardyce has left (Bolton, Newcastle, Blackburn) have since suffered relegation. In their last season at Upton Park before the controversial switch to the Olympic Stadium, can West Ham buck the trend?

other leading clubs cannot compete for players with Barcelona, Real Madrid and Bayern Munich. "I think there are only three clubs in the world who have the power to say, 'I don't sell,' he claimed.

"This is Real Madrid, Barcelona and Bayern Munich. Is anyone in England interested in Thomas Muller? For sure. Can we, England, bring Thomas Muller from Bayern? I don't think so.

"Does anyone want Messi? Can you bring him? I don't think so. They are big clubs with big histories, economically strong and stable, income amazing. I think they sell when they want to sell. When you see a player leave one of these big clubs you have to think it's because they want him to go."

Mourinho's words could well have been aimed at Manchester United, who brought in such a "name" in Bastian Schweinsteiger from Bayern Munich, but wrote off Angel Di Maria just one year after his arrival as a record signing from Real Madrid. The £43m paid by Paris Saint-Germain represented a £15m loss for United,

but manager Louis Van Gaal accepted the departure of an unhappy player who struggled with the physical nature of the English game and whose form appeared to drop following a violent burglary at his family home in February.

United were the busiest of the top four in the summer transfer market. In addition to Schweinsteiger, they signed French midfielder Morgan Schneiderlin, Dutch forward Memphis Depay and Italian full-back Matteo Darmian – an outlay of some £70m. Robin Van Persie, somewhat surprisingly, joined Turkey's Fenerbahce, leaving Wayne Rooney as the undisputed first-choice centre-forward. Rooney's partnership with the livewire Depay will be crucial to United's progress this season. Schneiderlin will add steel to the midfield while Schweinsteiger, injuries permitting, will bring greater guile in high-profile games. Van Gaal insists he will retire in 2017 when his contract expires. Whether he has done enough to challenge Chelsea (and City) remains to be seen.

Across town, City boss Manuel Pellegrini

agreed a one-year contract extension, until 2017, as rumours persisted that the club has targeted Pep Guardiola as his replacement next summer.

City backed their coach with the record £47m signing of Raheem Sterling from Liverpool. Sterling gives City an exciting new attacking outlet. If Sergio Aguero stays fit, City will provide Chelsea with their biggest challenge – especially now that midfielder Yaya Toure, a disappointment last season, has enjoyed a summer break after his involvement in the 2014 World Cup and 2015 African Nations Cup.

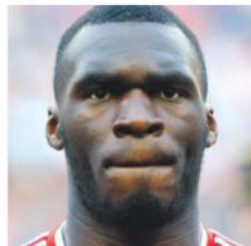

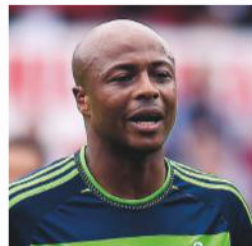

Outside of the big four, Brendan Rodgers will come under pressure if his expensive new signings Christian Benteke and Roberto Firmino fail to click. Even if they do, it may not be enough to break into the top four. Similarly, Tottenham, fifth last season, have not refreshed their squad in any way to suggest that things will be any different this season.

Liverpool and Spurs may be challenged by Swansea City, Stoke and Southampton who all bought well in the summer. West Ham, Newcastle and Crystal Palace also did well in the transfer market.

Not only is TV money greater in England than elsewhere, the fruits of TV deals are spread more evenly. Hence the arrival from Europe's leading clubs of players of the calibre of Georginio Wijnaldum (PSV to Newcastle), Ibrahim Afellay (Barcelona to Stoke), Andre Ayew (Marseille to Swansea), Dimitri Payet (Marseille to West Ham) and Yohan Cabaye (Paris Saint-Germain to Crystal Palace).

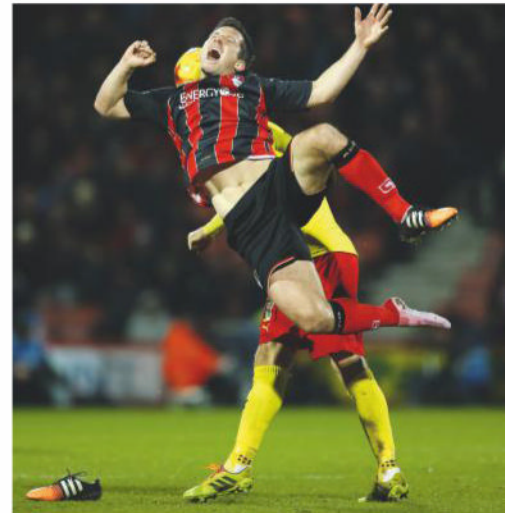

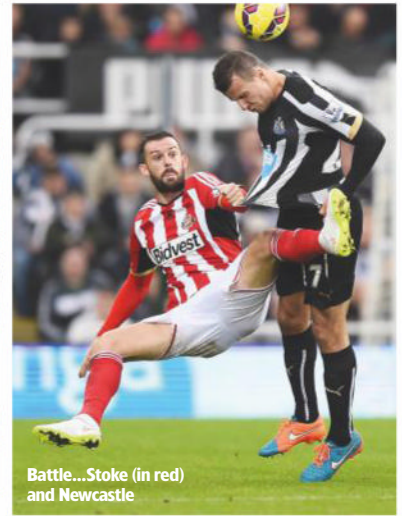

Same old, same old for PSG

At the risk of enraging supporters of clubs other than Paris Saint-Germain, it is hard to avoid the fact that domestic football in France these



days pretty much starts and ends with what happens in the capital.

Once again, Ligue 1 looks like being nothing more than a parade ground for PSG to win a fourth consecutive title; there really is nothing to suggest any of the top flight's 19 other clubs will be able to offer anything remotely approaching serious competition.

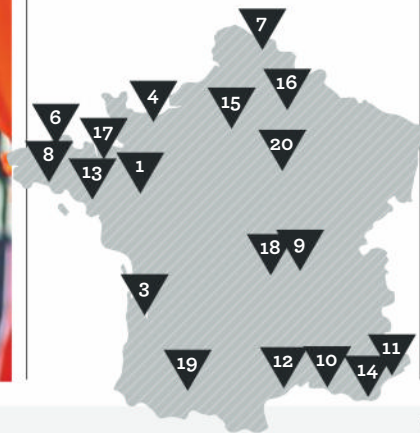
Last season PSG pulled off an unprecedented domestic quadruple, bagging the Champions Trophy, the League Cup, Ligue 1 and the French Cup. And this in a season when UEFA's Financial Fairplay rules were still forcing the club to operate under some pretty harsh sanctions. PSG were allowed to buy one player for a fee of up to €60million before the start of the season and had to reduce their Champions League squad to 21 players after exceeding permitted financial losses in 2011-12 and 2012-13.

However, last month UEFA did an about-turn and opted to relax their sanctions, supposedly in an effort to make more teams competitive and make sure more clubs are attractive to investors in the future.

"We are just evolving from a period of austerity to one where we can offer more opportunities for sustainable growth and development," said UEFA president Michel Platini. But what he didn't mention in his seemingly magnanimous statement, was the fact that before the relaxation both PSG and Manchester City – the two clubs whose challenges to Europe's footballing elite have been most effectively bankrolled – were seriously considering legal challenges to the Fairplay rules as anti-competitive and a restraint of trade.

PSG had also been limited to a €60m transfer budget for this summer and they had already committed €12m to completing the signing of full-back Serge Aurier from Toulouse following a loan period. But although this sanction no longer applies, which is clearly good news for PSG, things might not be quite as rosy as they might first appear.

Le Parisien, UEFA's overall relaxation of the rules may not be as advantageous to PSG as they might first have thought. The newspaper has apparently seen documents that, if approved, would change the playing field yet again.

All clubs currently involved in European competition are obliged to run their financial affairs with maximum losses over the last three seasons of €45m. However, there could soon be clubs that would be exempt from this constraint, beginning with the current season. If a club is now taken over by a new investor, and if these new investors have their business plans accepted by UEFA, then they will be allowed to exceed the aforementioned maximum losses for up to four seasons and will not be sanctioned for failing to comply. The problem is that these exemptions will only apply to new investors. So if these ideas are adopted by UEFA, then clubs such as PSG and Manchester City, while having many of their personal restrictions lifted, will find themselves punished once again, this time for being "first movers" into a new space.

The fight between PSG and UEFA will clearly go on in the short term as both parties look to find a workable solution, but relations between them are still very strained, despite the club's more comfortable financial situation right now.

Still, with more money freed up for immediate transfer movement into the French capital, there have been a number of wild rumours doing the rounds as to who will be heading to the capital before the transfer window closes.

Among the more outrageous suggestions was the idea that Cristiano Ronaldo could be tempted to swap Spain for France. The Real Madrid star's arrival, according to reports, depended on PSG being able to offload striker Zlatan Ibrahimovic.

Coach Laurent Blanc will doubtless have been spending plenty of time wrestling with his single trickiest recruitment problem: who can really help the club move towards the avowed goal of winning the Champions League? Can they attract

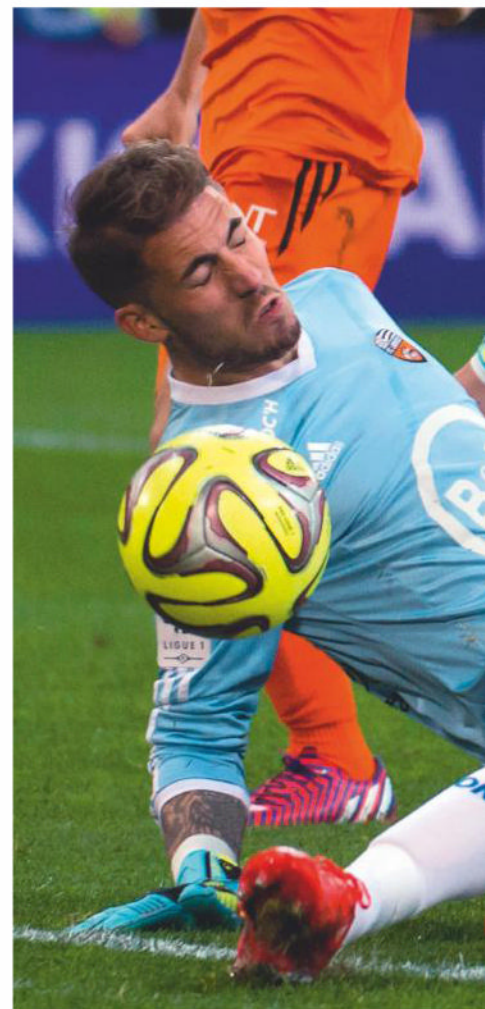
the kind of players – right now – who can genuinely mount a challenge for Europe's biggest prize?

Blanc will hope that Angel Di Maria, a far more realistic target than Cristiano Ronaldo, falls into that category. The Argentinian put a terrible season at Manchester United behind him by signing in a deal worth €63m. The transfer made him, cumulatively, the world's most expensive player, having cost a total of €179m in fees during his career.

Aside from Di Maria, Blanc's only new signing of note was that of goalkeeper Kevin Trapp from Eintracht Frankfurt to offer some competition to Salvatore Sirigu. The only big name heading out of the door, was midfielder Yohan Cabaye, who returned to England, joining Crystal Palace, after an unhappy 18 months with the club.

There are still an awful lot of loose ends

that need to be tied up if PSG are to start their latest campaign in a state of genuine readiness for Europe.

Blanc knows that winning the domestic title – and winning it well – is the absolute minimum requirement for the club's ultra-ambitious top brass. Especially when transfer movement elsewhere in France has been tepid, to say the least.

Although they have signed defender Karim Rekik from Manchester City and Argentinian winger Lucas Ocampos from Monaco, Marseille lost three key players in

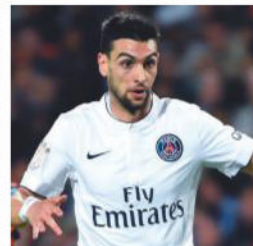

Andre-Pierre Gignac (Tigres), Giannelli Imbula (Porto) and Dimitri Payet (West Ham United). To add to their problems, coach Marcelo Bielsa quit after an opening weekend defeat at Caen.

Monaco themselves have lost Dimitar Berbatov to retirement, while Radamel Falcao has been sent out on loan again, this time to Chelsea. So it's hard to see coach Leonardo Jardim pushing his team further than their third-place finish last time out.

Which leaves Lyon as the only other

serious outfit in the ball park, and they finished a not-inconsiderable eight points behind PSG last season in second place.

Financial restrictions or no financial restrictions, it really is head-scratchingly difficult to see anyone who can truly rattle the PSG cage. With three consecutive Ligue 1 titles behind them and with a squad that easily outstrips anything else France has to offer, it would be a very brave man indeed who would bet against them making it four in a row.

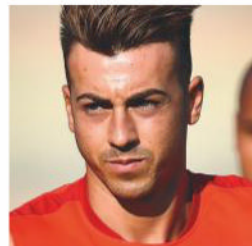

Besides their huge financial resources, ability to attract the best players from home and abroad, and the fear factor that they inspire in opponents, Bayern Munich will start the new season with another crucial advantage: a ravenous hunger and a relentless quest for new targets.

After completely dominating the last three domestic campaigns – finishing 25 points ahead of the chasing pack in 2013, 19 clear in 2014 and, despite coasting for the final month, 10 points to the good in May – Bayern now have their sights set on becoming the first team in Bundesliga history to win four straight titles. And should any player not be aware of just how important that is, the club's hard-nosed sporting director Matthias Sammer is only too willing to spell it out.

"No one ever has achieved four consecutive championships and it's an obvious objective for us," declared Sammer on the first day of pre-season training.

"The team have to do their duty. The responsibility is theirs. They have to make sure that everyone pulls together for the right results.

"We've a first-class squad, one I'm very satisfied with, and we're in a much better place compared to last season, when we had to contend with a World Cup summer and so many injuries."

With Holger Badstuber and Franck Ribery their only injury concerns this time, and with up-and-coming defensive

midfielder Joshua Kimmich and Brazilian attacker Douglas Costa pitching up this summer from RB Leipzig and Shakhtar Donetsk respectively, coach Pep Guardiola seems to have the quantitative and qualitative bases covered.

Not that every indicator has Bayern strolling to their 26th Bundesliga crown. Many believe their defensive frailties – a tendency for individual lapses of concentration and a vulnerability to the counter-attack – have yet to be addressed. Then there is Guardiola's incessant changing of tactics and

personnel, which runs the risk of destabilising the side. There is also a worry that German internationals Mario Gotze and Thomas Muller could follow long-serving midfielder Bastian Schweinsteiger out of the door.

Before his departure for Manchester United, Schweinsteiger was as much the club's standard bearer as he was their outstanding director of operations in the middle of the park. And for a large proportion of Bayern fans, Guardiola is the individual who shot Bambi, effectively ushering their hero to the exit by refusing to guarantee the *Nationalmannschaft*

skipper an automatic berth as the deep-lying playmaker.

Accused of seeing off two Bayern institutions – Schweinsteiger, plus club doctor Hans-Wilhelm Müller-Wohlfahrt – Guardiola does look more than a little isolated. Coaching a club like Bayern can be a thankless task and, after two years of Bundesliga triumphs and Champions League semi-final defeats, what the Spaniard really needs is that European gong. Anything less and his Bayern mission will be deemed a flop.

Almost under as much strain as Guardiola is beleaguered Schalke general manager Horst Heldt, whose post is very much on the line after all the disappointments of last term.

Failure to qualify for the Champions League for the first time in four years, the dour seven-month regime of coach Roberto Di Matteo, a team short on fight and character, and Kevin-Prince Boateng and Sidney Sam suspended for poor

attitude made it a campaign to forget. To launch the fightback, Heldt tried to bring in Augsburg's Markus Weinzierl. But clearly no respecter of the Bundesliga food chain, the latter said no, and following abortive negotiations with Belgium national coach

- Who are most likely to take advantage should the sky fall in and Bayern fail to win the title? Well, in the second-half of last term, no team amassed more points than Borussia Mönchengladbach. Even though they have lost influential players in holding midfielder Christoph Kramer and striker Max Kruse, they remain the most effervescent and best-organised team in the country.
- Having been shown the door by the club once before, in April 2010, and given Hamburg's lack of financial clout, glut of journeymen in the squad and propensity to panic in the corridors of power, Bruno Labbadia will need a good start to the season to avoid being the first coach to lose his job.

Marc Wilmots – who later would claim that Heldt did not want him anyway – the job finally went to Andre Breitenreiter, recently relegated from the Bundesliga with Paderborn and only a qualified coach for two years.

While the appointment of Weinzierl or former Schalke striker Wilmots would have proved extremely popular, the arrival of Breitenreiter has not exactly enthused the masses, and if it does not work out Heldt will simply have to go. Reports abound that Borussia Mönchengladbach's highly rated recruitment chief Max Eberl has been contacted by Schalke's top brass. Nor will Heldt appreciate the recent boardroom decision to create a three-man, first-team advisory board, featuring former club coaches Huub Stevens and Mike Buskens, plus ex-Schalke striker Ebbe Sand.

In a bid to keep the players on the straight and narrow, Schalke have handed each professional on their books a 15-page code of conduct in several languages. Maybe the movers and shakers there should take a copy.

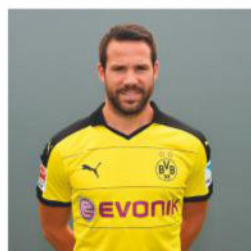

The Dortmund side which only finished seventh last term – thus missing out on the Champions League for the first time since 2011 – was plainly a declining force, and while the new boss will be happy that such key figures as centre-back Mats Hummels and midfield holder Ilkay Gundogan ultimately chose not to leave, the rebuilding job is a massive one.

After splashing out €152million on reinforcements over the past four years, Dortmund have now entered balanced-budget territory – only spending what they raise in the transfer market – and inevitably the new reality will make it even harder for Tuchel to raise the *Schwarz-Gelben* phoenix from the ashes.

With Klopp's ghost in every corner, Tuchel is going to have to learn the art of the exorcist. Another Bundesliga, another campaign of intense pressure.

Economic crisis bites as clubs struggle for signings

As Greece tries to find a way out of its financial doldrums, Superleague officials have expressed optimism that they will be able to survive this coming season following the turmoil of the previous campaign.

"We love soccer," says Superleague president Giorgos Borovilos. "Our country faces many challenges and we have to do something positive for Greek soccer to progress, to give vent and new breath to the fans from their everyday problems in life. What we must all do is to find solutions."

That, however, will be easier said than done as Greece was almost kicked out of UEFA and FIFA after the government tried to get involved in the affairs of the Greek Football Federation, which itself is accused of being involved in a match-fixing scandal.

And if the domestic game was not in enough trouble already, the national team added to the misery by losing twice to the Faroe Islands in the Euro 2016 qualifiers.

"We all want the best championship; more competitive and with no incidents

of violence," adds Borovilos, who took over at the helm of the federation after previous incumbent Giorgos Sarris and other officials faced felony charges for alleged involvement in the establishment of a criminal gang which fixed Greek matches.

With individual budgets as tight as ever, there were few significant new signings during the summer as clubs looked to avoid the financial failure which forced two Superleague clubs – OFI and Olympiakos Volos – to drop out

of the league before the end of last season due to a lack of funds.

Another reason for the lack of new signings is that, because of the continuous speculation that Greece will default on its debt, foreign players in the country are extremely concerned about their euro-related contracts. Agents are desperately trying to renegotiate deals to secure their clients' wages in case of a devaluation of the currency. Many are also asking for wages to be deposited in accounts abroad, rather than in Greece.

KEY DATES

The regular season starts on August 22 and will finish on April 16, followed by European play-off games.

However, Olympiakos' Spanish goalkeeper Roberto has a different view, saying: "Any player who wants to come and play in Greece should do so. Soccer has not been affected by the financial crisis here.

"At Olympiakos, they are consistent with payments. Yes, the country has problems but we continue to play soccer."

Olympiakos' managing director Ioannis Vrentzos believes that even minor clubs in England have more revenue from commercial sponsors than all of those in Greece put together.

"Olympiakos try to bring in great players, but the taxation here is high and gives no incentives or benefits to players," he says. "It is over 50 per cent and takes away much of our budget. Five years ago it was only 20 per cent.

"In the last few years we have given €90million in taxes. Let's see what the

other clubs have given – the authorities should be careful with this."

Olympiakos, who have slashed season-ticket prices in half for this season, are one of the few Greek clubs to make a profit – and this is due to constant Champions League football. But while they may not have trouble paying their players, others are not as fortunate.

"Some clubs here are not serious in

their payments and now with the crisis the situation has worsened," says PAS Giannina's Spanish midfielder Noe Acosta. "Giannina are trying to be more consistent in their payments as best they can."

Yet in spite of such problems, English goalkeeper Luke Steele has extended his contract with Panathinaikos until the summer of 2018.

"My friends see the bad pictures and think I live in a Third World country," says Steele. "But it is incredible, awesome and a beautiful country."

Cisse was under the impression that Panathinaikos had taken care of his tax obligations, but the club said no such clause was in his contract.

Yet another hunt to replace departing stars

It happens every year, and this summer was no exception. Dutch clubs lost the battle with their counterparts from Europe's biggest leagues as the country's brightest talents move abroad.

And it doesn't matter that some of those youngsters, such as 21-year-old defender Wesley Hoedt – who traded AZ for Lazio in Italy – have only a few Eredivisie games under their belts.

This summer, Premier League clubs across the North Sea were the biggest buyers – although they tended to be far more interested in players with international experience.

Memphis Depay opened the transfer window with his £25million move from PSV to Manchester United, and it was just a matter of time before team-mate

Giorginio Wijnaldum headed in the same direction, joining Newcastle United – who have a big Dutch colony – for £14.4m.

Both players had committed themselves to the Eindhoven club after the 2014 World Cup finals, but after breaking the Ajax monopoly last term it was always likely they would move on.

Another international heading to England was Feyenoord midfielder Jordy Clasie, reunited at Southampton with his former coach Ronald Koeman – who also snapped up Twente defender Cuco Martina. Andreas Bjelland, who played alongside Martina last season, joined Championship side Brentford and Heerenveen goalkeeper Kristoffer Nordfeldt went to Swansea City.

Burkina Faso international Bertrand Traore also left, but the striker was only on loan at Vitesse and Chelsea chose not to release him again.

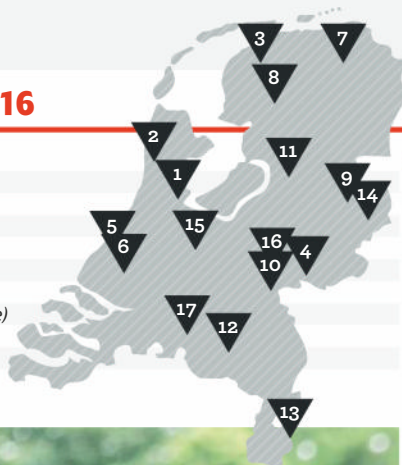

their chance – at least, that is what has happened in previous years when the exodus has been just as intense.

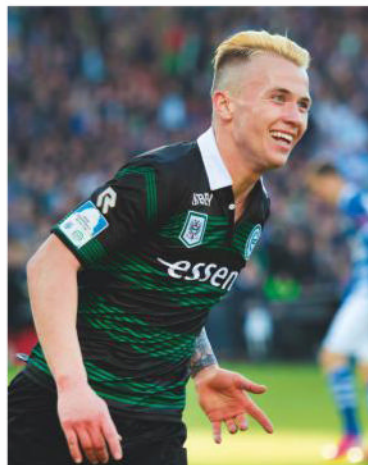
Those hoping to benefit include Davy Propper, who has joined PSV from Vitesse. It will be interesting to see if the one-time international can be the same technically gifted playmaker at a higher level. And will his former team-mate Marko Vejinovic be able to handle the pressure of the ever-demanding Feyenoord fans?

Yaya Sanogo, the French striker hired from Arsenal, will try to break the curse of players on loan at Ajax, with the likes of Barcelona's Bojan Krkic and Isaac Cuenca among those who have failed to make their mark in Amsterdam in the past.

From Heerenveen's Sam Larsson to Twente's Hakim Ziyech and Groningen's Albert Rusnak, there are plenty of exciting talents set to further their footballing education this term.

At the opposite end of the spectrum are two returning veterans, with Johnny Heitinga and Dirk Kuyt deciding to spend the final years of their careers at Ajax and Feyenoord respectively. They will be expected to take their rawer team-mates by the hand and help prepare them for the future, while also providing a sounding board for their coaches.

Success, however, can depend on many

things. For instance, after a frustrating time at Hertha Berlin, Heitinga will need to convince those around him that he still warrants a starting place. Kuyt will probably need less effort to gain respect, but the pressure at the Rotterdam club is enormous following a trophyless season in which even a European place was out of reach.

It is difficult, however, to look outside Holland's top three clubs as Eredivisie championship contenders.

Last year's winners PSV look to have bought well after the departure of Depay, Wijnaldum and Oscar Hiljemark (Palermo), with left-back Simon Poulsen (AZ) and midfielders Gaston Pereiro (Nacional) and Maxime Lestienne (Al Arabi) joining fellow newcomer Propper.

After finishing empty-handed for the first time in five years, Ajax coach Frank De Boer has made some drastic changes. Niklas Moisander (Sampdoria), Kolbeinn Sigthorsson (Nantes) and Richairo Zivkovic (Willem II, on loan) were offloaded but it remains to be seen whether Heitinga, Sanogo, left-back Mitchell Dijks – who was bought from Willem II but came up through the Ajax youth ranks before being

labelled not good enough and sold – and winger Amir Younes (Borussia Monchengladbach) are a real quality injection. At least, in Nemanja Gudelj (AZ) the Amsterdam club have finally signed a decent ball-winning midfielder.

As for Feyenoord, much will depend on Kuyt's form, fitness and charisma, while Giovanni Van Bronckhorst can't make too many mistakes in his first coaching job if they don't want to end up potless again.

Two faces of Italian football

Asplendid Juventus in last season's Champions League Final or the squalor of Parma in the bankruptcy court: which of these is the most representative face of Italian football?

As the curtain rises on another Serie A campaign, it is obvious that the game continues to reflect the highs and lows of the mesmerising society in which it is played. Modern Italy, after all, moves easily from the beauty of a Ferrari to the disgrace of widespread organised crime.

Not for nothing, two days after the 3-1 Champions League Final loss to Barcelona, Juve president Andrea Agnelli very publicly stated that the good showings in Europe by his club during the season, and by Fiorentina and Napoli in the Europa League, owed little to "sistema Italia" but rather everything to the good work of the three clubs involved.

On the eve of this new campaign, Italian football offers a now almost-traditional schizophrenic vision.

On the one hand, we have a movement of the highest standards, reflected not only by the quality of football played by such as Juventus, but also by the international demand for Italian know-how exemplified by coaches such as Carlo Ancelotti, Fabio Capello, Marcello Lippi, Roberto Mancini and, even at the ripe old age of 76, by Giovanni Trapattoni.

On the other hand, we have an Italian game humiliated not only by the ignominy of the Parma collapse but also by a seemingly unending series of match-fixing scandals, often related to both

international betting syndicates and to organised crime. Yet again, the football federation's prosecutor, Stefano Palazzi, will be working overtime to deal with the implications of May's "Catanzaro" enquiry, which involves mainly Lega Pro teams, and the Catania enquiry in June, involving essentially the club's then-owner Antonino Pulvirenti.

In both cases, Palazzi has to work quickly so that eventual federation disciplinary proceedings (enforced relegations/promotions) are resolved in time for the compilation of the new Serie B and Lega Pro fixture lists. While

Serie A is scheduled to begin on the weekend of August 22/23, the Serie B and Lega Pro seasonal starts have been delayed until September 5/6 because of these enquiries.

If recent scandals in Italian football have involved huge gambling heists, the most recent Catania one is almost endearingly old fashioned by comparison. Owner Pulvirenti claims he set about fixing end-of-season games not to make millions by betting but to ensure that his side avoided relegation to Lega Pro.

In contrast, the "Catanzaro" investigation, which saw 50 people arrested last May, ▶

bears the depressingly familiar look of a scandal in which online betting syndicates, local mafiosi and under-paid lower-division footballers form an explosive cocktail.

As well as these investigations, Italian football is still haunted by the Cremona-based, 2011-initiated "Last Bet" match-fixing investigation, run by local prosecutor Roberto Di Martino and allegedly involving betting syndicates in the Balkans, the Far East and Italy. In early July, Di Martino indicated the scope of his enquiry when he requested that 104 people be summoned to stand trial in relation to at least 60 suspect games – including a handful of Serie A fixtures.

Among those named were football royalty, including current national coach Antonio Conte, ex-Lazio striker Beppe Signori, current Lazio captain Stefano Mauri, former Italy international Christian Doni and Udinese coach Stefano

Championship in France next summer. Understandably, this is something which Conte would dearly like to avoid even if the football federation do not seem worried with president Carlo Tavecchio repeating that "Conte is innocent until he has been definitively condemned".

What makes for remarkable reading, however, is a recent interview given to sports daily *Gazzetta dello Sport* by prosecutor Di Martino. In it, he suggests that the football federation and other sports authorities were not exactly enamoured of his enquiry, saying: "What is sure is that none of them ever came to my office, looking for detailed information."

Di Martino goes on to say footballers have a "wrong attitude" that is ground into them from their youth-team days, adding: "Players are often convinced that they have done nothing wrong and the last thing in the world that they expect is to

concerned only the Lega Pro. I was wrong. It is just as easy to fix a Serie A game, and if you look at the court documents you will find plenty of examples of this."

All of that is for the future. As for the football out on the pitch rather than the courtroom, it inevitably still revolves around champions Juventus. Having lost the Champions League Final, Juve have opted to release three key figures of recent years: Andrea Pirlo (New York City), Carlos Tevez (Boca Juniors) and Arturo Vidal (Bayern Munich).

If there was something inevitable about the departures of 36-year-old Pirlo for the USA and 31-year-old Tevez for his native Argentina, the same does not apply to midfield dynamo Vidal. Whereas the first two might have come to the end of their Juventus road, you could argue that Chile's Vidal would still make an important contribution to the cause.

However, it would seem that the folk in Turin have opted to make a new start, replacing the above with players such as Argentinian striker Paulo Dybala (Palermo), Croat striker Mario Mandzukic (Atletico Madrid), Sami

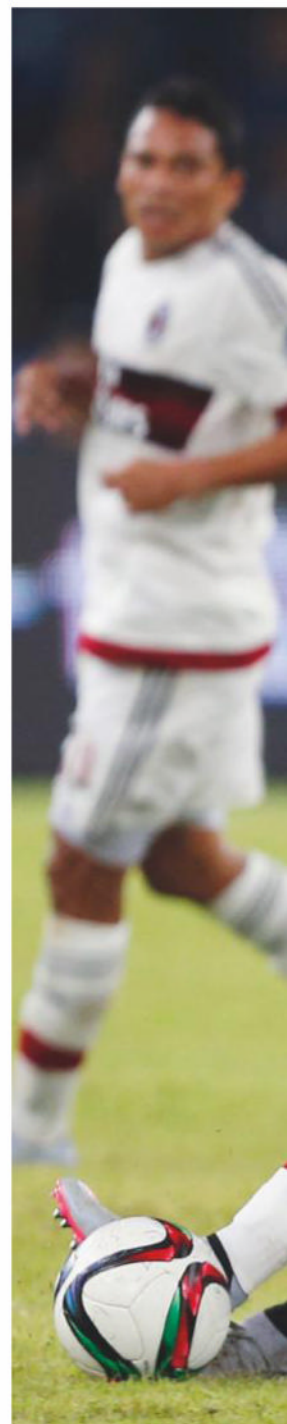
Khedira (Real Madrid) and Simone Zaza (Sassuolo). When he met the media on the first day of pre-season training, coach Massimiliano Allegri made plenty of positive noises, saying: "I am very happy with the team that we have put together.

Colantuono. Given Italy's liberal use of the "Statute Of Limitations" clause, this trial may never arrive at sentencing but, in the meantime, it is guaranteed to cause a huge media fuss.

That certainly applies to Conte who, essentially, is charged with not having reported a typical, last day of the season Serie B relegation/promotion "fix" between Albinoleffe and Siena, the team he was then coaching. The story of this game, played in May 2011, is quickly told: Albinoleffe, threatened with relegation, needed the points while Siena, already sure of promotion to Serie A, did not.

Conte is accused of having known that there was an "agreement" between the Albinoleffe and Siena players to ensure that Albinoleffe won the game. The prosecutor argues that Conte should have "safeguarded the players' moral conduct", implying that he knew about the fix but chose not to intervene.

Given the snail-like pace of Italian justice, the trial may not begin until the end of the year or later, making it possible that Conte could find himself on trial right up to the eve of the European

end up in prison. Seventeen players, including Mauri and ex-Genoa midfielder Omar Milanetto, ended up serving jail time in the summer of 2012.

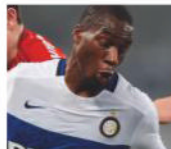

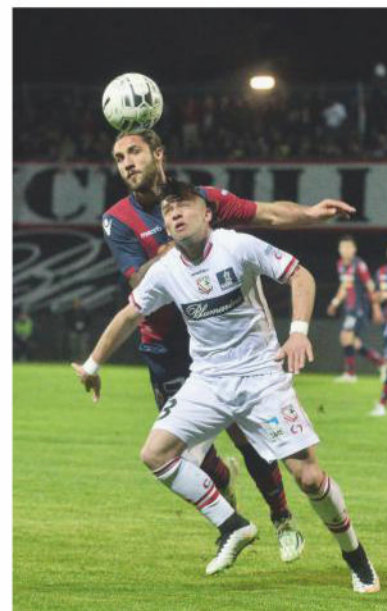

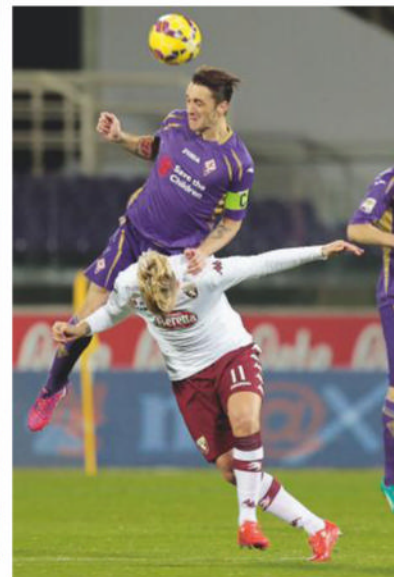

Bankrupt clubs rise again

Widzew Lodz – Polish champions in 1981, 1982, 1996 and 1997 – were declared bankrupt at the end of last season and officially dissolved in July. Just three days later, however, supporters established a brand new club who look likely to be admitted to this term's fourth tier.

"I know how difficult a job we have to do, but with the full support of our fans and a budget of a half a million zloty [£100,000] we should be able to exist, so I am really happy," says club chairman Marcin Ferdzyn.

Ferdzyn is the son of Jacek Ferdzyn, the architect of a new Widzew stadium which is currently under construction. It is being built with money from the city council, who also financed the home of Widzew's local rivals LKS – who themselves were declared bankrupt in May 2013 and also had to start again.

"Our stadium is due to be completed next year. Based on that, I am optimistic about the future," adds Ferdzyn.

Clubs going bust as a way to clear debts and start again is nothing new in Polish football. In 2003, Pogon Szczecin fans established Pogon Nowa (new Pogon) and they made it back to the top flight in 2012. Two years ago, Polonia Warsaw – who were national champions in 2000 – were declared bankrupt and started again, along with LKS Lodz, in the fourth tier and both gained promotion at the first attempt.

The current situation at Polonia looks especially promising after a new limited company took control this year, with Jerzy

Polonia chairman Jerzy Engel

Engel, who coached the national side at the 2002 World Cup finals, as a chairman. The club have a budget of £500,000 – which is several times more than any other club at their level – and they plan to build a new stadium without any city council support.

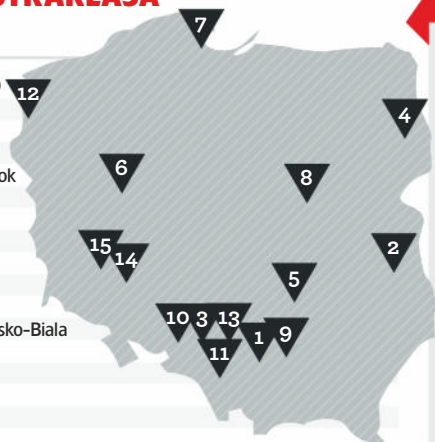

he explains: "This is a new idea in Polish football reality. It will be not only a stadium but a business centre as well, which should earn money for the club.

"Our aim is to come back to Ekstraklasa by 2020. In the coming season we aim for promotion to the second division."

In stark contrast to the grand old clubs who are battling their way back up from the bottom, Nieciecza are a team from a village of just 750 people who gained promotion to the top flight for the first time last season.

Funded by local business couple Krzysztof and Danuta Witkowski, the club represent the smallest village to play at the top level of a league in Europe.

They will, however, have to stage their opening home games of the campaign 50km away in Mielec while their modest stadium, surrounded by maize fields, is modernised to fulfil FA licensing criteria.

Jesus swaps the champs for Sporting

Just three days after the curtain officially fell on the 2014-15 campaign, Portuguese football fans were already captivated by the prospect of the next season as Jorge Jesus' sensational switch of allegiance, from champions Benfica to cross-city rivals Sporting Lisbon, shook the domestic game to its very core.

To widespread astonishment, the charismatic 60-year-old coach walked out on Portugal's biggest club, having just guided them to their first back-to-back championships for 31 years.

During Jesus' six-year stewardship at the Estadio da Luz, Benfica had succeeded in reeling in and then overhauling serial winners Porto. He had put the famous old club back on top of the pile – and he did it by playing an exhilarating brand of attacking football befitting of the club's glorious past.

With Jesus as coach, the astute self-made businessman Luis Filipe Vieira as president and club legend Rui Costa as football director, titles and long-lost prestige, not to mention some much-needed stability, were brought to the club. So why did it end?

Jesus can be a rumbustious personality and often blunt ways no doubt created enemies at the club. He subsequently confided that he felt he was being pushed out over the course of last season. When pressed to elaborate he said: "When you have been in football for many years, you know when you are not wanted." He went on to claim that, at the end of the season, Benfica, in collusion with Portuguese super-agent Jorge Mendes, opened the door to a string of jobs abroad, with Paris Saint-Germain and Internazionale among them.

But when it became apparent JJ had no

intention of going abroad, Sporting wasted little time in making him a lucrative offer. By then it was too late for Benfica to stop him from returning to the club where both he and his father played. Jesus insists money played no part in the decision – although it is safe to assume that the reported €6million a year salary he will earn at Sporting helped encourage him to put pen to paper.

As fascinating as the politics surrounding the exit of Benfica's longest-serving post-war manager are, the focus now falls on what he is capable

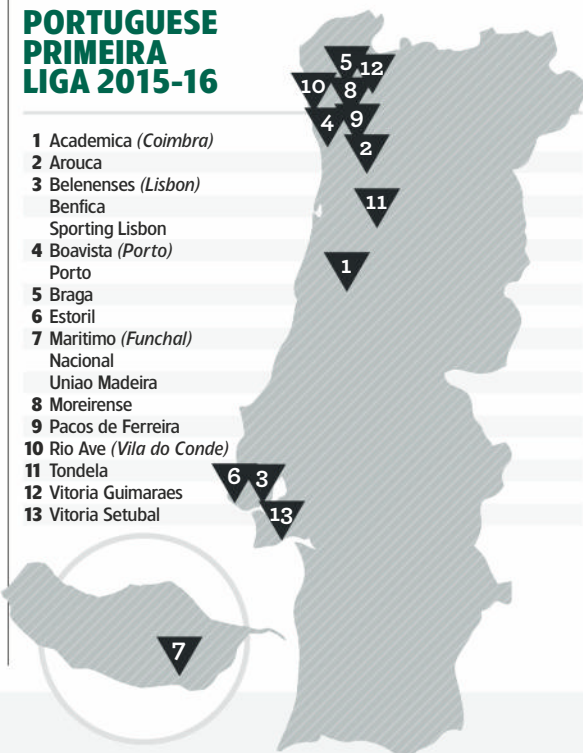
of achieving at Sporting, who have won the Portuguese championship just twice in the last 33 years, and not since 2002.

Two issues in particular raise doubts about the potential success of an apparent "match made in heaven".

Jesus' modus operandi at Benfica was to buy unpolished raw talent, often at considerable cost, and expertly hone the skillset of the players in question to suit the team's needs. The fact that he did so exclusively with foreign players was

a recurrent bone of contention among Benfica fans, who felt he never gave home-grown youngsters a fair chance to prove themselves in the first team.

Jesus refutes the claims, saying quality alone, and neither age nor nationality, were considerations in his team selections. But the roaring success last season of Andre Gomes at Valencia and Bernardo Silva at Monaco – the former played sparingly by Jesus, the latter almost never – confirmed that making use of the academy players was an area in which he did not excel. Indeed, Benfica frequently lined up with not a single Portuguese player during his time in the dugout.

So it will be interesting to see how Jesus' seeming lack of faith in Portuguese youth will be conciliated with a club whose very identity is built around its ability to produce a hugely impressive quality and quantity of alumni at its famed Alcochete Academy. In Sporting's final Champions League match of last season, against Chelsea, eight of the players used at Stamford Bridge had come through the club's academy.

A second intriguing aspect is how the relationship will pan out between the fiery

new coach and the brash club president, Bruno De Carvalho. Since his election in 2013, Carvalho has shaken up the institution from top to bottom, but his hard-nosed single-mindedness and lust to return Sporting to the top comes at a cost. Jesualdo Ferreira, Leonardo Jardim and Marco Silva all did decent jobs at the Estadio Jose Alvalade under Carvalho, yet none lasted more than a season alongside the highly driven supremo – and it was literally alongside him, given his liking for sharing the dugout with the coach and substitutes during matches.

Carvalho even managed to find fault in the placid and highly rated Silva – who last season led Sporting to their first trophy in seven years with a Portuguese Cup triumph, suffered fewer league defeats than champions Benfica and oversaw a creditable Champions League campaign.

"Bruno De Carvalho is like me," said Jesus when questioned about a potential personality clash. "He's a very dynamic man with a huge passion for what he does. For sure we will get on very well."

It promises to be quite a ride.

● For the first time in 15 years, Madeira has three clubs in the top flight after Uniao's promotion. Not bad considering the island's population is just over a quarter of a million.

● Maxi Pereira won't be looking forward to visiting the Estadio da Luz after leaving Benfica for Porto. A mock-up of the Uruguayan full-back with a noose around his neck has already appeared in the stadium.

● Belenenses are to build a squad almost entirely of Portuguese players – a courageous decision that will win the club many friends.

● After crashing and burning at Porto, coach Paulo Fonseca went back to Pacos de Ferreira, where he made his name, and again excelled, leading to his appointment at Braga. A positive season may well see top clubs reaching for his phone number again.

Steaua must stand on their own two feet

Romanian champions for the past three seasons, Steaua have been set two goals for this season by their eccentric owner Gigi Becali: retain the league title and become self-sufficient.

"Steaua will auto-finance itself," claims Becali, who was recently released after serving two years in jail and has vowed to make no further investment in the team. "Now we have €10million in the club's accounts. If we don't qualify for the Champions League or the Europa League group stage then we'll depend on the money the players produce.

"If they don't make enough for the team, then we'll enter insolvency."

All of this will have to be achieved with a new man in charge as 34-year-old

former club captain Mirel Rudoï has been handed his first coaching job.

Rudoï, who is Becali's godson, does not have the technical qualifications required by UEFA so he will officially become the Bucharest club's director of football for European games, with assistant Massimo Pedrazzini taking over as coach.

Although Rudoï's cult-hero status will ensure he has the fans' backing, he may not see many of them as supporters' groups continue to boycott matches.

"This is not a team that represents us right now," says ultras group leader Dorin Taban. "We don't understand what's happening and we feel there should be an explanation.

"If it doesn't happen, we won't return. This club will never be the same without

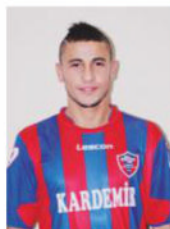

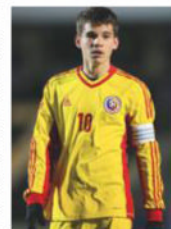

us. We are its spirit" Taban and thousands like him are protesting at Steaua's new identity, which has done away with all the old symbols that relate to its past as the army team.

Steaua attracted only 5,500 to the 55,000-capacity National Arena, where they have played home games since being kicked out of their Ghencea Stadium and training facilities by the army. This internal

unrest is the biggest threat to Steaua's hopes of a fourth straight title as their rivals will offer little competition this term.

Bucharest neighbours Dinamo have more pressing issues, with a ban from Europe doing little to help their battle against insolvency, while Rapid aren't even in the top flight this term, having been relegated last season.

Astra Giurgiu and Targu Mures are likely to be Steaua's closest challengers, but they too have problems. Astra's owner Ioan Niculae, one of Romania's richest men, was jailed for two-and-a-half years in April for illegally sponsoring a politician, while Targu Mures' accounts have been blocked by the anti-corruption department on suspicion of illegal financing.

Steaua, meanwhile, were the only Romanian club able to afford transfers this summer. Left alone to hunt for national glory, Europe may be their only valid source of survival in a bankrupt environment.

TALKING POINTS

competition due to insolvency. "The last two seasons were painful, we can't afford to slip once more", says chairman Dinu Gheorghe.

● Viitorul, the club owned and coached by Gheorghe Hagi, have their sights set on qualifying for the Europa League. Hagi says: "We have the young ones, but we need experience. This is a good team, you'll see what my boys can do."

● Dan Petrescu left Targu Mures after just one game as coach. With the club's accounts blocked, the squad have all had to accept less lucrative contracts and there are fears they may not last the season.

Chance for home grown coaches

Following Murat Yakin's lacklustre performance as boss of Spartak Moscow, the country's most popular club has now put its faith in Dmitri Alenichev, the 42-year-old who played in four of their nine Premier League title wins.

The last of those, however, came in 2001 and "The People's Team" are long overdue some success in the domestic championship.

A former MP and the only Russian player to have won both the Champions League and the UEFA Cup, Alenichev gave up his political career and began coaching in the old city of Tula in 2011.

Known for its traditional pryaniki cakes

and the local gun factory, the city's club side, Arsenal, managed three successive promotions under the former Porto star, reaching the top flight for the first time last season. Although they were relegated at the end of the campaign, Alenichev made a decent impression – especially when his side beat Spartak.

It was not only his ability in the dugout that raised eyebrows; he also demonstrated his strength of character by sending a reserve side to Moscow in protest against an unjust league decision to play Arsenal's home game against CSKA in the capital due to the poor condition of the Tula pitch.

With former Spartak team-mate Dmitri Ananko following him from Arsenal to

Spartak, Alenichev has also found a role on the coaching staff for former club legend Yegor Titov, while another ex-Spartak star Sergei Rodionov is now general director.

The trend for well-known former players taking top jobs has continued elsewhere as a result of the public's dissatisfaction with expensive foreign specialists failing to produce results.

Public Enemy number one in this respect was undoubtedly national coach Fabio Capello – with his reported annual salary of €7million – who oversaw two Euro qualifying defeats by Austria. The Italian finally lost his position in July, with CSKA boss Leonid Slutsky

replacing him and combining both roles.

Once nicknamed the "Russian Mourinho", the 44-year-old Slutsky was until recently the only recognised "young" home-grown specialist in the Russian Premier League.

Now he has been joined by such former playing talents as international striker Igor Kolyvanov, who has been highly effective as Ufa coach, ex-Dynamo Moscow forward Sergei Kiryakov, who has made a promising start in charge of the national under-21 side, and Dmitri Khokhlov, who went from Dynamo youth-squad boss to coach of Kuban Krasnodar.

Meanwhile, reigning champions Zenit have former Russia internationals Igor

Simutenkov and Sergei Semak assisting Andre Villas-Boas, former captain Andrey Kobelev is boss of Dynamo Moscow and Igor Cherevchenko is the top man at Lokomotiv Moscow – where, last season, he became the first Russian to win the national cup as a player and a coach, both with Lokomotiv Moscow. Although his side lost to Zenit in July's Russian Super Cup, they took the champions to penalties and looked the better side overall.

Whether these new, young local coaches can revive the Russian Premier League season remains to be seen, but

something needs to be done. With low attendances, poor TV ratings and hugely disappointing international results, fans are starting to turn their backs on the game. A recent opinion poll suggested that 73 per cent of Russians are indifferent to football – the highest ever figure for such a survey.

And it's not just the ordinary fan who is giving up. Even the country's president Vladimir Putin, who is known for his love of sport and regularly plays ice hockey, has said he does no longer watches football.

TALKING POINTS

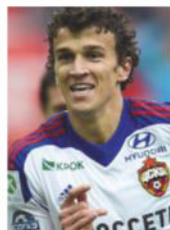

Champions raid Dundee United again

When Celtic used Gary Mackay-Steven and Stuart Armstrong as two of the poster boys for the launch of this season's new green away strip, Dundee United fans joked that it was "good to see what our B team is wearing this season".

A sense of irony is needed by fans of the east-coast club right now as the sale of their two best assets, for £2million to the champions last February, killed a promising campaign for United.

In March, Jackie McNamara's side lost the Scottish League Cup Final to Celtic, with Mackay-Steven and Armstrong sitting ineligible in the Hampden Park stand, having played for United in the competition. Celtic then knocked United out of the Scottish Cup, after which a slump in league form saw McNamara's one-time pacesetters finish fifth and miss out on Europe.

And to rub salt into the wounds on Tayside, on the same day that Mackay-Steven and Armstrong were fronting Celtic's kit launch, United's Nadir Ciftci was being unveiled as yet another new signing by the Glasgow club.

While his club might have received £1.5m for a player McNamara unearthed for nothing, there was little comfort in knowing that the 23-year-old Turkish striker may well come back to haunt his former club this season.

The United manager had declared his desire to

see Ciftci move to England, rather than Celtic – the club that McNamara himself served as a player for 10 years. The Tannadice board even accepted an offer from Wigan Athletic, only for Ciftci to reject the deal and insist on moving to Celtic.

European football was undoubtedly the lure for Ciftci, who McNamara found in Holland after he was released by NAC Breda. The player received a glowing endorsement from ex-Celtic striker Chris Sutton – whose £6m move from Chelsea is still the club's joint-record fee – as “a shrewd piece of business in the current financial climate”.

Because of the constraints of Dundee United's selling policy, McNamara has lost 11 players, from Johnny Russell (Derby County) and Andrew Robertson (Hull City) to Ryan Gauld (Sporting Lisbon) in the last two years.

United earned £6m from the sale of Gauld and Robertson, while Russell netted just £800,000 – but at least he was kept

out of the reach of Celtic, who were interested. There was no such luck with Ciftci. Or Mackay-Steven. Or Armstrong.

McNamara is not the first Dundee United boss wanting the club to sell to England rather than Glasgow. Jim McLean insisted on it during the 1980s, when United were Scottish champions and one of the best sides in Europe.

McLean refused to sell Richard Gough – who was part of United's 1983 league title side – to Rangers in 1986, transferring the centre-back to Tottenham Hotspur for

£750,00 instead. Gough went on to captain Spurs in a FA Cup Final, only for Rangers to buy him for £1m in late 1987.

Kevin Gallacher's goals helped Dundee United reach the 1987 UEFA Cup Final and again McLean resisted offers from Celtic – where Gallacher's grandfather, Patsy, was a club legend – and sold him to Coventry City for £1m in 1990. Gallacher went on to partner Sutton when Blackburn Rovers became English champions.

The only time McLean had to accept defeat was in 1993, when Duncan Ferguson moved from Tannadice to Rangers – but that was because they paid a then-British record fee of £4m.

Those days are long gone, with Celtic the only side in Scotland's top flight paying transfer fees, but at least the champions are re-circulating money around the domestic market – the other 11 teams also receive cash from UEFA based on Celtic's progress in Europe.

Manager Ronny Deila's conversion to buying “local” talent means the £1.5m for Ciftci is less of a risk than the £7m wasted on strikers from abroad, with Teemu Pukki (Brøndby), Amido Balde (Metz) and Mo Bangura (Istanbul BB and now AIK) all offloaded at a huge loss.

Bartomeu wins election on back of Barca treble

There was no game at Camp Nou, but 47,270 people still turned up one Saturday in July anyway. It was election day in Catalonia, the chance to vote for FC Barcelona's new president, and so they came – starting with coach Luis Enrique, who arrived six minutes after the polling booths opened. Asked a few days before if he planned to exercise his right to vote as a member and if he knew who he would be voting for, he responded succinctly: "Yes and yes."

He was not alone. Xavi also came, as did Carles Puyol and Gerard Pique. Johan Cruyff voted, although the man he supported, former president Joan Laporta, did not emerge victorious. Instead, the winner was Josep Maria Bartomeu. The outgoing president, under whom Barcelona won the league, Spanish Cup and Champions League treble, is back in power for the next six years.

Bartomeu had been Barcelona's president for 18 months, having taken over from Sandro Rosell, who was forced to resign over the scandal surrounding the Neymar signing. That ended with Rosell and Bartomeu both charged with fraud, but while it cost the former his post it did not stop the latter from taking over without having to go to the polls – and nor, ultimately, winning the elections comfortably.

With the club seemingly in crisis at the turn of the year, elections were called in January, with Bartomeu insisting he had done so "to reduce the tension around the club". By July, Barca had won everything and the panorama had changed entirely.

Bartomeu had looked to be in a weak position, his reign certain to end, but he managed the crisis well and used the interim period to strengthen his electoral position. Slowly, the team improved, ending with victory in Berlin. Now his mandate is an extremely strong one.

Of a total electorate of 109,637 only 47,270 members voted. At 43 per cent that may sound low, but the turnout was actually considered to be quite good, not least with elections happening in July, at a time when many Barca supporters are out of the city, and on a hot day in the school holidays when those who are in the city have better plans. There is no provision for proxy voting or postal votes.

Bartomeu polled 54.63 per cent of the vote, while Laporta, who was president between 2003 and 2010, polled 33.03 per cent. Agusti Benedito ended with 7.16 per cent and Toni Freixa 3.7 per cent. All four men had been part of the same team that swept to victory under Laporta in 2003, but divisions had opened up, paralleling the historic divide that has beset Barcelona for three decades.

Laporta and Rosell had been president and vice-president, but their relationship ended in bitterness and recrimination; in hatred, in fact. Rosell then won elections in 2010, the most voted-for president in the club's history, with Bartomeu as his vice-president. When Bartomeu took over, the tone softened, and there was little doubt that he was more likeable than his

predecessor, but the divide remained palpable. Played out through the press, it was often nasty too.

Benedito had been there in 2003 under Laporta, albeit not on the board, and had been the first to leave, although ideologically he is reasonably close to Laporta. Freixa had been there too, and was later the board's spokesman under Rosell and Bartomeu, but he had complained the board had been bypassed, decisions taken unilaterally, and now he was going it alone. Laporta accused him of being Bartomeu's "submarine" but Freixa called himself a "third way". Benedito

complained of a "civil war" that would not end if Laporta or Bartomeu won.

When Bartomeu won, he insisted that "together" Barcelona would be stronger. Whether that unity is lasting, or even sought, remains to be seen. With 75 per cent of the votes counted, Laporta left, not waiting for the final result. "Never surrender," he insisted. In the end, the treble had, quite naturally, proved decisive.

"Fans are happy," Bartomeu said, putting it in simple terms. An electorate by nature fairly conservative was still less likely to deliver a revolution after such success.

Bartomeu's campaign had been a cautious, defensive one, in which he avoided direct confrontations, agreeing to go to only one debate. "When he was president he acted like a candidate, now that he is a candidate he acts like he is ▶

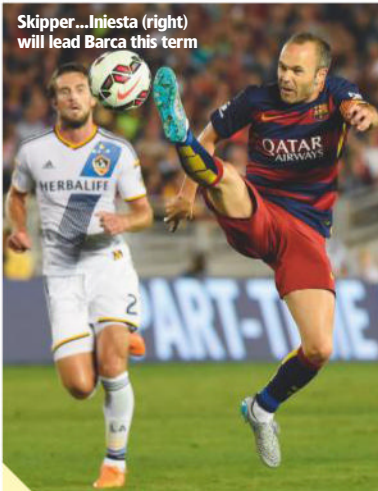

the president," Benedito had complained. Bartomeu's campaign could be summed up in two words he used often: "trident" and "treble". Neymar, Suarez and Messi; league, cup and European Cup; both are strong hands to play – even if the opposition sought to present the success as coming in spite of Bartomeu rather than because of him, while Laporta tried to claim "ownership" of Messi.

At an institutional level, there are key

from Sevilla and can play at right-back or on the right side of midfield. Arda Turan came from Atletico Madrid in a deal set up by Bartomeu but finalised by the interim committee which oversaw the day-to-day running of club during elections. Xavi, meanwhile, has departed, of course.

Unlike at Real Madrid – who are under new management with Rafa Benitez, have lost Iker Casillas, are still trying to sign another striker, have to restructure the team and maybe move Gareth Bale in to middle, and who are still pursuing David De Gea – it appears unlikely that there will be any other major changes at Barcelona. Continuity is the key but continuing their success will not be simple.

It is no secret they want Paul Pogba, but that is more likely to be a move for next year. Pedro may yet depart as he renewed his contract but the buyout clause dropped considerably. He admits he has had offers and that he has doubts over his future. When you have Messi, Neymar and Suarez ahead of you, you know that your opportunities will be few. Barcelona will allow him to decide. "I hope he stays, but..." admitted Luis Enrique.

A couple of days after the elections,

issues that still need to be handled, from the Neymar case to the FIFA transfer ban; from the UEFA investigation over the Catalan independence flags unfurled at the Champions League Final to the rocketing salaries, which account for almost 80 per cent of the budget; from redevelopment of the stadium to the shirt sponsorship with Qatar – an emotive issue during the campaign. There was also much debate over Barcelona's economic stagnation and their debt (estimated at around €300million), as well as the apparently declining significance of La Masia, the youth academy.

As for the first team, there were still debates, but this was an atypical campaign: the candidates came with their own sporting directors and there were some debates about signings, but the FIFA ban lessened the impact of those promises and rather than promising certain coaches, all four candidates said that they would continue with Luis Enrique. The coach's contract had been renewed by Bartomeu just before he was forced to step down as the electoral period opened.

Continuity won out. The question now is: will Barcelona's success continue?

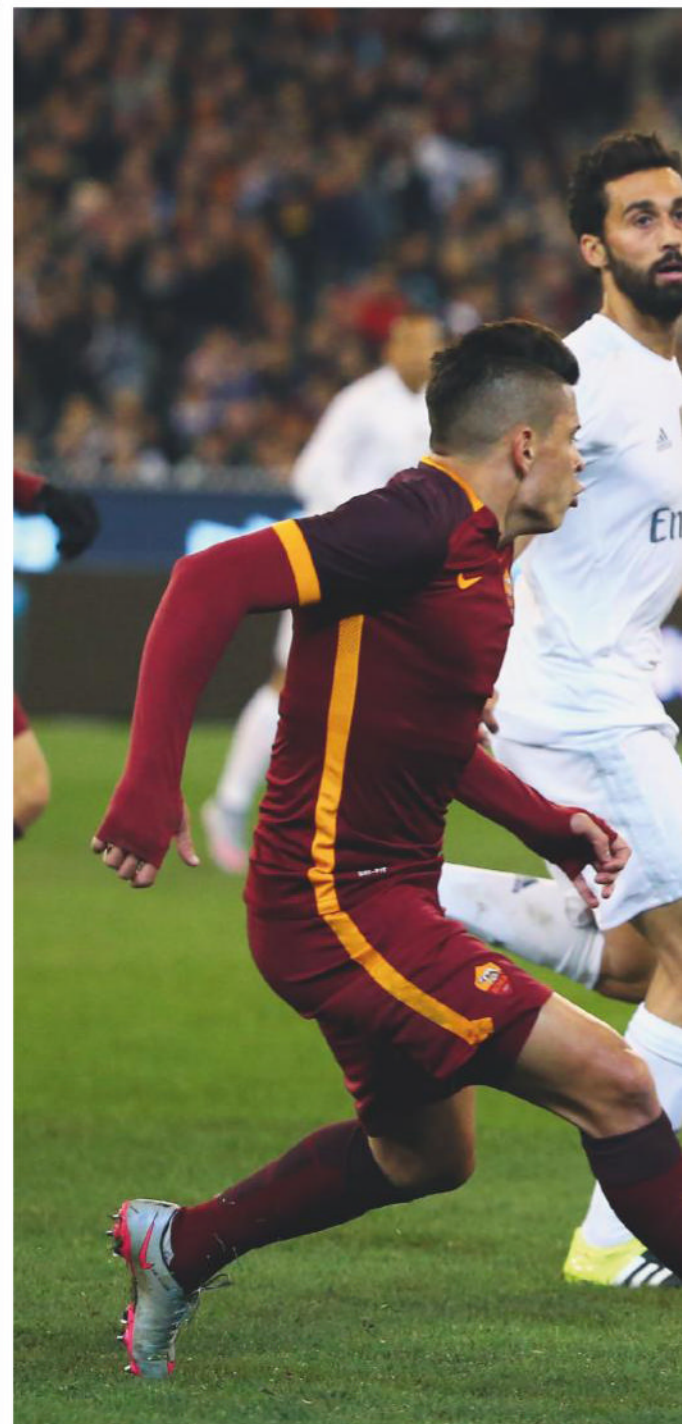
Two signings have already been made. Alex Vidal arrived

Barcelona headed off to the USA for pre-season training, minus the players who played at the Copa America: Bravo, Neymar, Alves, Mascherano and Messi. "Leo needs a rest," Luis Enrique said.

The team will play just two friendlies before the league campaign gets going – and once it starts, it won't let up. It may not be the ideal preparation for a long season that will end with the European Championship. The challenge is the six trophies won by Pep Guardiola's side five years ago.

Turan and Vidal will not be available because the FIFA ban means they can't play for Barcelona until the winter window opens in January. But fortunately for Barca, and for Bartomeu, it's already an impressive team. A treble-winning team and an election-winning team too.

TALKING POINTS

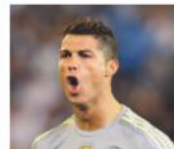

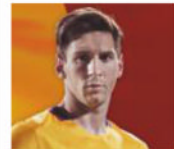

Basle play it safe after Sousa

Basle have once again paid the price for domestic success, with a sixth straight Swiss championship costing the club their coach and two key players this summer. Paulo Sousa left to take charge of Fiorentina just 12 months into a three-year contract, while midfielder Fabian Frey and defender Fabian Schar signed for Mainz and Hoffenheim respectively.

Helped by Champions League windfalls, the club have become adept at rebuilding during the close season, although their dealings this time have been less inspiring than usual.

Poached from Thun, new coach Urs Fischer was a safety-first choice after Basle broke with their preference for German-speaking bosses by appointing Sousa last year. The Portuguese brought some innovative methods to the club but clearly had his eye on bigger things, and there had been rumours that he was on his way to Italy even before the season was over.

Fischer is Basle's fifth coach in six seasons, since Christian Gross ended his 10-year stint at the club during the 2008-09 campaign. Of those, Thorsten Fink was snapped up by Hamburg after winning two titles in as many seasons and Murat Yakin left for Spartak Moscow.

Fischer, on the other hand, has spent his entire playing and coaching career in Switzerland, and does not appear the type to go gallivanting off to foreign lands at the first opportunity.

"Urs Fischer is not going to use FC Basle as a springboard," says club president Bernhard Heusler.

"It is not our aim to sit here every year and present a new coach, but we are in a situation where we have attracted international attention."

A central defender in his playing days, Fischer's career was spent with St Gallen and FC Zurich, where he was also coach for two seasons before moving to Thun. However, his association with Basle's bitter rivals Zurich did not immediately endear him to supporters and his first day at his new club was greeted by a banner which read: "Fischer will never be one of us."

His signings have looked strangely unambitious so far and have included 27-year-old Icelandic midfielder Birkir Bjarnason from Italian Serie B side Pescara and veteran Austrian striker Marc Janko, who is reaching the end of a journeyman career which has taken him

to Holland, Turkey and Australia. There was also a case of what the Italians call "reheated soup" as Basle brought back midfielder Zdravko Kuzmanovic, who left as a teenager in 2007 and went on to play for Fiorentina, Stuttgart and Internazionale.

Any perceived Basle weakness will be seized upon by Young Boys and Zurich, who look to be their only real challengers. Young Boys pushed the champions all the

way last time out despite a poor start to the season and were the league's biggest spenders during the summer, spending €6million on Benfica pair Miralem Sulejmani and Loris Benito.

Meanwhile, the presence of Zdenek Zeman at promoted Lugano down south should add some much-needed spice.

The Czech-born coach has taken his attacking philosophy to more than a dozen clubs in Italy with somewhat unpredictable results.

Sadly, at 68, he had an unhappy last season in Serie A with two stints at Cagliari. The first ended with him being sacked just before the halfway mark, and although he returned two months later he failed to lift the side and resigned.

TALKING POINTS

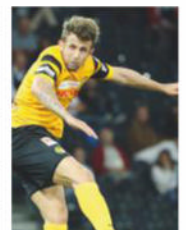

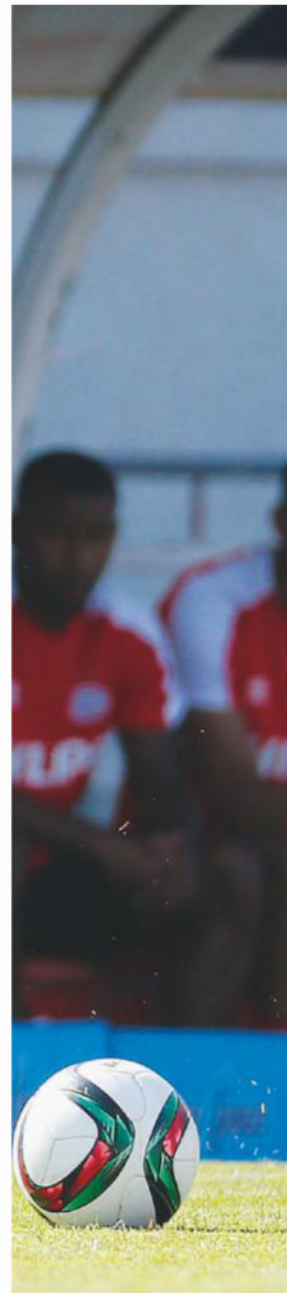

Big names bring renewed optimism

complete the domestic double last term, gaining their fourth star in the process for a record-breaking 20th league title. But with Van Persie and former United teammate Nani joining a side already boasting Bruno Alves, Raul Meireles and Volkan Demirel, there is a real belief at the Sukru Saracoglu Stadium that they, too, can claim a 20th championship.

Perhaps the only question mark concerns how new coach Vitor Pereira will settle in after moving from Greece, where he was sacked by Olympiakos after winning the league.

Defending champions Galatasaray already have some stellar names such as Holland's Wesley Sneijder in their ranks, but they still brought in Germany striker Lukas Podolski from Arsenal.

"We are the champions, we can't buy a lot," says Gala coach Hamza Hamzaoglu. "We already have global star players, key figures, and we have to take the financial fairplay really seriously"

So, with some exciting new names coming in and some huge matchups between the title contenders, other fans in

Europe may continue to view Turkey as a thriving football country.

However, beyond the games between the big four, attendances remain worryingly low. Last season's average gate in the top flight was less than 7,000 – so let's hope the summer's big signings can entice fans back into the stadiums.

Austrian defender Aleksandar Dragovic, Portuguese midfielder Miguel Veloso and Ukraine striker Andriy Yarmolenko have all been retained, with Dutch forward Jeremain Lens (Sunderland) the only notable departure.

With a place in the group stage of the Champions League guaranteed, Dynamo have strengthened their squad with the

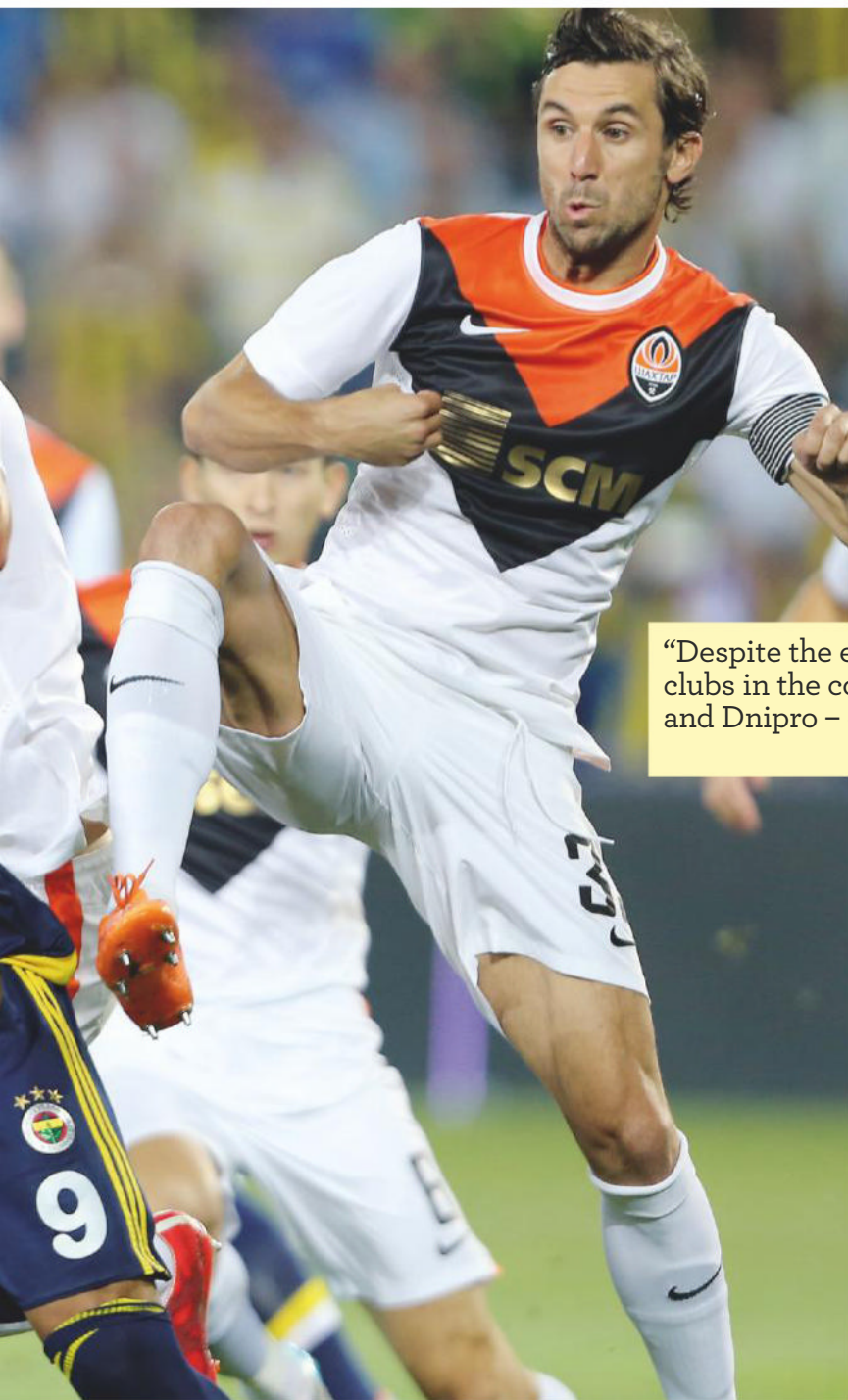

the Ukraine Cup. We have reached a good level in terms of discipline. I hope in the new season we will continue to develop.”

Rebrov is equally optimistic about the game as a whole in the Ukraine, adding: “Despite the economic crisis, the biggest clubs in the country – such as Dynamo, Shakhtar and Dnipro – continue to evolve. Yes, we don’t have players of Real Madrid and Barcelona’s calibre, but we can achieve good results in Europe”.

Shakhtar’s hopes of regaining the title have not been helped by the loss of four of their Brazilian stars during the summer. A bid of €30million persuaded Shakhtar owner Rinat Akhmetov to export key midfielder Douglas Costa to Bayern Munich, while Luiz Adriano joined Milan. A another Serie A club, Sampdoria, snapped up powerful midfielder Fernando and midfielder Ilninho returned home after his contract expired.

Despite being unable to train and play

in their native Donetsk, and the mass exodus of foreign players, Shakhtar remain a well-organised club who will push Dynamo all the way.

“We are not a club of strangers, we are a Ukrainian club built by professionals dreaming about some achievements even in hard times,” says Shakhtar coach Mircea Lucescu. “Last season was a shock for us. Nevertheless, we have learned a lot and received invaluable experience.”

The club’s Croatian skipper Darijo Srna adds: “The hardest thing is having to fly to Kiev, Lviv or whatever, but not to Donetsk. For years, after the game, we used to return there, to our houses and families. Now we are in rented flats.

“But we will stand; all will be well. This situation has made us stronger.”

Meanwhile, Dnipro sold their best player, Yevhen Konoplyanka, to Sevilla in Spain – a move that can only damage their chances against Dynamo and Shakhtar.

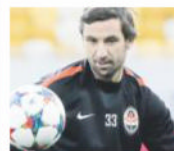

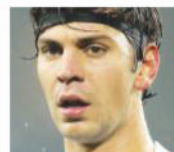

BASEMENT BATTLERS

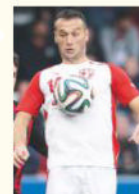

ONE TO WATCH

SIGNING OF THE SUMMER

Back on home soil after eight years piling up the goals in Austria, the USA, China and Israel, **Hamdi Salih** should prove the perfect front-line focal point for reigning champions Skenderbeu.

**CHAMPIONSHIP CHALLENGERS**

The quality of football in Bosnia is low, but the league is more competitive than any other in the region, with four different champions in last five years. **Vincent Tan's** money has transformed Sarajevo, who are favourites.

**BASEMENT BATTLERS**

No one is safe this season as the whole league is one big relegation battle, with the top flight being reduced from 16 clubs to 12 – which means six will be relegated. In terms of quality, most of the clubs are more or less even.

ONE TO WATCH

With 15 goals and nine assists in 28 games, Riad Bajic was key to Zeljeznicar's unexpected second place last season. If the club can resist offers from abroad for the 21-year-old striker, he should be prolific once again.

SIGNING OF THE SUMMER

Vincent Tan's investment allowed Sarajevo to bring in goalkeeper Matej Delac on loan from Chelsea and 24-year-old Nigerian midfielder Harmony Ikande, who was once on Milan's books.

CHAMPIONSHIP CHALLENGERS

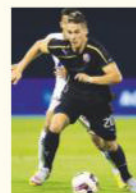
Anyone other than Dinamo winning the title would be a huge surprise as they have been champions for the past 10 seasons. For last two, HNK Rijeka have established themselves as the second best, but they have little chance of toppling Dinamo.

BASEMENT BATTLERS

Only one team is relegated, while another goes into a play-off. They are likely to be from newcomers Inter Zapresic and last season's strugglers: Istra 1961, Slaven and Osijek. Many second-tier clubs fail to meet the licencing requirements and are denied promotion.

ONE TO WATCH

Despite big investment in imported players, Dinamo keep producing their own talent – and **Marko Pjaca** could be the next one to catch the eye of the big European clubs.

**SIGNING OF THE SUMMER**

CHAMPIONSHIP CHALLENGERS

Victorious in the last three championships, APOEL remain the team to beat. No other side boasts as much talent, though they will miss Algerian striker Rafik Djebbour and German defensive midfielder Martin Lanig. AEK Larnaca have bought wisely this summer, while Apollon Limassol could improve on their third place.

BASEMENT BATTLERS

Promoted to the top flight in May after finishing third in the second division, Aris Limassol are too good for the lower leagues but too weak to exist in the highest. Doxa Katokopias won just seven of their 32 games last term and only just avoided the drop.

ONE TO WATCH

During his two years at Anorthosis, teenager winger Andreas Makris has gone from strength to strength and it may well be that 2015-16 is his Cypriot football farewell tour prior to a move abroad.

SIGNING OF THE SUMMER

Voted the best foreign player in the Cypriot elite last season, Brazilian winger Vander Vieira has left AEK Larnaca for APOEL. He was once on the books of top Rio side Flamengo.

CHAMPIONSHIP CHALLENGERS

Looks like a two-horse race between Viktoria Plzen, who have been champions for the last two seasons, and Sparta, the country's richest and historically most successful club. Big-spending Baumit Jablonec, who were third last time out, are dark horses.

BASEMENT BATTLERS

New boys Fastav Zlín were only promoted because the ground of runners-up Varnsdorf didn't meet requirements. The other promoted side, Sigma Olomouc, should be strong enough to avoid the drop. Zbrojovka Brno, Banik Ostrava and Slavia Prague could be drawn into a relegation battle, while Vysočina Jihlava look vulnerable.

ONE TO WATCH

Two and a half years after leaving for Slovan Liberec, 23-year-old midfielder Martin Frydek is back at Sparta after winning the cup last season and playing a prominent role in this summer's Euro Under-21 Championship.

SIGNING OF THE SUMMER

Champions Viktoria Plzen's decision to trade forwards Stanislav Tecl and Tomas Wagner to title rivals Baumit Jablonec in exchange for 25-year-old wide midfielder Jan Kopic was eye-catching.

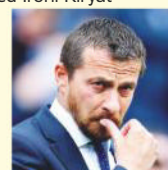

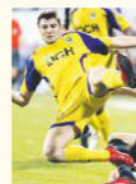

● **CHAMPIONSHIP CHALLENGERS**

Slovan Bratislava missed out on a third consecutive title last term and should have brought in enough new blood to set the record straight.



● **BASEMENT BATTLERS**

Podbrezova only stayed up because of Kosice's financial demise, while little is expected of second-tier champions Zemplin Michalovce. Zlate Moravce may be out of their depth.

● **ONE TO WATCH**

Coming up to his 19th birthday, Mauro Gonzalez brings a rare touch of South American flair to the Slovak league as Slovan Bratislava have the Argentinian midfielder on a one-year loan deal from Boca Juniors.

● **SIGNING OF THE SUMMER**

Most of the close-season transfer activity surrounded loan and out-of-contract deals. Much travelled French-born Serb defender Stefan Milojevic played for Scottish side Morton before a surprise move to unsung Zlate Moravce.

● **CHAMPIONSHIP CHALLENGERS**

Champions for the last five seasons running, who can stop Maribor? Domzale and Celje look the best of the rest, while promoted Krsko – who are nicknamed the "Nuclear Boys" after the local power plant – could prove a surprise package.

● **BASEMENT BATTLERS**

Of the bigger, traditional clubs, Koper and Gorica look to be struggling, while few expect Rudar to do anything but disappoint. Promoted in 2013, tiny Zavrč will hope to keep their place again.

● **ONE TO WATCH**

Son of former national team captain Ales Ceh, and someone who never broke through as a teenager at Olimpija, 21-year-old midfielder Tim Ceh has the chance to come into his own at promoted Krsko.

● **SIGNING OF THE SUMMER**

Good things are expected of 20-year-old Croatian striker Antonio Mance, who joined Domzale from Istra 1961. He has been capped at under-21 level by his country.

August 1974

Brian Glanville praises the rebirth of wingers at the World Cup

With the World Cup finals still fresh in the memory, the cover of *World Soccer's* August 1974 edition featured Italy captain Giacinto Facchetti exchanging pennants with his counterpart from Haiti, Wilner Nazaire, prior to their group game in Munich.

Reflecting on the tournament, and under the headline of "Wingers still live!", Brian Glanville reported on the teams that flourished using wide men. "The importance of wingers was abundantly shown," he wrote. "There are certain things a natural winger can do which no other player can: go outside the man, reach the byline and pull the ball back.

"Poland have a wonderful pair of wingers; a pair who tore holes in the defences of the Argentinians, Haitians and Italians on their way to the final stage. Grzegorz Lato and Robert Gadocha are both superb, strong runners with excellent control and a willingness to go straight for goal!"

He went on to comment: "Rene Houseman [of Argentina] was one of the most exciting wingers of the tournament. One sat there amazed to see [Italy's] Fabio Capello, essentially a creative inside-forward, given the task of marking little Houseman."

And Romeo Benetti "had an even worse time against Houseman than Capello", according to Glanville, who added: "Had they marked zonally, Capello would not have been obliged to follow Houseman around like Mary's little lamb; nor would

Wingers still live!

WORLD SOCCER, August, 1974

WINGERS live. This, surely, was one of the most salient lessons of the 1974 World Cup. I must confess to a certain feeling of pleasure when I heard that Hennes Weisweiler, the manager of Borussia Munchengladbach, had criticised West Germany's Helmut Schoen because he hadn't used them. Not altogether fairly, I felt, having been present at the surprising match in Hamburg where the East Germans, with Sparwasser's breakaway goal, beat the West.

After all, there were in that team no fewer than two men quite capable of playing on the right wing, and an overlapping full-back, in Paul Breitner, well able to function on the left; the purveyor of some extremely dangerous balls to Geri Muller. Moreover, even if it is true that Jurgen Grabowski plays for his club in midfield, and had a poor game against the DDR, it is equally true that he was an outside-right by vocation.

Who can easily forget the way he turned poor, exhausted Terry Cooper inside out in that World Cup quarter final in Leon,

four years ago, to tip the match towards West Germany? Meanwhile, much of Uli Hoernes' best attacking work is done on the right wing, where he, too, began.

But the importance of wingers was abundantly shown, and it seems more ludicrous than ever that England should have elected virtually to play without them since 1966, when Sir Alf's Wingless Wonders won the World Cup. Slavishly and unimaginatively, club managers followed suit, natural wingers were discouraged, and the consequence is that we now have pathetically few of them.

Breach

Yet as we know, there are certain things a natural winger can do which no other player can: go outside the man, reach the byline, and pull the ball back. Not that one has always to be a winger to do it. Mike Channon said to me on the successful England summer tour that he knew he was capable of "hitting the line". Hitting it, moreover, on either flank. Unless you can

do this, it is still terribly difficult to breach a packed defence; as England found against the Poles, at Wembley.

Poland themselves, as we know, have a wonderful pair of wingers; a pair who tore holes in the defences of the Argentinians, Haitians and Italians, on their way to the final stages. Lato and Gadocha are both superb, strong runners with excellent control, and a willingness to go straight for goal. Indeed, I honestly think that the loss of the great Lubanski was in some respect a blessing in disguise for the Poles.

When you have a player of such stature and accomplishment in your team, the natural tendency is to play to him. When Lubanski dropped out, Poland did not weaken. Indeed, it seems to me that two positive things happened. In the first place, the Poles were able to bring in Lato, which balanced the attack beautifully, giving it thrust down both flanks; not forgetting the fact that Lato, as he showed Hunter at Wembley, can flourish down the left, as well. Secondly, it allowed Deyna to blossom in midfield.

Meanwhile, the eventual runners-up also had Glanville purring: "Holland had [Rob] Rensenbrink, who can go to either wing with success but was somewhat overshadowed by [Johan] Cruyff, who plays on the left wing as well and as elusively as any left-winger has ever done."

Yet not every team used a winger – even those who had them in their squad, with Glanville pointing out that Scotland manager Willie Ormond consistently overlooked Jimmy Johnstone in his squad of 22.

"We all know Johnstone is a law unto himself," said Glanville. "But he is also a player of undeniable genius, a player always capable of doing the unexpected,

who can suddenly get you a goal when you need it most.

"I also think Johnstone would have had a picnic against Zaire, perhaps helping Scotland to score the goals that they needed.

"Note that the Yugoslav goal [in their match against Scotland] was made by a superb natural winger, Dragan Dzajic, and that the Scottish goal was made in a still more classical winger's way when Tommy Hutchison brought the ball up to his man on the byline and splendidly beat him."

And what of the winners? Despite West Germany not employing out-and-out wingers in their triumph, they had, as Glanville acknowledged: "Two men quite capable of playing on the right wing.

"Jurgen Grabowski was an outside-right by vocation, meanwhile much of Uli Hoernes' best attacking work is done on the right wing, where he, too, began." WS

Rene Houseman was one of the most exciting wingers of the tournament. I am still marvelling at the ingeniousness of Ferruccio Valcareggi, the Italian team manager, when the sides met in Stuttgart.

One sat there amazed to see Fabio Capello, essentially a creative inside-forward, given the task of marking little Houseman.

This meant that the Italians lost on two distinct counts. They lost, that is to say, a fine inside-forward, and gained, if that is the word, an extremely indifferent full-back.

And it took Valcareggi twenty-five minutes, a goal by Houseman, and a near miss by Babington when Zoff saved, to rectify his mistake.

Not that he truly rectified it, for if anything the rugged, ruthless Benetti had an even worse time against Houseman than Capello. Man to man marking is the Italian obsession. Had they marked zonally, Capello would not have been obliged to follow Houseman around like Mary's little lamb; nor would Benetti have been assigned to a task not really grateful to him. For Benetti is essentially an inside-forward who has been pressed into service as a half-back. To make him a virtual full-back was bound to be a dangerous experiment against that rare breed, a natural winger.

Assaults

Houseman, with courage, swerve, speed, footwork and initiative, turned Benetti over time and again, scoring the cruel assaults on his ankles. Moral: a natural winger needs to have a natural full-back against him. The bewildering thing is that Valcareggi afterwards said that he had not only had Houseman watched but had watched him, himself. In that case how on earth could he ever have mistaken him for a midfield player? He might almost as well have taken him for a centre-half.

Then there is, or was, the case of Jimmy Johnstone. Here, I believe that Scotland's excessive caution may have cost them their qualification. We all know that Johnstone is a law unto himself, undisciplined, if you

please, on the field and sometimes off it. But he is also a player of undeniable genius, a player always capable of doing the unexpected, who can suddenly get you a goal when you need it most.

Even as hard shooting a forward as Peter Lovreimer couldn't manage it against the Brazilians and the Yugoslavs. I also think Johnstone would have had a picnic against Zaire, perhaps helping Scotland to score the goals they needed, rather than go out in such a sad, unfair and anti-climatic way.

Note that the Yugoslav goal was made by a superb natural winger, Dragan Dzacic, and that the Scottish goal was made in a still more classical winger's way when Tommy Hutchinson brought the ball up to his man on the by-line, and splendidly beat him.

Talents

Brazil, alas for them, found that they were caught between two fires with Jairzinho. Play him on the right wing and there was no decent centre-forward. Play him in the middle and he simply didn't get adequate room to express his enormous talents; his pace, power and swerve.

Curiously, the East Germans dropped both their wingers, Lowe and Vogel, from the match against West Germany, and were none the worse for it. I shall not claim them to be the exception that proves the rule, but I think it legitimate to say that the West German defence, in its opening games, was incredibly open through the middle. Getting round the back of a more heavily manned and better organised defence might well have been another story.

It must also be admitted that the surprising Swedes owed little to orthodox wing play. Grahn, it is true, was once an excellent right winger, while Benno Magnusson played on the wing for Kaiserslautern, but the attack turned essentially on the excellence of Edstrom and Sandberg, those old "partners in crime" from Swedish club football. There was no Kurre Hamrin, no

Nacka Skoglund, as in the famous Swedish World Cup team of 1958.

Holland had Rensenbrink, who can go to either wing with success, but was somewhat overshadowed by Cruyff; who plays on the left wing as well and as classily as any left winger has ever done. But then Cruyff is surely a law to his remarkable self.

Overall Barry Davies emerged as the best of the commentators. Mind you, he must have wished the ground would open up during his first match of the tournament when he said of the West Germans: "They're playing into Chilean hands." Alas for Barry a split second later Paul Breitner slammed in Germany's first goal.

Barry recovered well and more than atoned when during the Holland v. Argentina match he said: "You have the feeling the Dutch could score when they want to like now." Johnny Rep had obliged at exactly the right moment.

When it came to on-the-spot informed opinion BBC also came out tops with Celtic's Jock Stein being an outstanding contributor. His pre-match analysis of the final was spot on.

Sir Alf Ramsey gave us an insight into his knowledge of overseas players which more than compensated for all those "most certainly" and "all credit" lines that punctuated his comments. And it must have been unsettling for Sir Alf, never at his best when facing the camera, to be interviewed by Gary Newbon, who didn't seem nearly strong enough on football to be given such an important job.

When it comes to presentation however, the West German Television service has much to learn from their British counterparts. The smart direction of BBC's Alec Weeks and John McConagie or ITV's Bob Gardam was something that was definitely missed.

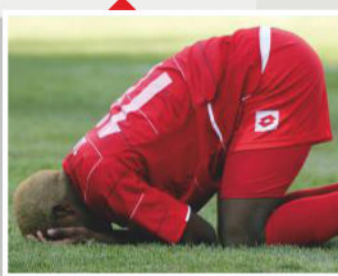

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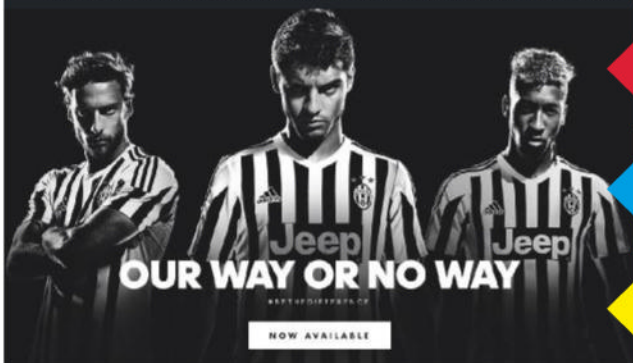

Monday July 6

YEMEN: FIFA rule that Yemen's 1-0 home defeat to North Korea in June is to be forfeited and awarded as a 3-0 victory to the visitors as the hosts' Mudir Al Radaei had failed to serve a automatic one-match ban.

Tuesday July 7

GIBRALTAR: Lincoln Red Imps win 2-1 at Santa Coloma in Andorra to become the first side from Gibraltar to win a Champions League tie, having drawn their home game 0-0.
GOLD CUP: Michael Bradley wins

his 100th cap and Clint Dempsey scores twice as the USA begin their CONCACAF Gold Cup title defence by beating Honduras 2-1. Haiti and Panama draw 1-1 in the other game in the opening day's double-header.
ITALY: Massimiliano Allegri, who won the double and led Juventus to the Champions League Final in his first season as coach, signs a one-year contract extension, tying him to the club until June 2017.

Wednesday July 8

ROMANIA: Last season's league runners-up Targu Mures pick up their

first-ever silverware, beating double winners Steaua Bucharest 1-0 in the Romanian Super Cup. The winners' coach, Dan Petrescu, who was taking charge of his first game, quit after the match and joined Chinese side Jiangsu Sainty.

Thursday July 9

FRANCE: Starting from the 2016-17 season, only two teams will be relegated from Ligue 1, instead of the usual three, with only two clubs coming up from Ligue 2.

GOLD CUP: Visa problems mean Cuba have just 16 players to chose

from as they lose 6-0 to Mexico, with Oribe Peralta scoring a hat-trick.

Friday July 10

ALBANIA: The Court of Arbitration for Sport upholds an appeal and awards Albania a 3-0 win over Serbia after their Euro 2016 qualifier in Belgrade. UEFA initially awarded Serbia a 3-0 win, but also docked the hosts three points. The game in October was abandoned when fans invaded the pitch and attacked visiting players after a pro-Albanian flag was flown over the stadium. Serbia's points deduction still stands.

SINGAPORE: Albirex Niigata beat Balestier Khalsa 2-1 with a last-minute goal from Kento Nagasaki in the Singapore League Cup Final.

Saturday July 11

ALGERIA: An own goal by MC Eulma goalkeeper Tarek Mahsas gives CAF Champions League holders ES Setif a 1-0 win in their all-Algerian group game.

CAMBODIA: Chan Vathanaka scores eight times as Boeung Ket Angkor win 12-2 away to Kirivong Sok Sen Chey in the Cambodian League.

Reward...Massimo Allegri will stay with Juve until 2017



EGYPT: El Gouna lose 2-1 to Wadi Degla and are relegated – along with El Raja, Al Nasr, Al Assiouty Sport and Ala'ab Damanhour – as the Egyptian Premier League is reduced to 18 teams for next season.

IRAQ: Naft Al Wasat become only the second club to win the Iraqi Premier League title in their debut season, beating Quwa Al Jawiya on penalties after a goalless draw in the play-off Final.

Sunday July 12

BULGARIA: Two Lokomotiv Gorna Oryahovitsa players – including Anthony Balakov, who is the nephew of Krassimir Balakov – are hospitalised after being attacked by Chernobyl supporters during the first half of a pre-season friendly. The fans responded to a gesture from a Lokomotiv player who was sent off.

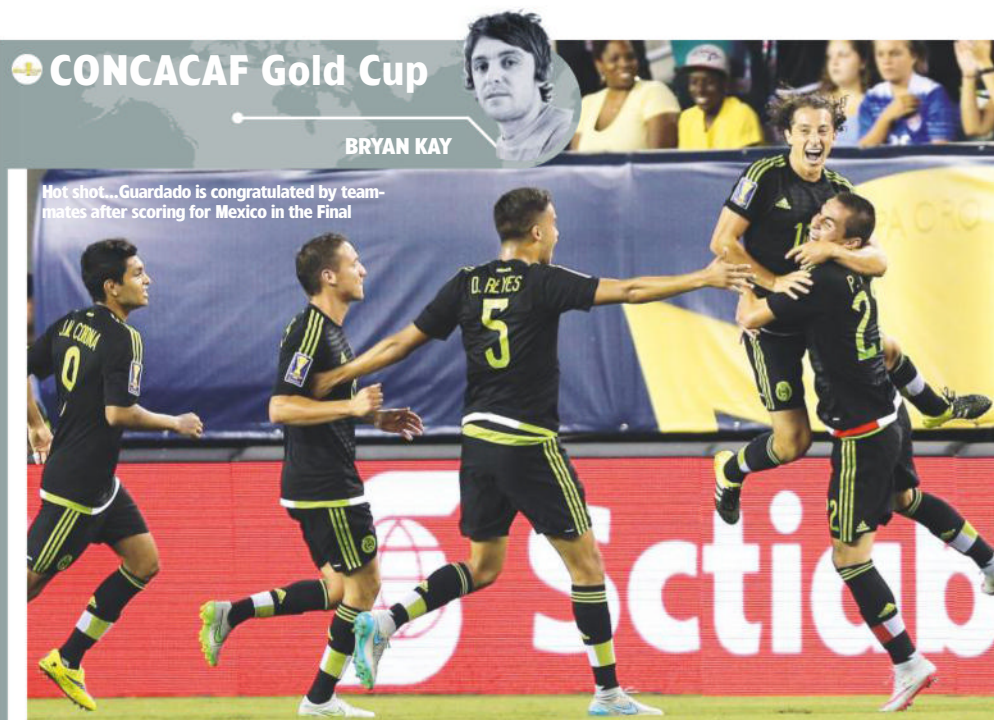
CROATIA: Defending champions Dinamo Zagreb are held 1-1 at home by Hajduk Split on the opening weekend of the new league season.

Caribbean islands are on the rise

Gold for Mexico, but plaudits go elsewhere

While Mexico may have won their seventh CONCACAF Gold Cup, the highlights from the latest edition of the North and Central American tournament came courtesy of three Caribbean islands.

In a group with Costa Rica, who were the region's highest-ranked side prior to the competition in the USA and Canada, Jamaica opened their campaign with a 2-2 draw against "Los Ticos", before going on to beat Canada and El Salvador to take top spot.

After a 1-0 win against Haiti, Winfried Schafer's side then met the USA in the semi-finals in a game that the Reggae Boyz coach said "feels like David against Goliath". But goals from Darren Mattocks and Giles Barnes gave his side a shock 2-1 and denied the US a place in the Gold Cup Final for the first time in 12 years.

Jamaica therefore became the first-ever Caribbean side to contest the Final – and even a 3-1 loss to Mexico could not dampen Schafer's spirits.

"For me, this is not silver, this is gold," said the 65-year-old German. "Nobody gave us a chance. I am very proud to be the coach of this team."

He added: "I have never seen this spirit in a team. These players gave their hearts for this country, for this island. Nobody understands what the players are doing for this country."

If anything, fellow islanders Trinidad & Tobago were even more convincing than Jamaica in the early stage of the competition, even managing to finish above Mexico in their group.

Led by striker Kenwyne Jones, T&T eased past

Guatemala and Cuba, before matching "El Tri" punch for punch in a 4-4 thriller in which they went 4-3 down in the last minute, only to equalize four minutes into stoppage time.

It took penalty kicks for Panama to eliminate the "Soca Warriors" in the quarter-finals.

Haiti, meanwhile, finished above Panama in their group and only lost narrowly to the USA before falling to Jamaica in the last eight.

As for the eventual champions, Mexico were largely disappointing and needed some dismal refereeing decisions to help them on their way, although they were thoroughly deserved winners in the Final.

They needed a controversial penalty – awarded for a seemingly phantom foul on Oribe Peralta – in the fourth minute of extra-time to get past Costa Rica in the quarter-finals. And in the semi-final against Panama things got even worse.

Trailing 2-1 and heading into injury time, Mexico were yet again awarded a spot-kick, which after lengthy protests from Panama, Andres Guardado dispatched to take the game into extra-time. Down to 10 men, the incensed Panamanians could not believe what they were witnessing as US referee Mark Geiger awarded Mexico another spot-kick midway through extra-time, which allowed Guardado to score the winner.

Given the ubiquity of disquiet over Mexico's passage to the Final, there was further insult away from the pitch after their triumph when coach Miguel Herrera inexplicably got involved in a violent confrontation with a Mexican journalist – and was sacked after punching the reporter. **WS**

Early shocks in qualifiers

Ajax and Fenerbahce fall at first hurdle

Ajax and Fenerbahce were two of the big names that crashed out of the Champions League at the first hurdle, losing to Rapid Vienna and Shakhtar Donetsk respectively in the third qualifying round.

Ajax lost 3-2 at home to Rapid Vienna in the second leg of their tie to go out 5-4 on aggregate. In the opening leg – at the Vienna stadium where they won the European Cup 20 years ago – they had thrown away a two-goal lead to draw 2-2 with 10-man Rapid.

In the return leg, the Dutch side went 2-0 down in the first half at the Amsterdam Arena before levelling the tie at 4-4 on aggregate, only for Louis Schaub to score a late winner for Rapid.

"This is so sad, for us and Dutch football," said Ajax coach Frank De Boer, who was criticised for his decision to leave the likes of Nemanja Gudelj, Lasse Schone, Ricardo Van Rhijn and Johnny Heitinga on the bench. "I felt that this young team could make the difference. Unfortunately this was not the case.

"We will continue. The Europa League is very important because it is crucial to play in Europe."

The defeat left Ajax in the play-off round of the continent's junior tournament, along with Turkey's Fenerbahce, who spent heavily this summer, recruiting star names from Manchester United in Robin Van

Persie and Nani, as well as Danish defender Simon Kjaer and Portuguese coach Vitor Pereira.

Fener's two games against Shakhtar were their first in European competition since the end of a two-year ban for match-fixing, and despite a goalless first leg in Istanbul, they travelled to Lviv, Shakhtar's temporary home, in confident mood.

However, without the injured Van Persie, the visitors struggled against a resurgent Shakhtar, who showed few signs of being weakened by the summer departures of Douglas Costa and Luiz Adriano, to Bayern Munich and Milan respectively.

Oleksandr Hladkyy gave the hosts the lead in the first half when he turned in Darijo Srna's near-post cross. Srna then doubled their advantage from the penalty spot after Volkan Demirel had brought down Marlos. Alex Teixeira wrapped things up three minutes later with a goal on the break, while Kjaer was sent off in stoppage time.

Steaua Bucharest, European champions in 1986,



also missed out on the chance to progress to the group stage as they were beaten by Partizan Belgrade.

After a 1-1 draw in the first leg, Steaua looked on course to progress when Algerian winger Jugurtha Hamroun gave them a first-half lead. But the game turned on the 47th-minute sending-off of their captain Fernando Varela and Partizan scored three times in the second period to turn the tie around.

While Rapid Vienna were surprise victors over Ajax, their Austrian counterparts Red Bull Salzburg one again came up short, beaten by Sweden's Malmo.

However, there was disappointment elsewhere in Scandinavia as Norwegian champions Molde lost on away goals to Dinamo Zagreb, while Midtjylland of Denmark provided Cypriot champions APOEL, who

competed in last year's group stage, with another scalp.

It was a disappointing round for both teams from Czech Republic as Sparta Prague lost to CSKA Moscow and champions Viktoria Plzen were surpassingly beaten

by Maccabi Tel Aviv, going down 2-0 at home in the second leg.

There were easy wins for Monaco, 7-1 on aggregate over Young Boys, while Swiss champions Basle were 4-1 aggregate winners

over Poland's Lech Poznan. Celtic survived a long trip to Azerbaijan, drawing the second leg 0-0 away to Qarabag after a 1-0 win in Glasgow.

And two lesser teams made unexpected progress. Albanian champions Skenderbeu reached the play-offs after a win over Moldova's Milsami, while Astana of Kazakhstan beat Finland's HJK Helsinki. **WS**

Big names boost Super League

Overseas stars contribute to an exciting finale

The current Chinese Super League (CSL) season is the most exciting for years. Off the pitch, clubs have ramped up the spending in a way not seen in East Asia since the start of the J-League. And on it, four teams – full of stars, ambition and goals – are competing for the title.

Guangzhou Evergrande were the first side to spend big to bring in European, South American and local talent and they have been the most successful, winning every title since 2011. Coached by Luiz Felipe Scolari, who arrived in June, there is a strong Brazilian streak running through the club on the Pearl River Delta, with Paulinho and Robinho recently adding to the existing South American contingent of Ricardo Goulart and Elkeson.

The 2002 World Cup-winning Scolari replaced Fabio Cannavaro, the Italian who lasted little more than six months in his first coaching role after succeeding countryman Marcello Lippi. Cannavaro did well despite numerous injury problems, but his team always looked

better going forward than they were at the back. However, his biggest problem was that he was not a Brazilian at a time when the owners were deciding to head in a South American direction.

If "Big Phil" delivers their fifth title, and a second Asian Champions League crown in three years, he should at least call the Italian to say "thank you" for leaving a team in the thick of the title race and in the last eight of Asia's biggest club competition.

The chase for the continental crown could make all the difference to Guangzhou Evergrande's CSL title hopes. Such was their domestic dominance in 2013 that Lippi could focus solely on Asia in the latter stages. But that will not be the case this time.

This season there is plenty of competition, not least from Shanghai SIPG. Fifth last term, they reacted by bringing in Sven Goran Eriksson, and the Swede has been allowed to invest in South American stars with proven records in China, such as Dario Conca and Davi. Then, in July, he smashed the Asian transfer record and paid over \$20million to sign Asamoah Gyan from Al Ain of UAE. SIPG were already finding the net pretty easily even before the arrival of the Ghanaian striker, who averaged over a goal a game in the Emirates.

SIPG's home game against Guangzhou Evergrande on September 12 could be decisive – and a chance for Eriksson to gain a modicum of revenge against Scolari, who ended England's World Cup campaign in 2002 with Brazil and their Euro 2004 hopes with Portugal.

Shandong Luneng have been quietly keeping pace with the top two and the east-coast club has more cause

than most to regret the new wave of spending that took off around 2010. That was the year Shandong won the league title for the third time in five years – the last team to do so before Guangzhou Evergrande's period of dominance.

While coach Cuca was a little lucky to survive last season, he brought in fellow Brazilian Diego Tardelli in January and, after a slow start, the 30-year-old has started to deliver. If he continues to do so, Shandong remain an outside shout for the title.

As do Beijing Guoan, who as a club were initially a little sniffy about the new money flowing into the domestic game and have taken a more low-key approach under Spanish boss Gregorio Manzano. In 2014, they pushed Guangzhou Evergrande to the final game of the season and, despite a hiccup in July, are still in this term's race.

Nobody else is going to make the top four, but Shanghai Shenhua will want to finish as high as possible. Desperate for a return to former glories after years of mid-table mediocrity, Didier Drogba and Nicolas Anelka arrived in 2012 but made little impact in their short stay. Tim Cahill was signed in February this year and, in July, around \$16m was enough to secure the services of Demba Ba, who was joined by former Liverpool and Juventus star Mohamed Sissoko.

Such stars and excitement mean more fans, and average attendances this season are touching 23,000 – the best in Asia, given that it's hard to include the Indian Super League as it has just eight teams, lasts only 10 weeks and has been around for just a year.

With a sense that there is still more to come, for now Chinese fans are just enjoying the big names, the big games and a title race that is set to go to the wire. **WS**

Tunisia go for Kasperczak again

Polish coach is back in charge of the national team

The French coach Claude Le Roy may be the godfather of national team bosses on the African continent, but Henryk Kasperczak is making his own bid at immortality. At the age of 69, the former Poland World Cup star has returned to take charge of Tunisia for what will be his seventh post in African football – all of them at international level.

The connection is through France, where Kasperczak played at the end of his successful career and where he has lived ever since, becoming a citizen and something of an Afrophile.

Tunisia, in particular, have fond memories of the ex-midfielder from Zabrze and had no hesitation in re-appointing him after the sudden resignation of George Leekens.

Kasperczak took Tunisia to the 1996 African Nations Cup Final, where they lost 2-0 to hosts South Africa, playing with an under-23 side that were using the tournament as a warm-up for the Olympic Games in Atlanta later that year.

Using the bulk of that squad, Tunisia were at the World Cup in France two years later – although after losing to England and Colombia, Kasperczak was sacked before their third game of the 1998 finals, a 1-1 draw with Romania.

He returns on a two-year deal that takes in the next Nations Cup, in Gabon, plus the World Cup qualifiers, and he will take charge once again in September, when Tunisia play Liberia in the second game of their group qualifiers for the Nations Cup.

Then, in November, they will meet either South Sudan or Mauritania over two legs as they begin

their bid to qualify for the World Cup in Russia 2018.

"To lead the team to the World Cup in Russia is a priority," said Kasperczak on his appointment. "There are quality players in Tunisia. This is an advantage and an important base.

"Similarly, there are important players based with European clubs. It will be key to make the best choice."

Kasperczak has coached at six previous Nations Cup, just two shy of Le Roy's record.

He took Ivory Coast to third in 1994, Mali to fourth in 2002 and was fired midway through Senegal's tournament in 2008. He was in charge of Mali again earlier this year at the tournament in Equatorial Guinea, but he did not have his contract renewed after his side bizarrely went out in the first round after losing a rare drawing of lots to Guinea after both

'Scams galore'

CEO forced out after discovering problems with FA finances



Keith Masters always meant to take a break from his job as chief executive of the Botswana Football Association (BFA) this summer – although not a permanent one. Now, however, their relationship is over.

A former referee, Masters spent 32 years as chief executive of the Kent FA, which a decade ago began to help develop the game in Botswana after he was contacted by the BFAs then president, Philip Makgalemele.

When that agreement ended in 2009, Masters continued going to Botswana twice a year at his own expense. After retiring in 2011, he was offered the post of BFA chief executive by new president Tebogo Sebege.

Masters was given a mandate to restore the BFA's finances and claims to have uncovered scams galore. But after Sebege turned against him, his position became untenable and he was forced to leave.

"Football in Botswana doesn't have a hope at the moment," says Masters. "The executive committee were impossible to deal with as some people knew nothing about the sport."

Public sector grants, particularly from the Botswana National Sports Council (BNSC), make up 86 per cent of BFA revenue according to Masters. The BNSC took the BFA to task over poor accounting, particularly over foreign trips by the national team, but Masters made enemies on the executive committee. He was even visited by the police, although no charges were brought.

"I was offered a couple of things I didn't take up that were clearly designed to set me up," he says. "I thought if they were prepared

to go to those lengths to get me, what would they do next?" Ex-BNSC secretary Kagiso Kemoeng has replaced Masters and national coach Peter Butler admits: "It was all very political and Keith was a victim of circumstance."

A veteran English player and coach, Butler spent 13 years in Asian club management until last year when he was offered the BFA national coaching job. "Our league is a semi-pro environment," says Butler. "We have a lot of students. You think that's an advantage, but we have lads working in the diamond industry who get released. The students don't"

Butler has reduced the average age of the national team to 22 and will only select players from the 16-team Botswanan Premier League. No club has their own ground and wages are low compared to neighbouring South Africa, where Botswana internationals Mogakolodi Ngele and Kabelo Dembe play for Platinum Stars.

Mogogi Gabonamong and Joel Mogorosi were also with Bloemfontein Celtic, but Gabonamong returned home to join Township Rollers. Mogorosi, Ngele and Dembe cannot play for Botswana under the current policy but Butler has no regrets.

"For every one who has been against it, I've had three or four people come out in favour," he says. "There was a lot of bias in selection but not now."

"I have another 18 months on my contract. Whether I see it out remains to be seen. It depends how you judge success. Is it winning tournaments, or building from grass roots?"

Keith Masters wanted to build in Botswana too, but hit too many obstacles. **WS**

In what *World Soccer* called "the best tournament since the 1970 World Cup", Keir Radnedge said of the Euro 84 semi-final in Marseille's Velodrome: "The match between France and Portugal was one of THE great games"

He began his report by writing: "Given the demands, pressures and prizes of top tournaments, it is amazing that players can produce football of such quality with the most demanding of audiences breathing down their necks:"

It was an enthralling game, with the lead changing hands on three occasions. France struck first with a free-kick from Jean-Francois Domergue after most people in Marseille thought Michel Platini was lining up a shot. Portugal then equalised through Rui Jordao.

Jordao scored again, near the end of the first period of extra-time, to put Portugal ahead for the first time, but France were not going to surrender easily.

"With barely a pause for breath, we roared into the second period of extra-time," continued Radnedge. "The atmosphere was so infectious that the Portuguese forgot about slowing down the game. And thus they played into French hands."

With just six minutes remaining, Domergue scored his second goal of the game after some intricate work by Platini and Yvon Le Roux – the big central defender who had been sent

upfield by coach Michel Hidalgo.

France kept pushing forward and with the game entering its final minute, Jean Tigana and Platini gave them their reward.

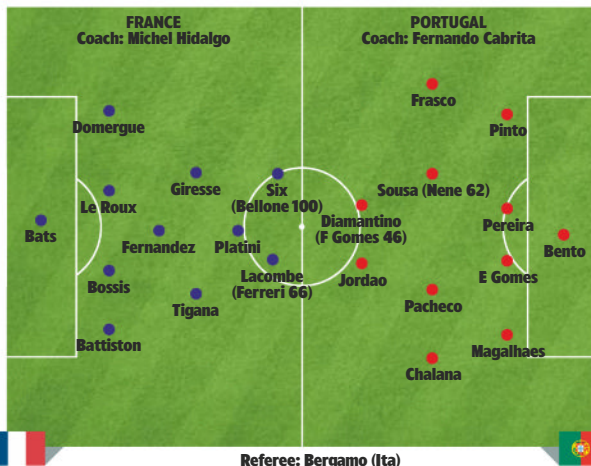
"Tigana went on one last wriggling slalom through the Portugal defence," concluded Radnedge. "He took the ball on and on, right past the goalkeeper to the byline before pulling it back.

"And there was Platini, superstar supreme, to control the ball, assure his own balance and fire into the back of the net for a most dramatic winner to a most remarkable game of football."

France went on to win the Final, beating Spain 2-0 in Paris with goals from Platini and Bruno Bellone. **WS**
