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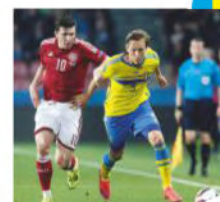

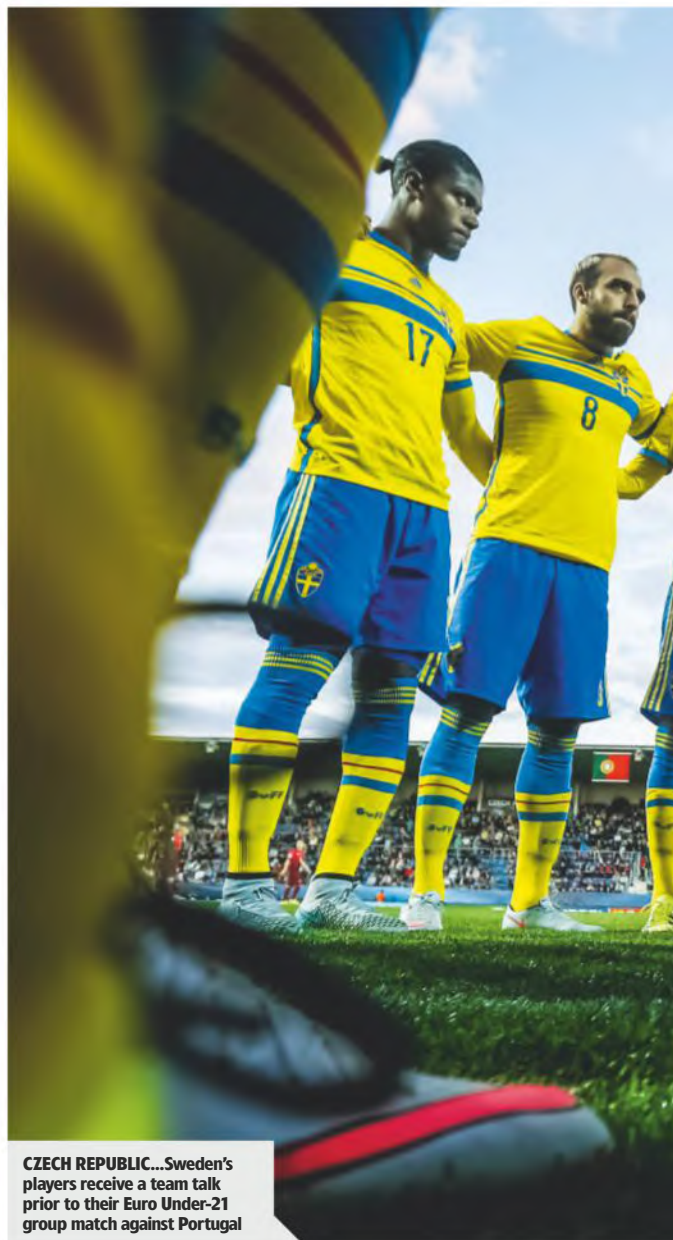

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# FROM THE EDITOR

Xavi has graced the cover of *World Soccer* before, in 2010 when he was voted World Player of the Year. It seems fitting, on the occasion of his final match for Barcelona, to feature him again.

The tributes to Xavi (page 42) have been long and justified. One of the most intelligent footballers to have played in Europe in recent times, it seems highly likely that he will return to Barcelona in a coaching capacity in the future. While Xavi earns petro-millions in semi-retirement in Qatar, so Steven Gerrard begins a new phase of his life in Los Angeles with Galaxy (page 50).

Sterling, though eligible, was not in the England squad that took part in this summer’s European Under-21 Championship (page 86). Manager Gareth Southgate chose (diplomatically?) to select only players who featured in qualifying. Sterling’s absence may have contributed to his country’s early exit; it may have not. We will never know.

We do know that Xavi first came to global attention in 1999 when Spain won the world under-20 title. It was his first success in a long and fruitful career. One that very few players, if any, will emulate.

## 46-0: a new unofficial world-record defeat

The Federated States of Micronesia suffered a 46-0 thrashing by Vanuatu at the Pacific Games, which double as the qualifying tournament for next year’s Rio Olympics. But because Micronesia are not affiliated to FIFA, the defeat will not be recorded as an official world record.

The defeat, in which Jean Kaltack was Vanuatu’s top scorer with 16 goals, means Micronesia conceded 114 goals in three games, also losing 30-0 to Tahiti and 38-0 to Fiji in the tournament.

“It was boys against men” said Micronesia coach Stan Foster, who added that for many of his players it is was the first time they had played on an 11-a-side pitch. “Most of these have never been out of their villages let alone on to another island. I took them to Guam the other day [and it was] the first time they’ve been on an elevator or an escalator.

“It’s been a huge step-up for these guys and they’ve just been overawed really!”

## Whistleblower Blazer banned for life

FIFA has banned ex-executive committee member and former CONCACAF general-secretary Chuck Blazer from all football-related activity for life.



A FIFA statement said Blazer “committed many and various acts of misconduct”.

Blazer, 70, worked undercover with prosecutors in the United States after pleading guilty to charges of bribery, money laundering and tax evasion. In May, several FIFA officials were arrested on charges of racketeering, fraud and money laundering.

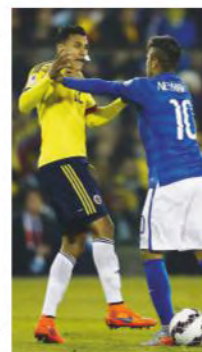

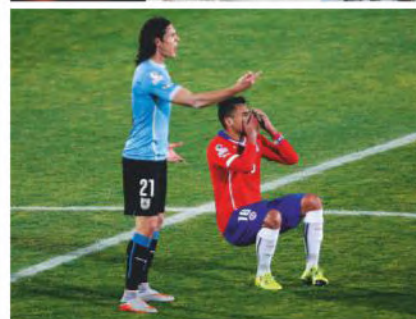

## SPAIN



And so a club without a president, that is banned from signing new players, has signed a player who didn't want to run and can't play. Not for six months, anyway.

Like Aleix Vidal, who was signed from Sevilla, Arda Turan has left Atletico Madrid to become a Barcelona player – even though he can't play until January.

The club's ban on transfers does not end until the next window but, in practical terms, the ban is on registering players, not buying them.

Arda and Vidal will have to wait six

months for their chance. And as the English twitter feed of the sports daily AS put it, tongue wedged firmly in its cheek, Vidal and Arda will have time to get very, very good at table tennis.

In Arda's case, he could yet get sent back to Atletico. Barcelona are immersed in presidential elections, so there is no board of directors or president at the moment. Instead, there is an interim committee whose job it is to oversee elections and carry out essential tasks so that the club does not simply grind to a halt in the meantime.

It would not be summer if Italian football was not up to its eyes in scandal. Yes, Italian football has again been rocked by yet another match-fixing scandal, this time involving Serie B side Catania.

Catania president Antonino Pulvirenti calmly admitted to state prosecutors

that, yes, he had "fixed" five games during the last six weeks of last season. And, ironically, it had been Pulvirenti himself who had first attracted the prosecutors' attention when he filed a complaint to police last March, claiming that various Catania fans had threatened him. From then on, his phone calls came under surveillance, allowing investigators to make some discoveries – not about fan threats but rather about match fixes.

If some of the recent scandals have involved huge sums of money and international betting syndicates, this one is almost old-fashioned.

Pulvirenti claims he set about fixing games only to ensure Catania avoided dropping to the third division.

# An Eastern European great

### Josef MASOPUST (1931–2015)

Different generations view their heroes from their own perspective, and Czech football fans are no different. For some, their greatest player was Pepi Bican from the 1930s and 1940s; for others it is the more recent Pavel Nedved. For all those inbetween, it was Josef Masopust, who died on June 29, aged 84.

A memorial tribute was held prior to the Euro Under-21 Final, between Sweden and Portugal, at Slavia’s Eden Stadium in Prague. But rather than Slavia or their city rivals Sparta, Masopust made his name with Dukla Prague.

I had the privilege of meeting Masopust, along with some of his old team-mates, just over a year ago. He was modest, humorous and still a passionate follower of the game, even if attending matches

– and as an opponent. I used to hate playing against him because he was such a commander on the pitch.

“He always seemed to be one move ahead of you all the time.”

History records Masek as scoring what was at the time the fastest goal in World Cup history, finding the net after just 16 seconds against Mexico in the group stage of the 1962 World Cup in Chile. Inevitably, Masopust had delivered the slide-rule pass which he put away.

Czechoslovakia went all the way to the Final that year, where they met Brazil in Santiago. Masopust opened the scoring after 15 minutes – he managed 10 goals in his 63 internationals – before Brazil went on to win 3-1.

Wistfully, Masopust recalled: “Of all my memories it was the best of all my career to be playing in the World Cup Final – and we were so close [to winning].

“At first we were disappointed to bring away only the silver medal because not only had we reached the Final but we had been in front. But, a few weeks later, we were happy we had won silver.”

His personal consolation was to be hailed European Footballer of the Year, the first eastern European winner of the award.

Born in Most, 50 miles northwest of Prague on February 9, 1931, he played for the local team before joining Dukla – and the army – in 1952. He won eight league titles and four cups before being permitted to move abroad to Belgium where he led Crossing Molenbeek, as player-coach, to promotion.

Nominally a left-half, his interpretation of the role was more akin to the old-fashioned attacking centre-half who was the central focus of the team. He was still performing that way, at 34, when, along with fellow Czechoslovak half-backs Svatopluk Pluskal and Jan Popluhar, he played in Stanley Matthews’ farewell match at Stoke City’s old Victoria Ground in 1965.

As a coach he guided Zbrojovka Brno to the Czechoslovak league title, and was later his country’s head coach for four years before going abroad to work for a while in Indonesia.

However, it was as a player – and a fine one, whatever the generation – that his name deserves to be remembered.

regularly was no longer possible.

The respect in which he was held then, and back in his playing days in the 1950s and 1960s, was obvious from the manner in which old colleagues – Vaclav Masek and Josef Jelinek among them – referred to him deferentially as “Mr Masopust”.

Jelinek said: “When I joined Dukla in the late 1950s it was the army club. We all wore uniform off the pitch and the older players had ranks. After I had been playing there two weeks, Mr Masopust said to me: ‘I know I am a captain but you don’t have to call me that on the pitch.’”

Masek recalled: “I played for two years with Dukla during my national service but otherwise I played all my career with Sparta. So I knew Mr Masopust as both a team-mate – also for the national team

### Angelo NICULESCU (1921–2015)

Introduced a passing style when appointed coach of Romania in 1976, and a year later led the country to its first World Cup finals in almost three decades. Also took the national side to the quarter-finals of the European Championship in 1972. At club level he coached Dinamo Bucharest to the league title in 1955 and 1965.

### CARLINHOS (1937–2015)

Nicknamed “the violin” for his elegant style, Luis Carlos Nunes da Silva played over 500 games for Flamengo before taking over as coach of the club. He had several spells in charge, during which time he won the Brazilian championship twice.

### ZITO (1932–2015)

A World Cup winner with Brazil in 1958 and 1962, the midfielder was a goalscorer in the 3-1 victory over Czechoslovakia in the Final of the latter tournament. Won the Libertadores Cup twice with Santos, in 1962 and 1963, and later joined the club’s back-room staff, recruiting such stars as Robinho in 1996 and Neymar in 2003.

### Dribbling skills are in danger of meeting a violent end

On YouTube you can find a grainy, black-and-white video clip from a 1968 game in Brazil, between Santos and Botafogo. It shows Santos forward Kaneko dribbling into the Botafogo penalty area, where he suddenly performs the perfect “donkey manoeuvre”, flipping the ball up with his heel, over his own head and over the defender. The execution is perfect and Kaneko runs on to set up Toninho to score.

Kaneko never became a great player, but he was long remembered for that “*lambretta*”. We now leap forward 47 years, to the 2015 Spanish Cup Final between Barcelona and Athletic Bilbao. Another “*lambretta*”, this one from Barca’s Neymar. But whereas Kaneko’s effort had been greeted with cheers, smiles and celebrations, Neymar’s caused immediate turmoil.

First, it didn’t work, because the defender involved, Unai Bustinza, made no attempt to turn and chase the ball. Instead, he simply stepped into Neymar’s path, stuck out an arm and pulled him down. After that came a disgraceful explosion of hostility and aggression from the Bilbao players as they tried, with frightening persistence, to get at Neymar.

Leading the charge was the intimidating 6’1” defender Xabier Etxeita, who had to be seriously restrained by Barcelona players and his own team-mates.

The Bilbao players were furious, claiming that Neymar was showboating, trying to make fools of them. No doubt they were also frustrated. There were only minutes remaining in the game, they were losing 3-1 and had been thoroughly outplayed.

The ugliness lasted for just one minute, but it was a minute of madness that starkly exposed just how the sport’s attitudes have hardened since the days of Kaneko. Back then, the “*lambretta*” was an exciting bit of dribbling trickery, to be admired and applauded.

How things have changed. Football, once a dribbler-friendly sport that encouraged creativity, open play and goalscoring has darkened. The harsher, more

miserly, mean-spirited attitudes of defensive play now dominate the game.

Inevitably, in a game where dour defenders and bossy goalkeepers rule, the goals have dried up. The three World Cup tournaments played during the 1950s averaged 4.3 goals a game. By the end of the century, in three World Cups of the 1990s, scoring average had dropped to just 2.25.

Those who predicted that this was a temporary state of affairs, a swing of the scoring pendulum that would quickly be reversed, were wrong. The four 21st century World Cups have shown only a slight increase, up to 2.4 goals, but in the four Finals, the goals have shrivelled to 1.5 per game.

The feeling that it is OK for defenders to foul opponents who have beaten them seems now to be firmly implanted in football. TV experts tell us “he had no choice, he had to bring him down”, and are quite likely to confirm their own judgment by adding “that was a good foul”.

The plea that referees do more to protect

skilful players from violent tackles is heard repeatedly in football – and it has to be repeated because the referees rarely respond. But here we have something rather different. Defenders apparently needing protection from too-skilful opponents.

Neymar’s “*lambretta*” may not cause physical injury, but it’s a slur on the opponent’s dignity. Neymar has perfected a dazzling piece of skill, a perfectly legal move, but it’s more than defenders can cope with.

Next time, before performing his trick,

Neymar must at least consider the scoreline. If Barca are losing, it’s probably OK. But if they’re winning comfortably, then, please, no “*lambrettas*”. Cristiano Ronaldo might also consider limiting his stepovers – just two if Real Madrid are winning, maybe up to four if they’re losing. Would that be acceptable?

While this may take colour and excitement and goals out of the game, we are asked to concede that it’s all in a good cause – making life easier for the poor defenders. **WS**

## Fearful Blatter skips USA as FIFA crisis continues



**No show...winners USA receive their medals but Blatter missed the Women's World Cup as the FIFA crisis spread**

The Cold War has been revived by the FIFA crisis. Sepp Blatter is happy to travel to Russia for the forthcoming World Cup qualifying draw but daring to visit North America for the Women's World Cup Final was out of the question.

Blatter, if the United States Department of Justice should want to meet him face-to-face, is a Swiss citizen and cannot be extradited from the country – like fearful Brazilians back home in South America, such as Ricardo Teixeira and Marco Polo Del Nero.

Football is bigger than its individual officials – who come and go, though some stick around longer than others – and, indeed, far bigger than FIFA. Certainly, the senior World Cup underwrites the losses of all the other competitions but FIFA, to some extent, has deliberately created that dependency system to suit its own purpose.

The reverberations from Blatter's decision to "lay down his mandate" continue ever since being originally greeted with a mixture of delight and relief from – among others – UEFA president Michel Platini and Olympic leader Thomas Bach. But not by everyone. His words were met with regret in Africa and suspicion elsewhere that this represented merely some further Machiavellian power-game play.

FIFA has had only eight presidents in its 111 years. All have been European except for

Brazilian Joao Havelange, but there was no likelihood this time around that a European candidate – not even Platini – would be favourite. Beyond Europe, a great deal of resentment already burned over what was viewed in some quarters as a UEFA coup.

Fikile Mbalula, sports minister of 2010 World Cup host South Africa, indicated regional concern by paying tribute to Blatter as the FIFA president who "has been a good friend to South Africa [and] played a major role in terms of shifting the world to focus on Africa in terms of hosting the World Cup for the first time".

That hosting itself now came into focus over the mysterious \$10million which the South Africans had paid to the notorious Jack Warner, via FIFA, for a diaspora legacy development fund in the Caribbean. Currency exchange controls had prevented the South African World Cup organisation from paying the money direct, so it was paid by FIFA and deducted from a hosting grant due to South Africa.

The payment was approved by FIFA's finance chairman and senior vice-president at the time, the late Julio Grondona, and effected by Jerome Valcke, then the new secretary-general.

Warner himself returned to the spotlight through the US extradition application in Trinidad. He had obtained bail and, after promising at various times never to speak

about football again, threatened an "avalanche" of evidence regarding corruption within FIFA.

In a televised address entitled "The gloves are off", and broadcast in Trinidad & Tobago, Warner said he would reveal everything he knows including allegations of FIFA meddling in his country's 2010 general election.

Privately, and more significantly, he engaged lawyers with a successful track record for blocking and delaying extradition applications.

South Africa was not the only hosting award under fire. Japan's bid for the 2002 World Cup was targeted by a former aide of ex-CONMEBOL president Nicolas Leoz claiming that \$1.5m had been paid in return for the South American confederation's support. Current chairman Ohito KuniWataru denied it, after an examination of the JFA's accounts, saying: "There is no record of any such remittance at all".

Blatter's announcement was also a severe blow to Qatar. Slowly, gradually, the fuss over the 2022 World Cup host award had been fading, but now it was open season on the Gulf state again. To be fair, Qatar did not help itself when the government's advisory council rejected even comparatively mild proposals for a reform of laws relating to migrant workers.

Meanwhile, in Switzerland itself, Domenico Scala, the compliance chairman charged with overseeing the election, said he thought a maximum of 12 years – as per the International Olympic Committee – was long enough for any president.

Simultaneously, in South America, investigators from the tax agency prepared to delve into Grondona's family funds and also the late AFA leader's links to the TyC marketing group, several of whose senior officials were being pursued by the US Department of Justice.

TyC was heavily involved with Grondona in creating the Futbol Para Todos TV football deal through which the government channelled cash which was supposed to help alleviate club debts – not that any of Argentina's clubs has shown the slightest signs of a return to solvency, prompting the obvious questions.

So it went on, day by day, one step after another:

- TyC's Argentinian marketing executive Alejandro Burzaco surrendered to police in Italy.
- Former Brazilian star Zico said he intended to run for FIFA's presidency.
- Swiss investigators gathered more documents

and electronic data from FIFA headquarters in their inquiries into the 2018-2022 World Cup bid scandal.

- The Pope's charity decided not to accept promised cash donations from the Copa America from scandal-hit CONMEBOL.
- Ex-Brazil CBF boss Jose Maria Marin failed in a bid to leave a Swiss jail for house arrest on health grounds.

Ever more serious image-battering followed, starting with the sudden departure of FIFA's communications director Walter De Gregorio, followed by Interpol's decision to freeze its anti-matchfixing partnership with FIFA.

De Gregorio left suddenly, after nearly four years' spinning for Blatter, as the victim of his own ill-timed joke ("The FIFA president, the director of communications and the general secretary are all sitting in a car – who is driving? The police.")

He had been brought in, specifically by Blatter, to bring a more aggressive, instant-response approach to FIFA's PR work. As a journalist and former war correspondent he appeared ironically

appropriate to the task in hand.

However his attempt, pre-congress, to portray the arrests of the "Zurich Seven" as a "good day" for FIFA was derided and he crossed swords with Blatter over the president's reliance on veteran PR guru Klaus Stohlker.

The joke was on FIFA again when Interpol halted the \$20m, 10-year partnership launched to great fanfare back in May 2011. Its then general-secretary Ronald Noble was a regular speaker at major FIFA events until his departure last year.

The suspension decision was taken by Noble's successor, Jurgen Stock, and endorsed by Interpol's executive committee meeting in Lyon. The FIFA agreement had included a clause stating that "the funding party declares notably that its activities are compatible with the principles, aims and activities of Interpol". Clearly Interpol now believed this assurance no longer valid.

Blatter, however, carried on as if nothing untoward were happening. He even dropped mischievous comments to the Swiss media about his departure, prompting an irritated Scala to tell him, in effect, to stop playing word games. This putdown was followed by what, to Blatter, would have been far more painful – the Nobel Peace Centre's decision to call a halt to its partnership with the embattled world federation.

Blatter's Nobel Peace Prize ambition was long a source of wonder among FIFA-watchers as, over the previous three years, he had exhorted listeners at almost every occasion to share the Handshake of Peace. A statement from the Peace Centre acknowledged the positive symbolism of the Handshake for Peace but urged the Norwegian football federation to come up with a different promotional context and/or partner. Back in 2012 NPC executive director Bente Erichsen said: "I'm sure this partnership can contribute to the

good of the game and develop respect" Now that respect had vanished.

Lids continued being lifted in all directions on the murky business in which some senior football officials had engaged down the years. None of the alleged deals – particularly concerning Warner and a cabal of South American "grandees" involved Blatter directly. But everything shown or reported to have gone on took place "on his watch".

New claims emerged over former CBF president Teixeira's links with Qatar

and allegations of the extravagant extent of the money laundering and profiteering undertaken at the behest of Leoz, while president of CONMEBOL. Leoz, one of the 14 men sought by the US Department of Justice, remained out of sight under house arrest. Paraguayan law forbade that someone of his age should be held in prison.

Next came the seven-year ban imposed on Chilean Harold Mayne-Nicholls, the technical assessment leader who handed the FIFA ExCo the self-evidently obvious caution that it is too hot in the summer in Qatar to stage a conventional World Cup.

Mayne-Nicholls, who had considered challenging Blatter in May's presidential election, was a potential candidate again. Whatever the outcome of his likely appeals to both FIFA and then perhaps the Court of Arbitration for Sport, he has been effectively removed from the computations.

An ExCo extraordinary meeting on July 20 will decide the date of the new election. Blatter has suggested January, maybe so he can lord it at the overblown FIFA Gala one last time. He derided an initial suggestion of December 16 because this would sit right in the middle of the Club World Cup in Japan.

But then, as the Women's World Cup proved, the presence or absence of FIFA grandees is irrelevant when the game itself demands priority. **WS**

### Blind replaces Hiddink as coach of Holland’s national side

Former Ajax captain **DANNY BLIND** was appointed national coach of Holland following the departure of Guus Hiddink, who had overseen the team’s stuttering start to the Euros.

Blind, an assistant to Hiddink and the previous coach Louis Van Gaal, has been tasked with rescuing Holland’s qualifying campaign. The 2014 World Cup semi-finalists currently lie third in their group, five points behind leaders Iceland and three points behind Czech Republic, with four games remaining.

Blind, whose only other coaching experience was a short spell in charge of Ajax, has signed a contract until August 2018, with an “evaluation moment” planned next summer.

“Reaching the European Championship is my only goal,” said Blind, who will be assisted by Marco Van Basten. “Only qualifying for Euro 2016 counts.”

Hiddink had been in his third spell as national coach and was contracted until after the Euro 2016 finals.

## England's women tread fine line from the sublime to the ridiculous

As Groucho Marx might have said, I've heard of patriotism but this is ridiculous. The day after England's women had beaten their German equivalents in the third-place World Cup play-off, a daily paper correspondent began his report: "A quarter of a century of hurt consigned to the rubbish bin. Revenge for Italia 90, an historic first win over Germany in a World Cup finals since 1966, and the journey from losers to legends."

The world bathos springs irresistibly to remind. If comparisons are odious, then this one is surely ludicrous. It might be added that, worthy though this victory was, it happened in a third-place match

and not in the Final. But should it be bathos or pathos? Has English football, as played by male teams, sunk so low that consolation has to be obtained from the women's game? The mind boggles.

There were those who compared and contrasted this victory with the mediocre showing of the under-21 (male) team in the European finals in the Czech Republic. Yet how calamitous, in retrospect, was this? Largely ignored was the fact that in a subsequent round, the Portugal team that had beaten England 1-0 put five goals past Germany later on.

And it is worth pointing out that the bright Italy team which humbled England in their third match didn't include a single player capped at senior level.

It was expected that, having missed the first two games through injury, Everton's centre-back John Stones would give stability to the defence on his return, but he was poor against the Italians.

who wants to impose the same tactics on every England team at all levels. An orthodoxy reminiscent of the dire days of the disastrous Charles Hughes, with his warmed up, remote theories based on those long obsolete of Wing Commander Charles Reep. I don't think the new orthodoxy goes nearly as far, but it still seems dubious.

We are hearing the siren song of Greg Dyke, chairman of the FA, with his dreams of England winning the 2022 World Cup. Dream on.

For the moment, celebrations of the England women's feats continue.

As long ago as February we learned that, despite the minor miracles he had achieved with Brentford, he would be leaving at the end of the season. Which in the event concluded with the anticlimax of double defeat in the play-offs by Middlesbrough.

To the dismay of Bees' supporters, the club's wealthy owner Matthew Benham, whose fortune has been made in betting endeavours, clashed with Warburton over transfer policies.

Benham is convinced his own programme will lead to success, but the proof of the pudding will be in the eating.

Meanwhile, he has said, "every decision I take is intended to be in the best long-term interests of the club. I am single minded in my resolve that we can leave no stone unturned in our quest for sustainable Premier League football".

We shall see. It may well be that he has

overturned the wrong stone. Warburton is unique in the way he has emerged from being a successful City gent via a coaching course to become such a highly effective manager. That Rangers should appoint him – that extreme rarity in their long history, an English manager – was itself remarkable.

And what vast rebuilding he will have to do at a club who speedily fell apart under one dubious regime after another. They now have Mike Ashley, the billionaire sports goods entrepreneur, nominally in the background but bound to call the shots just as he so controversially does at Newcastle United. Ashley has already installed one of his familiar proxies in a crucial administrative role.

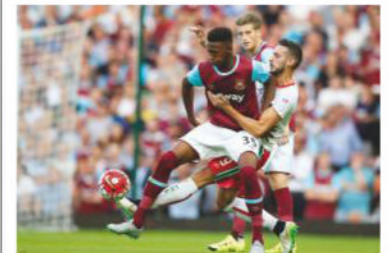
Twice humiliated by modest Motherwell in last season's play-offs, Rangers still languish after all those decades of triumph in the Scottish second tier. Warburton will presumably be given enough money to buy better players. Of his own abilities there can be no doubt.

## Who can follow the volatile Pearson?

"Goodbye, moral victories," was a headline in Chile's *La Tercera* newspaper the day after the national team won its first senior title. Meanwhile, the *Ultimas Noticias* paper declared that "the glory took 99 years to arrive, but the wait was worthwhile".

For the neutral, Chile's penalty shoot-out win in the Copa America Final after a disappointing goalless draw with Argentina may have seemed a relatively tame way to win the trophy.

## Copa America

Round-by-round

### Group A

Chile got the tournament under way with a wobbly 2-0 win over Ecuador, in Santiago, both second-half goals coming at times when the Ecuadorians were looking the better side.

The hosts were back to their best in their next game, against Mexico, and their high-tempo football was a delight to watch. But the deficiencies of the defence were cruelly exposed in a 3-3 draw that was overshadowed by the next day's events.

Returning to the team's training camp, Arturo Vidal crashed his Ferrari with alcohol in his system but Sampaoli insisted he remain part of the squad. Already assured of a quarter-final place, Chile then turned on the style to beat Bolivia 5-0 in their final group game.

Despite that humbling, Bolivia had also already qualified before their last match. They began with a tame 0-0 draw with Mexico and then took advantage of atrocious Ecuadorian defending to race into a 3-0 lead. Ecuador came roaring back, scoring twice, missing a penalty and laying siege to the Bolivian goal. They could not find an equaliser and a closing 2-1 win over Mexico was not enough to squeeze them into the last eight.

### Group B

With an embarrassment of attacking riches and their stars seemingly fitter than at the World Cup, Argentina raced into a two-goal lead against Paraguay in their opening game.

Paraguay went chasing the game, giving Argentina numerous chances to kill things off. But as the chances went begging, and with coach Gerardo Martino under fire for his substitutions, Paraguay scored twice late on to secure a 2-2 draw.

Doubts about Argentina's ability to last 90 minutes were not entirely cleared up, even though they won their next two games without conceding.

With Sergio Aguero looking especially sharp, they beat Uruguay 1-0, but looked ragged towards the end, as they did in the 1-0 victory over Jamaica – in which Lionel Messi won his 100th cap.

Paraguay came second, despite a slim 1-0 win over Jamaica and a grim, 1-1 draw with a Uruguay side making typically solid progress and, who, like everyone else, beat Jamaica 1-0.

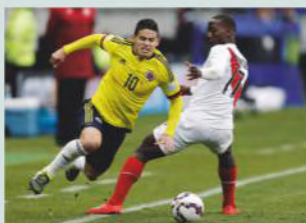
The tightest of the three groups went into the last round of games with all four sides level on points and capable of finishing either top or bottom.

Up until then it was a week dominated by Brazil's captain, Neymar, who in stoppage time of the opening 2-1 victory over Peru capped a fine individual display with a pass of almost absurd vision to set up the winner for Douglas Costa. A shaky team performance seemed to highlight just how dependent Brazil were on their number 10 – who was marked out of the next game by a superb defensive midfield performance from Colombia's Carlos Sanchez. This gave Colombia the platform to win a scrappy game 1-0 – and such was Neymar's frustration he was sent off after the final whistle. He made matters worse by abusing the referee and was banned for four games, removing him from the tournament.

Willian stepped up to play the lead role in a 2-1 win over Venezuela that put Brazil into the knockout stage.

Despite their victory over Brazil, Colombia had a disappointing group programme. Abel Aguilar's injury absence was keenly felt as the midfield lacked his ability to link things together. Radamel Falcao did not look sharp, and the need to play another striker alongside him put more pressure on the central midfield pairing of Sanchez and Edwin Valencia, who are more equipped to mark than create. No coincidence, then, that in the two games in which Colombia had to take the initiative they failed to score, losing 1-0 to Venezuela and drawing 0-0 with Peru.

Colombia went through as one of the best third-place teams, while Peru finished second by virtue of having scored more goals, thanks to a 1-0 win over Venezuela who were reduced to 10 men in the first half.

game, the title was theirs at long last. *La Tercera* caught the mood on its front page, stating: "*La Roja*" threw off its chronic fatalism. The tactical scheme of [coach Jorge] Sampaoli neutralised and minimised Messi's Argentina" Inside, sports editor Jose Miguez apportioned the credit, writing: "Sampaoli. It was Sampaoli. There was also a bit of luck, finally on Chile's side after the roulette wheel has so many times been an enemy. But this title is a direct consequence of his work. The coach won the Final"

In the cold light of a midwinter Chilean morning, it is possible to trace the process back a little further, to 2007. That was when Chile revealed an excellent crop of youngsters – with Alexis Sanchez, Arturo Vidal, Gary Medel and Mauricio Isla all part of the side that came third in that year's Under-20 World Cup. This, in turn, meant there would be some promising raw material for the new senior coach to work with. His name was Marcelo Bielsa, and

his appointment was fundamental to Chile's change in fortunes.

Chilean football, as former great Elias Figueroa told *World Soccer* in a special feature on the country over 11 years ago, had always suffered from an identity crisis – until Bielsa came along. He had previously struggled to have his methods accepted when in charge of his native Argentina, but with Chile he had a blank canvas. It was a situation he relished and his ideas were imposed and unopposed. Chile would play high-tempo, pressing football in the opposition's half of the field, looking to dominate the game wherever it was played and whoever it was against.

The young Chileans took to the idea with great enthusiasm and began to take



the field with no inferiority crisis. The emphasis on wing play, with the ceaseless quest to set up two-against-one situations down the flanks, chimed well with the type of player that Chilean football produces: quick, elusive wingers.

And it was more than just Chilean football that benefited; Chilean society also embraced the new national team, with their bold approach striking a chord with a traditionally staid public that was

growing in confidence after years of living under a dictatorship.

Bielsa resigned early in 2011 and, after a brief interlude under Claudio Borghi, at the end of the following year Chile turned to Sampaoli, a self-confessed Bielsa disciple. But while the pupil is perhaps a little more flexible than the master, the basic idea stays the same – even if its interpretations can vary.

Before the opening game of the 2015

Copa, Sampaoli claimed to have 18 different ideas in his head. In the event, he used six of them, tinkering with his team in every match, even if not all were impressed. After the second game, a 3-3 draw with Mexico, Alvaro Poblete wrote in *La Tercera*: “Sampaoli tries to come across as an illuminated man of football, and all Chile suffers.

### CHILE 1 URUGUAY 0

Despite pressing remorselessly against an opponent steeped in dogged defence, and enjoying 80 per cent possession, Chile had problems turning their domination into clear chances in Santiago – even after Uruguay went down to 10 men just after the hour.

Perhaps not in the best frame of mind after his father had been involved in a traffic accident the day before in which a motorcyclist had died, Uruguay centre-forward Edinson Cavani reacted with a slap after Gonzalo Jara pressed a finger against his backside. Already on a yellow, Cavani was sent off, while Jara was later handed a three-match ban.

Chile badly needed physical presence in the penalty area, which sub Mauricio Pinilla was to provide. With 10 minutes left, Pinilla and Arturo Vidal attacked a cross, forcing goalkeeper Fernando Muslera to punch clear to the edge of the area. Showing admirable calm, Jorge Valdivia rolled the ball square for Mauricio Isla to fire home.

There was no way back for Uruguay, especially when left-back Jorge Fucile was harshly sent off – which led to Uruguayan players pushing and jostling a linesman. Already without Luis Suarez and now Cavani for the start of the World Cup qualifiers, Uruguay could yet face further sanctions.

### PERU 3 BOLIVIA 1

Bolivia switched to three centre-backs in Temuco, but they could have fielded 10 and still been unable to stop the supply to Peru striker Paolo Guerrero.

The top goalscorer of the last Copa rose into the defence to head Peru into the lead after 19 minutes. Three

minutes later, he all but made the game safe as Peru broke quickly and midfielder Cristian Cueva curled a wonderful pass behind the defence for Guerrero to stroke home.

Bolivia had done little in the competition, owing their qualification to a mad few minutes of defending by Ecuador in the group phase. But now, deep in trouble, they produced their best performance, with the set-pieces of Martin Smedberg-Dalence – a 31-year-old Swedish-born midfielder who coach Mauricio Soria introduced to the side – impressive. However, any chance of a comeback ended when Danny Bejerano's suicidal ball across the face of his own back line allowed Guerrero to run through and complete his hat-trick. A penalty by Marcelo Martins Moreno was mere consolation.

**ARGENTINA 0 COLOMBIA 0**

*(Argentina win 5-4 on penalties)*

The heavyweight clash in Vina del Mar confirmed much about these two sides so far in the competition, as Argentina again failed to turn domination into goals and Colombia were unable to control midfield.

Colombia coach Jose Pekerman left captain Radamel Falcao on the bench and still went with two strikers. But with specialist man-marker Carlos Sanchez suspended, his side were being overrun in midfield. Lionel Messi, Angel Di Maria Sergio Aguero and Javier Pastore had the freedom of the park.

After 23 minutes, Pekerman had seen enough and replaced a striker with an extra midfielder, but it made little difference as Argentina still did everything but score. David Ospina produced an extraordinary double save to deny Aguero and then Messi.

The second half was a little more even there but in a late Argentinian onslaught Ever Banega clipped the bar and a Nicolas Otamendi volley hit the far post and rolled along the line before substitute Carlos Tevez had a shot cleared off the line.

Four years ago Tevez's miss in the

Copa quarter-final shoot-out against Uruguay saw Argentina eliminated. He did not figure in Argentina's first six penalty takers this time, but when Jeison Murillo, so impressive at centre-back for Colombia, sent his penalty high into the night, Tevez finally stepped up to fire home and achieve a little bit of redemption.

**PARAGUAY 1 BRAZIL 1**

*(Paraguay win 4-3 on penalties)*

Paraguay knocked Brazil out of the Copa on penalties in the quarter-finals four years ago, but that looked an unlikely outcome this time when Brazil took an early lead with a wonderfully constructed goal, Robinho sweeping home a cross from Dani Alves.

Brazil sat back and waited for the chance to kill off the game on the counter-attack. But Paraguay coach Ramon Diaz told his defence to sit deep and push up aggressively and the side started to exert a stranglehold. Then, just as he had for Paris Saint-Germain against Chelsea in the Champions League, Thiago Silva conceded a needless penalty by jumping with his arm above his head and Derlis Gonzalez equalised from the spot.

The game went to penalties. Brazil's Everton Ribeiro and Douglas Costa missed before Gonzalez shot high and true to send Paraguay into the semi-finals again.

► coach? But it was the coach who had the last laugh.

He had prepared for the tournament in the knowledge that playing at home would change things. Opponents would be less likely to commit players forward, meaning Chile could not be as direct as usual and would have to have more patience in their possession – hence the fact that playmaker Jorge Valdivia, who in the World Cup only started against Australia, was a fixture throughout the competition.

Sampaoli had also thought deeply on how to beat the best. Under Bielsa, Chile had steamed forward and been picked off by the Brazilian counter-attack. Sampaoli had apparently gone into the tournament expecting to meet Brazil in the Final and had taken precautions, using a friendly against Dunga's side at the end of March as a laboratory.

With the full-backs choosing their moment to push forward, and Charles

Aranguiz working overtime as part of a midfield block, Sampaoli satisfied himself that he could slow down the Brazilian counter – and the same formula worked well for the Final against Argentina. Without renouncing their attacking ideals, Chile took more precautions, and concentrated on isolating Lionel Messi from his team-mates. It could have gone wrong, as Messi managed to slip away in the last minute of normal time and set up a counter which Gonzalo Higuain, straining to arrive, just failed to steer inside the far post. On such narrow margins are historic triumphs constructed.

And so Chile join Bolivia, Colombia, Paraguay and Peru among South America's lesser winners of the world's

## Semi-finals

### CHILE 2 PERU 1

For the first 20 minutes, there looked to be a real chance of a shock result. Peru took the game to Chile, with winger Andre Carrillo and Paolo Guerrero proving a handful for a Chile defence lacking the suspended Gonzalo Jara. His replacement Jorge Rojas seemed overawed and there was a nervous hush around Santiago's National stadium.

But, and not for the first time in his international career, Peru centre-back Carlos Zambrano lost his head. He had already been involved in a couple of spats, and was on a yellow, when he received a straight red card for an ugly, unnecessary high footed stamp on Charles Aranguiz.

It was now far easier for Chile, who took the lead shortly before half time, when a cross-cum-shot from Alexis Sanchez came back off the far post and was bundled home by Eduardo Vargas, who should have been given offside.

A goal and a man up, Chile looked set for a routine win. But their complacency was shattered on the hour. Guerrero sent Luis Advinula away, and with his excellent cross heading towards Carrillo, Gary Medel's attempt to intercept diverted the ball past his own keeper.

Home nerves were soon settled, though, when Vargas left fly from 25 metres with a shot that caught keeper Pedro Gallese unawares, and he won the game for Chile with his 22nd goal at international level.

Peru ended up with some consolation for a promising campaign. They deservedly beat Paraguay 2-0 to claim third place.

### ARGENTINA 6 PARAGUAY 1

All those goals that Argentina had been threatening to score finally appeared in Concepcion and they were 2-0 up early on. Marcos Rojo forced home the first after a free kick, and Javier Pastore soon added a second after Lionel Messi dropped deep as a decoy and threaded the ball between the lines for Pastore to exploit.

But Paraguay kept pressing, and were rewarded soon before half-time when aggressive marking in the Argentina half resulted in a loose ball being smashed home by Lucas Barrios.

Argentina came out after the break determined not to be caught twice in the same trap as in the group game, and this time it took them just seven minutes to kill things off. Messi and Javier Mascherano combined to send Pastore away and he sent in Angel Di Maria to score. Then Paraguay were caught with too many men upfield, Messi took out the defence and Pastore's cross flicked off the keeper and was volleyed home by Di Maria.

There was time for two more, in which Argentina demonstrated their strength up front. First Agüero burst between the centre-backs and glanced Di Maria's cross into the far corner. Then he was replaced by Gonzalo Higuain, who immediately made his mark, rounding off yet another Messi-inspired move.

## Final

### CHILE 0 ARGENTINA 0

*(Chile won 4-1 on penalties)*

Chile finally have something to put in their trophy cabinet. After 99 years and 43 previous versions of the Copa America they became the eighth nation to win the competition – even if a potentially wonderful final did not come close to living up to expectations.

But, as Argentina coach Gerardo Martino said afterwards: “The two sides did not have the opportunity to show their football.

“We cancelled each other out. Argentina didn't shine, Chile didn't shine. Messi was controlled, Agüero as well. But then so were Jorge Valdivia and Alexis Sanchez of Chile.”

Argentina had shown signs during the tournament of end-of-season tiredness and Martino complained after the group game against Uruguay that his men seemed unable to sustain their rhythm for the full 90 minutes. But in the Final, despite coming off the back of a 6-1 semi-final thrashing of Paraguay, his team never really established their rhythm.

It must have seemed like Groundhog Day for Argentina, because so many memories of last year's World Cup campaign came flooding back: Angel Di Maria, after a bright start, pulling up injured early on; Messi seemingly short of gas and restricting himself to spurts; the vital chance that fell

to Gonzalo Higuain, this time in the last minute of normal time, when he arrived fractionally late at the far post and was unable to steer the ball home.

The stalemate also resulted from the fact Chile worked so hard to defend collectively.

Jorge Sampaoli, for the sixth time in six games, changed his starting line-up, this time using a back three of Francisco Silva, Marcelo Diaz and Gary Medel – all converted midfielders. All were booked in a first half when the momentum seemed to be with Argentina. Chile keeper Claudio Bravo produced a reflex save to block a close range Agüero header then stood up well to stop a shot from Ezequiel Lavezzi, who had replaced Di Maria.

But Chile wrested the initiative after the break, closing down Argentina in midfield, interrupting the circuit between Messi and Javier Pastore which had proved so effective during the competition. The lung power and unsung versatility of Charles Aranguiz, the motor of the Chile midfield, made him a strong contender for man of the match.

Chile looked fresher in extra time, and carried that spirit into the shoot out. The key moment was the third penalty. Mati Fernandez and Lionel Messi had both scored when Arturo Vidal stepped up for Chile. And then the hapless Higuain fired over the bar, and Chile were in front. Fittingly, Aranguiz made no mistake and when Bravo saved from Ever Banega, Chile had two chances to seal the win.

In the end they only needed the one. Alexis Sanchez went for the little dink down the middle, Sergio Romero was committed to the dive and the Chilean party could begin.

WORLD CUP PROSPECTS

After a year of friendlies, the Copa America kicked off a new cycle of competitive matches in South America. Indeed, many of the coaches, new in their jobs and with little preparation time, made no secret that the priority in the tournament was preparing a team for the 2018 World Cup qualifiers, which get under way in October. From that point of view, then, how did the teams emerge from the Copa?

**ARGENTINA**

Amid the trauma of yet another Final defeat, Gerardo Martino pointed out that "the positive side is that we've found our style". However, it is a style that would surely work better with more defensive pace, allowing the back line to play higher and the team to stay more compact. Martino took a very experienced squad to the Copa; presumably new players can be filtered into the process in next year's Centenary Copa and in the Olympics.

**BOLIVIA**

Making it out of the group, though almost entirely dependent on a dreadful 45 minutes' defending by Ecuador, was a big boost, and Mauricio Soria's team gave a good account of themselves in the 3-1 quarter-final defeat by Peru. Swedish born Martin Smedberg-Dalence looks a find, and if there may be some heavy defeats ahead, there are legitimate hopes the new bolder style might help the team do better away from the extreme altitude of La Paz.

**BRAZIL**

Ten consecutive friendly wins under Dunga were soon shown up to count for little once the competitive action started. True, a few important players were absent through injury, but Brazil go into the qualifiers with confidence undermined and Neymar suspended for the first two games – and every match in the qualifiers that they fail to win sets off another mini crisis. Interesting times ahead – might they even lead to a change of direction?

**CHILE**

Which way from here? The last Copa hosts to win the trophy, Colombia in 2001, suffered in the qualification campaign. Chile should gain confidence from finally claiming a title, but there is a natural tendency to ease off after the triumph, which ever-intense coach Jorge Sampaoli will need to guard against. He may also have to do without playmaker Jorge Valdivia, who is off to play in the UAE. But there is a big question looming on the horizon: how are Chile going to replace their golden generation?

▶ oldest continental competition, and for the seventh time in 44 versions, the Copa America eluded one of the traditional big three.

Record winners Uruguay were always unlikely to make an especially convincing defence of the title they won in Argentina four years ago, as they were without Luis Suarez and primarily concerned with rebuilding the team. Even so, the lack of ambition in their play sparked a debate back home, with questions being asked whether coach Oscar Tabarez has become addicted to fighting inside a bunker.

There is debate, too, in Brazil, after a hugely disappointing campaign. A group of notables has been summoned to discuss the underperformance of Brazilian football – a move which would have made much more sense a year ago, when the national team had months of friendlies ahead of them. On the eve of World Cup qualification – and with Dunga, seemingly obsessed with the counter-attack, ratified

organisation under siege. President Juan Angel Napout did at last make an appearance at the Final to hand over the trophy, but he, and many national association leaders spent most of their time at home, dealing with the scandal and its fallout. Investigations into FAs are being carried out all over the continent. During the tournament, a meeting in Brazil of South American government prosecutors made a formal request to the USA authorities to pass on the evidence unearthed by the FBI.

In less fraught days, CONMEBOL had awarded the 2015 Copa to Chile, in March 2012, after a deal was reached with Brazil, the original hosts, to switch the order so that they will now host 2019.

With just three years to prepare, Chile made a modest investment in stadiums, with nine being used in eight different cities, making this far more of a nationwide competition than the five previous Copas staged in Chile, and the 1962 World

as coach – it is difficult to see where change will come from.

Argentina limped away after losing their third Final in the last four tournaments: two of them on penalty shoot-outs. Javier Mascherano, present in all of those Finals, plus that of the 2014 World Cup, spoke of feeling cursed. The wait for a senior title is now 22 years and counting, but there might be another chance in June 2016, with the proposed Centenary Copa in the United States.

There are two caveats here, though. One is that a third consecutive end-of-season international tournament is a strain too much on the players and the key men will surely be rested for the World Cup qualifiers. The other is that there is no guarantee that the competition will go ahead, since allegations over the TV rights are at the epicentre of the FIFA scandal. CONMEBOL appears to be an

Cup. There were no organisational hitches, and an editorial in *La Tercera* went as far as to declare that the Copa was “organised in an impeccable manner, and with notable success in all the facets which nowadays pertain to these types of sporting events”.

Local interest was high and the point should be made that, while the stadiums outside Santiago are relatively small, most games were well attended, which is especially impressive as many of the matches took place in bitter evening cold.

The exception was Antofagasta in the north, which felt hard done by with its games – just two, both involving Jamaica – and stadium occupation there was just 34.3 per cent, well below the other venues.

Part of the success was down to the number of travelling fans, a relatively new development for the Copa, reflecting the fact that the continent has become wealthier. The Colombian hordes, first witnessed in Argentina four years ago, were back, and if they did not have too much to celebrate, they could at least roar their team to its first victory over Brazil

since James Rodriguez was precisely one day old.

While visiting supporters were rewarded with some stunning scenery, they also encountered an environmental problem. In Santiago and some of the other cities, especially Temuco, the quality of the air was very poor. Santiago sits in a valley, and in winter, when wood fires are burning, if there is little wind and no rain the pollution hangs in smog clouds above the city. The first genuine emergency since 1999 was declared, and there were lots of so-called “pre-emergencies”, with restrictions placed on car usage.

In a situation exacerbated by the driest June in decades, many experienced breathing problems.

On the Saturday that Chile won the trophy, there was a victory procession to La Moneda palace, where the players were greeted by president Michelle Bachelet. The next day the dry spell came to an end.

“The impossible happened,” trumpeted *La Quarta*. “We won the Copa, and a little water fell on Santiago.” Drizzle, yes, but it did not rain on Chile’s parade. **WS**

### **COLOMBIA**

This was the tournament when they aimed to ratify what they had done in the World Cup, and from that view they were a massive disappointment. Their attack did not shine and, oddly for a team coached by Jose Pekerman, there was very little midfield elaboration. Injured Abel Aguilar was missed and there is an urgent need to find all-round midfielders. At least the quest for a new centre-back was a success and Jeison Murillo had a fine tournament.

### **ECUADOR**

New coach Gustavo Quinteros was not devastated by first-round elimination. His team showed its considerable firepower, but were undermined by what he referred to as “gross errors” at the back. Tightening up the defence will be a priority. A possible problem is the spat between Antonio Valencia (who missed the tournament through injury) and local FA boss Luis Chiriboga, which shows the internal atmosphere is far from ideal.

### **PARAGUAY**

Exceeded all expectations by knocking out Brazil in the quarter-finals. A mixed bag for new coach Ramon Diaz, who, with little preparation time or local knowledge, understandably went with an experienced core of players, many of whom will have to be replaced in the course of the qualification campaign. They will go into the Russia 2018 campaign as an unknown quantity.

### **PERU**

Finishing third in the previous Copa ended up doing nothing for their dream of returning to the World Cup for the first time since 1982. Will it be any different this time? While their big-name strikers are all the other side of 30, a younger group of players – Pedro Gallese in goal, Luis Advincula at right-back, attacking midfielder Christian Cueva, striker Yordy Reyna – are coming through nicely. Their disastrous away record in recent years does, however, remain a big problem.

### **URUGUAY**

Suffered their first defeats since the World Cup, though both times they fought hard before going down 1-0. But has coach Oscar Tabarez become too obsessed with fighting from a bunker? Do they have the players for a more expansive game? This debate is going on in Uruguay, who will still be without Luis Suarez for the first four qualifying rounds. Prepare for another battle to claim the play-off position.

### **VENEZUELA**

Coming fourth in the previous Copa raised hopes they might be ready to qualify for their first World Cup. They were not realised in 2014, and it is not clear how they can be in Russia, either. New coach Noel Sanvicente managed to fashion a side with a fair degree of defensive solidity, but at the expense of attacking fluidity. They are competitive, but look to be short of the quality needed to grab a 2018 place.



## Sampaoli's triumph

Jonathan Wilson analyses how hosts Chile came out on top at the Copa America, thanks to their Argentinian coach



Where next for Jorge Sampaoli? Although he has a contract to stay on as Chile coach until the 2018 World Cup, he hinted after the Copa America Final that he may look to move on.

And he could hardly be blamed for doing so, because what he has achieved with Chile is remarkable.

From a financial point of view, Sampaoli is unlikely to ever be in a better negotiating position. But, from an emotional point of view, Chile's 99-year wait for a trophy with a win over his own native country, in a stadium where he achieved such success with Universidad de Chile, is unlikely to be topped. For, more than anything, Chile's triumph was Sampaoli's triumph.

It's true that the foundations of this

triumph were laid by Marcelo Bielsa, who was coach between 2007 and 2011, but after Claudio Borghi's disappointing reign, there was still plenty of work to be done.

Sampaoli, to a degree because of a lack of choice, kept the existing squad together and generated a spirit that was as near as it is possible to get in a national side to a club environment.

The basics of the way Chile played were no great surprise. They pressed hard and high, using Marcelo Diaz at the back of midfield to drop between the centre-backs and switch from a back four to a back three and release the full-backs. Arturo Vidal and Charles Aranguiz both worked exceptionally hard in midfield, their tactical intelligence vital to a system that switched

between 4-3-3 and 3-4-1-2. At the front, the shape replicated the back with Jorge Valdivia, so often such a frustrating player, operating behind a strike pairing of Alexis Sanchez and Eduardo Vargas, who would often split to allow him to advance between them. The result was a highly fluid style that produced by some way the most attractive football of the competition.

What was most impressive was how Chile – with the exception of a nervy semi-final against Peru – kept on correcting flaws. In the opening game, a slightly anxious 2-0 win over Ecuador, for instance, Jefferson Montero again and again exploited the space behind Mauricio Isla, while Chile seemed heavily focused on attacking down their right. That bias

disappeared thereafter and, after another shaky game against Mexico, no other left-winger really threatened to get in behind Isla, or at least not with the consistency Montero had.

A 3-3 draw with Mexico was more worrying for two other reasons, though. Firstly, that the Mexicans dominated a far shorter Chile side in the air, twice scoring with headers, and secondly that their third goal came from an extremely simple pass over the top because the Chilean back line had pushed up when there was no pressure on the ball.

The latter issue is why few international sides play a pressing game: it requires a cohesiveness that is extremely hard to generate when players are not playing and

training together every week. Sampaoli, though, presumably with further drilling on the practice pitch, ironed out the glitch.

The issue of height is rather different. Chile were the shortest team in the tournament, with an average height of 1.76m. There is not a huge amount that can be done about that, but Sampaoli was so worried about the threat that Uruguay posed from set-pieces that he strung up a tape 2m above the ground and had his players practising winning headers above that mark.

As it turned out, Chile defended extremely well against Uruguay. The goalkeeper, Claudio Bravo, was notably proactive about coming for crosses, and while Gonzalo Jara's provocation of Edinson Cavani will always leave a sour taste, that was probably their best performance of the tournament.

Against a resolute defence they stuck to their attacking principles, with Valdivia capping a superb performance by retaining his cool as a Fernando Muslera punch came to him on the edge of the box and calmly laying the ball off for Isla to score – a moment that, after the wobbles of the first two games, demonstrated the advantages of having a full-back surging forward late to join the attack.

But it was in the Final that Sampaoli really came into his own. Chile and Argentina had been the two sides with the most possession in the competition; for one or both that was clearly about to change.

Argentina had looked much more dangerous in the tournament when they had had space to attack behind the opponent, as happened in both games against Paraguay (even in their opening

group game, when they suffered a tactical collapse to squander a 2-0 lead and draw 2-2 they were still creating chances at the end). Given Chile's preference for a high line, that seemed to pose a major problem and there were moments early in the match when Lionel Messi found space behind the left-back Jean Beausejour.

Messi, after a devastating performance in the semi-final, had been Sampaoli's focus. Chile's coach had

reportedly spent the days before the Final watching videos of Messi while his players used a PlayStation4 to try to find a solution.

Remarkably, they did. Diaz played so deep in the Final that he was almost a third central defender. Francisco Silva came in to his right with Gary Medel swapped to the left of centre so he could push out and close Messi down, knowing he had Diaz behind him as protection. Aranguiz, on the left of the two shuttling midfielders, never let Messi get too far away from him, while Valdivia must have done more defending than in any other game in his career, forever pulling left to offer further protection. By the time Valdivia was replaced by the spikier Mati Fernandez, Messi was already a diminished, demoralised figure.

Perhaps it would not have worked with a referee less prepared to let robust challenges pass or had Angel Di Maria not pulled up with a hamstring injury, but hypotheticals can play both ways.

The fact is that Sampaoli honed Chile over the course of the tournament and devised specific plans for specific games that worked. His combative style rubs some up the wrong way, but this was Sampaoli's tournament. **WS**

made from pre-season games – both legally and illegally

Once a casually organised series of games watched by fans keen for a first glimpse of exciting new signings being eased into the forthcoming campaign, the pre-season friendly is now football's latest commercial battleground.

Last season, between a quarter and half of all pre-season friendlies played by clubs in the big five European leagues were staged overseas, with matches being given increasing value through sponsorship and often packaged up into meaningless tournaments, from the Audi Quattro Cup ▶

to the Premier League Asia Trophy. While sponsors get another plug, broadcasters snap up cheap opportunities to show Europe's top sides – despite managers' protests at their players being dragged all around the world.

The Emirates Cup in London eased Arsene Wenger's concerns over the demands of pre-season on his Arsenal players, but he is one of the few managers to win this battle. Last summer, new Manchester United boss Louis Van Gaal warned that a pre-season tour to the United States was too demanding, yet this summer United visit the US again.

"Commercial managers have the power in pre-season," says Michael D'Arcy, a director of KAM Sports, one of the biggest licensed agents arranging club and international friendlies.

Foreign tours date back to the game's early days, but in 1993 Italy became one of the first leagues to attempt to start a pre-season abroad, with the Italian Super Cup staged in the USA. Since then, the annual season opener between the winners of Serie A and the Italian Cup has been held in Libya (in 2002), the US (2003), Qatar (2014) and China (three times between 2009 and 2012). This year's game, between Juventus and Lazio, returns to China on August 8.

In 2013, Spanish clubs started the LFP World Tour, which visited destinations as diverse as Australia, Chile and Turkey to globalise La Liga, but England's Premier League and its clubs have blazed the biggest commercial pre-season trail.



Between 2005 and 2014, Premier League sides visited 41 countries in pre-season, from Malaysia and Vietnam to Liechtenstein, Nigeria and New Zealand. The big five – Arsenal, Chelsea, Liverpool and the two Manchester clubs – played 319 pre-season friendlies, of which just 97 were at home.

Although overseas touring did ease last summer, 60 per cent of Premier League

sides' pre-season games took place outside Britain between 2011-12 and 2013-14.

As an organisation, the Premier League stages the biennial Asia Trophy and four of the last six have been held in Hong Kong. As HKFA chief executive Mark Sutcliffe explains: "The gate money and TV income goes to the Premier League to pay its costs and clubs' appearance money. The HKFA gets a sanction fee to pay for our costs and match-day organisation. The stadium owner – in this case, the government – gets its levy and the local team gets an appearance fee. In addition, the Premier League gives the HKFA a good-causes grant for football development, so creating an event legacy.

"As I understand it, the event costs the Premier League money but is seen as an investment to develop the market in Asia."

However, the Premier League denies this, claiming the event – which is being staged in Singapore this year and features Arsenal, Everton, Stoke City and a Singapore Select XI – breaks even. "Premier League money is the clubs' money," says a spokesman. "Our job is to generate revenue for them, so they would not want the Premier League running competitions that make losses."

Asia, and China in particular, is of great appeal to the Premier League and its clubs. Rowan Simmons, an expert in Chinese media and sport, says: "Even if PL clubs are not playing in China this summer, the interest is certainly there. Several have sent commercial teams here recently; many seem to be looking for buyers."

With a bumper £5.1 billion domestic TV deal agreed, pre-season is a good time to attract interest from investors in markets such as China, although the proliferation of fake replica shirts in Asia, costing as little

as £2 each, does count against the region as a destination.

And although Premier League clubs have played 94 pre-season friendlies in 10 Asian countries over the last decade, they have played 97 in the USA. For all major European clubs looking to develop an international brand, the US is the big target market in pre-season.

In 2005, there were just five pre-season friendlies involving Premier League teams in the United States. Last summer, there were 25, with a game between Manchester United and Real Madrid in Michigan attracting 109,318 people.

The catalyst came in October 2012 when ABC agreed to pay \$250million to screen Premier League matches on free-to-air channels in the USA for three seasons from 2013-14. With no fake-replica-shirt market, the US is also popular with shirt manufacturers.

Real Madrid shirts from adidas were the world's biggest selling shirt in 2013-14, but Nike sold most shirts, at 4.3million, including half of the top 10 most popular clubs: Manchester United, Barcelona, Arsenal, Paris Saint-Germain and Juventus. This summer, United, Barcelona and PSG meet in the USA in the latest International Champions Cup.

Clubs and sponsors are not the only ones cashing in. Some national associations levy a fee to sanction a friendly, while money also can be made from allocating officials.

In England, the FA allegedly charges up to £2,750 to supply four officials. The FA declines to comment on this, but charges are even higher elsewhere. Securing

permission to play a friendly and a set of officials can cost €8,000 per match in Spain and €5,000 in Cyprus, according to agents.

Agents either arrange friendlies for a fee or act as promoters, but the latter is risky due to the demands from major clubs. Most clubs look to turn a profit on pre-season and can charge appearance fees of up to £1m – while it is rumoured that Barcelona charge €2m.

“The clubs are ruthless,” adds D’Arcy. “They are solely in it for the money, whereas the national teams do it for technical reasons.

“We tend not to promote club games any more as anything can go wrong, like the best players pulling out. In an international game, there are always replacements but not in club games.

“When clubs arrive and want everything first class and you have two teams wanting £1m each, you have to cover that and the travel and the cost of staging the game. Then, even if you sell out, it’s not

enough. So you need sponsors and TV. A lot of people have been stung putting on club games.”

All friendlies played between clubs from different countries must be arranged by a match agent that is licensed by FIFA. At present, 316 agents have FIFA licences but only 74 of FIFA’s 209 members have agents and there are as many – just two – in tiny San Marino as there are in the whole of China.

As the industry grows, so do concerns over loosely regulated matches that are staged by private companies. This is because these games are often offered as bets by bookmakers, who never pass up the opportunity to run a book on an event for fear of losing their market share.

These games can create an opportunity for corruption. Safeguarding group Sportradar monitors 35,000 matches a year for match fixing as part of a contract with UEFA. This contract does not include friendlies, but since January 2014, Sportradar has “escalated” 20

club friendlies due to suspicions of match fixing being a possibility.

Liquidity on legal betting markets for friendly matches is often low and Sportradar says the game between Manchester United and Real Madrid in Michigan attracted bets totalling just €250,000. But this figure does not take into account betting on illegal markets in places like Asia, where people are crazy about both gambling and football.

"Friendly football matches, particularly between clubs, are a clear target for match-fixers because they are inherently lower profile than regular fixtures, attract fewer spectators and are not always televised," says Jake Marsh, a match-fixing and betting fraud expert at International Centre for Sports Security (ICSS). "This

OFB administrative director, Thomas Hollerer. The OFB is keen to avoid the problems that hit Spain, which was once a popular venue for pre-season friendlies but also home to a match-fixing gang that has influenced a number of friendlies according to the ICSS.

In January this year, the ICSS warned of suspicious betting patterns during a friendly in Spain between Dutch club Den Haag and Albanian champions Skenderbeu. The same week, another friendly in Spain was abandoned after a local referee gave a fourth penalty to Belgian side Standard Liege for reasons so unclear that their opponents, Dutch side Heerenveen, simply walked off the field.

"For those that may argue friendly matches do not really matter, they are still

usually means they are not as well scrutinised and this extends to the fact that federations rarely monitor the betting markets on such matches."

A popular destination in Europe for clubs looking to run pre-season training camps and stage friendly matches is Austria, where the local football associations, the OFB, only charges a levy of €100 to sanction a friendly.

However, with few fans to watch the games, there are some concerns over the potential for matches to be rigged. When one operator tried to bring in a Romanian referee for the summer the OFB stepped in. "We only allow Austrian referees otherwise there is no come-back", says

played by professionals and bookmakers allow varieties of bets to be placed on them," says Marsh. "In some respects, the 'friendly' is also a good testing ground for organised criminals. They face less risk when infiltrating players and getting them under control for future manipulation, and they may go on to attempt fixes of competitive matches once there has been a first successful fix in a friendly."

As the pre-season schedule is inevitably ramped up this summer, managers will complain of demands on players, sponsors will be remorselessly plugged, fixers will look for easy targets and a bit of lustre will be wiped off the game before the real action even kicks off. **WS**

## AUSTRIA: THE EURO CHOICE OF MANY

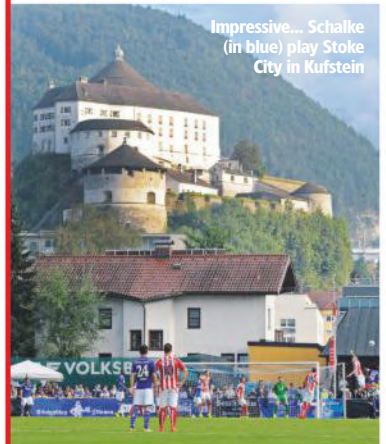
With clement weather and empty ski resorts clamouring for summertime guests, Austria has become Europe's most popular destination for pre-season training camps.

Helped by a major marketing boost in 2008, when Austria staged the European Championship with neighbours Switzerland, an industry has developed that saw more than 500 friendlies staged in Austria last summer, between clubs from places as diverse as Azerbaijan and Ukraine.

"The challenge is to provide a good package," says Thomas Plasser, an account manager at one of the leading operators, Global Sports, which was formed in 2010 and has since hosted clubs including Celtic and Sunderland.

Spain and Portugal were once popular with British clubs in pre-season but, while the USA and Germany are the top destinations for one-off games or tours, between 2005 and 2014 Premier League clubs played 58 pre-season games in Austria. That is more than the combined total for Portugal and Spain.

The summer-camp culture is more advanced in France, but Marseille and Paris Saint-Germain stopped off in Austria in 2014. In Italy, some local authorities cover



the cost of training camp for their top sides to encourage tourism, but seven Serie A clubs still played a dozen games in Austria last summer, including Roma and Udinese.

Athletic Bilbao were the only Spanish club to visit last summer, but half the German Bundesliga played pre-season games in Austria, including Borussia Dortmund and Hanover.

In Lower Austria, the local authority and the tourism association use former international striker Toni Pfeffer to attract clubs, but the industry is dominated by three agencies. SLFC is the biggest, and in 2014 arranged 178 matches in southern Austria and the Tyrol for 87 teams, including Chelsea, Everton, PSG, Juventus, Monaco and Sevilla; IFCS works around Syria and Burgenland; and Global Sports runs camps in Upper Austria.

The OFB vets every friendly and bans matches that could attract hooliganism. Sparta Prague were banned last summer for nine months after the Czech club's fans let off firecrackers. The same problem led to Turkish clubs being banned from playing pre-season games in Germany, so many of its sides now, like so many clubs in Europe, play matches in Austria.

# The man who made Barca and Spain tick

Xavi was the heartbeat of both club and country

**I**t was one o'clock in the morning when Xavi Hernandez left the dressing room as a Barcelona player for the last time. And he couldn't have wished

for better company on his final walk, stepping out at the Olympic Stadium in Berlin and down the concrete slope underneath the main stand towards the team bus. Alongside him was Sergio Busquets and together they carried the

European Cup; one handle each, the trophy swinging between them.

A few days later, Xavi headed off to Qatar and semi-retirement, aged 35. His European career was over after exactly 900 senior games: 133 for Spain and 767 for Barcelona. No one has played more times for the Catalan club; no outfield player has played more times for Spain.

No one has won more, either. You could almost imagine the removal men turning up at his new home, lugging furniture around, one of them pausing and holding up a European Cup in one hand, the Spanish Cup in the other.

"Where shall we put these?"

"Stick them there with the rest of them."

In the picture of Xavi with all the trophies he has won, there are so many there's something almost comic about the snap. Taken before this year's Champions League Final against Juventus, it wasn't even complete yet. Barcelona's 3-1 victory in Berlin was his fourth European Cup; that's four of the five that the club have won. There have been eight league titles

too, the first of them in 1999, plus three Spanish Cup trophies, six Spanish Super Cups, two European Super Cups and two Club World Cups.

Twenty-five club medals make him the most successful player in Spanish history. A World Youth champion in 1999, he has also won two European Championships and the World Cup.

But it is not just what he won, it is also how he won. In fact, Xavi himself talks about victory and defeat as “impostors”, about there being something deeper than success. It is not just about the trophies; it is about what he represents. Xavi was the ideologue for club and country, bringing an identity to the most successful national

as a collective sport Xavi is the most influential player I have ever seen. Others can move their team but I have only ever seen one player, and that’s him, who can move all 22 players on the pitch as he wishes, to his rhythm.”

An apparently throwaway line from Dani Alves also encapsulated his significance. It was not always that Xavi played passes to fit the run, it was that he played passes that obliged the run, however much he claimed that his team-mates’ movement made the game easy for him. As Alves put it: “Xavi plays in the future.”

Xavi’s former Barcelona coach Pep Guardiola said, as the end drew near: “Xavi is the most amateur player I know, and at the same time the most professional player too, such is his love for football.”

“When he is not playing football, he is watching football.”

It is an apt description. When *World Soccer* interviewed him in early 2011, he

was soon talking about Portsmouth and Real Oviedo. His enthusiasm carried you along. Just because the tape stopped didn’t mean that he had to.

That day, Xavi talked about the games he had been watching the night before. There had been five of them, he admitted – even though they weren’t very good. “I was watching Sampdoria–Juventus last night and it was awful, but I stuck with it; there’s always something that catches your eye, some detail,” he noted, apologetically, like an excuse. At one point he checked himself and smiled a little sheepishly. “Well,” he explained, “I am single.”

He is not single any more but even now Xavi can’t help himself. He loves football. There was a moment during that chat when Matthew Le Tissier was mentioned and Xavi’s eyes lit up in excitement. Le Tissier once joked he was going to get a T-shirt made with the words “Xavi’s idol” on it. Praise indeed. *World Soccer’s* Player

team and most successful club side there has been here, imposing a style and a way of playing that made them instantly recognisable.

He may well be the most important Spanish player of all time, the man who helped change their history. In the words of Porto coach Julen Lopetegui, who ran Spain’s under-19s and under-21s along what could be called “Xavian” lines, he “changed football”. According to Lopetegui: “Xavi helped us build, or see, a new player profile that ended up running through all levels of the national team. He killed off the myth of physicality above all else.

“There are lots of players who win things, but few who lay down concepts, ideas, who change the way we think – and Xavi did that.”

Andoni Zubizarreta, the former Barcelona goalkeeper and sporting director, described him as defining a new role, saying: “In the future, we will see players and say ‘he plays like Xavi.’”

Meanwhile, as former Athletic Bilbao player Joseba Etxebarria told journalist Rodrigo Errasti: “If we analyse football

of the Year for 2010, Xavi was always obsessed with the game and a committed believer in a specific approach – the technical Barcelona and Spain approach that he represents.

Enthusiasm and ideology – with Xavi, the two things go hand in hand. “Look, the thing is,” he told *World Soccer* that day at the club’s Sant Joan Despi training ground, “I like football so much. I enjoy this. I like the demands, I like the game, I like trying to perfect things. I watch so much football. All of it. Everything.”

“Don’t you ever get bored?”

“No,” came the reply. “Of course there are games that are boring, but no. Football doesn’t bore me. I like to watch players. What’s he like? What’s he doing? What are they trying to achieve?”

To listen to him talk about his own role on the pitch was to see the constant analysis, the thought, the awareness. He described himself as someone who spends

all game thinking about space, looking for it, and then distributing the ball, to all of his team-mates.

“My game is seeing a free man and giving it to him. I think: ‘Bloody hell, the defender is here, so I’ve got to play it there,’” he said. “Sometimes, I even think to myself: ‘this team-mate is going to get annoyed because I have played three passes in a row and I haven’t given him the ball yet. I better give the next one to, say, Dani because he’s gone up the wing three times now and I haven’t given him a pass. When Messi hasn’t been involved in the game I think: ‘the next pass is for him.’ So I’m working out not only the space but who’s had passes from me.”

There was an almost religious zeal about his defence of his view of football, his philosophy – one that could be exclusive and, at times, annoyed those who did not share it. His dismissal of other styles as somehow not being football irritated many, while others

saw a puritanical streak in him, one that they felt too many others had taken as gospel. And yet there is a kind of realism in his commitment to that model too and acceptance was slow in coming; it has not always been easy.

Xavi made his debut in 1999, a goal saving Louis Van Gaal’s job as manager. At the end of the year, *Don Balon* magazine named him their “revelacion” of the year. He had won a first league title and the World Cup at youth level followed. But the style of football he represented was not always trusted or successful; it was not until 2005 that he won anything again and his future was far from secure. He

certainly did not yet have the status he would come to enjoy later on.

If he agreed that he came to be seen as the defender of a footballing faith, Xavi insisted that was because he had very little

choice. He described players like him as an “endangered species” in a game that was, in his eyes, increasingly all about physique. Winning changed that, bringing confidence and commitment, acceptance and imitation too. He laughs now at how he and Andres Iniesta were seen as a problem, not a solution. He did not laugh then. Fortunately, two men came into his life whose impact on him was as huge as his was on the game in Spain.

“Winning serves to make people re-evaluate our style, my style,” he recalled. “I’m very happy because, from an egotistical point of view, six years ago I was extinct as a player; footballers like me were in danger of dying out.”

He was in danger of not continuing at Barcelona, too; an entire career has been spent at the Camp Nou but it could have been different.

Xavi’s mother was instrumental in him not leaving Barcelona when the first offer came in, from Milan, when he was just a teenager. Others followed and there was the chance, too, of Xavi leaving towards the end of the Frank Rijkaard era when Barcelona appeared to be collapsing. At least, that’s what he feared. The rumours that the club wanted to sell him, that they did not rate him, reached him.

But then so did Luis Aragones and so did Guardiola; the summer of 2008 was a new beginning. “With Luis, the revolution began: Spain swapped fury for the ball and showed that we could win playing good football. Without him, nothing would have been the same,” Xavi recalled in an open letter to Aragones written after the coach’s death. What Aragones did was

change the style to Xavi's style. Xavi would lay the path for Spain to walk down.

"He would come up to my room and we talked for hours, often about style," said Xavi. "He'd say: 'That's the key, knowing what kind of football we want to play; to have no fear, however much they run. You and I know that the ball runs more.'

"He made me feel important when my self-esteem was a disaster. He gave me the controls for Spain when I did not even have them for Barcelona. 'You run this team, and let them criticise me.'"

Guardiola agreed. "Pep said to me: 'Look, I can't even imagine a Barcelona team without you, I want you with me, I just don't see this team without you in it,'" Xavi explained. "And that was that."

"That" was everything, the kind of dominance the modern era rarely sees. A shift in paradigm, something new, perhaps even epoch defining. Every year for five consecutive years, Xavi was at the heart of the team that claimed the most significant trophies on the planet: the European Championship in 2008, the European

Just before the Final of Euro 2012, Xavi had decided that his time with the national team was probably over. He told Vicente Del Bosque that the Final would be his last game. Del Bosque persuaded him to stay, to give it two more years. It had not been his best tournament; in 2008 he had been given the Golden Ball and in 2010 his control of games in South Africa saw

him on the podium for the Ballon d'Or. But Spain destroyed Italy 4-0 in the Final and that day Xavi was superb. Afterwards, the Spain coach said: "You see?"

Xavi continued, but he may have wished he had not. Age waits for no man, tactics were shifting and so was the environment. By Brazil 2014, it was different. Spain were the first team knocked out. After their final game against Australia, Xavi left Curitiba, an unused substitute, without a word.

He seemed set to leave Barcelona, too: there were offers from the US and Qatar. He retired from international football and was ready to leave European club football, where the season had ended trophyless. His style was questioned once more. Some called it "the death of *tiki taka*"; others claimed that a style that had won it all like no other had been "found out". An era was over, they said. His era.

Barcelona were evolving. Ivan Rakitic had been signed to replace Xavi. But instead of going, Xavi eventually stayed. The coach Luis Enrique was clear and honest with him. If he wanted, there could be one more year. His role was a reduced one, and the debate raged almost all season, but it was important too – on and off the pitch. Few had the moral authority to manage the crisis in January like Xavi did. He was fundamental, intervening with Lionel Messi.

And slowly, things were falling into place: incredibly, Barcelona were closing

in on a treble, their second in seven years. What a way to go. It had been unthinkable at the beginning of the campaign. Tears in his eyes, Xavi bade farewell. "I could not have wished for a better ending," he said.

"He will leave here through the *puerta grande*, triumphantly through the main gate," Enrique said on the eve of the Champions League Final. "It would have felt wrong if he had left last season and I am so pleased he can leave like this, in the way that I would have liked Victor Valdes and Carles Puyol to have been able to as well. He deserves it.

"His importance is beyond doubt: he has played more games than anyone else at Barcelona, in an era when staying at a club this big for so long is extremely difficult, and he has won more titles than anyone else. Now he has the chance to try to win one more."

In Germany he did, and as captain too, coming on to replace Iniesta, his friend and team-mate handing over the armband, attaching it for him. One last time, one last success. 23, 24, 25... His last three games as a professional in Europe, his 898th, 899th and 900th matches, all ended the same way: with him lifting a trophy. First it was the league title; the Saturday after that, it was the Spanish Cup and the Saturday after that Xavi walked out of the Olympic Stadium carrying the European Cup. **WS**

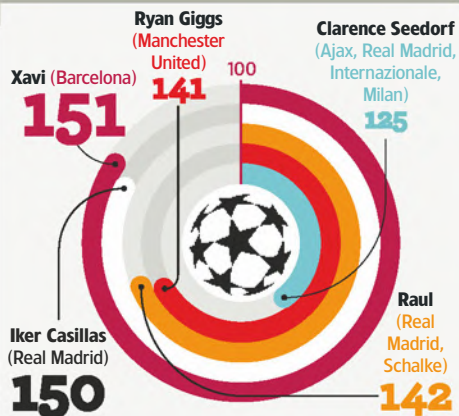

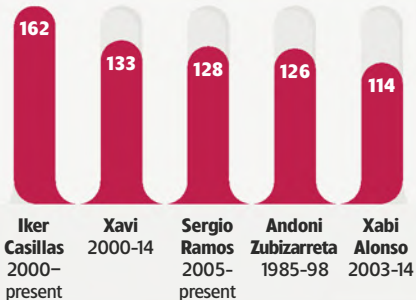

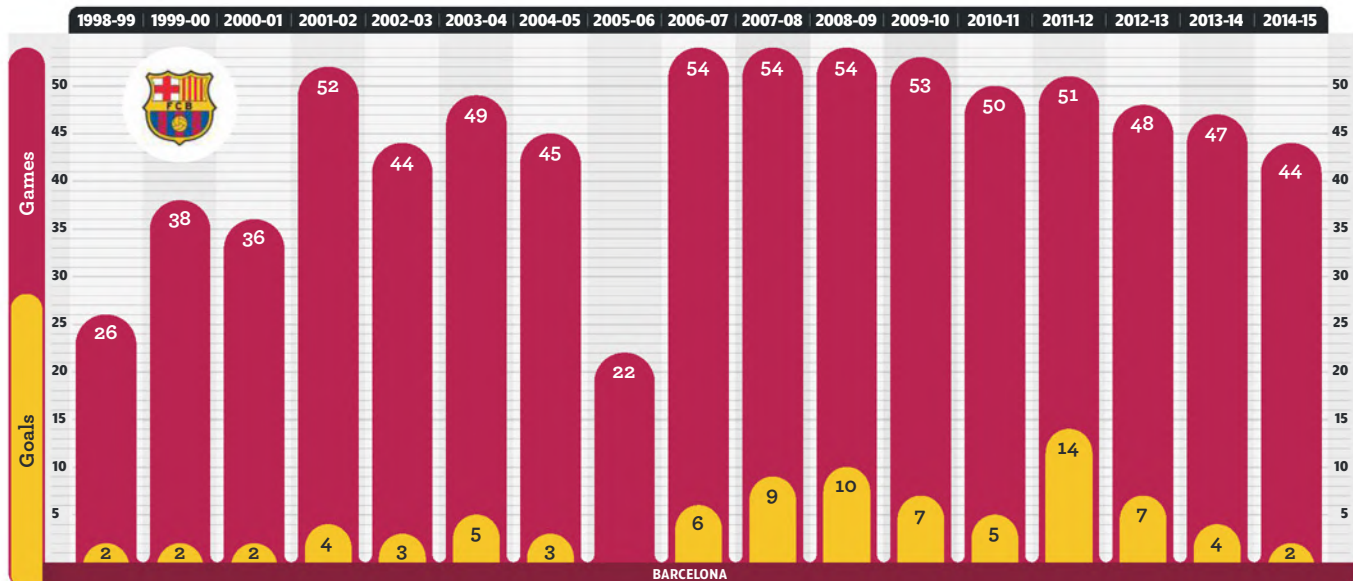

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# Gerrard joins Galaxy of stars

The former England and Liverpool midfielder follows in the footsteps of David Beckham and Robbie Keane

**M**LS Cup winners for three of the last four years, Los Angeles Galaxy welcomed Steven Gerrard to American soccer's most glamorous and successful club this summer. But the game hasn't been without its ups and downs in this part of the United States.

According to the Urban Dictionary, Los Angeles is "a massive tangle of highways and roads, also rumoured to contain people and houses." The "City of Angels" was founded by the Spanish in 1781, and the Americans took over in 1850, bringing the cars

and the massive tangle. Since then the city has spread exuberantly, making it – along with Tokyo and New York – one of the world's most populous areas, with nearly four million people in the city and over 10m in the county. In the midst of all that growth – and responsible for much of it – the city also spawned Hollywood, the world capital of the movie industry.

While Los Angeles was becoming a decidedly unique place to live, soccer was growing in the USA – but slowly and thousands of miles away, over on the east coast and in the mid west. For some 40 years, after its beginning in 1914, the Open Cup was dominated by teams from New York, Pennsylvania, New England, Chicago and St Louis. When the pro American Soccer League (ASL) was formed in 1921 it was exclusively a north-eastern league.

Los Angeles, stuck way out on the west coast, was isolated by the difficulties of long-distance travel. But in January 1959 the first commercial jet flight from LA arrived in New York and from then on, Los Angeles teams – Maccabi Los Angeles, Los Angeles Kickers, LA Croatia and Los Angeles Armenians, were the most successful and featured regularly in Open Cup Finals. These, however, were mostly amateur teams, with only the Kickers able to claim to be professional.

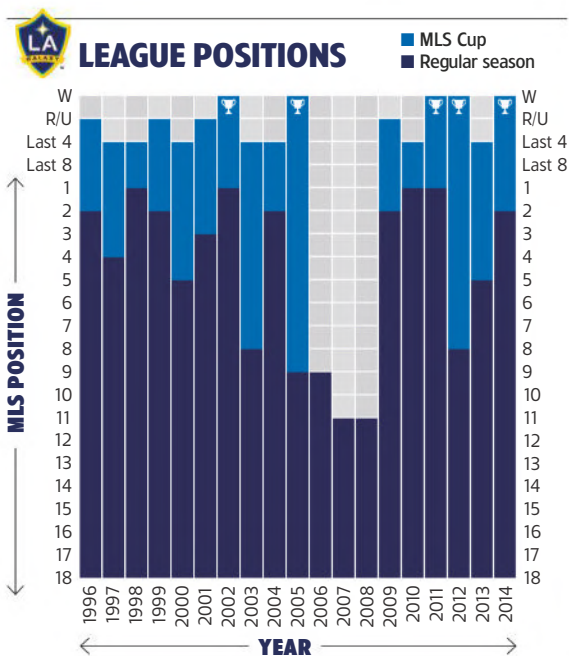
The ASL had collapsed in 1933, but big-time professional soccer was about to enter the picture with not one but two coast-to-coast leagues launched in 1967: the United Soccer Association (USA) and the National Professional

Soccer League (NPSL). Both included a team from LA, but neither LA Wolves in the USA or LA Toros in the NPSL lasted very long. The two leagues merged in time for the 1968 season, becoming the North American Soccer League (NASL), but the Toros moved south to San Diego while the Wolves played the season then folded.

It was a lousy beginning for pro soccer in LA and things didn't get much better during the next 28 years. In 1974 a new team, the LA Aztecs, joined the NASL and won the championship in their first year.

The Aztecs tried hard to sell the sport, signing an ageing George Best for three seasons, from 1976 to 1978, while Johan Cruyff played in 1978, but they ended up with a measly attendance average of just over 9,000 per game. They were joined in 1978 by California Surf, who were based in Anaheim, but they folded in 1981, along with the Aztecs.

Three years later the NASL disappeared, and for the next 11 years there was no pro soccer in the USA.

A huge problem for the Aztecs, that had never been solved, was simply finding somewhere to play. In its eight years it used four different stadiums, two of them college stadiums – both small and carrying the stigma of being a non-professional environment – while the other two, the Coliseum and the Rose Bowl, both with a capacity of over 90,000, were absurdly too big.

What turned this gloomy scene into one of great hope – for American pro soccer in general, and Los Angeles in particular – was the staggeringly successful staging of the 1994 World Cup, with huge crowds everywhere, none more so than in LA, where Brazil beat Italy in the Final at the Rose Bowl jammed with 94,000 fans.

The biggest legacy of the World Cup was the creation of Major League Soccer, which started in 1996 with 10 clubs – one of which was the Los Angeles Galaxy.

MLS adopted a "single entity" concept to limit spending and encourage investors who might otherwise be put off by the

on its list of priorities was a determination to shift the team out of the huge Rose Bowl. Plans were announced for the building of a soccer-specific stadium.

Zambrano soon found out he did not figure in AEG's plans when he was fired after just five games of the 1999 season and was replaced by Sigi Schmid, a long-time college coach at UCLA, who led Galaxy to their first trophy: the CONCACAF Champions Cup in 2000.

But the MLS title was the one that really mattered and that didn't arrive until 2002, when Schmid's team took the trophy by beating New England Revolution 1-0.

Galaxy took a huge step forward the following year with the opening of the 27,000-capacity Home Depot Center Stadium in Carson, about 10 miles south

of downtown Los Angeles, but still considered part of the city. The shining brilliance of the new stadium was not, however, reflected on the pitch.

Galaxy made the play-offs, where they met San Jose, and after winning the first leg 2-0 went 2-0 up in San Jose to lead 4-0 on aggregate. However, the home team staged a remarkable come-back, scoring five goals to eliminate Galaxy.

That humiliating exit marked the beginning of the end for Schmid, who was soon replaced by former US national team coach Steve Sampson. In 2005 Sampson's team took the MLS title, but the most significant event of that year was the arrival of Landon Donovan, who was destined to become the team's most important player.

The next two years saw Galaxy reacting, not always too well, to a series of major upheavals. Just before the

2006 season, the team's much-respected young general manager, Doug Hamilton, died of a heart attack. Halfway through the season came yet another coaching change, with Sampson replaced by Frank Yallop. Maybe Yallop would have pulled things together but he never really had the chance. Just after Jones announced that 2007 would be his final season came the earth-shaking news that David Beckham would be joining the team later that year.

MLS rules were changed for this move, allowing teams to sign one or two so-called Designated Players and pay them outside the restrictive salary cap. This "Beckham rule" was the first serious retreat from single-entity caution.

Beckham arrived, his advisors with him. The excitement created by his presence was offset by the disruption it caused to team chemistry. Beckham suffered injuries, the team did not play well, it missed out on the play-offs and Yallop departed at the end of 2007.

With the help of Beckham's advisors, the next coaching appointment proved to be one of truly inspired ineptitude. In came former Dutch star Ruud Gullit, blessed with a reported \$6m three-year contract. But Gullit had no experience of the American scene, and the intricacies and peculiarities of the MLS single entity set-up. Nor had he any patience to deal with it. The result was an inevitable disaster and, in August, Gullit resigned and general manager Alexi Lalas was fired.

Arena was brought in as coach, but the team finished 2008 with its worst-ever record of only eight wins in 30 games and

game's history of failure in the US. The league itself signed a number of top players and allocated them to various clubs. Flamboyant Mexican goalkeeper Jorge Campos arrived at Galaxy where among his team-mates were 5ft 6ins El Salvadoran playmaker Mauricio Cienfuegos and US winger Cobi Jones.

The team, under coach Lothar Osiander, had a great first season, reaching the Final where it lost to Bruce Arena's DC United.

Osiander was replaced by his assistant, Ecuadorian Octavio Zambrano, the following season and in 1997 they became the first US team to reach the CONCACAF Champions Cup Final, where they lost to Cruz Azul of Mexico. The following season Galaxy broke the MLS scoring record with 85 goals.

But the big change came when Galaxy were bought by AEG, the sports-marketing conglomerate owned by billionaire Phil Anschutz. Galaxy, it was proclaimed, would become "the club by which all others are measured". AEG meant business, and high

With over 10 million people in the greater Los Angeles area, it was always likely the city would get a second MLS team, and they arrived in 2005 with Chivas-USA.

The Mexican owner-investors were led by Jorge Vergara, owner of CD Guadalajara in Mexico, whose nickname is "Chivas" - which translates as "goats".

Chivas-USA was positioned as a sister club of Guadalajara and aimed to play Mexican-style soccer with, it was hoped, particular appeal to the huge Mexican-American population

of Los Angeles. But while this seemed an excellent idea - the tastes of the Hispanic fans had long been neglected - it flopped badly. After a poor opening season, the owners panicked, hastily bringing in non-Mexican players and a series of non-Mexican coaches, most of whom didn't even speak Spanish.

In 10 years the club had 11 coaches and, far from playing Mexican-style football, the team never developed any style at all. They shared the Home Depot Stadium with Galaxy and this also worked against Chivas-USA

developing their own personality. After nine uninspiring seasons, Chivas-USA was sold to the league. MLS operated it in 2014 then closed it down, announcing it was seeking a new group of investors to re-start the franchise under a new name.

The new investors had to guarantee they would build their own stadium and so far a group of 22 investors has been assembled - including Cardiff City owner Vincent Tan - who, under the name Los Angeles FC, plan to build a stadium, hopefully in downtown Los Angeles, and begin playing in 2017.

bottom of the Western Division. But Arena eventually calmed things down and took Galaxy into the MLS Cup Final in 2009, where they lost to Real Salt Lake.

Beckham's frequent absences from the line-up – sometimes it was an injury, sometimes personal engagements elsewhere – angered many Galaxy fans. After sitting out most of the 2010 season with a broken Achilles tendon (suffered while on loan to Milan), he ended his Galaxy years with two championships, in 2011 and 2012, but the truth is that these successes owed more to Donovan's

inspiration than Beckham's contribution.

Galaxy, by now established as the most popular and most publicised team in MLS, grabbed headlines with a global first when Robbie Rogers became a regular starter in 2013 – the first openly gay male to play at the top level of any pro sport.

In 2014 Galaxy again took the MLS title for a third time in four years, but talk of a dynasty was muted, for two reasons. Firstly, there were the MLS financial regulations,

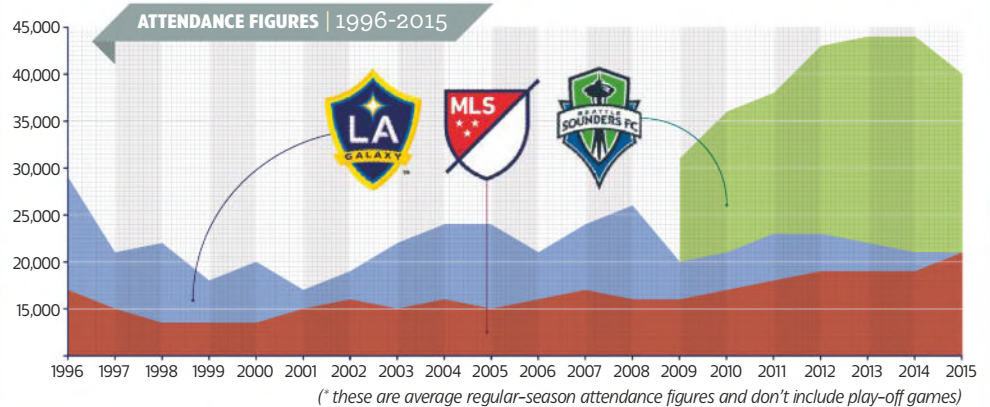
which were designed to maintain parity amongst its teams. Secondly, there was the retirement of Donovan after a 10-year Galaxy career in which he scored 112 goals in 247 games, while the team won four MLS championships.

The rise and rise of Galaxy is a very Los Angeles – almost a Hollywood – story. In no time at all, just 19 years, a respected football club with a global footprint has been created. Financially successful of course – that's a given in the home of

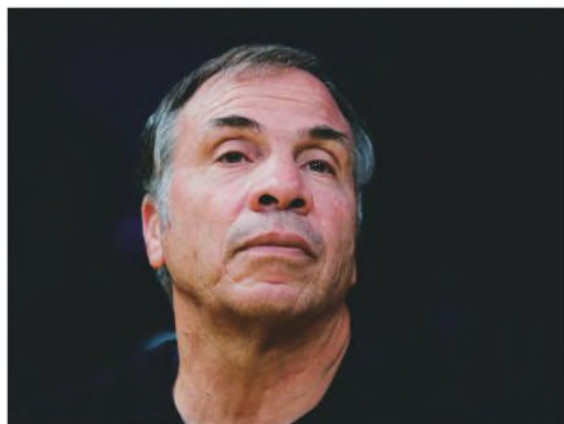
capitalism. In 2003, then CEO Tim Leiweke claimed Galaxy was the first MLS club to turn a profit. That was before it had moved into its own stadium, a step up that allowed it to rake in even more cash.

But even as Gerrard joins up, the team is not all about stars.

With players such as Gyasi Zardes, Jose Villarreal, Bradford Jamieson, Rafael Garcia and Oscar Sorto all coming through the youth system, the future looks bright indeed out on the west coast. **WS**

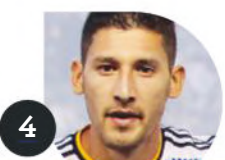

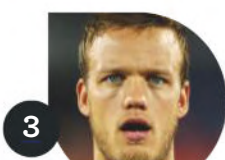

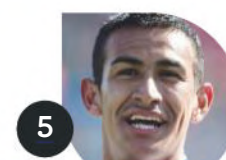

# July 1989

Each month we look back at the talking points of the decades

The cover of the July 1989 edition of *World Soccer* featured Pele in a Scotland tracksuit alongside two young Australian players. The Brazilian had been promoting the World Under-16 Championship in Scotland and the magazine devoted its first four pages to a tournament described by Paul Gardner as "the true coming of age of the Under-16 World Cup".

Gardner wrote: "The Scots gave this tournament the credibility it has been seeking. The sheer quality of the football, the exuberance of the players, proved an irresistible draw. The success of Scotland was the perfect accompaniment."

Scotland, against all the odds, reached the Final, and their semi-final victory over a Portugal team coached by Carlos Queiroz saw 29,000 fans packed into Tynecastle, in Edinburgh, to witness a 1-0 win courtesy of a 53rd-minute header by Brian O'Neill.

In the Final, the hosts met a Saudi Arabia team who played a brand of football influenced

## BRAVE SCOTS BEATEN IN PENALTY SHOOT-OUT

**SCOTLAND won everything but the Cup at the dramatic and entertaining climax to the third world under-16 championship.**

Having surprised even themselves by reaching the Final at Hampden, they drew away a two-goal lead.

But Saudi Arabia claimed the JVC-sponsored Cup observably. On the day they were the better team and no amount of whinging about age and appearance and "stretwise tactics" could take that away from them.

Not only were they fitter and stronger, they were technically several classes superior to the Scots. Thus, when the Scots found themselves roused by physical fatigue, it was Saudi skill which proved the decisive force.

A pity the big guns of the London press were not present. A pity, too, that English parochialism had seen the schools' international against West Germany being staged at Wembley on the very day the under-16 finals began.

No wonder, then, that England were absent from this teenage summit of the game.

Yet the English could have taken a little credit. After the game the Saudi general manager, Abdullah Jabari, proudly recalled that Saudi soccer had been developing an organised approach to the game only in the last 20 years. He might also have mentioned that Jimmy Hill, no less, had

to referee Escobar for making his decision quick and definite.

helped develop the infrastructure on which this triumph was built.

The crowd packed into that train comprised an encouragingly predominant number of young people: both boys and girls, young men and young women.

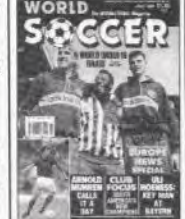

# ‘Effort is non-negotiable’

His team’s style of play may not be to everyone’s taste but the driven Atletico Madrid coach has found success by doing things very much his own way

**T**here is a single phrase that sums up Diego Simeone; one that condenses the philosophy and attitude that he brings to his teams and what he expects from his players. “Effort is non-negotiable”. While his career path and his teams reflect this maxim, there is also one single defining moment in his coaching career to date – and that is December 2011, when he took over at Atletico Madrid. Up until then, his track record had been a sharp and unrelenting learning curve, ▶

experimenting with style and formations at a dizzying number of clubs. Since then, it has been one of stability and unprecedented success.

"El Cholo" had always known that Atletico would come calling. He also knew that, when it happened, Atleti would more than likely be in trouble. And so it proved, taking over a side four points off the relegation zone and one that had been knocked out of the Spanish Cup by a team from the third tier. "When Cholo the coach arrived, everyone was thinking about Cholo the player," he wrote in his book *The Simeone Effect*, with his name conjuring up memories of the club's last league title, in 1996, when he formed a vital part of Atletico's midfield.

"Hopefully Simeone is here for a long time," said sporting director Jose Luis Caminero at the time of Simeone's arrival as coach. Four years on, he is the second most successful coach in the club's history.

Simeone has challenged Europe and Spain's big financial powers and proved it is possible to beat the Barcelona-Real

Madrid hegemony. At times, some of his methods and style of play have not won admirers, but the scale of the achievement is such that Simeone is considered by many to be one of the top coaches in world football.

And yet, four years ago neither the club nor the coach offered a guarantee of success nor – crucially – of stability.

Simeone's CV before Atletico reads as a rapid-fire roll call of clubs. Bookended by spells at Racing Club – the Argentinian side he supported as a youngster and where he ended his playing career – he accrued experience with five different clubs in five years.

Simeone ended a long and successful career – with over 100 caps for Argentina and three World Cup finals – at Racing in 2006 and immediately took over as coach with the club facing relegation. Having lost his first game to Independiente in the Avellaneda derby – a game in which a young Sergio Aguero scored twice – it

took him seven games to achieve a first win. But although he had been rushed into coaching, he had a clear vision of what he wanted from his teams from the outset.

"Above all, I want my team to have a style," he told Spanish sports newspaper *Marca* in 2006.

The style, and the ideas he had picked up as a player, were more modern and varied than those of the older generation of coaches in Argentina, many of whom were still entrenched in decade-old debates over how the game ought to be played. Yet for Simeone, it was quite simple: "The intelligent supporter is the one who does not obsess over whether the team plays well, but rather that the team wants to win."

While there is no single coach that he most clearly resembles, he has acknowledged such influences as the leadership of Daniel Passarella, the motivation of Alfio Basile, the competitiveness and reading of games of Carlos Bilardo, and Marcelo Bielsa's intensity and attention to training methods.

Comparisons with Bielsa grew in Argentina thanks to the intensity of his teams – not to mention the intensity of the coach himself on the sideline and his tactical preferences – but Simeone does not fit into the classic line of Bielsa disciples, who include such names as current Argentina and Chile coaches Gerardo Martino and Jorge Sampaoli. But the attention to detail, and the spirit and philosophy in which he speaks in public about his teams, as well as the expectations placed on his players, chimed with much of Bielsa's philosophy.

What Simeone's career showed, both before and after Atletico, is versatility given the available resources.

His first job after Racing was at Estudiantes, where he harnessed the recent return to the club of Juan Sebastian Veron alongside Rodrigo Brana in a dynamic midfield partnership. He also played two strikers, Jose Calderon and Mariano Pavone, in a move that reaped

its rewards, and there is still graffiti to this day remembering the 7-0 win in the city derby against Gimnasia. There was also an epic title success that saw Estudiantes four points behind Boca with two games to play, before they drew level on points and won the title play-off.

It was Estudiantes' first championship in decades and Simeone's first taste of success, but he left for River Plate after just 16 months at the club.

"The collective effort is installed ahead of the individual," he said on arriving at the Monumental, where he experimented with formations far more than he had done at Estudiantes. Often choosing a 3-3-3-1 to

harness the talent of Ariel Ortega, he repeated his success at Estudiantes, winning the title with a team that included Colombia's Radamel Falcao and a young Chilean striker Alexis Sanchez.

The River Plate experience was also a learning curve. As Simeone still sought to attack and kill off games with a goal rather than closing up in defence, in the 2008

Libertadores Cup quarter-finals his side suffered a famous defeat by San Lorenzo, throwing away victory with a two-man advantage. And just months after winning the title, River ended the following season bottom of the table. Simeone left shortly before the end of that campaign, but he assumed responsibility.

The short season format in Argentina meant that River were not relegated, although that season was the first that ultimately condemned the club to relegation in 2011. But the structure of the game in his home country did magnify a feature of Simeone's early teams: it was all or nothing – first or last.

It was in part this experience, plus the subsequent clubs he coached, that shaped

a more conservative and defensive Simeone. “I prefer to play well than to play attractively,” he said after joining San Lorenzo, who were in disarray at the time. Although he would leave the club no higher than 17th in the table, he did start a process that would turn the club's fortunes around and lead to their first Libertadores Cup triumph.

His departure saw the media question whether he needed a break, with *La Nacion* pointing to the pace with which Simeone changed clubs and suggesting that “Mr Vertigo needs a rest”.

Simeone, however, had no intention of stopping. “I haven't come here hoping to stay in Europe for 10 years,” he said on taking over Catania in Italy. “I came here looking to grow.”

With a squad containing 12 Argentinian players his mission to avoid relegation was accomplished and he would later look back on the Catania experience as a defining one, saying: “At first I

always wanted to attack. With time I learnt the best ways to think how to win is in your defensive balance.”

This more defensive Simeone was clear to see when he returned to Racing, with critics despairing at his conservative approach despite having the attacking talents of Colombian pair, forward Teofilo Gutierrez and playmaker Gio Moreno, at his disposal.

His frenetic, constant changing of clubs during this period was mirrored by Atletico Madrid's approach to coaches and in the five years before Simeone's appointment five came and went: Javier Aguirre, Abel Resino, Santi Denia, Quique Sanchez Flores and Gregorio Manzano.

By the time Atletico came calling,

Siemone had settled on a style that was an ideal for the club's history: uncompromising, committed, tough, and direct. He was meticulous and would seek every advantage possible. This ranged from checking the horoscopes of potential transfer targets to fighting to make sure Atlético had the same number of ball boys in the Spanish Cup Final against Real Madrid when the Bernabeu was selected as the host stadium.

"We want a team with commitment," he said of his plans for Atlético. "One that plays, runs, trains, respects the rival, and understands the intelligence in the game."

And his blueprint gave spectacular results. He took over with Atlético 10th in the table, but just four points off the relegation zone. Within five months they ended the season fifth and won the Europa League, beating Athletic Bilbao and his former international coach Bielsa in the Final.

Then came the European Super Cup, then the Spanish Cup, then the league title and then the Spanish Super Cup. Five trophies put Simeone behind only Luis Aragones as the most successful coach in the club's history.

Much of Simeone's success as a coach has been down to his ability to get the best

management has not only brought out the best in his established players, but also helped youngsters to break through. Luciano Vietto, who he recently signed for Atletico, was given his first-team debut by Simeone.

Having signed a new contract that runs until 2020, Simeone has given a clear indication to his players that he has little reason to leave Atletico. "Only Bayern, Real Madrid, Chelsea and Barcelona are better than us," he told Argentinian

television recently.

But Simeone is conditioned by Atletico's resources, which are not in the same category as those clubs he mentions. Internazionale and Lazio are among those who are likely to come calling at some point, and he is also taking English classes.

"I want to coach until I am 65," he told *El Grafico* when asked about the national team job.

"And if that happens when I am 60, then great" **WS**

out of his players. Falcao excelled under him at both River and in Spain, while Juanfran, Antoine Griezmann and Koke have all improved at Atletico in terms of performance levels.

Yet he also does not look to improve players' weaknesses, explaining that "a player must play the way he knows best and that way he will believe he is better than he is". He also insists on building team camaraderie without forcing the issue. Not bad for someone who probably would not have made the Czech squad this summer if Watford had not prevented Matej Vydra from taking part.

### What they say

"Selecting Kliment was a brilliant move by coach [Jakub] Dovalil," declares Czech all-time midfield great Pavel Nedved. "His agent told me he had talent, though I have to admit I didn't really know too much about him until now. He looked very sharp and hungry." Czech under 21 defender Tomas Kalas adds: "Above all else, Jan is modest, humble and reserved. He came ready to play, and when his chance came he grabbed it. He plays with his head, he likes to work hard."

### The story so far

Born in the Slovak town of Myjava, in the foothills of the Carpathian mountains, he was just a toddler when his family moved to Jihlava in the Czech Republic. 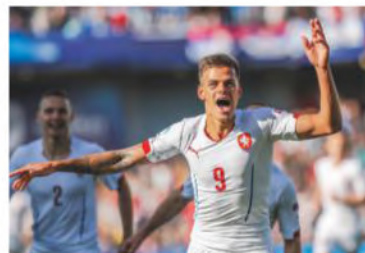

## Marco BENASSI

**Midfielder, 20 (08.09.94), Italy & Torino**

Was a member of the Internazionale junior side that won the NextGen series three years ago. And on the evidence of his two goals in the 3-1 victory over England, he has lost none of the flair that marked him out as one to watch. A complete midfield operator, he has good technique, vision, stamina and tactical awareness.



## Raphael GUERREIRO

**Defender, 21 (22.12.93), Portugal & Lorient (Fra)**

Breton club Lorient polished uncut diamonds such as Yoann Gourcuff, Laurent Koscielny, Andre-Pierre Gignac and Kevin Gameiro – and in the Portugal left-back they have another jewel. Blessed with tremendous pace, sumptuous ability and gritty desire.



## Ruben LOFTUS-CHEEK

**Midfielder, 19 (23.01.96), England & Chelsea**

Although only in action for 44 minutes – as a substitute in both the 1-0 victory over Sweden and 3-1 loss to Italy – he still impressed. In only his second and third appearances for the team, his composure, elegance, imposing physique and athleticism were there for all to see.



## Sergio OLIVEIRA

**Midfielder, 23 (02.06.92), Portugal & Porto**

A member of the under-20 side that came second at the World Championship in 2011, Portugal's box-to-box captain once again had to make do with silver, but throughout the tournament his creativity, support play and aerial ability were all of the highest order. Under contract with Porto until 2020 – with a release clause of some €30million.



## Pione SISTO

**Midfielder, 20 (04.02.95), Denmark & Midtjylland**

Despite starting only one match and mainly being used as an impact sub, the Uganda-born left-winger certainly did not waste his time. His late winner against the Czechs was worth its weight in gold. Recently helped unsung Midtjylland to their first Superliga title.



## Simon TIBBLING

**Midfielder, 20 (07.09.94), Sweden & Groningen (Hol)**

An adolescent freestyler who a few years ago would thrill fans at Stockholm's Rasunda stadium with party-piece tricks before a big game. Made an equally eye-catching contribution to Sweden's stunning triumph, with goals against Portugal and Denmark. Normally a defensive midfielder, he provided substance, energy and desire on either flank.



## Amin YOUNES

**Midfielder, 21 (06.08.93), Germany & Borussia Monchengladbach**

Not consistency personified, but the German winger with Lebanese roots was one of the most skilful and elusive performers at the finals. The problem is some club coaches regard him as a luxury.

## Adam TRAORE

Striker, 19 (28.06.95), Mali & Lille (Fra)

### In a sentence

Gifted, quick-thinking central midfielder, whose four goals, three assists and ability to rhythmically link the play underpinned Mali's surprise bronze medal in New Zealand. He deservedly scooped the Golden Ball as the most impressive individual at the tournament.

### What they say

"He's very much a boy on the up," according to former Lille boss, Rene Girard, his first coach in the professional game. "He has the technique, the vision, the punch and the freshness. His attitude was excellent too. I wouldn't say he was unassuming, but he is very calm and composed on the pitch. He's one of those remarkably mature youngsters, who can lead, who can set the example."

### The story so far

Born and brought up in the Mali capital of Bamako, he came up through the ranks of the local JMG football academy, the school set up in 2006 by former French international midfielder Jean-Marc Guillou. A pupil at the academy from the age of 12 to 18, he then had a short spell at top-flight Malian club Bakaridjan before moving to Lille in 2014. He was immediately sent on loan for six months to Belgian affiliate Mouscron, but within a few weeks of returning he was handed his Ligue 1 debut, against Nice in September, and was an automatic pick by the second half of the season. Won his first senior cap for Mali in a friendly against Ghana in March.



## 3 THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT TRAORE

- His nickname is "Noss", the nom de plume for everyone called Adama in Mali.
- Lille would not allow him to play in this year's African Under-20 Championship, prompting much angst in Bamako.
- He is the second Malian to win the Golden Boot at a World Under-20 finals, following in the 1999 footsteps of Seydou Keita.

### The next step

With his reputation greatly enhanced by his exploits this summer, he was rumoured to be a target for several top English sides but he now seems all set to join Monaco. Despite his limited experience – he has made just 20 Ligue 1 appearances – he has huge potential and could be the long-term replacement for Portuguese schemer Joao Moutinho at the Stade Louis II.

### Strengths

Outstanding as a number 10 or in a box-to-box role, his strong suits are his range of passing, flair for dictating the tempo, technical mastery and crafty dribbling in wide areas. Has a great left foot, but can deliver with the right too.

### Weaknesses

More than a little lightweight when challenging for the ball, he can often appear ungainly. A total of two goals last season for Lille suggests he needs to work on his finishing.


**DANILO**

**Midfielder, 19 (28.02.96),  
Brazil & Braga (Por)**

A recipient of silver in both the team classification and player of the tournament category, the *Selecao* captain and defensive midfielder was the personification of desire. He covered and tackled with intensity, passed the ball with quality and pushed forward with power. A true force of nature who quit Vasco da Gama for Europe last summer.



**Predrag RAJKOVIC**

**Goalkeeper, 19 (31.10.95),  
Serbia & Red Star Belgrade**

Two years after helping Serbia under-19s claim the European title, he enjoyed an equally rewarding tournament in New Zealand as captain, conceding just four goals in seven games as the Serbs struck gold. Rightly voted the best keeper on show, he made vital saves at key moments and dominated his area.



**Gabriel JESUS**

**Striker, 18 (03.04.97), Brazil & Palmeiras**

While the comparisons with Neymar are somewhat premature, the right-sided attacker was the youngest member of the Brazilian squad and undoubtedly shone in New Zealand. Superb on the ball, pacy, adept at playing with his back to goal and very industrious, he has scored a hatful of goals in the Palmeiras youth ranks and recently made his first-team debut.



**Emerson HYNDMAN**

**Midfielder, 19 (09.04.96),  
USA & Fulham (Eng)**

Despite missing a penalty in the loss to Ukraine, the US captain was a huge success, intelligently pulling the strings in the engine room, scoring twice and setting the tone with his work ethic. A first-teamer in the English second tier with Fulham, the Texan has already featured for the senior US side, making his debut against the Czech Republic last year.



**Hany MUKHTAR**

**Midfielder, 20 (21.03.95),  
Germany & Benfica (Por)**

Elimination in the quarter-finals represented palpable failure for Germany, but at least they were able to showcase the multiple assets of their captain and attacking midfielder. The Berlin-born son of a German mother and Sudanese father displayed a smooth touch and scored four times. He spent a dozen years at Hertha Berlin prior to moving to Portugal this year.



**Andrija ZIVKOVIC**

**Midfielder, 18 (11.07.96),  
Serbia & Partizan  
Belgrade**

Small of stature but gargantuan in ability, the right-winger was Serbia's creative hub, ever alert and imaginative. The free-kick he scored against Mexico was Goal of the Tournament and in the Final versus Brazil he was again decisive, setting up Nemanja Maksimovic's extra-time winner. Capped twice at full level, he became Partizan's youngest captain in March 2014, leading the team out aged just 17 years and seven months.



**Mamadou THIAM**

**Striker, 20 (20.03.95),  
Senegal & Dijon (Fra)**

Not since Ghana in 1993 has a country marked its first appearance in the World Under-20 finals by reaching the last-four, and the Paris-born attacker was as influential as any of Senegal's young Lions. He scored a fine solo goal in the 1-1 draw against Colombia and got the winner against Uzbekistan. His father, Pape Idrissa Thiam, played for Senegal and grandfather Abdoulaye Thiam coached the national team in the 1960s.



**Viktor KOVALENKO**

**Midfielder, 19,  
(14.02.96), Ukraine  
& Shakhtar Donetsk**

A thorn in opposition flesh throughout, thanks to his ability to make space for himself in the box and cool finishing, he not only scored five times to end up as the tournament's top scorer, he also set up two others. Proof that Shakhtar are not solely interested in signing Brazilians and that they can also produce their own talent.



# “The time has gone when football could exist above the rules of life. It’s finished”

The UEFA president reflects on recent events in the game – both on and off the pitch



### Are you tired of always handing the trophies to Spanish clubs?

No, because the Champions League is a very difficult competition and because no one had won the trophy two years in a row – which is different to what happened before with Ajax, with Bayern, with Liverpool. I always respect whoever wins the Champions League because it is a tough season. When I was a player we had important games from the quarter-finals: we had two quarter-finals, two semi-finals and the Final. Then there was a cup. Now you begin good games in September. September! You already have good games where you have to win, but I think I always will give the cup to the team who deserve to be the winners.

### Do any particular moments stand out from last season?

As president I don't care because the games are beautiful. As Michel Platini, former player of Juventus, I give the cup to Milan, to Inter, and I would have been happy to give it to a small Italian team from Piedmont, but it was not possible because Barcelona played very well.

### Did you have much chance to enjoy the Euro Under-21s in the Czech Republic?

I saw some games but I know more about the Champions League players than the younger ones. I will know them in a few years when they will be stars. In the Final we had Sweden and Portugal, two different teams, so it's good.

### Were you surprised by Germany's 5-0 defeat in the Euro Under-21 semi-finals by Portugal?

You can be surprised that Germany won 7-1 in Brazil in the semi-final of the World Cup.

Everything is possible in football. That is the beauty of the game because it's unpredictable. You can never think they will win 7-1 in Brazil or lose 5-0 against Portugal in the Euro Under-21s. It's why we come to see the game and why we fight against match fixing because everyone knows that it was not a fixed game. Football is the only game where you never know who will win.

### Did you follow the Women's World Cup, with two European teams in the semi-finals?

I saw a beautiful game, Germany v France. Unfortunately we lost. We didn't deserve to but it was a beautiful game and women's football is increasing a lot and we continue to develop our work with it in UEFA. The problem for women's football is that there is not a financial context as in the men's game. The women would like to have the same competitions as the men but there is not the same money. This is why we have to go slowly with the development of the competitions, not the development of the women's game. For some years I have said: "Don't ask me to bring professional players in because you have not the money to pay – unless we work through the professional clubs." You could have a situation where clubs from the Premier League have a women's team and they can give 10 per cent of the budget to the development of the women's teams. That could be easier, but I am not sure that will work everywhere.

### Is it possible to bring full-time professionalism into women's football?

Professionalism is because of the money, not because that they want to be professional. The difficulty is that for UEFA it is a matter of the national associations, the leagues, the clubs. It's more national than international.

### In Germany, the Women's World Cup drew more TV spectators than the Euro Under-21s. Did that surprise you?

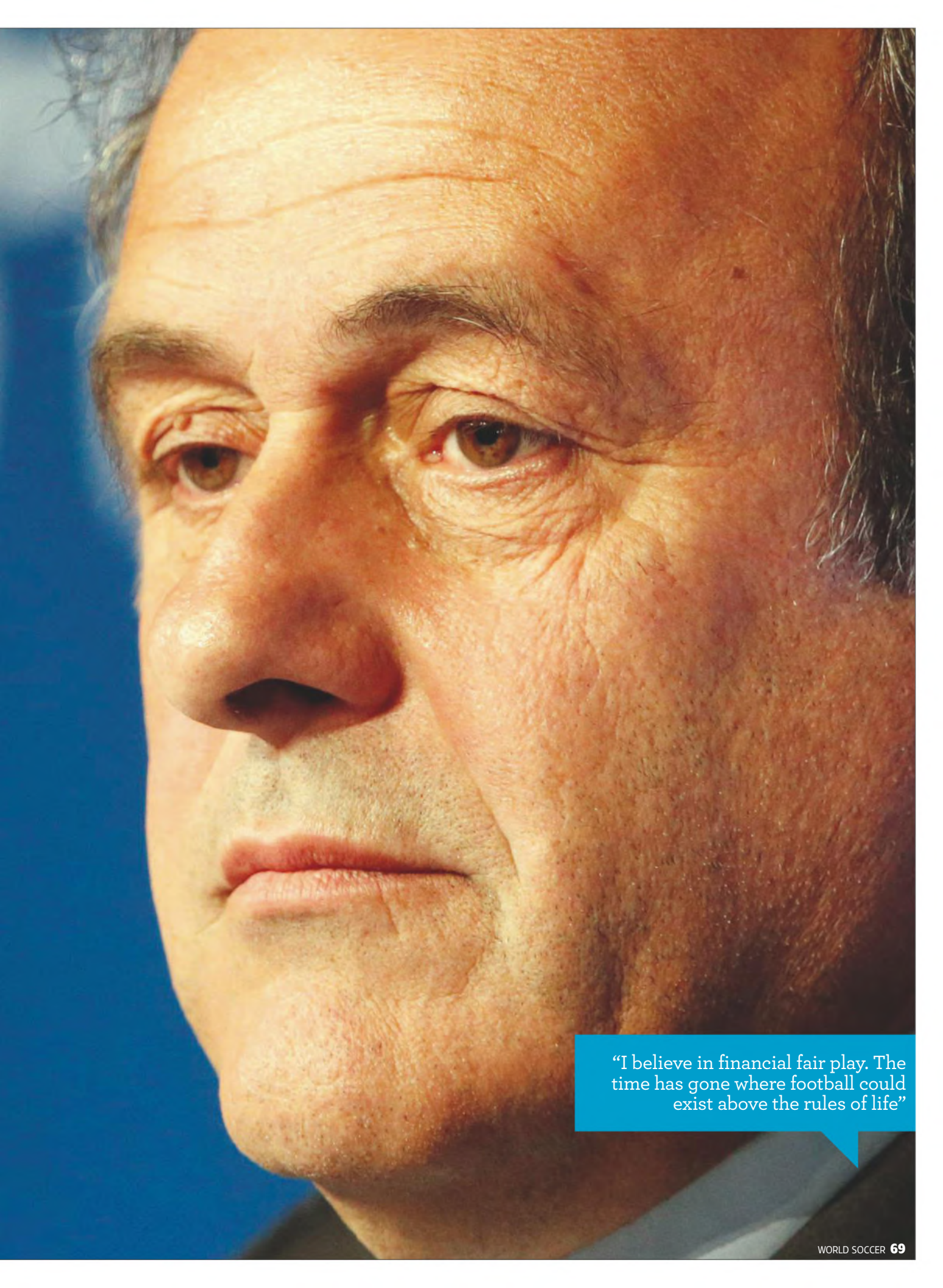
No, they love women's football in Germany. As for the under-21s, there are some decisions to take in the future about what could happen with the competition because it's not a youth tournament when you are 21 and, by the finals, when they play they are 23. It's an inbetween competition. Some players are 23 but I had won 20 caps for the French national team when I was 23. What happened a long time ago was that the education of the players was done by the national associations so we created competitions to develop the players. But, back then, at 17 or 18, they had not been in a professional club since 12 or 13 as they are now. That means that the development of young players is very different. Now, when they are 18, it's almost as if they have been professional players for six years. When I was 18 I had just arrived in the professional league. That means a big change so, for me, these competitions like the under-21s are a little bit strange today. A long time ago it was OK to use this sort of competition to develop the players, but players at 23 nowadays are developed because they have begun working in a Barcelona or Chelsea or Bayern at the age of 12. It is an issue for reflection.

### What about the Olympic tournament?

It creates some problems for the clubs but all the players love to participate in the Olympic Games and the clubs know that the release of the players is a little complicated.

### Do you see a difference between the Barcelona of Pep Guardiola and that of Luis Enrique?

Of course, a lot of difference. Who was the forward of the team of Pep? When I saw them beat Santos in Tokyo, when they won 4-0, there was no forward. There was Messi and Fabregas, there was total [movement]. Now ▶

**How do you view the Best Player in Europe award?**

It was important that we had a European prize and it was nice to be linked with ESM because you represent journalists from most of Europe and come together to vote on who can be the best players. I wanted it to be a real vote, so thank you to ESM for organising this. I think it's a nice opportunity for everybody to promote not only the best player but also the magazines who work for the beauty of football. It's nice that we are together and I am very proud and thank you for the collaboration because I think it was a good idea and is still a good idea. As to how I see this past season I can say that the football played out on the pitch is very good.

• *The initial shortlist for UEFA's Best Player in Europe award will be announced on July 15. A second shortlist of three will then be drawn up, from which the final vote will take place on August 27.*

we have three forwards: Messi, Suarez and Neymar. That's totally different. How did Barcelona win the last Champions League? Counter-attack. That didn't happen some years ago. This shows you have to adapt your team to respect your players. When you have Messi, Neymar and Suarez you play differently to when you have other players.

**Do you have a preference?**

No. I enjoy watching the players. To make these choices is the job of journalists, not mine. I look at the security of the stadium, I look to see that the referee doesn't make a mistake and I look to see players playing well.

**The Barcelona of Guardiola or Luis Enrique: who would have been the better coach for you as a player?**

Look where Messi played before and where he plays now. It's two different styles. Now he plays on the right but before, when he began, he played on the left, then he played more central. Players change and the coach is not stupid. Does the coach say: "I play like that because I want to"? No, it's because he has players who play like that. For example, Barcelona won the Champions League Final when Juventus thought to win the game. They played like Italians at the end and won by playing on the counter attack. When Juventus started thinking they could win, they lost - because Barcelona have three fantastic players who can score when they want.

**Is Barcelona's attack the best of this era?**

For the moment, yes, because they won the

Champions League. But last year it was Ronaldo, Benzema and Bale. Things can change with every game.

**Has football become much faster in the last 10 years?**

Do you think Messi is faster than 10 years ago? Do you think Ronaldo is faster than 10 years ago? I don't think players are faster than 10 or 20 years ago. The fact that the game is more protected by the referee, you have balls around the pitch, the goalkeeper can't pick up a back pass - it makes the game automatically more intensive. It's not a question of the

players. I'm not sure that a player today is going quicker than a player 30 years ago but the way that teams play is automatically faster. Perhaps the players are more physically prepared than 20 years ago but the ball is always the most important factor. As my father always told me: "Michel, the ball will always run more quickly than you."

**Why have Ronaldo and Messi been able to keep scoring so many goals for so long?**

It's just because they are incredible and there is a team who play for them. It was the same with Ronaldo, the Brazilian, in the past, and with many other players. In a great team you always have a great player - and the great player has become great because he has a great team. It was the same with Ajax, in the case of Johan Cruyff who made the difference for them, but who needed a good team around him to do that. It's a collective game.

**So why have we never seen players scoring goals like Ronaldo and Messi before in modern times?**

Take Hugo Sanchez at Real Madrid in the 1980s; how many goals did he score in his best season? 38. He did not have the same team around him because the budget of Real Madrid was not the same as it is now with Ronaldo and Benzema - or the budget of today's Barcelona, who have not only Messi but Neymar and Suarez.

**Isn't it also true that the transfer rules were different then?**

Now, with the Bosman rule, you can have all

the best players in the same team. In the past, in Spain, you had Real Madrid, Atletico, Barcelona, Valencia – a lot of teams – and all the players were in different teams. Now, more or less, the best players are in one or two clubs. It is not football but Bosman which changed things.

**Does this make it more difficult to promote national team football when high-level club football is so strong?**

We are promoting national team football through the Euro qualifiers and it will be more and more important because people like the national teams. What is important in the future is to limit the possibility to have the best players in one team or in two teams. That is important for competition. If everybody is in one team that is not so good and with the Bosman rule it was difficult at the beginning but people know that now. I support totally the agenda that says we need more home-grown players because it is not possible to fight on nationality but we have some meetings in September with Jean-Claude Juncker and the European Commission to work on that. It is not possible that the best teams should have all the best players or competition itself is finished. At the moment you have big clubs with a lot of money who can have everybody. We have to think about football in all of Europe not only in two or three clubs.

**Do you think this one of the achievements of financial fairplay?**

The clubs asked me to do something because they cannot continue to pay this and because of the debts and the losses – we had a total of €1.7billion – so we had to do something and we have done something. I think the principle is working very well. Of course one or two clubs are not so happy but, against that, thousands of clubs are happy.

**The president of the Spanish league is opposed to the ban on third-party ownership because the smaller clubs think it is the only way they can compete with Real Madrid and Barcelona...**



Third-party ownership is finished, it is forbidden by FIFA. The president of the Spanish league can do what he wants but it is forbidden by FIFA. He can go in front of the court. It is good that it is forbidden. TPO transfers money of the clubs into the money of individuals so the clubs stay poor and the individuals become richer. For example, how much money went from Barcelona to Santos for Neymar? €90m they said, but how much of that went to Santos? TPO takes the money from football. It goes to some offshore company. Then the players can't decide anything for themselves because they become a product. I went on strike when I was young in support of a player being free at the end of his contract to go where he wants. Now the players belong to companies which make the decisions. To my way of thinking, it's a scandal. We have to fight them. They can go to court. but the moral high ground is mine. That the player should belong to some "fund" is a scandal. I understand the problem because it's a business. The transfer system is not being used to improve teams but to take money out of football. That's why TPO is a scandal. People can say what they want. The moral high ground

is not theirs. It could be they go to court so then a judge can decide whether TPO should be shown a red card or a yellow card.

**Are you convinced that financial fairplay stands up legally?**

Yes. I believe in it. Which company with €1.7bn losses every year can survive in the world? One day it will explode. The time has gone when football could exist above the rules of life. It's finished. We had to do something otherwise there is an explosion. In creating FFP I protect the clubs, I protect the football, because with the losses there were we had to do something. When we have resolved the problem of the losses maybe we can work on investment. But it was my job to do that. Look how many clubs we have lost in the past years.

**Isn't it also a case that securing club finances can help make players less vulnerable to match fixing?**

Of course. It's a question of ethics. It was my job as president to think about that. When you have the moral high ground and ethics on your side it's always good and when you can look at yourself in the mirror it's always good. I am a guy of conviction and I will always defend and fight out of conviction not for politics because I think what I do and then I do what I think.

**How do you feel about the fact that some countries are starting to introduce their own FFP rules and we have seen clubs relegated in Spain for not paying their taxes?**

A lot of countries in the world are aware of the rules and now it's becoming complicated because you see what's happened in Brazil, in Spain, in Argentina. We have to find a solution so that the money stays in football. How can clubs sign thousands of players without money?

**Is this a delicate time for you within FIFA?**

Not for me personally but we all have a big problem – you, me, everybody – about FIFA. We are all FIFA. It's a problem for all the players of the world because our "mother house" has a big problem and we have to defend this house. The problem of FIFA is not a problem about football because you have good competitions. It's a problem of corruption. We will see. There is a meeting coming up. Wait and see what will happen. I stress it's not a problem of football, it's a problem of corruption of some people. Look, you cannot mix it up with the FIFA administration of competitions that are working, that are going on. FIFA has done a lot of good things, there are good ideas and good jobs, there are so many good things but it is a problem of people and the money. Let the police do their job. You know better than me many times. I look in the newspapers to see what's happened. As for the future, we'll see. I don't know. Well, I do know, but I can't tell you!

# Lloyd treble for Stars & Stripes

US win record-breaking third tournament

**F**ollowing in the footsteps of England's Geoff Hurst in 1966, Carli Lloyd became only the second person to score a hat-trick in the Final of a senior World Cup showpiece as the USA ended 16 years of hurt to reclaim the women's title for a record third time with a 5-2 victory over holders Japan.

It was a fitting finale for the United States' veteran striker Abby Wambach who, at the age of 35, now has a World Cup winners medal to go with her two Olympic golds and the 2012 FIFA World Player of the Year award.

At the Final, the 53,341 fans inside Vancouver's BC Place were not slow to voice their disapproval of the visiting dignitaries, with the crowd booing the introduction of Issa Hayatou. The FIFA vice-president had to present the trophy in the absence of president Sepp Blatter, who left it until just a few days before the game to announce

he would not attend due to pressing business back in Zurich. Secretary-general Jerome Valcke was another who stayed away, having originally been meant to attend the tournament's opening game.

For many, the ease with which Jill Ellis' side dispatched Japan in the Final was remarkably straightforward after a slow start to the tournament.

The US had kicked off their campaign with a 3-1 victory over Australia which, although a convincing scoreline, was littered with mistakes and it took a late goal by Alex Morgan to give the result a flattering edge.

Ellis had taken over as coach in May last year after Tom Sermanni was fired following the team's poorest

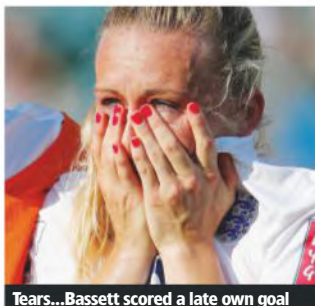
ever showing at the Algarve Cup, finishing seventh. Yet despite her 14 years as assistant coach and scout for the national team, not everyone was overly sold on Ellis' appointment. Questions were asked over tactics and selections before the squad went to Canada, and after a drab goalless draw with Sweden they only managed to finish top of their group on goal difference, courtesy of Wambach's goal in a narrow 1-0 win over Nigeria.

Even after a second round 2-0 win against Colombia, the coach's critics remained unimpressed, with two-time world champion Michelle Akers going on American radio to say: "[Ellis] is not handling the personnel right. The line-up sucks, the subs are sketchy, we're not all on the same page."

After another single-goal success, against China in the quarter-finals, the US met pre-tournament favourites Germany for a place in the Final.

A 10-0 victory over the Ivory Coast in their opening game had seen Germany ease their way into the knockout stage – and helped Celia Sasic finish joint top scorer with Lloyd on six goals. And after beating Sweden 4-1, they had a mouth-watering quarter-final clash with France, who overcame South Korea 3-0.

However, the manipulation of the draw to set up a highly desirable knockout tie for the spectators was criticised by the players. After losing on penalties to the

Germans after a 1-1 draw, France midfielder Camille Abily told *L'Equipe*: "FIFA did not conduct a real draw. Why don't we do [the draw] like the boys? At some point they have to stop taking us for idiots."

An impressive 2-0 semi-final victory over Germany set-up the Final showdown with defending champions Japan, who beat England 2-1.

England's first appearance in a Women's World Cup semi-final ended in cruel circumstances, with Laura Bassett's own goal in the penultimate minute of stoppage time, but they had performed with admirable spirit, battling through to the last four with several late goals

France's Camille Abily on the way FIFA conducted the draw

and an ever-changing line-up. Their 2-1 victory over Canada in the quarter-finals drew a record crowd of 54,027 to BC Place.

Among the other records to be set over the four weeks was the total aggregate attendance for the tournament of 1.35 million, and that total would surely have been even higher had the hosts not lost to England at the quarter-final stage.

Fox Sports had 25.4million viewers tune in for the Final: a record for any soccer game, men's or women's, shown on English-language TV in the US. Meanwhile, broadcasters in Australia, Brazil, China, South Korea and Norway all beat the highest TV audience for any match in the 2011 edition.

The bar, then, has been set high for the next finals, in France in 2019, with organisers looking to raise the standard even higher. For starters they will surely find it easier to acquire the maximum of six national sponsors given their event-hosting experience: Canada managed to secure only three.

France has also pledged that all matches will be played on real grass, highlighting the one issue that never

went away during Canada 2015.

Despite the promise of the highest quality turf, there were noticeable changes in games where either the pitch had not been watered enough or that it had been watered too much, with either scenario drastically affecting the way the ball plays on 3G grass.

The turf at BC Place had only been laid in May, giving it a very short window to be "worn in" for the tournament.

The Players' union, FIFPro, held a press conference in Vancouver two days before the Final to say it regretted joining a failed lawsuit too late last year challenging the decision to play on artificial turf. FIFPro head Theo Van Seggelen pledged, however, that no future tournament would be played on fake grass saying: "As long as FIFPro is around, men will not play a World Cup on artificial turf and the same will be for women from here on."

Tatjana Haenni, FIFA's head of women's football, said that there had been a number of working groups at each stadium analysing the matches on the turf and that their conclusions would be presented along with a survey taken from the players and coaches with their feedback on it.

Wambach, who played in Canada for the last time in a World Cup, was one of the fiercest critics of the decision to play on artificial turf, saying: "This would never happen to the men". **WS**

## All over for Parma

Club's proud 102-year history comes to an end

**M**uch as had been expected, there was no knight in shining armour riding over the hill to save Parma. Relegated to Serie B at the end of the season, the club that won the UEFA Cup (in 1995 and 1999) and the Cup-winners Cup (1993) lost an even bigger battle when faced with the receiver's deadline.

Declared bankrupt in March, with debts of around €220million, Parma's last remaining chance of survival rested on the unlikely possibility that someone might step up to the plate and buy the club by June 22. Even though the receivers had reduced the debt to €22.6m, there were still no takers.

As a result, Parma will now drop out of professional football, perhaps starting life again in the amateur ranks of the fifth-tier Serie D – if and when the club name can be recycled. Yet even this remains far from clear.

The ongoing crisis started in 2003 when owners Parmalat collapsed in a spectacular €14billion crash. Deprived of the backing of the dairy multinational company – which the previous year had been valued at €3.7bn and employed 30,000 people in 30 countries – Parma were soon on a slippery downwards slope.

In much more recent times, an alarm bell rang loud and clear last summer when UEFA refused to let the team play in the Europa League, despite finishing sixth in Serie A, essentially because of unpaid taxes.

Since then, things have gone from bad to worse. Last season, the club changed hands twice, allegedly for the

price of just one euro, and has had five different presidents. In December, Tommaso Ghirardi sold the club to a little-known Russian-Cypriot consortium headed by Albanian tycoon Rezart Taci. Two months later they sold it to the even-less-well-known Giampietro Manenti.

The Slovenia-linked businessman talked about respecting tax and salary deadlines but failed to come up with any serious funding. In the meantime, the club was having difficulty paying its electricity and gas bills, with bailiffs arriving at the training grounds to seize office goods and vehicles. With the players having received no wages since July 2014, the club were also docked seven points – making an already difficult relegation fight virtually impossible.

In the end, Manenti was arrested in Brescia, on March 18, on charges of alleged involvement in credit-card fraud and money recycling. The following day, the club was declared bankrupt by a court hearing. It was only thanks to emergency funding of €5m from the Lega Serie A and the Italian Football Federation (FIGC) that Parma were able to play on until the end of the season – during which time they even managed to beat Juventus 1-0 in mid-April before being relegated.

There had been hopes of a rescue package put together by two consortia – one headed by Parma businessman Giuseppe Corrado, the other by former

US baseball player Mike Piazza – but both came to nothing. It has been suggested that while neither was put off so much by the €22.6m debt, a bigger concern was the unknown financial liabilities linked to the contracts of more than 100 players, reportedly bought and sold on by Parma in recent seasons.

One particularly worrying aspect of the whole debacle – and one that

raises some serious questions – concerns the FIGC's management of the problem.

The federation's financial regulatory authority, Covisoc, carried out inspections of the club's books in April, September and December of last year, when it was already clear that all was not in order. Furthermore, last June, it was the federation that had ruled Parma out of the Europa League because of financial problems. Yet, the federation only took action this February when it became clear that the club had again failed to pay players' wages and, more dramatically, when Parma failed to play two consecutive league games, against Udinese and Genoa.

The receivers have now issued a statement to confirm that no acquisition offers were forthcoming, explaining that they will now meet with creditors and the bankruptcy court judge in order to "make the necessary arrangement regarding the bankruptcy proceedings of the company".

It is all a very sad end for a club where Buffon, Cannavaro, Chiesa, Crespo, Sensini, Thuram, Veron and Zola all once strutted their stuff. **WS**

# Young guns offer new hope

Success of the under-20s could be just the start

Following Serbia's triumph at the Under-20 World Cup in New Zealand, a crowd of 50,000 turned out in Belgrade to welcome home the country's triumphant youngsters. On one of the banners hanging from the front of City Hall – which is more used to celebrating successes in basketball, water polo or volleyball – there was the inscription "*Ima nade*" (there is hope).

And while the euphoria of the under-20s may soon be over, there is a real hope that this will be the start of something great at senior level.

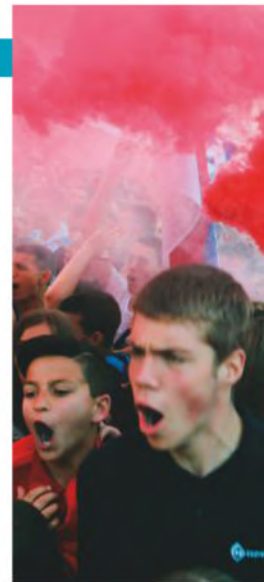
Much of that belief is not just down to the fact that the team won the junior world championship, but more about

how they did it, battling to victory despite playing extra-time in all four of their games in the knockout stage.

Physical strength, power and stamina have never been particular virtues of Serbian football, but this generation are an exception. As midfielder Sergej Milinkovic-Savic said after the 2-1 victory in the Final against Brazil: "We showed German mentality in a Serbian way. We always played well in those extra 30 minutes. It's not by chance that we eventually won in each of those games. Again we succeeded to show our strong mentality."

"Our persistence, desire for victory and motivation were on highest level. We never give up and we always reach our goal!"

Solid at the back, hard working and creative in

midfield, the team demonstrated great tactical discipline and, despite lacking a top-class striker, they still managed to be an effective attacking force, scoring 10 goals in seven matches.

From captain and goalkeeper Predrag Rajkovic of Red Star Belgrade, through to the centre-backs Milos Veljkovic of Tottenham Hotspur and Vojvodina's Srdjan Babic, and on to midfielders Nemanja Maksimovic of Astana in Kazakhstan and Milinkovic-Savic of Belgium's Genk, there was a great team spirit on display with no noticeable weak link. And added to

this was the talent of Partizan winger Andrija Zivkovic who is already being called a "Serbian Arjen Robben". But while all credit must go to the players, it is highly unlikely that any of this would have been possible without the guiding hand of 37-year-old coach Veljko Paunovic.

Ably assisted by his back-room staff, Paunovic left nothing to chance, setting up his side perfectly to combat whatever opposition they came up against. He has now worked with this set of players for the past three years and has built a tremendous relationship with players who have thrived on his outstanding motivational skills.

When he first started working with the group, he sat them down to watch a documentary about "the Chileans" – the Yugoslavia team of Boban, Suker, Mijatovic and Prosinecki that won the 1987 Under-20 World Cup in Chile.

"We gathered here [in the sports centre of Serbia's FA in Stara Pazova, near Belgrade] for the first time three years ago," said Paunovic on his return from this year's tournament. "Forty players were here and we watched footage of the 'Chileans'.

"I think that the most important thing was that the boys believed in it, that they respected each other and that they had a great desire to achieve their goal.

"I am proud of all players and I am proud that we crowned our work in the best possible way."

With the senior team very unlikely to qualify for the European Championship next year – which would be the third successive major

tournament they have missed out on – and a disappointing showing at this summer's Euro Under-21 finals, the under-20 side offers a glimmer of hope for the future.

It was a year ago that Paunovic said that he is convinced Serbia's national side will one day become European champions, claiming: "If Greece could do it, I see no reason why Serbia cannot."

With his charisma and optimism becoming contagious, Serbian fans are starting to believe that it is his "New Zealanders" who will fulfil that dream. **WS**



## 2015 UNDER-20 WORLD CUP

Serbia's first global title was achieved with a never-say-die attitude that culminated in a 2-1 victory over Brazil in the Final thanks to Nemanja Maksimovic's 118th-minute winner.

All four of their games in the knockout stage went to extra time and they were seconds away from going out in the round-of-16 until Ivan Saponjic's equaliser against Hungary. They then went on to win 2-1 despite Milan Gajic being sent off.

Although a record-equalling sixth world under-20 title eluded Brazil they did extend their record unbeaten run in the finals to 20 matches. They beat the previous best mark of Argentina, whose failure to get out of their group

was one of the competition shocks.

Adama Traore, who scored twice as Mali beat Senegal 3-1 in the third-place play-off, was named player of the tournament, while Viktor Kovalenko of Ukraine was top scorer with five goals.

# Shocks in store for big boys

## Minnows shine in qualifiers

**T**he second round of qualifiers for the 2018 World Cup is well and truly up and running in Asia, with 39 teams – 40 before Indonesia's suspension by FIFA – split into eight groups of five, with the winners and the four best second-placed finishers going into the final round.

The eight top seeds, including Australia, Japan and South Korea, have played just once so far while most of the other sides have 180 minutes under their belt. But who would have thought Guam would be leading their group with maximum points from the first two games?

Well, Guam coach Gary White for one. As he told *World Soccer* last month: "We want to be top of the group after the first two games and then we'll see what happens."

The Englishman got his wish with two famous wins: 1-0 v Turkmenistan and then 2-1 v India. There are tougher tests ahead – not least the next game, in Tehran against Iran, who were held to a 1-1 draw in Turkmenistan in their opener – on September 3, but it is going to be a pleasant summer for Guam followers.

With six games left, finishing second is a possibility. And for a team that had only played two qualification games previously, against Iran and Tajikistan for the

2002 tournament which ended in respective 16-0 and then 19-0 losses, that's quite a turnaround.

After the loss to White's Guam, India's coach Stephen Constantine – who is also English – reminded the country's media that, although Guam's population of 180,000 is dwarfed by India's 1.3 billion, Guam had more players with overseas experience than India.

"Guam started with nine players from the United States who have had a football education that is not available in India," said Constantine. "Fair play to Guam for using the rules, as you do what you can to field your strongest team."

India have no points from their first two games and with the AFC combining qualification for the 2018 World Cup with that of the Asian Cup, things are not looking good for the national side.

The loss has restarted a debate as to whether India should go down the same route as Guam, but at the moment the government does not allow what are called "players of Indian origin" to represent the country unless they renounce their other passport. Fans are putting together a petition for a change of

rules but it could take some time.

The Philippines, on the other hand, have fully embraced this idea and have been handing caps to players of Philippine heritage born all over the world. In came former Fulham reserve goalkeeper Neil Etheridge, the Youngusband brothers, once of Chelsea, and former German youth international Stephan Schrock, but the side remained south-east Asia's traditional underachievers.

However, with former United States international goalkeeper Thomas Dooley in charge, results are starting to pick up, with Bahrain and Yemen already beaten. Next up is a home game against top seeds

Uzbekistan, who lost their only game so far, 4-2 in North Korea.

Australia played their first competitive game since winning the Asian Cup in January and achieved a hard-fought 2-1 victory in Kyrgyzstan, where a bumpy pitch hampered the hosts more than the Socceroos. Jordan, who are expected to finish second in the group, won 3-1 in Tajikistan, who went on to draw with Bangladesh.

South Korea strolled to a 2-0 win over Myanmar in the neutral venue of Bangkok thanks to a goal and an assist for Bayer Leverkusen's Son Heung-min, while bitter rivals Japan fared less well.

Expected to win comfortably at home to Singapore, who opened their campaign with a 4-0 win in Cambodia, Japan were held to a goalless draw in Saitama in a first competitive game under the guidance of Algeria's 2014 World Cup boss, Vahid Halilhodzic.

While there's still time for Japan to get back on track, and the outsiders to fade after good starts, the signs are that some of the so-called minnows in Asia are growing up. **WS**

# It's gold again for Guernsey

Channel Islanders sweep to victory in Jersey

**F**our years after Guernsey FC started playing in the English league system – where they won successive promotions and are currently in Ryman League Division One – the Channel Islanders won gold at the Island Games' 14th football tournament, beating the Isle of Man 3-0 in the Final on neighbouring Jersey.

With all but one of the squad coming from Guernsey FC, they sailed through the group stage, beating Ynys Mon 5-2 and the Swedish island of Gotland 3-0, before brushing aside UEFA's newest members Gibraltar with a 4-0 victory at Springfield Stadium in St Helier.

Guernsey then returned to Springfield to edge out Menorca in the semi-finals before facing the Isle of Man, who were losing finalists in 1993, 1999 and 2003. Craig Young, Ross Allen and Kieran Mahon were all on target as the Channel Islanders won their third title to equal the record of Jersey.

Despite Jersey's elimination in the group stage this year, the tournament was a big success, attracting 16 sides – compared to the four who took part at the last event in Bermuda in 2013. Bermuda did not

defend their crown as they were involved in 2018 World Cup qualifiers, but Greenland – surprise silver medalists last time – were there, and they were desperately unlucky not to claim another medal.

Twice pegged back by Menorca in their opening Group A

game, Greenland won their next two – beating the Finnish island of Aland 2-0 and the Estonians of Saaremaa 2-1 – but they missed out on the semi-finals on goal difference to Menorca, who later claimed bronze.

“We had a rough preparation this year,” said Greenland’s Ethiopian coach, Tekle Ghebrelul. “There was too much snow and ice to do much, apart from some running, before we left for a training camp.”

Other than Guernsey, Greenland were the only team not to lose a game and they finished fifth after winning a play-off with the 2011 champions the Isle of Wight.

The Isle of Wight were disappointing and badly shown up in their second group game, in St Ouen against the Falkland Islands. After threatening to swamp the Falklanders, the Isle of Wight were outfought in the second half by a team that does not even play regularly and a 3-0 defeat was harsh on the South Atlantic side.

Like the Greenlanders, the Island Games provides a rare outlet for the Falklands, whose small, five-club league fell apart four years ago. “We don’t even know what our level is,” said coach Georgi Elkabidze. “If we played regularly we could find out, but all we have is four games every two years. We don’t even have a pitch as the one in Port Stanley is unusable.”

Elkabidze is a Georgian who was with Dynamo Tbilisi as a youth and reflects the slightly looser rules on nationality. The Falklands squad also included Chilean striker Rafa Sotomayor and a well-travelled Zimbabwean, Shupi Chipursa, who spent 14 years working around the world, including two years playing in the Croatian second tier.

Given that the Falklands’ 19-man squad took two days to get to Jersey and had no real preparations, a win in their opener against Hitra and finishing 11th can be viewed as a success.

First staged in 1989, the Island Games has run for longer and outlasted all the plethora of tournaments for sides stuck in the limbo world outside FIFA. Roll on Gotland 2017. **WS**

# Sweden triumph in Prague

Spot-kicks seal first Euro Under-21 crown

**S**upposed makeweights in their group, Sweden were crowned European Under-21 champions in the Czech Republic and proved once again that the gap between age-group teams is far flimsier than at senior level.

Their first success at this level was achieved by doing the simple things well, with goalkeeper Patrik Carlgren, defender Joseph Baffo, midfielders Simon Tibbling and Abdul Khalili, and the hard-running John Guidetti in attack all determinedly impressive.

Of the other teams, Denmark's centre-back Jannick Vestergaard and the more exotic likes of Portugal's Bernardo Silva and William Carvalho, as well as Italy's Domenico Berardi, stood out. England's Harry Kane, who was the focus of much attention, was hamstrung by a lack of creative support.

The Czechs' staging of the tournament was happily straightforward after the politically-inspired mangles of so many senior events.

In Prague, Slavia and Sparta's Eden and Letna stadia hosted Group A games, plus one semi-final and the Final, while Group B in Moravia was centred on Olomouc, two and a half hours south-east of the capital by train, and Uherske Hradiste, further down towards the Slovak border.

Group A interest focused on the Czech hosts and favourites Germany, but both ultimately disappointed. Every tournament needs the host team to generate fan momentum and the only Czech consolation after an opening 2-1 defeat by Denmark was that Germany and Serbia drew 1-1 in the day's other tie. The Germans conceded an early goal, levelled through Liverpool's Emre Can and held out for the draw despite having Christian Gunter sent off.

With Can restored to midfield after struggling as a makeshift defender at Liverpool, Germany beat the Danes 3-0 next time out, with Kevin Volland scoring twice, but it proved the high watermark of their campaign. Jihlava striker Jan Kliment's hat-trick in the Czechs' 4-0 win against Serbia was enough to make him the tournament's top scorer.

Denmark recovered from their German upset to beat Serbia 2-0 and claim top spot, while Czech hopes came to an end in a 1-1 draw with Germany, who finished runners-up in the group after

withstanding the hosts' late rally. Semi-final places not only fired Germany and Denmark forward but guaranteed places for both at the Rio Olympics.

One issue kept Czech hopes alive. In Group B, if England were to finish in the top two then, since Britain would not enter the Olympics, a play-off would be needed between the two third-placed teams – the Czechs being one – to settle the last place in Rio.

Despite being drawn with Italy, Portugal and the always redoubtable Sweden, England manager Gareth Southgate had built up morale and a selection system, with the presence of Kane in attack, after his outstanding season with Tottenham Hotspur, being one of the main attractions of the tournament.

However, Southgate's plan of action was undermined by the loss of qualifying top scorer Saido Berahino to a mystery eve-of-event injury and defensive cornerstone John Stones to concussion after a training-ground collision with keeper Jack Butland.

England lost their opener 1-0 to Portugal, for whom Monaco's Bernardo Silva was a delight to watch, but then beat Sweden with a fine late volley from Manchester United's Jesse Lingard.

They needed to win their third game to reach the semi-finals – and offer the Czechs an Olympic play-off chance – and opponents Italy came into the match with issues of their own. They had thrown away their opener against Sweden in ridiculous fashion, losing 2-1 after

leading 1-0 at the interval against a side reduced to 10 men by the early expulsion of defender Alexander Milosevic. But it all went wrong when Guidetti levelled and Juventus' Stefano Sturaro was sent off for throwing a punch. Four minutes from time, Sweden completed the turnaround with a winning penalty from Bordeaux's Isaac Kiese Thelin.

Next time out Italy wasted a catalogue of chances in a goalless draw with Portugal which set up a winner-takes-all last game.

Italy beat England 3-0 and for eight minutes they looked to be in the semi-finals, with Portugal leading Sweden 1-0. However, the impressive Tibbling snatched a last-minute Swedish equaliser and, finishing level on points, the use of "mutual results" saw Sweden progress rather than Italy as the first degree of separation proved fatal.

In the semis, Sweden comfortably beat Denmark 4-1 while Germany were ripped apart 5-0 by Portugal. Silva scored the first goal and had a hand in the next three as the Portuguese danced around opponents reduced to a helplessly tetchy 10 men by the expulsion of substitute Leonardo Billencourt.

The Final, however, proved a different story. Portugal captain Sergio Oliveira curled an early free-kick against the Swedish bar, but otherwise Silva and Carvalho were stifled. Sweden coach Hakan Ericson put into effect all the lessons he had learned from the teams' group game and the full 120 minutes ended goalless.

Two sharp saves by Carlgren in the shoot-out meant a 4-3 victory and Sweden, to the highly vocal delight of their magnificent fans, were European under-21 champions for the first time. **WS**

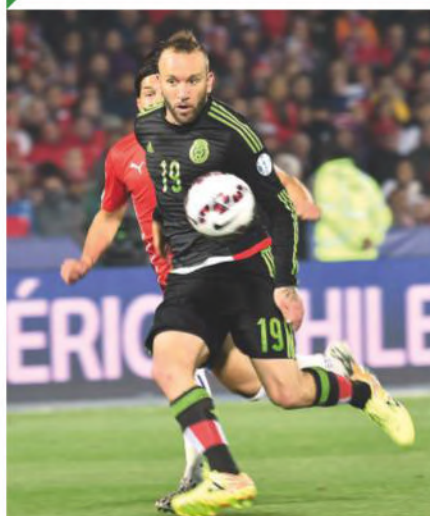

# Italy 4 West Germany 3

Five goals in extra time as West Germany push Italy all the way for a place in the World Cup Final



Drama...Italy win in extra time

When Franz Beckenbauer was told that the 1970 World Cup semi-final between Italy and West Germany had been voted *World Soccer's* greatest match of all time [in the Summer 2007 edition], he was not surprised. "It was the same when we voted in Germany," he said. "But what people forget is how ordinary the first 90 minutes were.

"It was the 30 minutes of extra time that were so extraordinary."

"Der Kaiser", who finished the match with his arm strapped to his side as a result of a brutal foul, was spot on.

Italy scored early in the game and set about defending their lead. The longer the match went on, the more the Germans threw caution to the wind.

Eric Batty wrote in *World Soccer*: "The climax of the competition was undoubtedly the Italy v West Germany semi-final which followed a predictable pattern. Italy, always content to defend, were leading for most of the game by a goal to nil while the Germans threw up everyone they had, including their liberos, Schnellinger and Schulz.

"With two minutes of injury time gone it was Schnellinger – who had abandoned his free role at the back – who threw himself forward, feet first to snatch the



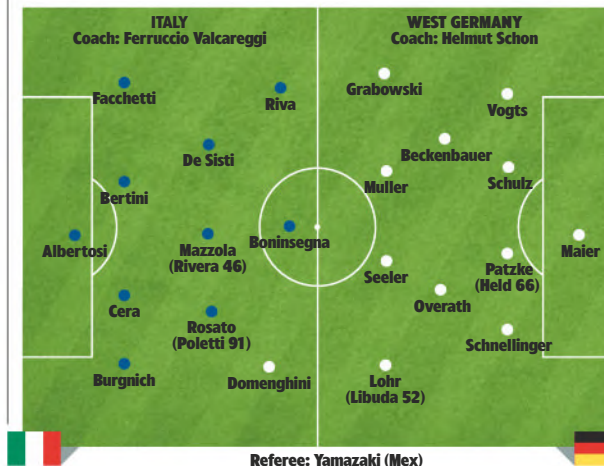

goal that forced Italy into extra time."

It was the extra half an hour that defined the game. Five goals were scored in a 16-minute period, with the lead fluctuating back and forth, before Italy substitute Gianni Rivera scored the winner.

Batty added: "The two fiercely fought matches that both went to extra time – West Germany v England (quarter-final) and West Germany v Italy – had a cumulative effect on the German's energy.

"This factor alone probably determined that Italy and not West Germany would face Brazil in the Final." *WS*
